Overview

Defending Atlantic Coast Conference champion Wake Forest will hold its home opener on Saturday against Nebraska . . . The Deacons suffered a 38-28 defeat at Boston College in their first game of the season . . . Nebraska will enter Saturday's game nationally-ranked after the Huskers, rated 19th in the USA Today preseason coaches poll, opened their season with a 52-10 win at home over Nevada . . . The game is a sellout and a capacity crowd is expected at Groves Stadium . . . In 2006, Wake Forest set a season attendance record by averaging 32,515 fans per home game . . . That is in excess of the listed capacity of 31, 500 . . . WFU quarterback Riley Skinner (shoulder) and defensive end Matt Robinson (ankle) are each listed as doubtful for Saturday's contest . . . WFU has won its last two non-conference home games and is 10-3 at home against non-ACC foes under Jim Grobe..

Series

Wake Forest and Nebraska will meet for the third time in a series that dates back to 1970 . . . Each of the previous games has been played in Lincoln . . . The Huskers won the first meeting 36-12 on Sept. 12, 1970 . . . The last meeting, on Sept. 10, 2005, resulted in a 31-3 NU win.

Head Coaches

Wake Forest head coach **Jim Grobe (Virginia '75)** is in his seventh season with the Deacons and has a record of 37-36 including last year's 11-3 mark . . . Grobe, who spent six seasons at Ohio University, is in his 13th season overall as a head coach and has a career mark of 70-69-1 . . . **Bill Callahan (Illinois Benedictine '78)** is in his fourth year with the Cornhuskers and has a record of 23-15 . . . He spent two years as the head coach of the Oakland Raiders in 2002-03, compiling a 17-18 record and leading the Raiders to the Super Bowl in his first season . . . Callahan has previously served as an assistant coach at Illinois, Northern Arizona, Southern Illinois and Wisconsin.

The Matchup

Wake Forest and Nebraska will meet in WFU's home opener at Groves Stadium on Saturday, Sept. 8 . . . Groves Stadium is in the midst of a multimillion dollar renovation project . . . The Deacons are coming off a 38-28 season-opening loss at Boston College on Sept. 1 . . . Nebraska defeated Nevada 52-10 at Memorial Stadium . . . NU is the top rushing team in the country after opening the season with 413 yards vs. Nevada . . . The Huskers have the nation's top individual rusher in Marlon Lucky who raced for 233 yards in the opener . . . Nebraska is third nationally in total offense with 625 yards while Wake Forest is sixth in the country in passing offense with 366.0 yards per game . . . WFU has won its last two non-conference home games . . . The Deacons defeated Liberty 34-14 in 2006 and East Carolina 44-34 in 2005 . . . WFU last lost at home to a non-conference opponent in the 2005 season opener to Vanderbilt in a 24-20 contest . . . The Deacons are 17-6 in non-conference games under Jim Grobe and 10-3 in home non-conference games.

Moore leads nation in receptions

Wake Forest wide receiver Kenneth Moore leads the nation in receptions after tying the school record with 15 catches against Boston College in the season opener . . . Moore tied the school mark that is also held by James Brim who had 15 catches against North Carolina State on Sept. 20, 1986, and Marlon Estes who also had 15 grabs vs. N.C. State on Nov. 18, 1995 . . . Jamarko Simmons of Western Michigan is second after having caught 14 passes in the Broncos' season-opener at West Virginia.

