## The Series

**Series Record** This is the first meeting between Nebraska and Western Illinois. Western has an 0-3 record against Big 12 schools, most recently playing at Missouri (L, 20-50) in the 2000 season opener. The other two games came against Kansas State - a 35-7 loss in 1986 and a 27-6 loss in 1990.

### 101st Season of Leatherneck Football Opens in Lincoln, Neb.

The 101st season of Western Illinois football will open Saturday in Lincoln, Neb., as the Cornhuskers open a new era with first-year head coach Bill Callahan.

### First Matchup Against the Huskers, Second Against Big 12 in Last Five Years

This marks the Leathernecks' first game against Nebraska, but the second meeting with the Big 12 in Coach Patterson's five years at Western. The Leathernecks opened the 2000 season with a 50-20 loss at Missouri, staying within striking distance for a half (21-13 at halftime) but giving up 29 second-half points.

Western has an all-time record of 0-3 against Big 12 schools, also facing Kansas State twice (35-7 in 1986 and 27-6 in 1990).

### Two Other Gateway/Big 12 Matchups This Week

Two more Gateway Football Conference members visit Big 12 teams this Saturday as Northern Iowa plays at Iowa State (1 p.m.) and Western Kentucky faces Kansas State (6:10 p.m.).

### Leathernecks vs. BCS Teams

When Western Illinois faced eventual national-champion LSU last season, it was just the second time a Leatherneck team had played against a member of a BCS institution; the 2000 season opener at Missouri being the first such game. The LSU matchup also marked Western's first game against a ranked I-A opponent.

### Patterson and Season Openers

Sixth-year head coach Don Patterson is 4-1 in season openers at Western Illinois, defeating Northern Illinois (27-21) in his first game as a head coach, beating Western Kentucky (17-13) in 2001, defeating Drake (64-7) in 2002, and handing Wayne State a 35-3 loss last season. His only season-opening loss came at Missouri in 2000.

**Recapping the 2003 LSU Matchup**

The Leatherneck defense held LSU to 13 points through nearly three full quarters, trailing by just six points with 20 minutes remaining in the game. The Tigers then stretched a 13-7 third-quarter lead into a 35-7 victory.

LSU reached the end zone on its first possession, but Western forced turnovers on the Tigers' next three possessions, including one at the Western Illinois 1-yard line and another at the LSU-11. The Leathernecks had a chance to close the deficit to three, but a 30-yard field goal attempt was blocked with 10:32 left in the first half. LSU missed 45- and 34-yard field goals, by two different kickers, on its next two drives and was held to just six points until the 0:42 mark in the second quarter.

Western scored its touchdown on the first drive of the second half, marking the first touchdown scored against LSU's first-string defense. Down 13-7, Western recovered another LSU fumble three plays later at its own 39-yard line, but gave up an interception on the first play of the ensuing drive. The Tigers retaliated with touchdowns on their next three possessions to seal the win.

**Patterson Owns Winning Record vs. I-A Opponents**

Coach Patterson is the nation's only active I-AA coach with four I-A wins over the last five seasons, having led the Leathernecks to a 4-3 mark against I-A teams. Patterson defeated Northern Illinois in his very first game in 1999, defeated Ball State in 2000, and Northern Illinois again in 2001. Last season the Leathernecks defeated Eastern Michigan, and the three losses came to Missouri in 2000, South Florida in 2001 and LSU in 2003.

Western has played at least one I-A team each season since 1993, and have won four of the last seven.

**Largest Crowds in Western Illinois History**

The Leathernecks played in front of their largest crowd ever (87,164) last year at LSU's Tiger Stadium. The 2000 opener at Missouri (53,224) had previously marked the largest crowd to witness a Western Illinois game. This week's game will represent Nebraska's 263rd consecutive sellout.

**Smith Penciled in as Starting QB**

Adam Smith has been penciled in as the starting quarterback for Saturday, but both he and sophomore Steve LaFalce, who backed up Russ Michna a year ago, are expected to see significant playing time against Nebraska. Smith graduated from Duke last spring, and transferred to Western after having started 12 games as a sophomore for the Blue Devils. He has one year of eligibility remaining.

"If the game were being played tonight (Monday)," said Patterson, "Smith would be the guy. But there are still a few more practices until Saturday and we certainly reserve the right to start LaFalce. Either way, we expect both quarterbacks to see the field Saturday."

