2022 SPRING FOOTBALL NOTEBOOK

HUSKERS ADD 33 TO 2022 ROSTER

Nebraska's full 2022 roster totals 150 players as of Feb. 28, including student-athletes who will not join the team until later this year. A total of 135 players are expected to be with the team for spring practice.

- The Husker roster features 117 returning players and 33 newcomers. Nebraska returns 11 starters, including six on offense and five on defense.
- Nebraska's 33 newcomers include 19 freshmen and 14 transfers. The Huskers picked up six FBS transfers - including four from Power Five programs - four FCS transfers, three junior college recruits and one Division III transfer.
- Eighteen of Nebraska's 33 newcomers are on campus and are expected to participate in the spring season. All 14 transfers will take part in the spring, while four of Nebraska's 14 freshmen enrolled early and are with the team this spring.

SPRING GAME ATTENDANCE NOTES

The 2022 Spring Game will mark the first Nebraska spring game without attendance restrictions since 2019. The 2020 Red-White game was canceled due to the pandemic, while the 2021 Spring Game had limited attendance due to COVID-19.

- Nebraska has drawn at least 50,000 fans for the Spring Game each of the past 15 times it has been played without attendance restrictions. At least 60,000 fans have attended every spring game played without attendance limitations dating back to 2008.
- Overall, Nebraska has drawn 1,036,959 fans for its past 15 spring games at Memorial Stadium, an average of 69,130 fans per game. By comparison, only 18 schools nationally - including Nebraska - averaged at least 69,000 fans per game during the 2021 regular season.
- NU has ranked first or second nationally in spring game attendance nine times in the past 13 years.
- With capacity restrictions in place across the country, Nebraska ranked second in 2021 spring game attendance. The Huskers drew 36,406 to last year's event, while Alabama led the nation with an attendance of 47,218 last spring.
- Nebraska posted two of the 10 largest Spring Game crowds in NCAA history in 2018 (8th-largest) and 2019 (9th-largest).

FROST SET FOR FIFTH SEASON

Scott Frost is set for his fifth season at Nebraska in 2022. The consensus 2017 national coach of the year, Frost is 34-36 in six seasons as a head coach.

- Nineteen of Frost's 29 losses at Nebraska have been by a touchdown or less, including 11 by five or fewer points.
- Nebraska was just 3-9 in 2021, but the Huskers cumulatively outscored their opponents by 63 points on the season. Despite the 3-9 record, the average score of a Nebraska game in 2021 was 28-23 in favor of the Huskers.
- All nine Nebraska losses in 2021 were by single digits, including eight by a touchdown or less. The Huskers played a school-record six games against ranked opponents during the 2021 regular season. Nebraska lost to those six ranked foes - all ranked in the top 20 - by an average of just 6.0 points per game.
- Frost has been a winner in his coaching career. In 15 seasons as a full-time assistant or head coach, Frost's teams have posted a 137-54 record, averaging more than nine wins per season. Frost has been a part of seven conference championship teams in his 15 seasons and has twice coached in the national championship game.
- Frost's teams have been ranked in the top 15 in 10 of his 15 seasons, including eight final top-10 rankings and six final top-five rankings.

A LOOK AT THE HUSKER OFFENSE

Nebraska returns six regular starters on offense and 12 other players who made at least one start last season. The Huskers must replace two starting offensive linemen from the 2021 season, their most productive wide receiver and tight end and their four-year starting quarterback.

- Nebraska averaged 447.6 yards of offense per game last season, ranking 20th nationally in that category. The No. 20 total offense ranking was the program's highest since the 2008 season (12th).
- The Huskers return 65 percent of their rushing yards from last season but must replace 68 percent of their total offensive yards, bringing back only 10 percent of their passing yards and 45 percent of their receiving yards.
- Up front, **Turner Corcoran** (11), **Bryce Benhart** (10) and **Nouredin Nouili** (7) return after combining for 28 starts last season. **Ethan Piper** and **Trent Hixson** are also back with 24 career starts between them. **Teddy Prochazka** returns after starting two of the first seven games at left tackle as a true freshman last season before a season-ending injury. **Brant Banks** is the seventh offensive lineman on the roster who has started a game for Nebraska, as he started in place of Corcoran at left tackle for the 2021 season opener at Illinois.
- In the backfield, **Rahmir Johnson** started seven games last fall and was the leading rusher among running backs with 495 yards. Overall, Nebraska brings back its four most productive running backs from 2021, as Johnson, **Jaquez Yant**, **Markese Stepp** and **Gabe Ervin Jr.** combined for 1,090 rushing yards last season.
- At wideout, NU returns four receivers who started multiple games last year including **Omar Manning** (7 starts), **Zavier Betts** (5), **Wyatt Liewer** (4) and **Oliver Martin** (3). That quartet combined for 860 receiving yards last season. **Brody Belt** and **Alante Brown** have each started one game at wideout for Nebraska in their careers.
- Veteran tight end **Travis Vokolek**, who has played in 36 career games, is also back after catching 11 passes for 127 yards last season behind Big Ten Tight End of the Year Austin Allen. **Chancellor Brewington** and **Chris Hickman** also return at the tight end spot. Brewington played in 10 games and caught three passes in his first season at Nebraska in 2021, and he has appeared in 31 games with 19 starts in his collegiate career. Hickman has played in 15 games with Nebraska, and he caught three passes for 90 yards last season.
- At quarterback, Nebraska must replace Adrian Martinez, the program's all-time leader in total offense. **Logan Smothers** started Nebraska's final game last season against No. 17 Iowa and completed 16-of-22 passes for 198 yards while rushing for 64 yards and two touchdowns in his first career start. Smothers is one of three quarterbacks on the roster that have started a game for a Power Five program.
- Texas transfer **Casey Thompson** played in 19 games with 10 starts as a Longhorn. He has completed nearly 64 percent of his career passes, throwing for 2,422 yards and 30 touchdowns. Thompson was named to the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award watch list in 2021, when he threw for 2,113 yards and 24 touchdowns.
- **Chubba Purdy** transferred to Nebraska from Florida State. Purdy played in three games with one start for the Seminoles as a true freshman in 2020 before redshirting in 2021. He has thrown for 219 yards and two touchdowns in his career with 19 carries for 57 yards.
- Thompson and Purdy aren't the only transfers who could make an impact for Nebraska's offense. On the line **Kevin Williams Jr.** and **Hunter Anthony** are both collegiate veterans. Williams appeared in 22 career games with 19 starts at FCS Northern Colorado while Anthony played in 23 games with five starts at Oklahoma State. At wideout, **Isaiah Garcia-Castaneda** played in 12 games with seven starts in two seasons at New Mexico State, catching 42 passes for 639 yards and four touchdowns. **Trey Palmer** transferred to Nebraska from LSU, where he played in 28 games with five starts and caught 41 passes for 458 yards and three touchdowns.

A BRIEF LOOK AT THE HUSKER DEFENSE

On defense, Nebraska returns five players who started every game last season and two other defenders who started four contests. The Huskers must replace six lost starters from 2021, all of whom earned at least honorable-mention All-Big Ten accolades last season. They will be big shoes to fill from a Husker defense that allowed only 22.7 points per game last season, Nebraska's lowest average since the 2010 season.

- On the defensive line, **Ty Robinson** and **Casey Rogers** are the veterans of a young group, and are the only linemen to start a game for the Huskers. Robinson has appeared in 20 career games with 11 starts, while Rogers has played in 19 games in his career with one start. The duo combined for 44 tackles, 7.0 TFLs and 2.5 sacks last season.
- Behind Robinson and Rogers, **Nash Hutmacher** (12 games), **Colton Feist** (8) and **Tate Wildeman** (4) are the only other defensive linemen who have played in more than two games at Nebraska.
- At outside linebacker, NU returns **Garrett Nelson** and **Caleb Tannor**, the two players on the roster with the most experience in a Husker uniform. Nelson has played in 31 career games with 20 starts, and he led Nebraska with 11.5 tackles for loss and 5.0 sacks last season. Tannor, who has played in 44 games with 22 starts as a Husker, also had a productive 2021 season, finishing with career highs of 33 tackles and 5.5 TFLs while adding 2.0 sacks and three breakups.
- **Damian Jackson** also adds a veteran presence at the outside linebacker spot. Jackson has played in 20 career games. **Blaise Gunnerson** emerged late last season as an option at outside linebacker, earning significant playing time in the final two games and totaling two tackles and a half TFL.
- At linebacker, Nebraska returns one of the top pairs in the nation in **Luke Reimer** and **Nick Henrich**. Both Reimer and Henrich ranked in the top 50 nationally last season in tackles, as Nebraska was one of only five FBS programs - and two Power Five teams - to have two players rank in the top 50 in tackles. Reimer (109) and Henrich (99) combined for 208 tackles last season, the sixth-highest returning teammate total in the country.
- **Chris Kolarevic** also figures into the mix at inside linebacker. He has played in 28 games in his career with 15 starts, playing in all 12 games and recording 27 tackles in his first season at Nebraska last year.
- At cornerback, **Quinton Newsome** and **Braxton Clark** are the most experienced returners. Newsome has played in 30 games with 13 starts as a Husker. He started all 12 games last season and recorded 57 tackles with four pass breakups. Clark also played in all 12 games last season, and he has appeared in 28 games with one start in his Nebraska career. **Marques Buford Jr.** will also compete for a spot at cornerback after he was a special teams standout in 2021, appearing in all 12 games of his freshman season.
- **Myles Farmer** is the only player on the roster who has started a game at safety for Nebraska. Farmer has played in 21 games with five starts the past three seasons. He is Nebraska's active leader with three career interceptions. Other safeties on the Husker roster with game experience are **Noa Pola-Gates** and **Isaac Gifford**, who could also play the nickel spot. Both special teams standouts, Pola-Gates has appeared in 18 games while Gifford has seen action in 20 contests.
- A pair of transfers could also figure into the secondary. **Omar Brown** started 29 games at Northern Iowa, totaling 140 tackles with 13 pass breakups and eight interceptions in his Panther career. He was the FCS Defensive Freshman of the Year and an All-American in the 2019 season. **Tommi Hill** played in 11 games as a freshman at Arizona State in 2021, finishing with nine tackles.

a head coach - Frost was the consensus national coach of the year in 2017 - Frost was successful at every stop along his journey to becoming a head coach. His teams posted a 103-18 record in his nine seasons as an assistant coach, with Frost coordinating both a top-10 defense and multiple top-10 offenses. Frost served as defensive coordinator for an FCS semifinalist, was Oregon's offensive coordinator in the inaugural College Football Playoff Championship Game and called the plays for Heisman Trophy winner Marcus Mariota.

The 47-year old Frost is a proven winner familiar with the Nebraska culture and tradition. He was a part of two national championship teams as a Husker player, coached in two national championship games as an assistant at Oregon and led UCF to a 13-0 record in 2017, when the Knights were the nation's only undefeated team.

Frost has been a winner throughout his coaching career, winning seven conference championships in his 15 seasons as a full-time coach. His teams have won 137 games in that span, averaging more than nine wins per season.

In addition to coaching in two national championship games, Frost has coached in five other New Year's Six bowl games in the last decade. His winning reputation dates back to his playing days, when he helped Nebraska to a 36-2 record in his three-year career, including a 24-2 record in two seasons as the Huskers' starting quarterback.

NEBRASKA (2018-21)

Frost has laid the foundation for rebuilding Nebraska's program in his first four seasons in Lincoln. Nebraska won four of its final six games in his first year in 2018, and improved by nearly 28 points per game in the second half of the season. The Huskers finished with a 4-8 record, but Nebraska faced eight opponents who were ranked during the 2018 season. Five of Nebraska's losses were by five or fewer points, with the Huskers' final three losses coming in a three-point overtime loss at Northwestern, which finished with a No. 21 ranking, a five-point setback at No. 3 Ohio State and a three-point loss at No. 25 Iowa as time expired.

Frost also lived up to his reputation as one of the best offensive play-callers in the country in 2018. Frost inherited an offensive unit that ranked 87th nationally in total offense in 2017. Nebraska ranked 25th nationally in total offense, the program's first top-25 finish in the category since 2008.

In his second season in 2019, Nebraska improved its win total with one of the youngest teams in the country, as the Huskers had more freshmen on their roster than any team in the country. Nebraska went 5-7, with five of those losses coming to ranked teams, including four losses to teams that finished in the top 15 of the final Associated Press poll. Four of the Huskers' seven losses were by a combined 17 points, including two last-second losses.

Scott Frost enters his fifth season as Nebraska's head coach in 2022 and his seventh season as a head coach overall. Frost's rapid rise in the coaching ranks culminated with the former Husker national champion returning to his alma mater in December of 2017.

In the span of just more than a decade, Frost went from a first-year FCS assistant to head coach of one of college football's most storied programs. It also took Frost just two years to post his first undefeated season as a head coach, as Frost guided UCF to the greatest two-year turnaround in NCAA history. He inherited an 0-12 team, made a bowl game in his first season and then led the Knights to a 13-0 record in his second and final season in 2017.

In addition to his success as

Frost's leadership guided the Huskers through the COVID-19 pandemic and an abbreviated 2020 campaign. Nebraska posted a 3-5 record, with three losses to teams that finished in the top 15 nationally. In the 2021 season, the Huskers were competitive in every game despite posting a 3-9 record. All nine of Nebraska's losses were by single digits - including eight losses by one score or less - while facing eight teams who won at least nine games, and six opponents who were nationally ranked at game time.

Frost has made upgrading Nebraska's talent a priority, with four of his five recruiting classes ranked in the top 25 nationally.

UCF (2016-17)

Frost went 19-7 in two seasons at UCF, helping turn an 0-12 team into a 13-0 squad in just two years. In Frost's first season, he took the Knights to a bowl game and finished with a 6-7 record. The turnaround was historic, as Frost became the only first-year coach in FBS history to make a bowl game with a team that was winless the previous season.

UCF led the nation with a six-win improvement in 2016 and exceeded that mark in 2017 with a win over No. 7 Auburn in the Peach Bowl to complete a 13-0 season as the nation's only undefeated team. The Knights put together the first undefeated regular season in UCF and AAC history in 2017, posted the longest winning streak in school history (13 games), achieved the highest in-season ranking in program history (10th), highest final ranking (6th) and set an AAC record with 16 all-conference selections.

UCF was led by its high-powered offense and improved defense under Frost. The Knights led the nation in scoring at 48.2 points per game and were the only FBS team to score at least 30 points in every game. Defensively, UCF improved its scoring defense by 65 spots in Frost's two seasons.

In addition to being the unanimous choice as the 2017 AAC Coach of the Year, Frost was honored as the national coach of the year by the Associated Press, American Football Coaches Association, the Touchdown Club of Columbus, the Lombardi Award and FCA in addition to winning the Home Depot, Paul "Bear" Bryant and Eddie Robinson coach-of-the-year awards. He was also a semifinalist for the George Munger Coach of the Year Award in each of his two seasons at UCF, making Frost one of three coaches to be a semifinalist for the award in both 2016 and 2017.

ASSISTANT COACHING CAREER

OREGON: Frost took his first head coaching job at UCF after spending seven seasons as an offensive assistant at Oregon from 2009 to 2015, including serving as the Ducks' offensive coordinator in his final three seasons. Frost helped Oregon post a 79-14 record in his seven seasons, during which time the Ducks won four conference titles and twice played for the national championship.

Oregon never ranked lower than eighth nationally in scoring offense during Frost's seven seasons on staff, and the Ducks led the nation in scoring in 2010. Frost was promoted to offensive coordinator in 2013, and Oregon ranked in the top five nationally in both scoring and total offense each of his three seasons calling plays. The Ducks scored 681 points in 2014, the second-highest total in NCAA history. Oregon made it to the College Football Playoff Championship Game that year, when Frost was one of five finalists for the Broyles Award, presented annually to the nation's top assistant. Frost's quarterback, Marcus Mariota, won the Heisman Trophy and was the No. 2 overall pick in the 2015 NFL Draft.

NORTHERN IOWA: Frost's first full-time coaching job came in the FCS ranks at Northern Iowa, where he spent two seasons on the Panthers' defensive staff. He coached the Panther linebackers in 2007 and helped UNI to the No. 1 seed in the FCS playoffs and a quarterfinals appearance. Frost was promoted to co-defensive coordinator the next season, when UNI ranked ninth nationally in scoring defense and advanced to the FCS Semifinals. The Panthers finished with a 24-4 record in Frost's two seasons, winning two Missouri Valley Conference titles and earning a No. 4 final ranking both years.

KANSAS STATE: Frost began his coaching career as a defensive graduate assistant at Kansas State in 2006, helping the Wildcats to a bowl game.

NEBRASKA: Frost's first coaching experience came during a brief stint on Nebraska's staff as a defensive graduate assistant in 2002, coaching the Huskers in the Independence Bowl.

PLAYING CAREER (STANFORD, NEBRASKA & NFL)

Frost spent two seasons at Stanford - where he was a two-way starter at safety and quarterback - before returning home to Nebraska for the Huskers' 1995 national championship season. He took over as NU's starting quarterback the next season and was the 1996 Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year. In 1997, he was a Johnny Unitas Award finalist and an Academic All-American as Nebraska went 13-0 and captured the program's fifth national title. Frost was then selected in the third round of the 1998 NFL Draft and played six seasons as an NFL safety.

PERSONAL

Frost earned his degree in finance from Nebraska in 1997. Scott and his wife Ashley have one son, Ryan James (RJ) and one daughter, Alli.



HISTORIC TURNAROUND AT UCF

At UCF, Frost produced the greatest two-year turnaround in college football history, inheriting an 0-12 team and leading the Knights to a 13-0 record just two years later.

- In his first season in 2016, Frost made history as the only first-time head coach in FBS history to make a bowl game with a team that was winless the previous season.
- UCF tied for the national lead with a six-win improvement from the 2015 to 2016 season. The Knights then ranked third nationally after improving by seven wins from the 2016 to 2017 season.
- The Knights' seven-win improvement from 2016 to 2017 ranked 11th in NCAA history and marked just the second time ever a bowl team improved by more than six wins the next season.
- UCF was the American Athletic Conference and Peach Bowl champions and was the only FBS team to go undefeated in 2017.
- Frost called UCF's plays, orchestrating the greatest two-year offensive turnaround in NCAA history. The Knights went from last to fifth in total offense, improving their output by more than 260 yards per game. UCF also went from third-to-last to first in scoring offense, improving by nearly 35 points per game.

FROST LED UCF TO 13-0 SEASON

In his second year as a head coach, Scott Frost guided UCF to a 13-0 record in 2017, when the Knights were the nation's only undefeated team.

- Frost was the fourth coach in FBS history to post a 13-0 record or better in either his first or second season as a head coach. Among that quartet, Frost is the only coach who inherited a team that won fewer than five games, as UCF went 0-12 the year before Frost's arrival.
- Frost is one of only seven active FBS head coaches who has posted a 13-0 season or better, joining Jimbo Fisher, Gary Patterson, Ed Orgeron, Nick Saban, Dabo Swinney and Kyle Whittingham.
- Frost also led Nebraska to a 13-0 record and a national title as the Huskers' starting quarterback in 1997. Frost was the first person in NCAA history to be part of a 13-0 season as both a player and a head coach.

NATIONAL COACH OF THE YEAR

Frost was the consensus choice as the 2017 national coach of the year, earning the honor from at least eight different organizations.

- Frost won the 2017 Paul "Bear" Bryant Award as the national coach of the year. He joined Chris Petersen (2006 & 2009, Boise State) as the only coaches in the 32-year history of the award to win the honor while coaching a team outside of a Power Five Conference.
- Frost was also the AP Coach of the Year, becoming the sixth coach to win the award in his first or second season as a head coach.

FROST A TOP OFFENSIVE COACH

For each of the last 13 years, Scott Frost has either been an offensive assistant, offensive coordinator or head coach who calls the offensive plays. During that time, he has consistently proven to be one of the nation's finest offensive coaches.

- In 13 seasons coaching offense, Frost has worked with eight units that finished in the top 10 nationally in scoring, including seven that ranked in the top five.
- Frost has also been a part of seven teams that ranked in the top 10 nationally in total offense the past 13 seasons.

FROST A PROVEN WINNER

Frost is a proven winner. In his 15-year full-time coaching career, Frost's teams have combined for a 137-54 record.

- Frost has averaged more than nine wins per year and been a part of seven 12-win teams.
- He has won seven conference titles in 15 years.
- Frost has coached in two national title games and his teams have finished with a top-10 ranking eight times in the past 15 years.
- In two seasons as UCF's head coach, the Knights were the nation's most improved team in 2016 and were the only FBS team to go undefeated in 2017.
- As a Husker quarterback, Frost was a two-time national champion who helped Nebraska to a 36-2 record, including a 24-2 mark as a starter.
- Frost is one of four active head coaches who won a national title as a player and is the only coach who won multiple national titles.

Chinander's units have ranked in the top 20 nationally in takeaways three times in the past eight seasons and in the top five twice. Individually, 26 Blackshirts have earned All-Big Ten accolades under Chinander. Before his arrival, only 12 Blackshirts were All-Big Ten honorees in the previous four seasons.

NEBRASKA (2018-21)

Chinander has implemented an aggressive defense at Nebraska, one that has resulted in more sacks, takeaways and defensive touchdowns. In his first season, Chinander oversaw a Husker defense that showed significant improvement. Nebraska allowed two fewer touchdowns per game over the final six games of 2018 compared to the first six games. The Huskers held two of their final five opponents to single digits, including a 9-6 victory over Michigan State, where the defense led Nebraska to its first victory without scoring a touchdown since 1937.

The Blackshirts improved by 26 spots in the national scoring defense rankings from the unit Chinander inherited, and NU saw dramatic improvements in its pass defense, sack totals and takeaways. The Huskers improved their pass efficiency defense by 61 spots in 2018, ranking 34th nationally in the category. Nebraska broke up 58 passes, the ninth-highest total in program history and the most by a Husker squad in nearly a decade. The Blackshirts also totaled 25 sacks in 2018, 11 more than they had in 2017. Nebraska also forced 20 turnovers, the program's highest total in four seasons.

In 2019, six Huskers earned All-Big Ten accolades, Nebraska's highest total since 2011. The Huskers allowed nearly 50 fewer yards per game and more than three fewer points per game than they did in 2018, moving up 30 spots in the total defense rankings and 22 spots in scoring defense. Nebraska also improved by 52 spots in first down defense, ranking 32nd nationally in that category in 2019.

Chinander's aggressive approach also resulted in the Huskers forcing their most turnovers (21) in five seasons, ranking in the top 35 nationally in takeaways and in the top 15 with three defensive touchdowns. Nebraska was one of only 25 teams nationally with double-digit interceptions and fumble recoveries in 2019.

The defensive improvement continued in 2020. The Blackshirt defense limited its eight opponents to 4.2 yards per rush, better than a half-yard improvement over the 2019 season. The Huskers also moved up 14 spots nationally in total defense and ranked sixth in the Big Ten in that category. Seven of Chinander's defensive players earned All-Big Ten accolades.

The 2021 Husker defense was Chinander's best Blackshirt unit. The Huskers finished 36th nationally in scoring defense, allowing 22.7 points per game against a schedule that featured eight teams that won nine games. The opponents points per game average was the lowest for a Nebraska defense since 2010.

The Blackshirts allowed 366.0 yards per game, Nebraska's lowest total since 2016. During the 2021 campaign, Nebraska had several standout

defensive efforts, including ending Oklahoma's FBS record streak of 65 straight games with at least 27 points, and holding Michigan State without a first down in the second half.

Individually, seven Husker defenders earned All-Big Ten accolades. Senior nickel back JoJo Domann and senior cornerback Cam Taylor-Britt were second-team all-conference selections, and Domann was a second-team Associated Press All-America choice.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

UCF: Chinander led a dramatic defensive turnaround in his two seasons at UCF in 2016 and 2017. He inherited a Knight defense that had allowed 37.7 points per game in 2015 and two years later, UCF lowered that average to 25.3 points per game.

The Knights forced 58 turnovers in 26 games under Chinander, ranking second nationally in takeaways in 2017 and 18th in 2016. The 58 combined takeaways over the 2017 and 2018 seasons ranked third nationally.

Chinander's defense played a major role in the first perfect season (13-0) in school and conference history in 2017. UCF led the AAC in defensive touchdowns and ranked third in scoring defense and pass efficiency defense.

Individually, six Knights earned all-conference accolades, including a league-high four first-team honorees. Linebacker Shaquem Griffin was the only player in the conference to be a unanimous All-AAC selection, and cornerback Mike Hughes earned second-team All-America honors. Hughes (first round), the highest defensive draft pick in UCF history, and Griffin (fifth round) were both selected in the 2018 NFL Draft.

In Chinander's first season in Orlando, the defense was the key to UCF leading the nation with a six-win improvement. The Knights ranked in the top 10 nationally in four defensive categories and in the top 25 in nine categories. Griffin was the 2016 American Athletic Conference Defensive Player of the Year after ranking ninth nationally in tackles for loss (20.0) and 11th in sacks (11.5). He was also a first-team all-conference selection as a total of four Knights earned All-American Athletic Conference accolades.

OREGON: Chinander coached the outside linebackers at Oregon in 2014 and 2015. His linebackers helped Oregon play in the inaugural College Football Playoff National Championship Game in 2014. The Ducks ranked in the top 30 nationally in scoring defense and were third with 34 takeaways. In 2015, Oregon ranked ninth in sacks and pass efficiency defense.

Chinander served as a defensive graduate assistant at Oregon in 2011 and 2012, when the Ducks ranked in the top 25 nationally in scoring defense. Chinander also spent the 2010 season in Eugene as an intern. In Chinander's five seasons at Oregon, the Ducks posted a 58-10 record, won three conference titles and twice played for the national championship.

PHILADELPHIA EAGLES: Chinander gained NFL experience by serving as the assistant defensive line coach with the Philadelphia Eagles in 2013. The Eagles won the NFC East that season with a 10-6 record.

NORTHERN IOWA: Chinander served as an offensive assistant at Northern Iowa, coaching the tight ends for six seasons from 2004 to 2009. Chinander also assisted with the defensive and specialist scout teams. He made a huge impact in the Panthers' recruiting and helped UNI win three conference titles and make three appearances in the FCS playoffs, including a runner-up finish in 2005 and a semifinal appearance in 2008.

ELLSWORTH CC: Chinander's first job was as the offensive and defensive line coach for Ellsworth Community College in Iowa, where he also coordinated the strength and conditioning programs for football and men's and women's basketball. The Panthers finished second in the region and three of his players garnered first-team all-region accolades.

PLAYING CAREER (IOWA)

Chinander was a walk-on offensive lineman at Iowa from 1998 to 2002. As a senior, Iowa shared the Big Ten title and played in the Orange Bowl. He received the Hawkeyes' Offensive Team Leader Award that season.

PERSONAL

Chinander earned bachelor's degrees from Iowa in history and health leisure and sports studies in 2003. He and his wife, Megan, have two daughters, Penelope and Sophia, and one son, Ripp.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

PITT: Whipple spent three seasons as Pitt's offensive coordinator prior to coming to Nebraska. His Pitt offense ranked among the nation's most prolific units in his final season in 2021. The Panthers ranked in the top 10 nationally in scoring offense (41.4 ppg, 3rd), total offense (486.6 ypg, 8th), passing offense (337.4 ypg, 8th) and passing efficiency (8th). Pitt scored more than 40 points eight times in 2021 and converted 88 percent of its red-zone trips into scores.

Individually, the Panther offense featured two of the nation's top skill players. Senior quarterback Kenny Pickett thrived under Whipple's coaching. A Heisman Trophy finalist, Pickett threw for 4,319 yards to rank sixth nationally in that category, and he was fourth nationally with 42 touchdown passes and ninth in the nation in passing efficiency. Receiver Jordan Addison led the nation with 17 receiving touchdowns, while ranking fourth in the country with 1,593 receiving yards and sixth with 100 receptions. Addison was a first-team All-American and the Biletnikoff Award winner as the nation's top wide receiver

UMASS (HEAD COACH): Whipple spent the previous five seasons (2014-18) as the head coach at UMass, his second stint as head coach at the school after also guiding the Minutemen from 1998 to 2003. Overall, Whipple owns a school record 65 wins at UMass and guided the school

Mark Whipple is in his first season as Nebraska's offensive coordinator. Whipple brings extensive experience to the Husker sideline.

