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SEASON NOTEBOOK

FROST SET FOR FIFTH SEASON

Scott Frost is set for his fifth season at Nebraska in 2022. The consensus 2017 national coach of the year, Frost is 34-36 in six seasons as a head coach.

- Nineteen of Frost's 29 losses at Nebraska (66 percent) have been by a touchdown or less, including 11 by five or fewer points.
- NU was 3-9 in 2021, but the Huskers outscored their opponents by 63 points on the season. Despite the 3-9 record, the average score of a Husker game in 2021 was 28-23 in Nebraska's favor.
- All nine Nebraska losses in 2021 were by single digits, including eight by a touchdown or less. The Huskers played a school-record six games against ranked opponents during the 2021 regular season. Nebraska lost to those six ranked foes - all ranked in the top 20 - by an average of just 6.0 points per game.
- In 15 seasons as a full-time assistant or head coach, Frost's teams have posted a 137-54 record. He has coached in two national championship games, won seven conference titles and coached 10 teams who earned a final top-15 ranking.

FIVE NEW ADDITIONS TO HUSKER STAFF

Nebraska's coaching staff features five new faces this fall. New to the staff are offensive coordinator **Mark Whipple**, running backs coach **Bryan Applewhite**, special teams coordinator **Bill Busch**, wide receivers coach **Mickey Joseph** and offensive line coach **Donovan Raiola**.

- Whipple is a 40-year coaching veteran who has won 137 games as a collegiate head coach, including the 1998 Division I-AA (now FCS) national championship. The offensive coordinator at Pittsburgh the past three seasons, Whipple helped the Panthers to the 2021 ACC title, and Pitt had the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award winner (Kenny Pickett) and the Biletnikoff Award winner (Jordan Addison).
- Applewhite came to Nebraska after two seasons as the running backs coach at TCU. He helped the Horned Frogs rank in the top 30 nationally in rushing in both 2020 and 2021. In Applewhite's final season, two TCU running backs posted yards-per-carry averages that ranked among the top five marks in school history.
- Busch owns more than 30 seasons of collegiate experience, and he
 is in his third coaching stint at Nebraska after serving as a Husker
 graduate assistant in the 1990s and as the special teams coordinator
 from 2004 to 2007. Before serving as a defensive analyst for
 Nebraska in 2021, Busch coached the safeties for three seasons at
 LSU from 2018 to 2020, helping the Tigers to the 2019 national title.
- Joseph, a former Husker quarterback, joined the Nebraska staff after spending five seasons at LSU. With the Tigers, Joseph coached 2019 Biletnikoff Award winner Ja'Marr Chase and developed four wide receivers who were selected in the first or second round of the NFL Draft. Joseph also served as LSU's assistant head coach in 2020 and 2021, and he is Nebraska's associate head coach in 2022.
- Raiola is the younger brother of former Husker All-America center Dominic Raiola. Donovan came to Nebraska after spending the past three seasons as the assistant offensive line coach for the Chicago Bears, helping the Bears to a pair of playoff appearances. Raiola, who boasts previous collegiate coaching experience at Notre Dame, was a three-time All-Big Ten offensive lineman at Wisconsin.
- Of the five returning assistants on Frost's staff, four have been with Frost in each of his seven seasons as a collegiate head coach (Erik Chinander, Sean Beckton, Travis Fisher and Barrett Ruud). Mike Dawson has served on Frost's staff for a total of six seasons.

IRELAND TRIP HIGHLIGHTS HUSKER SCHEDULE

Nebraska will play a 12-game regular season in 2021, which begins with only the second international game in program history.

- Nebraska's season begins Aug. 27 against Northwestern in the Aer Lingus College Football Classic in Dublin, Ireland. The Huskers' only other game outside of the United States was a 38-24 win over Kansas State on Dec. 5, 1992, in Tokyo, Japan.
- The Aug. 27 season opener marks the fourth-earliest season opener in program history and the earliest since the 2002 season (Aug. 24).
- Nebraska is facing a conference opponent in a season opener for just the 15th time in school history but for the third straight season.
- NU will play each of the other six teams in the Big Ten West Division, while taking on Indiana, Rutgers and Michigan from the East Division.
- Nebraska will play seven games against 2021 bowl teams. NU also faces three teams who were ranked in the final 2021 AP poll (No. 3 Michigan, No. 10 Oklahoma and No. 23 Iowa), while playing three more teams (Wisconsin, Minnesota and Purdue) who were among the top four teams receiving votes in the final poll.

A LOOK AT THE HUSKER OFFENSE

Nebraska returns four regular starters on offense and 13 other players who made at least one start last season. The Huskers must replace three starting offensive linemen from the 2021 season, four of their five leading receivers and their four-year starting quarterback.

- Nebraska averaged 447.6 yards of offense per game last season, ranking 20th nationally in that category. The No. 20 total offense ranking was the program's highest since the 2008 season (12th).
- Up front, Turner Corcoran (11) and Bryce Benhart (10) return after combining for 21 starts last season. Ethan Piper and Trent Hixson are also back with 24 career starts between them. Teddy Prochazka returns after starting two of the first seven games at left tackle as a true freshman last season before a season-ending injury. Brant Banks started at Illinois last year. Nouredin Nouili made seven starts last year but will miss the 2022 season.
- Nebraska added a pair of transfers to bolster the offensive line in Kevin Williams Jr. and Hunter Anthony. Williams appeared in 22 career games with 19 starts at FCS Northern Colorado while Anthony played in 23 games with five starts at Oklahoma State.
- In the backfield, Rahmir Johnson started seven games last fall and was the leading rusher among running backs with 495 yards. Overall, Nebraska brings back three of its four most productive running backs from 2021, as Johnson, Jaquez Yant and Gabe Ervin Jr. combined for 913 rushing yards last season.
- Junior college transfer Anthony Grant will also figure into the mix.
 Grant, who began his career at Florida State, ran for 2,549 yards in junior college and was the 2021 National Offensive Player of the Year.
- At wideout, NU returns three receivers who started multiple games last year including Omar Manning (7 starts), Wyatt Liewer (4) and Oliver Martin (3). That trio combined for 574 receiving yards in 2021. Brody Belt and Alante Brown have each started one game in their careers.
- A trio of transfers bolster the receivers. Isaiah Garcia-Castaneda played in 12 games with seven starts in two seasons at New Mexico State, catching 42 passes for 639 yards and four touchdowns. Trey Palmer transferred to Nebraska from LSU, where he played in 28 games with five starts and caught 41 passes for 458 yards and three touchdowns. Marcus Washington played in 31 games with eight starts at Texas and caught 25 passes for 366 yards and three touchdowns.
- Veteran tight end **Travis Vokolek**, who has played in 36 career games, is back after catching 11 passes for 127 yards last season behind Big Ten Tight End of the Year Austin Allen. **Chancellor Brewington** and **Chris Hickman** also return at the tight end spot. Brewington played in 10 games and caught three passes in his first season at Nebraska in 2021, and he has appeared in 31 games with 19 starts in his collegiate career. Hickman has played in 15 games with Nebraska, and he caught three passes for 90 yards last season.
- At quarterback, Nebraska must replace Adrian Martinez, the program's
 all-time leader in total offense. Logan Smothers started Nebraska's
 final game last season against No. 17 Iowa and completed 16-of-22
 passes for 198 yards while rushing for 64 yards and two touchdowns in
 his first career start. Smothers is one of three quarterbacks on the roster
 that have started a game for a Power Five program.
- Texas transfer Casey Thompson played in 19 games with 10 starts as a Longhorn. He completed nearly 64 percent of his passes at Texas, throwing for 2,422 yards and 30 touchdowns. Thompson was named to the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award watch list in 2021, when he threw for 2,113 yards and 24 touchdowns.
- Chubba Purdy transferred to Nebraska from Florida State. Purdy played in three games with one start for the Seminoles as a true freshman in 2020 before redshirting in 2021. He has thrown for 219 yards and two touchdowns in his career with 19 carries for 57 yards.
- At place-kicker, Timmy Bleekrode joined the roster as an FCS transfer from Furman, where he was 15-of-18 on field goals last season.

A LOOK AT THE HUSKER DEFENSE

On defense, Nebraska returns five players who started every game last season and two other defenders who started four contests for a unit that allowed Nebraska's fewest points per game (22.7) since 2010. The Huskers must replace six starters lost from last season, all of whom earned at least honorable-mention All-Big Ten accolades in 2021.

- On the defensive line, Ty Robinson is the veteran of a group bolstered by transfers. The only defensive lineman to start a game for the Huskers, Robinson has appeared in 20 career games with 11 starts, totaling 44 tackles, 6.0 tackles for loss and 2.0 sacks.
- Behind Robinson, Nash Hutmacher (12 games) and Colton Feist (8) are the only other defensive linemen who have played in more than two games at Nebraska.
- Boosting the defensive line are a trio of Power Five transfers in Devin Drew, Ochaun Mathis and Stephon Wynn Jr. Drew played in 23 games and started 12 contests at Texas Tech, finishing with 55 tackles. Mathis was a two-time All-Big 12 performer at TCU, where he totaled 135 tackles, 30.5 tackles for loss and 15.5 sacks over four seasons, 38 games and 34 starts. Wynn spent four seasons at Alabama and made 16 tackles over 21 games.
- At outside linebacker, NU returns Garrett Nelson and Caleb Tannor, the two players on the roster with the most experience in a Husker uniform. Nelson has played in 31 career games with 20 starts, and he led Nebraska with 11.5 tackles for loss and 5.0 sacks last season. Tannor, who has played in 44 games with 22 starts as a Husker, also had a productive 2021 season, finishing with career highs of 33 tackles and 5.5 TFLs while adding 2.0 sacks and three breakups.
- Blaise Gunnerson emerged late last season as an option at outside linebacker, earning significant playing time in the final two games and totaling two tackles and a half TFL.
- At inside linebacker, Nebraska returns one of the top duos in the nation in Luke Reimer and Nick Henrich. Both Reimer and Henrich ranked in the top 50 nationally last season in tackles, as Nebraska was one of only five FBS programs - and two Power Five teams - to have two players rank in the top 50 in tackles. Reimer (109) and Henrich (99) combined for 208 tackles last season.
- Chris Kolarevic also figures into the mix at inside linebacker. He has played in 28 games in his career with 15 starts, playing in all 12 games and recording 27 tackles in his first season at Nebraska last year.
- At cornerback, Quinton Newsome and Braxton Clark are the most experienced returners. Newsome has played in 30 games with 13 starts as a Husker. He started all 12 games last season and recorded 57 tackles with four pass breakups. Clark also played in all 12 games last season, and he has appeared in 28 games with one start in his Nebraska career. Marques Buford Jr. will also compete for a spot at cornerback after he was a special teams standout in 2021, appearing in all 12 games of his freshman season.
- Myles Farmer is the only player on the roster who has started a game at safety for Nebraska. Farmer has played in 21 games with five starts the past three seasons. He is Nebraska's active leader with three career interceptions. Other safeties on the Husker roster with game experience are Noa Pola-Gates and Isaac Gifford, who could also play the nickel spot. Both special teams standouts, Pola-Gates has appeared in 18 games while Gifford has seen action in 20 contests.
- A pair of transfers could also figure into the secondary. Omar Brown started 29 games at Northern Iowa, totaling 140 tackles with 13 pass breakups and eight interceptions in his Panther career. He was the FCS Defensive Freshman of the Year and an All-American in the 2019 season. Tommi Hill played in 11 games as a freshman at Arizona State in 2021, finishing with nine tackles.
- At punter, Brian Buschini is a first-year FCS transfer from Montana. Buschini was the 2021 FCS Punter of the Year. He ranked third nationally with an average of 46.0 yards per punt last season, and Buschini placed 30 of his 69 punts inside the opponent's 20-yard line.