**vs. I-A Opponents**

*The Leathernecks have played at least one game against a I-A team each season since 1993, winning four of its last seven games against I-A schools, including a victory over Northern Illinois in 2002. The Huskies finished 8-4 and had the highest Sagarin rating of the eight I-A teams that fell to I-AA opponents that year.*

**Large Opportunities Loom on Offense, Defense**

Several large holes are waiting to be filled this season with the graduation of two-time Gateway Conference Offensive Player of the Year Russ Michna and four-year starting linebacker Lee Russell. Michna threw for over 3,000 yards during both his junior and senior seasons, including a school-record 3,160 last year, and Russell set the school's record of 317 career solo tackles. Russell finished fifth in the Buck Buchanan Award voting a year ago, and Michna finished sixth in the Walter Payton Award voting, given to the nation's best I-AA defensive and offensive player each season.

**Under the Lights**

Coach Patterson has led the Leathernecks to a 9-5 record under the lights, playing 14 night games in five seasons. That marks includes a spotless 5-0 record in night games at Hanson Field.

**Callahan No Stranger to Western Illinois, Patterson**

Coach Callahan has several indirect connections to Western Illinois, including having coached on opposite sidelines as Coach Patterson for seven seasons in the Big Ten. Patterson spent 20 year at Iowa, during which time he coached against Callahan while he was at Illinois from 1980-86. Also at Illinois during that time was current Western Illinois Athletics Director Tim Van Alstine. Callahan's additional ties to the state of Illinois include having graduated from Illinois Benedictine College (now Benedictine University) in Lisle, having coached at Oak Lawn and De La Salle high schools, and serving as the offensive coordinator at Southern Illinois in 1989.

**Nebraska OC Norvell Played Under Patterson at Iowa**

Nebraska offensive coordinator Jay Norvell was recruited by Coach Patterson during his early year on the Iowa staff. With the Hawkeyes, Norvell was an all-Big Ten defensive back in 1985 when he led the conference with seven interceptions, helping Iowa to a league title and one of Patterson's three Rose Bowl appearances. Norvell was a part of five bowl teams, including two Rose Bowl squads (1981, 1985), a pair of Big Ten championship teams and a team that spent five weeks of the 1985 season ranked No. 1. Norvell began his coaching career as a graduate assistant with the Hawkeyes, then had his first full-time job with Gateway Conference member Northern Iowa.

**Patterson Leads Nation in I-A Wins**

Don Patterson is the nation's only active I-AA coach with four I-A wins over the last five years, having led the Leathernecks to a 4-3 record against I-A teams in five seasons as head coach. Patterson defeated Northern Illinois in his very first game in 1999, defeated Ball State in 2000, and Northern Illinois again last season, while the two I-A losses came to Missouri (2000) and South Florida (2001). The Leathernecks have played at least one I-A team each season since 1993, and have won four of the last seven. Last season, Western defeated Eastern Michigan and lost to LSU.

2004 preview

**Langan Close to Becoming Leathernecks' All-Time Leading Scorer**

With 264 career points, senior placekicker Justin Langan is just four points away from becoming Western Illinois' highest scoring kicker, and just seven points shy of becoming the Leathernecks' all-time leading scorer. Keith Jones (267 points from 1994-97) is currently the school's highest-scoring kicker, and running back Aaron Stecker holds the school's career scoring record of 270 points, set in 1997-98.

**Gray Returns as Leading Receiver...**

Junior wideout Reggie Gray returns to the Leatherneck lineup after leading the squad with 764 receiving yards on 44 catches last season. Gray scored eight touchdowns and had three games of at least 100 yards receiving, including two of his last three contests and a career-high 116 yards at Youngstown State. He tallied two games in which all three of his receptions were touchdowns.

**...and Leading Kick Returner**

Gray, an all-conference second team honoree, also set school records of 28 kickoff returns and 712 kick return yards. He returned a kick 99 yards for a touchdown against Northern Iowa and ranked third in the Gateway with an average of 25.4 kick return yards per game.

**Norris Returns as Nation's Leading Punt Returner**

Senior punt return specialist James Norris, a Gateway all-newcomer and all-conference second-team honoree in 2003, returns as the nation's leading punt returner after averaging 19.1 yards per return as a junior (287 yards, 1 TD, 15 returns). His touchdown came on a school-record 95-yard return in a win at I-A Eastern Michigan. Norris, who is also penciled in as a starting wide receiver for the spring, averaged a team-best 62.9 receiving yards per game last year.