During his 40-year coaching career, Whipple has won a national championship as a head coach and won a Super Bowl as an assistant coach.

Whipple has accumulated 21 years of head coaching experience. He has also been an offensive coordinator for 10 seasons and coached six years in the National Football League.

Whipple owns a 137-103 record in his 21 seasons as a college head coach. He won a national championship in 1998, leading Massachusetts to the Division I-AA title when he was the national coach of the year.

Whipple has been an offensive coordinator at three Power Five programs. Before coming to Nebraska, he helped Pitt win the 2021 ACC title by leading a Panther offense that ranked in the top 10 nationally in scoring offense, passing offense and total offense.

As a quarterbacks coach, Whipple helped Kenny Pickett win the 2021 Johnny Unitas Golden Arm award, and he coached Ben Roethlisberger when Roethlisberger was the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year in 2004.

to a Division I-AA (now FCS) title in 1998, and to three NCAA playoff appearances. Whipple won three conference titles with the Minutemen, and he produced a pair of 10-2 seasons.

CLEVELAND BROWNS: Whipple was an offensive assistant for three NFL teams, most recently the Browns in 2011 and 2012. As the Browns' quarterbacks coach, Whipple helped Colt McCoy throw for a career-high 2,733 yards in 2011. The next season, Whipple helped Brandon Weeden pass for a career-high 3,385 yards.

MIAMI: Whipple's first stint as an FBS offensive coordinator came at Miami in 2009 and 2010, when he also served as the Hurricanes' Assistant Head Coach. Miami ranked in the top 30 nationally in scoring offense in 2009, and the Hurricanes were 31st nationally in total offense in 2010.

PHILADELPHIA EAGLES: Whipple spent the 2008 season as an assistant coach with the Philadelphia Eagles under Head Coach Andy Reid. He helped the Eagles to the NFC Championship Game.

PITTSBURGH STEELERS: Whipple spent three seasons as the quarterbacks coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers from 2004 to 2006, during Ben Roethlisberger's first three NFL seasons. In 2004, Roethlisberger was named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year, and in 2005 Whipple helped the Steelers capture the Super Bowl.

BROWN (HEAD COACH): Whipple led Brown, his alma mater, to a 24-16 record in his three seasons as head coach from 1994 to 1997. He bookended his stint at Brown with 7-3 seasons.

NEW HAVEN (HEAD COACH): Whipple's first head coaching job came at Division II New Haven. He spent six seasons with the Chargers, guiding New Haven to a 48-17 record while his team earned five top-20 rankings. UNION: Whipple served as the offensive coordinator for Union College in 1981 and 1982. He helped the Dutchmen to an 8-1 record in 1982.

ST. LAWRENCE: Whipple began his career as an assistant coach at St. Lawrence in 1980.

PLAYING CAREER (BROWN)

Whipple was a quarterback at Brown from 1976 to 1979, where he was a teammate of Nebraska senior offensive analyst Ron Brown. Whipple earned his degree from Brown in 1979.

Bryan Applewhite is in his first season as Nebraska's running backs coach.

A veteran coach in his 24th season, Applewhite is coaching running backs for the 20th consecutive season in 2022. He previously coached running backs at TCU, Colorado State, Louisiana-Monroe, Montana State and Wyoming.

Applewhite has a strong reputation for player development and recruiting. He coached two of the four all-time leading rushers in Wyoming history and two of the top eight rushers in Colorado State history. He also served as a recruiting coordinator at both Colorado State and Louisiana-Monroe, spending eight total seasons in that role.

As a player, Applewhite was a two-time NCAA Division II

national champion for Northern Colorado, which is where he also began his coaching career in 1999.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

TCU: In two seasons with the Horned Frogs in 2020 and 2021 before joining Nebraska, Applewhite helped TCU rank in the top 30 nationally in rushing both seasons. TCU averaged 214.7 rushing yards per game in 2020 to rank 20th nationally and finished 30th in the country in 2021 at 196.3 yards per game. In 2020, TCU had three running backs top 100 yards in a single game, with true freshmen Zach Evans (7.7 ypc) and Kendre Miller (7.2 ypc), posting the second- and fifth-best yards per carry averages in Horned Frogs history, respectively.

COLORADO STATE: Before coaching at TCU, Applewhite spent five seasons as running backs coach at Colorado State from 2015 to 2019. He also took on the added responsibility as the Rams' recruiting coordinator in 2018 and 2019. In his time at CSU, the Rams had two of their top five season marks in total offense and points per game. Colorado State reached three bowl games in five seasons while Applewhite was on staff. Applewhite's Colorado State running backs posted 24 individual 100-yard rushing games. Ram running backs Izzy Matthews and Dalyn Dawkins each finished in the top eight on the CSU career rushing list under Applewhite's guidance.

LOUISIANA-MONROE: Applewhite coached for five years at Louisiana-Monroe from 2010 to 2014, working with the running backs and coordinating the Warhawks' recruiting efforts. He coached two all-conference running backs while at ULM. In 2012, his running backs combined for 19 total touchdowns as the Warhawks finished with eight wins and played in the Independence Bowl, the school's first bowl games since joining the FBS in 1994.

MONTANA STATE: Applewhite spent one season at FCS Montana State in 2009. In his one season, Applewhite coached a running back tandem that tallied over 1,110 rushing yards and scored 10 touchdowns.

WYOMING: Applewhite was at Wyoming for six seasons as running backs coach from 2003 to 2008. While at Wyoming, Applewhite tutored two of Wyoming's four all-time leading rushers in Devin Moore and Wynel Seldon.

NORTHERN COLORADO: Applewhite spent four seasons from 1999 to 2002 coaching at his alma mater, Northern Colorado. He first served as a graduate assistant in 1999, and was elevated to a full-time assistant coach in 2000. The Bears played in the Division II playoffs in both 1999 and 2002 while Applewhite was on the coaching staff.

Veteran coach Sean Beckton is in his fifth season as Nebraska's tight ends coach in 2022. He is in his 27th season overall as a college coach, having spent the first 22 years of his career coaching in the high school, collegiate and professional ranks in Florida. Beckton came to Lincoln after spending 19 seasons at UCF, his alma mater, including serving as the Knights' tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator under Scott Frost in 2016 and 2017. Beckton was one of the most important figures in the history of UCF football before deciding to follow Frost to Lincoln. As a coach, Beckton helped the Knights win four of the six conference championships in UCF history and the program's only two New Year's Six bowl wins. Beckton also played a large role in the only unbeaten season in UCF history in 2017, when the Knights went 13-0 to complete the greatest two-year turnaround in NCAA history. As a player, Beckton concluded his career as UCF's all-time leader in receptions and receiving yards, and he and a teammate were the first two football players inducted into the UCF Athletics Hall of Fame.

NEBRASKA (2018-21)

In 2018, Beckton inherited a tight end unit that featured only freshmen and sophomores. Nebraska's tight ends combined for 28 catches, 374 receiving yards and three touchdowns. Jack Stoll led the way with 21 catches for 245 yards and three touchdowns, setting career highs in all three categories, while redshirt freshman Austin Allen led Nebraska with an average of 27.0 yards per reception. In addition to contributing to a passing attack that averaged nearly 250 passing yards per game, the tight ends also added perimeter blocking for a Husker rushing attack that was the nation's third-most improved rushing unit.

In 2019, Beckton's tight ends contributed to a balanced offense that averaged more than 200 passing and rushing yards per game. Stoll set a career high with 25 receptions and led the Husker tight ends with 234 receiving yards. Allen also posted career highs in both receptions and receiving yards.

Beckton's veteran tight end unit was a key part of the Husker offense in 2020. Junior Austin Allen caught 18 passes for 236 yards, including five catches of at least 20 yards. Junior Travis Vokolek and Stoll added nine and seven catches, respectively. The tight ends also provided blocking for the Big Ten's No. 2 rushing offense.

Senior tight end Austin Allen had a record-setting season under Beckton's guidance in 2021. Allen set Nebraska season tight end records with 38 receptions and 602 yards. He also set a school single-game record with 143 receiving yards at Wisconsin. Allen earned first-team all-conference honors and was the Kwalick-Clark Big Ten Tight End of the Year.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

UCF: Beckton spent a total of 19 seasons at his alma mater, where he was a member of the coaching staff for four of the Knights' first five conference titles in program history, including three American Athletic Conference championships his final five seasons. In his last season at UCF in 2017, Beckton helped the Knights post the first perfect season in program history and the first undefeated season in AAC history. UCF was the only FBS team to go undefeated in 2017, and the Knights finished with a No. 6 ranking after defeating No. 7 Auburn in the Peach Bowl.

Beckton's tight ends helped UCF post the nation's most improved offense in 2017, when the Knights led the nation in scoring and ranked fifth nationally in total offense. As UCF's recruiting coordinator, he helped Frost land several of the Knights' standout players. Sophomore quarterback McKenzie Milton was the 2017 American Athletic Conference Offensive

Player of the Year and each of the Knights' three leading rushers and four of the top six receivers were either freshmen or sophomores.

Beckton's tight ends recorded 87 catches for 1,345 yards and seven touchdowns his last two seasons at UCF. In 2017, the unit totaled 49 receptions for 818 yards and caught five touchdown passes while averaging 16.7 yards per reception. In 2016, UCF's tight ends combined for 38 catches, 527 receiving yards and a pair of touchdown catches.

Individually, Jordan Akins posted his best two seasons under Beckton's coaching. Akins set career highs with 32 receptions for 515 yards and four touchdowns as a senior in 2017, when he was a first-team all-conference selection and was named to the John Mackey Award preseason watch list. In 2016, Akins caught 23 passes for 347 yards. Following his senior season, Akins was selected in the third round of the 2018 NFL Draft.

Before Frost's arrival, Beckton coached the UCF wide receivers from 2012 to 2015, his second stint in that role. Working with a young unit in 2015, Tre'Quan Smith finished with 52 catches for 724 yards, both of which set UCF freshman records. The 2015 American Athletic Conference Rookie of the Year, Smith went on to be a first-team All-AAC selection and Biletnikoff Award nominee in 2017. In 2014, four Knights totaled 500 receiving yards for the first time in program history, led by Breshad Perriman's 1,044 yards. Perriman went on to be a first-round pick in the 2015 NFL Draft. In 2013, three wideouts had at least 500 receiving yards to help UCF to a 12-1 record, an AAC title and a Fiesta Bowl win over Baylor. In Beckton's first year coaching the wide receivers in 2012, the Knights totaled more than 3,100 receiving yards and 28 receiving touchdowns.

Beckton coached defensive backs from 2009 to 2011. The Knights ranked in the top 25 nationally in passing defense in 2011 when cornerback Josh Robinson was a first-team all-conference selection before being selected in the third round of the 2011 NFL Draft. In 2010, UCF won 11 games, a Conference USA title and produced the program's first bowl win and the school's first national ranking. In 2009, he guided Robinson to freshman All-America honors.

Beckton also coached the wide receivers for eight seasons from 1996 to 2003. During that time he coached a slew of top wideouts, including three who went on to NFL careers. His most high-profile pupil was Brandon Marshall, who caught 74 passes for 1,195 yards in 2005 before being selected in the fourth round of the 2006 NFL Draft. Marshall played 13 seasons in the NFL and was a six-time Pro Bowler. Beckton also received his start in the coaching profession as an offensive graduate assistant at UCF in 1992 and 1993.

ORLANDO PREDATORS (AFL): Beckton coached the wide receivers for the Orlando Predators of the American Football League in 2008, helping the team to a 9-7 record and a playoff berth.

MAINLAND (FLA.) HIGH SCHOOL: Beckton was an assistant coach for Mainland (Fla.) High School from 1993 to 1996, where he also taught history. He helped Mainland to a pair of state championships and also worked with the basketball team, where he coached future NBA star Vince Carter.

PLAYING CAREER (UCF)

Originally from Daytona Beach, Fla., Beckton was a star wide receiver at UCF from 1987 to 1990. He ended his career as the program's all-time leader with 196 receptions and 2,493 receiving yards and was one of the first two football players to be enshrined in the UCF Athletics Hall of Fame. Against Texas Southern as a senior, Beckton was responsible for a touchdown four different ways (passing, rushing, receiving and punt return).

PERSONAL

Beckton earned his degree from UCF in liberal studies in 1993. He and his wife, Zorana, have one son, Sean Jr., and one daughter, Zaria. Sean Beckton Jr. is a member of the Husker football performance staff.

their best defenses in recent years. Nebraska allowed only 22.7 points per game in 2021, the program's lowest average since 2010.

Busch served as an assistant coach at Nebraska from 2004 to 2007. In his first season, he coached the outside linebackers and served as special teams coordinator. Busch then coached the safeties and continued to handle special teams duties from 2005 to 2007. During his tenure, the Huskers blocked 16 kicks, including seven in 2005. Nebraska ranked in the top 25 nationally in net punting (24th in 2006) and punt returns (17th in 2005) under Busch, as well. NU's kickoff coverage unit ranked 15th nationally in 2006 after finishing 22nd the previous year.

Busch also spent four seasons as a graduate assistant with the Huskers from 1990 to 1993. Busch worked with the secondary at Nebraska helping the Huskers to three straight Big Eight titles from 1991 to 1993.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

LSU: Busch spent three seasons as the safeties coach at LSU from 2018 to 2020, including helping the Tigers to a 15-0 record and the national championship in 2019. Busch coached LSU safety Grant Delpit to back-to-back first team All-America seasons in 2018 and 2019. Delpit, who also claimed the Thorpe Award as the nation's top defensive back in 2019, was a unanimous All-American as a sophomore in 2018. Under Busch's

A veteran coach with more than 30 years of experience, Busch has spent more than 20 years of coaching experience at Power Five schools. He has extensive experience in the Big Ten, spending three seasons at Wisconsin, two seasons at Nebraska and Rutgers and one season at Ohio State.

Busch won a national championship as an assistant at LSU in 2019, and he coached in one national title game as a graduate assistant at Nebraska. He has served on the staff of three national championship head coaches (Urban Meyer, Ed Orgeron and Tom Osborne).

guidance LSU led the SEC in interceptions in both 2018 and 2019. The Tigers finished second in the conference in pass efficiency defense in 2018 and were the only SEC team to hold opposing quarterbacks to less than 50 percent completion percentage (49.7) in 2018. Off the field, Busch was one of LSU's top recruiters and played a key role in the Tigers landing Heisman Trophy winner Joe Burrow as a graduate transfer quarterback.

RUTGERS: Busch spent two seasons at Rutgers in 2016 and 2017 where he served as defensive backs coach in 2016 and then added the title of co-defensive coordinator in 2017. In 2016, Busch helped the Scarlet Knights rank among the nation's best in both red zone defense (No. 6 at 72.7 percent) and passing defense (No. 18 at 186.5 yards per game).

OHIO STATE: Busch spent the 2015 season at Ohio State handling quality control on defense. He helped the Buckeyes to a 12-1 season and a No. 4 final ranking in his lone season in Columbus.

WISCONSIN: Prior to joining the Buckeyes, Busch worked for two seasons as the safeties coach at Wisconsin in 2013 and 2014. Busch also assisted with the special teams unit for the Badgers. In his first season at Wisconsin, Busch helped lead a defensive backfield that ranked 17th nationally in passing defense and tied for 13th in passing yards per attempt in 2013. Busch also served as a graduate assistant at Wisconsin in 1994.

UTAH STATE: Busch spent four seasons at Utah State from 2009 to 2012. In his first two seasons (2009-10), Busch served as defensive coordinator before taking over as safeties and special teams coach during the 2011-12 seasons. Busch also served as associate head coach for the Aggies in 2011 and 2012. In 2012, Utah State won a school-record 11 games and finished the year ranked No. 16 in the nation, behind a stingy defense. The Aggies were No. 7 nationally in scoring defense (15.4 points per game) and No. 14 in total defense (322.1 yards per game).

UTAH: Busch coached the secondary at Utah from 2001 to 2003, spending a season under head coach Urban Meyer. Utah boasted one of the top defenses in the Mountain West Conference in 2003 to help the Utes to a 10-2 record and their first outright conference title since 1957. Utah's 10 victories that season tied the then-school record. The secondary ranked second in the Mountain West and 27th nationally in pass efficiency defense, as Utah surrendered just nine passing touchdowns in 12 games. In 2001, Utah ranked 17th nationally in pass efficiency defense while earning an 8-4 overall record.

NEW MEXICO STATE: Before his three seasons at Utah, Busch spent four years at New Mexico State where he coached the defensive backs.

NORTHERN ARIZONA: Busch's first full-time coaching job was at Northern Arizona where he was the secondary coach in 1995 and 1996. Busch also served as the co-defensive coordinator in 1996 when he helped guide Northern Arizona to its first appearance in the Division I-AA (now FCS) playoffs.

NEBRASKA WESLEYAN: Busch began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Nebraska Wesleyan, his alma mater.

Busch played wide receiver at Nebraska Wesleyan from 1985 to 1987.

Dawson has tutored three All-Big Ten performers at Nebraska, and has coached five different defenders to all-conference accolades in his last four collegiate seasons.

NEBRASKA (2018 & 2020-21)

In Dawson's first year at Nebraska in 2018, his defensive line featured a pair of All-Big Ten performers and helped key a Blackshirts unit that moved up 27 spots in the national scoring defense rankings from the 2017 season. The line helped Nebraska total 25 sacks, 11 more than the Huskers recorded the previous season.

In addition to the pressure created by the defensive line, the unit also helped the Huskers post the ninth-most pass breakups in school history (58). Carlos Davis led the line with five breakups, the most by a Husker defensive lineman since Ndamukong Suh had nine in 2009. Carlos and his twin brother, Khalil, were both all-conference performers in 2018, as Khalil led the defensive line with 41 tackles, eight tackles for loss and 3.0 sacks.

In 2020, Dawson's outside linebackers played a key role for a Blackshirt unit that ranked sixth in the Big Ten in total defense, and lowered opponent rushing yards per attempt by more than a half-yard over 2019. Outside linebacker JoJo Domann led the team with 58 tackles and 6.5 tackles for loss en route to All-Big Ten honors.

Dawson played a key role in the continued improvement of the Nebraska defense in 2021. Nebraska allowed 22.7 points per game, the fewest points allowed per game by a Husker defense in 11 seasons. The Huskers also allowed their fewest yards per game in five seasons at 366.0 per game.

Individually, Dawson oversaw the continued development of outside linebackers Caleb Tannor and Garrett Nelson. Tannor finished the season with a career-high 5.5 tackles for loss, while Nelson led Nebraska in TFL (10.5) and sacks (5) ranking among the Big Ten leaders in both categories.

Mike Dawson is in his third season as the Huskers' outside linebackers coach and his fourth season overall on Scott Frost's Nebraska coaching staff. In 2022, Dawson will coach the Husker interior defensive linemen in addition to his work with the outside linebackers.

Dawson coached Nebraska's defensive line on Frost's first staff in 2018, before spending the 2019 season as the outside linebackers coach for the New York Giants. He returned to Lincoln in the winter of 2020.

A coaching veteran in his 24th season, Dawson has coached at the FCS, FBS and professional levels. He has spent 19 seasons in the collegiate ranks, including 13 years at the FBS level and eight seasons at a Power Five school. Dawson also boasts four years of coaching experience in the National Football League. He has coached both defensive linemen and outside linebackers in college and the NFL.

Dawson has helped build impressive defenses throughout his career, including working with a UCF squad that ranked second nationally in takeaways in 2017 and a Philadelphia Eagles team that ranked second in the NFL in sacks in 2014. Individually,

NEW YORK GIANTS (2019)

Dawson spent the 2019 season coaching the outside linebackers for the New York Giants. Dawson helped Markus Golden have a career year in his fifth year in the league, as Golden totaled a career-high 68 tackles. Golden also had 10.0 sacks – the second-highest total of his career – and scored the first defensive touchdown of his career. Dawson also helped Oshane Ximines record 4.5 sacks in his rookie season.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

UCF: Dawson spent two seasons on Frost's staff at UCF in 2016 and 2017. UCF improved by more than 12 points per game in scoring defense during Dawson's tenure, and the defense helped out the offense by forcing 58 turnovers and scoring nine defensive touchdowns in his two seasons. UCF ranked third nationally in takeaways over the 2016 and 2017 seasons.

In 2017, Dawson's defensive line helped UCF post the first perfect season in program and AAC history when UCF finished 13-0 as the nation's only undefeated team. The Knights ranked third in the league in scoring defense and fourth in rushing defense. Two of his three starting defensive linemen earned all-conference accolades.

In 2016, the Knights ranked in the top 10 nationally in four defensive categories and in the top 25 in nine categories. UCF ranked second nationally in red zone defense, sixth in third-down defense and ninth in tackles for loss. The defense was the key to UCF leading the nation with a six-win improvement from the 2015 to 2016 season.

PHILADELPHIA EAGLES: Dawson spent three seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles from 2013 to 2015. He served as a defensive quality control coach in 2013, when the Eagles won the NFC East and ranked third in the NFL with 31 takeaways. Dawson spent the next two seasons as an assistant defensive line coach, helping Philadelphia rank second in the NFL in sacks (49) and fifth in opponent yards per carry (3.7) in 2014.

BOSTON COLLEGE: Dawson was Boston College's special teams coach for three seasons from 2009 to 2011. In his first year, Steve Aponavicius set school records for career points, extra points made and field-goal percentage. The next year, Nate Freese was 22-of-25 on field goals, and he went on to break Aponavicius' career scoring record. Dawson also coached punter Ryan Quigley, who went on to play six seasons in the NFL.

AKRON: Dawson coached the Akron linebackers for three seasons from 2006 to 2008. He tutored all-conference linebacker Brion Stokes, who ended his career with 38.5 tackles for loss, the second-most in school history.

NEW HAMPSHIRE: Dawson had a six-year stint at New Hampshire from 2000 to 2005. He held three different positions with the Wildcats, coaching the linebackers in 2000 and 2002-03, the offensive line in 2001 and serving as defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005. In his two seasons leading the defense, New Hampshire posted a 21-5 record and reached the 2005 FCS quarterfinals, when the Wildcats led the country with 45 takeaways.

PITTSBURGH, MAINE AND UMass-LOWELL: Dawson's first coaching stint in the FBS ranks came as a graduate assistant at Pittsburgh in 1998. Dawson began his coaching career as the defensive line coach in the spring of 1998 for UMass-Lowell before he joined Maine as a defensive assistant for the 1998 season.

check while showing a knack for interceptions. After inheriting a Husker secondary that allowed more than 275 passing yards per game in 2017, Fisher helped Nebraska hold five opponents to fewer than 200 passing yards in 2018.

NU held six opponents to fewer than 165 passing yards in 2019, when the Huskers ranked No. 33 nationally in pass efficiency defense. On the strength of a veteran secondary, the 2020 Blackshirts continued to improve and finished sixth in the Big Ten in total defense. The 2021 Husker defense allowed its fewest points per game in 11 seasons, and best posted its best total defense mark in five years. Fisher led UCF to a No. 12 ranking in pass efficiency defense in 2016, and the Knights ranked second nationally with 20 interceptions in 2017.

Fisher has excelled developing individual talent. Nine of his defensive backs have signed NFL contracts in the last four years alone. In just one year, Fisher turned junior college transfer Mike Hughes into an All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick. Hughes was selected with the 30th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft, surpassing Fisher as the highest-drafted defensive player in UCF history. Fisher was selected in the second round of the 2002 NFL Draft following three seasons as a Knight.

In addition to developing players, Fisher has impressed in his role of bringing talent to Lincoln as one of Nebraska's top recruiters.

NEBRASKA (2018-21)

Fisher made an instant impact on the Husker secondary in his first season in 2018, when Nebraska produced impressive results as a team and individually. NU ranked 34th nationally in pass efficiency defense in 2018, a 61-spot improvement from 2017. Dicaprio Bootle shined under Fisher's guidance in 2018, earning All-Big Ten accolades. Bootle set career highs in every category and led the Big Ten and ranked ninth nationally with 15 pass breakups, the second-highest total in school history. At the opposite corner spot, Lamar Jackson posted his best season as a Husker, intercepting the first two passes of his career, breaking up a career-high seven passes and recording the first tackle for loss and forced fumble of his career.

Each of Nebraska's four primary safeties had at least one interception and one fumble forced or recovered in 2018. All told, Fisher's secondary recorded eight interceptions, forced 10 fumbles and had four fumble recoveries, helping Nebraska post its highest turnover total in four seasons. The secondary also combined for 41 pass breakups, helping Nebraska rank ninth in school history with 58 total pass breakups.

In 2019, Nebraska held six of its 12 opponents to fewer than 165 yards passing, including four opponents under 100 yards. Nebraska again ranked in the top 35 nationally in pass efficiency defense, and the Huskers were 11th nationally with two interception returns for touchdowns. Individually, Lamar Jackson ranked in the top 15 nationally in pass breakups and passes defended, while Cam Taylor-Britt - in just his second season playing defense - ranked fifth in the country with four forced fumbles, the most by a Husker since 1999. Jackson and Taylor-Britt also tied for the team lead with three interceptions.

Under Fisher's guidance, three of Nebraska's four secondary starters were All-Big Ten selections. Bootle earned All-Big Ten accolades for the second straight season, with Jackson and Taylor-Britt earning all-conference recognition for the first time.

Fisher's veteran secondary again shined in 2020. Each of the four starters in the secondary earned all-conference recognition, including Bootle who completed his Husker career as a three-time All-Big Ten honoree. Bootle finished in ninth place in Nebraska history in career breakups.

Travis Fisher is in his fifth season as Nebraska's defensive backs coach in 2022. Fisher entered the coaching ranks following a nine-year NFL career, and he is in the 10th season of his coaching career, the last seven of which have been as a member of Scott Frost's staff.

Fisher has been able to transfer his success and experience as a player into coaching. Fisher's defensive backs have consistently held opposing passing attacks in

Junior Cam Taylor-Britt earned second-team all-conference honors and once again showed his play-making ability with two interceptions, four breakups and 28 tackles. The hard-hitting safety duo of Marquel Dismuke and Deontai Williams combined for 98 tackles, eight tackles for loss and eight pass breakups.

In 2021, Fisher's experienced secondary helped Nebraska hold opponents to 22.7 points per game, despite playing a schedule that featured eight teams that won at least nine games. Individually, three Husker veterans earned all-conference honors, including senior cornerback Cam Taylor-Britt who was a second-team All-Big Ten pick. Senior safeties Williams and Dismuke were honorable-mention selections. Williams led the Nebraska defense with four interceptions, while Dismuke finished his career as one of eight Nebraska defensive backs with 200 career tackles.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

UCF: At his alma mater, Fisher helped turn the UCF defense into one of the top units in the American Athletic Conference. Fisher's defensive backs were a big reason why the Knights were able to record 58 takeaways and score nine defensive touchdowns in 2016 and 2017. UCF ranked third nationally in takeaways over the 2016 and 2017 seasons combined, and the Knights ranked fifth with 35 interceptions, including 26 from Fisher's defensive backs. In 2017, UCF led the AAC and was second nationally in interceptions.

Fisher's unit helped UCF go 13-0 as the nation's only undefeated team in 2017 while posting the first perfect season in school and conference history. The Knights led the league in interceptions and defensive touchdowns and ranked third in scoring defense and pass efficiency defense. UCF's 20 interceptions ranked fifth nationally, with 15 of the interceptions by Fisher's defensive backs, two of which were returned for touchdowns.

Cornerback Mike Hughes and safety Kyle Gibson were both first-team all-conference selections and each ranked in the top 25 nationally in interceptions. Hughes went on to earn second-team All-America honors in his only season at UCF before being a first-round selection in the 2018 NFL Draft, eclipsing Fisher as the highest-drafted defensive back in UCF history.

A year earlier, five defensive backs from the 2016 roster signed NFL contracts following the season, including third-round draft pick Shaquill Griffin. In 2016, Griffin helped UCF posted 12th-best pass efficiency defense nationally, while the defensive backs totaled 12 of the Knights' 15 interceptions. The group also returned four interceptions for touchdowns, helping UCF rank third nationally with five defensive touchdowns. Individually, Griffin led the AAC and was fifth nationally with 1.5 passes defended per game, and his 15 pass breakups in 2017 and 36 career breakups were both the second-most in UCF history. Drico Johnson also set a school record by becoming the first UCF player to score two defensive touchdowns in one game, accomplishing the feat against Tulane.

