Trojans set for return trip to Lincoln, date with Huskers

The Troy State football team will open its 2002 season in Lincoln, Neb., this Saturday against Nebraska (No. 8 Coaches/No. 9 AP), fulfilling the second and final part of a two-year contract with one of the nation's most storied programs.

The Trojans will travel to Lincoln with one of their most experienced squads since Larry Blakeney became head coach in 1991. TSU boasts 25 seniors and returns 16 starters from last season, although two of those players, senior center Trent Garmon and junior cornerback Freeman White, will not play due to injuries.

Nebraska opened its season on Saturday with a 48-10 win over Arizona State at Memorial Stadium, using a 24-point, fourth-quarter outburst to put the game away. The Huskers return 13 starters from last year's squad, which played Miami for the national championship in the Rose Bowl.

TROY STATE VS. NEBRASKA, THE SERIES: This will be the second meeting between Troy State and Nebraska, with the Huskers owning a 1-0 advantage. Nebraska defeated the Trojans, 42-14, on Sept. 1 last season in Lincoln.

TROY STATE VS. NEBRASKA, THE LAST TIME: Nebraska running back Dahrran Diedrick rushed for 177 yards as the Huskers ran up a total of 457 yards total offense - including 330 rushing - and ruined the Trojans' Division I-A "coming out" party before 77,812 on Sept. 1 last year.

The Trojans led 7-0 early following a 'Husker turnover and a Demontray Carter 9-yard scoring run. TSU then sliced a 21-point deficit to 28-14 at halftime and had an opportunity to cut into the lead further early in the second half after recovering a Nebraska fumble inside the Huskers' 30. An interception by Mark Vedral snuffed out the threat, however, and the Trojans never threatened again.

Nebraska used three Trojan miscues to account for 14 points.

Troy State finished with only 165 yards total offense and had minus-25 yards rushing, a school record for fewest yards on the ground, although the team lost 68 yards on eight sacks and another 30 on botched punt snaps.

WEEKLY INTERVIEWS

The Troy State Athletics Media Relations office encourages media contact and interaction with Troy State coaches and athletes and will coordinate all interviews. Before or after practice is the best time to catch players and coaches at the same time. The Trojans practice from 5-8 p.m. on Mondays and 2:30-5 p.m. Tuesday-Friday, except when playing on the road. Although a select group of players will be present at each press conference, specific player interview requests should be made by 6 p.m. on Sundays.

NO PLAYER INTERVIEWS ARE ALLOWED AFTER WEDNESDAY.

WEEKLY PRESS TELECONFERENCE

Those media unable to attend the weekly press conference in Troy can still participate in the event via the Troy State Football Teleconference.

Coach Blakeney will make a brief opening statement and take questions from the media present for the first 20 minutes. THE NEBRASKA SCOUTING REPORT

Nebraska Head Coach Frank Solich

Frank Solich is entering his fifth season as the Huskers' head coach. After spending four seasons (1962-65) as a player under Bob Devaney, and 19 seasons (1979-97) as an assistant under Tom Osborne, both Nebraska coaching legends, Solich was named Nebraska's 26th head coach on Dec. 10, 1997.

In his first four seasons, Solich has compiled a 43-9 record, better than both of his predecessors in their first four years at Nebraska. Solich claimed Big 12 Conference Coach-of-the-Year honors in both 1999 and 2001, and was one of seven finalists for the Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach-of-the-Year Award last season. The 57-year-old Solich has led Nebraska to four consecutive nine-win seasons and four consecutive bowl appearances, including a bid to his first national championship game as a head coach in the 2002 Rose Bowl.

The Huskers have spent nine weeks as the nation's AP No. 1 team and 10 weeks as the ESPN/USA Today Coaches top team. NU has been ranked in the top 10 in every poll since the preseason AP poll in 1999.

The Huskers Last Time Out

Nebraska scored a pair of touchdowns just 1:42 apart in the third quarter to break open a seven-point game, as the eighth-ranked Huskers opened the 2002 season with a 48-10 victory over Arizona State in the Black Coaches Association Classic last Saturday.

Nebraska quarterback Jammal Lord, who was making his first career start since replacing 2001 Heisman winner Eric Crouch, performed well in his starting debut, but was overshadowed by a the special teams and defensive units. The Husker special teams blocked a pair of punts that led to a pair of touchdowns and a suffocating defense recorded four sacks and allowed one Sun Devil touchdown.

