#### **Cowboys Travel to Nebraska for 2003 Opener**

Oklahoma State heads north for its 2003 season opener as the Cowboys travel to Lincoln for a date with Nebraska. Kickoff at Memorial Stadium in Lincoln is set for 2:30 p.m. (CDT), in a game that will be televised nationally on ABC. It's the fourth straight year the Cowboys have opened away from home and the second time since 1995 O-State has opened against the Cornhuskers.

#### The 102nd Opener

Saturday's game between Oklahoma State and Nebraska will mark the beginning of the 102nd season of Oklahoma State football. It will be the third season opener in the head coaching career of Les Miles, and will be the first time OSU has ever opened a season in the state of Nebraska. Oklahoma State is 58-38-5 all-time in season openers and has won four of the last six times it has opened a season on the road. The Cowboys will, however, be trying to snap a two-game opening day losing streak. The Pokes lost at Southern Miss, 17-9, in 2001 and at Shreveport against Louisiana Tech, 39-36, in 2002.

#### **OSU-Nebraska on TV/Radio**

Saturday's season opener at Lincoln will be broadcast to a national television audience by ABC. It's the second time in three years an OSU opener has been nationally televised (the 2001 opener at Southern MIss was on ESPN), but the first time ever the Cowboys have appeared in a national telecast on ABC in a season opener. The on-air talent for Saturday's game in Lincoln will be Brad Nessler, Bob Griese and Lynn Swann. It will be OSU's 18th all-time appearance on ABC, and the first since Sept. 30, 2000, when the network televised the Cowboys' game at Texas. Saturday's game will also be broadcast live on the Cowboy Radio Network with Dave Hunziker, Tom Dirato and Robert Allen describing the action.

#### **Lots of Orange**

Oklahoma State fans will roll into Lincoln by the thousands for the season opener. The Athletic Ticket Office reports that all 4,000 tickets allotted to Cowboy fans have been sold. OSU has also sold its entire allotment of tickets for the Nov. 1 game against Oklahoma at Norman.

#### **August Openers**

Oklahoma State had never opened a football season in August until 1995, but it has now become almost commonplace. The 2003 opener on Aug. 30 marks the fifth time since 1995 the Cowboys have played a regular season game before Sept. 1. By the way, OSU is 2-2 in August openers, defeating Southwest Missouri State in '96 and Iowa State in '97 while losing to Nebraska in '95 and Louisiana Tech in '02.

## Season Opener, Conference Opener

Saturday's game at Nebraska is not only the season opener for the Cowboys, it is also the Big 12 opener for both teams. It's just the fifth time since 1961 the Cowboys have opened their schedule against a conference opponent. OSU opened the '61 season at Iowa State (both members of the Big Eight Conference), and didn't open with a league game again until 1995 when Nebraska came to Stillwater. The Pokes opened the '97 season at Iowa State and the '98 season at Kansas. OSU is 2-0 in season openers on the road against Big 12 opposition.

## Significant Opener(s)

The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines the word significant as "having meaning." That certainly describes the 2003 season opener between Oklahoma State and Nebraska. It could be the most significant season opener for OSU in nearly two decades. The Cowboys ride into 2003 on the heals of an 8-5 campaign in 2002 that was topped with a Houston Bowl win last December. Oklahoma State finished the season by winning four straight and six of its last seven. In terms of significance, this week's opener ranks near the top. Following are brief recaps of just a few of the other significant openers in OSU gridiron history.

**1997** — **Oklahoma State at Iowa State** — Bob Simmons' third Oklahoma State team had high preseason expectations but a demanding schedule that would open on the road against a talented Iowa State squad. A 21-14 win at Ames was certainly significant because the Cowboys used it to springboard to six straight wins, an OSU first since 1945. After a 33-29 win over Colorado on Lewis Field on Oct. 11, OSU found itself ranked 12th in the country and on its way to an 8-4 record and Alamo Bowl berth opposite Purdue.

**1985** — No. 16 Oklahoma State at No. 12 Washington — The last time Oklahoma State went into an opener with a preseason national ranking. OSU was coming off a 10-2 season in 1984 and Gator Bowl win over South Carolina. The 1985 season opener pitted the Cowboys against a Washington team picked by most to win the Pac-10 and compete for a national title. OSU rolled into Seattle and came away with a dominating 31-17 win over the Huskies. The Cowboys used the win at Washington to jump out to a 4-0 start, climb to No. 6 in the polls and glide to a second straight Gator Bowl appearance.