A former Knight cornerback, Fisher also spent the 2015 season at UCF, where he coached the cornerbacks in his first season as an FBS assistant. He began his coaching career as a defensive quality assistant with UCF in 2013, when the Knights went 12-1 and finished with a No. 10 ranking.

SOUTHEAST MISSOURI STATE: Fisher's first full-time coaching role came as the cornerbacks coach at Southeast Missouri State in 2014.

PLAYING CAREER (UCF & NFL)

As a player, Fisher totaled 130 tackles with the Knights from 1999 to 2001. He was selected in the second round of the 2002 NFL Draft with the 64th overall pick by the St. Louis Rams. Fisher had been the highest drafted defensive back in UCF history before his pupil Hughes was selected in the first round with the 30th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft. Fisher went on to spend nine seasons in the NFL and led the NFL with two interception returns for touchdowns and 205 interception return yards in 2003.

PERSONAL

Fisher graduated from UCF with a degree in criminal justice in 2001. He has two daughters, Taliyah and Aria, and one son, Travis Jr.

Former Husker quarterback Mickey Joseph is in his first season as Nebraska's passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach. He also serves as Scott Frost's associate head coach.

Joseph has nearly three decades of coaching experience, including time as a collegiate head coach at Langston University in Oklahoma. His role as NU's associate head coach is a familiar one, as he also served as assistant head coach at LSU (2020-21) and Alcorn State (2013).

Joseph was a key part of LSU's 2019 national championship staff. His receivers helped the Tigers set an FBS record with 60 touchdown receptions, while helping Joe Burrow rank third in FBS history in season passing yards (5,671).

Joseph has a proven track record of recruiting and developing wide receivers. Recognized as a Rivals Top 25 Recruiter, Joseph had four wide receivers selected in the first three rounds of the past two NFL Drafts (2020 and 2021). That includes Ja'Marr Chase, who was the 2021 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year after being selected with the No. 5 overall pick.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

LSU: Joseph came to Nebraska from LSU, where he coached for five seasons and helped the Tigers to the 2019 national championship. Joseph was responsible for developing some of the nation's top receivers during his time with the Tigers.

In 2019, LSU assembled the best group of receivers in SEC history. The Tigers' three starters—Ja'Marr Chase, Justin Jefferson and Terrace Marshall—

combined for 241 receptions for 3,991 yards and 51 touchdowns.

Chase was the 2019 Biletnikoff Award winner, earned first-team All-America honors and set SEC records for receiving yards and receiving touchdowns. Jefferson set the LSU record with 111 receptions. Overall, Joseph coached four receivers selected in the first two rounds of the NFL Draft during his time at LSU, including Chase, the fifth pick in the 2021 Draft and Jefferson, the 22nd pick in the 2020 NFL Draft.

A New Orleans native, Joseph was part of an offensive staff that helped LSU set numerous SEC records in 2019, including passing yards (6,024), passing TDs (61) and total offense per game (568.4) en route to a 15-0 season and national championship. Joseph also helped LSU post a 10-3 record in 2018 and a 9-4 mark in 2017.

In addition to his work with the LSU receivers, Joseph served as the Tigers' assistant head coach for his final two seasons. He also played a prominent role in LSU having a record five first-round picks in the 2020 NFL Draft through his recruiting and player development.

LOUISIANA TECH: Joseph joined the LSU staff after serving as the running backs coach at Louisiana Tech in 2016, where he helped the Bulldogs to a 9-5 record and a win in the Armed Forces Bowl. Louisiana Tech ranked second nationally in scoring and averaged 514.9 total yards per game.

GRAMBLING STATE: Joseph coached receivers and special teams at Grambling in 2014 and 2015, helping the Tigers to 16 wins in two seasons.

ALCORN STATE: Joseph was the special teams coordinator and wide receivers coach at Alcorn State in 2013, helping the school to a 9-3 record, its most wins in 30 years.

HOUSTON TEXANS: During the summer of 2012, Joseph spent time with the Houston Texans as part of an NFL minority internship. While in Houston, Joseph worked with the running backs and all aspects of special teams.

LANGSTON UNIVERSITY: Joseph spent five seasons at Langston University from 2008 to 2012. He served as the head coach in 2011 and 2012, when he led Langston to a 13-7 record.

CENTRAL OKLAHOMA: Joseph was the running backs coach at Central Oklahoma in 2004 and 2005, helping the school to an 8-4 record in 2004.

NICHOLLS STATE: Joseph was the quarterbacks coach at Nicholls State from 2001 to 2003. In 2002, Joseph helped quarterback Josh Son earn first-team all-conference honors as the Colonels finished 7-4.

ALABAMA STATE: Joseph's first job as a collegiate wide receivers coach came at Alabama State in 2000.

TULANE: Joseph's first coaching job at the FBS level was as a graduate assistant at Tulane in 1999.

WAYNE STATE COLLEGE: Joseph's first collegiate coaching job was as an assistant coach and run game coordinator at Wayne State College in 1997.

HIGH SCHOOL COACHING: Before working at Langston, Joseph served as the head football coach and Director of Athletics for Desire Street Academy, a private school in New Orleans' Ninth Ward area. Joseph guided the school through the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, including moving the school to Florida. Overall, seven of his players at the school signed with Division I football programs.

Joseph has had two other high school coaching stops. He began his coaching career as an assistant at Omaha North High School in 1995 and 1996. In 1998, Joseph was an assistant at his alma mater, Archbishop Shaw High School in New Orleans.

PLAYING CAREER (NEBRASKA)

Joseph was one of the nation's most prized prep recruits when he joined Coach Tom Osborne's Nebraska program in 1988. He was the Gatorade National Player of the Year and a first-team Parade All-American. Joseph started nine games in his Nebraska career, rushing for 1,091 yards and 16 touchdowns, while passing for 909 yards and 14 touchdowns. During his four seasons, Nebraska posted a 39-9-1 overall record, won two Big Eight titles, while playing in two Orange Bowl games, a Citrus Bowl and a Fiesta Bowl.

PERSONAL

Joseph earned his degree from Nebraska in 1993. He and his wife, Priscilla Arzaga Joseph, have four children: Jacob, Zachary, Makiyah and Malania.

Ruud spent his first four years in the profession in an off-field coaching role, but he was elevated to inside linebackers coach in January of 2018.

Ruud has made a big impact with the Husker inside linebackers. Most recently, in 2021 sophomore linebackers Luke Reimer and Nick Henrich combined for 207 tackles and both ranked among Big Ten leaders in tackles per game.

It should come as no surprise that Ruud has produced prolific tacklers while coaching Nebraska's inside linebackers. As a Husker linebacker himself, he recorded 432 tackles, 90 more than any other player in program history. Ruud then went on to make more than 650 tackles during his eight-year NFL career.

NEBRASKA (2014; 2018-21)

In his first season as a full-time assistant coach in 2018, Ruud's inside linebackers helped Nebraska improve by 27 spots in the national scoring defense rankings from the 2017 season and by 61 spots in pass efficiency defense. Both of Ruud's starting inside linebackers put together impressive seasons in 2018, with Mohamed Barry leading the team with 112 tackles, the best by a Husker linebacker since All-American Lavonte David had 133 tackles in 2011. Barry ranked second in the Big Ten in tackles per game and earned all-conference accolades.

Dedrick Young II also had a career high in tackles in his lone season with Ruud as his position coach. Young totaled a career-high 83 tackles in 2018 to end his career with 284 tackles, the fifth-highest total in Nebraska history. In addition to his career high in tackles, Young also broke up a career-high five passes and intercepted the first pass of his career.

In Ruud's second season, Nebraska's top three tacklers were inside linebackers. Barry led the Huskers in tackles for the second straight season with 89 stops, while Will Honas was second with 73 tackles, and Collin Miller was third on the team with 67 tackles. Barry earned All-Big Ten honors for the second straight season.

Ruud adeptly rotated inside linebackers in 2020 as the Huskers battled injuries. Honas led the group with 57 tackles, 6.5 tackles for loss and three sacks on his way to all-conference honors. Miller made 27 tackles in four games before a neck injury ended his playing career. The development of a pair of underclassmen highlighted Ruud's coaching. Sophomore Luke Reimer made 40 tackles and five tackles for loss, while redshirt freshman Nick Henrich moved inside late in the season and finished the year with 27 tackles. The play of the linebackers helped Nebraska rank sixth in the Big Ten in total defense.

Reimer and Henrich flourished under Ruud's coaching in 2021, helping Nebraska allow just 22.7 points per game, the best by a Husker defense in 11 seasons. Nebraska's 366.0 yards per game allowed also marked its best total in five years.

Reimer led Nebraska with 109 tackles, including five double-figure tackle games with 16 tackles against Buffalo and 19 against Purdue. Reimer also recorded six tackles for loss, broke up six passes and forced three fumbles and was an honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection. Henrich nearly joined Reimer in reaching 100 tackles, registering 98 tackles in his first full season as a starter. Henrich had three games with double-figure tackles, including a career-high 15 stops against Big Ten champion Michigan.

Ruud also served as a defensive intern at Nebraska in 2014. That marked his first venture into the coaching profession and came two years after his NFL playing career ended.

Following his NU career, Ruud was a second-round pick in the 2005 NFL Draft, when the Tampa Bay Buccaneers selected him with the 36th overall pick. Ruud spent eight seasons in the NFL, recording 658 tackles with six sacks, seven interceptions and six forced fumbles. He played six seasons in Tampa Bay and also played for Tennessee, New Orleans and Houston.

Ruud graduated with a degree in business management from Nebraska in 2005. He and his wife, Jenna, have two sons, Brooks and Hudson, and a daughter, Jaimes.

Donovan Raiola is in his first season as Nebraska's offensive line coach. Raiola owns 11 years of coaching experience, including four years as an offensive line coach in the National Football League.

Raiola joined Nebraska after spending four seasons as an assistant offensive line coach with the Chicago Bears. Raiola also coached offensive linemen at Aurora (Ill.) University, in addition to collegiate coaching stops at Notre Dame and Hawaii.

In addition to being in his sixth season as an offensive line coach, Raiola was an outstanding

2021 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Bryce Benhart played in every game in 2021 with 10 starts at right tackle. Against Fordham, Benhart helped Nebraska total 300 yards rushing and passing in the same game for only the third time in program history.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Benhart started every game at right tackle as a redshirt freshman. He was the only Husker offensive lineman to start every game at the same position in 2020. Benhart helped Nebraska's offense total 620 yards in a season-ending win at Rutgers, and the Huskers finished with the second-best rushing attack in the Big Ten.

Benhart played in three games and traveled to every road game as a true freshman in 2019, preserving his redshirt season. With Benhart providing a huge blocking presence, the Lakeville North offense scored at least 35 points seven times in its unbeaten season, capped by victories over Eden Prairie and Lakeville South in the state semifinals and finals. Benhart earned All-Minnesota honors from USA Today for his efforts as a senior. In 2017, Benhart helped Lakeville to a 7-4 record and a trip to the state playoffs. For his work on the line, Benhart was a second-team All-Minnesota selection by the Associated Press. Benhart was also a member of the varsity team in 2016, helping Lakeville North to a 9-2 record.

Benhart was also a standout on the wrestling mat. He finished fourth at the 2018 state wrestling championship and then went 34-0 as a senior en route to capturing the Minnesota 3A heavyweight title.

Benhart was ranked as the No. 2 player in Minnesota by both Rivals and 247Sports. 2020 (COVID SEASON)

Betts appeared in six games with one start as a true freshman. He caught 12 passes for 131 yards, ranking third on the team in receiving yards. Betts had at least one reception in each of the six games he played.

Betts was a member of Nebraska's travel roster for the Huskers' season-opening trip to No. 5 Ohio State, but he did not play in the game. He made his Husker debut at Northwestern and caught two passes for 17 yards. Betts caught two more passes and led Nebraska with 54 receiving yards in the win over Penn State. He scored his first career touchdown with a 45-yard catch against the Nittany Lions. Betts added a nine-yard catch against Illinois. He made his first career start at Iowa and had a 15-yard reception against the Hawkeyes. At Purdue, Betts caught a career-high five passes for 36 yards. He made one catch in his final appearance of the season against Minnesota.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (BELLEVUE WEST HS)

Betts came to Lincoln as the highest rated recruit from the state of Nebraska in a dozen years after totaling more than 3,300 career receiving yards at Bellevue West High School, including a Class A state-record 46 touchdown receptions.

As a senior, Betts helped Bellevue West to a 13-0 season and the Class A state title by catching 64 passes for 1,185 yards and 17 touchdowns, averaging nearly 19 yards per reception. Following his senior season, Betts was named an honorary captain of the Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska team. It marked Betts' third straight year on the All-Nebraska team, as he became the fifth three-time All-Nebraska player in the 99-year history of the team. Betts was also tabbed as a three-time first-team Super-State selection by the Lincoln Journal Star.

In his junior season, Betts battled through an injury to total 48 receptions for 856 yards and 12 touchdowns while earning first-team All-Nebraska accolades. Betts was also a first-team All-Nebraska selection as a sophomore after catching 57 passes for 1,035 yards and 15 touchdowns. He was only the seventh sophomore ever to earn All-Nebraska honors.

Betts was widely regarded as one of the top recruits in the country, and he was selected to represent Team USA in the 2020 International Bowl. Rivals listed him as the No. 12 wide receiver and No. 59 overall player nationally. Betts was also listed as the No. 111 player in the 247Sports Composite national rankings. Betts chose Nebraska over offers from Iowa, Iowa State and Minnesota, among others.

Alante Brown played in 10 games in 2021, catching three passes for 30 yards and returning five kickoffs for 77 yards. He made an 11-yard catch against Fordham for his first reception of the season. Brown also had an 11-yard reception against Purdue, and he returned a kickoff for 18 yards against the Boilermakers. Brown had a 19-yard kickoff return against No. 6 Ohio State. He caught an eight-yard pass at No. 19 Wisconsin and returned three kickoffs for 40 yards.

2021 (FRESHMAN)

After dealing with an injury during fall camp, Turner Corcoran played in every game and started Nebraska's final 11 contests in 2021. On the season, Corcoran started nine games at left tackle and two games at right tackle.

After playing extensively off the bench in the season opener at Illinois, Corcoran started the next four games at left tackle. Against Fordham, Corcoran helped Nebraska total 300 yards rushing and passing in the same game for only the third time in program history. Corcoran also started at left tackle against Buffalo. 2021 (FRESHMAN)

Isaac Gifford played in every game in 2021, including extensive action as Nebraska's nickel back in the final two games of the season. Gifford has made seven tackles on the season with one pass breakup.

He recorded one tackle on punt coverage at Illinois and had a tackle on defense against Northwestern. 2021 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Nick Henrich started all 12 games in 2021, finishing with 99 tackles, 3.5 tackles for loss and a half sack. During the regular season, Henrich ranked sixth in the Big Ten in tackles.

Henrich made a game-high 11 tackles at Illinois, including a half tackle for loss. After making four tackles against Fordham, Henrich posted eight tackles with a half TFL against Buffalo. At No.

3 Oklahoma, Henrich posted seven tackles. He made nine tackles, including his first career sack at No. 20 Michigan State. Henrich had four solo tackles against Northwestern.

He totaled a career-high 15 tackles against No. 9 Michigan, the third double-figure tackle game of his career. At Minnesota, he had seven tackles, including six solo stops and 1.0 TFL. Henrich posted his third double-figure tackle game of the season and fourth of his career with 14 tackles against Purdue, including a two-yard tackle for loss. He was also a member of the ESPN 300. Henrich also visited Wisconsin and had dozens of offers including Notre Dame, Iowa and Oregon to name a few.

2021 (JUNIOR)

Trent Hixson played in five games as a junior with two starts at left guard at No. 3 Oklahoma and at No. 20 Michigan State. He also appeared on the line against Fordham, Buffalo and Northwestern.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

2021 (FRESHMAN)

Nash Hutmacher played in 11 games in 2021, appearing on both defense and special teams. He provided valuable depth on the defensive line over five games, but he did not record a tackle.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Hutmacher gained valuable experience on the defensive line as a true freshman in 2020. He appeared in one game, making his Husker debut in the season finale at Rutgers.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (CHAMBERLAIN HS)

Hutmacher was a standout three-sport athlete for Chamberlain High School in South Dakota. In addition to being a three-time all-state football player, Hutmacher was also a four-time state champion in wrestling and two-time state champion in track and field.

Hutmacher was a three-time all-state selection who set several school records while finishing with 269 career tackles, 63 tackles for loss and 13 sacks. As a senior, Hutmacher had 88 tackles, 18 tackles for loss and four sacks. As a junior, he totaled 105 tackles (56 solo) with 11 TFLs, 10 sacks, 10 forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries. He also saw limited action at running back, scoring three touchdowns on nine carries.

On the wrestling mat, Hutmacher was a four-time state champion, the first four-time heavyweight state champion in South Dakota history and the first four-time champion in one weight class in state history. Ranked as the nation's No. 1 high school heavyweight wrestler, Hutmacher went 166-0 from his freshman to senior season. He first started practicing with the varsity team as a sixth grader and amassed 226 career wins and competed in six state tournaments. Hutmacher won each of his final 73 matches by pin - 71 in the first period - the second-longest pin streak in the history of high school wrestling. He became the first person to be named the Daily Republic Wrestler of the Year four times.

Hutmacher was 43-0 as a senior, with each win via pin including 30 within one minute. He won the Junior Schalles Award as the nation's best high school pinner. He went 33-0 as a junior with 32 pins and one forfeit en route to earning a spot on the 2018-19 USA Today All-USA Boys Wrestling Team. He was 46-0 as the state champion as a sophomore and 44-0 as a freshman state champion. Outside of high school competition, Hutmacher was a four-time All-American who won several event titles, including pinning three of his four opponents en route to the 2019 USA Wrestling Junior Folkstyle National Championship and winning the 2017 USA Wrestling Cadet Freestyle National Championship.

In track and field, Hutmacher won the Class A state title in the shot put and discus as a junior. Hutmacher was named the 2018-19 and 2019-20 South Dakota Boys Athlete of the Year.

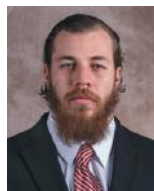

2021 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Rahmir Johnson played in each of the season's first 10 games with seven straight starts before he missed the final two games of the year with an injury. He ranked second on the team with 112 carries, 495 rushing yards and four rushing touchdowns, while ranking second with two receiving touchdowns and sixth with 16 catches and 197 receiving yards.

Johnson had four carries for 11 yards and a 13-yard kickoff return at Illinois. The next week against Fordham, Johnson gained 19 yards on five carries. Against Buffalo, Johnson had four carries for nine yards. He made his first career start at No. 3 Oklahoma, and he totaled 103 all-purpose yards against the Sooners. He rushed 11 times for 42 yards at Oklahoma and had three catches for 49 yards, both of which were career highs. Johnson also returned one kickoff for 12 yards against the Sooners.

He totaled 100 all-purpose yards at No. 20 Michigan State, setting career highs with 19 carries and 76 rushing yards. Johnson started and had 12 carries for 74 yards against Northwestern with a career-high two rushing touchdowns. He also had a career-long 23-yard rush against the Wildcats. Johnson had a career-high 172 all-purpose yards against No. 9 Michigan. In addition to rushing for 67 yards on 17 carries, he set career highs with seven catches for 105 yards. Johnson hauled in a 41-yard touchdown pass against the Wolverines, the first touchdown reception of his career. At Minnesota, Johnson had 11 carries for a career-high 83 yards and two touchdowns before leaving the game early with an injury. He had a career-long 29-yard run against the Golden Gophers. Johnson had 13 carries for 52 yards against Purdue, and he also caught a 12-yard touchdown pass against the Boilermakers. He rushed for 62 yards on 16 carries against No. 6 Ohio State and added two catches for 10 yards.

Johnson played in four games as a true freshman. He gained 64 yards on 21 carries with one touchdown, and he had one catch for 12 yards. Johnson carried the ball three times for nine yards in his debut against Northern Illinois. He also saw action in the backfield against Northwestern and Purdue, although he did not have a carry in either game. Johnson played a large role in Nebraska's 54-7 win at Maryland, gaining 55 yards on 18 carries, including a one-yard touchdown run. Johnson also had a 12-yard reception at Maryland, the first catch of his career.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (BERGEN CATHOLIC HS)

Johnson rushed for more than 2,300 yards in his career as a state champion at Bergen Catholic High School. As a senior, Johnson ran for 1,334 yards and scored 12 total touchdowns, becoming the first Crusader to rush for 1,000 yards since 2009. He was named a third-team all-state selection and a first-team pick among non-public schools.

Johnson rushed for 555 yards and six touchdowns on 90 carries as a junior, when Bergen Catholic won the state title. He also caught 11 passes for 97 yards and two touchdowns and had 23 kickoff returns for 428 yards. He rushed for 462 yards and three touchdowns as a sophomore.

One of the top 75 prospects in the country, Prochazka was a 2020 Sports Illustrated All-America candidate. Prochazka joined the Huskers as an offensive lineman after he was a two-way lineman for Elkhorn South High School. Prochazka enrolled at Nebraska in January.

Prochazka was a three-year starter on offense and two-year starter on defense. As a senior, he helped Elkhorn South to a state runner-up finish when he was named to the Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska and Lincoln Journal Star Super-State first teams. Prochazka was one of the most decorated Nebraska high school players during his career, as he was also an All-Nebraska first-team selection in 2019, one of only five juniors to make the team. Reimer finished with eight tackles at Illinois, including a half tackle for loss and a forced fumble that resulted in a Husker takeaway. He then made four solo tackles and added a quarterback hurry in the win over Fordham. Reimer totaled 16 tackles against Buffalo, then the most by a Husker since the 2015 season. He also intercepted the first pass of his career and returned it to the 1-yard line to set up a Husker touchdown on the next play. Reimer also recorded his first career pass breakup against the Bulls.

At No. 3 Oklahoma, he totaled seven tackles, a half TFL and a quarterback hurry. He made 11 tackles at No. 20 Michigan State, including 1.5 tackles for loss and a half sack. Reimer recorded five tackles with a pass breakup against Northwestern. Reimer posted double-figure tackles for the third time this season with a 12-tackle performance against No. 9 Michigan that included a seven-yard tackle for loss and a pass breakup. At Minnesota, Reimer recorded four tackles.

Against Purdue, Reimer recorded a career-high 19 tackles, the most ever by a Husker in a Big Ten Conference game and the most by a Husker in any game since Lavonte David had a 19-tackle performance against South Dakota State in 2010. Reimer had his fifth double-figure tackle game of the season against No. 6 Ohio State, totaling 10 tackles and a pass breakup. He ranked second on the team with five tackles at No. 19 Wisconsin and had one of Nebraska's two tackles for loss in the game.

Reimer finished the season with seven tackles, 1.0 TFL, one pass breakup and a career-high two forced fumbles against No. 17 Iowa. He came up clutch against the Hawkeyes, breaking up a 4th-down pass in the end zone to deny a touchdown, while forcing a fumble that was recovered by Nebraska with Iowa driving inside the Husker 15-yard line.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Reimer battled injuries to play in six games with five starts as a sophomore. He posted 40 tackles, 5.0 tackles for loss and 2.0 sacks, ranking second on the team in sacks and third in TFLs.

Reimer missed the Ohio State game due to injury but returned to make his first career start at Northwestern. Reimer led Nebraska with a then-career-high 10 tackles against the Wildcats, while also setting career highs with 1.5 tackles for loss and 1.0 sack. Reimer came off the bench to record four tackles in the win over Penn State, including a four-yard sack. He had seven tackles, including one for a two-yard loss, against Illinois.

Reimer led Nebraska with a career-high 12 tackles at Iowa, including 11 solo stops. His 11 solo tackles were the second-most by a Husker in a Big Ten Conference game, trailing only the 14 solo tackles Lavonte David made at Michigan in 2011. Reimer added five tackles, including a half tackle for loss, at Purdue. He made two early tackles against Minnesota before leaving the game in the first quarter with an injury. The injury also kept him out of the season finale at Rutgers.

2019 (FRESHMAN)

Reimer played in 10 games as a true freshman walk-on, totaling 11 tackles, including one tackle for loss. Reimer made his Husker debut on special teams against Colorado, and he recovered a fumble as a member of Nebraska's kickoff coverage unit. He also saw action on special teams at Illinois and made his debut on defense against No. 5 Ohio State, recording his first three career tackles from his linebacker spot. Reimer made his first career special teams tackle with a stop on kickoff coverage against Indiana. He added tackles on kickoff coverage in back-to-back games against Purdue and No. 15 Wisconsin. Reimer saw extensive action on both special teams and defense at Maryland, recording a season-high four tackles, including his first career TFL. Reimer made his final stop of the season with a tackle on kickoff coverage against Iowa.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (LINCOLN NORTH STAR HS)

Reimer was a two-way performer at Lincoln North Star. As a senior, Reimer earned Lincoln Journal Star Super-State honors as a linebacker, as he posted 74 tackles, 14 tackles for loss and a sack. The captain of the Journal Star's all-city team, Reimer added 328 rushing yards and nearly 500 all-purpose yards. Reimer earned honorable-mention all-state recognition as a junior, when he had 397 rushing yards and nine touchdowns with 838 all-purpose yards. He added 40 tackles, six TFLs and an interception. Reimer was selected to play in the 2019 Nebraska Shrine Bowl. Reimer had scholarship offers from Buffalo, South Dakota State, South Dakota, Northern Iowa and North Dakota.

Robinson made two stops at No. 20 Michigan State, including a one-yard tackle for loss. Robinson tied his career high with four tackles against No. 9 Michigan, while also registering a 13-yard sack for his first career sack and breaking up the first pass of his career. Robinson started at Minnesota and had a pair of solo tackles. He recorded one tackle against Purdue and added another tackle against No. 6 Ohio State. He turned down scholarship offers from Western Michigan and West Virginia and opted to spend one year at Old Farms prep school in Avon, Conn., to increase his football exposure.

The decision paid off, as Rogers helped Avon Old Farms to an 8-1 record in 2017 and a berth in the New England Class A state championship game. Following his season, Rogers received scholarship offers from numerous Power Five programs including Cal, Indiana, Ole Miss, Pittsburgh and Vanderbilt, among others. He visited Alabama and Ohio State in December before committing to Nebraska. Rogers was rated as a three-star recruit by Rivals, ESPN and 247Sports. ESPN listed him among the nation's top 90 defensive ends.

Rogers was a four-year member of the football team at Westhill High School in Syracuse before his one year at Old Farms. Rogers was also named a high school All-American in lacrosse after scoring 62 goals and compiling 79 points as a senior.

2021 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Logan Smothers played in six games in 2021 with a start against No. 17 Iowa in the final game of the year. On the season, Smothers completed 23-of-33 passes for 317 yards while rushing 37 times for 133 yards and two touchdowns.

He made his Husker debut by playing a little more than a quarter in Nebraska's win over Fordham. Smothers completed 4-of-7 passes for 50 yards and rushed four times for 36 yards. The next week against Buffalo, Smothers completed a career-long 54-yard pass in his only attempt, and he had a two-yard carry. Smothers saw action for one series at No. 20 Michigan State when starter Adrian Martinez was being evaluated for an injury. Smothers rushed three times for 11 yards against the Spartans and completed 1-of-2 passes for four yards. Smothers completed an 11-yard pass against Northwestern and rushed four times for 20 yards. He was the quarterback for the Huskers' final drive of the first half at No. 19 Wisconsin, rushing once for one yard.

In his first career start against No. 17 Iowa, Smothers completed 16-of-22 passes for 198 yards. He also led Nebraska with 24 carries for 64 yards and two rushing touchdowns, the first touchdowns of his career. Smothers had a career-long 24-yard rush against the Hawkeyes, while his 24 carries were the most by a Husker quarterback since Jammal Lord had 30 carries against Texas A&M in 2002.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Smothers did not play in a game in his first season at Nebraska, but he was a member of the travel roster for all five road games in 2020.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (MUSCLE SHOALS HS)

Smothers was a star high school quarterback in Alabama for four years. Smothers played his senior season at Muscle Shoals High School after his father, Shane, became the Trojans' offensive coordinator. Logan played his first three seasons at Athens High School.

As a senior at Muscle Shoals, Smothers helped the team to a 12-1 record by passing for more than 2,000 yards and 27 touchdowns and rushing for more than 800 yards and 13 scores. For his efforts, he was a second-team all-state selection in the state's second-largest class, and he earned honorable-mention all-state honors regardless of class. Following his high school career, Smothers was selected to participate in the Alabama-Mississippi All-Star Game.