Player of the Week Nominations

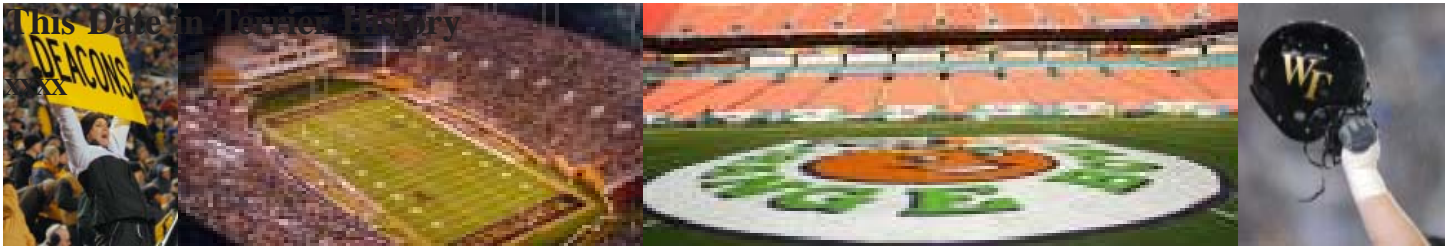
Offense: Kenneth Moore, a 6-0, 204-pound redshirt senior from Charlotte, NC (Butler) . . . Moore tied the Wake Forest record with 15 receptions in a 38-28 loss at Boston College on Sept. 1 . . . Moore had 11 receptions in the first half and four in the second . . . He missed most of the third quarter while receiving fluids to fight off dehydration . . . Moore tied the school record also held by James Brim who had 15 catches against North Carolina State on Sept. 20, 1986, and Marlon Estes who also had 15 grabs vs. N.C. State on Nov. 18, 1995 . . . Moore is back at wide receiver this season after playing running back for most of the second half of the 2006 season after injuries depleted the corps of rushers . . . Moore also carried the ball four times from scrimmage for -5 yards.

Defense: Alphonso Smith, a 5-9, 191-pound redshirt junior from Pahokee, FL (Pahokee) . . . Smith intercepted Matt Ryan on BC's first play from scrimmage and returned the ball 21 yards for a touchdown . . . It marked his seventh career interception and his second interception return for a touchdown . . . In the second quarter, Smith hit BC running back A.J. Brooks and forced a fumble that was scooped up by Chip Vaughn and returned 38 yards for a touchdown . . . Smith also added a pass breakup . . . He finished the game with three solo tackles, one forced fumble, one interception return for a touchdown and one pass break-up.

Non-Offensive Touchdowns

Wake Forest had three non-offensive touchdowns in all of the 2006 season . . . The Deacons had two on Saturday at Boston College . . . The Deacs scored twice with Alphonso Smith returning an interception 21 yards for a score on BC's first play from scrimmage . . . In the second quarter, Chip Vaughn returned a fumble 38 yards for a touchdown . . .

Similar Season-Opening Shoulder Stories

When Riley Skinner suffered a separated shoulder in the season-opener at Boston College, a feeling of deja vu permeated the injury . . . In the 2006 season opener, Skinner came off the bench to lead the Deacons to a 20-10 win over Syracuse . . . Skinner got the call after starting QB Benjamin Mauk suffered a dislocated shoulder and broken arm while diving for a fumble . . . And Skinner was the number two quarterback because Brett Hodges had suffered a shoulder separation in the weeks leading up to the 2006 season . . . Hodges is expected to start at quarterback vs. Nebraska if Skinner is sidelined.

Noting the Boston College Game

Alphonso Smith's interception on BC's first offensive play marked his seventh career pick . . . It was his second interception return for a touchdown . . . QB Riley Skinner has thrown at least one touchdown pass in 10 of his 14 career starts . . . He had career-highs for attempts (37), completions (28) and interceptions (3) . . . The 28 completions fell one shy of making the school top 10 list for completions in a game . . . Kenneth Moore tied the school record with 15 receptions . . . The ACC record is 16 . . . Moore finished with a career-high 126 receiving yards, a career-best . . . Chip Vaughn's 38-yard fumble return marked his first career touchdown . . . Brett Hodges saw the most extensive action of his young career when he replaced Skinner in the third quarter after the starter suffered a mild shoulder separation . . . Hodges completed 17 of 23 passes for 130 yards, all career-bests . . . He also threw his first career TD pass when he hit Kevin Harris with a 12-yard completion . . . DB Marcus Williams made his first career interception . . . Demir Boldin played for the first time since 2005 . . . Delon Lowe made his first career reception . . . TE John Tereshinski had career-highs with six catches for 75 yards . . . Kevin Marion also posted a career-high five catches . . . TE Zac Selmon matched his career-best with three catches.

