Oklahoma Sooners (6-0) vs. Nebraska Cornhuskers (7-0)

October 28, 2000 -- 11:09 a.m. CST

Memorial Stadium -- Norman, Oklahoma



The Oklahoma Sooners return home for the first time in a month to face the top-ranked Cornhuskers of Nebraska. This will be the first meeting between these two Big 12 programs since 1997.

The contest, which will be a nationally televised game by ABC, is slated to kick off at 11:09 a.m. inside Memorial Stadium.

The Sooners moved to 6-0 on the season with an impressive 41-31 win over second-ranked Kansas State in Manhattan earlier this month. The win snapped K-State's 25-game home winning streak and gave the Sooners their first back-to-back wins over top 10 squads since 1986.

OU, one of just five undefeated teams remaining in division I-A, is 6-0 to start a season since 1993 and moves to third in both national polls. It's the highest regular season ranking for the Sooners since standing third after the fourth weekend of the 1988 season.

Against the Wildcats, Sooner quarterback Josh Heupel had the performance of his career by completing 29 of 37 passes for 374 yards and two touchdowns. He also ran for one touchdown and threw no interceptions for the third straight contest.

The biggest recipient of Heupel's big day was wide receiver Antwone Savage, who posted career highs for catches (7) and yards (116). His 74-yard touchdown catch in the third quarter was also the longest of his career.

Defensively, the Sooners were outstanding by holding K-State, which entered the game averaging nearly 500 yards of offense and 50 points a game, 150 yards under its average for offense and 19 points under its average for scoring.

The defensive effort was highlighted by allowing KSU just 2-for-15 on third downs, and forcing three sacks and two interceptions.

Chris Fowler, Lee Corso and Kirk Herbstreit will host the show from the southwest corner of the stadium.

Radio: The Sooner Radio Network for football covers 39 stations throughout Oklahoma, Kansas and Texas. Bob Barry, Sr. (play-by-play) joins former OU Assistant Head Coach Merv Johnson (analyst) in the booth.

Quickly: The **Sooners** are 6-0 to open up a season for the first time since 1987...**OU's** 3-0 conference record is its first since 1989...**OU** is 12-2 in the last 18 games when scoring first...**Oklahoma** has now scored at least 28 points in 15 of its last 17 regular-season games...In its history, **OU** is 279-9 when scoring at least 28 points in a game...The 280 points scored by **OU** in the first six games this season is the most since the Sooners racked up 286 points in the first six outings of 1987...**OU** scored 241 points in the first six games last year...Defensively, the 96 points allowed by **OU** in six games of '00 is the fewest since allowing just 88 in the first six games of 1993...**OU's** defense has allowed just two fourth-quarter touchdowns in its last eight games dating back to the fourth quarter against Texas Tech last season...**OU** leads the Big 12 and ranks fourth nationally in turnover margin (+10)...In three Big 12 games, **OU's** defense has forced 12 turnovers and 15 sacks...This game marks just the fourth time in NCAA history that one team has faced the No. 1 and No. 2 ranked teams in consecutive games. USC did so in 1947, Notre Dame did it in 1956 and Michigan St. did it in 1989. All three teams lost both games...**OU** is 3-0 against top 10 teams under Stoops and have outscored those squads 155-51 (scoring margin of +34.6).

Against The Huskers

When the Sooners and Cornhuskers go head-to-head this weekend on the Norman campus, it will mark the 79th meeting ever between these two Big 12 foes. Because of league scheduling, OU and Nebraska haven't played each other since 1997.

Beginning in 1912 and played continuously from 1928 to 1997, this will be the 36th time the series has been played in Norman.

Despite winning just two of the last 11 meetings, the Sooners continue to hold a slim 39-36-3 all-time record against Nebraska. In Norman, the Sooners hold a 19-16 mark versus the Cornhuskers.

Oklahoma took control of this series during the 70s and late 80s by winning 13 of 17 meetings. Nebraska has battled back to control things lately with nine wins in the last 10 meetings, including a current streak of six straight.

This will be the seventh time in the history of the series that OU will face Nebraska while it holds the No. 1 ranking in the national polls. However, it's the first time since 1993 that OU has been ranked heading into this contest.