Lord picked up his first career 100-yard rushing day, carrying 17 times for 103 yards, while also completing five-of-13 passes for 35 yards and a touchdown. His efforts helped the Huskers extend their home winning streak to 22 games en route to their 17th straight season-opening victory.

Nebraska, which improved to 6-0 in preseason contests, jumped out on its first possession, going 65 yards in 10 plays before Josh Brown's 40-yard field goal gave the hosts a 3-0 lead just 4:19 into the contest. Lord showed a solid passing touch on the first drive by completing 2-for-2 passes for 26 yards, including finding Troy Hassebroek for a 22-yard reception on third-and-nine to keep the drive alive.

Larry Blakeney Head Coach • 12th Season

• Is the all-time winningest coach in school history with a 98-34-1 record. With the 98 career wins, Blakeney has shattered the previous school record of 44, set by Billy Atkins in the late 1960s and early 1970s. He is the 20th head coach in school history.

This season is Blakeney's 12th, marking the longest tenure by a head coach at the school.
Blakeney has guided the Trojans to eight winning seasons, including four seasons with 10 or more wins.
Blakeney's success at Troy State has come under changing conditions. He began his career at TSU in the Trojans' final two seasons in Division II, and led the Trojans to seven Division I-AA playoff appearances in eight seasons. Last season, he led Troy State through a transition season, as the Trojans moved to Division I-A, finishing with a 7-4 record and wins over Sun Belt Conference champion North Texas and Southeastern Conference foe Mississippi State.

Was a three-year letterwinner under Ralph "Shug" Jordan at Auburn.
Blakeney began his collegiate coaching career at his alma mater, serving as an assistant coach from 1977 until coming to Troy in 1991.
While at Auburn, he helped lead the Tigers to four SEC titles and coached

in nine bowl games, serving as wide receivers coach and offensive playcaller.

• Has twice been named as AFCA regional Coach of the Year.

• Was named Southland Football League Coach of the Year in 1999 and 2000.

• Winner of the 2000 Johnny Vaught Lifetime Achievement Award by the All-American Football Foundation.

• Is 51-7-1 in games played at Memorial Stadium.

OFFENSE

QUARTERBACKS: The "Trojan Spread" enters its second season with a new triggerman in Hansell Bearden. Bearden, who appeared in seven games as a redshirt freshman, earned the starting job during the spring and withstood a challenge from junior college transfer Matt Ray. Bearden will replace Brock Nutter, a four-year starter, who set school records for pass attempts (964), pass completions (542), passing yards (7,331) and started a school-record 48 consecutive games.

Ray, who spent a year at UNLV under John Robinson before transferring to Butte College in Oroville, Calif., will back up Bearden.

RUNNING BACKS: With the departure of all-purpose wizard Demontray Carter, who earned All-Independent honors in 2001, the Trojans have a trio of players who will take his place this season. Senior LeBarron Black and sophomores DeWhitt Betterson and Jermaine Richardson will share time in the backfield. Black has played in 35 games in his career and will be the starter. Last season, Black appeared in 10 games, starting one while catching two touchdown passes. Richardson is a speedster who was redshirted last season, but he has been impressive during fall camp and will see plenty of action. Betterson, the team's leading returning rusher, will also see significant playing time. Betterson enjoyed his best performance of the season against top-ranked Miami in 2001, rushing nine times for 96 yards in the fourth quarter.

WIDE RECEIVERS: With three returning starters, including playmaker Heyward Skipper and the addition of consensus I-AA All-America receiver Andrew Amerson, the Trojans receiving corps will be one of the offense's strengths this season.

On the left side, Skipper, who stepped into the spotlight last season by catching 60 passes for 995 yards and nine touchdowns, will start and contend for national honors. Amerson played the previous three seasons at Cal State-Northridge, catching 97 passes for 1,244 yards and five touchdowns for the Matadors in 2001. He will start as the slot receiver on that side.

On the right side, Jason Samples returns at wide receiver. As a true freshman, Samples started 10 games, catching 30 passes for 365 yards. He also showed that he can throw as well, completing a 31-yard touchdown pass to Skipper on an end-around play against Louisiana-Monroe. At the slot position, senior Eric Felton earned the starting nod. Felton played in all 11 games a year ago, starting five. One of the team's quickest players, Felton caught 18 passes for 149 yards.

