WINNING TRADITION



All-Time Victories

Nebraska ranks fourth in NCAA history with 794 victories and is easily the nation's winningest program with 360 wins since 1970.

Bowl Bonanza

Nebraska has appeared in 43 bowl games, including an NCAA record 35 straight from 1969 to 2003.

Back-to-Back

Nebraska is one of only two teams in history to win back-to-back national titles with perfect records in 1994 and 1995. NU is also one of just two teams to win at least a share of the national title three times in a four-year span (1994,1995, 1997).

Decade of Dominance

The Huskers were dominant in the 1990s, as NU captured three national titles from 1994 to 1997. Nebraska lost just three home games in the 1990s.

Poll Leader

The Huskers have been ranked in the final Associated Press Poll in 35 of the last 37 seasons.

Big 12 Conference

Eight Big 12 teams qualified for postseason bowl games in 2005, including the eventual national champions from Texas. The Huskers will face the Longhorns in Lincoln on Oct. 21, after traveling to 2004 national champion USC on Sept. 16.

NCAA Record Sellouts

Nebraska boasts an NCAA-record 275 consecutive home sellouts in Memorial Stadium dating back to 1962, when Coach Bob Devaney took the helm as head coach.

Academic Dominance

Nebraska leads the nation with an amazing 233 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans across all sports. The Huskers also lead the nation with 85 football Academic All-Americans throughout history. Approximately 93 percent of student-athletes who exhaust their eligibility graduate at Nebraska.

For more than a century, the legacy of Nebraska Football has been growing. From its humble beginning in 1890 – when two games made an entire schedule – to 2006, where an established, nationally prominent program enjoys a rich history of success, Nebraska's student-athletes have entertained and excelled on all levels. Five national championships and more than 40 conference titles highlight the accomplishments of one of college football's most storied programs. There have been Heisman winners and Outland Trophy recipients, a nation-leading number of Academic All-Americans, a Big 12-leading graduation rate and many professional football stars. But underlying all of



the countless accolades is an organization that does not rely on wins and losses as the final indicator of excellence. Nebraska Football is much more than talented athletes and coaches taking the field to play a game - it is a family. The fans, support staff and student-athletes are all Dedicated to Excellence through Tradition, Teamwork and integrity. It is this commitment on and off the field that makes Nebraska unique and assures that the rich tradition of the Huskers will keep growing for years to come.

Outland Trophy Leaders

Seven Huskers have won a nation-leading eight Outland Trophies.

All-Americans

Since 1960, 75 Huskers have earned firstteam All-America honors, including 13 two-time winners for 92 total awards.

NFL Connections

Over the past 10 years, Nebraska leads all Big 12 Conference schools with 52 players chosen in the NFL Draft. No other Big 12 team has had 40 draft choices. Nebraska has had 31 fiirstround NFL draft picks, including 22 over the past 33 years. NU has had 216 players drafted since 1972, more than six per year.

Home-Field Advantage

Nebraska has not lost more than two games at home in a season since a 2-3 mark in 1968. NU is 477-129-30 in Lincoln and 352-106-13 in Memorial Stadium.

Conference Champs

The Huskers have won 34 conference titles outright and have shared another nine crowns. The Huskers won the last four Big Eight crowns (1992-95) outright, the only school to ever do so. Nebraska has played in three Big 12 Championship Games, winning conference crowns in 1997 and 1999.

National Attention

Nebraska has played on television 241 times in the last 51 years. The Huskers have averaged 10 national TV broadcasts per year since


Tough Competition

Over the last 32 years, Nebraska has posted a 74-52-1 (.587) record against ranked teams. NU has averaged nearly four games vs. ranked teams per year, with 65 against top 10 teams.

RICH HISTORY



Nebraska started off the millennium the same way it ended the last - in dominant fashion. The Huskers finished off the 1990s by becoming the first team in the history of Division I football to post 100 wins in back-to-back decades. Since the start of the 1970s, Nebraska has posted the best record of any Division I team (341-74-5). The Huskers ranked first in the 1980s and second in the 1990s. That outstanding tradition began with Bob Devaney and Tom Osborne and continues in 2006 with Coach Bill Callahan.





