Extra Points

Through four games, the KU defense ranks second in the Big 12 allowing the opposition to convert on just 25.4 percent of its third down opportunities. Opponents have converted 15-of-59 third down tries.

KU ranks second in the Big 12 by scoring on 94 percent of its red zone opportunities. The Hawks have been in the red zone 17 times and have come away with 13 touchdowns and three field goals.

Eight teams that participated in bowl contests a year ago highlight the 2004 KU football schedule -- one of the most challenging in school history. KU's opponents coming off bowl appearances in 2003 include Tulsa (Humanitarian Bowl), Northwestern (Motor City Bowl), Texas Tech (Houston Bowl), Nebraska (Alamo Bowl), Kansas State (Fiesta Bowl), Oklahoma (Sugar Bowl), Texas (Holiday Bowl) and Missouri (Independence Bowl).

After collecting a 2-10 record in coach Mark Mangino's first season, the Jayhawks finished 2003 with a 6-7 overall mark, representing a 3.5 game improvement. Only seven Division I teams recorded better turn-arounds, including Tulsa (KU's opponent in the 2004 season-opener) which was 1-11 in 2002 but ended last season with an 8-5 mark.

In each of his first two seasons at Kansas, Mark Mangino has coached the Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year. QB Bill Whittemore won the honor in 2002, while center Joe Vaughn became the first lineman in Big 12 history to earn the award last season.

Scene Setter

After a pair of hard-luck losses, the University of Kansas (2-2, 0-1 Big 12) football team looks to return to the win column when the team travels to Lincoln, Neb., for a 6:10 p.m. kickoff against Nebraska. The game against the Cornhuskers will mark the 99th straight year that the two teams have faced each other -- the longest continuous series in Division IA and an NCAA record (ahead of the 95 games by Kansas-Oklahoma, who met every year from 1903-1997. Kansas and Nebraska rank seventh and eighth in the Big 12 in scoring offense with an average of 32.8 and 32.2 points per game, respectively.

Nebraska enters the game against the Jayhawks with the league's top rushing defense that allows an average of 41.3 yards per game. First-year head coach Bill Callahan spent the past two seasons as the head coach of the Oakland Raiders and was just the fourth rookie head coach in the history of the NFL to lead his team to the Super Bowl -- a feat he accomplished in 2002.

A Kansas WIN Would ...

Be the team's first against Nebraska since the 1968 season and snap a streak of 35 straight wins by the Cornhuskers ... Make the all-time series against the Cornhuskers 86-22-3 in favor of Nebraska ... Give KU its eighth all-time win in NU's Memorial Stadium and 16th all-time win in Lincoln ... Be Mark Mangino's first win as a head coach over Nebraska ... Give Mark Mangino his 11th career win as head coach, making his overall record 11-19 ... Make Kansas 528-521-58 all-time.

A Kansas LOSS Would ...

Extend NU's win streak over the Jayhawks to 36 games ... Give KU a 2-3 record for the first time since 2002 ... Mark Bill Callahan's first career win over the Jayhawks ... Give Mark Mangino an overall record of 10-20 ... Make Kansas 527-522-58 all-time.

The Coaches

KU head coach Mark Mangino (10-19, .345), who was a driving force in the successful turn-around of two Big 12 Conference football programs prior to his arrival in Lawrence, is in his third season as head football coach at the University of Kansas. Last year, Mangino led the Jayhawks to their first bowl appearance since 1995 when the team faced North Carolina State in the Mazda Tangerine Bowl.

Behind a solid work ethic and attention to detail, Mangino's plan to resurrect the Kansas football team is paying dividends. His eye for talent has shone brightly as each of the last two Big 12 Offensive Newcomers of the Year have been represented by Jayhawk football players -- quarterback Bill Whittemore in 2002 and center Joe Vaughn in 2003.

Nebraska is coached by Bill Callahan (2-1, .667), who is in his first season as the team's head coach. Callahan spent the last two seasons as head coach of the Oakland Raiders where he guided the team to a 17-18 overall record in two years, and a 2-1 playoff record in 2002 (lost to Tampa Bay in Super Bowl XXXVII).