Junior Chris Day will also see some playing time at the slot positions, with some talented freshmen, pushing for playing time at all four receiver positions.

TIGHT ENDS/FULLBACKS: The fullback position is being anchored by Adrian Moore, a converted tight end who sat out last season due to an injury. He has been impressive in the fall, both as a blocking back and as a runner between the tackles, and has earned the starting job.

At tight end, the Trojans are blessed with experience, with junior Cedric Phillips and senior Jonathan Tomlin both returning. Phillips will start, with Tomlin coming in in double tight end formations.

OFFENSIVE LINE: After learning on the job last season, the Trojans return four starters from a year ago, making the offensive line one of the team's strong points this season.

A shoulder injury to starting center Trent Garmon occurred during the first week of August, forcing him to the sidelines, preventing the Trojans from having their front back intact.

That has forced Troy State into moving people around and learning new positions. Rodney Jordan, who was slated to start at right guard, has moved to center to replace Garmon. He spent the majority of spring practice at center, however, and is familiar with the position. Sophomore Donnie Bostian will step in and replace Jordan at right guard.

All-Independent candidate Branden

Hall will start at right tackle. The left side is anchored by two-year starter Stan Curington at tackle and last year's starter, Robin Lee, at guard.

DEFENSE

The "Deadbolt Defense," as it is affectionately named for defensive coordinator Wayne Bolt, returns eight starters but will have to replace its two leading tacklers in graduated linebackers Jimmy McClain and Corey Sears.

DEFENSIVE LINE: With three starters back from last season, the Trojans' defensive line will once again be one of the team's strong points. Seniors Davern Williams and Jose Gamboa return to handle the inside tackle positions. Last season, Williams had one sack and six tackles for a loss and made 61 tackles. Gamboa racked up 65 tackles, five for a loss, and had four sacks.

Osi Umenyiora, a three-year starter and one of the team's top pro prospects, anchors the right end of the line. Last season, he set new career highs in sacks, with six, and tackles for a loss, with 10. He also had 14 quarterback hurries while forcing three fumbles.

Shelton Felton, another senior, will start at left end. Coming off the bench last year, Felton was a force, recording 45 tackles and four sacks on top of his 11 tackles for a loss.

Depth is key for the Trojans, and they have plenty of it. Demarcus Ware, Byron Knight, Jamaal Holt and Torre Lankford will all see playing time as well.

LINEBACKERS: Last season, the Trojan defense was led by its linebackers, but now the Trojans have some new faces to fill those gaps left by Sears and McClain.

Naazir Yamini is the lone returning starter and will be the key to this group at "Mike" linebacker. A two-year starter, Yamini will become the focal point of the defense. He has racked up 20 tackles for a loss over the last two seasons and had 10 sacks in that period as well. He has also finished with more than 100 tackles in each of the last two seasons, recording 129 and 105, respectively, in 2000 and 2001.

At the "Will" position, senior Gordon Williams has earned the

starting role. A reserve the past the three seasons, he moves into the starting lineup and will be pushed by a talented group of newcomers.

The "Sam" position is anchored by Deloise Moore, the team's strongest player. After starting his career at running back, he shifted to defensive back and moved into the linebacker position this spring. A quick, physical player, he will be counted on to provide leadership to the defense's biggest question mark.

DEFENSIVE BACKS: When fall camp began, the defensive backfield appeared to be one of the strengths of this year's outfit. A season-ending knee injury to junior cornerback Freeman White, however, has left tremendous inexperience at left corner. The Trojans will look to two freshmen to replace White in Jermaine Miller and

Johnny Faulk. Miller is a redshirt freshman who enjoyed a solid spring and has been impressive thus far in August. Faulk is a true freshman who enrolled in January. He also had an impressive spring but has been slowed by injuries in August. Both will see significant playing time.

On the right side, All-Independent honoree Rayshun Reed returns. Likely the team's top pro prospect, Reed led the team with six interceptions last season and is the leader of the secondary. He had 57 tackles last season to go along with 14 passes broken up also. With two interceptions returned for touchdowns last season, he became the school's all-time leader in defensive touchdowns with three.

At free safety, sophomore Derrick Ansley returns as the starter after an impressive freshman season that saw him rack up 55 tackles and three interceptions in 10 games.