Four Key Players Return

Wake Forest should greatly benefit from the return of senior running back Micah Andrews, senior defensive end Matt Robinson, junior wide receiver Demir Boldin and sophomore defensive back Brandon Ghee . . . All four could be in the starting lineup on September 1 in Chestnut Hill . . . Andrews, Boldin and Robinson were all projected starters last season . . . Technically, the trio does not count toward Wake Forest's returning starter total . . . If they did, the Deacons would have 18 starters back, including 10 on offense. Both numbers would rank second in the ACC . . . Andrews, a 2006 preseason All-ACC running back, missed the majority of last season with a torn ACL injury suffered on September 16 at Connecticut . . . Robinson was the team's leading pass rusher as a freshman and sophomore in 2004 and 2005. But the lingering effects of a broken kneecap, suffered in the 2005 finale against Miami, caused him to miss all of the 2006 campaign . . . Boldin and Ghee did not participate in any football-related activities in 2006 because of academics . . . In 2005, Boldin played sparingly as a freshman in the first half of the season . . . By season's end, he was an emerging talent . . . Boldin ranked second on the team in receiving yards, fourth in receptions and yards and led the team with 14.9 yards per catch . . . Boldin was also the best blocker of all the receivers, which helped bolster the run . . . Ghee, a heavily recruited player was expected to play a large role last

Senior center **Steve Justice** is on the Rotary Lombardi Award Watch List as well as the Outland Trophy . . . Sophomore quarterback **Riley Skinner** is one of 35 quarterbacks on the watch list for the 2007 Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award . . . And punter Sam Swank is the Watch List for both the Lou Groza Placekicker Award and the Ray Guy Punter Award . . . Swank was a semifinalist for the Groza Award in 2006 . . .

Know Your Williams

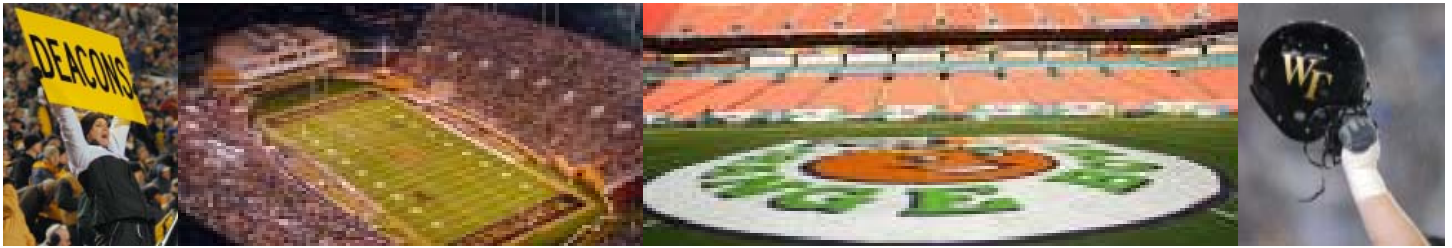
Wake Forest has five players with the last name of Williams . . . Three of those have first names starting with M (Marcus, Marshall and Mike) . . . And in the case of Marcus and Marshall, both names start with MA . . . Equipment manager Demetrius Gibson has solved the problem by making the name plate on Marshall Williams' jersey "M. Williams" . . . Mike Williams will be "Mi. Williams" and Marcus will wear "Williams, Jr."

2006 Season Accomplishments

- Wake Forest won only its second ACC title and its first since 1970.
- The Deacons won the ACC's Atlantic Division after being picked to finish last by the league's media during the preseason.
- Wake Forest shattered the school record for most wins in a season with 11. The previous record was eight (1944, 1979, 1992).
- Wake Forest was the first team in history (out of 113) to go 6-0 in road games. Overall, the Deacons won seven contests away from Groves Stadium (including the ACC Championship Game).
- Judging by win differential, Wake Forest was the most improved team in America. The 2005 Deacons went 4-7 and the 2006 Deacons are 11-2, a plus-seven compared to last year.
- Wake Forest had six ACC wins for first time in school history.
- Wake Forest finished with a winning record in the ACC for the first time since 1988 and the seventh time ever.
- The Deacons were ranked in the top 25 for eight straight weeks for the first time ever.
- Wake Forest swept its ACC Tobacco Road rivals for the first time since 1987.
- Wake Forest's five wins in September marked the most victories in any month of any year in Deacon history.
- Wake Forest beat Florida State in Tallahassee for the first time since 1959.
- The Deacons won a game in Florida for the first time since 1959, snapping a 17-game losing streak.
- Wake Forest beat NC State in Raleigh for the first time since 1984.
- Wake Forest beat Maryland for the first time since 1998.