NEBRASKA AMONG TOP ALL-TIME PROGRAMS

Nebraska will play its 133rd season this fall, and the Huskers have historically been one of the top programs in college football history.

- Nebraska ranks eighth in NCAA history with 908 wins and sixth with 53 all-time bowl game appearances.
- NU has won five national championships. The Huskers' four AP national titles (1970, 1971, 1994, 1995) rank seventh all-time and NU's four coaches poll titles (1971, 1994, 1995, 1997) rank fourth.
- Nebraska's 46 conference titles rank second in NCAA history.
- The success extends to the classroom as well. Husker football has produced 108 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans, the most of any sport in NCAA history. Nebraska football has produced nine NCAA Top 10 Award winners, the most of any sport in NCAA history.



Frost went 13-0 and led Nebraska to a national title as the Huskers' starting quarterback in 1997, and he then guided UCF to a 13-0 season as the Knights' head coach in 2017, when UCF was the nation's only undefeated team.



Nebraska's offensive coaching staff features four new faces in 2022. Coordinator Mark Whipple, who was a 2021 semifinalist for national assistant coach of the year while helping Pittsburgh to the ACC title. The offensive staff has combined to help three different Power Five programs rank in the top 20 nationally in total offense the past three seasons.

HISTORY OF THE BLACKSHIRTS

One of Nebraska's most well-known traditions is the Blackshirts, the common nickname for the Husker defense. The term originally dates back to the early 1960s and refers to the black jerseys that Nebraska's first-string defenders wear in practice.

With the return of the two-platoon system in college football in 1964, Head Coach Bob Devaney looked for a way to distinguish the defensive units on the practice field. Devaney sent an assistant coach to a local sporting goods store to find "contrast jerseys", a sleeveless pullover that went on top of the players' practice jerseys. While the top offensive unit practiced in red jerseys and the second-string offense worked in green pullovers, the first-string defense wore black and the second string wore contrasting gold jerseys.

The term quickly caught on and then gained momentum during Monte Kiffin's tenure as defensive coordinator in the mid-1970s. The Blackshirts earned national recognition under Charlie McBride, who served as the Huskers' defensive coordinator from 1982 to 1999.

The Blackshirts celebrated their 50th season in 2013. As a former Husker with former Blackshirts on his coaching staff, Head Coach Scott Frost is very familiar with the long-standing tradition.

DEFENSIVE DOMINANCE

- Nebraska has ranked in the top 10 nationally in total defense 22 times since 1964.
- Nebraska has ranked in the top 10 in scoring defense 23 times since 1964, including leading the nation in scoring defense in 1984 and 2009.
- Nebraska has ranked among the top 10 in all four major defensive categories (rush defense, pass defense, total defense and scoring defense) on five occasions, including national title seasons in 1994, 1995 and 1997, and most recently in 2009.
- Opponents have traditionally found moving the ball through the air difficult against the Blackshirts, as the Huskers have ranked in the top 10 in passing defense 18 times in the past five decades.

ACADEMIC COUNSELING

Eight academic counselors, three learning specialists, two assistant academic counselors and one administrative assistant are in place to monitor daily academic progress, receive consistent course feedback, assist with the advising/ registration process and monitor eligibility and progress toward graduation.

TUTORIAL SUPPORT

A tremendous resource for all academic abilities, unlimited tutorial support from approximately 75-100 tutors on staff is available from day one up to college graduation in all subject areas. Tutorial support is provided both in-person and virtually. Nebraska's tutorial program is certified by the College Reading and Learning Association.

STUDY HALL
Student-athletes attend a supervised, flextime study hall within the Herman Student
Life Complex that features day, evening
and weekend hours. Student-athletes are
required to complete a specific number
of study hours each week as determined
by their academic counselor and/or coach.
Additional performance hased or tutos Additional performance-based or tutor-based study hall also may be determined by the academic counselor.

MENTORING

Academic staff serve as mentors to all incoming student-athletes and select returning student-athletes. The student-athletes meet with their mentor weekly to develop time management skills, gather and report academic progress information and discuss academic success strategies.

EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENTS

Assessments are administered upon the request of the student-athlete, academic request of the student-athlete, academic counselor or coach. Learning specialists are available to administer and score informal assessments, which include a reading comprehension and a writing assessment. When more in-depth assessments are necessary, referrals are made to a neuropsychologist who conducts the assessments. If it is determined a studentablete has a learning disability or another assessments. If it is determined a student-athlete has a learning disability or another medical condition that impedes the student from reaching their academic potential, appropriate accommodations are implemented by the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ORIENTATION

Each new student-athlete attends an orientation at the beginning of their academic career. Student-athletes are introduced to staff, faculty, administrators and a variety of resources that help facilitate the transition into college while enhancing awareness of support services in the Athletic Department and across campus.

PERSONAL COUNSELING

Student-athletes will find a supportive and caring environment at Nebraska. Transitional issues, stress management, time management, academic focus and problem resolution are all addressed in a proactive manner throughout the year. If necessary, counseling referrals are also made to designated practitioners.

COMPUTER RESOURCES

All student-athletes are provided the opportunity to have a laptop for use during their academic career at Nebraska. The Herman Student Life Complex has printers and desktop computers available for student-athletes to use in the facility. A full-time computer specialist is on-site and available to assist with technology needs.

The Life Skills staff provides proactive education to all incoming and returning student-athletes designed to promote responsible decision-making, enhance one's personal brand and prepare student-athletes for life after sports. Interactive presentations are delivered during summer bridge sessions, orientations and year-by-year tiered development workshops.

HUSKER ADVANTAGE/NAME, IMAGE, LIKENESS (NIL) PERSONAL BRANDING

All Nebraska student-athletes will benefit from specialized personal branding content within the innovative Husker Advantage program. Designed to enhance overall marketability while in college and beyond, engaging and interactive content in the areas of Strength Assessment, Building Personal Brand, Communication, and Finance/Compliance will position student-athletes for potential NIL opportunities while sharpening fundamental life skills beyond athletic eligibility.

INDIVIDUAL MEETINGS

Every Nebraska student-athlete is assigned a Life Skills staff member who will assist with personal and career development. The meetings help each student-athlete identify a career focus and implement a plan to increase career marketability.

CAREER COMMITMENT & NETWORKING

Nebraska Life Skills organizes an annual Student-Athlete Career Fair Networking Night and other career events aimed at connecting Huskers with companies desiring competitive, hard-working, accountable candidates. Athlete Network and UNL's Handshake Link provide opportunities to explore career opportunities across the country.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Nebraska student-athletes readily accept the role-model challenge, collectively giving more than 1,500 hours annually to impact thousands across the state of Nebraska. Outreach events include but are not limited to hospital visits, mentoring, school assemblies, statewide rallies, Make-A-Wish, School is Cool and Husker Heroes. During the 2021-22 academic year, 243 Husker student-athletes completed at least six service projects earning spots on the coveted Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

LEADERSHIP

Nebraska Life Skills provides studentathletes with countless opportunities to enhance leadership skills while distinguishing themselves from the competition. Studentathletes can be members of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, Minority Student Athlete Collective (MSAC), Nebraska Football Road Race, Inner Circle, N-Vest or N-VOLYED. UNL offers more than 600 recognized student organizations allowing athletes to collaborate with other campus leaders for common goals.

RECOGNITION

In 2021-22, 25 Husker Football student-athletes were named to both the Tom Osborne and Brook Berringer Citizenship teams for completing a minimum of six service projects in the calendar year. A host of other recognition opportunities at the institutional, Big Ten and NCAA levels that all reflect the high ideals, character and servant leadership nurtured through community involvement also are available. Annually, Nebraska Football coordinates a Road Race to enhance Pediatric Brain Cancer awareness, conducts multiple hospital visits, coordinates a Day of Service and volunteers at local elementary and middle schools.

ATHLETIC MEDICINE


Nebraska features one of the most well-trained and highly skilled athletic medicine staffs in the country. Under the guidance of Director of Athletic Medicine Dr. Lonnie Albers, Head Athletic Trainer and Physical Therapist Jerry Weber (pictured, bottom) and Football Head Athletic Trainer Mark Mayer, the Nebraska athletic medicine staff consists of five physicians, 14 full-time athletic trainers and eight graduate assistant athletic trainers.

Nebraska's medical facilities have long been among the nation's best, and Husker Athletic Medicine will have a new home in 2023 with the completion of the Go B1G Project. Currently, NU's athletic medicine center is housed in the Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex. In addition to Nebraska's North Stadium facility, Hawks Field, Bowlin Stadium, Pinnacle Bank Arena, the Bob Devaney Sports Center and the Nebraska Soccer and Tennis Complex all feature athletic medicine areas.

Nebraska uses advanced equipment, including two anti-gravity treadmills (pictured, top) to help athletes recondition after injuries. Nebraska's Athletic Medicine Center also features a hydrotherapy area that includes a three-level laned pool, as well as hot and cold plunge tanks (pictured, middle). The Hydroworx 1000 Treadmill Pool is equipped with two cameras underwater for evaluation and assessment.

SPORTS PSYCHOLOGY

Continuing its commitment to complete care for all student-athletes, Nebraska has a staff of five in-house mental health providers specializing in performance psychology who work directly with student-athletes, teams and coaches. Under the leadership of Director of Sports Psychology Dr. Brett Haskell, the Huskers' sports psychology staff provides counseling, psychological services, mental skills training, teambuilding and leadership development services for each of Nebraska's 24 sports and more than 600 Husker student-athletes. The staff works directly with student-athletes to help them develop skills to enhance personal well-being, address mental health and train psychological skills to optimize performance.

PERFORMANCE NUTRITION

There is no place like Nebraska when it comes to the high-performance fueling of hard-working athletes. Nebraska Performance Nutrition has a long-standing tradition of setting the highest standard for the 'food first' approach to fueling. The Nebraska Performance Nutrition program is setting the standard for student-athlete welfare across collegiate athletics and beyond.

Nebraska has its own Executive Chef. Mike Steele, who innovates the menus under the guidance of Director of Performance Nutrition, Dave Ellis, who is widely considered to be a thought leader in the high-performance fueling field. Nebraska has it's own kitchen and culinary staff and has the ability to source a food supply that is second to none when it comes to fresh, natural and organic sources. Athletes are taught to follow a three-step approach that was conceived right here at Nebraska over three decades ago. It's a simple system, where food is merchandised in three steps, each delivering a health and performance benefit for hard-working athletes.

Husker athletes have the chance to learn how to cook their own food in the Life ready-to-eat food supply and to-go meals that offer fueling solutions when a student-athlete has class conflicts.

Nebraska has four, full-time registered dietitians on staff who help athletes navigate the managed food supply that is served at each meal. The registered dietitians also orchestrate meals on the road for teams and offer fueling solutions before and after workouts or competition. This attention to detail helps get those critically timed sources of fuel and fluids that hard-working muscles require in just the right amounts. To make fueling convenient when training, there are two locations adjacent to the weight rooms where grab-and-go nutrition support is available to all student-athletes.

With over six decades of collective experience, the performance nutrition staff is very knowledgeable on topics including how to help drug-tested athletes avoid inadvertent adverse analytical findings (AAFs/positive drug test) that can result from adulterated dietary supplements.

Scott Frost enters his fifth season as Nebraska's head coach in 2022 and his seventh season as a college head coach. Frost's rapid rise in the coaching ranks culminated with the former Husker national champion returning to his alma mater in December of 2017.