The strong safety position is held by senior David Philyaw, who has played corner for most of his career. Philyaw burst on the scene last year with stellar play on special teams, forcing Nebraska's Keyuo Craver to fumble the Trojans' first punt and set up Demontray Carter's first-quarter touchdown. The team's top reserve in the secondary last season, he will make an immediate impact on the defensive unit.

SPECIAL TEAMS

The Trojans lost both of their kicking specialists last season in kicker Drew Boteler and punter Jeremy Schatz. Thomas Olmsted will handle both duties early this season while kicker Matt Munyon nurses a hip injury. Olmsted has been impressive in fall camp, regularly booming punts longer than 40 yards and nailing field goals from 40 yards and longer.

Amerson and Skipper will handle punt and kick returns.

TROJANS ARE SENIOR-LADEN: This year's squad will boast the largest senior class since Larry Blakeney became head coach in 1991. With 25 players playing their final seasons, the Trojans will bid adieu to nearly a quarter of the team once the year is over. Of the 25 seniors, 15 are starters and 22 were listed on the

team's preseason depth chart. Those 22 have combined for 55 varsity letters. Of the seven seniors not starting, five at some point *have* started at their respective positions during their careers.

FINALLY FULL-FLEDGED: While the Trojans played their first season as a I-A school last season, they were officially listed as a "transitional" program by the NCAA, meaning that TSU counted toward bowl-eligibility for its opponents but was ineligible for the post-season at any level itself.

That is no longer the case in 2002. The Trojans are now full-fledged members of Division I-A. That standing was secured in May when the University submitted its final application to the NCAA after meeting transitional attendance and scheduling requirements.

The Trojans will also be ranked statistically among its I-A brethren this season.

ON THE ROAD IN 2002: The Trojans will play eight road games in 2002, the most in the Larry Blakeney era.

Of those games, however, two will be played in the state of Alabama - at UAB in Birmingham on Sept. 7 and vs. Florida A&M in Mobile on Nov. 9.

The Trojans will also visit two Southeastern Conference foes (Mississippi State and Arkansas), three Big 12 opponents (Nebraska, Iowa State and Missouri) and perennial Mid-American Conference champion Marshall. TSU's schedule boasts four home games, including one with Division I-A foe Utah State on Nov. 16.

BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE, RIGHT NOW: Construction on an expanded Memorial Stadium has already begun, with the south endzone seeing the first signs of change when it was filled with dirt and leveled out in preparation for the building of new permanent stands and a concourse area.

Bids for the full project will open in early September, after which the east-side stands (along George Wallace Drive) will be demolished. Construction on the new press box structure will begin following the season.

The five-story building will house 27 sky boxes, a state-of-the-art press facility and areas dedicated to sports medicine, strength & conditioning and academics. The expansion will increase the stadium's capacity to more than 30,000 and is expected to be completed in time for the 2003 season-opener, currently scheduled against Marshall on Sept. 4.

TROJANS ARE ALABAMA'S BEST SINCE '91: Since Larry Blakeney became Troy State's head coach in 1991, his teams have compiled a 99-33-1 overall record. That ranks the Trojans as the state's winningest program during that time, having posted a .735 winning percentage.

HOME WINNING STREAK: The Trojans enter the 2002 season having won 15 consecutive regular-season games at Memorial Stadium. Troy State's last regular-season home loss came at the hands of McNeese State on Nov. 14, 1998.

All-time, the Trojans are 154-69-4 at Memorial Stadium. Larry Blakeney is 51-7-1 at home in his 11 seasons.

BUZZ PHILLIPS NAMED DIRECTOR OF FB OPERATIONS: Buzz Phillips, a Troy State graduate and member of the Trojans' 1968 NAIA national championship team, was named as the football program's first Director of Football Operations in June.

Phillips previously served as the department's director of marketing and game management since April 2001.

BLAKENEY NO STRANGER TO TRANSITION TIME: The 2001 campaign was Troy State's transition year from Division I-AA to Division I-A.

It was not the first time that Troy State, or head coach Larry Blakeney, faced a transition year, however. The Trojans first transition season came in 1992, when Troy State moved from Division II to Division I-AA.

That season, the Trojans went 10-1 in their second year under Blakeney. The next season, Troy State advanced to the Division I-AA playoffs in their first year of eligibility, advancing all the way to the semifinals, going 12-1-1.

BLAKENEY REACHES ANOTHER MILESTONE: TSU Head Coach Larry Blakeney will reach another career milestone in 2002, coaching his 12th season at the school. That marks the longest tenure of any coach in school history.