**Quick Hits**

Linebacker Tim Martz is the son of St. Louis Rams head coach Mike Martz. Tim will miss the 2004 season after having knee surgery over the summer, and will petition for a sixth year of eligibility next season. The Rams' training camp has been held in Macomb for the past nine summers.

## Back-to-Back Top-Five Finishes in the Polls

The Leathernecks have finished each of the last two seasons at No. 5 in the I-AA polls, the nation's only I-AA team to end the 2002 and 2003 campaigns in the top five. Western reached its first No. 1 national ranking on Sept. 8 before LSU knocked them down to second where they spent the next five weeks. Western has been ranked in the last 25 consecutive regular season polls.

## Former Buffalo Okruch Steps in as Defensive Coordinator

Former University of Colorado defensive coordinator Vince Okruch joined the Western Illinois staff as defensive coordinator July 16. Okruch, 48, spent five seasons with the Buffaloes, the last two as defensive coordinator, and had worked under Gary Barnett for the last 12 years. During his five seasons at Colorado, the Buffs earned a 34-28 record and a 25-15 Big 12 mark, including a 17-7 league record since the start of the 2001 season.

## Four All-Conference Honorees Return

Four all-conference honorees from 2003 return to the 2004 lineup, including senior WR/RS James Norris who earned all-conference recognition at both positions. Joining Norris are OL Fred Layne (first team), WR Reggie Gray (second team) and PK Justin Langan (HM).

## Layne, Langan Named Preseason All-Americans

Senior offensive lineman Fred Layne was named to The Sports Network's Preseason All-America First Team and he joined senior placekicker Justin Langan on the *i-aa.org* preseason all-America list. Layne, a 6-foot-4, 295-pound left guard, is a two-time All-America and All-Gateway honoree who has started 25 of his 26 games over the last two seasons, leading the Leathernecks to a 20-6 record during that span.

## Glasford Tabbed Nation's Eighth-Best Returning RB, Yellin Rated Fifth-Best Fullback

According to an off-season Sports Network article, junior Travis Glasford was tabbed the nation's eighth-best returning I-AA running back. Also in the article, junior Matt Yellin was rated the country's fifth-best returning fullback. Glasford will have to battle UNI's Terrance Freeney (rated fifth) and a pair of Southern Illinois tailbacks for the national spotlight in a league heavy with rushers this season.

## Experienced O-Line

An experienced offensive line returns for 2004, led by senior left guard Fred Layne, junior center Perry Cox and sophomore left tackle Chad Walker who combine for 47 career starts. Layne, who has experience at every position on the line, has started his last 22 games, while Cox and Walker have started 13 and nine, respectively.

Last year's offensive line helped produce the first offense in school history to record a 3,000-yard passer and a 1,000-yard rusher, while allowing just 20 sacks in 13 games.

**THIS DATE IN LEATHERNECK HISTORY**

James Norris returned a second-quarter punt for a school-record 95 yards, scoring a touchdown that gave Western Illinois a 14-6 halftime lead at Eastern Michigan on **Sept. 4, 2003**. The Leathernecks went on to defeat the Eagles 34-12, holding EMU to -2 rushing yards and recording Western's fourth I-A victory in Coach Patterson's five seasons.

Russ Michna completed nine passes for 201 yards, Travis Glasford rushed for 135 yards and three touchdowns, and Terrence Hall caught five passes for 110 yards.

Norris eventually led the nation in punt returns during the 2003 campaign, averaging 19.1 ypr.

The Leathernecks were ranked No. 1 in the nation in the following week's I-AA poll.

**How 2003 Ended**

With their second consecutive appearance in the quarterfinal round of the I-AA playoffs, Western's 2003 season ended in a flurry as the Leathernecks lost 28-27 at Colgate in a game that featured a 10-inch snow storm. Western lost its lead with under two minutes remaining in the fourth quarter after a back-and-forth battle in which the end zone and sidelines had to be spray painted orange because of the snow.

**Six Nine-Win Seasons in Last Eight Years**

The Leathernecks have produced more nine-win seasons over the last eight years than any other Gateway Conference school, winning at least nine games in six of their last eight years, including three of Coach Patterson's five seasons. Also, last year's 9-4 record marked the fourth seven-win season under Patterson and Western's seventh in the last eight years.