**1984** — **Oklahoma State at No. 12 Arizona State** — Just three months after Jimmy Johnson left OSU for Miami and the mandate went to Pat Jones to take over the Cowboys program, OSU prepared for a daunting opener at Tempe against a team picked by some to win the national championship. On a hot September night in the desert, Oklahoma State picked Arizona State apart by a 45-3 margin. It was a game that set the tone for one of the most successful five-year runs in OSU football history. The '84 Cowboys finished 10-2 and ranked seventh in the final AP poll.

**1976** — **Oklahoma State vs. Tulsa** — Three straight winning seasons had brought only one bowl appearance to Jim Stanley and his Oklahoma State Cowboys. After a 7-4 finish in 1975 and back-to-back Big Eight wins over Kansas State and Iowa State to finish the season, the Cowboys faced a season opener against in-state rival Tulsa. It was the renewal of a series that had been dormant for 10 years. Oklahoma State posted a convincing 33-21 win over Tulsa and went on to an 8-3 regular season and Tangerine Bowl slot against BYU.

**1945** — **Oklahoma State at Arkansas** — How do you follow an 8-1, Cotton Bowl championship season? That was the question being asked of the 1945 Aggies as they prepared to open their season at Arkansas. The year before, the Cowboys rolled to seven wins during an eight game regular season and put an exclamation mark on the season with a 34-0 win over TCU in the Cotton Bowl. The questions of the '45 Pokes were answered with a 19-14 win over the Razorbacks. That win set the scene for a 9-0 season, Sugar Bowl win over St. Mary's and a No. 5 final AP ranking.

## **OSU Travel Plans**

Oklahoma State's travel party will depart for Lincoln early Friday afternoon via air charter. The Cowboys will arrive in Lincoln, bus to Memorial Stadium for a light workout, then bus to Omaha. Oklahoma State's Friday workout in Lincoln is closed, but head coach Les Miles will be available briefly just prior to that workout.

#### Going in on a Roll

Oklahoma State goes into the 2003 season with nearly unprecedented momentum. OSU finished the 2002 season one of the hottest teams in college football, and that strong finish has certainly driven preseason attention in 2003. The Cowboys head into the new year after winning the final four games of the 2002 season and six of the last seven a year ago. The last time Oklahoma State finished a season that strongly was 1988 when the Cowboys fashioned an identical 6-1 mark over the final seven games.

#### **Finishes and Followups**

Three times since 1945 Oklahoma State has finished a season with six wins in their final seven games. In 1988, OSU finished the season with a Holiday Bowl win over Wyoming, but opened the 1989 season with a 20-10 loss at Tulsa. After the Cowboys finished the 1976 season with a Tangerine Bowl win over BYU, the Cowboys opened the '77 season with a 34-17 win over Tulsa.

#### The Rankings

Oklahoma State will go into Saturday's opener against Nebraska ranked No. 24 in both major Top 25 polls. The Cowboys finished just out of the polls at the end of last year after fashioning an 8-5 record and winning the Houston Bowl. It is the first time since 1985 the Cowboys have gone into a season opener ranked in one of the major polls. OSU was a regular in the polls in 1997, climbing as high as 12th in late October. The Pokes appeared in the polls seven straight weeks in 1997. OSU's most consistent string of poll appearances in recent history was 1987 and 1988 when the Cowboys were ranked 19 of 21 weeks, and 1984 and '85 when the Cowboys were ranked 23 straight weeks.

#### **More Poll Numbers**

Since 1972, Oklahoma State has found itself in the national rankings 69 weeks. Since 1945, the Cowboys have finished the season ranked in a major poll eight times. The Cowboys were fifth in 1945 (AP), 19th in 1958 (AP), 14th in 1976 (AP), 18th in 1983 (UPI), 7th in 1984 (AP), 11th in 1987 (AP), 11th in 1988 (AP) and 24th in 1997 (USA Today/ESPN).

#### What's New in 2003?

The simple answer is not a whole lot. Oklahoma State's coaching staff returns intact from 2002. In fact, in the first three years of the Les Miles era at OSU, there have been only three changes among the full-time members of his coaching staff. The Cowboys do have a new strength and conditioning coordinator. Gary Calcagno took over those duties on an interim basis during the summer. The Cowboys will wear the same basic uniform as last year with orange jerseys and white pants at home and white jerseys and white pants on the road.