A Quick Look at Nebraska

Nebraska (2-1, 0-0 Big 12) opens its 2004 Big 12 campaign against the Jayhawks after earning a pair of wins over Western Illinois and Pittsburgh, which sandwich a home loss to Southern Mississippi on Sept. 11. The Cornhuskers have won 28 of their last 29 conference openers since 1974 with the lone loss a 36-14 setback at Iowa State in 2002. Through its first three games, NU is averaging 32.3 points per game and has outscored its opponents 69-22 in the first half. The team averages 253.3 rushing yards per contest and collects an average of 5.9 yards per carry. Sophomore quarterback Joe Dailey has completed 48-of-94 passes for 562 yards and seven touchdowns but has also been picked off eight times this season. I-Back Cory Ross leads the ground attack with 367 total rushing yards and averages 5.7 yards per carry.

Kansas - Nebraska Series Notes

The KU-NU series is tied for the third longest in NCAA Division I-A history at 110 games, trailing only Minnesota-Wisconsin (113) and Kansas-Missouri (112) ... The two teams have squared off 98 consecutive years making it the longest current uninterrupted series in NCAA I-A history ... KU's 100th all-time football win was an 8-6 victory over NU in 1906 ... Three of the last five meetings in the series with the Cornhuskers have been played at night ... The Nebraska defense has held the Jayhawks to one touchdown or less in each of the last three meetings and in seven of the last nine contests.

Kansas - Nebraska Ties

► Both Kansas head coach Mark Mangino and Nebraska offensive coordinator Jay Norvell have had similar influences in their coaching careers. Mangino served on Bob Stoops' staff as assistant head coach/offensive from 1999-2001 before being tapped at KU's head coach. Norvell also worked on the offensive side of the ball with Stoops at OU, as the Sooners wide receivers coach in 2002.

► Oct. 11 is the earliest ever meeting between the two school in the series. The traditional rivals have met in November each of the past four seasons and 15 of the past 21 years.

► Nebraska I-Back Cory Ross is the younger brother of former KU wide receiver Roger Ross who starred at Kansas from 2000-01.

► Jayhawk head football trainer Carol Jarosky came to KU 10 years ago from the University of Nebraska where she was a graduate assistant for two years and assistant athletics trainer for one season.

Barmann Continues to Put Up Numbers

Kansas quarterback Adam Barmann has completed better than 56 percent of his pass attempts this season and currently ranks second in the Big 12 in both touchdown passes (9) and passing yards (927). He also ranks third in the Big 12 with an average of 231.8 passing yards per game. It seems that every game, the Weston, Mo., native, sets a new career-high in one category or another. At Northwestern on Sept. 18, Barmann recorded career-bests with 30 pass completions and 48 pass attempts. On Sept. 11 against Toledo, Barmann completed 24-of-34 passes for a career-best 310 yards while tying a career mark with four touchdowns.

Inside the Numbers

Through the team's first four games, the KU defense has not allowed a first quarter touchdown as the Jayhawks have outscored the opposition 42-5 in the first stanza. In addition, the opposition has crossed the goal line just twice in the fourth quarter (Northwestern, Texas Tech), but both of those scores turned into game-winning drives.

Receivers Making Plays

If the 2003 football season proved anything to head coach Mark Mangino, it was that his team's receivers should be solid for years to come. Junior Brandon Rideau was catching everything thrown his way, and finally was developing into the dependable target Mangino had hoped for. Sophomore Mark Simmons became one of the Big 12's most feared deep threats and rookie Charles Gordon was an all-around playmaker who could keep defenses constantly on their heels. All three players return to the team in 2004.

Rideau's numbers last season were solid for a player who only had 29 receptions and one touchdown after his first two years on campus. He finished the 2003 season with 51 catches, 677 yards and six touchdowns. Last week against Texas Tech, Rideau led the team with a season-high seven receptions for 69 yards and a touchdown. On Sept. 18 against Northwestern, Rideau caught seven passes for 84 yards and tied a career-best with two touchdown receptions. On Sept. 4 against Tulsa, the Beaumont, Texas, native blocked a pair of punts and was named the Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Week. He leads the 2004 club in catches (23), touchdowns (4) and receiving yards per game (58.2).