Smothers played his first three seasons at Athens High School. He completed 65 percent of his passes and threw for 1,702 yards and 14 touchdowns as a junior, adding 832 rushing yards and nine touchdowns. As a sophomore, Smothers threw for 2,041 yards and 14 touchdowns, while rushing for 719 yards and eight touchdowns. He threw for more than 1,500 yards and rushed for nearly 500 yards as a freshman while accounting for 15 total touchdowns.

Smothers also ran track at Athens High School, finishing fourth in the 400 meters at the 2019 Alabama state indoor championship with a personal-best time of 51.34. Smothers also had a top-10 finish at the state championship in the 60-meter dash.

Smothers was a four-star recruit who was ranked as the No. 4 dual-threat quarterback in the country by Rivals, which also tabbed Smothers as the nation's No. 171 overall recruit. In the 247Sports Composite rankings, Smothers ranked among the top 15 dual-threat quarterbacks in the country. Smothers was the first commitment in Nebraska's 2020 class, and he chose the Huskers over offers from Louisville and Ole Miss, among others.

2021 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Garrett Snodgrass played in five games in 2021. He made his season debut against Fordham and finished with two tackles. Snodgrass added two solo tackles the next week against Buffalo.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Snodgrass played in every game as a redshirt freshman, contributing as a linebacker and on special teams while totaling five tackles. He made one tackle while playing special teams and inside linebacker at No. 5 Ohio State. Snodgrass saw the most extensive playing time of his career against Illinois, totaling a career-high four tackles in the fourth quarter, all from his linebacker spot.

Snodgrass also impressed in his time on the scout team, earning Nebraska Defensive Scout Team MVP honors.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (YORK HS)

Snodgrass starred as a versatile performer at York High School for his father, Glen. Garrett lined up at as many as seven positions, and his outstanding defensive play earned Snodgrass a selection as a semifinalist for the high school version of the Butkus Award in 2018.

As a senior, Snodgrass helped the Dukes to a 9-3 record and an appearance in the Class B state semifinals. On offense, Snodgrass completed 98-of-167 passes for 1,780 yards and 17 touchdowns, against just five interceptions, while rushing for 1,008 yards and 23 touchdowns. Defensively, he had 47 tackles, five tackles for loss and a sack. Snodgrass was a first-team All-Nebraska pick as a linebacker by the Omaha World-Herald and a member of the Lincoln Journal Star's Super-State team.

Snodgrass keyed York's run to the Class B state championship and a 12-1 record in 2017. On offense, Snodgrass rushed for 1,542 yards, threw for 692 yards and had 426 receiving yards. He paced the York defense with 86 tackles from his linebacker position. Snodgrass was the honorary captain of the World-Herald's Class B offensive all-state team and a member of the paper's All-Nebraska offense. The Lincoln Journal Star named him to its Super-State team as an all-purpose player. Snodgrass earned honorable-mention all-state recognition as a sophomore, while helping York to a 7-3 record and a state playoff appearance.

Following his career, Snodgrass played in the 2019 Nebraska Shrine Bowl, where he played on the South squad coached by his father.

A multi-sport talent, Snodgrass was a three-time honorable-mention all-state basketball player. He was a two-time state qualifier in the discus and finished fourth in the shot put as a senior.

Snodgrass committed to Nebraska in November of 2017, and only visited the Huskers, but did have offers from Iowa State and Kansas State. Allen had 360 rushing yards and four touchdowns against St. Thomas More, including touchdown runs of 82 and 99 yards on his first two carries. In the state quarterfinals, Allen had nine carries for 149 yards, including 54- and 65-yard touchdown runs.

Allen was regarded as a four-star prospect by 247Sports, On3 and the On3 Composite Rankings. Regarded as the No. 5 running back recruit in the nation by On3, Allen chose Nebraska after previously being committed to TCU.

CHASE ANDROFF

TIGHT END | 6-6 | 230
LAKEVILLE, MINN. | SOUTH HS

Chase Androff came to Nebraska after a standout career at Minnesota powerhouse Lakeville South High School. Androff helped Lakeville South to a 13-0 record and a Class 6A state championship in Minnesota's largest class as a senior.

He had 10 receptions for 171 yards with two touchdown catches as a senior in a primarily ground-based Cougar offense that had only 32 completions on the season. Androff earned second-team all-state honors from the Associated Press as a senior. Androff also helped Lakeville South to an undefeated season as a junior – when there was no state tournament due to the pandemic – and to a state semifinal appearance as a sophomore.

A three-star recruit, Androff was ranked among the top 50 tight ends nationally. He only visited Nebraska but had more than a dozen scholarship offers.

HUNTER ANTHONY

OFFENSIVE LINE | 6-6 | 320
TUTTLE, OKLA. | TUTTLE HS | OKLAHOMA STATE

Hunter Anthony joined Nebraska as a graduate transfer after spending four seasons at Oklahoma State. After redshirting in 2018, Anthony played in 23 games with five starts over the next three seasons. He has two years of eligibility at Nebraska.

Anthony helped Oklahoma State to a Big 12 championship and a Fiesta Bowl win as a junior in 2021, playing in 11 games. As a sophomore in 2020, Anthony started the season opener at right tackle before suffering an injury that kept him out for eight games.

Anthony appeared in nine games with four starts as a redshirt freshman in 2019. He started four games at right guard and one game at right tackle, helping the Cowboys rank in the top 25 nationally in total offense while paving the way for Chuba Hubbard to lead the nation in rushing.

Anthony earned his degree in marketing from Oklahoma State, and he was a two-time second-team Academic All-Big 12 selection. He played his prep ball for Tuttle High School in Oklahoma.

Hunter is the son of Mark and Carola Anthony, and he was born on Aug. 18, 1999.

JAKE APPEGET

OUTSIDE LINEBACKER | 6-4 | 210
LINCOLN, NEB. | SOUTHEAST HS

Lincoln native Jake Appeget joined the Huskers as one of the top players in the state of Nebraska. Appeget was a two-way starter for Lincoln Southeast High School.

Appeget was an Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska second-team selection as a defensive back and a Lincoln Journal Star second-team Super-State pick as a linebacker. Appeget was also a first-team all-state honoree as a senior. On defense, Appeget totaled more than 70 tackles with one interception and two pass breakups while helping the Knights to the state tournament. Offensively, he had 30 catches for 427 yards and eight touchdowns with 19 carries for 109 yards and one score. As a junior, Appeget was named a first-team Super-State selection by the Journal Star and was a second-team All-Nebraska honoree.

A three-star recruit, Appeget was ranked as the No. 6 player in the state in the 247Sports Composite rankings. He chose Nebraska over several other scholarship offers, including Minnesota.

JANIRAN BONNER

WIDE RECEIVER | 6-3 | 200
ELLENWOOD, GA. | CEDAR GROVE HS

Janiran Bonner was a standout wide receiver for Cedar Grove High School. He helped the Saints win three Georgia Class 3A state championships.

Bonner had 50 catches for 816 yards and nine touchdowns as a senior while helping Cedar Grove to a 12-3 record. He had eight catches for 150 yards and two touchdowns in the state championship game, including an 80-yard touchdown reception just before halftime that put the Saints ahead for good. Bonner was recognized as an all-state performer as a senior.

A consensus four-star recruit, Bonner was ranked among the top 50 wide receivers in the country by both Rivals and 247Sports. He chose Nebraska after originally committing to Georgia Tech.

OMAR BROWN**CORNERBACK | 6-1 | 200**
MINNEAPOLIS, MINN. | NORTH HS

Omar Brown came to Nebraska after three seasons at Northern Iowa, where he played in 29 games and recorded 140 tackles with 13 pass breakups and eight interceptions. Brown, who was an All-American and with the Panthers, has two years of eligibility at Nebraska with a redshirt season available.

As a freshman at UNI in 2019, Brown was named a third-team All-American by the Associated Press and a first-team All-American by Phil Steele. The FCS Defensive Freshman of the Year and a first-team all-conference pick, he totaled 77 tackles, six interceptions and three fumble recoveries, ranking third in the FCS in fumble recoveries and fourth in interceptions. Brown helped Northern Iowa to the FCS quarterfinals in his freshman year. In his second year, Brown started all seven games in an abbreviated spring schedule, finishing with 30 tackles, five pass breakups and one interception en route to honorable-mention all-conference accolades. Brown was also an honorable-mention all-conference pick in 2021, when he had 33 tackles, three breakups and an interception before suffering a season-ending injury.

Brown played his prep ball for Minneapolis North High School, where he was rated as the top cornerback recruit in Minnesota.

BRIAN BUSCHINI**PUNTER | 6-0 | 215**
HELENA, MONT. | CAPITAL HS | MONTANA

Brian Buschini transferred to Nebraska from Montana, where he was recognized as the top punter in the FCS. Buschini spent three seasons at Montana from 2019-21, and he has three years of eligibility of Nebraska.

Buschini played in 15 games at Montana, averaging 45.8 yards on 75 career punts. He had 30 punts of 50 yards or longer with the Griz, while placing 35 of his 75 punts inside the opponent's 20-yard line. Buschini also handled kickoffs for Montana, recording 35 career touchbacks.

Buschini started all 13 games for the Griz as a redshirt freshman in 2021, winning the Ray Guy Award as the top punter in the FCS. Buschini ranked third nationally with an average of 46.0 yards per punt in 2021, and he helped Montana lead the nation in net punting average. He punted 69 times in 2021 with 30 punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line and 58 punts covering 50 yards or longer. Montana did not play in the fall of 2020 due to the pandemic and played only two games during an abbreviated 2021 spring schedule when Buschini averaged 43.3 yards per punt, placing five of his six punts inside the opponent's 20-yard line. Buschini redshirted in 2019.

Previously, Buschini was a three-time honorable-mention all-state selection for Capital High School in Helena, Mont., where he handled both the punting and place-kicking duties.

DECOLDEST CRAWFORD**WIDE RECEIVER | 6-2 | 190**
SHREVEPORT, LA. | GREEN OAKS HS

Decoldest Crawford joined the Huskers after a standout career at wide receiver for Green Oaks High School in Louisiana. Crawford helped Green Oaks to three playoff appearances in his four seasons.

As a senior, Crawford caught 30 passes for more than 200 yards as the Giants started a freshman quarterback. He earned a spot on the Louisiana Sports Writers Association Class 3A all-state team as a senior. Crawford caught 50 passes for 813 yards and six touchdowns as a junior. In his high school career, Crawford had nearly 150 catches and more than 2,200 receiving yards.

Crawford was a consensus three-star prospect who was ranked among the top 20 players in Louisiana and the top 80 receivers in the country by Rivals. A former LSU commit, he chose Nebraska over Auburn, Texas and Florida after re-opening his recruitment.

JUSTIN EVANS-JENKINS**OFFENSIVE LINE | 6-2 | 280**
EAST ORANGE, N.J. | IRVINGTON HS

Justin Evans-Jenkins came to Nebraska from Irvington High School in New Jersey. In high school, Evans-Jenkins was a starter on the offensive and defensive lines.

Evans-Jenkins helped Irvington to a 12-2 record and a state championship as a senior in 2021. He was named an all-state selection for his efforts on the offensive line. Evans-Jenkins was also an all-state offensive lineman as a junior, when he helped the Blue Knights rush for more than 2,000 yards. As a defensive lineman, Evans-Jenkins recorded 52 tackles and five sacks as a junior. Evans-Jenkins also wrestles for Irvington.

A three-star prospect, Evans-Jenkins was ranked among the top 20 players in New Jersey by Rivals. He had interest from more than a dozen schools, including offers from Alabama, Cincinnati, Kentucky, Pittsburgh and Texas A&M.

ISAIAH GARCIA-CASTANEDA**WIDE RECEIVER | 6-0 | 185**
TWENTYNINE PALMS, CALIF. | TWENTYNINE PALMS HS
SADDLEBACK (ARIZ.) COLLEGE | NEW MEXICO STATE

Isaiah Garcia-Castaneda joined Nebraska from New Mexico State, where he played two seasons (2020-21) after beginning his career at Saddleback College. Garcia-Castaneda has two seasons of eligibility at Nebraska, and he also has an additional redshirt season available to use.

Garcia-Castaneda played in 12 games in his two seasons at New Mexico State, catching 42 passes for 639 yards and four touchdowns. As a sophomore in 2021, he had 37 catches for 578 yards and four touchdowns, including career highs of seven receptions, 106 receiving yards and two touchdowns at San Jose State. New Mexico State did not play in the fall of 2020 due to the pandemic and played only two games in an abbreviated spring 2021 season. In those two games, Garcia-Castaneda caught five passes for 61 yards.

Prior to New Mexico State, Garcia-Castaneda spent his 2019 freshman season at Saddleback College in Arizona. He caught 56 passes for 953 yards and 13 touchdowns in his only season at Saddleback, catching a touchdown pass in 10 consecutive games en route to all-conference accolades. Garcia-Castaneda played his prep ball for Twentynine Palms High School in California, where he scored 31 touchdowns as a senior while playing wide receiver, running back and quarterback.

JAEDEN GOULD

CORNERBACK | 6-2 | 190

SOMERSET, N.J. | BERGEN CATHOLIC HS

Jaeden Gould came to Nebraska after being recognized as the top player in New Jersey. One of the top recruits in the nation, Gould played both cornerback and safety for powerhouse Bergen Catholic High School, and he was named the 2021 New Jersey High School Player of the Year by MaxPreps.

As the top player in the state in 2021, Gould helped Bergen Catholic to its 15th state championship, a 12-0 record and a No. 4 national ranking. Gould was a big part of a Crusader defense that allowed 7.8 points per game. He led the team with four interceptions and recorded 27 tackles and two pass breakups en route to all-state accolades. In an abbreviated junior season shortened to six games due to COVID, Gould had 13 tackles and four pass breakups.

Gould was ranked as one of the top 25 cornerback prospects and one of the top 200 overall players in the country in the 247Sports Composite rankings, which also ranked him as the No. 2 recruit in New Jersey. Originally a USC commit until the Trojans made a coaching change, Gould chose Nebraska over Penn State, and he had scholarship offers from dozens of schools including Alabama, Clemson, Notre Dame, Oklahoma, Texas and Texas A&M.

ANTHONY GRANT

RUNNING BACK | 5-11 | 210

BUFORD, GA. | BUFORD HS

FLORIDA STATE | NEW MEXICO MILITARY INSTITUTE

Anthony Grant came to Nebraska with impressive credentials, as he was the top offensive player in the junior college ranks and he also boasts previous Power Five experience. Grant began his career at Florida State, playing in every game as a true freshman in 2018 before redshirting in 2019. He then played two seasons at the New Mexico Military Institute. He has two seasons of eligibility with the Huskers.

In his two seasons at NMMI, Grant rushed for 2,549 yards and 28 touchdowns. He averaged 7.1 yards per carry in his Bronco career and added 21 receptions for 116 yards and 16 kickoff returns for 354 yards. Grant averaged 127.5 rushing yards per game at New Mexico Military Institute, and he posted 10 100-yard rushing efforts in his 20 games, including four 200-yard rushing games.

In 2021, Grant rushed for 1,730 yards and 18 touchdowns on 241 carries, leading the junior college ranks in rushing attempts, rushing yards, rushing yards per game (144.2) and rushing yards per carry (7.2). He was named the 2021 NJCAA Division I Offensive Player of the Year and an All-American after he helped New Mexico Military Institute to a national championship.

In the Broncos' two playoff games, Grant rushed for 590 yards and six touchdowns on 60 carries, averaging 295.0 rushing yards per game and 9.8 yards per carry. In the semifinal against Northwest Mississippi CC, Grant ran 26 times for 398 yards and five touchdowns.

In his first season at New Mexico Military Institute, the pandemic limited the Broncos to an eight-game spring schedule. In those eight games, Grant ran for 819 yards and 10 touchdowns while averaging 7.1 yards per carry and 102.4 yards per game. He had a season-high 268 rushing yards and four touchdowns against Navarro College.

Grant began his career at Florida State. He played in every game as a true freshman in 2018, serving as the Seminoles' primary kick returner. Grant led FSU with 11 kickoff returns for 247 yards. He also had five carries and made nine tackles on special teams. Grant redshirted in his second season at Florida State in 2019.

Previously, Grant starred at Buford High School in Georgia, the same alma mater as fellow Husker running back Gabe Ervin Jr. At Buford, Grant was an all-state selection and the region player of the year as a senior.

Grant was regarded as the No. 1 running back recruit in the junior college ranks and among the top 20 overall junior college recruits by 247Sports. Rivals regarded him as a four-star junior college recruit.

MALCOLM HARTZOG

CORNERBACK | 5-10 | 175

SILVER CREEK, MISS. | JEFFERSON DAVIS COUNTY HS

Malcolm Hartzog was the first Mississippi native to sign with Nebraska since Byerson Cockrell in 2014 and was the Huskers' first scholarship recruit from the Mississippi high school ranks since Brandon Jackson in 2004. Hartzog was a standout on offense, defense and special teams for Jefferson Davis County High School.

Hartzog helped the Jaguars to state championship as a senior, when he was named Class 3A Mr. Football. A cornerback, running back and returner, he rushed for 131 yards and a pair of touchdowns in the state final and also had an interception and a pass breakup. On the season, Hartzog had more than 10 passes defended from his cornerback position. He also rushed for more than 1,200 yards and accounted for 44 total touchdowns, including 30 rushing touchdowns, three rushing scores and 11 combined kickoff and punt return touchdowns.

Hartzog was regarded as a three-star recruit by Rivals and 247Sports, and he was the MVP of the Mississippi/Alabama All-Star game after recording nine tackles and an interception. He chose Nebraska after also considering Ole Miss, South Alabama and Southern Miss.

COOPER HAUSMANN**DEFENSIVE BACK | 5-10 | 175**
ROCA, NEB. | NORRIS HS

Cooper Hausmann was a two-way standout for Norris High School, excelling as a quarterback and a safety. Hausmann threw for 1,612 yards and 20 touchdowns in 2021, while rushing for 497 yards and another seven touchdowns. Hausmann also saw action on defense for the Titans, recording 12 tackles and two interceptions. Hausmann was a first-team all-state honoree by the Lincoln Journal Star and was an honorable-mention all-state pick by the Omaha World-Herald. Hausmann led Coach Ty Twarling's squad to an 8-3 record as a junior in 2020, when he threw for 1,835 yards and 27 touchdowns.

A three-sport athlete at Norris, Hausmann played on the basketball team and was a standout on the track. As a junior, Hausmann finished second in Class B in the 100 meters, was fourth in the 200 and placed seventh in the high jump. Hausmann is the younger brother of Nebraska defensive back Ashton Hausmann.

ERNEST HAUSMANN**INSIDE LINEBACKER | 6-3 | 205**
COLUMBUS, NEB. | COLUMBUS HS

Ernest Hausmann joined the Huskers as one of the top defenders and overall players in the state of Nebraska. Hausmann was a two-way standout for Columbus High School.

Hausmann helped the Discoverers to a state playoff appearance as a senior. An Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska first-team selection, Hausmann made 80 tackles with eight tackles for loss, two sacks, two fumble recoveries and four pass breakups in his final season. Offensively, he caught 37 passes for 600 yards and eight touchdowns while rushing six times for 108 yards, including a 57-yard touchdown run.

Hausmann was regarded as a three-star prospect, and he was rated as the No. 5 player in the state of Nebraska and among the top 50 linebackers in the country by Rivals. He chose Nebraska after also considering offers from Arizona State, Iowa, Kansas State, Michigan, Michigan State and Minnesota, among others.

TOMMI HILL**CORNERBACK | 6-0 | 205**
ORLANDO, FLA. | EDGEWATER HS | ARIZONA STATE

Tommi Hill joined Nebraska after spending his freshman season at Arizona State in 2021. Hill has three seasons of eligibility at Nebraska, and he also has a redshirt season available to use.

Hill played in 11 games as a true freshman for Arizona State in 2021, finishing with nine tackles, including a career-high three stops against Stanford. He also returned four kickoffs for 79 yards.

Hill chose to attend Arizona State after being one of the top high school prospects in the country for Edgewater High School in Orlando. Ranked as one of the top 200 overall recruits in the nation and the No. 12 cornerback by ESPN, Hill won a state championship as a senior with Edgewater when he had four interceptions and eight pass breakups.

JACOB HOHL**PUNTER | 6-2 | 220**
LINCOLN, NEB. | SOUTHWEST HS
NEBRASKA WESLEYAN

Jacob Hohl joined the Huskers after spending two seasons at Nebraska Wesleyan in 2020 and 2021, where he was the Prairie Wolves' starting punter. Hohl has three seasons of eligibility at NU. Hohl's first season was postponed until the spring of 2021 due to the pandemic. The Prairie Wolves played in only one game, and he punted eight times for 329 yards (41.1 average) with two 50-yard punts and one downed inside the opponent 20-yard line.

In his second season in the fall of 2021, Hohl averaged 40.0 yards on his 56 punts and was a first-team all-conference selection. He had eight 50-yard punts and placed 18 punts inside the 20-yard line. A Lincoln Southwest High School graduate, Jacob's father Erich was a tight end at Nebraska in the early 1990s and was a senior on NU's 1994 national championship team.

EMMETT JOHNSON**RUNNING BACK | 6-0 | 185**
MINNEAPOLIS, MINN. | ACADEMY OF HOLY ANGELS

Emmett Johnson came to Nebraska as the top high school player in Minnesota. As a star running back and two-way player for the Academy of Holy Angels, Johnson was named Mr. Football by the Minnesota Football Coaches Association in 2021.

Honored as the top player in the state, Johnson rushed for more than 2,500 yards and scored 42 touchdowns in his senior season. He had at least 100 rushing yards in all 11 games as a senior, including seven 200-yard rushing efforts. Johnson also had eight four-touchdown games and accounted for more than 2,800 all-purpose yards. He also played safety for Holy Angels, recording 85 tackles and 13 tackles for loss in 2021. As a junior, Johnson carried the ball 174 times for 1,521 yards and 12 touchdowns.

In his prep career, Johnson ran for nearly 5,000 yards and had nearly 6,000 all-purpose yards with more than 130 tackles. He was a two-time District MVP, three-time all-district selection, two-time all-metro pick and an all-state honoree. Johnson was named the Offensive MVP for the South team in the Minnesota High School All-Star Game following his senior season. Johnson also plays basketball and competes in track and field for Holy Angels.

The top running back in Minnesota, Johnson was ranked among the top 10 overall players in the state. The three-star prospect chose Nebraska over scholarship offers from numerous FCS programs and interest from several Big Ten schools.

VICTOR JONES JR.**WIDE RECEIVER | 6-2 | 190**
ORLANDO, FLA. | OLYMPIA HS

Victor Jones Jr. came to Nebraska as one of the top players in Orlando. Jones was a star wideout for Olympia High School.

Jones had 53 catches for 847 yards and seven receiving touchdowns as a senior. He also averaged 30.3 yards per return on six kickoff returns. He ranked among the receiving leaders in the Orlando area and was named an all-metro selection for his

performance. As a junior, Jones caught 43 passes for 718 yards and 10 touchdowns in only seven games. He also added two rushing touchdowns and had two kickoff return touchdowns.

A three-star recruit, Jones was ranked among the nation's top 75 receivers by Rivals. He chose Nebraska after also considering Arkansas, Cincinnati and Kentucky, among others.

LUKE LINDENMEYER

TIGHT END | 6-4 | 250

LA VISTA, NEB. | PAPILLION-LA VISTA HS

Luke Lindenmeyer joined Nebraska as a walk-on tight end from Papillion-La Vista High School. Lindenmeyer has played on both sides of the ball for the Monarchs and was one of the state's top tight ends. Lindenmeyer helped Coach Tim Williams' team to a Class A playoff berth in 2021, catching 29 passes for 424 yards and six touchdowns. He added 24 tackles on defense and earned second-team all-metro and honorable-mention all-state honors from the Omaha World-Herald.

During his junior season, Lindenmeyer caught 35 passes for 444 yards and three touchdowns, while adding three sacks on defense. He earned honorable-mention all-metro honors in 2020. Lindenmeyer also saw action at tight end as a sophomore in 2019. Lindenmeyer also received interest from Columbia, Army, Southeast Missouri and Southern Illinois.

JALIL MARTIN

DEFENSIVE BACK | 6-3 | 190

CHICAGO, ILL. | KENWOOD ACADEMY

Jalil Martin is a tall and lengthy defensive back who came to Nebraska from Chicago's Kenwood Academy. Martin was a two-way player for Kenwood Academy.

As a senior, Martin was named a Class 6A all-state selection by the Illinois High School Football Coaches Association. He helped the Broncos to a city title and playoff appearance in his final season. Martin finished with 27 tackles, one interception and six passes defended. Offensively, Martin caught 12 passes for 263 yards and four touchdowns in 2021. Illinois did not play high school football in the fall of 2020, and Martin played in only three games during the abbreviated spring season. He was also a key contributor as a sophomore when Kenwood Academy made another playoff appearance.

Martin had offers from a dozen Power Five schools. The three-star prospect chose Nebraska after also considering Boston College, Colorado and Illinois, among others.

BLAKE MILLER

DEFENSIVE BACK | 6-2 | 185

NEBRASKA CITY, NEB. | LOURDES CENTRAL CATHOLIC HS

One of the top Eight-Man players in Nebraska, Blake Miller joined the Huskers from Lourdes Central Catholic High School in Nebraska City. Miller starred at quarterback and defensive back, and he helped the Knights to a 10-1 record and a trip to the state quarterfinals in 2021. Miller threw for 2,047 yards and 36 touchdowns, while completing 72 percent of his passes. He also

ran for 1,117 yards and 23 touchdowns, with five 100-yard rushing games. Defensively, Miller made 100 tackles as a senior. For his efforts, Miller was named the Class D-1 all-state quarterback and honorary offensive captain by the Omaha World-Herald and Lincoln Journal Star. The World-Herald also listed him as a second-team All-Nebraska selection as a defensive back, while the Journal Star tabbed him as a second-team Super-State pick as an athlete.

Miller earned D-1 all-state honors as an athlete in 2020, when he helped his team to a 6-3 record. In his career, Miller threw for 3,397 yards and 53 touchdowns, while rushing for 2,506 yards and 55 touchdowns. On defense he finished with 257 career tackles, 13 interceptions and five fumble recoveries. Miller also plays basketball for Lourdes Catholic and averaged more than 15 points per game in his career.

JAVIER MORTON

DEFENSIVE BACK | 6-2 | 185

ATLANTA, GA.

STEPHENSON HS | GARDEN CITY [KAN.] CC

Javier Morton came to Nebraska after spending one season at Garden City Community College in Kansas. He has three seasons of eligibility with the Huskers, and Morton also has an additional redshirt season available to use.

Morton played in nine games with Garden City in 2021, helping the Broncbusters to an 8-3 record. He totaled 20 tackles with one sack, two pass breakups and one fumble recovery. Morton also returned one punt for six yards.

Morton was originally committed to Alabama as a four-star prospect from Stephenson High School in Georgia. Morton was regarded as one of the top 35 safety recruits in his class.

TREY PALMER

WIDE RECEIVER | 6-1 | 190

KENTWOOD, LA. | KENTWOOD HS | LSU

Trey Palmer joined Nebraska after playing the three seasons at LSU from 2019-21. Palmer has two seasons of eligibility at Nebraska, and he also has an additional redshirt season available to use.

Palmer played in 28 games in his three seasons at LSU, totaling 41 receptions for 458 yards and three touchdowns. In addition to averaging more than 11.0 yards per reception, Palmer was an electric return man for the Tigers, returning both a punt and kickoff for a touchdown. He had 23 punt returns for 188 yards and one touchdown at LSU with 15 kickoff returns for 394 yards and one touchdown.

In 2021, Palmer caught 30 passes for 344 yards and three touchdowns, ranking third on the team in touchdown receptions and fourth in catches. He also returned 18 punts for 115 yards and seven kickoffs for 142 yards. In 2020, Palmer had 10 catches for 108 yards while returning seven kickoffs for 241 – including a 93-yard touchdown against South Carolina – and two punts for eight yards. Palmer earned playing time as a true freshman in 2019, when LSU won the national championship. He had a six-yard reception as a true freshman while returning three punts for 65 yards – including a 54-yard touchdown against Northwestern State – and one kickoff for 11 yards.