OU-Nebraska Quick Hits

- » The winning team has had to come from behind to win 24 of the last 31 games in this series.
- » In the 78 previous meetings in this series, both teams have been nationally ranked at kickoff 22 times, including this meeting. Overall, this match-up has featured the top-ranked team 11 times.
- » In the 1996 meeting, OU redshirt-freshman running back De'Mond Parker made a major statement about his ability by rushing for 151 yards and three touchdowns against the two-time defending national champions.
- » The 1994 game was the final regular season coaching appearance for Sooner head coach Gary Gibbs, who was 44-23-2 in six seasons. He resigned the Monday before the Husker game and OU lost the game 13-3 in Norman.
- » In 1990, the Sooners beat Nebraska 45-10 in Norman. The 45 points were the most ever scored on a Tom Osborne-coached NU squad at that time.
- » Sooner head coach Barry Switzer coached his final regular season college game against Nebraska in 1988. The Sooners lost that contest 7-3, in Norman.
- » The 1987 encounter produced a 17-7 Sooner win and three OU 100-yard rushers. Patrick Collins (131 yards), Charles Thompson (126 yards) and Rotnei Anderson (119 yards) each cracked the century mark for the Sooners.
- » Oklahoma's 20-17 win in 1986 was the Sooners' 600th all-time victory. In that contest, OU scored 10 points in the final 1:22 to win the game. Tim Lashar hit a 31-yard field goal with :06 left to ice the game.
- » The Sooners dominated the 1985 affair with Nebraska 27-7 even though the Huskers' Chris Spachman returned a fumble 76-yards for a touchdown.
- » OU lost to Nebraska 17-14 during the 1978 season as Billy Sims gained 247 yards on 28 attempts. He scored on runs of 44 and 30 yards. The Sooners lost six of nine fumbles that day, including ones on the NU 11, 38 and three-yard lines. It was the only game in which the Sooners trailed in all season.

Hosting No. 1

The Sooners have hosted the top-ranked team in the nation five times in its history, including Nebraska three times. In the five meeting with No. 1 inside Memorial Stadium, OU is 0-5. Here are the meetings:

The Sooners' Head Coach

It didn't take long for Bob Stoops to win the hearts of Sooner fans across the country. Considered to be one of the brightest young rising stars in college football, Stoops used his vast knowledge of football and his tremendous ability to relate with players to lead OU to its first winning season since 1993 and bowl appearance since 1994. For his efforts, Stoops was recognized as the Big 12 Conference Coach of the Year by *The Dallas Morning News* and *The Sporting News*.

Stoops is just the fourth Oklahoma head coach to lead his team to a bowl appearance in his first season. Only Jim Tatum (1947 Gator), Gomer Jones (1965 Gator) and Chuck Fairbanks (1968 Orange) have accomplished this feat.

Stoops was introduced as the Sooners' 21st head football coach on December 1, 1998, after playing a key role in the nationally ranked football programs at both Kansas State and Florida. During his time as defensive coordinator at both schools, the defense ranked among the best in the nation and was instrumental in Florida winning the national championship in 1996.

In his first season as a head coach, Stoops and his staff made vast improvements in the Sooner offense, defense and special teams. Offensively, OU ended the regular season ranked 13th nationally in total offense (427.2), ninth in passing (321.7) and eighth in scoring (36.8). On defense, OU proudly held the 18th best scoring defense in the nation, however the largest improvement came from the special teams where the Sooners ranked inside the top 10 nationally in punting (8th) and kickoff returns (7th). They also stood 15th in punt returns.

Stoops, who has already added his name to the list of winningest coaches at OU, spent the previous three seasons as the assistant head coach, defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of Florida. During his tenure with the Gators, Stoops helped Florida to a combined 30-5 record, a national championship, one SEC championship and three bowl games. In each of his three seasons, the Gators ranked among the nation's top 15 teams in total defense and top 20 in rush defense.

Prior to Florida, Stoops spent seven seasons (1989-95) at Kansas State University, assisting in one of the most impressive turnarounds in college football history. During his final four seasons in Manhattan, KSU posted a 35-12 record and played in three bowl games.

His 1995 defensive unit led the nation in total defense, ranked second in scoring and had all four defensive backs named to the All-Big Eight Team.