Grobe: National Coach of the Year

In his sixth season at Wake Forest, coach Jim Grobe's Deacons were picked to finish last in the Atlantic Division . . . Then Wake Forest lost its top pass rusher, its starting quarterback and its preseason All-ACC running back — all to season-ending injuries . . . But Grobe led the Deacons through the adversity and all the way to an ACC Championship, its first in 36 years . . . Grobe, who became the first Wake Forest coach to take the Deacons to a pair of bowl games in the ACC era, was named national coach of the year by his peers and the media . . . The media outlets and organizations that named Grobe to the honor included the American Football Coaches Association, Associated Press, Bobby Dodd Foundation, CBS Sportsline and The Sporting News . . . Legendary coach and current ESPN analyst Lou Holtz noted, "Among fellow coaches, there was no doubt that Jim Grobe was a special coach. He didn't need a season like this to validate himself. To the media, yes. To the fans, yes. But to fellow coaches, no."

Skinner Named ACC Rookie of the Year

Quarterback Riley Skinner was voted the ACC's Rookie of the Year in 2006 as he led the league in three passing categories . . . He received 48 of a possible 80 votes from the league's media . . . The Jacksonville, Fla. native led the ACC in passing efficiency, completion percentage and interception rate . . . Skinner and Texas' Colt McCoy were the only freshmen quarterbacks in the country to post 10 wins as a starter . . . Clemson running back C.J. Spiller was the runner-up with 25 votes . . . Darrius Heyward-Bey of Maryland, North Carolina's Hakeem Nicks and Myron Rolle of Florida State each received two votes . . . Skinner became the third Wake Forest player to win the ACC's Rookie of the Year award . . . He joined James McDougald (1976) and Michael Ramseur (1982).

All-ACC Selections

Wake Forest set a school record by placing nine players on the All-Atlantic Coast Conference team . . . Five Deacons were named first team All-ACC, tying Clemson for the most first-team selections . . . The selections are made by the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association . . . Wake's nine selections broke a school record of six shared by the 1970 ACC championship team and the 1992 Deacon team . . . Earning All-ACC honors in 2006 were senior offensive tackle Steve Vallos, senior safety Josh Gattis and junior linebacker Jon Abbate . . . All three have departed . . . The lone first team selections returning are center Steve Justice and placekicker Sam Swank . . . Swank was one of just five sophomores to earn first team All-ACC . . . He was also named honorable mention as a punter . . . QB Riley Skinner was a second team selection despite not being on the ballot . . . Skinner received enough write-in votes to be chosen second team . . . Two other departed seniors, defensive end Jyles Tucker and safety Patrick Ghee, were also earned honorable mention status.

Temporary Press Box Tower

Wake Forest is in the midst of a football stadium renovation with the construction of Deacon Tower . . . Phase Three of the Groves Stadium renovation project began in January with the demolition of the former press box . . . Construction is well underway on the 123,000-square foot Deacon Tower project which will stand seven stories and 125 feet high and will include premium seating, a new President's box and upgraded press accommodations . . . Phase Three also includes ground level concessions and a signature entry point for the stadium . . . Phases One and Two, which included cosmetic and structural improvements to the stadium and installation of FieldTurf were completed prior to the start of the 2006 season.

Grobe Signs New Contract

Head coach Jim Grobe signed a new 10-year contract on February 27, 2007 . . . Athletic director Ron Wellman made the surprise announcement at the conclusion of the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year banquet that night.