THE RODGERS RUN

One of the most memorable moments in Nebraska football history, 1972 Heisman Trophy winner Johnny Rodgers' electrifying 72-yard punt return against Oklahoma in the 1971 "Game of the Century" helping the Huskers to their second straight national title.



The roots of Nebraska football date back to 1890, when Dr. Langdon Frothingham led NU's first team to a 2-0 record. Nebraska football teams were known as the Old Gold Knights, the Antelopes and the Bugeaters before the 1900 team adopted the name "Cornhuskers."


Tunnel Walk

The Tunnel Walk, which began in 1994, has become an integral part of Memorial Stadium's game-day experience. It was created as a way for fans to share in the excitement of the team emerging from the locker room, something only a few could do before HuskerVision's cameras and big screens came to Memorial Stadium. The sounds of the Alan Parsons Project's "Sirius," and the roar of the 80,000 frenzied fans rock the stadium as the Huskers burst through the locker room doors and into the tunnel on their way to the Memorial Stadium FieldTurf.



The Horseshoe

For as long as anyone can remember, the Huskers have touched a lucky horseshoe on their way from the locker room to the field. The horseshoe hangs above the double doors that open into the tunnel, and it has hung there since the South Stadium locker room opened before the 1973 season. Prior to 1973, during coach Bob Devaney's tenure, the horseshoe hung above a door near the north locker room. When the team moved to its new airconditioned quarters, players persuaded Coach Tom Osborne to allow them to relocate the horseshoe. Captains John Dutton and Daryl White hoisted teammate Bob Thornton, who put the horseshoe in its current place. Osborne, who had just succeeded Devaney as coach, agreed that the horseshoe should be moved. He wasn't superstitious, he said, but he figured the players didn't want UCLA, the opening-game opponent in 1973, to have the horseshoe's luck. The Cornhuskers won, 40-13.



Family Atmosphere

Cornhusker football has always had a family atmosphere. At the Red-White Spring Game in 2005, 26 Huskers in the NFL returned to Lincoln, as did "The Triplets" - Heisman winner Mike Rozier, quarterback Turner Gill and wingback Irving Fryar - the cornerstones of Nebraska's 1983 "Scoring Explosion" offense.

CHAMPIONSHIP TRADITION



Few college athletic programs can boast the national championship resume of Nebraska football. Since 1970, Nebraska has captured five national championships, and played for a national title in a bowl game on four other occasions. The Huskers are one of only three college football teams to win five national championships since 1970, and one of only six to capture more than three titles.

NEBRASKA GAME DAY




Game days at Nebraska are unlike any in college football. Fans line the streets of Lincoln waiting to enter the "Sea of Red," while the marching band parades up Stadium Drive as thousands of redclad fans look on. The Huskers emerge from the famous "Tunnel Walk" to the sound of "Sirius" and the fans stay at a frenzied pitch until the final play of the game when they graciously cheer for the opposing players as they exit the field.

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



More than 60,000 red-clad Huskers trekked to Pasadena for the 2002 Rose Bowl, and in 2001, more than 30,000 Huskers swarmed South Bend for a matchup with Notre Dame.


Every entrance at Memorial Stadium welcomes Husker fans with the following phrase:

Nebraska's annual Red-White Spring Game (right) has become a major attraction with Coach Bill Callahan on the sideline. The Huskers have averaged nearly 61,000 fans per Spring Game over the past three years to conclude spring practice. Another Husker tradition is Fan Day which attracts nearly 10,000 fans annually to Memorial Stadium during fall camp. Every Husker player and coach signs autographs and takes pictures with fans in a tradition that dates back more than 30 years.

Perhaps the most impressive measurement of the support Husker fans give to the Nebraska football team comes from its Spring Game attendance. Over the past three seasons, more than 182,000 fans have flocked to Memorial Stadium to watch NU's final practice of the spring, including a record 63,416 fans in 2005. By comparison, seven of the Big 12 schools drew fewer than 15,000 fans for their 2006 spring games.