Palmer was a five-star recruit coming out of Kentwood High School, where he helped the Kangaroos to the Class 1A state title with more than 1,000 receiving yards as a senior. Palmer was regarded as the No. 20 prospect in the nation by Rivals. He was also a track standout, winning the 100-meter state title as a senior and capturing four 200-meter state championships, including a state meet record-time of 21.11 in his senior season.

CHUBBA PURDY

QUARTERBACK | 6-2 | 210

QUEEN CREEK, ARIZ. | PERRY HS | FLORIDA STATE

Chubba Purdy came to Nebraska after spending two seasons at Florida State from 2020-21. He has four years of eligibility with the Huskers.

Purdy played in three games with one start as a true freshman for the Seminoles in 2020. He completed 27-of-53 passes on the season for 219 yards and two touchdowns while rushing 19 times for 57 yards. Purdy earned the start at North Carolina State to become only the fifth true freshman quarterback to start a game in Florida State history. He accounted for 235 yards and two touchdowns in his lone start with the Seminoles. Purdy redshirted during the 2021 season.

Purdy was a four-star prospect for Perry High School in Arizona, where he was regarded as the nation's No. 6 dual-threat quarterback in the 247Sports Composite rankings. Purdy accounted for 9,000 yards of total offense and 111 touchdowns in two seasons as Perry's starter. Purdy totaled 4,423 yards of offense and 52 touchdowns as a senior, when he was the Arizona Offensive Player of the Year. As a junior, he passed for 3,425 yards and 36 touchdowns while rushing for 1,152 yards and 23 scores.

DeSHON SINGLETON

SAFETY | 6-3 | 205

**AMITE, LA. | ST. HELENA HS
HUTCHINSON (KAN.) CC**

DeShon Singleton joined Nebraska after spending the 2021 season at Hutchinson Community College in Kansas. He has three seasons of eligibility at NU with the ability to use a redshirt year.

Singleton helped Hutchinson to a 9-2 record, a top-10 ranking and a victory in the Salt City Bowl in his lone season as a Blue Dragon. He recorded 21 tackles on the season with 2.5 tackles for loss, a pair of interceptions and two pass breakups. Singleton joined Hutchinson from St. Helena College and Career Academy in Louisiana, where he played quarterback and safety.

A three-star recruit, Singleton was rated among the top 20 prospects in the 247Sports Composite junior college rankings. The No. 4 junior college safety, Singleton chose Nebraska after also considering Kansas and Kansas State, among others.

GAGE STENGER

ATHLETE | 6-2 | 200

OMAHA, NEB. | MILLARD SOUTH HS

Gage Stenger was one of the most versatile players in the state for Millard South High School. He played quarterback and defensive back for the Patriots.

As a senior, Stenger was an honorary captain of the Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska team, making the squad as a defensive back. He was also a Lincoln Journal Star first-team Super-State selection as an athlete. Stenger quarterbacked Millard South to an undefeated regular season and the No. 1 seed in the state playoffs. He threw for nearly 1,400 yards and 19 touchdowns and did not have an interception all season, while setting a Class A state record with six touchdown passes in a first-round playoff matchup with Omaha North. He also rushed for nearly 600 yards and 11 touchdowns. Stenger was also an honorary captain of the World-Herald's All-Metro team. Patriots' head coach Andy Means, who coached Millard South for 36 years, told the World-Herald that Means was arguably the best football player he coached in his tenure at Millard South.

A three-star recruit, Stenger was rated as the No. 5 player in Nebraska by 247Sports. He chose Nebraska over Kansas State.

BRODIE TAGALOA

DEFENSIVE LINE | 6-4 | 260

PITTSBURG, CALIF. | DE LA SALLE HS

Brodie Tagaloea came to Lincoln from California, where he starred for prep powerhouse De La Salle High School. Tagaloea was selected to participate in the 2022 Polynesian Bowl.

Tagaloea did not play football his freshman season, but he still earned a starting role as a sophomore in 2019. His junior season was disrupted by the pandemic, as De La Salle played a six-game spring schedule. As a senior, he helped De La Salle to a 10-3 record and a trip to the state playoffs. In addition to playing on the defensive line, Tagaloea was also a tight end for the Spartans.

A consensus three-star prospect, Tagaloea had offers from several Power Five programs. He chose Nebraska over fellow finalists California and Washington State, while he also considered Arizona State, Oregon and Oregon State, among others. His brother Boss played football at UCLA from 2016 to 2019, while his brother Beaux is a junior fullback at California.

CASEY THOMPSON

QUARTERBACK | 6-1 | 200

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA. | NEWCASTLE HS | TEXAS

Casey Thompson joined Nebraska as a graduate transfer from Texas. He spent four years in the Longhorn program from 2018-21 and has two seasons of eligibility with the Huskers.

Thompson played in 19 games at Texas, including 10 starts. He completed nearly 64 percent of his passes (185-of-290) for 2,422 yards and 30 touchdowns while rushing 73 times for 210 yards and five scores. Thompson had three career games with five or more touchdowns – all in 2021 – the most in Texas history.

As a sophomore in 2021, Thompson started the final 10 games of the season. He was 165-of-261 (63.2 percent) through the air for 2,113 yards and 24 touchdowns. Thompson was a member of the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award preseason watch list and was the Big 12 and national player of the week after completing 18-of-23 passes for 303 yards and five touchdowns with six total touchdowns in his second career start against Texas Tech. Thompson also tied the Texas school record with six touchdown passes and seven total touchdowns against Kansas, when he completed 30-of-43 passes for 358 yards.

Thompson redshirted in his first season at Texas in 2018. He played in four games as a redshirt freshman in 2019, completing 8-of-12 passes for 84 yards. Thompson saw action in three games in 2020, completing better than 70 percent of his passes (12-of-17) for 225 yards and six touchdowns.

Thompson went to Texas as one of the nation's top 225 recruits and top 15 quarterbacks by ESPN. He played his final prep season for Newcastle High School after beginning his career at Southmoore High School. Thompson totaled 12,840 yards of offense in his high school career, including 9,829 passing yards and 107 passing touchdowns with 3,011 rushing yards and 47 touchdowns.

Casey is the son of Kori and Charles Thompson, and he has one brother, Kendal. His father Charles played quarterback for Oklahoma in 1987 and 1988, while his brother Kendal spent three seasons as a quarterback at Oklahoma (2011-13) before playing two seasons at Utah (2014-15).

RICHARD TORRES

QUARTERBACK | 6-5 | 210
SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS | SOUTHSIDE HS

Richard Torres was the lone Texas native in Nebraska's freshman signing class. He starred at Southside High School in San Antonio.

Torres suffered a knee injury that cut his senior season short. He threw for 912 yards and 12 touchdowns in four games, while rushing 14 times for 76 yards and one touchdown. As a junior, he passed for 1,149 yards and 18 touchdowns, while rushing for 276 yards. Torres also played basketball for Southside.

Torres was a three-star recruit, and 247Sports ranked him among the nation's top 40 quarterback prospects. He chose Nebraska after also visiting Kansas State.

BRADY WEAS

LONG SNAPPER | 6-2 | 260
WHITEFISH BAY, WIS. | WHITEFISH BAY HS | GEORGETOWN

Brady Weas joined Nebraska after spending four years at Georgetown from 2018-21. Weas, who has one season of eligibility, played in 31 games at Georgetown, which did not have a season in 2020 due to the pandemic. Weas also also listed as a defensive lineman with the Hoyas, and he recorded 11 career tackles with a half tackle for loss.

Weas was previously a three-year starter and two-year captain at Whitefish Bay High School in Wisconsin, where he helped the school to the state playoffs as a junior and the state semifinals as a senior. Weas was a three-time all-conference pick and two-time all-suburban choice at defensive end and a two-time all-conference selection at offensive line and utility. He was also a member of the basketball, baseball and rugby teams.

CHARLIE WEINRICH

PLACE-KICKER | 5-11 | 190
LEAWOOD, KAN. | BLUE VALLEY HS

Charlie Weinrich joined Nebraska as one of the nation's top place-kickers. The Blue Valley (Kan.) High School product connected on 40-of-41 PATs as a senior and made seven field goals, with a long of 57 yards. Weinrich recorded touchbacks on 44 of 64 kickoffs and handled the punting chores for Blue Valley, helping his team to an 8-2 record and a trip to the second round of the state playoffs. As a junior, Weinrich connected on 7-of-11 field goals, including a 51-yarder and made all 29 of his PAT attempts in helping Blue Valley to a 6-2 record. Weinrich was a second-team selection to the prestigious All-Simone team in 2020, honoring the top players in the Kansas City Metro area.

Weinrich attended the Kohl's National Scholarship Camp in 2020 and 2021 and was among the leaders in kicking competitions at the camp. He also had interest from Iowa State and Kansas.

KEVIN WILLIAMS JR.

OFFENSIVE LINE | 6-5 | 330
OMAHA, NEB. | NORTH HS | NORTHERN COLORADO

Omaha native Kevin Williams Jr. joined Nebraska as a graduate transfer. He spent four years at FCS Northern Colorado (2018-21) and whas two seasons of eligibility with the Huskers.

After redshirting in his first season in 2017, Williams played in all 11 games with eight starts as a redshirt freshman in 2018. He then started nine games at left guard as a sophomore in 2019. Northern Colorado did play in the 2020 season due to the pandemic, but Williams returned to start the first two games of the 2021 season at left tackle before missing the rest of the year.

Williams also received interest as a transfer from Arizona State, Michigan State and Kansas State, among others. In high school, he was an all-metro selection at Omaha North.

Kevin is the son of Kevin Williams Sr. and Sabrina Stephens, and he is the cousin of fellow Omaha native Gabrielle Union. Williams earned his degree in sociology from Northern Colorado.

Champaign, Ill. (Aug. 28) - Nebraska rallied from a 21-point deficit late in the third quarter to pull within a touchdown, but Illinois held on for a 30-22 season-opening win.

The Huskers outgained the Fighting Illini (392-326), but a pair of pivotal second-quarter plays - a roughing the passer penalty and an Adrian Martinez fumble that led to a 41-yard scoop and score - to erase an early 9-2 lead.

Trailing 30-9, Martinez started the comeback with a 75-yard scoring run to make it 30-16 late in the third quarter. In the fourth quarter, Martinez engineered a 19-play, 91-yard drive capped by his four-yard touchdown pass to Oliver Martin with 2:41 left.

The Nebraska defense got a crucial stop with one minute left in the game to give Martinez and the offense one last shot to send the game to overtime. But Nebraska was unable to mount a scoring drive as time expired.

Martinez finished with 232 yards on 16-of-32 passing with one touchdown and no interceptions, while adding 111 rushing yards on 17 carries. Martin hauled in six catches for a career-high 103 yards and a touchdown.

The Huskers trailed 2-0 at the end of the first quarter after Cam Taylor-Britt was ruled down in the end zone when his left knee touched after fielding a long punt and retreating all the way to the goal line before slipping to the turf.

Nebraska answered early in the second quarter with the two-yard touchdown run by Markese Stepp on a drive that also featured a 30-yard reception by Stepp, as NU went 63 yards on seven plays. After a 3-and-out, Nebraska took over at its own 31 and a 43-yard pass from Martinez to Martin moved the Huskers into scoring position. However, the drive stalled at the Illinois 9, and Culp kicked a 27-yard field goal to put NU up 9-2.

Perhaps the game's most pivotal play occurred on the ensuing Illinois drive. On 3rd-and-7 at the Illinois 44, Caleb Tannor hit quarterback Artur Sitkowski in the chest just as Sitkowski released the ball. The pass was intercepted by Taylor-Britt, but Tannor was flagged for both roughing the passer and unsportsmanlike conduct, giving the Illini the ball back and a 30-yard gain to the Nebraska 24. Seven plays later, Mike Epstein, who led Illinois with 75 yards rushing, found paydirt on a one-yard blast to tie the game with 2:51 left in the half.

After an Illinois turnover, Nebraska took over at its own 39 with 58 seconds left. On 3rd-and-2 at the NU 47, Martinez was sacked from behind by Keith Randolph Jr., who knocked the ball loose. It was scooped up by Calvin Hart Jr., who raced 41 yards into the end zone to give the Illini a 16-9 halftime lead.

Illinois seized control on the opening drive of the second half with a 14-play, 75-yard march that consumed 8:04. Sitkowski went 4-for-4 for 30 yards on the drive, including a two-yard pass to Luke Ford to put the Illini up 23-9. Illinois extended the lead by going 47 yards on three plays on its next drive, highlighted by a 45-yard Sitkowski pass to Deuce Spann, before Sitkowski's one-yard toss to Isaiah Williams made it 30-7. Sitkowski finished 12-for-15 passing for 124 yards and two touchdowns in relief.

Lincoln (Sept. 4) - Nebraska produced a dominant and balanced performance with more than 300 yards rushing and passing on its way to a 52-7 win over Fordham.

Adrian Martinez completed 17-of-23 passes for 254 yards and one touchdown, while adding eight carries for 33 yards and two more scores. He piloted a Husker offense that rolled up well over 600 yards of total offense, including 329 rushing and 304 passing yards.

Markese Stepp led the Big Red ground game with 101 yards on 18 carries, while Sevon Morrison rushed for two TDs. Samori Toure pitched in a big game for Nebraska with eight receptions for 133 yards, while adding three carries for 35 yards, including a touchdown run. Martinez helped the Huskers build a 38-7 lead midway through the third quarter, before Logan Smothers led the Huskers on its final two TD drives.

Overall, Nebraska ran the ball 65 times and the Husker rushing total likely would have been far greater if not for an historic performance by Fordham's Ryan Greenhagen, who set a NU opponent record with 31 tackles, a Memorial Stadium record.

Nebraska's defense surrendered just 292 total yards on the afternoon, holding Fordham to 129 rushing yards on 28 carries. The Rams managed 163 passing yards, as Tim DeMorat completed 18-of-30 passes but was intercepted three times by the Blackshirts. Deontai Williams pulled down two of the interceptions while JoJo Domann snagged the other interception as all three turnovers led to NU scores.

Nebraska took a 7-0 lead on Martinez's first quarter four-yard touchdown run before Fordham tied the score on DeMorat's 31-yard touchdown pass to Fotis Kokosioulis with 14:14 left in the first half.

After that, it was all Huskers. Connor Culp put Nebraska on top less than three minutes later with his 39-yard field goal to make it 10-7. Martinez then pushed NU's lead to 17-7 with his second four-yard scoring run of the day. The Big Red's lead grew to 24-7 at the half after Morrison's one-yard touchdown blast with 29 seconds remaining in the half.

Nebraska's defense continued to put the clamps down on the Rams before Martinez connected with Chancellor Brewington on a two-yard touchdown pass to make it 31-7 with 8:24 left in the third. NU extended the margin to 38-7 less than five minutes later when Toure took an option pitch from Martinez and scored from eight yards.

Lincoln (Sept. 11) - Nebraska limited Buffalo to one score, while Adrian Martinez accounted for over 350 yards of total offense in a 28-3 victory over Buffalo.

Martinez completed 13-of-19 passes for 242 yards, including a pair of 68-yard touchdown passes to Samori Toure. The first came with 34 seconds left in the half to give NU a 14-0 lead, while the second one iced the game with just under six minutes remaining.

The game was scoreless until the second quarter when Martinez unleashed a spectacular 71-yard scamper inside the Buffalo 5-yard line. That run set up a 2-yard run by Gabe Ervin Jr., the first of two touchdowns by the freshman.

Martinez finished the first half 7-of-9 through the air for 116 yards, while carrying the ball six times for 110 yards. He finished the game with 354 total yards on 28 attempts, including nine carries for 112 yards.

Nebraska's final margin could have been greater had Martinez's apparent 26-yard touchdown pass to Toure on 4th and 3 on the fourth play of the second quarter not been called back because of an offensive pass interference penalty. Later in the second quarter, an apparent 56-yard touchdown pass to Zavier Betts was wiped off by a holding call on the offensive line. The Huskers also had an apparent touchdown taken off the board on their final drive when quarterback Logan Smothers pitched the ball down the 11-yard line on an option to Will Nixon, who sprinted into the end zone. An illegal forward pass was called, and the call stood upon an official review.

None of the adversity appeared to shake the Blackshirts, who got a huge play in the fourth quarter to help the Huskers take complete control of the outcome.

Linebacker Luke Reimer deflected a pass by Kyle Vantrease that bounded into the air. Reimer adjusted to the ball and plucked it from the air and returned it to the Buffalo 1, setting up Ervin's second score to make it 21-3 with 14:47 left.

Reimer finished with a huge game that included a game and career-high 16 tackles, including seven solo stops, to go along with his interception. Fellow linebacker Nick Henrich added eight tackles and a pair of hurries, while JoJo Domann contributed five stops, including a TFL, and a hurry of his own.

Ervin finished with 10 carries for 56 yards and two scores, while Sevon Morrison contributed eight carries for 24 yards. Overall the Huskers amassed 220 rushing yards on 41 carries, while adding 296 yards through the air, including a 54-yard connection between Smothers and tight end Chris Hickman on the final drive.

Hickman finished with career highs of three receptions for a career-high 90 yards. Toure finished with two receptions for 136 yards on his two 68-yard touchdown catches, marking his second straight 100-yard receiving day.

Norman, Okla. (Sept. 18) - Nebraska took No. 3 Oklahoma down to the wire in Norman, but came up just short in a 23-16 setback to the Sooners.

The Huskers held a high-powered Oklahoma offense in check for most of the day, limiting the Sooners to 408 yards of total offense, including 214 through the air. Nebraska nearly matched OU yard-for-yard, managing 384 total yards, including 289 through the air.

Oklahoma survived by converting three drives into touchdowns and adding a defensive two-point conversion after a blocked Nebraska extra-point attempt late in the third quarter. The Huskers were able to answer with two touchdowns and a career-long 51-yard field goal from Connor Culp.

Nebraska's Blackshirts kept the Huskers in it on the road with outstanding performances. JoJo Domann led the Huskers with 12 tackles and a pass breakup, while Deontai Williams added nine stops and a quarterback hurry.

Spencer Rattler marched the Sooners 75 yards on 14 plays in just under seven minutes to open the game. Rattler capped the drive on a one-yard plunge to five OU a 7-0 lead. Nebraska answered with Culp's 51-yard field goal after a 14-play drive of its own to make it 7-3 at the end of the first quarter.

Nebraska started the second half with the ball and marched into field goal range before the drive stalled in the red zone. NU attempted a 35-yard field goal that missed wide left.

The Sooners then put together another long drive, covering 80 yards in 10 plays on a march that took 5:29 and was capped by Rattler's one-yard touchdown pass to Jeremiah Hall to take a 14-3 lead with 3:50 left in the third quarter. Rattler finished 24-of-34 for 214 yards and one touchdown through the air.

Nebraska answered with eight seconds left in the third on Adrian Martinez's four-yard touchdown run to cap a nine-play, 75-yard drive to cut the margin to 14-9. But NU's extra-point try was blocked and picked up on the run by Patrick Fields, who returned it 100 yards to put the Sooners up 16-9.

Oklahoma firmed its grip on victory on a 12-play, 65-yard drive that resulted in a two-yard touchdown run by Kennedy Brooks that put the Sooners up 23-9 with 10:24 left.

Nebraska fought back, as Martinez then found Omar Manning streaking across the middle of the end zone for a touchdown to cut OU's lead to 23-16.

After Nebraska's touchdown, Oklahoma misplayed the kickoff, as Marvin Mims scooped up the ball at the OU 8 and dove out of bounds. But the Sooners strung together three first downs to cross into Nebraska territory and chew up more than four minutes off the clock before the Blackshirts forced a Sooner punt on 4th-and-5 at the NU 48.

Trailing by a touchdown, Nebraska got the ball back with just under a minute left in the game but was unable to move down the field without any timeouts.

Martinez finished 19-of-25 for 289 yards and a touchdown through the air in the game but was sacked five times.

East Lansing, Mich. (Sept. 25) - Nebraska held No. 20 Michigan State without a first down in second-half regulation, but the Huskers fell 23-20 in overtime.

The Blackshirts held Michigan State scoreless in the second half and led 20-13 before Jayden Reed's 62-yard punt return with 3:47 remaining tied the score. At the time, the defense had held unbeaten MSU to five yards of offense in the second half.

Adrian Martinez, who completed 24-of-34 passes for 244 yards in the game and rushed 21 times for 72 yards including both of Nebraska's scores, threw a third-down interception on NU's opening possession of overtime.

The Blackshirts gave up their only first down after halftime on Kenneth Walker III's 23-yard run to the NU 2 on MSU's first offensive play after the interception. But the defense backed Walker and the Spartans up one yard on the next two plays before Matt Coghlin kicked a 21-yard game-winning field goal.

Nebraska trailed 13-10 at halftime before tying the game on Connor Culp's second field goal of the game to cap a 14-play, 60-yard drive.

The Huskers continued to build offensive momentum as Martinez jogged into the end zone early in the fourth quarter to cap an 11-play, 80-yard drive to give Nebraska its first lead of the game at 20-13 with 7:29 left in regulation.

The Blackshirts continued to dominate, forcing three-and-outs by Michigan State on every second-half possession.

The massive edges in special teams and return yardage (320 yards) were enough to overcome Nebraska's edge in total offense, which was 442-254 on the night.

In addition to 316 yards of total offense from Martinez for the Huskers, Rahmir Johnson led all rushers in the game with 19 carries for 76 yards. Zavier Betts led the Husker receivers with five catches for 62 yards, while Samori Toure had five receptions for 42 yards.

Reed did the most damage for the Spartans in the game, hauling in four receptions for 59 yards including a 35-yard touchdown catch on a second-quarter flea-flicker that gave the Spartans a 7-0 lead. Reed also had two kick returns for 69 yards and totaled 192 all-purpose yards.

The Blackshirts completely shut down MSU quarterback Payton Thorne in the second half, as he finished with 14 completions on 23 attempts for 183 yards in the game. Nebraska held Walker to 39 yards on 16 carries in regulation.

Luke Reimer led the Blackshirts with 11 total tackles, including 1.5 tackles for loss and a half-sack. Nick Henrich pitched in nine stops and half a sack, while Garrett Nelson was a disruptive force in the second half and finished with six tackles and two tackles for loss with one sack.

Lincoln (Oct. 2) - Nebraska racked up 657 yards of total offense en route to a 56-7 rout of Northwestern on Homecoming.

The Huskers churned out 427 yards and seven touchdowns on the ground on its way to their highest scoring output in a conference game since joining the Big Ten. NU's 657 yards were the most against the Wildcats since at least 2005.

Nebraska sprinted to a 21-0 lead in the game's first 11 minutes on the strength of three touchdown runs by Martinez. The Husker quarterback moved Nebraska with his legs and his right arm, while freshman Jaquez Yant also carried a huge load, posting his first career 100-yard game with 127 yards on 13 carries.

Nebraska needed just 50 seconds to strike, as Martinez found Samori Toure for a 70-yard pass on the first play from scrimmage to set up his own scoring run two plays later. On the Huskers' next possession, Yant exploded for a 64-yard burst to set the Big Red up at the Northwestern 4. Two plays later, Martinez sprinted into the end zone from one yard out for the second time in five minutes to put the Big Red up 14-0. After a 3-and-out by the Blackshirts, Nebraska went 64 yards in 11 plays, as Martinez scored on a 25-yard run to make it 21-0 with 4:14 left in the first quarter.

Northwestern got on the scoreboard late in the first quarter, as Ryan Hilinski connected with Stephon Robinson Jr. on a 28-yard scoring strike. Nebraska rolled 75 yards on 10 plays in four minutes capped by Rahmir Johnson's five-yard touchdown run.

Trailing 28-7, the Wildcats had first and goal at the Husker 1-yard line, but JoJo Domann forced a fumble that Deontre Thomas recovered at the 10-yard line. Domann had 10 tackles, including three TFLs and two sacks for the Blackshirts.

Nebraska extended its lead right before halftime, as Johnson's second score of the day, a nine-yard run, made it 35-7. The Huskers put the game out of reach early in the third quarter, needing just three offensive plays for a pair of scores.

After the Blackshirts forced a three-and-out on Northwestern's first drive, Zavier Betts took a pitch and sprinted 83 yards around the left end to paydirt to make it 42-7. On the Huskers' next possession, Martinez found Toure, who finished with 108 receiving yards, for a 38-yard strike to extend the lead to 49-7.

Martinez completed 11-of-17 passes for 202 yards in the air, while rushing for 50 yards on eight carries in less than three quarters of work. Johnson added 74 rushing yards and two scores, as NU had 11 rushers and 11 players haul in at least one catch.

Lincoln (Oct. 9) - Jake Moody's 39-yard field goal with 1:24 remaining lifted No. 9 Michigan to a 32-29 win over Nebraska.

Moody, who went 4-of-4 on field goals, tied the game at 29 with 3:00 remaining. On the Huskers' next possession, Adrian Martinez fumbled while going for a first down and it was returned 19 yards to the NU 18-yard line. The Blackshirts held the Wolverines to a field goal, giving the Huskers a final chance.

The Huskers moved the ball to midfield after a 25-yard pass from Martinez to Samori Toure, but the Wolverines held on downs and escaped Memorial Stadium with a win.

Michigan took a 6-0 lead after a pair of Moody second-quarter field goals before Hassan Haskins' three-yard touchdown run capped an 11-play, 76-yard drive to give the visitors a 13-0 halftime lead.

Nebraska struck quickly to open the second half, going 75 yards in six plays, as Martinez connected with Austin Allen on a 46-yard touchdown pass. The Wolverines answered with a second three-yard scoring run by Haskins with 3:36 left in the third, but Michigan's two-point pass attempt failed.

Nebraska provided another quick-strike answer as Martinez capped a five-play, 75-yard drive with a 41-yard touchdown pass to Rahmir Johnson to cut the lead to 19-14. Johnson finished with the first 100-yard receiving game of his career, hauling in six receptions for 105 yards, while adding 67 rushing yards.

On Michigan's next possession, Deontai Williams intercepted a Cade McNamara pass and returned it to the UM 13-yard line. On the next play, Martinez hit Levi Falck on a 13-yard touchdown pass to give Nebraska a 20-19 lead with 52 seconds left in the third quarter. Martinez, who threw three TD passes, capped the score with a two-yard run for a two-point conversion to make it 22-19.

Michigan regained the lead on a 10-play, 75-yard drive capped by Blake Corum's 29-yard touchdown run with 11:21 left in the game. Nebraska regrouped and went 75 yards in eight plays, as Martinez's 5-yard run gave NU a 29-26 lead with 7:08 left.

The Wolverines then found another answer with a nine-play, 69-yard drive in 4:01 capped by Moody's 31-yard field goal to tie the game with three minutes left.

In an evenly played game, Michigan finished with 459 yards compared to 431 for the Huskers. Martinez led the offense with 18 completions on 28 attempts for 291 yards and three scores. He added eight carries for 38 yards and another touchdown and his two-point conversion. Haskins led Michigan on the ground with 123 yards and two scores, while Corum contributed 89 yards and a touchdown on 13 totes.

Minneapolis, Minn. (Oct. 16) - Nebraska could not overcome a slow start in a 30-23 loss to Minnesota. The Huskers trailed 21-9 at the half before the Blackshirts led the Huskers on a comeback.

On Minnesota's first possession of the second half, the Gophers drove to the NU 33 before Tanner Morgan's pass was picked off. The Huskers were unable to turn that interception into points, but on Minnesota's next offensive play, Morgan was intercepted again, this time by Deontai Williams - his fourth of the season - to put the Nebraska offense back in business. Rahmir Johnson then turned the Minnesota mistake into points with one-yard run to pull Nebraska within 21-16 with 9:19 left in the third quarter.

The Blackshirts then forced a three-and-out on Minnesota's ensuing drive, setting the Big Red offense up with excellent field position at the Gopher 47. Martinez quickly led Nebraska back to the red zone. The Huskers had first-and-goal and eventually got to the Minnesota 1, but Jaquez Yant was stuffed on fourth down. NU forced another three-and-out, but the Husker offense was unable to convert and missed a 27-yard field goal on the first play of the fourth quarter.

The score remained 21-16 deep into the fourth quarter and Nebraska gained possession with just under five minutes remaining and 89 yards in front of them. But on the first play of the drive, Martinez retreated in the pocket and was corralled in the end zone. He unleashed a ball toward the Minnesota sideline, but there was no Husker receiver in the area and he was flagged for intentional grounding, resulting in a safety. Just over two minutes later, Bryce Williams, who ran for 127 yards on 17 carries, blasted through the line on third-and-short and rumbled 56 yards for a touchdown to make it 30-16.