Blakeney's 98 wins are already the most in school history. His teams have posted winning records in nine of his 11 years and in four consecutive, including last season's 7-4 mark. He needs just two wins to reach 100 in his career.

MCCLAIN HEADS FOR NFL'S TEXANS: Jimmy McClain was the lone Trojan to earn an NFL free-agent invitation in 2002. Seven Trojans earned NFL invites in 2000 and 29 have since Larry Blakeney became head coach in 1991.

This season could bring forth a record crop of professional opportunities for Troy State, with scouts already studying numerous Trojans, including Rayshun Reed, Osi Umenyiora and Davern Williams.

PLAYING BEFORE A CROWD: When the Trojans traveled to Nebraska on Sept. 1, 2001, they played before before 77,812 spectators, the largest crowd in school history.

They also played before 36,617 at the Orange Bowl vs. top-ranked Miami, the second-largest crowd in school history. The Trojans' previous high for attendance came in 1988 at the Citrus Bowl in Orlando, Fla. On that day against Central Florida, the Trojans played before 33,000 spectators.

In 2001, the Trojans played before 25,000 or more spectators four times, the most in school history. This season, the Trojans will play in five stadiums with capacities greater than 50,000 and three with capacities greater than 70,000.

NEW COACHING BLOOD: The Trojans welcomed just one full-time newcomer to the coaching staff in 2002, adding Ricky Logo to coach defensive tackles in March. Logo replaces Tracy Rocker, who left for a similar position at the University of Cincinnati.

HAVE DEGREE, WILL PLAY: Three Trojans playing this season have already earned their undergraduate degrees.

LeBarron Black (criminal justice), Stan Curington (business administration) and Byron Knight (criminal justice) earned bachelor's degrees this past spring. All three are pursuing master's degrees in the same fields.

SEASON OPENERS: In Larry Blakeney's 11 seasons at Troy State, the Trojans have won nine of their season openers, claiming nine in a row before losing at Nebraska a year ago.

During Blakeney's reign, the Trojans have played just two season openers at home, winning both. Troy State has played the other nine on the road, going 7-2.

OPENERS ON THE ROAD: The Trojans will play two straight on the road before playing at Memorial Stadium in 2002, the third consecutive season they have played two straight to open the year.

INAUGURAL AZALEA CITY CLASSIC SET: The Trojans will play Florida A&M on Nov. 16 in Mobile in the inaugural "Azalea City Classic."

While this will be the game's first year, the Trojans and Rattlers are familiar foes, having played three times in the last six years -- all in the I-AA postseason. The Trojans are 1-2 in those games, being eliminated from the postseason by the Rattlers with losses in 1998 and 2000.

The Trojans have played one other game at Mobile's Ladd-Peebles Stadium, blasting Alcorn State 30-0 in the 1997 seasonopener.

REED RANKED AMONG NATION'S BEST: Cornerback Rayshun Reed was listed as the 23rd best corner in the nation by the *Sporting News* in its preseason football edition.

TROJANS SIGN AGREEMENT WITH ADIDAS: The Troy State Athletics Department signed a three-year merchandising agreement with the Adidas during the off-season.

The athletic apparel company will provide uniforms, shoes and apparel for all of Troy State's athletic teams, a deal worth more than \$90,000 for Troy State. The Trojans will begin wearing Adidas shoes and uniforms this fall.

SKIPPER APPROACHING RECORDS: Senior wide receiver Heyward Skipper fell just five yards shy of becoming only the fifth receiver in school history to record 1,000 yards receiving in a season. In 2001, he will try to eclipse several school career marks.

The Baxley, Ga., native enters the 2002 season needing 1,426 yards to become the school's all-time leader in receiving yards. The school's single-season record for receiving yards is 1,169.

TSU VS. NEBRASKA - THE SEQUEL: One year ago, Troy State stepped into Memorial Stadium for its game against fourth ranked Nebraska, marking its first game at the Division I-A level.

With the game televised live on Fox SportsNet and being broadcast throughout the country, the Trojans caught the Cornhuskers' attention early when Demontray Carter scored on a 9yard run with 11:43 left in the first quarter to put TSU on top, 7-0. Nebraska came back to take a 28-14 lead at the end of the half before pulling out the 42-14 win.