Oklahoma Štate's 2003 season opener is on the road, nothing new for the Cowboys. Since 1984, Oklahoma State has opened on the road 11 times, compared to only six openers at home. The Cowboys have won seven of those 11 season openers on the road dating back to 1984. Oklahoma State hasn't opened a season at home since 1999, when the Pokes defeated Louisiana-Lafayette, 24-7.

## **Opening Day Notes**

While this is the first time Oklahoma State has ever opened a season at Nebraska, it is the second time the Cowboys have opened with the Cornhuskers. Nebraska came to Stillwater in the 1995 season opener, and the second-ranked Huskers won going away in Bob Simmons' first game as OSU's head coach ... Recent history may provide a positive omen for the Cowboys. Each of OSU's last five head coaches who had three or more seasons in Stillwater won the season opener in their third season. Floyd Gass, Jim Stanley, Jimmy Johnson, Pat Jones and Bob Simmons each opened their third OSU seasons with victories ... The most points OSU has ever scored in a season opener was an amazing 134 in 1914 against Phillips. The most an opening day opponent has ever scored on the Cowboys came in '95 when Nebraska put 64 on the Lewis Field scoreboard ... Oklahoma State has posted 17 opening day shutouts, the last coming in 1975 when the Cowboys blanked Wichita State, 34-0 ... OSU and its opening-day opponents have played to three scoreless ties ... Oklahoma State's 2004 season opener is scheduled to be in Los Angeles against UCLA.

## They're Back

No fewer than eight starters return from OSU's Houston Bowl championship team of 2002, including three of the most exciting offensive players in the country. All-American and Heisman Trophy candidate Rashaun Woods tops the list of offensive returners. Woods returns for his senior season owning nearly every receiving record in OSU and Big 12 history. He should quickly become the all-time leading receiver at OSU, eclipsing Hart Lee Dykes' career numbers. Quarterback Josh Fields, who became the first OSU quarterback to pass for 3,000 or more yards, is also back, and tailback Tatum Bell, who registered a 1,000-yard rushing season in 2002, returns to anchor the backfield. Across the front, the Cowboys appear veteran and solid. Sam Mayes, Ben Buie and Chris Akin return to their starting spots, while Matt Hardison and Kellen Davis join Doug Koenig, Corey Curtis, Kurt Seifried, Corey Hilliard and Caleb Noble to give the Cowboys depth and talent. Billy Bajema and Charlie Johnson return to give the Cowboys a talented one-two punch at tight end, and the rest of the receiving corps looks solid with D'Juan Woods, Kenneth Williams, Gabe Lindsay and Errick McCown.

## Radio Affiliates for 2003 Cowboy Football Network

Every game of the 2003 Cowboy Football season can be heard throughout the state of Oklahoma on the Cowboy Radio Network. OSU Football will cover the state like a blanket when 28 stations join the Network, from Altus to Bartlesville, from Guymon to Idabel. ## **Rashaun Woods ... Simply the Best**

The best wide receiver in college football returns to Oklahoma State for his senior season. Rashaun Woods established virtually every OSU receiving record a year ago, and the two main records he doesn't have should fall in his lap early in 2003. Rashaun's 2002 numbers were incredible. In 13 games, he caught 107 passes for 1,695 yards and 17 touchdowns. He averaged 15.8 yards per catch, 130.4 yards per game and 8.2 receptions per game. He holds OSU records for season receiving yards (1,695), season receptions (107), career receptions (216) and game receiving yards (226). He needs three touchdowns to move past Hart Lee Dykes' current career mark of 29, and needs 126 yards to become OSU's all-time leading receiver, moving past Dykes' career mark of 3,171.

#### **Honors and More Honors**

After the 2002 season, Rashaun Woods became Oklahoma State's first consensus All-American since Alonzo Mayes in 1997. Heading into the 2003 season, Woods has been recognized on most preseason All-America teams, is on most Heisman watch list, and should be considered a favorite for the Biletnikoff Award, given annually to the nation's top collegiate receiver. Just this week, ESPN the Magazine listed Rashaun Woods fourth on their list of top 100 players in the country. Coming off a season in which he was named All-America by Walter Camp, Football News, Sporting News and CNN/SI, the sky could be the limit for Rashaun Woods in 2003. There is a complete rundown of Woods' OSU career elsewhere in this release.