Nebraska rallied, as the Huskers went 75 yards in a minute, capped by a touchdown pass from Martinez to Austin Allen, who finished with five catches for a career-high 121 yards. NU tried an onside kick, but the Gophers recovered and ran out the clock.

Martinez completed 18-of-33 passes for 241 yards, while Rahmir Johnson led the Nebraska ground game with 11 carries for a career-high 83 yards and a score. Morgan completed 20-of-24 passes for 209 yards and two touchdowns. Chris Autman-Bell led the Minnesota receivers with nine catches for 103 yards and a score, while Mike Brown-Stephens added three receptions for 58 yards and a touchdown of his own.

JoJo Domann and Garrett Nelson led the Blackshirts with eight tackles apiece, while Cam Taylor-Britt, Deontai Williams and Nick Henrich all pitched in seven stops. Taylor-Britt and Williams added the two biggest defensive plays with momentum-changing interceptions, while Taylor-Britt also notched a 12-yard sack to stop another Gopher drive.

Lincoln (Oct. 30) - Nebraska held a three-point halftime lead, but Purdue won a defensive slugfest in the second half to earn a 28-23 victory at Memorial Stadium.

Nebraska took a 17-14 lead to the locker room at halftime after an evenly played opening 30 minutes. The Huskers led 7-0 after one quarter on the strength of a 12-play, 82-yard drive that was capped by Adrian Martinez's 16-yard touchdown pass to Omar Manning with 6:16 left in the period. Manning finished the day with a career-high four receptions for 75 yards.

Martinez and the Husker offense responded with a five-play, 75-yard drive in just 1:52, capped by Martinez's four-yard touchdown run with 10:45 left in the half to give the Big Red a 14-7 lead. Jaquez Yant did most of the damage for the Huskers on the drive, taking the opening carry 33 yards before adding an 18-yard run two plays later.

Purdue provided an answer of its own with a 14-play, 75-yard march that lasted 6:57 and culminated with a Zander Horvath one-yard touchdown blast to tie the score at 14 with 3:48 left in the second.

But the Huskers put up the final response of the half with the first field goal of Chase Contreras' career, a 33-yard boot with 1:20 left to give Nebraska the 17-14 lead. NU's final scoring drive of the half featured a 43-yard strike from Martinez to Levi Falck on the opening play.

Purdue took the lead for the first time on Aidan O'Connell's three-yard touchdown pass to Milton Wright with 2:47 left in the third, then extended the margin to 28-17 on O'Connell's nine-yard scoring strike to Jackson Anthrop with 10:05 left.

In the first 26 minutes of the second half, the Boilermaker defense surrendered just 68 yards to the Huskers. Leading 28-17 and possessing the ball after securing its fourth interception, Purdue appeared to have the game salted away, but the Blackshirts held on three downs and Nebraska used its timeouts to force a punt.

Martinez and the Huskers were pinned at their own 6, but covered 94 yards in just 1:30, capped by his 12-yard touchdown pass to Rahmir Johnson with 1:44 left. NU attempted a two-point conversion to cut the margin to a field goal but it failed.

Trailing 28-23, Connor Culp then attempted an on-side kick that provided Nebraska a golden opportunity, but the ball skipped over the outstretched hands of Cam Taylor-Britt and was recovered by Purdue tight end Payne Durham to seal the 28-23 win.

Luke Reimer led the Blackshirts with a career-high 19 tackles, the seventh-most in a game in school history and the most ever by a Husker in a Big Ten Conference game. Nick Henrich added 14 stops, while JoJo Domann contributed a career-high 13 tackles on the day for Nebraska.

Lincoln (Nov. 6) - Nebraska went toe-to-toe with No. 6 Ohio State, but four field goals by Noah Ruggles were the difference as the Buckeyes escaped from Memorial Stadium with a 26-17 win on Saturday.

Ohio State used a ball-control passing game to total 495 yards on the day, including 36-of-54 passing by C.J. Stroud. However, the Blackshirts got interceptions from JoJo Domann and Myles Farmer to stay within striking distance until the game's closing moments. Nebraska's defense held Ohio State to its lowest point total of the season. It was also just the third time in the past four seasons that the Buckeyes were held to just two touchdowns in a game.

Ohio State cracked the scoreboard with a 26-yard field goal by Ruggles with 11:25 left in the half. The Buckeyes went up 10-0 on a three-yard pass from Stroud to Chris Olave with 6:41 left. Olave finished with seven receptions for 61 yards.

Nebraska's offense found an answer with an eight-play drive of its own that concluded with a 39-yard Chase Contreras field goal to cut the margin to 10-3 with 3:46 left in the half. However, that score held for just one play, as Smith-Njigba took a short Stroud pass and turned it into a 75-yard touchdown to give the Buckeyes their biggest lead of the half at 17-3 with 3:34 left.

Two plays later the Big Red found a big answer when Martinez hit Toure at midfield and the Husker receiver outran the Buckeyes to the end zone for a 72-yard touchdown. The long throw and run cut the Buckeye margin to 17-10 with 2:53 remaining before halftime.

In a choppy drive that included a pair of negative running plays and an offensive holding penalty, the Buckeyes still pushed the ball to the Nebraska 29, where Ruggles booted a 46-yard field goal to go up 20-10 with just under 10 minutes left in the third quarter.

Ruggles' third field goal of the game, this time from 35 yards out, pushed the OSU lead to 23-10 with 2:05 left in the third quarter. Nebraska responded with a one-yard run by Martinez, cutting the deficit to 23-17 with 22 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

Ohio State was able to put up the only points of the fourth quarter with a Ruggles 46-yard field goal with 1:29 left.

In addition to his first quarter interception, Domann notched nine tackles, including a TFL. He also had two breakups and a quarterback hurry. Farmer added seven tackles, while Quinton Newsome and Luke Reimer both led the Blackshirts with 10 tackles.

Madison (Nov. 20) - Nebraska pushed No. 19 Wisconsin to the limit before falling, 35-28, Saturday afternoon at Camp Randall Stadium.

Trailing by seven with 3:50 remaining, Nebraska made one final drive with Adrian Martinez completing four straight passes before a pass interference call put the ball at the Wisconsin 11-yard line. After a holding penalty pushed the ball back to the 21, three straight incomplete passes set up a controversial fourth down play. Martinez threw toward Zavier Betts, who looked to be interfered with but no call was made, and the Badgers held on to keep their Big Ten West Division hopes alive.

Nebraska got off to an auspicious start on the opening kickoff, as Stephen Bracey raced 91 yards for a score to put the Badgers up 7-0 just 13 seconds into the contest.

The Huskers responded quickly, marching 74 yards in five plays to even the score. Martinez found Samori Toure for 42 yards on the opening play before a 27-yard completion to Toure two plays later got the ball to the Wisconsin 8-yard line. Two carries from Markese Stepp tied the game at seven.

Wisconsin extended the lead to 14-7 late in the first quarter, as Braelon Allen broke free on a 3rd-and-1 play and went 71 yards for a touchdown.

Nebraska's ensuing drive ended on downs at the Badger 6-yard line, but the Blackshirts forced a three-and-out and NU got the ball back at the Wisconsin 33-yard line. The Huskers would take advantage, going 33 yards in eight plays, as Martinez found Toure for a 4-yard touchdown pass to knot the score at 14.

Following a Badger touchdown, Nebraska answered with an 11-play, 75-yard drive capped by a Martinez 1-yard touchdown run to tie the game at 21 in the third quarter.

Wisconsin regained the lead with 1:30 left in the third on a 3-yard run, before Nebraska tied it back up at 28 with 6:27 left in the game on Marvin Scott III's 3-yard run. UW took the lead for good with 3:50 remaining on Allen's 53-yard scoring run.

Martinez completed 23-of-35 passes for a season-high 351 yards, his highest passing total since throwing for a career-high 384 yards at Wisconsin in 2018. In all, Nebraska gashed the Badgers' top ranked defense for 452 yards, more than double UW's average of 216.3 yards allowed per game.

It was a part of a record-setting day for both Martinez, who became Nebraska's all-time leader in total yardage, and tight end Austin Allen, who hauled in seven catches for 143 yards. Allen's 143 yards were the most ever by a Husker tight end, while he upped his season total to 36 catches, breaking the school mark for catches by a tight end in a season which had stood since 1978.

Lincoln (Nov. 26) - Nebraska led No. 17 Iowa by 12 in the fourth quarter, but the Hawkeyes scored 19 unanswered points to rally for a 28-21 win.

The game turned when Iowa, trailing 21-9, blocked a Husker punt and returned it 14 yards for a touchdown just 44 seconds into the final quarter. A Hawkeye safety four minutes later made it a three-point game and on the ensuing drive, Iowa tied the score at 21-21 on Caleb Shudak's fourth field goal of the game. Iowa then took its first lead when Spencer Petras capped a six-play, 76-yard drive with a two-yard touchdown run with 2:58 remaining. Nebraska, led by freshman Logan Smothers in his first career start, drove inside the Hawkeye 30-yard line before Jermari Harris denied the comeback attempt with an interception at the 2-yard line with 43 seconds to play.

The Hawkeye rally came after Nebraska led by as many as 15 and never trailed until the final three minutes. Things started well for Nebraska, which controlled the game for the first three quarters. The Huskers took the opening kickoff and marched right down the field, going 75 yards on 12 plays, as Smothers scored from two yards out just 5:42 into the contest. The freshman accounted for 67 of the Huskers' 75 yards on the drive.

Iowa came right back on its opening drive, but the Blackshirts got the defensive play they needed. Iowa had 1st-and-goal but on fourth down, Luke Reimer broke up a pass in the end zone, after the play was originally ruled a touchdown catch.

Iowa got on the scoreboard early in the second quarter on Shudak's career-long 51-yard field goal to cut the Husker advantage to 7-3 with 10:39 left in the first half. The Huskers answered with a 13-play, 75-yard drive capped by Jaquez Yant's 1-yard touchdown run. The Hawkeyes pulled to within 14-6 at halftime following a 48-yard field goal from Shudak with 39 seconds left in the half.

Iowa was threatening on its first drive of the second half and drove deep into Husker territory before Reimer forced a Tyler Goodson fumble and Deontre Thomas recovered at the Nebraska 6-yard line. The Huskers capitalized on the turnover, going on a season-long 94-yard drive that culminated with a Smothers' two-yard touchdown run to extend the lead to 21-6 with 5:54 left in the third quarter.

Iowa threatened again on its next drive, getting into the Husker red zone, but once again was forced to settle for a Shudak field goal, this time from 36 yards to cut the lead to 21-9 with 27 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

The game turned early in the fourth quarter when Henry Marchese blocked William Przystup's punt. Tyler Fisher recovered and went 14 yards for a touchdown. That sparked Iowa to a 19-0 scoring margin in the fourth quarter, while Nebraska was unable to overcome the blocked punt, safety and two turnovers in the final quarter.

2021 (JUNIOR)

The 2021 Big Ten Tight End of the Year, Austin Allen started all 12 games in a record-breaking final season at Nebraska. He caught 38 passes for 602 yards, the most season receptions and season receiving yards by a tight end in Nebraska history. Allen ranked second on the team in receptions, receiving yards and receiving yards per game (50.2) in 2021.

In the regular season, Allen led all Big Ten tight ends and ranked 13th nationally among tight ends in receiving yards. His average of 15.8 yards per reception also led all Big Ten tight ends and ranked sixth nationally among all tight ends. In addition to winning the Kwalick-Clark Tight End of the Year Award, Allen earned first-team All-Big Ten honors from the conference media.

Allen had two catches for 23 yards at Illinois before recording four catches for 61 yards against Fordham. Allen had an eight-yard reception on Nebraska's opening possession against Buffalo, but suffered an injury on the play and did not return. Allen returned the next week to catch six passes for 43 yards at No. 3 Oklahoma, setting a then-career high in receptions. At No. 20 Michigan State, Allen had four catches for 28 yards. He saw his streak of 13 consecutive games with a reception snapped in the win against Northwestern, but his perimeter blocking helped the Huskers rush for 427 yards. Allen caught two passes for 59 yards against No. 9 Michigan, including a 46-yard touchdown that marked the longest reception of his career. He had a career day at Minnesota, catching five passes for a then-career-high 121 yards, including a nine-yard touchdown grab. Allen's 121 receiving yards were the sixth-highest total by a tight end in school history and marked the first 100-yard receiving game by a Husker tight end since 2017. Allen had three catches for 28 yards against Purdue. He caught two passes for 33 yards against No. 6 Ohio State.

At No. 19 Wisconsin, Allen set career highs with seven catches and 143 receiving yards. His 143 receiving yards were the most by a tight end in school history, and his seven catches gave him the Nebraska season record for receptions by a tight end. Allen closed his career with two catches for 55 yards against No. 17 Iowa, setting the Nebraska season record for receiving yards by a tight end.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Allen played in all eight games with seven starts in 2020. He had 18 receptions and 236 receiving yards, eclipsing his career totals entering the year in both categories. Allen, who had at least one reception in every game, also caught the first touchdown pass of his career in 2020. Allen ranked second on the team in both receptions and receiving yards, and his average of 13.1 yards per catch was the highest of any Husker with more than five receptions.

Allen had two catches for 30 yards in the opener at No. 5 Ohio State. He caught a 26-yard pass that was Nebraska's longest reception of the game. He started Nebraska's next game at Northwestern and caught

two passes for 29 yards, including a 25-yard reception. Allen had three receptions in the win over Penn State, totaling 39 yards. He caught a 25-yard pass against the Nittany Lions, giving him a catch of 25 yards or longer in each of the first three games. Allen had a then-career-high five receptions for a career-high 43 yards against Illinois. He had 28 receiving yards on two catches at Iowa and had a 37-yard catch at Purdue.

After having at least 25 receiving yards in the first six games of the season - the longest streak by a Husker tight end in more than a decade - Allen caught an eight-yard touchdown pass against Minnesota, his first career touchdown and his only catch of the game. He helped Nebraska win at Rutgers in the final game by catching two passes for 22 yards.

2019 (SOPHOMORE)

Allen played in every game as a sophomore, including the first five starts of his career (Colorado, Illinois, Northwestern, Maryland and Iowa). He caught seven passes for 83 yards, five more receptions than he had as a redshirt freshman. Allen posted his first catch of the season with an eight-yard reception in the season opener against South Alabama, and he had a career-high two catches against No. 5 Ohio State. Allen hauled in a 24-yard reception against Northwestern. He added a nine-yard catch against Indiana and had a five-yard reception against No. 15 Wisconsin. Allen had his longest reception of the season with a 30-yard catch at Maryland.

Allen also made significant contributions in a win over Northern Illinois even though he did not have a catch. He recovered a fumble on special teams to set up a Husker touchdown and had a tackle to stuff a fake punt attempt short of the first-down line.

2018 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Allen played in all 12 games as a redshirt freshman. Along with adding perimeter blocking for a Husker run game that was the third-most improved attack in the country, Allen caught two passes for 54 yards. He hauled in a 13-yard reception vs. Bethune-Cookman for his first career catch before adding a career-long 41-yard reception the next week at No. 8 Ohio State. Allen's catch at Ohio State marked the longest reception by a Husker tight end in three seasons.

2017 (REDSHIRT)

Allen sat out as a redshirt in his first season in the program.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (AURORA HS)

Allen was regarded as the consensus top prospect in the state of Nebraska in the 2017 recruiting class. A three-time first-team all-district selection, Allen was limited by injury in his senior season, catching five passes and making five tackles and two sacks.

As a junior, Allen caught 41 passes for 507 yards and eight touchdowns, helping his team to a 12-1 record and a Class B runner-up finish. Allen also made 51 tackles, including five tackles for loss and had five interceptions from his linebacker position. Allen earned first-team Class B all-state honors as a linebacker from both the Omaha World-Herald and Lincoln Journal Star. Allen also saw significant time as a sophomore, catching 14 passes and helping his team to a state playoff berth.

In addition to being the top ranked player in Nebraska, Allen was ranked among the nation's top 25 tight ends by both Scout and ESPN.

PERSONAL

Austin is the son of Andrew and Renae Allen, and he was born on Nov. 10, 1998. Austin's father was a walk-on for the football team in 1981. Allen earned his bachelor's degree as a mechanized systems management major in May of 2021. Allen volunteered his time with local hospital and school outreach, the FCA, the Buffett Cancer Center, Husker Heroes, the Black History Arts Showcase and the Nebraska Football Road Race.

2021 (SENIOR)

Connor Culp started eight games at place-kicker in his final season, making six field goals and 28 PATs. He connected on a 27-yard field goal in his only attempt at Illinois. Culp added a 39-yard field goal against Fordham, and he scored 10 points against the Rams. At No. 3 Oklahoma, Culp connected on a career-long 51-yard field goal, the first 50-yard field goal of his career. Culp made n both of his field goal attempts at No. 20 Michigan State. He set a career high with eight extra points against Northwestern and made all three of PATs against No. 9 Michigan. Culp hit his second 50-yard field goal of the season at Minnesota when he connected on a 50-yard attempt. Culp is the first Husker to have multiple 50-yard field goals in a season since Brett Maher in 2012.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Culp had an impressive debut season as Nebraska's starting place-kicker in 2020. The graduate transfer was named the Big Ten Kicker of the Year in addition to being a first-team all-conference selection. Culp was 13-of-15 on field goals and made all 20 of his extra-point attempts. Culp led Nebraska with 59 points and he also had 12 touchbacks on his 40 kickoffs. Culp ranked second in the Big Ten and 15th nationally in field goals per game (1.6) and second in the conference and 13th nationally in field goal percentage (86.7).

In the opener at No. 5 Ohio State, he connected on both of his extra-point tries and made a 22-yard field goal. He also kicked off four times with one touchback, and Ohio State managed only 14 yards on two kickoff returns. At Northwestern, Culp was 2-of-3 on field goals, including a season-long 38-yarder. He also had two touchbacks on four kickoffs.

Culp made all three of his field goals and both of his extra-point tries in the win over Penn State. He added two touchbacks on his six kickoffs, while the four Penn State returns averaged only 12.8 yards. Culp hit a 30-yard field goal against Illinois and had one touchback on four kickoffs. He made a pair of field goals at Iowa, including a season-long 39-yarder.

At Purdue, Culp was perfect on three field goal attempts, including a 49-yarder that was the longest field goal by a Husker since 2016. Culp also had three touchbacks on eight kickoffs against the Boilermakers. Culp hit 1-of-2 field goals and had three touchbacks on four kickoffs against Minnesota. Culp tied his then-career high for the second time in three games with four extra points in Nebraska's season-ending win at Rutgers.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (DESERT VISTA HS/LSU)

Culp came to Nebraska as a graduate transfer after spending his first four seasons at LSU. Culp started 10 games as the Tigers' place-kicker as a redshirt freshman in 2017, and he was a member of LSU's 2019 national championship team. After redshirting in 2016, Culp started 10 games in 2017 and connected on 11-of-16 field goals, including eight consecutive makes at one point. He made four field goals against Ole Miss, tied for the second-most field goals in a game in LSU history. Culp also had three touchbacks in his 10 kickoffs as a redshirt freshman. Culp came to LSU as one of the top 10 kicker recruits in the country. A U.S. Army All-American, Culp made 12-of-15 field goals with a long of 51 yards and recorded 63 touchbacks on his 67 kickoffs as a senior.

Connor is the son of John and Karen Culp, and he was born on Aug. 8, 1997. Culp earned his bachelor's degree in general business from LSU and studied business at Nebraska.

2021 (JUNIOR)

Damion Daniels started the first 11 games in 2021 before suffering an injury at Wisconsin that kept him out for the final game. Daniels had four tackles against No. 6 Ohio State. Daniels had a pair of solo stops at No. 19 Wisconsin before suffering an injury in the first half which kept him out for the remainder of the game and the following contest against Iowa.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Daniels was a key member of Nebraska's defensive line as the Huskers' starting nose guard in 2020. Daniels played in every game with three starts, and he recorded 20 tackles and 4.0 tackles for loss.

He started at nose guard and made one tackle at No. 5 Ohio State. He added two tackles at Northwestern and made three stops in the win over Penn State. Against Illinois, Daniels made two tackles, including his second career tackle for loss. At Iowa, Daniels had a then-career-high five tackles, including another TFL. He made it three straight games with a tackle for loss in the win over Purdue, finishing with two total tackles. Daniels had a TFL for the fourth straight game against Minnesota, totaling four tackles against the Gophers. In the season-ending win at Rutgers, Daniels recorded one tackle.

2019 (SOPHOMORE)

Daniels played in every game as a sophomore, including making his first career start against Wisconsin. He posted three tackles against South Alabama, then matched his then-career high with four tackles against Northern Illinois. Daniels added one tackle the next week at Illinois, and he had three tackles against No. 5 Ohio State. After recording one tackle against Indiana, Daniels made one tackle in his start at nose guard against Wisconsin. He recorded his final tackle of the season at Maryland.

2018 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Daniels appeared in all 12 games as a redshirt freshman. He made his career debut in the opener against Colorado and had one tackle while helping the Huskers limit Colorado to 44 yards rushing. After making two tackles against Troy and one against Minnesota, Daniels recorded a season-best four tackles against Bethune-Cookman, including his first career tackle for loss. He added three tackles the next week at Ohio State. In a win over Michigan State, Daniels had one tackle and he recovered a fumble to set up Nebraska's game-tying, fourth-quarter field goal.

2017 (REDSHIRT)

Daniels was a preseason candidate to play as a true freshman and traveled with the Huskers to Oregon before sitting out as a redshirt.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (BISHOP DUNNE HS)

Daniels was a standout defender for Bishop Dunne High School. As a senior, Daniels finished with 78 tackles, 26 tackles for loss and nine sacks. He also forced three fumbles and had a blocked punt. His play helped Bishop Dunne to an 8-6 record and a trip to the finals of the Division 1 Texas Private and Parochial School playoffs. A team captain, Daniels was the TAPPS Defensive MVP in 2016 and earned first-team all-state honors.

Daniels also earned first-team all-state honors as a junior, when Bishop Dunne went 12-1, won a district championship and was the state runner-up. As a sophomore, Bishop Dunne won the state title and was 12-1. In the spring, Daniels finished second in the district in the shot put in 2016.

Daniels was ranked among the top 25 defensive tackles in the nation by both Rivals and ESPN. He chose Nebraska over Colorado and Texas-San Antonio and had dozens of other offers.

PERSONAL

Damion was born on Aug. 31, 1999, and is the son of Tony and Rhonda Daniels. He earned his degree in communication studies in May of 2020. Daniels volunteered his time with the Nebraska Football Road Race, Day of Service and local hospital and school outreach visits. He also served as a member of the Nebraska Student-Athlete Advisory Committee during his career. Damion's older brother, Darrion, was a 2019 Nebraska team captain. The Daniels were one of nine sets of brothers to both serve as captains in Nebraska history.

2021 (SENIOR)

Marquel Dismuke started every game at safety in 2021, finishing his career with a streak of 32 consecutive starts at the position spanning every game of the 2019, 2020 and 2021 seasons. Dismuke recorded 46 tackles, intercepted one pass and blocked one kick, finishing his career with 204 tackles to become only the eighth defensive back in school history with 200 tackles. For his efforts, Dismuke was selected as an honorable-mention All-Big Ten pick by the conference coaches.

Dismuke finished with six tackles against Illinois before making one stop and recording Nebraska's first blocked field goal since 2014 the next week against Fordham. Dismuke totaled a pair of tackles in the win over Buffalo. Against No. 3 Oklahoma, Dismuke recorded four tackles. He intercepted his first career pass and finished with two tackles at No. 20 Michigan State. He made three tackles against Northwestern and had one tackle against No. 9 Michigan. Dismuke had five tackles at Minnesota, including four solo stops. He totaled a season-high eight tackles against Purdue. Dismuke recorded five tackles against No. 6 Ohio State. He finished with a pair of solo tackles at No. 19 Wisconsin. In his final game against No. 17 Iowa, Dismuke had seven tackles to become the eighth defensive back in school history with 200 career tackles.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Dismuke was an honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection in 2020. He started all eight games at safety. Dismuke ranked fourth on the team with 47 tackles and set career highs with 4.0 tackles for loss and four pass breakups.

In the opener at No. 5 Ohio State, Dismuke tied for the team lead with seven tackles. He added three tackles at Northwestern and broke up a Wildcat pass that led to a Husker interception. Dismuke had a career performance in Nebraska's win over Penn State. He totaled a career-high 15 tackles against the Nittany Lions, becoming the first Husker to have a 15-tackle game in three seasons. Dismuke also broke up a pass vs. Penn State and recorded one tackle for loss.

Dismuke posted four tackles against Illinois, and he made a career-high seven solo tackles and a career-high two tackles for loss against Iowa. In the win at Purdue, Dismuke had three solo tackles, including a two-yard tackle for loss. Dismuke made five tackles and broke up a pass against Minnesota, and he had three tackles in the Huskers' season-ending road win at Rutgers.

The play of Dismuke and the rest of the Husker secondary helped Nebraska limit four of eight opponents to fewer than 200 yards passing.

2019 (JUNIOR)

Dismuke started every game at safety as a junior, totaling a career-high 67 tackles to lead the NU secondary and tie for third on the team overall.

He made four tackles in the season opener against South Alabama, including his first career TFL. The next week at Colorado, Dismuke totaled six solo tackles. He had seven tackles at Illinois while recording the first three pass breakups of his career. With Nebraska leading by four, Dismuke broke up passes on third and fourth down on the Illini's final drive to preserve the win.

Dismuke made eight tackles against Ohio State and seven tackles against Northwestern before totaling a then-career-high 10 tackles at Minnesota. Dismuke tied for the team lead with six tackles against Indiana and added seven tackles at Purdue, giving him at least six tackles in each of the first six Big Ten games. Dismuke registered two tackles against Wisconsin and had one tackle, a fumble recovery and a breakup at Maryland. He tied for the team lead with six tackles against Iowa.

In addition to being a productive run-stopping safety, Dismuke helped the Huskers hold six opponents to fewer than 170 passing yards in 2019, including three under 100 yards. Dismuke's play helped Nebraska allow its fewest passing yards per game (200.8) since the 2012 season.

2018 (SOPHOMORE)

Dismuke appeared in seven games as a sophomore in 2018, seeing time on both defense and special teams. Dismuke totaled nine tackles, including four special teams tackles. He made his season debut against Troy and posted two tackles at No. 19 Michigan the next week. Dismuke added tackles on kickoff coverage against both Purdue and No. 16 Wisconsin. He totaled a season-high three tackles - all solo stops on defense - at Northwestern. He was a force on special teams in the Huskers' win over Illinois, making a pair of tackles on kickoff coverage and blocking a punt that resulted in a safety. Dismuke's block marked the first blocked punt by a Husker since 2015. Dismuke concluded his sophomore season with a tackle on kickoff coverage at Iowa.

2017 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Dismuke appeared in all 12 games and made one start as a contributor in the Husker secondary and on special teams. Dismuke did not record a tackle in the first five games, but he did recover a fumbled punt to set up Nebraska's first touchdown against Northern Illinois. Dismuke made his first career tackles against No. 9 Wisconsin, finishing with a season-high nine tackles against the Badgers. He added six tackles against No. 9 Ohio State the next week before totaling three stops at Purdue.

Dismuke tallied seven tackles in his first career start against Northwestern, then had six total tackles and a then-career-high five solo stops at Minnesota. Each of Dismuke's 34 tackles came over the final seven games of the season, including four games with six or more tackles. Thirty-one of his tackles came at safety, and he added three tackles on special teams.

2016 (REDSHIRT)

Dismuke redshirted and worked on the scout team.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (CALABASAS HS)

Dismuke had a standout prep career at Calabasas High School in California. He had 66 tackles, including two tackles for loss and a sack as a senior. He also had four interceptions and added a team-high 11 pass breakups. Calabasas went 13-2 in Dismuke's senior season, won the Southern Section Canyon Division and was the CIF Southern Section West Division playoff winner. Dismuke starred for Compton Dominguez High School as a junior, helping the team to a 7-4 record and a trip to the CIF Southern Section playoffs.

Dismuke was ranked as the No. 4 safety in the country by ESPN, the 14th-best prospect in California and the No. 133 overall prospect. He was ranked among the top 20 safeties in the country by Rivals, Scout and 247Sports, which ranked him as the No. 247 overall prospect in the country, while Scout had him No. 254 overall.