That game launched the Trojans into their first I-A season. TSU finished the year 7-4, posting wins over Sun Belt Conference champion North Texas and Southeastern Conference foe Mississippi State in the process.

Nebraska and Troy State are not currently scheduled to meet again.

TROJANS SIGN PACT WITH ESPN TO TELEVISE

GAMES: The Troy State Athletics Department and ESPN have agreed to a three-year contract that will place the TSU football team on the network in selected games. ESPN will assume all broadcast rights to Troy State football during the contract, televising a minimum of four games in 2002.

The contract will put TSU under the ESPN-Plus umbrella, which means the network would have three options for each broadcast: Place it on ESPN or ESPN2, make it part of the ESPN Gameday package (a subscription-based service), or sell the rights to local networks as a syndicated broadcast.

Comcast Sports Southeast and has agreed to purchase the rights to all games and will carry the broadcasts. Channel 67 (UPN) will also air all of the broadcasts in Montgomery and Troy.

According to the agreement, Troy State would agree, if necessary, to play any of its games on Tuesday or Friday nights to be televised live on either ESPN or ESPN2.

FOOTBALL IN AUGUST? For the fifth time in school history, the Trojans will begin their season in August, when the Trojans face Nebraska on Aug. 31 in Lincoln. The last time the Trojans began their season in August was in 1997, when they defeated Alcorn State, 30-0, on Aug. 30. That game marked the earliest start in TSU history.

All four previous August openers have occurred during the Larry Blakeney era, with the Trojans winning three. The only loss came in 1991, in Blakeney's first game at Troy State, when the Trojans fell to Central Florida, 21-10.

NO REST STOPS ON THIS ROAD: With a 12-game regularseason schedule in 2001, including eight away from Memorial Stadium, the Trojans will travel many miles before the season ends. They will do it, however, without the benefit of an "Open" week. The last time the Trojans did not have an open date was in 1990, when TSU played 10 straight games, beginning on Sept. 1.

TROJANS AGAINST TOP 25 COMPETITION: In its first season of I-A football, Troy State faced three Top 25 opponents, losing all three games. The Trojans hold the honor of being the only team in the nation to face both defending national champion Miami and Nebraska in 2001, however, the teams that played for the national championship in the Rose Bowl.

The Trojans' other Top 25 opponent, Maryland, won the Atlantic Coast Conference and advanced to the Bowl Championship Series, falling to Florida in the Orange Bowl.

TROJANS TO GET MOUTHFUL OF BIG 12 AND SEC: The 2002 schedule gives the Trojans five games against teams from the Big 12 and Southeastern conferences. Last season, TSU played just two games against teams in those conferences, going 1-1.

After facing Nebraska in the opener, the Trojans take on Iowa State and Missouri, both on the road, in back-to-back weeks to round out their Big 12 schedule. With their Big 12 schedule behind them, the Trojans then face two SEC opponents in four weeks, traveling to Mississippi State on Oct. 12 and Arkansas on Nov. 2.

The Trojans are scheduled for one game against a team from the SEC in 2003 and 2004 and two in 2005. TSU has one game scheduled against a Big 12 school in 2004, when Missouri visits Memorial Stadium, and two in 2005, when Iowa State visits Troy and the Trojans make another trip to Missouri to complete a threeyear contract.

ON THIS DATE: While only four games have been played in August in TSU's history, three have occurred on Aug. 31. Troy State is 2-1 on Aug. 31, having won two straight. Here's a look at those games:

BLOW A LEAD? NOT THESE TROJANS: When Troy State leads going into the fourth quarter, don't expect the opponent to rally. The Trojans have won their last 35 games in which they hold the lead going into the fourth quarter.

The last time the Trojans lost a fourth-quarter lead was at Samford on Oct. 25, 1997. The Bulldogs rallied with two touchdowns in the fourth quarter to pull out a 25-14 win. During the Larry Blakeney era, the Trojans hold an 82-6-1 record in games in which they hold the lead going into the fourth quarter.

INJURY REPORT: Senior center Trent Garmon (shoulder) and junior cornerback Freeman White (knee) are both unlikely to return this season.

HOME SWEET HOME: Following the Trojans' wins over Southern Utah, the Trojans hold a 155-68-3 record at Memorial Stadium. They now have a 13-game home winning streak in the regular season. The longest home winning streak in school history is 17 from 1967 to 1971. Overall, the Trojans have won 14 of their last 16 at home, with both losses coming in postseason games.