## **Fields on Record Setting Pace**

Junior quarterback Josh Fields is entering his second season as Oklahoma State's starting signal caller, and is on a pace that could put him at the top of most OSU passing records. A year ago, Fields put together the most impressive season ever by a Cowboy quarterback. In 13 games, Fields completed 226-of-408 passing attempts for 3,145 yards and 31 touchdowns. He completed 55.4 percent of his passes while averaging 241.9 yards per game. He's the top returning quarterback in the Big 12, and his touchdown percentage last year (7.6) was second nationally to Iowa's Brad Banks (8.8).

## **Fields in the Record Book**

Going into his junior season, Josh Fields already owns the OSU record for single season passing, and has taken aim at the all-time career passing leaders at OSU. His 3,145 yards a year ago was 942 yards more than the previous record of 2,203 yards owned by his current position coach Mike Gundy. Going into the season opener at Nebraska, Fields is sixth on the all-

#### **Hot Down the Stretch**

While Fields' entire season was phenomenal, his last four games were extraordinary. In season-ending victories over Kansas, Baylor, Oklahoma and Southern Miss, Fields completed 66-of-110 passes for 1,264 yards and 16 touchdowns. During that four-game stretch, he threw just one interception. That's a four-game average of 316 yards per game, and a 60 percent completion ratio.

#### **Bell Looks for Another Banner Year**

Tailback Tatum Bell used the 2002 season to emerge as one of the top tailbacks in the Big 12 Conference. He became OSU's first 1,000-yard rusher since David Thompson in 1996. Bell's 1,096 yards a year ago represented the 10th-best single-season rushing effort in OSU history, and moved him into the all-time top-10 among OSU rushers. He will go into the 2003 season with 2,123 career yards and ranked 10th on that list. He needs 1,406 yards in 2003 to move into the top five.

#### As a Team

With the key components all returning, Oklahoma State will look to match or improve on 2002 numbers that ranked among all-time bests. Oklahoma State's 2002 offense set a school record for passing, averaging 262.6 yards per game. The Cowboys' total offense average of 411.1 was the fourth-best average in school history.

## **Cowboys Return Talent and Depth**

While a lot of preseason talk has focused on how Oklahoma State will replace departed starters Kevin Williams and LaWaylon Brown, the Cowboys defense has gone about their business in preseason camp with a definite purpose. OSU's defense has talent and depth at every position, and should be better across the board in 2003. Returning defensive starters include Greg Richmond, Antonio Smith and Khreem Smith at the ends, Paul Duren and Lawrence Pinson at linebacker and Darrent Williams, Elbert Craig and Vernon Grant in the secondary.

#### Duren, Craig Return as Top Two Tacklers

Oklahoma State's top two tacklers from 2002 return for the 2003 season. Linebacker Paul Duren led the team a year ago with 84 total tackles. Of his 84 tackles, 52 were unassisted. Duren was especially strong in late-season games against Baylor and Oklahoma. In OSU's win over Baylor, Duren had a season-high 12 tackles. He followed that with an 11 tackle performance in OSU's 38-28 win over Oklahoma. Craig was OSU's secondleading tackler with 83 total, 54 of which were solo stops. Craig had double-digit tackles performances against UCLA (11) and Nebraska (10).

## **Craig Moving up Tackle List**

Senior defensive back Elbert Craig will go into the 2003 season ranked 19th on Oklahoma State's career tackle list, and very much in range of loftier numbers. His career total of 262 tackles leaves him four short of Harry Cheatwood and Jason Gildon's career totals of 266 and five short of Kenyatta Wright's career total of 267. Elbert's career has been one of consistency. He registered 82 tackles in 2000, 98 in 2001 and 83 in 2002. In his OSU career, Craig has registered seven tackles for loss, two sacks and six interceptions.

## Farden Emerges As Force On Special Teams

After taking over the punting duties last season, Cole Farden helped the Cowboys win the field position battle in several crucial situations. After serving solely as the squad's kickoff specialist as a freshman in 2001, the Grapevine, Texas, native assumed the punting duties last season and finished the year with a 41.4 yards per punt average. Of his 57 punts, 13 were downed inside the 20-yard line and six more were fair caught. Farden provided even fewer return opportunities on his kickoffs, producing touchbacks on 60 percent (43-of-72) of his attempts.