North Carolina Legislature

The North Carolina State Legislature honored the Wake Forest football team in Raleigh on Wednesday, March 7 as State Senators Fred Smith and John Snow, both Wake Forest graduates and former members of the Demon Deacon football team in the 1960's, presented a joint resolution that recognized Wake Forest's ACC Championship and berth in the FedEx Orange Bowl. Head coach Jim Grobe and the entire Wake Forest football team bussed to Raleigh to be on hand for the special presentation.

The Nation's Biggest Turnaround

Wake Forest won seven more games in 2006 than it did in 2005 . . . In terms of actual wins and losses, the Deacons enjoyed the biggest positive turnaround in the nation . . . The Deacons went 4-7 in 2005, but returned 18 starters, including 10 on defense . . . Wake Forest went 11-3 in 2006 . . . This is not Grobe's first turnaround at Wake Forest . . . He inherited a Deacon squad that went 2-9 in 2000, but led the 2001 Wake Forest team to a 6-5 mark . . . Grobe came to Wake Forest after building Ohio University into a perennial contender in the Mid-American Conference . . . He inherited an Ohio program that had won 17 games in the 10 seasons prior to Grobe's arrival. Grobe coached there for six seasons and led the Bobcats to a 33-33-1 record.

Poll Position

The Deacons finished 18th in the 2006 AP poll, 17th in the *USA Today* poll and 14th in the BCS. Wake has been in the top 25 for nine straight polls, the longest streak in program history.

Successful Spans In History

Wake Forest has won 24 games in the last four seasons, the most in a four-year stretch since 1944-47 under head coach D.C. "Peahead" Walker. Wake Forest went to the first-ever Gator Bowl on January 1, 1946. The most wins in any four-year period in Wake Forest history is 25, set in 1939-42 and 1944-47. Wake Forest's 37 wins in Grobe's six years in Winston-Salem ties for the most wins in any six-year span in program history (1939-44).

Attendance Record Falls

Wake Forest broke its season average home attendance record last year . . . An average of 32,515 fans saw the Deacons go 4-2 at Groves Stadium where the capacity is 31,500 . . . Wake Forest has broken its season average attendance record in three of the last four years.

Prone To Picking Off Passes

Wake Forest intercepted 22 passes in 2006 to rank second in the nation . . . A total of 10 different Deacons picked off passes . . . Wake Forest had four players with three or more interceptions, including Josh Gattis (5), Riley Swanson (4), Patrick Ghee (3) and Alphonso Smith (3) . . . The Deacons intercepted a pass in 11 straight games, a streak that ended in the Orange Bowl.

Going Down To The Wire

In the six seasons since Jim Grobe arrived at Wake Forest, the Deacons have played 72 games . . . Exactly half of those, 36 of the 72, have been decided by eight points or less and three have gone to overtime . . . Wake Forest is 19-18 in games decided by eight points or less since Grobe arrived in 2001 . . . The Deacons posted a 5-4 mark in 2001, 4-3 in 2002, 1-3 in 2003, 2-6 in 2004, 2-2 in 2005, and 5-0 in 2006.

Turnover Story

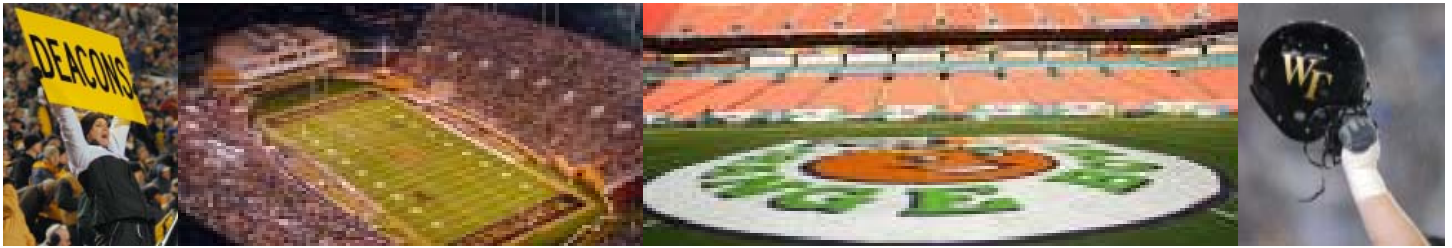
Wake Forest ranked second in the ACC and sixth nationally last year with a plus-13 turnover ratio . . . The Deacons had 31 takeaways and only 18 giveaways . . . Wake Forest forced a turnover in every game last season.