However, the biggest surprise in 2003 may have come from Simmons who led the way for Jayhawks in yards per catch (19.2) and tied Gordon for the team lead with 769 receiving yards. His seven touchdowns were a team-high and the third-best single-season total in school history. Against Toledo on Sept. 11, Simmons led the team with 81 yards on six catches and scored his first TD of the year.

Gordon had 57 catches in 2003 and was the perfect fit in the slot while playing both offense and defense. While many believe his transformation into a cornerback this season will severely impede his ability to post impressive offensive numbers, he caught a pair of passes in the Tulsa game, including a seven-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter -- KU's first TD of the season. Gordon has caught at least one pass in all four of KU's games this year, including a pair of touchdowns.

Linebackers Solid

Middle linebacker Gabriel Toomey, who was the team's Defensive MVP last season, leads a veteran group of linebackers looking to solidify a defense which ranked 85th nationally in 2003 and allowed an average of 412.6 yards per game. Toomey, a junior transfer from Iowa Central CC, originally signed with Oklahoma but left Norman after a redshirt season. He finished second on the team last season with 121 tackles and was a second-team All-Big 12 selection (AP and Fort Worth Star Telegram).

Nick Reid came to KU as a quarterback but permanently switched to the defensive side of the ball during his freshman campaign. In 2003, Reid led the team with 133 tackles and was named honorable-mention All-Big 12. The Derby, Kan., native currently leads the Big 12 with an average of 10.2 tackles per game.

Kevin Kane made his first career start against Tulsa on Sept. 4 and finished the game with five tackles and an interception. Kane also recorded a sack and two TFLs in the contest against the Golden Hurricane. Currently, Kane ranks fifth on the team with 18 total tackles, including three TFLs.

Banks Floodman, a KU captain, earned honorable-mention All-Big 12 honors last season after starting all 13 contests and recording 93 tackles. The Wichita, Kan., native averaged 7.2 tackles per game as a sophomore and was the winner of the Nolan Cromwell Award for Leadership at the team's annual postseason awards banquet.

Defense Improved

KU's 21-3 win over Tulsa on Sept. 4 marked the first time Kansas has held an NCAA Division I-A team without a touchdown since defeating Missouri, 21-0, in 1999. After a second-quarter field goal, KU's defense seemed to get better as the game progressed. Tulsa collected 124 yards of total offense in the first half, but the Jayhawks held the Golden Hurricane to just 17 yards in the second stanza. Throughout the game, KU kept constant pressure on Tulsa quarterback James Kilian as he collected just 91 passing yards on the night. Seven different Jayhawks recorded sacks, including linebacker Kevin Kane who dropped Kilian in his endzone for a safety.

Against Toledo on Sept. 11, the Jayhawk defense shined again, forcing five turnovers, including a pair of interceptions (Nick Reid, Tony Stubbs). The KU secondary held the Rockets' top receiver, Lance Moore to just three catches for nine yards -- including a long of four yards. Moore had 103 catches in 2003.

At Northwestern on Sept. 18, the KU defense was solid for the majority of the game as it held Wildcat quarterback Brett Basanez to just 192 yards through the air. Entering the contest, Basanez was averaging more than 370 passing yards per contest.

Last week against Texas Tech, the Jayhawk defense held the high-scoring Red Raiders to just 11 points in the first half as KU built a 30-11 halftime lead. Junior linebacker Nick Reid led all Kansas defenders with 12 total tackles as four different KU defenders recorded interceptions in the contest against Tech.

Making their Point

The KU defense allowed just 37 points in the teams first three games of the 2004 season -- the fewest points the team had surrendered in three consecutive contests since 1999 when the KU allowed 34 points in three straight games (0 vs. Missouri, 24 vs. Nebraska, 10 vs. Baylor). To emphasize the improvement, the KU defense allowed 37 or more points in seven separate games during the 2002 season -- Mark Mangino's first year as head coach at Kansas.