Quickies About Stoops

Now that Oklahoma is eligible for a bowl game, OU head coach Bob Stoops has become just the second Sooner head coach to lead his first two squads to bowl berths. The other Sooner head coach to do so was Chuck Fairbanks in 1967 and 1968...With a 13-5 record after 18 games at OU, Stoops just the fifth Sooner head coach to have 13 or more wins in 18 games. Others are Switzer (17), Wilkinson (14), Fairbanks (14) and Stidham (14)...At home under Stoops, Oklahoma has outscored its opponents 408-74 overall.

Practice Policies

Practices will be closed to the public and media. Drills begin around 4 p.m. on the practice fields just southwest of the stadium and media is welcome to use the first 30 minutes to shoot photos or video. Everyone must stay at the end of the practice field unless escorted by a member of the media relations staff.

Media will be allowed back into practice with about 15 minutes remaining to prepare for coach and player interviews.

Coach & Player Interviews

Interviews with OU coaches and players will only take place following practice during the season. There will be no opportunities for interviews before practice.

Coach Stoops will be available to the media following every practice Monday through Thursday and following each game. To schedule an interview, contact Mike Prusinski, Athletic Media Relations Director, at 405-325-8231.

Assistant coaches will be available after practice each Tuesday and Wednesday throughout the 2000 season. On occasion, assistant coaches could also be available at the media luncheon each Tuesday during the year.

On Sunday evenings throughout the season, coaches will conduct interviews on the telephone from their offices between 5-5:30 p.m. Contact Mike Prusinski or Cyndi Robinson for direct office phone numbers.

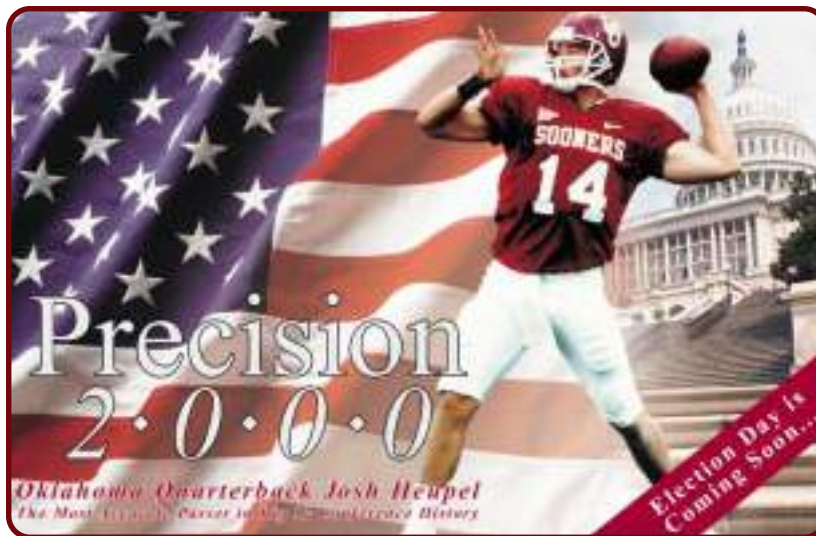

Heupel Sweeps Kansas Primary

With the final election just a few weeks away, action between the states are heating up. Last Saturday, OU quarterback Josh Heupel swept the Kansas primary with a very solid performance against Kansas State QB Jonathan Beasley. It's the fifth state contest that the Sooner QB has won this season.

The holder of 21 school and Big 12 passing records, Heupel has vaulted into the race for the Heisman Trophy, as well as the Johnny Unitas Quarterback Award and Davey O'Brien Award.

Through 18 regular season games as a Sooner, Heupel has the single-game school marks for completions (37), passing attempts (58), passing yards (429) and total offense (410). He has the school marks for touchdown passes in a single game (5), back-to-back games (8), three games (13) and season (38).

CheckOut More Heupel Hype

With 374 yards passing against the top-ranked defense of Kansas State, Heupel has now thrown for 200 or more yards in 16 of 18 career games as a Sooner. He has topped the 300-yard barrier 12 times in 18 career games.

He currently has some impressive streaks going, including -- 18 straight games with at least one TD pass, a 50 percent completion rate in 18 straight games, nine straight games with at least 270 yards passing, 118 passes attempted without an interception and 83 passes completed without an interception.

As far as Big 12 quarterbacks and the number of 300-yard passing games in their careers, Heupel currently ranks first with 12. Behind him are Major Applewhite (Texas) with seven and former Colorado QB Koy Detmer with four.