In the span of just more than a decade, Frost went from a first-year FCS assistant to head coach of one of college football's most storied programs. It also took Frost just two years to post his first undefeated season as a head coach, as Frost guided UCF to the greatest two-year turnaround in NCAA history. He inherited an 0-12 team, made a bowl game in his first season and then led the Knights to a 13-0 record in his second and final season in 2017. In addition to his success as

a head coach - Frost was the consensus national coach of the year in 2017 - Frost was successful at every stop along his journey to becoming a head coach. His teams posted a 103-18 record in his nine seasons as an assistant coach, with Frost coordinating both a top-10 defense and multiple top-10 offenses. Frost served as defensive coordinator for an FCS semifinalist, was Oregon's offensive coordinator in the inaugural College Football Playoff Championship Game and called the plays for Heisman Trophy winner Marcus Mariota.

The 47-year old Frost is a proven winner familiar with the Nebraska culture and tradition. He was a part of two national championship teams as a Husker player, coached in two national championship games as an assistant at Oregon and led UCF to a 13-0 record in 2017, when the Knights were the nation's only undefeated team.

Frost has been a winner throughout his coaching career, winning seven conference championships in his 15 seasons as a full-time coach. His teams have won 137 games in that span, averaging more than nine wins per season.

In addition to coaching in two national championship games, Frost has coached in five other New Year's Six bowl games in the last decade. His winning reputation dates back to his playing days, when he helped Nebraska to a 36-2 record in his three-year career, including a 24-2 record in two seasons as the Huskers' starting quarterback.

NEBRASKA (2018-21)

Frost has laid the foundation for rebuilding Nebraska's program in his first four seasons in Lincoln. Nebraska won four of its final six games in his first year in 2018, and improved by nearly 28 points per game in the second half of the season. The Huskers finished with a 4-8 record, but Nebraska faced eight opponents who were ranked during the 2018 season. Five of Nebraska's losses were by five or fewer points, with the Huskers' final three losses coming in a three-point overtime loss at Northwestern, which finished with a No. 21 ranking, a five-point setback at No. 3 Ohio State and a three-point loss at No. 25 lowa as time expired.

Frost also lived up to his reputation as one of the best offensive playcallers in the country in 2018. Frost inherited an offensive unit that ranked 87th nationally in total offense in 2017. Nebraska ranked 25th nationally in total offense, the program's first top-25 finish in the category since 2008.

In his second season in 2019, Nebraska improved its win total with one of the youngest teams in the country, as the Huskers had more freshmen on their roster than any team in the country. Nebraska went 5-7, with five of those losses coming to ranked teams, including four losses to teams that finished in the top 15 of the final Associated Press poll. Four of the Huskers' seven losses were by a combined 17 points, including two last-second losses.

Frost's leadership guided the Huskers through the COVID-19 pandemic and an abbreviated 2020 campaign. Nebraska posted a 3-5 record, with three losses to teams that finished in the top 15 nationally. In the 2021 season, the Huskers were competitive in every game despite posting a 3-9 record. All nine of Nebraska's losses were by single digits - including eight losses by one score or less – while facing eight teams that won at least nine games, and six opponents who were nationally ranked at game time.

Frost has made upgrading Nebraska's talent a priority, with four of his five recruiting classes ranked in the top 25 nationally.

UCF (2016-17)

Frost went 19-7 in two seasons at UCF, helping turn an 0-12 team into a 13-0 squad in just two years. In Frost's first season, he took the Knights to a bowl game and finished with a 6-7 record. The turnaround was historic, as Frost became the only first-year coach in FBS history to make a bowl game with a team that was winless the previous season.

UCF led the nation with a six-win improvement in 2016 and exceeded that mark in 2017 with a win over No. 7 Auburn in the Peach Bowl to complete a 13-0 season as the nation's only undefeated team. The Knights put together the first undefeated regular season in UCF and AAC history in 2017, posted the longest winning streak in school history (13 games), achieved the highest in-season ranking in program history (10th), highest final ranking (6th) and set an AAC record with 16 all-conference selections.

UCF was led by its high-powered offense and improved defense under Frost. The Knights led the nation in scoring at 48.2 points per game and were the only FBS team to score at least 30 points in every game. Defensively, UCF improved its scoring defense by 65 spots in Frost's two seasons.

In addition to being the unanimous choice as the 2017 AAC Coach of the Year, Frost was honored as the national coach of the year by the Associated Press, American Football Coaches Association, the Touchdown Club of Columbus, the Lombardi Award and FCA in addition to winning the Home Depot, Paul "Bear" Bryant and Eddie Robinson coach-of-theyear awards. He was also a semifinalist for the George Munger Coach of the Year Award in each of his two seasons at UCF, making Frost one of three coaches to be a semifinalist for the award in both 2016 and 2017.

ASSISTANT COACHING CAREER

OREGON: Frost spent seven seasons as an offensive assistant at Oregon from 2009 to 2015, including serving as the Ducks' offensive coordinator in his final three seasons. Frost helped Oregon post a 79-14 record in his seven seasons, during which time the Ducks won four conference titles and twice played for the national championship.

Oregon never ranked lower than eighth nationally in scoring offense during Frost's seven seasons on staff, and the Ducks led the nation in scoring in 2010. Frost was promoted to offensive coordinator in 2013, and Oregon ranked in the top five nationally in both scoring and total offense each of his three seasons calling plays. The Ducks scored 681 points in 2014, the second-highest total in NCAA history. Oregon made it to the College Football Playoff Championship Game that year, when Frost was one of five finalists for the Broyles Award, presented annually to the nation's top assistant. Frost's quarterback, Marcus Mariota, won the 2014 Heisman Trophy and was the No. 2 overall pick in the 2015 NFL Draft.

NORTHERN IOWA: Frost's first full-time coaching job came in the FCS ranks at Northern lowa, where he spent two seasons on the Panthers' defensive staff. He coached the Panther linebackers in 2007 and helped UNI to the No. 1 seed in the FCS playoffs and a quarterfinals appearance. Frost was promoted to co-defensive coordinator the next season, when UNI ranked ninth nationally in scoring defense and advanced to the FCS Semifinals. The Panthers finished with a 24-4 record in Frost's two seasons, winning two Missouri Valley Conference titles and earning a No. 4 final ranking both years.

KANSAS STATE: Frost began his coaching career as a defensive graduate assistant at Kansas State in 2006, helping the Wildcats to a bowl game.

NEBRASKA: Frost's first coaching experience came during a brief stint on Nebraska's staff as a defensive graduate assistant in 2002, coaching the Huskers in the Independence Bowl.

PLAYING CAREER (STANFORD, NEBRASKA & NFL)

Frost spent two seasons at Stanford - where he was a two-way starter at safety and quarterback - before returning home to Nebraska for the Huskers' 1995 national championship season. He took over as NU's starting quarterback the next season and was the 1996 Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year. In 1997, he was a Johnny Unitas Award finalist and an Academic All-American as Nebraska went 13-0 and captured the program's fifth national title. Frost was then selected in the third round of the 1998 NFL Draft and played six seasons as an NFL safety.

PERSONAL

Frost earned his degree in finance from Nebraska in 1997. Scott and his wife Ashley have one son, Ryan James (RJ) and two daughters, Alli and Capri.



HISTORIC TURNAROUND AT UCF

At UCF, Frost produced the greatest two-year turnaround in college football history, inheriting an 0-12 team and leading the Knights to a 13-0 record just two years later.

- In his first season in 2016, Frost made history as the only first-time head coach in FBS history to make a bowl game with a team that was winless the previous season.
- UCF tied for the national lead with a six-win improvement from the 2015 to 2016 season.
 The Knights then ranked third nationally after improving by seven wins from the 2016 to 2017 season.
- The Knights' seven-win improvement from 2016 to 2017 ranked 11th in NCAA history and marked just the second time ever a bowl team improved by more than six wins the next season
- UCF was the American Athletic Conference and Peach Bowl champions and was the only FBS team to go undefeated in 2017.
- Frost called UCF's plays, orchestrating the greatest two-year offensive turnaround in NCAA history. The Knights went from last to fifth in total offense, improving their output by more than 260 yards per game. UCF also went from third-to-last to first in scoring offense, improving by nearly 35 points per game.

FROST LED UCF TO 13-0 SEASON

In his second year as a head coach, Scott Frost guided UCF to a 13-0 record in 2017, when the Knights were the nation's only undefeated team.

- Frost was the fourth coach in FBS history to post a 13-0 record or better in either his first or second season as a head coach. Among that quartet, Frost is the only coach who inherited a team that won fewer than five games, as UCF went 0-12 the year before Frost's arrival.
- Frost is one of only five active FBS head coaches who has posted a 13-0 season or better, joining Jimbo Fisher, Nick Saban, Dabo Swinney and Kyle Whittingham.
- Frost also led Nebraska to a 13-0 record and a national title as the Huskers' starting quarterback in 1997. Frost was the first person in NCAA history to be part of a 13-0 season as both a player and a head coach.

NATIONAL COACH OF THE YEAR

Frost was the consensus choice as the 2017 national coach of the year, earning the honor from at least eight different organizations.

- Frost won the 2017 Paul "Bear" Bryant Award as the national coach of the year. Frost, Chris Petersen (2006 & 2009, Boise State) and Luke Fickell (2021, Cincinnati) are the only coaches in the 36-year history of the award to win the honor while coaching a team outside of a Power Five Conference.
- Frost was also the AP Coach of the Year, becoming the sixth coach to win the award in his first or second season as a head coach.

FROST A TOP OFFENSIVE COACH

For each of the last 13 years, Scott Frost has either been an offensive assistant, offensive coordinator or head coach who calls the offensive plays. During that time, he has consistently proven to be one of the nation's finest offensive coaches.

- In 13 seasons coaching offense, Frost has worked with eight units that finished in the top 10 nationally in scoring, including seven that ranked in the top five.
- Frost has also been a part of seven teams that ranked in the top 10 nationally in total offense the past 13 seasons.

FROST A PROVEN WINNER

Frost is a proven winner. In his 15-year full-time coaching career, Frost's teams have combined for a 137-54 record.

- Frost has averaged more than nine wins per year and been a part of seven 12-win teams.
- He has won seven conference titles in 15 years.
- Frost has coached in two national title games and his teams have finished with a top-10 ranking eight times in the past 15 years.
- In two seasons as UCF's head coach, the Knights were the nation's most improved team in 2016 and were the only FBS team to go undefeated in 2017.
- As a Husker quarterback, Frost was a two-time national champion who helped Nebraska to a 36-2 record, including a 24-2 mark as a starter.
- Frost is one of four active head coaches who won a national title as a player and is the only coach who won multiple national titles.

Erik Chinander is in his fifth season as Nebraska's defensive coordinator and his 20th year of coaching. He is in his seventh season serving as Scott Frost's defensive coordinator. Chinander has coached with Frost at Nebraska, UCF, Oregon and Northern Iowa for a total of 13 years.

Recognized as one of the nation's top assistant coaches with a nomination for the Broyles Award in 2016 and 2021, Chinander has been on the staff of one FCS (UNI) and two FBS (Oregon) teams that have played in the national championship game. He also coached in the NFL Playoffs. Chinander has played a key role in Nebraska's recruiting success and was named one of Rivals' Top 25 Recruiters of the Year in 2021.

Chinander's units have ranked in the top 20 nationally in takeaways three times in the past eight seasons, including a pair of top-five rankings. Individually, 26 Blackshirts have earned All-Big Ten accolades under Chinander. Before his arrival, only 12 Blackshirts were All-Big Ten honorees in the previous four seasons.