#### Phillips Takes Aim At Cowboy Scoring Leaders

In just two seasons of action, kicker Luke Phillips has vaulted up the OSU career scoring chart, entering his senior season ranked No. 12 on the school's all-time list. The Tulsa, Okla., native's 160 career points are two behind David Thompson and 20 behind Hart Lee Dykes for the No. 10 spot on the list. Phillips' numbers have been bolstered by his nearly flawless work on point-after attempts. The 2002 Houston Bowl Special Teams MVP has converted 82 of his 83 attempts during his career to stand atop the school's all-time chart with a .987 success rate.

## Young, Experienced Duo To Patrol Cowboy Secondary

OSU will enter the 2003 season with a talented duo of cornerbacks that possess a unique blend of youth and experience. Junior Darrent Williams and sophomore Vernon Grant will factor heavily into the Cowboys' rotation again this season. Williams has made the most of his five career interceptions, returning three for touchdowns. Last season, the Ft. Worth, Texas, native started all 13 games, recording 53 tackles to go along with team bests in interceptions (three) and pass breakups (16). Grant came on strong during the second half of the 2002 season, closing out the year with seven consecutive starts and making his mark against Texas A&M with his lone interception with time winding down to preserve the victory. The Duncanville, Texas, native recorded five pass breakups and 62 tackles during his inaugural season in Stillwater.

#### **Richmond Leads by Example**

Senior defensive end Greg Richmond is OSU's 2003 defensive captain and came by that honor the old fashioned way — he earned it. He turned in an exceptional season a year ago, logging 55 tackles and sharing the team lead with seven tackles for losses. He was named honorable mention All-Big 12 a year ago and should be considered for postseason honors in 2003. He was a leader all summer in off-season conditioning workouts, and appears poised for his best OSU season.

#### **Scouting the Huskers**

Nebraska opens the 2003 football campaign attempting to extend its streak of 41 consecutive winning regular seasons and NCAArecord 34 straight bowl berths. Last season, the Huskers finished 7-7 overall (3-5 in Big 12 play) after a 27-23 loss to Mississippi in the Independence Bowl. The 2002 season brought an end to the program's impressive run of 33 consecutive seasons with at least nine wins.

This season, Nebraska is picked third in the North Division in the Big 12 media's preseason poll, finishing behind Kansas State and Colorado. The Huskers return 15 starters, including nine on defense and five on the offensive side, from a year ago.

While the majority of the Huskers' starting lineup remains intact, the coaching staff underwent several changes in the offseason. Six new coaches have joined the program, including offensive coordinator Barney Cotton and defensive coordinator Bo Pelini. In addition, two new coaches have been added to both the offensive and defensive sides of the ball. Tim Albin will serve as the new running backs coach and passing game coordinator, while Scott Downing will be in charge of the Nebraska tight ends. Defensively, Jimmy Williams will handle the squad's linebackers and Marvin Sanders will tutor the defensive backs.

#### **Huskers to Watch**

**QB Jammal Lord** — Lord earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors last season after setting several school records. The senior from Bayonne, N.J., set new standards for total offense (2,774 yards), single-game total offense (369 yards), quarterback rushing yards (1,412) and single-game rushing yards (234) by a quarterback. His 2,774 yard total surpassed the old school mark set by Eric Crouch during his 2001 Heisman Trophy campaign. Lord's rushing total was also the third-highest ever by a quarterback at the Division I level. He produced five 100-yard rushing games last season, including the only two 200-yard games by a quarterback in school history. He had a pair of 100-yard passing and rushing games, accomplishing the feat against McNeese State and Texas A&M.

**OT Richie Incognito** — Sophomore who started 13 of the squad's 14 games last season and played in every contest. The Glendale, Ariz., native led the team with 171 pancake blocks, including a season-high 28 against Texas A&M. His knock-down block total was the second-highest total in school history, trailing only Toniu Fonoti's 201 in 2001. Incognito was named a first-team freshman All-American and all-conference selection by several outlets. He also received honorable mention all-league honors from the Associated Press and the Big 12 coaches. Incognito enters this season on the Outland Trophy watch list.

