### Extra Points

► Kansas and Nebraska have met 109 previous times and have played 97 consecutive years since 1906, making KU-NU the second-longest current uninterrupted series in college football.

---

► NU leads the series 85-21-3, including a 45-6-1 mark while playing in Lawrence. The Cornhuskers have won 34 consecutive games in the series. KU's last win in Lawrence came in 1967 - a 10-0 victory.

---

► Freshman quarterback Adam Barmann had 294 yards passing last week against Texas A&M -- the highest total by a freshman signal-caller in KU history.

---

► Barmann tied a school record after being responsible for five touchdowns in the game against the Aggies. The Weston, Mo., native threw for four scores and ran for another in his collegiate debut.

---

► Clark Green, Charles Gordon and Mark Simmons have each caught at least one pass in all nine of KU's games this season.

---

► Fourteen different players have started all nine games this season for the Jayhawks (six offensive players, eight defensive players).

---

► Freshman wide receiver Charles Gordon hauled in nine catches against Texas A&M last week breaking Harrison Hill's rookie record of eight catches in a contest set in 1998.

**Scene Setter**

The University of Kansas (5-4, 2-3 Big 12) football team looks to snap its two-game losing streak when the No. 16 Nebraska Cornhuskers visit Lawrence for a 2:30 p.m. kickoff on Saturday. The Jayhawks were defeated 45-33 last week at Texas A&M despite a valiant effort from freshman quarterback Adam Barmann who passed for 294 yards and four touchdowns in his collegiate debut. Barmann, who also ran for 45 yards against the Aggies, posted 339 yards of total offense -- the most ever in a single game by a KU freshman.

Rookie wide receiver Charles Gordon is also coming off an outstanding effort that saw him catch a career-best nine passes against the Aggies. Gordon, who had a team-leading 89 yards receiving in the contest, now has 505 yards receiving this season -- the best total by a freshman in school history.

Nebraska (7-2, 3-2 Big 12) enters the contest against the Jayhawks on the heels of a 31-7 road loss to Texas. The Cornhuskers are 1-2 away from Lincoln this season, but NU has won the last 34 meetings against Kansas overall and has not lost in Lawrence since 1967.

**The Coaches**



KU head coach Mark Mangino is in his second season as head coach of the Jayhawks and holds an overall record of 7-14 (.333) during his two-year career in Lawrence. Mangino, who was a driving force in the successful turn-around of two Big 12 Conference football programs over the last 12 years, came to KU after working three seasons as assistant head coach/offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at the University of Oklahoma. Mangino, the 35th coach in KU history, had an impressive record during his 11-year career as an assistant coach at both Kansas State and Oklahoma. Overall, Kansas State and Oklahoma were a combined 101-30-1 and were ranked in the top 25 nationally in eight of the 11 seasons during Mangino's involvement on the staffs.

Nebraska is coached by Frank Solich, who holds a 56-18 record in his sixth year of guiding the Cornhuskers. Solich is no stranger to the NU program as he has been a member of the coaching staff in Lincoln for the last 25 years, which includes a 15-year stint as the team's running backs coach (1983-97).

**A Quick Look At Nebraska**

No. 16 Nebraska (7-2, 3-2 Big 12) enters the game against Kansas after falling 31-7 to Texas last weekend in Austin, Texas. The Cornhuskers bolted to a perfect 5-0 mark to start the season, but have been defeated twice in their last four contests with losses to Missouri and Texas. Senior quarterback Jammal Lord directs the NU offense as he averages a team-leading 69.8 yards rushing and 87.9 yards passing per contest. Last season, Lord accounted for a school-record 2,774 yards of total offense and was an honorable-mention All-Big 12 selection. I-backs Josh Davis (59.3 ypg) and David Horne (47.1 ypg) also see significant action out of the backfield. Defensively, the Cornhuskers are holding their opponents to just 125.9 rushing yards per game and have not allowed a third quar-

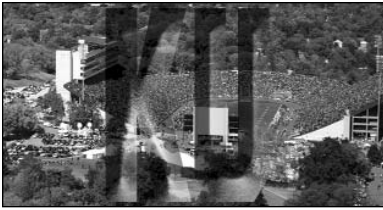

ter touchdown this season. Junior linebacker Barrett Ruud (95 total tackles) and senior linebacker Demorrio Williams (83 total tackles) are NU's top two defensive players.