NEBRASKA (2018-21)

Chinander has implemented an aggressive defense at Nebraska, one that has resulted in more sacks, takeaways and defensive touchdowns. In his first season, Chinander oversaw a Husker defense that showed significant improvement. Nebraska allowed two fewer touchdowns per game over the final six games of 2018 compared to the first six games. The Huskers held two of their final five opponents to single digits, including a 9-6 victory over Michigan State, where the defense led Nebraska to its first victory without scoring a touchdown since 1937.

The Blackshirts improved by 26 spots in the national scoring defense rankings from the unit Chinander inherited, and NU saw dramatic improvements in its pass defense, sack totals and takeaways. The Huskers improved their pass efficiency defense by 61 spots in 2018, ranking 34th nationally in the category. Nebraska broke up 58 passes, the ninth-highest total in program history and the most by a Husker squad in nearly a decade. The Blackshirts also totaled 25 sacks in 2018, 11 more than they had in 2017. Nebraska also forced 20 turnovers, the program's highest total in four seasons.

In 2019, six Huskers earned All-Big Ten accolades, Nebraska's highest total since 2011. The Huskers allowed nearly 50 fewer yards per game and more than three fewer points per game than they did in 2018, moving up 30 spots in the total defense rankings and 22 spots in scoring defense. Nebraska also improved by 52 spots in first down defense, ranking 32nd nationally in that category in 2019.

Chinander's aggressive approach also resulted in the Huskers forcing their most turnovers (21) in five seasons, ranking in the top 35 nationally in takeaways and in the top 15 with three defensive touchdowns in 2019. Nebraska was one of only 25 teams nationally with double-digit interceptions and fumble recoveries in 2019.

The defensive improvement continued in 2020. The Blackshirt defense limited its eight opponents to 4.2 yards per rush, better than a half-yard improvement over the 2019 season. The Huskers also moved up 14 spots nationally in total defense and ranked sixth in the Big Ten in that category. Seven of Chinander's defensive players earned All-Big Ten accolades.

The 2021 Husker defense was Chinander's best Blackshirt unit. The Huskers finished 36th nationally in scoring defense, allowing 22.7 points per game against a schedule that featured eight teams that won nine games. The opponents points per game average was the lowest for a Nebraska defense since 2010.

The Blackshirts allowed 366.0 yards per game, Nebraska's lowest total since 2016. During the 2021 campaign, Nebraska had several standout

defensive efforts, including ending Oklahoma's FBS record streak of 65 straight games with at least 27 points, and holding Michigan State without a first down in the second half.

Individually, seven Husker defenders earned All-Big Ten accolades. Senior nickel back JoJo Domann and senior cornerback Cam Taylor-Britt were second-team all-conference selections, while Domann was a secondteam Associated Press All-American.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

UCF: Chinander led a dramatic defensive turnaround in his two seasons at UCF in 2016 and 2017. He inherited a Knight defense that had allowed 37.7 points per game in 2015 and two years later, UCF lowered that average to 25.3 points per game.

The Knights forced 58 turnovers in 26 games under Chinander, ranking second nationally in takeaways in 2017 and 18th in 2016. The 58 combined takeaways over the 2017 and 2018 seasons ranked third nationally

Chinander's defense played a major role in the first perfect season (13-0) in school and conference history in 2017. UCF led the AAC in defensive touchdowns and ranked third in scoring defense and pass efficiency defense.

Individually, six Knights earned all-conference accolades, including a league-high four first-team honorees. Linebacker Shaquem Griffin was the only player in the conference to be a unanimous All-AAC selection, and cornerback Mike Hughes earned second-team All-America honors. Hughes (first round), the highest defensive draft pick in UCF history, and Griffin (fifth round) were both selected in the 2018 NFL Draft.

In Chinander's first season in Orlando, the defense was the key to UCF leading the nation with a six-win improvement. The Knights ranked in the top 10 nationally in four defensive categories and in the top 25 in nine categories. Griffin was the 2016 American Athletic Conference Defensive Player of the Year after ranking ninth nationally in tackles for loss (20.0) and 11th in sacks (11.5). He was also a first-team all-conference selection as one of four Knights earned All-American Athletic Conference accolades.

OREGON: Chinander coached the outside linebackers at Oregon in 2014 and 2015. His linebackers helped Oregon play in the inaugural College Football Playoff National Championship Game in 2014. The Ducks ranked in the top 30 nationally in scoring defense and were third with 34 takeaways. In 2015, Oregon ranked ninth in sacks and pass efficiency defense.

Chinander served as a defensive graduate assistant at Oregon in 2011 and 2012, when the Ducks ranked in the top 25 nationally in scoring defense. Chinander also spent the 2010 season in Eugene as an intern. In Chinander's five seasons at Oregon, the Ducks posted a 58-10 record, won three conference titles and twice played for the national championship.

PHILADELPHIA EAGLES: Chinander gained NFL experience by serving as the assistant defensive line coach with the Philadelphia Eagles in 2013. The Eagles won the NFC East that season with a 10-6 record.

NORTHERN IOWA: Chinander served as an offensive assistant at Northern lowa, coaching the tight ends for six seasons from 2004 to 2009. Chinander also assisted with the defensive and specialist scout teams. He made a huge impact in the Panthers' recruiting and helped UNI win three conference titles and make three appearances in the FCS playoffs, including a runner-up finish in 2005 and a semifinal appearance in 2008.

ELLSWORTH CC: Chinander's first job was as the offensive and

defensive line coach for Ellsworth Community College in Iowa, where he also coordinated the strength and conditioning programs for football and men's and women's basketball. The Panthers finished second in the region and three of his players garnered first-team all-region accolades.

PLAYING CAREER (IOWA)

Chinander was a walk-on offensive lineman at Iowa from 1998 to 2002. As a senior, Iowa shared the Big Ten title and played in the Orange Bowl. He received the Hawkeyes' Offensive Team Leader Award that season.

PERSONAL

Chinander earned bachelor's degrees from Iowa in history and health leisure and sports studies in 2003. He and his wife, Megan, have two daughters, Penelope and Sophia, and one son, Ripp.

Mark Whipple is in his first season as Nebraska's offensive coordinator. He brings extensive experience to the Husker sideline.

During his 40-year coaching career, Whipple has won a national championship as a head coach and a Super Bowl as an assistant coach.

Whipple has accumulated 21 years of head coaching experience. He has also been an offensive coordinator for 10 seasons and coached six years in the National Football League.

Whipple owns a 137-103 record in his 21 seasons as a college head coach. He won a national championship in 1998, leading Massachusetts to the Division I-AA title when he was the national coach of the year.

Whipple has been an offensive coordinator at three Power Five programs. Before coming to Nebraska, he helped Pitt win the 2021 ACC title by leading a Panther offense that ranked in the top 10 nationally in scoring offense, passing offense and total offense.

As a quarterbacks coach, Whipple helped Kenny Pickett win the 2021 Johnny Unitas Golden Arm award, and he coached Ben Roethlisberger when Roethlisberger was the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year in 2004.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

PITT: Whipple spent three seasons as Pitt's offensive coordinator prior to coming to Nebraska. His Pitt offense ranked among the nation's most prolific units in his final season in 2021. The Panthers ranked in the top 10 nationally in scoring offense (41.4 ppg, 3rd), total offense (486.6 ypg, 8th), passing offense (337.4 ypg, 8th) and passing efficiency (8th). Pitt scored more than 40 points eight times in 2021 and converted 88 percent of its red-zone trips into scores.

Individually, the Panther offense featured two of the nation's top skill players. Senior quarterback Kenny Pickett thrived under Whipple's coaching. A Heisman Trophy finalist, Pickett threw for 4,319 yards to rank sixth nationally in that category. He was fourth nationally with 42 touchdown passes and ninth in the nation in passing efficiency. Receiver Jordan Addison led the nation with 17 receiving touchdowns, while ranking fourth in the country with 1,593 receiving yards and sixth with 100 receptions. Addison was a first-team All-American and the Biletnikoff Award winner as the nation's top wide receiver

UMASS (HEAD COACH): Whipple spent the previous five seasons (2014-18) as the head coach at UMass, his second stint as head coach at the school after also guiding the Minutemen from 1998 to 2003. Overall, Whipple owns a school record 65 wins at UMass and guided the school to a Division I-AA (now FCS) title in 1998, and to three NCAA playoff

appearances. Whipple won three conference titles with the Minutemen, and he produced a pair of 10-2 seasons.

CLEVELAND BROWNS: Whipple was an offensive assistant for three NFL teams, most recently the Browns in 2011 and 2012. As the Browns' quarterbacks coach, Whipple helped Colt McCoy throw for a career-high 2,733 yards in 2011. The next season, Whipple helped Brandon Weeden pass for a career-high 3,385 yards.

MIAMI: Whipple's first stint as an FBS offensive coordinator came at Miami in 2009 and 2010, when he also served as the Hurricanes' Assistant Head Coach. Miami ranked in the top 30 nationally in scoring offense in 2009, and the Hurricanes were 31st nationally in total offense in 2010.

PHILADELPHIA EAGLES: Whipple spent the 2008 season as an assistant coach with the Philadelphia Eagles under Head Coach Andy Reid. He helped the Eagles to the NFC Championship Game.

PITTSBURGH STEELERS: Whipple spent three seasons as the quarterbacks coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers from 2004 to 2006, during Ben Roethlisberger's first three NFL seasons. In 2004, Roethlisberger was named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year, and in 2005 Whipple helped the Steelers win the Super Bowl.

BROWN (HEAD COACH): Whipple led Brown, his alma mater, to a 24-16 record in his three seasons as head coach from 1994 to 1997. He bookended his stint at Brown with 7-3 seasons.

NEW HAVEN (HEAD COACH): Whipple's first head coaching job came at Division II New Haven. He spent six seasons with the Chargers, guiding New Haven to a 48-17 record while his team earned five top-20 rankings. Whipple guided the Chargers to the Division II playoffs in each of his final two seasons, including a semifinal appearance in 1992. The Chargers posted back-to-back 10-win seasons in Whipple's final two years, combining for a 23-2 record in those two seasons.

NEW HAMPSHIRE: Whipple served as New Hampshire's offensive coordinator in 1986 and 1987. With the Wildcats, Whipple coached players who ended their careers as New Hampshire's all-time leading rusher, receiver and second-leading passer.

ARIZONA WRANGLERS: Whipple's first coaching stint in the professional ranks came with the Arizona Wranglers of the USFL in 1984. That season, he helped the Wranglers win the conference title and play for the USFL championship.

BROWN: Before later becoming Brown's head coach, Whipple spent the 1983 season coaching the Bears' wide receivers.

UNION: Whipple served as the offensive coordinator for Union College in 1981 and 1982. He helped the Dutchmen to an 8-1 record in 1982.

ST. LAWRENCE: Whipple began his career as an assistant coach at St. Lawrence in 1980.

PLAYING CAREER (BROWN)

Whipple was a quarterback at Brown from 1976 to 1979, where he was a teammate of Nebraska senior offensive analyst Ron Brown. Whipple earned his degree from Brown in 1979.

PERSONAL

A New York native, Whipple and his wife Brenda have two children, Spencer and Austin, who is an offensive quality control coach for the Huskers.

Bryan Applewhite is in his first season as Nebraska's running backs coach.

A veteran coach in his 24th season, Applewhite is coaching running backs for the 20th consecutive season in 2022. He previously coached running backs at TCU, Colorado State, Louisiana-Monroe, Montana State and Wyoming.

Applewhite has a strong reputation for player development and recruiting. He coached two of the four all-time leading rushers in Wyoming history and two of the top eight rushers in Colorado State history. He also served as a recruiting coordinator at both Colorado State and Louisiana-Monroe, spending eight total seasons in that role.