Scoring Standards Set Against Toledo

The 63 points scored by KU against Toledo on Sept. 11 were the most by the Jayhawks against a Division I-A team since KU defeated New Mexico 68-7 on Oct. 5, 1968. KU defeated Division I-AA Cal State Northridge 71-14 on Sept. 11, 1999. In addition, KU's 49-point margin of victory was the largest since it defeated Cal-State Northridge 71-14 (by 57 points) on Sept. 11, 1999. The Jayhawks also tied a school record by lighting up the scoreboard with 49 points in the first half against the Rockets. KU also scored 49 points in a single half against Illinois State (first half, 1998) and St. Mary's (first half, 1912).

Rideau Among KU's Elite

With seven receptions against Texas Tech on Sept. 25, senior wide receiver Brandon Rideau moved into fifth place on KU's all-time receptions list. Rideau is currently 20 catches shy of tying Willie Vaughn for first place on the Jayhawks' career catches list.

PAT Record Broken

Making his first appearance in a Jayhawk uniform, redshirt freshman kicker Scott Webb booted nine PATs against Toledo, marking the most by an individual in a single game in KU history.

Out of the Backfield

Led by junior Clark Green and sophomore John Randle, the KU running game is averaging 102.2 yards per contest. Green led the team in 2003 with an average of 74.5 rushing yards per game and averaged an impressive 4.7 yards per carry. Green is also a valuable receiver out of the backfield, as he hauled in 44 catches last year -- the most ever in a single-season by a KU running back.

Randle led the team last season by averaging 6.2 yards per carry after gaining 400 yards on just 64 attempts and is the team's leading rusher through four games this season with an average of 57.0 yards per outing. He was the team's leading rusher against Tulsa on

Sept. 4 and Toledo on Sept. 11 as he gained 56 yards against the Golden Hurricane and 104 yards against the Rockets. Randle's 100-yard rushing effort marked the first by a Jayhawk since Clark Green (103 yards) accomplished the feat against Colorado on Oct. 11, 2003.

All Three Phases

After an outstanding freshman campaign in 2003 that saw him earn first-team freshman All-America honors from *The Sporting News*, as both a wide receiver and kick returner, Charles Gordon has switched primarily to the defensive side of the ball in 2004. Gordon played just four games in the team's defensive backfield last season, but spent much of this year's training camp preparing for life as a cornerback. However, head coach Mark Mangino believes that Gordon will still see a number of snaps on the offensive side of the ball -- which is good news for KU quarterbacks. In fact, Gordon scored the team's first touchdown of the season on a seven-yard reception in the third quarter against Tulsa, and last week against Texas Tech, scored on a 20 yard pass play in the second quarter to give the Jayhawks a 30-5 lead.

2003 Offense Set Numerous Records

The Jayhawks tied a school-record by scoring 21 or more points on 10 different occasions last year en route to a record-setting offensive performance. Kansas also set school records for most points (384), most first downs (286), most touchdown passes (25) and most yards gained in a season (5,479).

Scoring at a Record Pace

The Jayhawks set a school record by scoring 384 points during the 2003 season -- an average of 29.5 points per game. In fact, during Mark Mangino's two years at Kansas, the offense raised its per-game average by 13 points per contest. After averaging 16.5 points per contest in 2001 -- the year prior to Mangino's arrival -- the Jayhawks scored 20.6 points per game in 2002. Last season, the KU offense averaged nearly 30 points per game -- the fourth-best single-season mark in school history.

Junior defensive end David McMillan has KU's longest starting streak as he has started the last 29 games for the 'Hawks ... Since 1999, the Jayhawks are 21-10 when scoring 21 or more points including the team's 31-30 loss to Texas Tech on Sept. 25 ... Kansas has forced at least one turnover in 14 of its last 17 contests ... Since 1995, KU is 23-8 when a Jayhawk player rushes for over 100 yards in a game.