**Glasford is First Sophomore to Rush for 1,000 Yards**

All-conference second-teamer Travis Glasford returns for his third season as the starting running back after becoming the first sophomore in school history to rush for more than 1,000 yards. Glasford's 1,368 yards (296 att., 20 TD, 105.2 ypg) in 2003 ranked fourth in Western's single-season record book. After two seasons, he ranks seventh on the career list with 2,057 yards - 809 yards away from second and 1,742 shy of first.

**No. 1 in the National Polls**

The Leathernecks reached the nation's top ranking a year ago when they were voted No. 1 in both The Sports Network/CSTV and the ESPN/USA Today I-AA Polls on Sept. 8. They held the spot for one week before LSU knocked them down to No. 2 where they spent the next five weeks.

**First Season with 3K Passer and 1K Rusher**

Last season marked the first year in Western Illinois history in which the Leathernecks produced a 3,000-yard passer and a 1,000-yard rusher in the same season. Russ Michna threw for a school-record 3,160 yards and Travis Glasford became the first sophomore in school history to surpass the 1,000-yard mark, ending the year with 1,368 yards.

**2003 Passing Average is Third-Highest in School History**

Western's 247.0 passing yards per game last season is the third-highest passing average in school history, behind the 285.5 ypg (10 games) in 2001 and the 270.8 ypg (12 games) mark in 1988.

**Two Kicks Returned for Touchdowns in 2003**

For the first time in Western's Division I history, two different players returned kickoffs to the end zone. Reggie Gray returned a kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown against Northern Iowa, and Charles Hayden became the second Leatherneck to do so, with a 75-yard touchdown return against SMS.

Adding to the dangerous return unit, punt returner James Norris scored on a 95-yard punt return in a win at Eastern Michigan.

**Three Different Players Record 100-yard Receiving Games in 2003**

For the second consecutive season, the Leathernecks had three different players, two of which return for 2004, record 100-yard receiving games. Reggie Gray caught a career-high seven passes for 116 yards at Youngstown State, Terrence Hall recorded 110 yards on five catches at Eastern Michigan and James Norris caught eight passes for 109 yards against Western Kentucky.

Gray has four 100-yard games in his two-year career, including a career-high 124 yards at Indiana State as a freshman. He had three 100-yard games as a sophomore, while Norris had two a year ago.

**Norris Sets School Record with 95-yard Punt Return**

Junior return specialist and wide receiver James Norris set a Leatherneck record and tied a Gateway Conference record with his 95-yard punt return at Eastern Michigan last season. Norris back-peddled 10 yards to catch the 56-yard punt, eluded a would-be tackler, ran to the right side of the field and streaked down the sideline after receiving two key blocks.

His first touchdown as a Leatherneck came on the fifth punt return of his career. Prior to Western Illinois, Norris returned eight punts to the endzone in two years at Los Angeles Valley Community College.

**All-Americans at Western Illinois**

Western Illinois has produced 105 all-Americans, including seven consensus all-Americans, since joining the Gateway Conference in 1985, and has had at least one all-America honoree every year since 1969, a streak of 35 seasons. Under Patterson, 21 different Leathernecks have earned all-America status.

**Eight Playoff Appearances Rank Second in the Gateway**

Only one other Gateway Football Conference team (Northern Iowa) has appeared in more I-AA playoff series than Western Illinois. The Leathernecks' eight playoff appearances is three shy of UNI's league-high 11.

**Illinois' Winningest Division I Program**

Western Illinois has accumulated the highest all-time winning percentage among all Division I schools in Illinois. Below is a chart listing each school's first year of football, along with its all-time winning percentage entering the 2003 season.

**Putting Your Country First**

Two current Leathernecks decided to put the country before their college plans, completing four-year stints in the U.S. Navy before starting their collegiate football career. Tight end Boomer Moore, a 25-year old sophomore, redshirted in 2002 and caught 20 passes for 218 yards and four touchdowns last season. Shannon Foster, a 24-year old junior, joined the Navy after playing two years at Chicago's St. Xavier University.

**Fourth Seven-Win Season in Five Years**

Last year, Patterson recorded his fourth seven-win season in five years at Western Illinois, with the lone exception being a 5-5 season in 1999. The Leathernecks have recorded at least seven wins in seven of the last eight years, and have had a .500 or better winning percentage in 11 of the last 13 seasons and 15 times in 19 seasons in the Gateway.

**HEAD COACH DON PATTERSON**



The only head coach in Western Illinois history to win at least 40 games in his first five seasons, Don Patterson has guided the Leathernecks to three playoff berths, two Gateway Football Conference titles and a No. 1 national ranking, elevating the program to the level of a I-AA national

powerhouse.