BOWL TRADITION



The holiday plans of Nebraska football teams and thousands of Husker fans have traditionally included travel to a bowl game. Nebraska has participated in 43 bowls in the history of the program, including an NCAA record 35 consecutive bowls from 1969 to 2003. The Huskers have won eight of their last 11 bowl games, including three victories in national championship games.

Husker Bowl Facts

Nebraska ranks fifth all-time with 43 bowl appearances in the history of the program.

Nebraska owns 22 all-time bowl victories, including eight wins in its last 11 bowl games. The Huskers defeated Michigan, 32-28, in the 2005 Alamo Bowl.
















Covering the Bowls







HUSKER OUTREACH






Members of the NU staff have proven track records as elite recruiters. In 2005, the Huskers brought the No. 1 recruiting class in the nation to Lincoln.




Nebraska owns one of the most glorious histories of any school represented by players in the National Football League. Nearly 300 former Huskers have represented Nebraska in the NFL. Over the past 10 years, Nebraska leads all Big 12 schools with 52 players chosen during the NFL Draft. No other conference school has had 40 players chosen over the past 10 seasons.

Bob Brown became Nebraska's third inductee in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in August of 2004, joining Guy Chamberlin and William (Roy) Lyman.


Will Shields, a 10-time Pro Bowl lineman for the Kansas City Chiefs, was named the NFL Man of the Year in 2003.
















Nebraska's student-athletes are not only prepared for every college opportunity, but for life after the University as well. NU consistently beats the odds by sending more than the national average to the pros. Since 2000, the Huskers have had a Big 12-leading 27 players chosen on draft day.

Husker NFL Facts

Nebraska had four players selected in the 2006 NFL Draft. Over the last 10 years, Nebraska has averaged more than five players chosen in each NFL Draft for a Big 12-leading total of 52 drafted players.

The 2006 NFL Draft marked the 37th consecutive year the Huskers have had at least three players chosen in the draft.

Since 1962 NU has had 265 players drafted, an average of nearly six selections per year, including an amazing 46 Husker offensive linemen.

Since 1990, Nebraska has had 21 defensive backs, 17 linebackers, 15 defensive linemen, 13 offensive linemen, 10 running backs, eight wide receivers, five quarterbacks and three kicker/punters chosen in the NFL Draft. Fourteen more Husker receivers have signed free agent contracts in that span.

Nebraska leads the nation with four former kickers (two place-kickers, two punters) who will be on NFL rosters for the 2006 season.

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Nebraska has been a hotbed for gifted athletes to earn national honors. In 2001, quarterback Eric Crouch became Nebraska's third Heisman Trophy winner. He also took home the Davey O'Brien Award given to the best collegiate quarterback and the Walter Camp Player-of-the-Year Award. Husker athletes have won a nation-leading eight Outland Trophies, four Lombardi Awards, three Heisman Trophies and one Butkus Award.



MEDIA ATTENTION



Nebraska football is among the most recognized college programs in the nation. Newspapers, magazines, radio, television and the Internet keep Nebraska in the national spotlight. Nebraska has been a regular stop for ESPN's College GameDay, most recently hosting the show for the Notre Dame and Oklahoma weekends in 2001.

Nebraska in the Spotlight


Nebraska, which appeared on television 10 times in 2005, has averaged eight televison appearances per year since 1980.

NU has ended the season ranked among the Associated Press Top 25 in 36 of the past 38 seasons. The Huskers were ranked by the AP for 348 consecutive weeks from 1981 to 2002.

Nebraska football can be heard statewide and across the nation on the Pinnacle Sports Radio Network. The games can also be heard on Sirius Satellite Radio and live worldwide and on the Internet at Huskers.com. Approximately two million fans per month visit Huskers.com during football season.