Three sets of brothers are currently listed on the Jayhawk roster, including Greg and Gary Heaggans, identical twins Donnie and Ronnie Amadi and newcomer walk-ons Milan and Mitar Rudanovic.

What's That Sign?

In a show of support for defensive end John McCoy and all of the U.S. troops around the globe, the University of Kansas football team will affix McCoy's initials, "JM" to the back of its helmets during the 2004 season. The decals are Jayhawk gold in color and approximately one inch tall.

McCoy, a senior from Richwood, Ohio, has been a member of the United States Army since July 2000. He was a member of the Lawrence-based 317th Quartermaster Battalion that departed for specialized training in late July. Last April, he received notice that his unit had been put on alert for mobilization. McCoy's career with the military began after his senior year of high school in Richwood, Ohio. Without a scholarship to an NCAA I university, McCoy made a goal to pay for college on his own.

McCoy appeared in 12 games last season for the Jayhawks and recorded 11 tackles, including one quarterback sack.

Did you Know?

KU cornerback/wide receiver Charles Gordon has caught at least one pass in each of his 17 career games. Despite spending the majority of his time on the defensive side of the ball this year, Gordon hauled in seven passes and scored two touchdowns this season.

Kansas Captains

Head coach Mark Mangino waited a little longer than usual this season to name his 2004 team captains, but the coach made the announcement at the team's annual Fan Appreciation Day ceremonies on Aug. 25 at Memorial Stadium. Earning the honors for the 2004 season were senior defensive end David McMillan, junior linebacker Banks Floodman, senior defensive tackle Travis Watkins, senior center Joe Vaughn and senior wide receiver Brandon Rideau.

Game-by-Game Post-game Notes

at Kansas 21, Tulsa 3

- Defensive end David McMillan started for the 26th-straight time.
- A total of eight Jayhawks made their first career starts -- Derek Fine, Travis Dambach, David Ochoa, Matt Thompson, Theo Baines, Jermial Ashley, Rodney Harris and Kevin Kane.
- Senior Brandon Rideau blocked a pair of punts and was named Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Week.
- Senior kicker Johnny Beck's 51-yard field goal in the second quarter was his best at Memorial Stadium since hitting a 52-yarder against UCLA as a freshman on Sept. 8, 2001.
- The three points KU allowed in the game were the fewest since the Jayhawks shut out Southern Illinois 42-0 on Sept. 23, 2000 and the first against an NCAA IA team since 1999 shutout of Missouri.
- Sophomore Charles Gordon, who had pair of catches including a seven-yard touchdown, has caught at least one pass in each of his 14 career games.
- KU recorded a safety for the first time since Oct. 12, 2002, against Colorado.
- Junior linebacker Kevin Kane recorded his first career interception mid-way through the fourth quarter.
- Since 1999, the Jayhawks are 18-9 when scoring 21 or more points.
- With his three receptions in the game, Brandon Rideau moved into 12th place on the all-time career receptions list with 83.

at Kansas 63, Toledo 14

- The 63 points scored by KU against Toledo were the most against a Division I-A team since the Jayhawks defeated New Mexico 68-7 on Oct. 5, 1968.
- KU's 49-point margin of victory was the largest since it defeated Cal-State Northridge 71-14 (by 57 points) on Sept. 11, 1999.
- Kansas had nine receivers catch at least one pass in the game. It marked the fifth time under Mark Mangino in which KU has used eight or more different receivers in a single game.
- The last time Kansas scored 28 points in a single quarter was on Oct. 11, 2003, when the Jayhawks put 28 on the board in the second quarter against Colorado. The last time KU scored 28 in a quarter at home was Sept. 20, 2003, in the first stanza against Jacksonville State. Kansas' 28 points in the first quarter were the most in an opening stanza against a Division I school since 1965 when such records have been kept.
- The Jayhawks improved their record to 7-2 under Mark Mangino when scoring first.