**RB David Horne** — An honorable mention All-Big 12 pick a year ago, Horne rushed for 651 yards and seven touchdowns despite not seeing action in the Huskers' first five games. Horne had a breakout performance against OSU, carrying a season-high 24 times for 125 yards and a score. The Omaha native also recorded 24 carries for a season-best 128 yards and four touch-downs at Texas A&M. Horne also posted a 100-yard game against Kansas, finishing with 122 yards and a touchdown. He was named a fourth-team freshman All-American by the Sporting News.

**LB Demorrio Williams** — Transferred last season from Kilgore (Texas) Junior College and promptly won a starting linebacker slot. The junior from Beckville, Texas, went on to lead the team with 92 tackles. Williams made 38 unassisted tackles, including six tackles for 24 yards in losses. He recorded one sack last season, a 15-yard loss against Texas A&M, five quarterback hurries, caused two fumbles and recovered one. Williams amassed at least eight tackles in a game five times, one of which was the Huskers' contest against OSU in Stillwater. He blocked a punt in the season opener as well. Followed up a 130 tackle, All-America campaign in 2000 at Kilgore with a 127 tackle, nine sack season as a sophomore in 2001.

#### **Head Coach Frank Solich**

Entering his sixth season at the helm of the Nebraska program, Solich has compiled a 49-16 mark and two bowl wins, emerging victorious at the 1999 Fiesta Bowl and the 2000 Alamo Bowl. With his .754 winning percentage, he currently ranks sixth among active Division I coaches with at least five years of experience. In 1999, he led Nebraska to the Big 12 title before directing the Huskers to a berth in the 2001 National Championship game. Solich's ties to the Nebraska program run deep, having served the previous 19 years as an assistant coach for the Huskers and earning three letters as a fullback under Bob Devaney from 1963-65.

#### **OSU-NU Series ... Huskers lead, 35-3-1**

The Cowboys are the first of seven Husker opponents this season that competed in a bowl game last year. OSU snapped a 24game winning streak in the series by Nebraska with its 24-21 victory last season in Stillwater. The Cowboys opened the series with back-to-back wins before the Huskers reeled off 11 straight victories of their own. The lone deadlock in the series was a 17-17 contest in 1973 in Stillwater that preceded NU's aforementioned 24-game string. The last meeting between the two schools at Memorial Stadium came in 1999 with the Huskers prevailing, 38-14, to take a 19-1-0 overall advantage against the Cowboys in Lincoln.

The Aug. 30 date of this year's contest is the earliest in the history of the series. The only other game played between these two schools before the month of October came in 1995, when the Cowboys and the Huskers took to Lewis Field on Aug. 31.

#### **Odds and Ends**

Since 1990, the Huskers own the nation's best home record, posting a mark of 82-5-0 (.943) ... Nebraska enters the 2003 season having sold out an NCAA-record 255 consecutive home contests ... the Huskers have one Oklahoman, Jason Lohr of Tulsa, on their roster ... Nebraska has won its last 17 season openers since suffering a loss to Florida State to start the 1985 campaign ... the last time Nebraska opened the season against a conference opponent was also against Oklahoma State, with the Huskers prevailing, 64-21, in 1995 in Stillwater ... this year's matchup against OSU marks the first time the Huskers have opened their home season against a conference foe since taking on Iowa State in 1954.

## **Head Coach Les Miles**

Oklahoma State's Les Miles is entering his third season, and perhaps never before has the Cowboy football program been on stronger footing. Miles became OSU's 21st Head Football Coach in December of 2000 and it didn't take long to see positive results. Miles will head into year three with a career mark of 12-12 and a postseason record of 1-0. Oklahoma State's season-opening opponent represents the 25th game in the Les Miles era, and the 49-year-old coach has already served notice he has every intention of keeping the Cowboys in the hunt for Big 12 Championships and lofty national goals.

## The First Season

Miles' first OSU season began with just two wins in the first nine tries. OSU fell just short, however, against Southern Miss (17-9), Missouri (41-38 in 3 OTs), Iowa State (28-14) and Colorado (22-19). Fourteen points separated the Cowboys from its final record of 4-7 and a possible record of 7-4 and likely bowl trip. Miles and the Cowboys saved the best for last. The Cowboys finished the 2001 season with back-to-back road wins over Baylor and Oklahoma.