As a player, Applewhite was a two-time NCAA Division II

national champion for Northern Colorado, which is where he also began his coaching career in 1999.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

TCU: In two seasons with the Horned Frogs (2020 and 2021) before joining Nebraska, Applewhite helped TCU rank in the top 30 nationally in rushing both seasons. TCU was the Big 12 rushing champion in 2020, averaging 214.7 rushing yards per game to rank 20th nationally in rushing. The Horned Frogs then finished 30th in the country in 2021 at 196.3 rushing yards per game. In 2020, TCU had three running backs top 100 yards in a single game, with true freshmen Zach Evans (7.7 ypc) and Kendre Miller (7.2 ypc), posting the second- and fifth-best yards per carry averages in Horned Frogs history, respectively.

COLORADO STATE: Before coaching at TCU, Applewhite spent five seasons as running backs coach at Colorado State from 2015 to 2019. He also took on the added responsibility as the Rams' recruiting coordinator in 2018 and 2019. In his time at CSU, the Rams posted two of their top five season marks in total offense and points per game. Colorado State reached three bowl games in five seasons while Applewhite was on staff. Applewhite's Colorado State running backs posted 24 individual 100-yard rushing games. Ram running backs Izzy Matthews and Dalyn Dawkins each finished in the top eight on the CSU career rushing list under Applewhite's guidance.

LOUISIANA-MONROE: Applewhite coached for five years at Louisiana-Monroe from 2010 to 2014, working with the running backs and coordinating the Warhawks' recruiting efforts. He coached two all-conference running backs while at ULM. In 2012, his running backs combined for 19 total touchdowns as the Warhawks finished with eight wins and played in the Independence Bowl, the school's first bowl games since joining the FBS in 1994.

MONTANA STATE: Applewhite spent one season at FCS Montana State in 2009. In his one season, Applewhite coached a running back tandem that combined for more than 1,100 rushing yards and 10 touchdowns.

WYOMING: Applewhite was at Wyoming for six seasons as running backs coach from 2003 to 2008. While at Wyoming, Applewhite tutored two of Wyoming's four all-time leading rushers in Devin Moore and Wynel Seldon.

NORTHERN COLORADO: Applewhite spent four seasons from 1999 to 2002 coaching at his alma mater, Northern Colorado. He first served as a graduate assistant in 1999, and was elevated to a full-time assistant coach in 2000. The Bears played in the Division II playoffs in both 1999 and 2002 while Applewhite was on the coaching staff.

Veteran coach Sean Beckton is in his fifth season as Nebraska's tight ends coach in 2022. He is in his 27th season overall as a college coach, having spent the first 22 years of his career coaching in the high school, collegiate and professional ranks in Florida.

Beckton came to Lincoln after spending 19 seasons at UCF, his alma mater, including serving as the Knights' tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator under Scott Frost in 2016 and 2017. Beckton was one of the most important figures in the history of UCF football before deciding to follow Frost to Lincoln.

As a coach, Beckton helped the Knights win four of the six

conference championships in UCF history and claim the program's only two New Year's Six bowl wins. Beckton also played a large role in the only unbeaten season in UCF history in 2017, when the Knights went 13-0 to complete the greatest two-year turnaround in NCAA history. As a player, Beckton concluded his career as UCF's all-time leader in receptions and receiving yards. He was one of the first two football players inducted into the UCF Athletics Hall of Fame.

NEBRASKA (2018-21)

In 2018, Beckton inherited a tight end unit that featured only freshmen and sophomores. Nebraska's tight ends combined for 28 catches, 374 receiving yards and three touchdowns. Jack Stoll led the way with 21 catches for 245 yards and three touchdowns, setting career highs in all three categories, while redshirt freshman Austin Allen led Nebraska with an average of 27.0 yards per reception. In addition to contributing to a passing attack that averaged nearly 250 passing yards per game, the tight ends also added perimeter blocking for a Husker rushing attack that was the nation's third-most improved rushing unit.

In 2019, Beckton's tight ends contributed to a balanced offense that averaged more than 200 passing and rushing yards per game. Stoll set a career high with 25 receptions and led the tight ends with 234 receiving yards. Allen also posted career highs in both receptions and receiving yards.

Beckton's veteran tight end unit was a key part of the Husker offense in 2020. Austin Allen caught 18 passes for 236 yards, including five catches of at least 20 yards. The tight ends also provided blocking for the Big Ten's No. 2 rushing offense.

Allen had a record-setting season under Beckton's guidance in 2021. Allen set Nebraska season tight end records with 38 receptions and 602 yards. He also set a school single-game record with 143 receiving yards at Wisconsin. Allen earned first-team all-conference honors and was the Kwalick-Clark Big Ten Tight End of the Year.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

UCF: Beckton spent a total of 19 seasons at his alma mater, where he was a member of the coaching staff for four of the Knights' first five conference titles in program history, including three American Athletic Conference championships in his final five seasons. In his last season at UCF in 2017, Beckton helped the Knights post the first perfect season in program history and the first undefeated season in AAC history. UCF was the only FBS team to go undefeated in 2017, and the Knights finished with a No. 6 ranking after defeating No. 7 Auburn in the Peach Bowl.

Beckton's tight ends helped UCF post the nation's most improved offense in 2017, when the Knights led the nation in scoring and ranked fifth nationally in total offense. As UCF's recruiting coordinator, he helped Frost land several of the Knights' standout players. Quarterback McKenzie Milton was the 2017 American Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year and each of the Knights' three leading rushers and four of the top six receivers were either freshmen or sophomores.

Beckton's tight ends recorded 87 catches for 1,345 yards and seven touchdowns his last two seasons at UCF. In 2017, the unit totaled 49 receptions for 818 yards and caught five touchdown passes while averaging 16.7 yards per reception. In 2016, UCF's tight ends combined for 38 catches, 527 receiving yards and a pair of touchdown catches.

Individually, Jordan Akins posted his best two seasons under Beckton's coaching. Akins set career highs with 32 receptions for 515 yards and four touchdowns as a senior in 2017, when he was a first-team all-conference selection. In 2016, Akins caught 23 passes for 347 yards. Following his senior season, Akins was selected in the third round of the 2018 NFL Draft.

Before Frost's arrival, Beckton coached the UCF wide receivers from 2012 to 2015, his second stint in that role. Working with a young unit in 2015, Tre'Quan Smith finished with 52 catches for 724 yards, both of which set UCF freshman records. The 2015 American Athletic Conference Rookie of the Year, Smith went on to be a first-team All-AAC selection and Biletnikoff Award nominee in 2017. In 2014, four Knights totaled 500 receiving yards for the first time in program history, led by Breshad Perriman's 1,044 yards. Perriman went on to be a first-round pick in the 2015 NFL Draft. In 2013, three wideouts had at least 500 receiving yards to help UCF to a 12-1 record, an AAC title and a Fiesta Bowl win over Baylor. In Beckton's first year coaching the wide receivers in 2012, the Knights totaled more than 3,100 receiving yards and 28 receiving touchdowns.

Beckton coached defensive backs from 2009 to 2011. The Knights ranked in the top 25 nationally in passing defense in 2011 when cornerback Josh Robinson was a first-team all-conference selection before being selected in the third round of the 2011 NFL Draft. In 2010, UCF won 11 games, a Conference USA title and produced the program's first bowl win and the school's first national ranking. In 2009, he guided Robinson to freshman All-America honors.

Beckton also coached the wide receivers for eight seasons from 1996 to 2003. During that time he coached a slew of top wideouts, including three who went on to NFL careers. His most high-profile pupil was Brandon Marshall, who caught 74 passes for 1,195 yards in 2005 before being selected in the fourth round of the 2006 NFL Draft. Marshall played 13 seasons in the NFL and was a six-time Pro Bowler. Beckton also received his start in the coaching profession as an offensive graduate assistant at UCF in 1992 and 1993.

ORLANDO PREDATORS (AFL): Beckton coached the wide receivers for the Orlando Predators of the American Football League in 2008, helping the team to a 9-7 record and a playoff berth.

MAINLAND (FLA.) HIGH SCHOOL: Beckton was an assistant coach for Mainland (Fla.) High School from 1993 to 1996, where he also taught history. He helped Mainland to a pair of state championships and also worked with the basketball team, where he coached future NBA star Vince Carter.

PLAYING CAREER (UCF)

Originally from Daytona Beach, Fla., Beckton was a star wide receiver at UCF from 1987 to 1990. He ended his career as the program's all-time leader with 196 receptions and 2,493 receiving yards and was one of the first two football players to be enshrined in the UCF Athletics Hall of Fame. Against Texas Southern as a senior, Beckton was responsible for a touchdown four different ways (passing, rushing, receiving and punt return).

Beckton earned his degree from UCF in liberal studies in 1993. He and his wife, Zorana, have one son, Sean Jr., and one daughter, Zaria. Sean Beckton Jr. is a member of the UCF football performance staff, and Zaria earned her degree from Nebraska in May of 2022.

Bill Busch is in his second season at Nebraska in 2022 and his first season as the Huskers' special teams coordinator. Busch, who owns more than three decades of college coaching experience, spent the 2021 season as a defensive analyst with the Huskers.

Busch is in his third coaching stint at Nebraska and second as special teams coordinator. He previously served as a Husker assistant from 2004 to 2007, working with the secondary and special teams. He was also a defensive graduate assistant for the Huskers from 1990 to 1993, helping Nebraska to three consecutive Big Eight titles.

A veteran coach with more than 30 years of experience, Busch has spent more than 20 years of coaching experience at Power Five schools. He has extensive experience in the Big Ten, spending three seasons at Wisconsin, two seasons at Nebraska and Rutgers and one season at Ohio State.

Busch won a national championship as an assistant at LSU in 2019, and he coached in one national title game as a graduate assistant at Nebraska. He has served on the staff of three national championship head coaches (Urban Meyer, Ed Orgeron and Tom Osborne).

NEBRASKA (1990-93, 2004-07 & 2021)

Busch served as a defensive analyst for Nebraska in 2021, helping the Huskers develop one

of their best defenses in recent years. Nebraska allowed only 22.7 points per game in 2021, the program's lowest average since 2010.

Busch served as an assistant coach at Nebraska from 2004 to 2007. In his first season, he coached the outside linebackers and served as special teams coordinator. Busch then coached the safeties and continued to handle special teams duties from 2005 to 2007. During his tenure, the Huskers blocked 16 kicks, including seven in 2005. Nebraska ranked in the top 25 nationally in net punting (24th in 2006) and punt returns (17th in 2005) under Busch. NU's kickoff coverage unit ranked 15th nationally in 2006 after finishing 22nd the previous year.

Busch also spent four seasons as a graduate assistant with the Huskers from 1990 to 1993. Busch worked with the secondary at Nebraska, helping the Huskers to three straight Big Eight titles from 1991 to 1993.

in 2019. Busch coached LSU safety Grant Delpit to back-to-back first team All-America seasons in 2018 and 2019. Delpit, who also claimed the Thorpe Award as the nation's top defensive back in 2019, was a unanimous All-American as a sophomore in 2018. Under Busch's guidance LSU led the SEC in interceptions in both 2018 and 2019. The Tigers finished second in the conference in pass efficiency defense in 2018 and were the only SEC team to hold opposing quarterbacks below .500 in completion percentage (.497) in 2018. Off the field, Busch was one of LSU's top recruiters and played a key role in the Tigers landing Heisman Trophy winner Joe Burrow as a graduate transfer quarterback.

RUTGERS: Busch spent two seasons at Rutgers in 2016 and 2017 where he served as defensive backs coach in 2016 and then added the title of co-defensive coordinator in 2017. In 2016, Busch helped the Scarlet Knights rank among the nation's best in both red zone defense (No. 6 at 72.7 percent) and passing defense (No. 18 at 186.5 yards per game).