**Kansas – Nebraska Ties**

- ▶ Dave Gillespie, NU's assistant athletics director for football, coached at Kansas from 1994-97 and served as an assistant coach and administrative assistant while on the KU staff.
- ▶ Jayhawk head football trainer Carol Jarosky came to KU nine years ago from the University of Nebraska where she was a graduate assistant for two years and assistant athletics trainer for one season.
- ▶ KU director of video services Mike Lickert spent two years as video production specialist at Nebraska. Kansas assistant athletics director/facilities Brad Nachtigal also served on the athletic department staff at NU prior to his appointment at KU.
- ▶ Carl Pelini, Nebraska graduate assistant coach, took much the same path in coaching as KU head coach Mark Mangino. Pelini played at Youngstown State for two seasons and then went on to coach at Kansas State. He was later a defensive coordinator at Blue Valley High School in Overland Park, Kan.
- ▶ Peter Atha, a sophomore linebacker, is the lone Kansas native on NU roster.

**Scoring At A Record Pace**

After scoring a total of 248 points in 12 games last season, the Jayhawks have already accumulated 299 total points through nine games this year. The 2003 average of 33.2 points per game would rank second behind the 1968 school record 34.5 points per contest (380 points in 11 games). KU has averaged 30 or more points in a season just three times in school history (34.5 in 1968, 31.8 in 1992 and 31.6 in 1951).

**What A Debut**



Freshman quarterback Adam Barmann proved the Jayhawks can still move the football, even without the services of starting QB Bill Whittemore. In his first career game, the 18-year old Barmann completed 25-of-37 pass attempts against Texas A&M for a KU freshman record 294 yards. He also carried the ball 15 times for 45 yards, giving him 339 yards of total offense -- the best single-game total ever by a KU freshman.

"Absolutely unbelievable," said KU head coach Mark Mangino after the game. "To think this was his first start, in College Station, Texas, in one of the best venues and most hostile venues in college football, to perform like that is just unbelievable."

**KU Running Backs Paving The Way**

Led by sophomore running back Clark Green and freshman tailback John Randle, the Jayhawk running game continues to make waves. Green leads the team with an average of 79.4 rushing yards per game and averages 4.9 yards per carry. However, the young Randle continues to improve and boasts a team-best 6.2 yards per carry. He rushed the ball five times for 51 yards against Texas A&M last week for an average of 10.2 yards per carry. The team has rushed for 11 touchdowns over its last five games, after running the ball into the endzone just five times in its first four contests. Green (4) and Randle (2) have combined for six of KU's 10 rushing TDs over the last five con-

tests and both recorded their first career receiving TDs in KU's game against Texas A&M on Nov. 1. Kansas had five rushing touchdowns against Missouri on Sept. 27, marking the most rushing TDs by the 'Hawks in a Big 12 game since the team ran across the goal line six times against Baylor on Nov. 6, 1999 -- a string of 26 games.

### **Added Pressure**

After not recording a quarterback sack in either of the first two games of the season, the KU defense is putting more pressure on opposing quarterbacks. KU's seven sacks against Baylor on Oct. 18 represented the most by Kansas against a Big 12 team since Oct. 5, 2002 when the team recorded seven against Baylor. Against Missouri, the 'Hawks sacked Heisman candidate Brad Smith three times while forcing several hurried pass attempts. KU's first sack of the season went to sophomore linebacker Brandon Perkins who hit Wyoming quarterback Casey Bramlet forcing the signal caller to drop the ball. KU's David McMillan scooped up the fumble and returned it 53 yards for a touchdown.

### **On The Horizon**

Following Saturday's contest against Nebraska, the Jayhawks play their final road game of the regular-season on Nov. 15 when the team travels to Oklahoma State. KU's plays its final home game of the year on Nov. 22 when Iowa State visits Memorial Stadium.