Heupel and former Colorado quarterback Koy Detmer are the only Big 12 Conference quarterbacks to ever record more than 400 yards passing twice in a season. Detmer posted 400 or more yards three times during the 1996 season.

The OU career record holder for touchdown passes, Heupel has thrown at least two TD strikes in 15 of his 18 games as a Sooner.

Last season Heupel completed touchdown passes to 17 different receivers, another school record. The previous school record was nine different receivers in 1996.

Heupel is the only player in the history of OU football to pass for more than 3,000 yards and collect more than 3,000 yards of total offense in a single season.

For his efforts against K-State, he was named National Player of the Week by USA Today, Rivals.com and College Football News.

In the first three Big 12 games of the 2000 season, Heupel has completed .701 percent of his passes (75-107) for 995 yards, four touchdowns and no interceptions.

While he's already reached the top of the OU career list, Heupel is quickly moving up on the Big 12 charts as well. Here's where he stands heading into this weekend:

Making The Most Of Opportunities

If there was ever an example of fair play, it would be the passing offense of the Oklahoma Sooners the past 18 games. Last season, OU finished two games with at least 13 different players catching at least one pass six different times. (OU set a school record vs. Texas A&M last year with 14 players having at least one reception.) This season, the OU single-game best was 11 different players against Arkansas State.

In their first five games of '00, the Sooners have had a total of 13 different players (six receivers, three running backs and four tight ends) register at least one catch.

Sooner receivers have also made the most of their opportunities with 1,972 yards after the catch (YAC) last season (164.3 ypg), and 959 yards this season (159.8 ypg). Here is a list of the OU receivers and the yards they've earned this year following the catch:

Tim Duncan (PK) - Has connected on 39 straight extra points dating back to last season (37 straight this year).

OU Defense - Has eight straight games (dating back to last year) with at least one interception...Has not allowed an opponent to rush for 100 yards in 12 straight regular season games.

Mackey Streak Ends

Sophomore receiver Damian Mackey failed to record at least one catch in the Kansas State game, ending his school record streak for catches in consecutive games at 17. Not only was his streak of 17 games the OU school record for consecutive games with a catch from the beginning of a career, but also the record for consecutive catches.

While Mackey starts over, running back Quentin Griffin will keep moving forward with a current streak of 11 straight games with a catch from the beginning of a career.

OU Hits The Ground Running

The Sooner offense has made a concentrated effort to better the running attack for the 2000 season. Through six games, the time has proven to be well spent.

" Last season, OU finished the year averaging 3.9 yards per carry. In 2000, Sooner running backs have averaged 4.0 yards.

" Last season, the Sooners averaged 105.5 yards a game rushing. In 2000, OU is averaging 145.5 a game on the ground.

" In 1999, OU ended the year with 18 rushing touchdowns. Through six games in 2000, OU has 23 rushing TDs. The 23 rushing touchdowns are the most since 25 in 1997.

" Sophomore running back Quentin Griffin has already surpassed his 1999 rushing totals of 285 yards and four touchdowns which he recorded in four games. Freshman running back Renaldo Works is close behind Griffin with 312 total yards and four TDs.

" Griffin recorded a school record and tied the Big 12 Conference mark for rushing touchdowns with six against Texas earlier this season. His 11 rushing touchdowns in '00 are the most by a Sooner running back since Jerald Moore ended the '94 season with 11.

" In 11 games last season, OU had just 83 first downs rushing (7.4 avg.). Through six games, the Sooners have recorded 49 first downs on the ground (8.2 avg.).

Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award (College Football's Top Senior Quarterback); Davey O'Brien Award (Nation's Top Quarterback)

Josh Heupel -- Completed 78.4% of his passes (29-37) for 374 yards and two touchdowns against the top-ranked defense of Kansas State. He also threw no interceptions for the third straight game running his streak to 118 straight attempts and 83 completions without an INT. He also recorded his fifth rushing touchdown of the season.

Dick Butkus Award (Nation's Top Linebacker)

Rocky Calmus -- Recorded seven tackles against Kansas State and led the defensive effort with one sack, one tackle for loss and two pass deflections.

Ray Guy Award (College Football's Top Punter)

Jeff Ferguson -- Punted four times against Kansas State for a 44.0 average. He currently leads the Big 12 Conference in punting with a 45.1 average. He would stand third nationally but he is one attempt shy of qualifying for the NCAA stats.