OHIO STATE: Busch spent the 2015 season at Ohio State handling quality control on defense. He helped the Buckeyes to a 12-1 season and a No. 4 final ranking in his lone season in Columbus.

WISCONSIN: Prior to joining the Buckeyes, Busch worked for two seasons as the safeties coach at Wisconsin in 2013 and 2014. Busch also assisted with the special teams unit for the Badgers. In his first season at Wisconsin, Busch helped lead a defensive backfield that ranked 17th nationally in passing defense and tied for 13th in passing yards per attempt in 2013. Busch also served as a graduate assistant at Wisconsin in 1994.

UTAH STATE: Busch spent four seasons at Utah State from 2009 to 2012. In his first two seasons (2009-10), Busch served as defensive coordinator before taking over as safeties and special teams coach during the 2011-12 seasons. Busch also served as associate head coach for the Aggies in 2011 and 2012. In 2012, Utah State won a school-record 11 games and finished the year ranked No. 16 in the nation, and Busch was recognized as the Football Scoop National Defensive Backs Coach of the Year. The Aggies were No. 7 nationally in scoring defense (15.4 points per game) and No. 14 in total defense (322.1 yards per game).

UTAH: Busch coached the secondary at Utah from 2001 to 2003, spending a season under head coach Urban Meyer. Utah boasted one of the top defenses in the Mountain West Conference in 2003 to help the Utes to a 10-2 record and their first outright conference title since 1957. Utah's 10 victories that season tied the then-school record. The secondary ranked second in the Mountain West and 27th nationally in pass efficiency defense, as Utah surrendered just nine passing touchdowns in 12 games. In 2001, Utah ranked 17th nationally in pass efficiency defense while earning an 8-4 overall record.

NEW MEXICO STATE: Before his three seasons at Utah, Busch spent four years at New Mexico State where he coached the defensive backs.

NORTHERN ARIZONA: Busch's first full-time coaching job was at Northern Arizona where he was the secondary coach in 1995 and 1996. Busch also served as the co-defensive coordinator in 1996 when he helped guide Northern Arizona to its first appearance in the Division I-AA (now FCS) playoffs.

NEBRASKA WESLEYAN: Busch began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Nebraska Wesleyan, his alma mater.

Mike Dawson is in his third straight season and his fourth season overall on Scott Frost's Nebraska coaching staff. In 2022, Dawson will coach the Husker defensive linemen and edge rushers.

Dawson coached Nebraska's defensive line on Frost's first staff in 2018, before spending the 2019 season as the outside linebackers coach for the New York Giants. He returned to Lincoln in the winter of 2020.

A coaching veteran in his 24th season, Dawson has coached at the FCS, FBS and professional levels. He has spent 19 seasons in the collegiate ranks, including 13 years at the FBS level and eight seasons at a Power Five school. Dawson also boasts four years of coaching experience in the National Football League. He has coached both defensive linemen and outside linebackers in college and the NFL.

Dawson has helped build impressive defenses throughout his career, including working with a UCF squad that ranked second nationally in takeaways in 2017 and a Philadelphia Eagles team that ranked second in the NFL in sacks in 2014. Individually, Dawson has tutored three All-Big Ten performers at Nebraska, and

has coached five different defenders to all-conference accolades in his last four collegiate seasons.

NEBRASKA (2018 & 2020-21)

In Dawson's first year at Nebraska in 2018, his defensive line featured a pair of All-Big Ten performers and helped key a Blackshirts unit that moved up 27 spots in the national scoring defense rankings from the 2017 season. The line helped Nebraska total 25 sacks, 11 more than the Huskers recorded the previous season.

In addition to the pressure created by the defensive line, the unit also helped the Huskers post the ninth-most pass breakups in school history (58). Carlos Davis led the line with five breakups, the most by a Husker defensive lineman since Ndamukong Suh had nine in 2009. Carlos and his twin brother, Khalil, were both all-conference performers in 2018, as Khalil led the defensive line with 41 tackles, eight tackles for loss and 3.0 sacks.

In 2020, Dawson's outside linebackers played a key role for a Blackshirt unit that ranked sixth in the Big Ten in total defense, and lowered opponent rushing yards per attempt by more than a half-yard over 2019. Outside linebacker JoJo Domann led the team with 58 tackles and 6.5 tackles for loss en route to All-Big Ten honors.

Dawson played a key role in the continued improvement of the Nebraska defense in 2021. Nebraska allowed 22.7 points per game, the fewest points allowed per game by a Husker defense in 11 seasons. The Huskers also allowed their fewest yards per game in five seasons at 366.0 per game.

Individually, Dawson oversaw the continued development of outside linebackers Caleb Tannor and Garrett Nelson. Tannor finished the season with a career-high 5.5 tackles for loss, while Nelson led Nebraska in TFL (10.5) and sacks (5) ranking among the Big Ten leaders in both categories.

NEW YORK GIANTS (2019)

Dawson spent the 2019 season coaching the outside linebackers for the New York Giants. Dawson helped Markus Golden to a career year in his fifth year in the league, as Golden totaled a career-high 68 tackles. Golden also had 10.0 sacks – the second-highest total of his career – and scored the first defensive touchdown of his career. Dawson also helped Oshane Ximines record 4.5 sacks in his rookie season.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

UCF: Dawson spent two seasons on Frost's staff at UCF in 2016 and 2017. UCF improved by more than 12 points per game in scoring defense during Dawson's tenure, and the defense helped out the offense by forcing 58 turnovers and scoring nine defensive touchdowns in his two seasons. UCF ranked third nationally in takeaways over the 2016 and 2017 seasons.

In 2017, Dawson's defensive line helped UCF post the first perfect season in program and AAC history when UCF finished 13-0 as the nation's only undefeated team. The Knights ranked third in the league in scoring defense and fourth in rushing defense. Two of his three starting defensive linemen earned all-conference accolades.

In 2016, the Knights ranked in the top 10 nationally in four defensive categories and in the top 25 in nine categories. UCF ranked second nationally in red zone defense, sixth in third-down defense and ninth in tackles for loss. The defense was the key to UCF leading the nation with a six-win improvement from the 2015 to 2016 season.

PHILADÉLPHIA EAGLES: Dawson spent three seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles from 2013 to 2015. He served as a defensive quality control coach in 2013, when the Eagles won the NFC East and ranked third in the NFL with 31 takeaways. Dawson spent the next two seasons as an assistant defensive line coach, helping Philadelphia rank second in the NFL in sacks (49) and fifth in opponent yards per carry (3.7) in 2014.

BOSTON COLLEGE: Dawson was Boston College's special teams coach for three seasons from 2009 to 2011. In his first year, Steve Aponavicius set school records for career points, extra points made and field-goal percentage. The next year, Nate Freese was 22-of-25 on field goals, and he went on to break Aponavicius' career scoring record. Dawson also coached punter Ryan Quigley, who went on to play six seasons in the NFL.

AKRON: Dawson coached the Akron linebackers for three seasons from 2006 to 2008. He tutored all-conference linebacker Brion Stokes, who ended his career with 38.5 tackles for loss, the second-most in school history.

NEW HAMPSHIRE: Dawson had a six-year stint at New Hampshire from 2000 to 2005. He held three different positions with the Wildcats, coaching the linebackers in 2000 and 2002-03, the offensive line in 2001 and serving as defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005. In his two seasons leading the defense, New Hampshire posted a 21-5 record and reached the 2005 FCS quarterfinals, when the Wildcats led the country with 45 takeaways.

PITTSBURGH, MAINE AND UMASS-LOWELL: Dawson's first coaching stint in the FBS ranks came as a graduate assistant at Pittsburgh in 1998. Dawson began his coaching career as the defensive line coach in the spring of 1998 for UMass-Lowell before he joined Maine as a defensive assistant for the 1998 season.

PLAYING CAREER (UMASS)

Dawson was a three-year starter at linebacker and defensive end from 1995 to 1997 at UMass-Amherst. He served as team captain as a senior in 1997.

Travis Fisher is in his fifth season as Nebraska's defensive backs coach in 2022. Fisher entered the coaching ranks following a nine-year NFL career, and he is in the 10th season of his coaching career, the last seven of which have been as a member of Scott Frost's staffs at UCF and Nebraska.

Fisher has been able to transfer his success and experience as a player into coaching. Fisher's defensive backs have consistently

held opposing passing attacks in check while showing a knack for interceptions. After inheriting a Husker secondary that allowed more than 275 passing yards per game in 2017, Fisher helped Nebraska hold five opponents to fewer than 200 passing yards in 2018.

NU held six opponents to fewer than 165 passing yards in 2019, when the Huskers ranked No. 33 nationally in pass efficiency defense. On the strength of a veteran secondary, the 2020 Blackshirts continued to improve and finished sixth in the Big Ten in total defense. The 2021 Husker defense allowed its fewest points per game in 11 seasons, and posted its best total defense mark in five years. Fisher led UCF to a No. 12 ranking in pass efficiency defense in 2016, and the Knights ranked second nationally with 20 interceptions in 2017.

Fisher has excelled developing individual talent. Nine of his defensive backs have signed NFL contracts in the last four years. In just one year, Fisher turned junior college transfer Mike Hughes into an All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick. Hughes was selected with the 30th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft, surpassing Fisher as the highest-drafted defensive player in UCF history. Fisher was selected in the second round of the 2002 NFL Draft following three seasons as a Knight.

In addition to developing players, Fisher has impressed in his role of bringing talent to Lincoln as one of Nebraska's top recruiters.

NEBRASKA (2018-21)

Fisher made an instant impact on the Husker secondary in his first season in 2018, when Nebraska produced impressive results as a team and individually. NU ranked 34th nationally in pass efficiency defense in 2018, a 61-spot improvement from 2017. Dicaprio Bootle shined under Fisher's guidance in 2018, earning All-Big Ten accolades. Bootle set career highs in every category and led the Big Ten and ranked ninth nationally with 15 pass breakups, the second-highest total in school history. At the opposite corner spot, Lamar Jackson posted his best season as a Husker, intercepting the first two passes of his career, breaking up a career-high seven passes and recording the first tackle for loss and forced fumble of his career.

Each of Nebraska's four primary safeties had at least one interception and one fumble forced or recovered in 2018. All told, Fisher's secondary recorded eight interceptions, forced 10 fumbles and had four fumble recoveries, helping Nebraska post its highest turnover total in four seasons. The secondary also combined for 41 pass breakups, helping Nebraska rank ninth in school history with 58 total pass breakups.

In 2019, Nebraska held six of its 12 opponents to fewer than 165 yards passing, including four opponents under 100 yards. Nebraska again ranked in the top 35 nationally in pass efficiency defense, and the Huskers were 11th nationally with two interception returns for touchdowns. Individually, Lamar Jackson ranked in the top 15 nationally in pass breakups and passes defended, while Cam Taylor-Britt - in just his second season playing defense - ranked fifth in the country with four forced fumbles, the most by a Husker since 1999. Jackson and Taylor-Britt also tied for the team lead with three interceptions.

Under Fisher's guidance, three of Nebraska's four secondary starters were All-Big Ten selections. Bootle earned All-Big Ten accolades for the second straight season, with Jackson and Taylor-Britt earning all-conference recognition for the first time.

Fisher's veteran secondary again shined in 2020. Each of the four starters in the secondary earned all-conference recognition. Bootle completed his Husker career as a three-time All-Big Ten honoree, finishing in ninth place in Nebraska history in career breakups. Taylor-Britt earned second-team

all-conference honors and once again showed his play-making ability with two interceptions, four breakups and 28 tackles. The hard-hitting safety duo of Marquel Dismuke and Deontai Williams combined for 98 tackles, eight tackles for loss and eight pass breakups.