### **One Of The Best**

As a punt return man, freshman Charles Gordon's 14.2 yard average is tied for second-best in school history since 1963 when the legendary Gale Sayers averaged 26.0 yards on his five punt returns. However, no player in KU history with at least 20 punt returns in a season has a better average than Gordon.

### **Whittemore Injured At KSU**



Senior quarterback Bill Whittemore, who was knocked out of the game late in the first quarter against Kansas State on Oct. 25, was having one of the finest seasons by a Jayhawk signal-caller in recent memory. The 2002 Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year threw for a career-best 422 yards against Colorado on Oct. 11 which ranks as the second-most prolific passing game in school history (Mike Norseth passed for 480 yards against Vanderbilt in 1980). Whittemore, who had 11 TD passes in nine games last year, had tied the single-season school record with 15 touchdown strikes this year (David Jaynes, 1972 and Mike Norseth, 1985). Prior to leaving the game against Kansas State, he had thrown for at least two touchdowns in nine of his last 12 games.

### **Rideau Shines**

Junior wide receiver Brandon Rideau is playing the best football of his career. Last week against Texas A&M, the Beaumont, Texas native recorded his first career multiple touchdown game when he hauled in a pair of fourth quarter scores. Rideau has five TDs this season and needs just one more to tie Dwayne Chandler (six TDs in 1992) for most receiving scores by a KU junior.

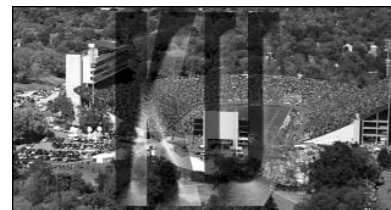
### **Gordon Makes Freshman History**



Redshirt freshman Charles Gordon continues to impress the KU coaches as both a wide receiver and a punt returner. He set a KU freshman record by hauling in nine catches in the game against Texas A&M on Nov. 1. In addition, his 505 receiving yards this season are the most-ever by a KU freshman. Through nine games this year, he is third on the team in yards per catch (14.4) and is second in receiving yards (505).

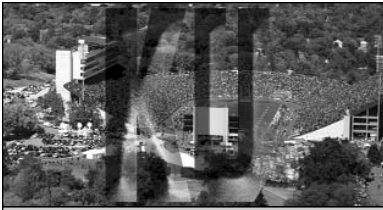

he ran for two scores and this past week at Kansas State when he was forced to the sidelines in the first quarter because of an injury ... Fourteen different Jayhawks have started every game this season ... Since 1999, the Jayhawks are 16-7 when scoring 21 or more points including the team's 45-33 loss to Texas A&M on Nov. 1 ... Kansas has forced at least one turnover in 28 of its last 32 games ... Since 1995, KU is 22-8 when a Jayhawk player rushes for over 100 yards in a game ... After going 0-for-2 in the red zone against Northwestern in the first game of the season, Kansas has scored on 30 of its last 37 trips (81.1%) to the red zone (24 TDs, 6 FGs).

### Heaggans Sets Return Record

In just his second year as KU's kickoff return man, sophomore Greg Heaggans has already become the school's all-time leader in career kickoff return yardage. Heaggans' 28-yard return in the first quarter against Kansas State on Oct. 25 gave him 1,083 kickoff return yards and moved him ahead of Maurice Douglass who had 1,077 return yards from 1998-99. After 139 return yards against Texas A&M last week, Heaggans two-year total now reads 1,244 yards. Heaggans now owns the top two single-season kickoff return totals in school history (691 yards in 2002 and 553 yards in 2003).

### All He Does...



Sophomore wide receiver Mark Simmons has caught a touchdown in six of KU's nine games this season after crossing the goal line just once in 2002. His career-best 152-yard performance against Colorado on Oct. 11 ranks among the top-20 single-game receiving efforts in school history. Simmons currently leads the team with 682 receiving yards and an average of 22.7 yards per catch. Simmons is KU's biggest threat to go deep as he has touchdown receptions of 74, 70 and 65 yards this season. His next touchdown this year will tie him with Bruce Adams who set a KU sophomore record by hauling in seven TDs in 1973.