Last season, Patterson guided the Leathernecks to their second consecutive quarterfinal playoff appearance, finishing with a 9-4 record. After a 34-12 win at Eastern Michigan, the Leathernecks earned their first No. 1 national ranking. It took a 35-7 loss to eventual I-A national champion LSU (a game in which Western was down only 13-7 late in the third quarter) to knock them out of the top spot, but the Leathernecks remained ranked in the top three throughout the majority of the season.

Patterson is the only active I-AA coach in the nation with four wins over I-A programs in the last five years, starting with a win at Northern Illinois in his very first game as a head coach. On the conference level, Patterson has begun a dynasty in arguably the toughest I-AA conference in the nation. With a winning record against every Gateway Football Conference team, Patterson's 22 league wins are more than any other Gateway coach at his current school.

The 2000 and 2002 Bruce Craddock Gateway Coach of the Year and AFCA Regional Coach of the Year has established four of the top six scoring teams, three of the top seven offensive teams and four of the top 10 passing teams in school history.

Patterson was an assistant coach at Iowa for 20 years under the legendary Hayden Fry, serving as the offensive coordinator for the last seven years. During that time, Iowa went to 14 bowl games, including three Rose Bowls. The 1985 Iowa team was ranked #1 for five weeks, en route to a school-record 10-victory season.

**Patterson is Quickest Coach to 40 Wins**

Don Patterson is the only coach in school history to win at least 40 games in his first five seasons with the Leathernecks. His 41-18 (.695) record places him in third on the all-time coaching wins list and fourth on the school's winning percentage list.

**Patterson Produces High-Scoring Teams**

The Leathernecks averaged 36.3 points per game in 2003, edging out their 2002 average of 36.2 points per game for the second-highest scoring season in school history. The 1951 squad averaged 37.4 points over nine games.

Four of Patterson's five Western Illinois teams rank among the top six scoring team's of all-time, including his 2003 squad (36.3 ppg) and 2002 squad (36.2 ppg) which rank second and third in the school's record book. Over Patterson's five-year career, the Leathernecks have averaged 33.42 points per game - more than any other Gateway school during that span.

**Patterson is One of Many Hayden Fry Success Stories**

Coach Patterson is one of many success stories to come from the legendary Hayden Fry camp. A member of Fry's original staff at Iowa, Patterson spent 20 years under Fry, including the last seven as offensive coordinator. During his 20 years with the Hawkeyes, Iowa was one of only three Big Ten teams to appear in 14 bowl games, including three Rose Bowls (1981, 1985, 1990), and spent five weeks in 1985 as the nation's top-ranked team. Iowa ranked third among Big Ten teams in victories from 1979-98.

**Patterson Becomes First to 40 Wins in Five Seasons**

With a win over SMS in the regular-season finale, Coach Patterson became the only Leatherneck head coach to win 40 games in his first five seasons. His 41 current victories place him in a tie for third on the all-time Leatherneck coaching list. By winning percentage, Patterson ranks fourth, behind Darrell Mudra's .750 (39-13) mark.

**Patterson Owns a Winning Record Against All Gateway Opponents**

Coach Patterson has amassed a winning record against all seven Gateway Conference opponents, including a 3-0 regular-season record against Western Kentucky and a 4-1 mark against Indiana State. He has a 3-2 record against each of the other five league schools.

**Former "Third-Down Back" now Coaching Western Backs**

Former Iowa Hawkeye and NFL standout Ronnie Harmon was hired as the Leathernecks' running backs coach prior to the 2003 season and he wasted little time making an impact, developing Travis Glasford into the school's first sophomore to rush for 1,000 yards. Harmon's success as an NFL running back spanned 12 years after being selected in the first round of the 1986 draft as he became one of the most productive backs in NFL history.

**41 Years of I-A Coaching Experience On Leatherneck Staff**

A I-A national championship, four Rose Bowl appearances, 33 bowl games and 59 years of Division I-A coaching experience are represented by this year's Leatherneck coaching staff. In addition, Leatherneck assistants bring 16 years of NFL playing experience.

**Patterson's Teams Putting Points on the Board**

Coach Patterson has coached four of the top six scoring teams in Leatherneck history, including the 2003 squad which averaged 36.3 points per game and the 2002 squad which averaged 36.2 points per contest. Patterson's 1999 (34.8 ppg) and 2000 teams (32.5 ppg) also rank among the top six Leatherneck scoring teams.