In 2021, Fisher's experienced secondary helped Nebraska hold opponents to 22.7 points per game despite playing a schedule that featured eight teams that won at least nine games. Individually, three Husker veterans earned all-conference honors, including Taylor-Britt who was a second-team All-Big Ten pick and a second-round pick in the 2022 NFL Draft. Senior safeties Williams and Dismuke were honorable-mention selections. Williams led the Nebraska defense with four interceptions, while Dismuke finished his career as one of eight Nebraska defensive backs with 200 career tackles.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

UCF: At his alma mater, Fisher helped turn the UCF defense into one of the top units in the American Athletic Conference. Fisher's defensive backs were a big reason why the Knights were able to record 58 takeaways and score nine defensive touchdowns in 2016 and 2017. UCF ranked third nationally in takeaways over the 2016 and 2017 seasons combined, and the Knights ranked fifth with 35 interceptions, including 26 from Fisher's defensive backs. In 2017, UCF led the AAC and was second nationally in interceptions.

Fisher's unit helped UCF go 13-0 as the nation's only undefeated team in 2017 while posting the first perfect season in school and conference history. The Knights led the league in interceptions and defensive touchdowns and ranked third in scoring defense and pass efficiency defense. UCF's 20 interceptions ranked fifth nationally, with 15 of the interceptions by Fisher's defensive backs, two of which were returned for touchdowns.

Cornerback Mike Hughes and safety Kyle Gibson were both first-team all-conference selections and each ranked in the top 25 nationally in interceptions. Hughes went on to earn second-team All-America honors in his only season at UCF before being a first-round selection in the 2018 NFL Draft, eclipsing Fisher as the highest-drafted defensive back in UCF history.

A year earlier, five defensive backs from the 2016 roster signed NFL contracts following the season, including third-round draft pick Shaquill Griffin. In 2016, Griffin helped UCF post the 12th-best pass efficiency defense nationally, while the defensive backs totaled 12 of the Knights' 15 interceptions. The group also returned four interceptions for touchdowns, helping UCF rank third nationally with five defensive touchdowns. Individually, Griffin led the AAC and was fifth nationally with 1.5 passes defended per game, and his 15 pass breakups in 2017 and 36 career breakups were both the second-most in UCF history. Drico Johnson also set a school record by becoming the first UCF player to score two defensive touchdowns in one game, accomplishing the feat against Tulane.

A former Knight cornerback, Fisher also spent the 2015 season at UCF, where he coached the cornerbacks in his first season as an FBS assistant. He began his coaching career as a defensive quality assistant with UCF in 2013, when the Knights went 12-1 and finished with a No. 10 ranking.

SOUTHEAST MISSOURI STATE: Fisher's first full-time coaching role came as the cornerbacks coach at Southeast Missouri State in 2014.

PLAYING CAREER (UCF & NFL)

As a player, Fisher totaled 130 tackles with the Knights from 1999 to 2001. He was selected in the second round of the 2002 NFL Draft with the 64th overall pick by the St. Louis Rams. Fisher had been the highest drafted defensive back in UCF history before his pupil Hughes was selected in the first round of the 2018 NFL Draft. Fisher went on to spend nine seasons in the NFL and led the NFL with two interception returns for touchdowns and 205 interception return yards in 2003.

PERSONAL

Former Husker quarterback Mickey Joseph is in his first season as Nebraska's passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach. He also serves as Scott Frost's associate head coach.

Joseph has nearly three decades of coaching experience, including time as a collegiate head coach at Langston University in Oklahoma. His role as NU's associate head coach is a familiar one, as he also served as assistant head coach at LSU (2020-21) and Alcorn State (2013).

Joseph was a key part of LSU's 2019 national championship staff. His receivers helped the Tigers set an FBS record with 60 touchdown receptions, while helping Joe Burrow rank third in FBS history in season passing yards (5,671).

Josephhasa proventrack record of recruiting and developing wide receivers. Recognized as a Rivals Top 25 Recruiter, Josephhad four wide receivers selected in the first three rounds of the past two NFL Drafts (2020 and 2021). That includes Ja'Marr Chase, who was the 2021 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year after being selected with the No. 5 overall pick.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

LSU: Joseph came to Nebraska from LSU, where he coached for five seasons and helped the Tigers to the 2019 national championship. Joseph was responsible for developing some of the nation's top receivers during his time with the Tigers.

In 2019, LSU assembled the best group of receivers in SEC history. The Tigers' three starters—Ja'Marr Chase, Justin Jefferson and Terrace Marshall—

combined for 241 receptions for 3,991 yards and 51 touchdowns.

Chase was the 2019 Biletnikoff Award winner, earned first-team All-America honors and set SEC records for receiving yards and receiving touchdowns. Jefferson set the LSU record with 111 receptions. Overall, Joseph coached four receivers selected in the first two rounds of the NFL Draft during his time at LSU, including Chase, the fifth pick in the 2021 Draft and Jefferson, the 22nd pick in the 2020 NFL Draft.

A New Orleans native, Joseph was part of an offensive staff that helped LSU set several SEC records in 2019, including passing yards (6,024), passing TDs (61) and total offense per game (568.4) en route to a 15-0 season and national championship. Joseph also helped LSU post a 10-3 record in 2018 and a 9-4 mark in 2017.

In addition to his work with the LSU receivers, Joseph served as the Tigers' assistant head coach for his final two seasons. He also played a prominent role in LSU having a record five first-round picks in the 2020 NFL Draft through his recruiting and player development.

Louisiana Tech ranked second nationally in scoring (44.3 points per game) and averaged 514.9 total yards per game.

GRAMBLING STATE: Joseph coached receivers and special teams at Grambling in 2014 and 2015, helping the Tigers to 16 wins in two seasons.

ALCORN STATE: Joseph was the special teams coordinator and wide receivers coach at Alcorn State in 2013, helping the school to a 9-3 record, its most wins in 30 years.

HOUSTON TEXANS: During the summer of 2012, Joseph spent time with the Houston Texans as part of an NFL minority internship. While in Houston, Joseph worked with the running backs and all aspects of special teams.

LANGSTON UNIVERSITY: Joseph spent five seasons at Langston University from 2008 to 2012. He served as the head coach in 2011 and 2012, when he led Langston to a 13-7 record.

CENTRAL OKLAHOMA: Joseph was the running backs coach at Central Oklahoma in 2004 and 2005, helping the school to an 8-4 record in 2004.

NICHOLLS STATE: Joseph was the quarterbacks coach at Nicholls State from 2001 to 2003. In 2002, Joseph helped quarterback Josh Son earn first-team all-conference honors as the Colonels finished 7-4.

ALABAMA STATE: Joseph's first job as a collegiate wide receivers coach came at Alabama State in 2000.

TULANE: Joseph's first coaching job at the FBS level was as a graduate assistant at Tulane in 1999.

WAYNE STATE COLLEGE: Joseph's first collegiate coaching job was as an assistant coach and run game coordinator at Wayne State College in 1997.

HIGH SCHOOL COACHING: Before working at Langston, Joseph served as the head football coach and Director of Athletics for Desire Street Academy, a private school in New Orleans' Ninth Ward area. Joseph guided the school through the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, including moving the school to Florida. Overall, seven of his players at the school signed with Division I football programs.

Joseph has had two other high school coaching stops. He began his coaching career as an assistant at Omaha North High School in 1995 and 1996. In 1998, Joseph was an assistant at his alma mater, Archbishop Shaw High School in New Orleans.

PLAYING CAREER (NEBRASKA)

Joseph was one of the nation's most prized prep recruits when he joined Coach Tom Osborne's Nebraska program in 1988. He was the Gatorade National Player of the Year and a first-team Parade All-American. Joseph started nine games in his Nebraska career, rushing for 1,091 yards and 16 touchdowns, while passing for 909 yards and 14 touchdowns. During his four seasons, Nebraska posted a 39-9-1 overall record, won two Big Eight titles, while playing in two Orange Bowl games, a Citrus Bowl and a Fiesta Bowl.

PERSONAL

Joseph earned his degree from Nebraska in 1993. He and his wife, Priscilla Arzaga Joseph, have six children: Jacob, Zackary, Makiyah, Malania, Maya and Mickey Reign.

Donovan Raiola is in his first season as Nebraska's offensive line coach. Raiola owns 11 years of coaching experience, including four years as an offensive line coach in the National Football League.

Raiola joined Nebraska after spending four seasons as an assistant offensive line coach with the Chicago Bears. Raiola also coached offensive linemen at Aurora (III.) University, in addition to collegiate coaching stops at Notre Dame and Hawaii.

In addition to being in his sixth season as an offensive line coach, Raiola was an outstanding

lineman himself. A three-time All-Big Ten selection at Wisconsin, Raiola went on to play six seasons in the NFL.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

CHICAGO BEARS: Raiola helped the Bears to two playoff appearances in his four seasons on staff from 2018 to 2021. In his first season in Chicago assisting offensive line coach Harry Hiestand, the Bears posted a 12-4 record and captured the NFC North Division title. The Bears offensive line allowed just 33 sacks, tied for the third fewest in the NFC, while Chicago averaged 26.3 points per game, the fourth-best average in the NFC.

In the 2020 season, Raiola helped tutor an offensive line that featured six different starting combinations. Raiola assisted in helping develop a pair of rookie undrafted free agents (Sam Mustipher and Alex Bars) into starters late in the season, as the Bears reached the NFC playoffs. The Bears rushed for more than 2,000 yards in 2021, ranking seventh in the NFC in rushing.

AURORA UNIVERSITY: Raiola spent the 2017 season as the offensive line coach at Aurora University in Illinois. Raiola's line helped the Spartans average more than 200 yards rushing.

NOTRE DAME: Raiola was an offensive graduate assistant at Notre Dame in 2015 and 2016 assisting offensive line coach Harry Hiestand, helping develop six Fighting Irish offensive linemen who went on to play in the NFL. In 2015, the Fighting Irish finished with a 10-3 record and averaged more than 34 points per game. Notre Dame against averaged more than 30 points per game in 2016.

HAWAII: Raiola's first collegiate stop was in his home state of Hawaii as an offensive intern in 2014. At Hawaii, Raiola worked under Head Coach Norm Chow, who was an accomplished offensive coordinator who helped USC to a pair of national titles in 2003 and 2004.

KAMEHAMEHA SCHOOLS-KAPALAMA: Raiola began his coaching career with two seasons at Kamehameha Schools-Kapalama in 2012 and 2013. At Kamehameha Schools-Kapalama, Raiola coached the offensive line and organized clinics for offensive linemen throughout the state of Hawaii.

PLAYING CAREER (WISCONSIN & NFL)

Raiola spent parts of six seasons playing in the NFL, signing contracts with the Rams, Steelers, Seahawks, Cardinals, Bears, Buccaneers and Commanders. Raiola started 39 games at center for Wisconsin and was a three-time honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection from 2003 to 2005. He helped the Badgers to top-20 finishes in each of his final two seasons.

PERSONAL

Raiola earned his degree in agricultural business management from Wisconsin in 2005. He is the younger brother of Dominic Raiola, an All-America center and Rimington Trophy winner for the Huskers. Dominic Raiola played 14 seasons in the National Football League with the Detroit Lions.

Barrett Ruud, Nebraska's all-time leading tackler, is in his fifth season as the Huskers' linebackers coach in 2022. Ruud entered the coaching ranks shortly after an eight-year NFL career, and he has been a member of Scott Frost's staff each of the last seven years.