Dismuke only visited Nebraska, but had numerous offers including Arizona State, California, LSU, Michigan State, Mississippi State and Utah.

PERSONAL

Marquel is the son of Nicole Samuel, and he was born on March 10, 1998. He earned his degree as a criminology and criminal justice major in August of 2020. Dismuke volunteered his time with the Nebraska Football Road Race, Day of Service and local hospital visits.

2021 (SENIOR)

A quarterfinalist for the Lott Trophy and a second-team All-American, JoJo Domann played in the first 10 games of his final season before season-ending surgery forced him to miss the final two games. In his 10 games, Domann posted 72 tackles with 9.0 tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, two forced fumbles, two interceptions and three pass breakups. At the time of his injury, Domann ranked eighth in the Big Ten with his 9.0 TFLs and 72 total tackles as one of only three Big Ten players to rank in the top 10 in the conference in both tackles and tackles for loss. Domann also ranked third among all active FBS players with nine career forced fumbles at the time of his injury.

Domann was recognized as a second-team All-Big Ten selection by the conference coaches and a third-team pick by the league media. The Associated Press named Domann a first-team All-Big Ten selection and second-team All-American, the first Husker All-American since 2014.

After making one tackle at Illinois in the opener, Domann tied for the team lead with five tackles against Fordham, including one tackle for loss. He also intercepted the first pass of his career against the Rams. Domann matched that effort with five more tackles and another TFL against Buffalo, when he also added a quarterback hurry. Domann had a terrific game at No. 3 Oklahoma, tying his then-career high with 12 tackles. Domann added a TFL and a breakup against the Sooners. At No. 20 Michigan State, Domann totaled four tackles, including a five-yard tackle for loss.

He had a huge game in the win over Northwestern, finishing with 10 tackles, 3.0 TFLs, 2.0 sacks and a pair of forced fumbles. Domann set career highs in TFLs, sacks and forced fumbles against the Wildcats. For his performance against Northwestern, Domann was named the Big Ten Co-Defensive Player of the Week. Domann had five tackles against No. 9 Michigan. At Minnesota, he recorded eight tackles with a three-yard tackle for loss. Domann had a career-high 13 tackles against Minnesota, his sixth career game with double-figure tackles and third this season. He then made a major impact against No. 6 Ohio State despite playing through a hand injury that required season-ending surgery a week later. Domann posted nine tackles with one interception, two pass breakups and a tackle for loss against the Buckeyes.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Domann started all eight games at outside linebacker in 2020 and was a leader for the Blackshirts, earning honorable-mention All-Big Ten accolades. Domann led Nebraska with 58 tackles, 6.5 tackles for loss, five pass breakups, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

Domann recorded six tackles and a fumble recovery in the season opener at No. 5 Ohio State. He added five tackles at Northwestern, including a tackle for loss. Domann had a career game in the win over Penn State, totaling a then-career-high 12 tackles with two TFLs. He had an outstanding all-around game against Illinois, finishing with eight tackles, 2.0 TFLs, a forced fumble and a quarterback hurry. At Iowa, Domann tallied seven tackles and tied his career high with two pass breakups. Domann led Nebraska with 11 tackles at Purdue, his second career game with double-digit tackles. Domann made seven tackles against Minnesota, and he had two tackles, a TFL and a pass breakup in the Huskers' season-ending win at Rutgers.

2019 (JUNIOR)

Domann made the full-time switch to outside linebacker as a junior after playing primarily safety in his first three years on campus. Domann played extensively in every game as a junior, starting six games and recording 52 tackles. He ranked second on the team with 11 TFLs, six pass breakups and two forced fumbles and fourth with 2.5 sacks, all of which were career highs.

He had an impressive start to the year with four tackles, two tackles for loss and one breakup in the opener against South Alabama. He added two solo tackles the next week at Colorado before recording six tackles, a TFL and a pass breakup against Northern Illinois. Domann played a big role in Nebraska's win at Illinois in the Big Ten opener, totaling five tackles and tying his then-career high with two TFLs and 1.0 sack. In addition to a 10-yard sack, Domann also forced his first fumble of the season against the Illini and had the first quarterback hurry of his career.

Domann earned his first start of the season against No. 5 Ohio State and finished with four tackles, including a half-sack against the Buckeyes. He started again the next week against Northwestern and had a then-career-high seven tackles, while tying his career high with two TFLs and adding one pass breakup. After making one tackle at Minnesota, Domann tied for the team lead with six stops against Indiana, including one tackle for loss. The next week at Purdue, Domann had eight tackles, including one TFL. Against No. 15 Wisconsin, Domann recorded three tackles and forced a fumble that was recovered by the Huskers to set up a touchdown. At Maryland, he had a sack and a pass breakup in the Huskers' 54-7 win. Domann concluded his junior season with four tackles and a career-high two breakups against Iowa.

2018 (SOPHOMORE)

Domann saw action at both safety and outside linebacker, starting two games at outside linebacker in November. He finished with 19 tackles while recording his first career tackle for loss and first career sack. Domann also tied for the team lead with two forced fumbles, and he recovered one fumble and broke up a pair of passes.

Domann played in the season opener against Colorado and had a tackle on special teams but missed the next four games with an injury. He returned in a special teams role at Northwestern and saw action on special teams and defense in the win over Minnesota. Against Bethune-Cookman, Domann had one tackle, a forced fumble and the first pass breakup of his career. Domann then earned his first career start the next week at No. 8 Ohio State, recording seven tackles - including a seven-yard sack - while forcing a fumble and breaking up a pass for the second straight game. Domann started again the next week against Illinois, and he made five tackles and recovered a fumble. In a win over Michigan State, Domann had four stops, his third straight game with at least four tackles.

2017 (REDSHIRT)

Domann sat out his sophomore season as a redshirt with an injury.

2016 (FRESHMAN)

Domann saw action in every game, primarily on special teams coverage units. He had eight tackles, all on special teams. He also forced a fumble on kickoff coverage in the Music City Bowl against Tennessee. His eight special teams tackles ranked third among the Huskers.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (PINE CREEK HS)

One of the top prospects in Colorado, Domann helped Pine Creek to a 38-3 record in his final three seasons, including two Class 4A state titles. Domann was named the Prep Colorado Player of the Year and an All-Colorado pick as senior. Domann totaled 34 tackles, including 4.5 tackles for loss, and averaged 43 yards per punt, made three field goals and connected on 34-of-37 extra-point tries.

As a junior, Domann helped Pine Creek to a Class 4A state title and a 14-0 record. Domann recorded 61 tackles, while adding seven TFLs and seven interceptions. As a sophomore, Domann had 44 tackles and earned first-team all-area honors.

Domann was ranked as the top player in Colorado and among the top 350 players nationally by 247Sports.

2021 (SENIOR)

Levi Falck played in every game in 2021 with four starts, catching 18 passes for 223 yards and one touchdown. Falck made his first catch of the year with an eight-yard reception in the win over Fordham. Falck added a 20-yard catch at No. 3 Oklahoma. He had a 22-yard reception at No. 20 Michigan State. He had three catches for 38 yards against Northwestern. Falck caught three passes for 31 yards against No. 9 Michigan, including a 13-yard touchdown. He surpassed 1,000 career receiving yards against the Wolverines, and he also had a six-yard carry on an option play.

In his return to his home state of Minnesota, Falck caught four passes for 36 yards against the Golden Gophers. Against Purdue, Falck hauled in a 23-yard pass for the longest reception of his career. Falck earned the start against No. 6 Ohio State but did not have a catch. He caught two passes for 17 yards at No. 19 Wisconsin. He had two catches for eight yards in his final game against No. 17 Iowa, recording his 100th collegiate reception against the Hawkeyes.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Falck played in all eight games with four starts in 2020. He caught a pass in seven of his eight games and had 13 catches for 122 yards and one touchdown, ranking third on the team in catches and fourth in yards.

He had an eight-yard catch in his Husker debut at Ohio State and caught a six-yard pass at Northwestern. Falck had a 21-yard grab in the win against Penn State. He caught two passes for 11 yards against Illinois, including a four-yard touchdown. Falck added two catches for 22 yards at Iowa. He had his most productive day in the win at Purdue, catching five passes for 39 yards. Falck also blocked a punt, setting Nebraska up at the Boilermaker 1-yard line. After being held without a catch against Minnesota, Falck had a 15-yard reception in the win at Rutgers.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (CENTENNIAL HS/SOUTH DAKOTA)

Falck joined Nebraska as a graduate transfer from South Dakota. He played in 24 games and made 14 starts with the Coyotes from 2016 to 2019, catching 70 passes for 774 yards and a pair of touchdowns. After redshirting in 2016, Falck caught 16 passes for 197 yards in seven games as a redshirt freshman in 2017. As a sophomore in 2018, he played in all 11 games and earned nine starts, ranking second on the team with 45 catches and third with 492 receiving yards and two touchdowns. He tied the South Dakota record with 11 catches against Kansas State and had a career-high 140 receiving yards against the Wildcats. Falck battled injuries as a junior in 2019, catching nine passes for 85 yards.

2021 (SOPHOMORE)

Cam Jurgens started every game at center in 2021, stretching his streak to 18 consecutive starts at the position. He was one of the top centers in the Big Ten, earning third-team all-conference accolades from the coaches and honorable-mention recognition from the media.

Against Fordham, Jurgens helped Nebraska total 300 yards rushing and passing in the same game for only the third time in program history. He also helped Nebraska rush for 427 yards against Northwestern, when the Huskers totaled 657 yards of offense and 56 points, Nebraska's highest scoring output in a Big Ten game.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Jurgens started seven of eight games at center as a sophomore. He earned his 13th consecutive start at center in the Huskers' season opener at No. 5 Ohio State, before an injury kept him out of the Northwestern game. He returned to start the final six games, including the season finale at Rutgers, when Nebraska had 620 yards of total offense. Jurgens helped the Huskers rank second in the Big Ten in rushing.

2019 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Jurgens started every game at center in 2019. He made history in the season opener against South Alabama, becoming the first Husker freshman (true or redshirt) to start a game at center since the NCAA restored freshmen eligibility in 1972. Jurgens helped Nebraska rank third in the Big Ten in rushing offense and fifth in total offense.

Jurgens played a key role in Nebraska producing its most total yards in a Big Ten Conference game (690 yards at Illinois). Against Illinois, the Huskers totaled 300 yards rushing and 300 yards passing for just the second time in school history en route to gaining the most yards in any conference game since 2007. Nebraska also set a school record for team completion percentage against Indiana (87.0 percent).

2018 (REDSHIRT)

Jurgens worked at both tight end and center in his first year. He played in one game, lining up at tight end against Troy.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (BEATRICE HS)

Jurgens was a three-sport star at Beatrice High School. As a hybrid tight end, he rushed for 318 yards and eight touchdowns as a senior, while also catching 17 passes for 277 yards. Jurgens was named to the Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska and Lincoln Journal Star Super-State first team in addition to being a first-team all-state selection.

Jurgens was also an All-Nebraska and Super-State selection at linebacker as a junior, when he led Beatrice with 98 tackles. He added 23 catches for 286 yards as a tight end. Jurgens was a second-team Super-State selection as a sophomore, when he was one of only two underclassmen to make either the Super-State first or second team.

Jurgens also excelled on the basketball court and in the discus and shot put, which helped him earn the honor as the 2017 Lincoln Journal Star Boys Athlete of the Year. Jurgens was a four-time Class B state champion in the discus and three-time champion in the shot put.

He was ranked among the nation's top 200 recruits in the 247Sports Composite rankings and was the No. 4 tight end in the ESPN rankings.

2020 (JUNIOR)

Lane McCallum played in 11 games in 2021. He saw action at safety in Nebraska's wins over Fordham and Buffalo, and he played on special teams against No. 3 Oklahoma, No. 20 Michigan State, Northwestern, No. 9 Michigan and Minnesota, Purdue, No. 6 Ohio State, No. 19 Wisconsin and No. 17 Iowa.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

McCallum added depth to a veteran Husker secondary in 2020. Although he did not play in a game, McCallum was on Nebraska's travel roster for the Ohio State, Northwestern and Rutgers games.

2019 (SOPHOMORE)

McCallum added depth at safety during his sophomore season, and he saw the field as an emergency place-kicker early in the year. McCallum kicked in five games for the Huskers in 2019, including four games as Nebraska's starting place-kicker.

McCallum made his Nebraska debut against Northern Illinois, connecting on all three of his extra-point tries. He attempted the first field goal of his career at Illinois and made four of his five PAT attempts against the Illini. He made the first two field goals of his career in Nebraska's 13-10 win over Northwestern. McCallum made a 35-yarder in the first quarter then hit the game-winning 24-yarder as time expired for the third walk-off win in the 96-year history of Memorial Stadium.

2018 (TRANSFER)

Per NCAA rules, McCallum sat out the 2018 season after transferring from Air Force. Despite being unable to play, McCallum gained valuable experience in the program while adding depth to the NU secondary.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (NORFOLK HS/AIR FORCE)

McCallum spent the 2017 season as a kicker at the Air Force Academy. He graduated from Norfolk High School in 2017. As a senior in 2016, McCallum was a Lincoln Journal Star Super-State selection after rushing for 1,149 yards and 13 touchdowns on offense, as he helped the Panthers to the Class A state playoffs. He also finished fourth on the team in tackles on the defensive side of the ball. An All-Nebraska kicker, McCallum set Norfolk's school record for points scored in a career with 354, as he made 120 of 123 extra points and 20 of 31 field goals in his career. McCallum also participated in basketball and soccer at Norfolk.

Matt Sichterman started all 12 games at right guard in 2021. Against Fordham, Sichterman helped Nebraska total 300 yards rushing and passing in the same game for only the third time in program history. Against Northwestern, Sichterman helped the Huskers rush for 427 yards, gain 657 yards of offense and score the most points Nebraska has scored in a Big Ten Conference game (56).

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Sichterman played in every game as a junior. He saw action on the offensive line and on special teams in the opener at No. 5 Ohio State and played on special teams against Northwestern, Penn State, Illinois, Iowa, Purdue, Minnesota and Rutgers.

2019 (SOPHOMORE)

Sichterman played on special teams in every game and also saw time at right guard in wins over Northern Illinois and Maryland.

2018 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Sichterman appeared in four games as a redshirt freshman. He made his Nebraska debut with extensive playing time in the second half at No. 19 Michigan, helping the Huskers to an 80-yard touchdown drive in the fourth quarter. He also saw action at No. 16 Wisconsin, against Bethune-Cookman and Illinois.

2017 (REDSHIRT)

Sichterman sat out the 2017 season as a redshirt.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (KINGS HS)

Sichterman was a standout at Kings High School in Ohio. As a senior, Sichterman started at right tackle and earned the top grade among Kings High linemen and led the squad in knockdown blocks. He earned all-state special mention accolades for his play, was a first-team All-Tri-State pick and was a first-team All-Southwest District selection.

As a junior, Sichterman had the most knockdown blocks as Kings High went 12-3. He played tight end prior to his junior season.

Sichterman was also a standout off the field. He was named the Eastern Cincinnati Conference recipient of the "That's My Boy" award, given by the National Football Foundation to recognize players for athletic and academic success and community involvement. He also earned the Anthony Munoz Scholar Lineman of the Year Award.

Sichterman was ranked among the top 300 overall prospects in the nation by Scout, which listed him as one of the top 20 guard prospects. Sichterman only visited Nebraska, but had dozens of offers including Illinois, Indiana, Maryland, Northwestern and Purdue to name a few.

PERSONAL

Matt was born on Feb. 26, 1999, and is the son of Mark and Judy Sichterman. A software engineering major, Matt earned his bachelor's degree from Nebraska in May of 2021. He volunteered his time with a Day of Service, a Register to Vote campaign, Operation Christmas Child, the Athletic Department Career Fair, the Nebraska Football Road Race and local hospital visits.

Sichterman is one of three triplets, all of whom were collegiate athletes. His sister, Megan was a swimmer at Tennessee and his brother Dan played football at Iowa State.

2021 (SENIOR)

Ben Stille started all 12 games in his final season, ending his career with 20 consecutive starts. He recorded a career-high 42 tackles and 6.0 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks with three pass breakups. Stille was selected as an honorable-mention All-Big Ten defender by the conference coaches and media. He was also honored as a first-team All-Big Ten selection by Pro Football Focus.

Stille made four tackles in the opener at Illinois and had a two-yard tackle for loss against Fordham, which marked his 10th consecutive start. Against Buffalo, Stille had four tackles, a half TFL and three quarterback hurries. He tied his then-career high with five tackles at No. 3 Oklahoma, including a one-yard tackle for loss. Stille made two tackles at No. 20 Michigan State. Stille recorded three tackles and a pass breakup against Northwestern. He had another pass breakup and made two tackles against No. 9 Michigan. At Minnesota, Stille recorded four tackles, including three solo stops. He tied his career high with five tackles against Purdue, when he was in on a pair of sacks, getting credited with two half sacks. Stille had two tackles against No. 6 Ohio State, including a two-yard TFL. He made four tackles and broke up a pass at No. 19 Wisconsin. Stille finished his career with a career-high six tackles against No. 17 Iowa with 1.5 TFLs and a half sack.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Stille started all eight games at defensive end in 2020, finishing with 27 tackles, 3.0 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks.

He had three tackles, including a half TFL, in the opener at No. 5 Ohio State. At Northwestern, Stille finished with four tackles. Stille made three tackles against Penn State, and he sealed the win with a quarterback hit that forced a fourth-down incompleteness on the Nittany Lions' final offensive play. Stille added four stops against Illinois before totaling five tackles at Iowa, including his first TFL of the season.

Stille set a career high with 1.5 sacks at Purdue, while recording five tackles for the second straight game. He made two tackles against Minnesota and had one tackle in the win at Rutgers.

Off the field, Stille earned academic all-district honors for the second straight season and was also an AFCA Good Works Team nominee and Wuerffel Trophy Watch List member for the second year in a row.

2019 (JUNIOR)

Stille played in all 12 games as a junior with a pair of starts, totaling a career-high 31 tackles with eight TFLs and 3.0 sacks.

He had four tackles in the season opener against South Alabama and had three more tackles - including two TFLs - the next week at Colorado. Stille made three tackles against No. 5 Ohio State before making his first start of the season against Northwestern and producing a then-career-high five tackles, including a half sack. He added two tackles the next week at Minnesota and had his first full sack of the season against Indiana.

At Purdue, Stille made four tackles, including one sack and a pair of TFLs. He earned the start against Wisconsin and finished with three tackles, a pass breakup and a hurry. The next week at Maryland, Stille had two tackles, including a half sack. Stille concluded his junior season with three tackles against Iowa, including a nine-yard tackle for loss.

Stille's combination of his work on the field, in the classroom and in the community earned him recognition as a junior. He was an academic all-district selection in addition to being nominated for the AFCA Good Works Team and appearing on the watch list for the Wuerffel Trophy.

2018 (SOPHOMORE)

Stille played in every game and started 11 contests at defensive end in 2018. He totaled 25 tackles with a career-high 5.0 sacks, leading all Nebraska defensive linemen in that category.

Stille earned his second career start in the season opener against Colorado and produced three tackles, including a nine-yard sack. Stille totaled one tackle over the next two games before recording a sack and making four tackles against Purdue. After recording a pair of tackles at No. 16 Wisconsin, Stille picked up his third sack of the season at Northwestern. He added another sack the next week against Minnesota. Stille had a nine-yard sack against Bethune-Cookman, giving him a sack in three consecutive games. He also had a career-high two pass breakups against BCU.

Stille made one tackle at Ohio State and had two stops and three quarterback hurries against Illinois. He totaled three tackles in Nebraska's win over Michigan State and made two stops in the season finale at Iowa.

2017 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Stille appeared in nine games with a start against No. 9 Wisconsin during his redshirt freshman season, lining up at both defensive end and outside linebacker. He showed versatility to play both positions during the year. Stille emerged as one of the Blackshirts' top playmakers, leading Nebraska with 10 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks as part of his 24 total tackles. He became the first freshman to lead the Huskers in TFLs since the stats began being tracked (1968) and the first freshman to lead Nebraska in sacks since the stat became official (1981).

All 10 of Stille's tackles for loss came during the Big Ten season, as he led all conference freshmen in that category. Overall, he ranked eighth in the Big Ten in TFLs despite playing only nine games, and Stille had four more TFLs than any other Big Ten player who appeared in fewer than 10 games. He recorded at least one tackle for loss in seven of his nine appearances and had three games with four tackles. For his performance, Stille was named to the Big Ten Network All-Freshman team and took home one weekly honor as the Big Ten Freshman of the Week, joining David Santos (2012) as the only Husker defenders to be named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week.

Stille made his career debut against Rutgers, totaling three tackles including one for a two-yard loss. Stille exploded onto the scene the next week at Illinois, registering four tackles, including three TFLs and his first career sack, which resulted in a forced fumble. He was honored by the Big Ten as the conference freshman of the week following his performance against the Illini. Stille's performance earned him his first career start against No. 9 Wisconsin, and he made one tackle against the Badgers. He had two tackles and one sack against No. 9 Ohio State the next week and tallied three tackles, one TFL and a half-sack at Purdue. Stille made four tackles against Northwestern and broke up the first pass of his career while adding another tackle for loss. He made it four consecutive games with a TFL with a 14-yard sack at Minnesota. Stille ended his debut season with four tackles and two TFLs against Iowa.

2016 (REDSHIRT)

Stille sat out the season as a redshirt and worked on the scout team.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (ASHLAND-GREENWOOD HS)

Stille starred on both sides of the ball at Ashland-Greenwood High School. He caught 26 passes for 415 yards and five touchdowns as a tight end. As a defensive end, he recorded 79 tackles, including 46 solo stops, while adding 17 tackles for loss and nine sacks. Stille also handled kicking and punting chores, making 46-of-49 PATs and three field goals.

Stille was a first-team Super-State choice by the Lincoln Journal Star and a first-team All-Nebraska pick by the Omaha World-Herald. He was also an honorary captain of the Class C-1 all-state teams by both newspapers. He was the USA Today Nebraska Defensive Player of the Year and made the publication's Nebraska all-state team.

In 2014, Stille caught 16 passes for 538 yards and had 63 tackles, including 19 TFLs and 10 sacks, while connecting on all four of his field goal attempts. His effort helped Ashland-Greenwood to a 12-1 record and a state runner-up finish. Stille earned first-team Class C-1 all-state honors as a tight end from the Omaha World-Herald and was an honorable-mention all-state choice by the Lincoln Journal Star.

Stille helped the Bluejays to an 11-2 record and a trip to the state championship game as a sophomore. He had 41 tackles and four interceptions, while adding 10 receptions for 199 yards and three touchdowns. He also made 7-of-12 field goals. Stille was also on the varsity as a freshman.

Stille was a two-time state champion in wrestling, posting a 44-0 record at 285 pounds as a senior and a 34-0 record at 220 pounds as a junior. He finished third at 182 pounds as a sophomore with a 35-5 record.

Stille was ranked among the top three players in Nebraska, and was listed as the No. 33 strongside defensive end in the country by 247Sports. Stille only visited Nebraska, but had offers from Army, Iowa, Iowa State, Ohio, Vanderbilt and Wyoming.

PERSONAL

Ben is the son of Kevin and Karen Stille, and he was born on Nov. 12, 1997. He earned his master's degree in nutrition and health sciences from Nebraska in May of 2021, after claiming a bachelor's degree in nutrition and health sciences in December of 2019. Stille was very active in the community. He has volunteered his time with the FCA, a Day of Service, pediatric brain cancer patients, the Nebraska Football Road Race, Teammates, a Unified track meet and with numerous local hospital, school and youth camps. He was a member of the Nebraska Student-Athlete Advisory Committee in 2019.

2021 (JUNIOR)

Cam Taylor-Britt started all 12 games in 2021, recording 51 tackles, 3.0 tackles for loss, 1.0 sack, 11 pass breakups, one interception and one blocked kick. During the regular season, Taylor-Britt ranked third in the Big Ten at 1.0 passes defended per game. For his efforts, Taylor-Britt was named a second-team All-Big Ten selection.

Taylor-Britt recorded two tackles against both Illinois and Fordham while helping limit both teams to fewer than 165 passing yards. Taylor-Britt totaled three tackles and one pass breakup against both Buffalo and No. 3 Oklahoma. At No. 20 Michigan State, Taylor-Britt posted two tackles and broke up a pass for the third straight game. He also blocked the first field goal of his career. He totaled three tackles, including a two-yard tackle for loss, against Northwestern.

Against No. 9 Michigan, Taylor-Britt filled up the stat sheet with a career-high 11 tackles and a career-high three pass breakups. The next week at Minnesota, Taylor-Britt totaled seven tackles with a career-high 2.0 TFLs and 1.0 sack, and he also intercepted a pass in the end zone. He totaled five tackles and two pass breakups against Purdue. Taylor-Britt recorded four tackles and broke up a pass against No. 6 Ohio State. He made four tackles and broke up a pass on fourth down at No. 19 Wisconsin. Against No. 17 Iowa in the season finale, Taylor-Britt recorded five tackles and one pass breakup. The breakup marked the 10th time in 11 games Taylor-Britt had at least one pass defended.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

A second-team All-Big Ten selection, Taylor-Britt played in every game with seven starts in 2020. He totaled 28 tackles with 3.0 tackles for loss, four pass breakups and two interceptions, leading the team with six passes defended and tying for the team lead in interceptions. Taylor-Britt was also NU's leading punt returner, as he returned six punts for 79 yards, averaging more than 13 yards per return.

Taylor-Britt started at cornerback and made five tackles at No. 5 Ohio State before a targeting disqualification. After sitting out the first half at Northwestern, Taylor-Britt had two tackles and a TFL in the second half. Against Penn State, Taylor-Britt totaled four tackles and a pass breakup. He intercepted a pass and had a 55-yard return to set up a field goal, and he also returned a punt 25 yards to set up another field goal.

Against Illinois, Taylor-Britt recorded three tackles and returned two punts for 22 yards. He made two tackles at Iowa. In the win at Purdue, Taylor-Britt totaled six tackles, including 1.0 tackle for loss, with a pair of pass breakups. Against Minnesota, Taylor-Britt had four solo tackles in the first half before missing the second half following a targeting penalty. He returned to intercept a pass, break up another and finish with two tackles, including 1.0 TFL, in Nebraska's season-ending win at Rutgers.

The play of Taylor-Britt and the rest of the Husker secondary helped NU limit four of its eight opponents to fewer than 200 yards passing.

2019 (SOPHOMORE)

Taylor-Britt was a versatile and productive member of the Husker secondary in 2019, earning honorable-mention All-Big Ten recognition. He played in 11 of 12 games with 10 starts. He started seven games at safety and three at cornerback, lining up at multiple positions to total 45 tackles, four TFLs, 1.5 sacks, three interceptions, two pass breakups and four forced fumbles. His four forced fumbles ranked third nationally and tied for the most by a Husker since 1999. Taylor-Britt led the team in forced fumbles and tied for the team lead in interceptions.

2021 (JUNIOR)

Deontre Thomas played in all 12 games in 2021 with a start in the season finale against No. 17 Iowa. He posted a career-high 23 tackles, 1.5 sacks and one fumble recovery.

Thomas recorded three tackles at Illinois, including a half sack. Against Buffalo, Thomas posted three tackles and he also lined up at fullback and was the leader blocker for Gabe Ervin Jr.'s 1-yard touchdown run. Thomas made four tackles in his return to his home state at No. 3 Oklahoma. The next week at No. 20 Michigan State, Thomas had two tackles, including an eight-yard sack. Thomas made three tackles against Northwestern and recovered the first fumble of his career. He recorded three tackles and a quarterback hurry against No. 9 Michigan. Thomas had three tackles against Purdue. He made one tackle at No. 19 Wisconsin and started the final game against No. 17 Iowa and had one tackle.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Thomas battled injuries as a junior, which limited him to two games. He saw action on the defensive line against Ohio State and Penn State.

2019 (SOPHOMORE)

Thomas played in all 12 games as a sophomore, recording 19 tackles. He had three tackles and one TFL in the opener against South Alabama. Thomas then posted a career-high five tackles against Northern Illinois with a pass breakup. He had one tackle against both Illinois and Ohio State before recording two tackles against Northwestern. He also had one tackle against both Minnesota and Indiana. Thomas totaled four tackles against Wisconsin, including Nebraska's lone TFL. He added one tackle at Maryland the next week.