### Ansel Candidate For Ray Guy Award

Senior punter Curtis Ansel was named to the 2003 Ray Guy Award watch list, the Greater Augusta Sports Council announced on August 28. Ansel, a native of Lakin, Kan., is one of 32 college football punters named to the list as potential candidates for the top collegiate punter of the year. Ansel, who was one of 10 semifinalists for the award last season, holds the Big 12 record for longest punt (83 yards) and averaged a career-high 42.2 yards per punt in 2002. This season, Ansel has punted 30 times for an average of 40.9 yards per kick and has pinned the opponents inside their 20 yard line on 10 different occasions.

### KU's Do-It-All Man



Not only was he the team's leading rusher a year ago, sophomore tailback Clark Green showed he could be an effective receiver out of the backfield. After not hauling in a pass in KU's first game of the year at Iowa State in 2002, the Tampa, Fla., native has recorded at least one catch in each of KU's 20 games since. Green posted his third 100-yard rushing game of the 2003 season on Oct. 11 against Colorado as he carried the ball 17 times for 103 yards. Green had two 100-yard rushing games as a freshman and posted a career-best 160-yard effort in the team's final game of 2002 against Oklahoma State. This season, Green is the team leader in rushing yards (715) and trails just one player with his 31 receptions (WR Charles Gordon has 35).

### Defensive Leaders

The Jayhawk linebackers appear young on paper, but in reality, are a strong group on the defensive side of the ball. The position is loaded with a nice blend of talent, experience and depth. All three starters (OLB Nick Reid, MLB Gabriel Toomey, OLB Banks Floodman) are sophomores and all three have been impressive at the position. Reid, who came to KU as a quarterback, permanently switched to the defensive side of the ball because of his outstanding play on special teams. He finished the 2002 season fourth on the team with 62 tackles while leading the club with six sacks. This year, Reid currently leads the team with 103 tackles after a collecting 12 against Texas A&M.

Floodman, a KU captain, played in all 11 games and made two starts as a true freshman in 2001. In the first half of KU's 2002 season-opener at Iowa State, the Wichita, Kan., native was having a career day (eight tackles, one sack, one QBH) when a knee injury forced him to the sidelines for the remainder of the year. His 15-yard interception return against Baylor on Oct. 18 marked the first of his career and sealed KU's 28-21 win over the Bears. Currently, Floodman is third on the team with 74 tackles.

Toomey, a sophomore transfer from Iowa Central CC, originally signed with Oklahoma but left Norman after a redshirt season. Last year, Toomey was named an NJCAA All-American and was also the Iowa Community College Conference defensive player of the year. Toomey is second on the team with 97 tackles and eight TFLs this year. Waiting in the wings are several talented sophomores including Darren Rus, Brandon Perkins (team-leader

with six quarterback sacks) and Kevin Kane who all receive playing time in backup roles.

### Lamb Taking Charge

Freshman free safety Jonathan Lamb is quietly having a fine season after making the team this past spring as a walk-on. Lamb is currently fifth on the club with 66 tackles and is coming off one of his most impressive performances as a Jayhawk. The Olathe, Kan., product had a career-high nine tackles against Texas A&M and also recorded his first career interception. Lamb has started all nine games this season in the Jayhawk secondary.

### Whittemore Candidate For Davey O'Brien Award

Jayhawk senior Bill Whittemore is one of 40+ candidates for the Davey O'Brien Award given annually to the nation's top quarterback. The O'Brien Award is the oldest and most prestigious award in the country for college quarterbacks and is named in honor of the late Davey O'Brien who was an All-American and Heisman Trophy winning quarterback at TCU in the 1930s.

Other Big 12 quarterbacks on the watch list include Josh Fields (OSU), Jammal Lord (NU), Ell Roberson (KSU) and Brad Smith (MU). Semifinalists for the award will be announced in early November.