Deacons on the Road

In 2006, Wake Forest became the first ACC team to go 6-0 on the road . . . The Deacons enter the Boston College game with a six-game road winning streak . . . Over the 2--4 and 2005 seasons, WFU had lost eight of 10 road games . . . The Deacs had previously won four road games in a single season including a 4-1 record in 2001 and a 4-2 mark in 1992.

Keeping Everyone On The Shelf

The Demon Deacons did not play a true freshman in 2006 . . . Wake Forest and Colorado State were the only two teams in the country that could make that claim.

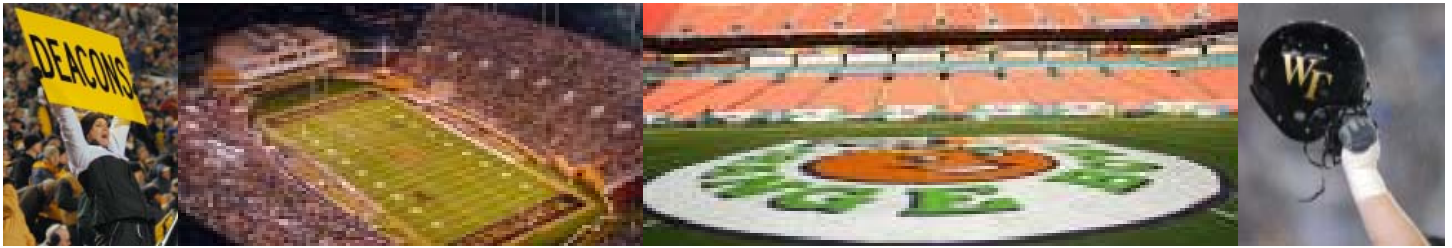

In his first five years at Wake Forest, Jim Grobe brought respectability back to the Demon Deacon football program. In his sixth year, Grobe brought an ACC Championship and a berth in the FedEx Orange Bowl.

Long regarded as a coach who “gets the most out of his talent,” Grobe and his staff are now recognized as great coaches who coach great players.



And the accolades are pouring in.

In 2006, Grobe was the unanimous choice as the ACC’s Coach of the Year in a vote by the league’s media. He

was selected as the National Coach of the Year by American Football Coaches Association, Bobby Dodd Foundation, the Associated Press, The Sporting News and CBS Sportsline.com.

In 2006, Grobe’s Deacons broke nearly every school record imaginable and reached several milestones.

Consider:

- u Wake Forest won only its second ACC title and its first since 1970.

- u The Deacons won the ACC’s Atlantic Division after being picked to finish last by the league’s media in the preseason.

- u With 11 wins, Wake Forest shattered the school record for most victories in a season.

- u The previous record was eight (1944, 1979 and 1992). Wake Forest was the first team in history (out of 113) to go 6-0 in road games.

- u Wake Forest was the most improved team in America, winning seven more games in 2006 than in 2005. The 2005 Deacons went 4-7 and the 2006 Deacons went 11-3.

- u The Deacons was ranked in the AP top 25 for nine straight weeks, the longest stretch in history. Wake Forest swept its ACC Tobacco Road rivals for the first time since 1987.

- u Wake beat Florida State in Tallahassee for the first time since 1959, NC State in Raleigh for the first time since 1984 and Maryland for the first since 1998.

It hasn’t been easy.

Grobe was hired in December 2000 to take over a Demon Deacon football program long regarded as an afterthought in the ACC.

Grobe inherited a Wake Forest program that won only 38 games in the 1990’s.

In six seasons, Grobe’s teams have won 37 contests, earned two bowl berths and won an ACC Championship.