2018 (REDSHIRT)

Thomas played in the first four games before an injury forced him to utilize his redshirt season. Thomas recorded a tackle in three of his four games, including the first tackle for loss of his career against Purdue.

2017 (FRESHMAN)

Thomas finished with 14 tackles as a true freshman. He recorded three tackles in his career debut against Arkansas State and added three more tackles at Oregon the next week. Thomas tallied two tackles in his Big Ten debut against Rutgers and had three tackles at Illinois. He had two tackles against Ohio State and one stop against Purdue.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (MUSTANG HS)

Thomas racked up 79 tackles and eight sacks for Mustang High School as a senior en route to first-team all-state honors. Thomas helped Mustang to the state playoffs in each of his last three seasons.

Thomas was ranked among the nation's top 200 players by 247Sports. The service also listed him as the nation's No. 11 defensive tackle.

He began his sophomore campaign with a career game against South Alabama, totaling five tackles against the Jaguars, including the first two TFLs of his career and his first career sack. Taylor-Britt also forced a pair of turnovers, intercepting the first pass of his career - which he returned 48 yards - and forcing a fumble on his sack which was recovered for a Husker touchdown. Taylor-Britt earned his first career start the next week at Colorado and again had five tackles while forcing a career-high two fumbles. Taylor-Britt had one tackle and one breakup against Northern Illinois before leaving the game in the second quarter with an injury.

He returned from the injury to start the next week at Illinois, finishing with three tackles, one breakup and his second career interception. Taylor-Britt totaled a then-career-high seven tackles against No. 5 Ohio State, including one tackle for loss. He had five tackles in the win over Northwestern, recording one TFL and forcing one fumble, before making six stops against both Minnesota and Indiana. After missing the Purdue game, Taylor-Britt returned to start at corner against No. 15 Wisconsin and recorded five tackles. He also started at corner at Maryland and had two tackles. In the season finale at Iowa, Taylor-Britt registered four tackles and one pass breakup, but his biggest impact came when he intercepted a pass and returned it 38 yards for a touchdown.

2018 (FRESHMAN)

Taylor-Britt played in 11 games as a true freshman. A converted high school quarterback, Taylor-Britt contributed on both defense and special teams, totaling 12 tackles, including eight on defense. Taylor-Britt had three pass breakups, and he also recovered a fumble on punt coverage.

Taylor-Britt was the lone true freshman to see action on defense in the opener against Colorado, recording his first career tackle. He then recovered a fumbled punt against Troy, setting up a field goal. At No. 19 Michigan, Taylor-Britt made his second career tackle and first on special teams. After missing the Purdue game, Taylor-Britt returned with a two-tackle performance - the first multi-tackle game of his career - at No. 16 Wisconsin that also included his first pass breakup. The next week at Northwestern, Taylor-Britt had another breakup and a solo tackle.

He saw significant action in the secondary against Minnesota and posted three tackles. He matched that effort with three tackles against Bethune-Cookman. Taylor-Britt made an impact in Nebraska's win over Michigan State with a critical pass breakup on third down in the third quarter of the Huskers' come-from-behind victory. He added a tackle on kickoff coverage in the final game of the season at Iowa.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (PARK CROSSING HS)

Taylor-Britt was one of the most prolific quarterbacks in the state of Alabama in 2017. Taylor-Britt put up huge numbers for Park Crossing High School as a senior in 2017. He amassed 2,496 yards of total offense and accounted for 30 total touchdowns, throwing for 1,466 yards and 16 touchdowns and adding 1,030 rushing yards and 14 touchdowns on the ground. His play helped the Thunderbirds to a 10-2 record and the second round of the Class 6A state playoffs. Following the season, Taylor-Britt was named an athlete on the Alabama Sports Writers Association Class 6A All State First Team.

Taylor-Britt was listed among the nation's top 60 athletes in the 247Sports Composite rankings, while ESPN listed him among the nation's top 80 wide receiver prospects. Taylor-Britt also visited Auburn and held more than a dozen scholarship offers.

2021 (SENIOR)

A member of the Biletnikoff Award watch list, Samori Toure played in all 12 games with nine starts in his lone season at Nebraska in 2021. Toure led Nebraska with 46 receptions, 898 receiving yards and five receiving touchdowns. He tied the Nebraska season record with five 100-yard receiving games, posted the second-highest yards-per-catch average in Nebraska history (19.5) among Huskers with at least 40 catches in a season and tied for sixth place on NU's single-season receiving yardage list. Toure's performance earned him third-team All-Big Ten honors from Pro Football Focus and honorable-mention accolades from the conference media.

During the regular season, Toure ranked second nationally in 70-yard catches (2) and third nationally in 60-yard catches (4) while ranking fifth in 50-yard catches (5). He also led the Big Ten and ranked 17th nationally in yards per reception and was sixth in the Big Ten in receiving yards.

Toure had three catches for 37 yards and added a pair of carries for nine yards in his Nebraska debut at Illinois. The next week against Fordham, Toure caught eight passes for 133 yards and added three carries for 35 yards with his first career rushing touchdown. The 100-yard receiving game was Toure's first as a Husker. Toure made it back-to-back games with 100 receiving yards when he caught two 68-yard touchdown passes against Buffalo for his 10th career 100-yard receiving game. At No. 3 Oklahoma, Toure caught three passes for 27 yards. Toure had five catches for 42 yards at No. 20 Michigan State, and he also added a four-yard carry against the Spartans. Toure caught two passes for 108 yards against Northwestern, including a 38-yard touchdown.

Toure caught three passes for 37 yards against No. 9 Michigan to surpass 3,000 career receiving yards including his time at the University of Montana. He also added a 16-yard carry against the Wolverines. Against Purdue, Toure had two catches for 47 yards. He had his most productive game as a Husker against No. 6 Ohio State, catching four passes for 150 yards, including a 72-yard touchdown. Toure posted his record-tying fifth 100-yard receiving game of the season at No. 19 Wisconsin, catching seven passes for 113 yards, including a four-yard touchdown grab. In his final game against No. 17 Iowa, Toure led Nebraska with six catches for 67 yards.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (WESTVIEW HS/MONTANA)

Toure was one of the top receivers in the FCS ranks during his decorated career at the University of Montana. Toure finished his career with the Griz with 155 receptions for 2,488 yards and 20 touchdowns, ranking in the top 12 in Montana history in each of those categories.

As a junior in 2019, Toure led the Big Sky and was second in the FCS with a school-record 1,495 receiving yards on 87 receptions. His receiving yardage total was one of the top 30 single-season performances in FCS history. Toure closed the season in impressive fashion, with 905 yards, 48 catches and 10 receiving touchdowns in the final six games.

Overall, Toure posted six 100-yard receiving games in 2019, including a school-record 303 yards on 12 catches against Southeast Louisiana. Toure also became the first ever Montana player to have three games with three or more receiving touchdowns in a season, snaring three TD passes against Portland State, Weber State and Southeast Louisiana. His efforts helped Montana to a 10-4 record and a trip to the FCS quarterfinals.

Toure played in all 11 games as a sophomore in 2018, with 10 starts. He caught 37 passes for 440 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Toure had three games with at least five receptions and totaled a season-high 105 receiving yards at North Dakota.

As a redshirt freshman, Toure played in all 12 games and helped Montana to a 7-4 record. He finished the season with 31 receptions for 553 yards and five touchdowns, averaging nearly 18 yards per reception. Toure had three receptions that covered at least 72 yards during the 2017 season and also returned 21 kickoffs for 379 yards.

Toure redshirted in 2016. He was a standout at Westview High School in Portland, Ore., before choosing Montana.

Walker was a first-team All-Nebraska selection as an offensive lineman by the Omaha World-Herald, while the paper also listed him as a Class A all-state defensive lineman. He was a Super-State pick by the Lincoln Journal Star. He was an honorable-mention all-state pick as a junior when he recorded 43 tackles on defense and started on the offensive line.

A consensus choice as one of the top five prospects in Nebraska, Walker originally committed to Wyoming and also had an offer from Ohio.

2021 (SENIOR)

Deontai Williams started the first eight games at safety in 2021 before missing the final four games of the season due to injury. He totaled 46 tackles, 2.0 tackle for loss, four interceptions and three pass breakups.

During the regular season, Williams ranked 11th nationally with four interceptions despite his four missed games. He was named an honorable-mention All-Big Ten performer.

Williams made six tackles, including a tackle for loss, while making his 10th career start at Illinois. The next week against Fordham, Williams recorded four tackles and intercepted a pair of passes. Against Buffalo, Williams recorded four tackles and tied his career high with two breakups. At No. 3 Oklahoma, he recorded nine tackles. Williams made five tackles, including a one-yard tackle for loss at No. 20 Michigan State. He made three tackles in the win over Northwestern. Williams intercepted his third pass of the season against No. 9 Michigan and totaled eight tackles. He had another interception and a pass breakup the next week at Minnesota, finishing with seven tackles before exiting the game early with an injury that proved to be season-ending.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Williams played in every game and made seven starts while earning honorable-mention All-Big Ten accolades in 2020. Williams finished with a career-high 51 tackles, and he set career highs with 4.0 tackles for loss and 1.0 sack. He also broke up four passes, forced a fumble and recovered a fumble.

Williams earned the start in the season opener at No. 5 Ohio State after missing nearly all of the 2019 season due to injury. Williams made five tackles against the Buckeyes before being disqualified in the second half due to a targeting penalty. He had to sit out the first half of the Northwestern game but returned to finish with four tackles and his second career tackle for loss in the second half.

Williams made three tackles and broke up a pass against Penn State and arguably delivered the key play in the Huskers' win. Williams had a 13-yard strip sack, and he recovered the fumble and returned it 26 yards for a touchdown. Williams was the first Husker to have a sack, forced fumble and fumble recovery for a touchdown on the same play since at least 1962, when complete game statistics are available.

Against Illinois, Williams had a then-career-high six tackles. He topped that effort with a then-career-high seven tackles at Iowa, all of which were solo stops. Williams then set a career high in tackles for the third straight game in the win at Purdue, totaling 12 tackles, including 10 solo stops. He also broke up a pass and had 1.0 tackle for loss against the Boilermakers. Williams made it back-to-back games with double-digit tackles against Minnesota, totaling 10 tackles, 1.0 TFL and a career-high two pass breakups. He finished the season with four tackles at Rutgers.

The play of Williams and the rest of the Husker secondary helped Nebraska limit four its eight opponents to fewer than 200 yards passing.

2019 (JUNIOR)

Williams earned the start and made two early tackles in the season opener with South Alabama before leaving the game in the first half with an injury. The injury proved to be season ending, as Williams appeared in only one game as a junior.

2018 (SOPHOMORE)

Williams made an immediate impact in his first year, appearing in every game with a start against Purdue. He totaled 23 tackles and one TFL, and he had at least one tackle in 10 of Nebraska's 12 games. Williams had a nose for the ball, forcing two fumbles, recovering one fumble, intercepting two passes and breaking up two more passes. Williams tied for the team lead in interceptions, forced fumbles and fumble recoveries.

Williams recorded his first career pass breakup in the season opener with Colorado and then posted his first career tackle the next week vs. Troy. At No. 19 Michigan, Williams picked off the first pass of his career with a diving interception in the end zone. He started the first game of his career against Purdue and recorded three tackles. He then made five tackles the next week at No. 16 Wisconsin. Williams had one tackle each against Northwestern and Minnesota. He was a disruptive force against Bethune-Cookman, totaling two tackles while recovering a fumble, intercepting a pass and breaking up another. He forced the first fumble of his career and had four tackles at No. 8 Ohio State. Williams forced another fumble the next week against Illinois, when he had a pair of tackles. He ended his season with a two-tackle performance at Iowa that included his first career tackle for loss.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

(TRINITY CHRISTIAN ACADEMY/JONES COUNTY [MISS.] CC)

Williams totaled 26 tackles and recorded two interceptions and two forced fumbles for Jones County Community College in 2017, helping the Bobcats to an 8-2 record and an appearance in the Mississippi Association of Community & Junior Colleges playoffs. In 2016, Williams played in the opener and totaled four tackles and one fumble recovery before an injury sidelined him for the rest of the year. He was granted a redshirt for the 2016 season.

A three-star recruit, Williams was ranked among the nation's top 30 junior college prospects by the 247Sports Composite rankings, which also tabbed Williams as the nation's No. 2 junior college safety. He chose Nebraska after also considering Florida, Ole Miss and Central Florida.

Originally from Jacksonville, Fla., Williams played his high school ball for Trinity Christian Academy in Jacksonville. Coming out of high school, Williams was ranked among the nation's top 250 players by ESPN, and he received scholarship offers from Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Notre Dame and UCLA, among others.

PERSONAL

Deontai was born on Oct. 4, 1996, and he is the son of Shantell Davis and Roosevelt Williams. Deontai majored in child, youth and family studies, earning his degree in December of 2019. He volunteered with a Day of Service, the Nebraska Football Road Race, and local hospital visits. Deontai's father, Roosevelt, was a third-round pick in the 2002 NFL Draft and played two seasons in the NFL, one each with the Bears (2002) and Browns (2003).

Series Notes: Nebraska and Northwestern meet each season as members of the Big Ten West Division. Seven of the 11 meetings since NU joined the Big Ten have been decided by three or fewer points or in overtime. Northwestern holds a 4-3 edge in those close contests. However, the most recent meeting in 2021 was a 56-7 Nebraska win, tying for the largest margin of victory in the series. Nebraska has twice defeated Northwestern on the final play of the game (Hail Mary in 2013 and field goal in 2019), two of the three-walk off Husker wins in Memorial Stadium history. Nebraska is 3-2 at Ryan Field, including an overtime loss in 2018. Nebraska rallied from fourth-quarter deficits in both 2012 and 2013, including winning on a Hail Mary pass at Memorial Stadium in 2013, the first game-winning Hail Mary in Nebraska history. Nebraska won 29-28 at Evanston in 2012, rallying from a 12-point fourth-quarter deficit to the largest fourth-quarter comeback in school history. The Huskers defeated Northwestern 66-17 in the 2000 Alamo Bowl. The game marked the highest point total by the Huskers in a bowl game and Dan Alexander rushed for a Nebraska bowl-game record 240 yards and two touchdowns. Nebraska has been ranked in the AP top 10 in three of the meetings. Nebraska won the first meeting in series history, 12-0, in Lincoln on Nov. 27, 1902—the only shutout in series history. Northwestern posted a 19-7 victory in the first meeting between the two schools in Evanston on Oct. 3, 1931.

Series Notes: This year's game is the second game of a home-and-home series after Nebraska came up a touchdown short against No. 3 Oklahoma in 2021. The schools are also scheduled for a home-and-home series in 2029 and 2030. The schools met for 71 consecutive seasons (1927-1997) before the streak was snapped in 1998 with the start of the North-South rotations in the Big 12. Nebraska was 16-3-3 in the first 22 games with 11 shutouts, while OU was 22-4 from 1943 to 1968. Since 1969, Oklahoma holds a 20-18 edge in the series. Five times Oklahoma handed Nebraska its only regular-season loss (1964, 1966, 1975, 1979, 1987), while twice Nebraska has given Oklahoma its only loss (1971, 1978). The 1971 game is still known as "The Game of the Century" with No. 1 Nebraska winning a 35-31 contest in Norman. The two teams met in a No. 1 vs. No. 2 matchup again in 1987, with Oklahoma winning, 17-7, in Lincoln. In 1978, Tom Osborne got his first win against the Sooners for the fourth-ranked Huskers knocking off No. 1 OU, 17-14. The teams met again a few weeks later in the Orange Bowl with Oklahoma winning, 31-24. That matchup was one of three postseason meetings, with Oklahoma knocking off Nebraska in a pair of Big 12 Championship Games (2006, 2010). The 2010 game was NU's last as a member of the Big 12. One of the two teams has been ranked No. 1 in 13 of the meetings, including eight times by NU, most recently in 2000. Since the AP poll began in 1936, the NU-OU matchup featured at least one ranked team in 60 of 70 games, with both teams ranked in 24 meetings. The series has featured at least one top-10 team in 48 games and two top-10 teams 18 times. The game featured at least one AP top-10 team in 22 straight games from 1970 to 1990, and 17 times since 1971 both teams have been ranked in the top 10. One of the two teams has been ranked entering the contest in all but three games since 1948. The winning team has had to come from behind in 27 of the last 40 games. Nebraska's biggest-ever upset win was a 25-21 victory in 1959, ending OU's 36-game win streak, and 74-game conference unbeaten streak. Tom Osborne posted his 250th win against OU in 1997, with a 69-7 victory, the largest by either team in the series. The 1923 game was the first game played in Memorial Stadium.

Series Notes: Nebraska and Indiana have met only twice in the Huskers' 11 seasons as a Big Ten member. This year's meeting will be the first between the teams since 2019, when the Hoosiers were the last Big Ten team to make the visit to Memorial Stadium in league play. Indiana won that game 38-31. Indiana and Nebraska met for the first time as Big Ten opponents in Bloomington in 2016 with 10th-ranked Nebraska winning 27-22. Prior to 2016, the four previous meetings came under Coach Tom Osborne, and the Huskers posted a combined margin of 190-43. Those victories snapped a 10-game NU winless streak in the series that dated back to a 13-7 win over Indiana at Memorial Stadium in 1940. Fifteen of the 21 games in the series have been played in Lincoln. IU has enjoyed success, posting an 8-5-2 record in its trips to Nebraska. In fact, from 1940 to 1959, Indiana went 7-0-1 at Memorial Stadium. Nebraska has been ranked in the top 12 of the AP poll in five of the last six meetings.

Series Notes: Nebraska and Illinois meet each season as members of the Big Ten West Division. The Illini have won the past two meetings, after the Huskers won six of the first seven meetings as conference foes. The 2021 game - originally scheduled to be played in Dublin, Ireland - marked the earliest conference game in school history. Nebraska has won six of nine matchups as Big Ten opponents. The Huskers are 9-2 against Illinois in Lincoln, including a 4-1 mark as conference foes. NU's 54-35 win in 2018 marked the Huskers first 50-point game in Big Ten Conference play. The only meetings between 1953 and 2013 came in 1985 and 1986 when the Huskers easily won both ends of a home-and-home series. One of the more memorable wins in the first half-century of Nebraska football was a 14-0 victory over Red Grange and the Illini on Oct. 3, 1925. It was the only time in Grange's career that he was held scoreless in a home game. NU's second-ever meeting with a Big Ten school came against Illinois with a 6-0 victory on Oct. 24, 1892. NU opened the series with four straight wins in Lincoln from 1892 to 1905. Illinois has never been ranked at game time in 18 meetings with NU.

Series Notes: Before Nebraska joined the Big Ten, Minnesota was NU's most frequent opponent among conference schools, with 51 meetings between 1900 and 1990. NU is 5-6 against the Gophers as Big Ten foes, as Minnesota has won the past three meetings. The 2020 game was played on Dec. 12, the first December game in Memorial Stadium history. Nebraska's 2018 win (53-28) in Lincoln was Scott Frost's first win as Nebraska head coach. Minnesota has won six of the nine meetings since 2013 after the Huskers had a 16-game win streak in the series. The 16-

game NU win streak from 1963 to 2012 included lopsided NU wins in the first two meetings as Big Ten opponents. In the 2011 win, Nebraska scored the first 34 points, giving NU 145 consecutive points against the Gophers in three consecutive meetings. The first 14 of the wins in the 16-game streak came under Hall of Fame coaches Bob Devaney and Tom Osborne by a combined score of 553-100. NU was 8-0 against the Gophers under Devaney (225-73) and 6-0 under Osborne (328-27). Nebraska posted five shutouts in the winning streak. Nebraska defeated the Gophers for eight consecutive seasons from 1967 to 1974, including NU national championship seasons in 1970 (35-10 at Minneapolis) and 1971 (35-7 in Lincoln). NU posted back-to-back shutouts in the final two meetings in non-league games (1989, 1990), winning by a combined margin of 104-0. Minnesota's 1960 national championship team posted a 26-14 win over Bill Jennings' Huskers in Lincoln in the Gophers' previous victory in the series. The Gophers also beat NU on their way to AP national titles in 1936 (7-0, Minneapolis), 1940 (13-7, Minneapolis) and 1941 (9-0, Minneapolis). Minnesota has never played Nebraska as the nation's No. 1 team, while the Huskers have entered the game with Minnesota as the AP No. 1 three times (1971, 1983, 1984). In 1968, both teams were ranked at game time (NU 9, UM 17) for the only time in series history. Nebraska's 84 points in 1983 are the most scored by the Huskers during the modern era (since WW II). In the first 37 games in the series, which dates to 1900, Minnesota posted a 29-6-2 record and shut out the Huskers 12 times. The Gophers' last shutout came in 1941, which marked the second win in a 10-game winning streak by Minnesota.

Series Notes: Nebraska and Michigan are meeting for the second straight year after playing just once in the previous seven seasons. Only two of the 11 all-time meetings have been played in Lincoln, with four of the six matchups as Big Ten foes - including 2022 - contested in Ann Arbor. Michigan has won the last two meetings after the Huskers won back-to-back games in 2012 and 2013, giving NU the first winning streak in series history. Nebraska allowed just one Michigan touchdown in winning the 2012 and 2013 meetings. The 2012 game in Lincoln was Michigan's first trip to Lincoln in 101 years and the first-ever game between the schools at Memorial Stadium. Michigan's only other trip to Lincoln came on Nov. 25, 1911, when the teams battled to a 6-6 tie. First-year Nebraska head coach Bob Devaney led the Cornhuskers to a 25-13 victory over the Wolverines in Ann Arbor on Sept. 29, 1962. Between 1962 and 2011, the two traditional powerhouses split a pair of bowl matchups, with No. 5 Michigan defeating No. 7 Nebraska, 27-23, on Jan. 1, 1986, in the Fiesta Bowl following the 1985 regular season. NU knocked off No. 20 Michigan, 32-28, in the 2005 Alamo Bowl, posting the largest bowl comeback in school history.

Series Notes: Nebraska and Wisconsin play for the Freedom Trophy each season, a trophy that debuted for the 2014 matchup, when the schools began meeting every year as members of the Big Ten West Division. Nebraska played its first-ever game as a member of the Big Ten Conference

at Camp Randall Stadium against Wisconsin on Oct. 1, 2011. The teams met twice in 2012. In the regular-season meeting in Lincoln, Nebraska posted the second-largest comeback in school history, twice rallying from a 17-point deficit for a 30-27 victory. Wisconsin defeated Nebraska 70-31, in the Big Ten title game at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis. The Badgers have won nine of 10 games since NU joined the Big Ten, including each of the past eight. Nebraska was ranked in the top 25 in eight straight meetings with the Badgers before entering the 2015 game unranked, while Wisconsin has been ranked in each of the past five matchups. The 2016 game featured a pair of ranked teams for the third time in 14 all-time matchups. The 2020 game scheduled for Lincoln was canceled due to COVID-19 protocols in the Badger program. NU was ranked in the top 10 five times entering the UW game from 1965 to 2011, and was No. 7 in 2016. Wisconsin won the first meeting between the two teams, 18-0, on Nov. 2, 1901. The Huskers reeled off three straight wins from 1965 to 1973 by a combined margin of 88-19. The first two meetings came under NU Hall of Fame Coach Bob Devaney, who led his 1965 Huskers to a 37-0 shutout of the Badgers. Nebraska completed a series sweep one year later with a 31-3 victory in Madison. Current Wisconsin A.D. Barry Alvarez was a linebacker on those two NU teams. The two teams met again in Lincoln in 1973, when No. 2 NU, under first-year head coach Tom Osborne, escaped with a 20-16 win.

Series Notes: Nebraska and Iowa began the Heroes Game tradition with the first meeting as Big Ten opponents in 2011. The road team has won seven of the past 10 games. Iowa extended its win streak in the series to seven games with a 28-21 win in Lincoln in 2021, overcoming a 12-point fourth-quarter deficit. The past four meetings have been decided by a total of 19 points, including last-second field goals in 2018 and 2019. The schools have met on Black Friday each of the Huskers' 11 seasons in the Big Ten. Nebraska has played on the day after Thanksgiving each year since 1990, including matchups with Oklahoma (1990-95), Colorado (1996-2010) and Iowa (2011-present). Iowa's 56 points in 2017 were the most points the Hawkeyes have scored in 51 meetings with the Huskers. Iowa was ranked No. 3 entering the 2015 game in Lincoln, the first time NU faced a ranked Hawkeye team (Iowa was also ranked in 2019 and 2021). In 2014, Nebraska rallied from a 17-point second-half deficit, tying the largest road comeback in school history. The Huskers prevailed 37-34 in overtime. No. 1 Nebraska rolled to a 42-13 win at Memorial Stadium in 2000 in the final non-conference meeting, a year after the No. 5 Huskers cruised to a 42-7 victory in Iowa City in 1999. NU was ranked at game time in eight straight meetings from 1979-2012. The Huskers were 7-1 in those contests, suffering a 10-7 defeat to the Hawkeyes on Sept. 12, 1981. Nebraska held the Hawkeyes to 13 or fewer points in seven straight matchups from 1980 through 2012. NU is 15-6-1 all-time against Iowa in Lincoln, including 11-5 at Memorial Stadium. The first true home game in the series was played at Iowa City on Oct. 31, 1903, with Nebraska coming away with a 17-6 win. The previous 10 meetings had come on neutral fields in the Omaha/Council Bluffs area with the two teams battling to a 4-4-2 deadlock.

Series Notes: Five of the seven meetings since Nebraska joined the Big Ten have been decided by five or fewer points. Nebraska defeated Michigan State, 9-6, in Lincoln in 2018, winning without a touchdown for the first time since a 3-0 win over Kansas State in 1937. Nebraska's 39-38 win over No. 6 MSU in 2015 marked just the third time in school history an unranked Nebraska team defeated a top-10 opponent. It was also the highest-ranked team NU had defeated in 14 seasons. MSU posted its first two wins in the series in 2013 and 2014. Nebraska's rally from a 10-point fourth-quarter deficit marked one of four second-half double-digit comebacks in 2012. The Spartans were held to 14 or fewer points in each of the first six meetings, including three points in consecutive meetings in 2003 and 2011. NU's win over No. 9 Michigan State in 2011 marked the second straight year the Huskers defeated a top-10 team in Lincoln. Second-ranked Nebraska posted a 50-10 victory at Michigan State in 1995, in the Huskers' first trip to East Lansing.

Series Notes: NU and Ohio State have played eight times as Big Ten foes, including six straight seasons from 2016-21. The first meeting in Lincoln was Nebraska's first-ever Big Ten home game on Oct. 8, 2011. That game featured the largest comeback victory in Husker history, as NU rallied from a 27-6 deficit for a 34-27 win, its first Big Ten win. The 2016 contest was the first in the series between top-10 teams. Ohio State has been ranked in the top 10 in each of the last six games, including 2019 when ESPN College Gameday came to Lincoln for the first time since 2001. The 2020 game was just the eighth in college football history between two programs with 900 all-time wins. The 2020 contest (Oct. 24) marked NU's latest season opener since 1892. The Buckeyes won the first two games in the series, played in

the mid-1950s in Columbus. In the first meeting, the No. 6 Buckeyes posted a 28-20 victory over Bill Glassford's team. The next year, Michigan grad Pete Elliott led his only Nebraska team to Ohio State in a 34-7 loss to the No. 8 Buckeyes.

Series Notes: Nebraska and Penn State met as protected division cross-over foes from 2011 to 2013, but have played just twice since 2014. NU won the first three meetings as Big Ten foes, before No. 13 Penn State won in 2017. NU improved to 7-1 all-time in overtime games with its 2013 win in Happy Valley. Nebraska rallied from a two-touchdown halftime deficit for a 32-23 win in Lincoln in 2012. NU's 17-14 win at Penn State in 2011 came in the first game in 46 seasons without Joe Paterno as the Nittany Lions' head coach. Both teams were nationally ranked in five straight meetings between 1979 and 1983, with NU winning three of the five games. In 1982 in Happy Valley, No. 2 Nebraska dropped a 27-24 decision to a Nittany Lion team that went on to win the national title. In 1983, No. 1 NU opened the season with a 44-6 victory over No. 4 Penn State in the Kickoff Classic in East Rutherford, N.J. PSU won four of the first five meetings, including a pair of shutouts in State College in 1920 and 1952. NU claimed its first win with a 19-0 shutout at Memorial Stadium in 1950.