In home openers, Troy State now holds a 28-6 record since 1968 and has won 15 straight. Head coach Larry Blakeney has never lost a home opener in 11 seasons. During his career, Blakeney holds a 52-7-1 record at Memorial Stadium.

TROY STATE PLAYING 82ND SEASON: Troy State is playing its 82nd season of college football at its fourth competitive division. Troy State has a 425-308-27 (.603 pct.) overall record. The Trojans come in with four straight winning seasons.

During Blakeney's 11 seasons as head coach, the Trojans have had a losing record just twice.

Here are some other tidbits about Trojan history:

- Troy State has won three national championships in its history. TSU claimed the 1968 NAIA title and won the Division II title twice, in 1984 and 1987.

- This is the fourth level of competitive football for Troy State. The Trojans participated as an NAIA member until 1972. TSU then joined NCAA Division II ranks. The Trojans remained there until 1992, when they made the move to the Division I-AA level.

- The Trojans have claimed 15 conference championships in their history. TSU claimed the Alabama Collegiate Conference crown six times (1939, 1941, 1942, 1967, 1968, 1969), the Gulf South Conference title six times (1971, 1973, 1976, 1984, 1986, 1987) and the Southland Football League title three times (1996, 1999, 2000).

- Troy State has advanced to postseason play 11 times, including seven times under Blakeney. TSU appeared in the NAIA playoffs in 1968, the Division II playoffs in 1984, 1986 and 1987 and the I-AA playoffs seven times, 1993-1996 and 1998-2000.

TRAVELING THE ROADWAYS: This season, the Trojans will travel 4,754 miles to play eight games on the road. Their longest trip will be to face Nebraska in the season-opener, a whopping 1,082 miles from Troy. The second-longest trip will be to Ames, Iowa, to face Iowa State just three weeks later.

TROJAN TIDBITS

BUMPS IN THE ROAD: The Trojans have found life on the road somewhat difficult of late, losing six of their last 11 away from home. The Trojans are 46-24 on the road during Blakeney's career. The Trojans were just 2-4 on the road in 2001 ... SHUTOUT STREAK: Troy State enters this week's game having scored in 221 consecutive games (204 regular-season). The last team to shut out TSU was Mississippi College in the fifth game of the 1983 season. During the streak, the Trojans have scored less than 10 points only 12 times. The fewest points the Trojans have scored in a game during the streak is three, which has happened three times. The NCAA record for most consecutive games without being shut out is held by Brigham Young, a streak which started in 1975 and is at 335 games ... NEW UNIFORMS: The Trojans are sporting new uniforms for the second consecutive season, both home and away. An agreement with Adidas made the purchase of new uniforms possible. The team also purchased a full set of practice uniforms during the summer, the first such purchase in more than five years ... FLIGHT TIME: This year's five flight trips will be the most in school history, nearly doubling the previous single-season high (three) ... ON TV: All-time, the Trojans are 26-15 on television. They snapped a five-game losing streak on the tube against Jacksonville State on Nov. 17, 2001. Since moving to full-time Division I-AA status in 1993, the Trojans have been televised 37 times and are 24-13 during that stretch. The team has been televised regionally 26 times in the last three seasons, posting a record of 18-8. They are 18-5 all-time in games televised at Richard M. Scrushy Field. The Trojans have lost six straight televised games on the road, including their games at Nebraska, Middle Tennessee, Miami and Maryland last season. All-time on FOX Sports Net, the Trojans are 4-2 and had won three straight games on the network before last season's loss at Nebraska. On Comcast-Charter Sports Southeast, the Trojans are 3-1 alltime. On ESPN-Plus, the Trojans are 0-2. The game televised by Comcast Sports Net against Maryland in 2001 was the team's first appearance on that network ... PERFECT 10, OR LESS: During the Larry Blakeney era, Troy State has held its opponents to under 10 points 31 times, winning all but one. TSU shut out Nicholls State, 26-0, in 2001, and then upset Mississippi State, 21-9. The only loss by the Trojans when allowing less than 10 points came against Liberty when Troy State lost 9-7 in 1992. Since then, Troy State has rattled off 29 straight wins when holding its opponent to less than 10 ... IT'S BEEN A WHILE SINCE 1,000: The last time TSU had a 1,000-yard receiver was in 1970 when Vince Green caught 60 balls for 1,030 yards. He also had 10 touchdowns.