**WHAT'S A LEATHERNECK?**

Seventy-seven years ago, Western Illinois University became the only non-military institution to have its nickname attributed to a branch of the military service - a distinction it still holds today.



Western Illinois received its current nickname, "The Fighting Leathernecks," in 1927 when then-athletic director and head baseball, basketball and football coach Ray "Rock" Hanson was granted permission from the U.S. Navy to use the Marine's official seal and their mascot (the Bulldog), along with their nickname.

Hanson held the rank of Colonel in the Marine Corps and served his country during World War I and again in World War II.

He coached Leatherneck football for 16 years (1926-41) and was Western's all-time winningest coach until 1998. The football stadium, Hanson Field, is named after the former mentor, who passed away in 1982 at the age of 86.

The Western Illinois mascot's official name is "Colonel Rock," although the shortened form of "Rocky" is commonly used.

**Langan Riding 11 Consecutive Field Goals, 43 Straight PATs**

Langan has converted his last 11 field goal attempts, breaking his own school record. His last miss was a 52-yard attempt against Northern Iowa on Oct. 25, 2003 (six games). The streak includes two playoff games - a perfect 5-for-5 overtime performance in the first round at Montana, and a 2-for-2 outing in a 10-inch blizzard at Colgate.

He has also converted his last 43 extra point attempts, a streak which dates back 10 games to Sept. 23, 2003.

**Langan and the 50-yard Plateau**

Justin Langan has converted three of his seven career field goal attempts from beyond 50 yards. He made field goals of 52 and 53 yards at Youngstown State on Oct. 26, 2002 to become the first Leatherneck and only the third Gateway player to convert more than one from 50 yards out in the same game. His third 50-plus yard field goal came at Indiana State in 2003, a 51-yarder.

Langan in 12-for-25 from 40 yards and beyond, and is 30-of-37 from inside 40.

**Five Field Goal Performance at Montana Ties I-AA Record**

Langan's five field goals (31, 26, 46, 25 and 23 yards) in the first-round playoff game at Montana last season set the school record and tied the I-AA postseason record for most field goals in a game. His 25-yarder with 1:03 left in regulation tied the game and his 23-yarder in the second overtime was the eventual game-winner.

**Langan Holds I-AA Scoring Record**

Langan's 116 points as a sophomore (20-27 FG, 26-28 PAT) were the most single-season points scored by a kicker in I-AA history.

**The Justin Langan Tour**

Last season, Langan finished his third and final year as a two-sport athlete, as he led both the football and soccer teams in scoring for two straight years. He is a three-time Academic All-America soccer player who finished as one of the nation's top 20 scorers last season, helping the soccer Leathernecks to a 10-5-2 record and first-place finish in the Mid-Con.

**Glasford Becomes First Sophomore to Rush for 1,000 Yards**

Travis Glasford rushed for a total of 1,368 yards in 2003, the fourth-highest single-season total in school history and the top rushing mark for a Western Illinois sophomore. He also became the first sophomore to average over 100 yards per game. It had been three years since Western's last 1,000-yard rusher, Charles Tharp.

**Glasford Rushes for Career-High 230 Yards at SMS**

Glasford rushed for a career-high 230 yards and four touchdowns on 29 carries in last year's win over SMS. He averaged 7.9 yards per carry, had just four carries over 20 yards and tallied 130 yards in the first half.

**Six 100-yard Games as a Sophomore, Eight in Two-Year Career**

Glasford recorded six 100-yard rushing games last season, and now has eight in his two-year career, the school's third-highest marks in each category. After his 230-yard performance in the regular-season finale, he was held to 83 and 81 yards in the two postseason games.

**126 Points Ranked Seventh in Nation**

Glasford's 126 points last season led the Gateway and ranked seventh among all I-AA scorers. In the school's single-season record books, Glasford ranked second, 42 points behind Aaron Stecker's 168 points in 1997.

**Five-TD Outing at Youngstown State Ties 33-year Old School Record**

The five-touchdown outing at Youngstown State on Oct. 11, 2003 tied a 33-year old Western Illinois record set by Leroy Jackson in 1960. Glasford scored on runs of two and 19 yards in the first half, and added scoring runs of 26, 8 and 45 yards in the second half. His final touchdown came with 9:16 left in the game and put the Leathernecks up 47-20.