He heads up a punting unit that ranks second in the Big 12 and ninth nationally in punting but has allowed just 80 return yards on 11 returns.

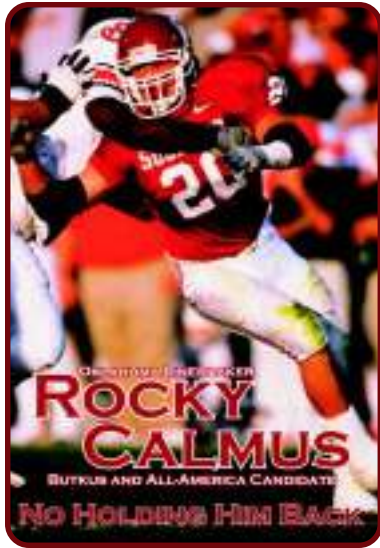

It's Getting Rocky Around OU

Sooner junior linebacker Rocky Calmus has been one of OU's defensive leaders the past two seasons and now he's getting national attention for it.

Calmus was named to every preseason All-Big 12 team and preseason All-America squads by several publications and in the first six games of 2000 he showed why. The tough junior has recorded 50 tackles, nine tackles for loss, one forced fumble and three fumble recoveries, two sacks and an interception for a TD.

Playing through a broken wrist and leg fracture last season, as well as a broken thumb this year, Calmus has recorded 10 or more tackles in all but seven games the last two years. Against Colorado last season, he tied the school record (previously held by Brian Bosworth vs. Miami in 1986) for tackles in a game with 22 (12 solo).

In the category of tackles for loss by a linebacker, Calmus continues to hang with impressive company in the OU record book with 34 for -100 yards for his three seasons as a Sooner. He's currently second behind only Brian Bosworth on the career list. On the Big 12 Conference career list, he's 14th all-time.

Oklahoma Memorial Stadium

With the help of some of the best college football fans in the country, Memorial Stadium has once again become one of the toughest places to play in college football.

Since Memorial Stadium opened in 1925, the Sooners have built a 291-78-15 record (.780). Heading into this weekend, OU has won 11 straight home games dating back to 1998, the longest home winning streak for the Sooners since winning 19 straight at home between 1985-88 and currently the longest home winning streak in the Big 12 Conference thanks to losses by Kansas State (by OU) and Texas A&M (by Colorado).

OU won all five home games in impressive fashion last year, giving OU its first undefeated home season since 1987 and 29th all-time.

The Final Word

Oklahoma has allowed its opponents to score in the opening quarter just eight times in the last 17 regular season games...OU has scored on its opening drive nine times (seven touchdowns, two field goals) in the last 17 regular season games, including four times this season...OU's opponents have scored on their opening drive just twice (Notre Dame & Texas Tech last year) in the last 18 games...In the last 13 games (dating back to last year), **OU's defense** has allowed just 11 rushing touchdowns...The **Oklahoma offensive line** has allowed just 10 sacks this season and a total of 23 in the last 18 games...With 721 passing attempts in the last 18 games, the sack/pass ratio is 1:35...The six interceptions by **J.T. Thatcher** is the most by a Sooner since Kevin Thompson recorded six in 1988...**Thatcher**, who is second nationally in interceptions, is now just two shy of the school record (8) shared by **Rickey Dixon** (1987) and **Scott Case** (1983)...The **Sooner defense** has been strong on third down conversions this season, allowing just 27% (24-90), including just 13.3% (2-15) to Kansas State...In the last two games, the OU defense has held Texas and Kansas State to a combined 6 of 30 in third down conversions...As for the **OU offense** on third downs, the Sooners are converting 49% (42-85), including a whopping 73% (11-15) against Texas...The last two games, OU is 18 for 31 in third down conversions...Did you know that the **OU offense** has thrown for 5,424 yards in the last 18 games and that's more than the Sooners threw for in all six national championship seasons combined...Despite the fact that **OU** has thrown for more than 5,000 yards in 18 games, only four Sooners (**Brandon Daniels '99, Antwone Savage '99 & '00, Jarraill Jackson '99 and Andre Woolfolk '00**) have topped the century mark in receiving yards in that span of games...The 149 completions this season for OU is the third most in school history...The 1,964 passing yards stands as the fourth best output in OU history...If the season ended tomorrow, the 101.7 yards allowed rushing would be the fifth best average by a Sooner defense.