ESPN COLLEGE GAMEDAY AT NEBRASKA

ESPN College GameDay has made five appearances in Lincoln since 1994. On Sept. 8, 2001, more than 15,000 Husker fans helped set an ESPN College GameDay record by attending the morning telecast live inside Memorial Stadium. Lincoln also served as Nebraska's home for ESPN's "50 in 50" telecasts during the summer of 2005.



Nebraska football has been a fixture on national television for more than 50 years, since being featured on the first-ever television broadcast of a college game by NBC on Sept. 19, 1953. Since then, the Huskers have played on TV 240 more times, including 111 appearances on ABC. Since 2000, Nebraska has made more than 50 appearances on ABC, NBC, ESPN and FSN. As of June 15, Nebraska already had three national TV appearances scheduled for 2006.

With expanded capacity reaching beyond 80,000 fans for the first time in 2006, Nebraska still expects to continue its NCAA-record streak of 275 consecutive sellouts dating back to 1962.

During the sellout streak, NU has recorded a 242-33 record, including a 110-10 mark during the last 18 seasons.

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




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HAWKS CHAMPIONSHIP INDOOR CENTER

Nebraska's new Hawks Championship Indoor Center opened for the football team during spring practice in 2006. The magnificent facility features FieldTurf identical to Memorial Stadium's surface. The field also opens onto the grass practice fields of the new Ed and Joyanne Gass Practice Facility. The indoor center is connected by a skybridge to the new Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex to give Nebraska the best all-around football facilities in the nation.







Two HuskerVision Mitsubishi instant replay screens became fixtures inside Memorial Stadium in 1994. At the time, Nebraska became the first collegiateonly facility in the nation with big screens for its fans. In 2006, Nebraska continued to set the pace for innovation inside **Memorial Stadium with** the addition of one of the nation's largest big screens inside a college-only facility. The stadium also features two new smaller HuskerVision screens to help create one the best game-day atmospheres in the country within the historic walls of Memorial Stadium.

In 2004, Nebraska embarked on a major facilities project that included the Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex and the Hawks Championship Indoor Center.

Nebraska's newest additions to Memorial Stadium will increase the capacity of Memorial Stadium beyond 80,000 in 2006.

Since Memorial Stadium originally opened in 1923, its capacity has increased by nearly 50,000 seats.

HUSKERVISION

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The excitement of the more than 80,000 fans that fill Memorial Stadium each home football Saturday reaches a fever pitch for the Tunnel Walk, when the Huskers officially take the field. Over the past 18 seasons, Nebraska has won an amazing 92 percent of its games inside Memorial Stadium.

HOME OF CHAMPIONS



Nebraska's top facilities are not limited to the football program. Nearly every Husker sport enjoys a venue that ranks among the nation's best. Nebraska is dedicated to providing its athletes top-notch game-day and practice atmospheres in every sport. Nebraska annually hosts several Big 12 and NCAA Championship events, including volleyball, baseball, soccer, softball, track and field, gymnastics, golf, wrestling and swimming and diving.




Named after NU's longtime football coach and athletic director, the 13,595-seat Bob **Devaney Sports Center** is home to the Husker basketball, gymnastics, swimming and diving, track and field and wrestling teams. The **Devaney Center has** hosted numerous NCAA postseason events since its opening in 1976, including the 2003 NCAA Women's Gymnastics Championships.

Home to Nebraska's twotime national champion volleyball team, the 4,200-seat Nebraska Coliseum is one of the premier facilities in college volleyball and gives the Huskers a definitive homecourt advantage. The Coliseum has been the home of 71 consecutive sellouts for volleyball entering the 2006 season.

The Nebraska Indoor Track and Field facility received \$2.7 million in renovations in 2000, distinguishing it among the world's best. It features a hydraulic-banked track, one of three in the nation and only seven in the world.

Nebraska's strength training facilities have always been among the finest in the nation. The strength complex was one of the most efficient and well-designed weight rooms in the country for nearly three decades.

During 2006, Nebraska will take the next step in peak performance with the addition of the new Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex. Within the Osborne Complex, the 63,500-square foot Charles and Romona Myers Performance Center will feature the nation's top weight room, a nutrition center and a technologically advanced athletic medicine center featuring two hydro-therapy pools.