That is particularly impressive given the recent ACC expansion that introduced three nationally-prominent programs to the league.

Even with the rising level of play in the conference, making the ACC arguably the nation’s best football league, Wake Forest has become even more competitive and successful.

Football observers have already recognized Grobe’s efforts in transforming Wake Forest as one of the rising programs, not just in the ACC, but on a regional and national basis.

The levels of excitement and expectation surrounding Demon Deacon football have reached unprecedented heights. That is a tribute to Grobe and his staff who believe the best is yet to come.

Grobe, who turned 55 in February, has gained a national reputation as a builder of programs.

He came to Wake Forest after turning a struggling Ohio University program into a contender for the Mid-American Conference championship.

In the seasons before Grobe left his assistant’s position at the Air Force Academy to become Ohio University’s head coach, the Bobcats won 17 games. In the six years under Grobe, they won 33 and finished with winning records in the Mid-American Conference five straight seasons.

Grobe coached at Ohio for six years (1995-2000). After taking over the reigns of a program that went 0-11 and was ranked last among Division I-A programs in 1994, Grobe led the Bobcats to a cumulative six-year record of 33-33-1.

A 1975 University of Virginia graduate, Grobe gained valuable experience as an assistant to Fisher DeBerry at the Air Force Academy prior to going to Ohio. He served as linebackers coach from 1984 to 1994, during which the Falcons produced a record of 84-50 and appeared in seven bowl games.

Grobe was born on Feb. 17, 1952. A native of Huntington, W. Va., Grobe earned his undergraduate degree (B.S.) in education from Virginia in 1975 and earned a Master’s degree in guidance and counseling in 1978.

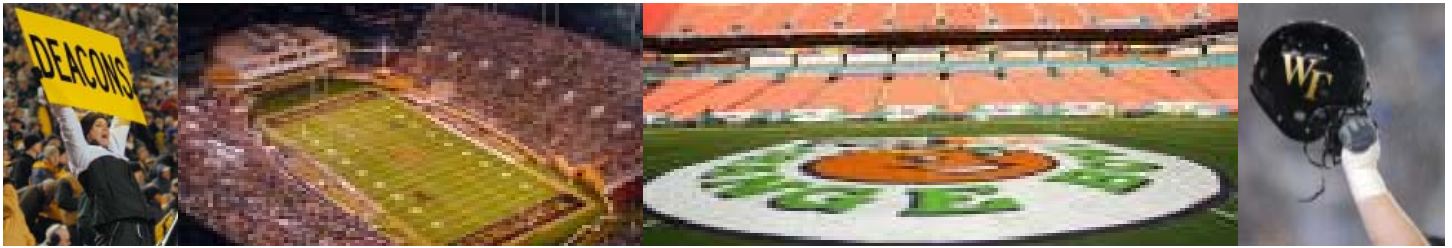

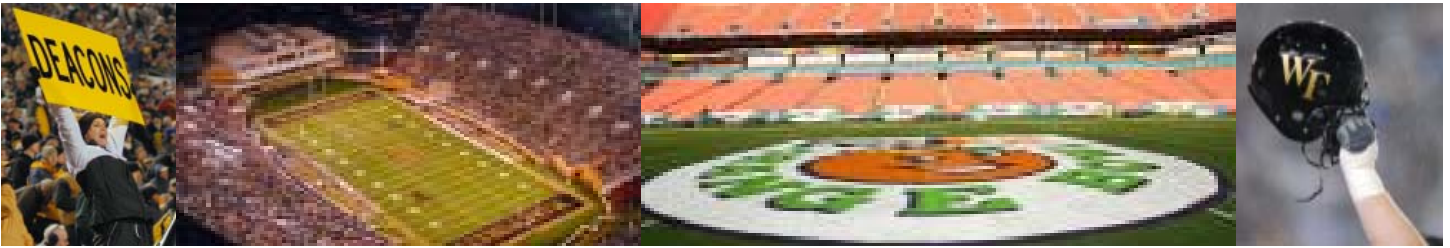