- The 49 points scored by KU in the first half were the most points scored in a half against Toledo by any opponent.
- Kansas' 17 points given up in the first two games of the season mark the lowest for a two-game stretch since early in the 1997 season when KU defeated TCU 17-10 and Missouri 15-7.
- KU's nine PATs tonight by Scott Webb marked the most in a single game in KU history. The previous record was eight PATs for a game held by four others with the last by Jeff McCord vs. UAB in 1994.
- Sophomore running back John Randle scored a career-high three TDs in the first half for a career total of six. Randle's 55-yard reception was a career-long. Randle rushed for a career-high 104 yards, surpassing his 77 yards (nine carries) vs. UNLV last season. His 79 receiving yards also marked a career-high.
- Sophomore quarterback Adam Barmann's four touchdown passes tied a career-high. Barmann also threw four TDs against Texas A&M last season.
- Senior Mark Simmons moved into sixth place on the all-time KU career touchdown receptions list (10).
- Redshirt freshman Brandon McAnderson (Lawrence, Kan.) recorded his first career rushing attempt and first TD late in the fourth quarter.

at Northwestern 20, Kansas 17

- Senior offensive guard Tony Coker made his first appearance of the season.
- Charles Green hauled in a career-long 49-yard catch in the second quarter.
- Freshman kicker Scott Webb connected on his first career field goal, a 27-yard attempt in the second quarter.
- Kansas used nine receivers in the game. It marked the second-straight week and sixth time under Mark Mangino in which KU has used eight or more different receivers in a single game.
- Freshman punter Kyle Tucker made his first career appearance, booting a 46-yard punt in the third quarter on his first career kick.
- Senior tight end Lyonel Anderson recorded a career high five pass receptions (3 vs. Texas A&M, 11/1/03).
- Freshman wide receiver Marcus Henry established new career highs with two catches for 22 yards (1 catch for 17 yards vs. Toledo, 9/11/04).
- Kansas' 47 rushing yards were its fewest since KU rushed for 88 yards versus Nebraska on Nov. 8, 2003.
- Adam Barmann recorded career-highs with 30 pass completions and 48 passing attempts, the most in each category since his collegiate debut (25-of-37 vs. Texas A&M, 11/1/03).

- Senior wide receiver Brandon Rideau tied a career high with two touchdown receptions (2 vs. Texas A&M, 11/1/03).
- Brandon Rideau moved into eighth place on the all-time KU career receptions list with 96 career catches. He passed Ashaundai Smith (91), and is one short of Quinton Smith and Kenny Drayton (97).
- Rideau also moved into a tie for sixth on the all-time touchdown receptions list with 10.
- Northwestern's fourth quarter touchdown were the first points KU has given up in the fourth quarter this season.

Texas Tech 31, at Kansas 30

- Kansas had four interceptions to mark its third multi-interception game of the season and seventh under head coach Mark Mangino. The last time KU had four interceptions in a game was Oct. 10, 1998 at Baylor.
- Kansas' one-play drive in the first quarter was the first since the Jayhawks' win against Jacksonville State on Sept. 20, 2003 (first quarter).
- Texas Tech's five points in the first quarter were the first points scored on Kansas in the first quarter this season. KU has outscored its opponents 42-5 in the first quarter this year.
- Texas Tech broke the record for largest comeback by a KU opponent as KU held a 30-5 advantage in the game. The previous mark was a 19-0 KU advantage against Colorado in 1961 -- a CU 20-19 win.
- Senior Greg Tyree's interception in the second quarter was the first of his career.
- Rodney Harris recorded his first career interception in the first quarter.
- Charles Gordon's first pass attempt of the season was good for a touchdown. Gordon attempted two passes last season.
- Senior Brandon Rideau moved into a tie for fifth on the KU career receptions list with 101, tying Isaac Byrd (1995-96). Rideau's TD catch today moved him into a tie for fourth on the career TDs list with 11. He is tied with Termaine Fulton (1997-2001) and David Verser (1977-80). Rideau also moved into 12th on the KU career receiving yards list with 1,272 yards.
- Senior Clark McCracken's fumble recovery in the first half was the first of his career at Kansas.
- Junior Clark Green moved into 10th on the school's career rushing list, now at 1,869 yards.
- Junior Gabriel Toomey's interception was the first of the season and second for his career at KU.