### Defense Helping Out

The Kansas defensive unit has forced a turnover in eight of nine games this season and, in three of the team's contests, the Jayhawk "D" has scored a defensive touchdown. Junior defensive end David McMillan, who leads the team with a pair of defensive TDs, returned an errant Northwestern pass 31 yards for a score in KU's first game of the season and also returned a fumble 57 yards for a touchdown against Wyoming. Linebacker Gabriel Toomey turned the trick with a 29-yard interception return against UNLV on Sept. 6. The KU defense, which has two INT returns for touchdowns this year, did not have a single interception return for a touchdown last season.

### Did You Know?

The Jayhawks are playing 12 regular-season games in back-to-back seasons for the first time in school history. The 2003 season marks just the fifth time in school history that Kansas will play 12 regular-season contests. KU also played 12 regular-season games in 2002, 1999, 1993 and 1985.

### All In The Family

Three sets of brothers are currently listed on the Jayhawk roster, including Greg and Gary Heaggans, Josh and Cullen Homolka and identical twins Donnie and Ronnie Amadi. In addition, defensive tackle Travis Watkins and fullback Brandon Watkins are cousins.

### Tough Competition

Four of KU's final five games this season will be against teams that appeared in bowl games last year-- Kansas State (Holiday Bowl), Nebraska (Independence Bowl), Oklahoma State (Houston Bowl) and Iowa State (Humanitarian Bowl).

### Kansas Captains

At the conclusion of spring practice this past April, the Jayhawks named five team captains (two offense, two defense, one special teams) for the 2003 season.

Earning the honors this year were quarterback Bill Whittemore, offensive lineman Adrian Jones, linebacker Banks Floodman, defensive lineman Travis Watkins and safety Zach Dyer.

### Career Record Chasers

#### QB Bill Whittemore

Whittemore, last year's Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year, moved into third-place all-time at KU for career touchdown passes after throwing two against Baylor on Oct. 18. Earlier this season, the Brentwood, Tenn., native also moved into the top 10 in the KU record books in several other categories including career attempts, career completions and TD runs by a quarterback.

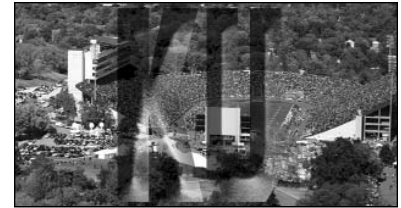

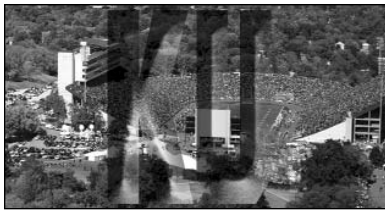

### **Jacksonville State (Sept. 20)**

- ▶ Mark Simmons' 65-yard touchdown in the first quarter marked his third TD catch of 65+ yards this year.
- ▶ Whittemore tied Dylon Smith for sixth place on the KU career touchdown passes chart (22).
- ▶ Whittemore's first qtr. (2 rushing TDs/2 passing TDs) performance was the first time at KU that a player was responsible for four TDs in a one qtr.

One ratings point equals about 8,750 households, meaning the MU-KU game was seen in about 67,375 Kansas City households.
- ▶ The sell-out crowd of 50,071 at Memorial Stadium was the largest to ever watch a KU-MU game in Lawrence.
- ▶ The 35-14 victory over Missouri was KU's fourth straight win of the season, marking the first time since 1995 that KU has reeled off four consecutive "W's".
- ▶ With the win, KU untied the all-time series record against MU and now leads 52-51-9.

### **Colorado (Oct. 11)**

- ▶ Sophomore receiver Mark Simmons carded career highs with six receptions and 152 yards to lead both teams in receiving yardage.
- ▶ Quarterback Bill Whittemore moved to third-place in school history on the list of career touchdown producers. He's run or passed for 42 TDs, six behind Chip Hilleary (1989-92) and one behind June Henley (1993-96).
- ▶ Whittemore's career-best 422 passing yards rank second all-time in a single game.