Providing expert care to more than 550 Husker student-athletes, Nebraska features one of the most well-trained and highly skilled Athletic Medicine staffs in the country.



Nebraska's team of orthopaedists is led by Chief of Staff Dr. Pat Clare, a nationally respected orthopaedic surgeon with more than 30 years of service to Husker athletics.



The medical facilities at Nebraska have long been among the nation's best, and NU's new Athletic Medicine Center within the Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex will keep the Huskers on the front line of technology for decades to come. In addition to Nebraska's North Stadium facility, the NU Coliseum, the Bob Devaney Sports Center, and Haymarket Park all feature athletic medicine areas.

More Husker student-athletes have been selected to CoSIDA Academic All-America teams than from any other school in the nation, and more Huskers have earned academic all-conference honors than athletes from any other league school. NU has led the Big 12 in graduation rates in six of the conference's first 10 years.

A total of 15 Husker student-athletes, including a nation-leading nine NU football players, have earned the NCAA Today's Top Eight Award.


NU boasts a 93-percent Exhausted Eligibility Graduation Rate for studentathletes.


In 2005, Nebraska received the National Consortium for Academics and Sport Award of Excellence for highest combined total in community outreach and degree completion.

Personal Counseling

Transitional issues, stress management, time management, academic focus and problem resolution are all addressed in a proactive manner throughout the year. Counseling referrals are also made if necessary to mental health professionals at the University Health Center.



NATIONAL POWERS



One of the nation's premier athletic programs, Nebraska is dedicated to and successful in all 23 of its varsity sports. In 2005-06, 15 of Nebraska's teams finished among the top 25 in their respective sports, including six top-five finishes in volleyball, rifle, bowling, women's outdoor track and field, women's gymnastics and wrestling dual rankings. Nebraska has won 22 team national championships since 1970.



Peak Performances

Christina Houghtelling (right) of the Nebraska volleyball team was one of five Huskers to earn the highest athletic honors in their sports in 2005-06. Houghtelling was the AVCA National Player of the Year, while bowling's Lindsay Baker also captured National Player-of-the-Year honors. Men's long jumper Arturs Abolins won indoor and outdoor national titles, while Dace Ruskule won the NCAA crown in the women's discus. Kristina Fehlings added an NCAA individual title for the Huskers in the air rifle in 2006.


In each of the past two seasons, Nebraska has produced 37 individual All-Americans that captured 48 All-America awards in their respective sports.

Nebraska finished either first or second in the conference in eight sports, including a Big 12 volleyball title and a Great America Rifle Conference championship.







A National Approach: Nebraska's Recruiting Power

Nebraska has always taken a national approach to recruiting and the 2006 roster is a perfect example as it includes players from 23 states and Germany. Over the past two seasons, the Huskers have signed 28 high school players from 12 states who ranked among the top 50 in the nation at their respective position.

In the history of the program, Nebraska's 92 football All-Americans hail from 23 states and the District of Columbia. NU boasts seven All-Americans from California, while Texas has sent 10 All-Americans to Nebraska, led by Outland winner Aaron Taylor and two-time All-Americans Broderick Thomas and Jake Young.

The Nebraska program has been built by the best players in the state. A staggering 37 Nebraska natives have become All-Americans at NU. Heisman Trophy winners Eric Crouch and Johnny Rodgers are both Omaha natives, as is two-time Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award winner Dave Rimington.

New Jersey sent Heisman Trophy winner Mike Rozier, NFL No. 1 pick Irving Fryar, Lombardi winner Rich Glover and two-time All-American Daryl White to Nebraska.

All-American Tommie Frazier, who led Nebraska to national titles in 1994 and 1995, came to the Big Red from Florida, as did All-America defensive back Wonder Monds, and recent NFL stars Fabian Washington and Tyrone Williams.

Outland Trophy winner Will Shields came to Nebraska from Oklahoma, before going on to one of the greatest careers by an offensive lineman in NFL history.