## 2002: A Breakthrough

The 2002 season, Miles second on the OSU sideline as head coach, did not get off to a solid start. The Cowboys were upset in the season opener against Louisiana Tech and after winning the home opener over Northern Iowa, lost three of the next four leaving them with a 2-4 record and Nebraska coming to Stillwater. OSU turned the season around with a 24-21 win over Nebraska on Oct. 19 and followed that with a 28-23 win over Texas A&M the following week. The Cowboys would win three of their last four regular-season games, including another win over Oklahoma, and accept a Houston Bowl invitation, where they defeated Southern Miss.

## **Coach of the Year**

After leading the Cowboys to their strongest finish in over a decade, Miles was recognized as the Big 12 Coach of the Year

The Cowboys are now recognized as legitimate title contenders in the rugged Big 12 Conference, and interest in the program is at unprecedented levels.

#### **Family Man**

Miles and his staff have not rebuilt the OSU program without hard work. This Cowboy staff consists of tireless workers and magnificent recruiters. Its also a staff that focuses on family, and that theme starts with the head coach. Kathy Miles, sons Benjamin and Manny, and daughters Kathryn and Macy Grace, are frequently seen around the football program, as are wives and young children of other OSU coaches. It is another fulfilled promise Miles made when he took the job.

#### **Academic Strength**

All of Oklahoma State's success in 2002 was not confined to the field. The Cowboys made headlines for academic achievement as well. OSU had a first-team Academic All-American in Kyle Eaton who was also named a National Football Foundation Scholar Athlete of the Year. The Cowboys also featured eight Academic All-Big 12 selections. Perhaps the most impressive academic honor, however, was the 100 percent graduation rate among OSU's 2002 senior class.

It will be OSU's 18th all-time appearance on ABC, and the first since Sept. 30, 2000, when the network televised the Cowboys' game at Texas.

## **Captains for 2003**

Seniors Rashaun Woods and Greg Richmond have been voted as the captains for the 2003 Oklahoma State Cowboys. Both are fifth-year seniors from Oklahoma City. Woods graduated from Millwood High School, while Richmond graduated from Douglass High School.

# **RASHAUN WOODS ... ALL-AMERICAN**

ashaun Woods has broken virtually every Oklahoma State and Big 12 single-season receiving record imaginable. With 134 yards on seven receptions vs. Baylor, he set the Big 12 single-season record for receiving yards, surpassing the 1,188 yards set by Texas' Kwame Cavil. Woods also broke the OSU single-season mark of 1,278 yards, held by Hart Lee Dykes for 14 years. Rashaun also holds the Oklahoma State and Big 12 record for receptions in a season with 107. With 17 touchdown receptions last season, he broke both the OSU and Big 12 single-season marks of 14. Rashaun is a preseason All-Big 12 first-team selection, a preseason All-America candidate, and was the preseason Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year. Woods begins his senior year the most touted Cowboy receiver since Hart Lee Dykes, and will in all likelihood replace Dykes at the top of every OSU career-receiving record. Rashaun has made at least two catches in 31 consecutive games.

#### As a Sophomore

Woods' sophomore season numbers were astonishing. In 11 games, he caught 80 passes, then an OSU season record, for 1,023 yards. He caught 10 touchdown passes, and averaged 7.3 receptions per game, 12.8 yards per catch and 93 yards per game. Through his first two seasons at the collegiate level, Woods had 109 career receptions, 1,352 career yards and a 12.4 yards-per-catch average.

#### As a Junior

Woods' junior season was one for the record books. He had 107 receptions for 1,695

yards (both OSU and Big 12 single-season records) as well as 17 touchdowns. He averaged 130.4 yards per game and an amazing 15.8 yards per reception. Rashaun's total receiving yards were second nationally to just J.R. Tolver of San Diego State, and he was third nationally in receiving yards per game behind Tolver and Nevada's Nate Burleson. Rashaun led the nation in yards per catch with a minimum of 100 receptions, and also led the country in touchdown receptions. USC's Mike Williams was second with 14.

#### As a Senior

Woods enters his senior season in a Cowboy uniform just 126 yards away from breaking the OSU career receiving yards record held by Hart Lee Dykes. Should Rashaun accumulate 953 yards

this season, he would become just the eighth player in NCAA history to reach the 4,000-yard mark. A season resembling last year's would rank second in the NCAA record book. The NCAA record for career receiving yards is 5,005 by Nevada's Trevor Insley from 1996-99. Rashaun is also on track to break the NCAA career receptions record of 300, set by Louisville's Arnold Jackson from 1997-2000. Rashaun would need 85 receptions his senior year to achieve that mark.