Ruud spent his first four years in the profession in an off-field coaching role, but he was elevated to inside linebackers coach in January of 2018. Ruud has made a big impact with the Husker linebackers. In 2021 sophomore linebackers Luke Reimer and Nick Henrich combined for 207 tackles and both ranked among Big Ten leaders in tackles per game.

It should come as no surprise that Ruud has produced prolific tacklers while coaching Nebraska's inside linebackers. As a Husker linebacker himself, he recorded 432 tackles, 90 more than any other player in program history. Ruud then went on to make more than 650 tackles during his eight-year NFL career.

NEBRASKA (2014; 2018-21)

In his first season as a full-time assistant coach in 2018, Ruud's inside linebackers helped Nebraska improve by 27 spots in the national scoring defense rankings from the 2017 season and by 61 spots in pass efficiency defense. Both of Ruud's starting inside linebackers put together impressive seasons in 2018, with Mohamed Barry leading the team with 112 tackles, the best by a Husker linebacker since All-American Lavonte David had 133 tackles in 2011. Barry ranked second in the Big Ten in tackles per game and earned all-conference accolades.

Dedrick Young II also had a career high in tackles in his lone season with Ruud as his position coach. Young totaled a career-high 83 tackles in 2018 to end his career with 284 tackles, the fifth-highest total in Nebraska history. In addition to his career high in tackles, Young also broke up a career-high five passes and intercepted the first pass of his career.

In Ruud's second season, Nebraska's top three tacklers were inside linebackers. Barry led the Huskers in tackles for the second straight season with 89 stops, while Will Honas was second with 73 tackles, and Collin Miller was third on the team with 67 tackles. Barry earned All-Big Ten honors for the second straight season.

Ruud adeptly rotated inside linebackers in 2020 as the Huskers battled injuries. Honas led the group with 57 tackles, 6.5 tackles for loss and three sacks on his way to all-conference honors. Miller made 27 tackles in four games before a neck injury ended his playing career. The development of a pair of underclassmen highlighted Ruud's coaching. Sophomore Luke Reimer made 40 tackles and five tackles for loss, while redshirt freshman Nick Henrich moved inside late in the season and finished the year with 27 tackles. The play of the linebackers helped Nebraska rank sixth in the Big Ten in total defense.

Reimer and Henrich flourished under Ruud's coaching in 2021, helping Nebraska allow just 22.7 points per game, the best by a Husker defense in 11 seasons. Nebraska's 366.0 yards per game allowed also marked its best total in five years.

Reimer led Nebraska with 109 tackles, including five double-figure tackle games with 16 tackles against Buffalo and 19 against Purdue. Reimer also recorded six tackles for loss, broke up six passes and forced three fumbles and was an honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection. Henrich nearly joined Reimer in reaching 100 tackles, registering 98 tackles in his first full season as a starter. Henrich had three games with double-figure tackles, including a career-high 15 stops against Big Ten champion Michigan.

Ruud also served as a defensive intern at Nebraska in 2014. That marked his first venture into the coaching profession and came two years after his NFL playing career ended.

Ruud boasts extensive knowledge of the linebacker position from his playing days. He totaled a school-record 432 tackles in his Nebraska career, 90 more than any other Husker. He was a freshman All-American, a three-time All-Big 12 selection and a 2004 third-team All-American. Ruud played in the 2002 Rose Bowl when Nebraska battled Miami for the national championship.

Following his NU career, Ruud was a second-round pick in the 2005 NFL Draft, when the Tampa Bay Buccaneers selected him with the 36th overall pick. Ruud spent eight seasons in the NFL, recording 658 tackles with six sacks, seven interceptions and six forced fumbles. He played six seasons in Tampa Bay and also played for Tennessee, New Orleans and Houston.

PERSONAL

Ruud graduated with a degree in business management from Nebraska in 2005. He and his wife, Jenna, have two sons, Brooks and Hudson, and a daughter, Jaimes.

ZACH **DUVAL**



[HEAD STRENGTH COACH]

The 2017 National Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year, Zach Duval is in his fifth season as Nebraska's head football strength and conditioning coach and his seventh year under Scott Frost. Duval previously worked as a Husker Power student assistant (1994), graduate assistant (1995-96) and assistant football strength coach (1997-2002 and 2008).

Nebraska's players have made great strides in their physical development since Duval's arrival. During Duval's first four seasons with the Huskers, 45 Huskers have been recognized as All-Big Ten selections. In 2022, Nebraska had two players selected in the first two rounds of the NFL Draft for the first time in seven years, helping the Huskers produce their most NFL Draft picks overall in six years.

Duval followed Frost to Lincoln after two seasons as the director of sports performance for football at UCF, where he also oversaw the school's entire sports performance department. Duval helped Frost's team to a 13-0 record in 2017, two years after the Knights were a winless team. Aided by Duval's development, UCF was the nation's only undefeated team in 2017. Individually, an American Athletic Conference-record 16 Knights were selected as all-conference performers. In Duval's first season at UCF, he helped UCF qualify for a bowl game as the nation's most improved team.

Duval went to Orlando after a two-year stint at Wyoming, where he served as the director of sports performance with the Cowboys. At Wyoming, Duval was certified as a Master Strength and Conditioning Coach by the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches association, the highest honor given in the strength and conditioning coaching profession.

Duval was the director of sports performance at Buffalo from 2010 to 2013, where he worked with All-American Khalil Mack, the fifth overall pick in the 2014 NFL Draft. In 2009, he was the director of athletics performance at Creighton. The first 15 years of Duval's strength and conditioning career were spent at Nebraska or in private business, where he founded the XPlosive Edge Performance Center in Nebraska and later co-owned and managed The Performance and Wellness Institute in Colorado.

Duval previously spent a total of 10 seasons with Husker Power. Duval returned to Nebraska as a strength coach in 2008 after previously serving as an assistant football strength coach with the Huskers from 1997 to 2002. He was a graduate assistant with Husker Power in 1995 and 1996 and served as a student assistant in 1994. Nebraska won three national championships with Duval on the strength staff, and he was a member of the staff for three seasons when Frost was a Husker.

Zach earned his degree in exercise science from Nebraska. He and his wife Sarah have three daughters, Sonja, Capri and Zolie, and two sons, Bronx and Jaggar.



JASEN CARLSON



ASSISTANT STRENGTH COACH]

Jasen Carlson is in his fifth year as an assistant football strength coach at Nebraska. Carlson has worked alongside Head Football Strength and Conditioning Coach Zach Duval in each of his eight seasons in the profession. Carlson assists Duval in all aspects of the strength and conditioning program.

Previously, Carlson was a sports performance assistant under Duval at UCF in 2016 and 2017. In his two seasons, Carlson helped the Knights post the greatest two-year turnaround in college football history, as UCF went from an 0-12 season to a 13-0 campaign. The Knights finished as the nation's only undefeated team in 2017 and were ranked No. 6.

Carlson's first job came as a graduate assistant under Duval at Wyoming in 2015. Carlson and Duval first became acquainted with each other at the University of Buffalo, where Duval was the Bulls' director or sports performance while Carlson was a player. An offensive lineman, Carlson was a four-year letterwinner and three-year starter at Buffalo from 2010 to 2013, earning all-conference accolades as a senior. He graduated from Buffalo with a degree in sociology.



DAN **Millington**

Dan Millington is in his fifth season as an assistant football strength coach at Nebraska. In his 11th year overall as a collegiate strength coach, Millington assists Zach Duval in all aspects of the strength and conditioning program.

Previously, Millington served as an assistant strength and conditioning coach at East Carolina from 2014 to 2017. At ECU, he assisted with all aspects of the football strength and conditioning program and worked with the women's basketball, track and field and swimming and diving programs.

Millington began his full-time career at Indiana State, his alma mater. He spent three seasons on the Sycamores' strength and conditioning staff, assisting with the football team while also designing and implementing strength, speed and conditioning programs for men's and women's basketball, baseball, women's soccer, volleyball, golf and track and field. Millington also developed, organized and served as the director of Indiana State's strength and conditioning clinic.

Millington earned his degree in exercise science from Indiana State in 2010, where he played on the Sycamores' defensive line and was a 2009 second-team academic All-American. Following his playing career, Millington served as a senior undergraduate intern with the strength and conditioning program at Indiana State, before accepting a postgraduate internship position at Villanova for the 2010-11 season. He returned to Indiana State following that stint and earned his master's degree in 2014.



ANDREW STROP

Andrew Strop is in his fifth season as an assistant football strength coach at Nebraska. Strop has worked under Husker Head Football Strength and Conditioning Coach Zach Duval at every stop of his career, as Strop was on Duval's staff at UCF, Wyoming and Buffalo.

Strop assists Duval in all aspects of the Husker strength and conditioning program. Before Nebraska, Strop sent two seasons as an assistant director of sports performance for football under Duval at UCF. With the Knights, Strop helped UCF post the greatest two-year turnaround in college football history, as the Knights went from an 0-12 record in 2015 to a perfect 13-0 season in 2017, when UCF was the nation's only undefeated team.

Strop also worked under Duval as a football strength coach at Wyoming in 2014 and 2015. Strop began his career as an assistant strength coach under Duval at Buffalo, working with football and men's basketball.

Strop earned his degree in allied health science from The College of the Ozarks, and he is a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist.



RYAN Teifer

Ryan Teifer has been part of Nebraska's strength and conditioning staff every season under Zach Duval. Teifer is a developmental performance quality control coach and was previously a strength and conditioning intern.

Teifer came to Nebraska after serving on Duval's strength and conditioning staff at UCF for two seasons. During Teifer's time working with the Knights he helped UCF to the greatest two-year turnaround in NCAA history, culminated by a 13-0 record and Peach Bowl victory in 2017.

Teifer earned his degree in sports and exercise science from UCF in 2017.

RON **BROWN**



SENIOR OFFENSIVE ANALYST

Ron Brown is in his fifth season on Scott Frost's Nebraska football staff, and his second season as a senior offensive analyst. Brown spent his first three seasons on Frost's staff as the Huskers' director of player development.

A veteran college coach, Brown has a long association with Husker football, serving as an assistant coach for 24 seasons (1987-2003 and again from 2008-14).

Overall, Brown brings 32 years of college coaching experience to the staff. He coached for four seasons at his alma mater, Brown University, before his 24 seasons at Nebraska. Brown's most recent coaching stop came as the associate head coach at Liberty for three seasons from 2014 to 2017, where he served under former Husker player and assistant coach Turner Gill.

Brown was a part of three national championships at Nebraska, and he coached more than 40 academic all-conference players and nearly 40 players that went on to professional careers.

Brown coached the Nebraska tight ends (2008-10) and running backs (2011-14) during his most recent stint with the Huskers. During that time, he tutored future NFL running backs Rex Burkhead and Ameer Abdullah, who rank second and sixth, respectively, on NU's all-time rushing list.

Burkhead earned first-team Academic All-America honors in both 2011 and 2012, while Abdullah was a Doak Walker Award finalist as a senior in 2014. Abdullah left Nebraska as the school's No. 2 all-time rusher and all-time leader in all-purpose yards.

During his time as an assistant from 1987 to 2003, Brown coached the Nebraska wide receivers and tight ends. Brown's players had a reputation for their tenacity and downfield blocking, helping Nebraska to nine NCAA rushing crowns in 17 seasons.

Brown spent four years from 2004 to 2007 as the Nebraska State Director of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. A native of New York, Brown earned his bachelor's degree from Brown in 1979, and a master's degree from Columbia in 1982.

Ron is married to Molvina Carter.

[SENIOR OFFENSIVE ANALYST]

Steve Cooper is in his first season as a senior offensive analyst for Nebraska in 2022. Overall, Cooper is in his fifth season at Nebraska after serving as an offensive quality control coach from 2018 to 2021.

In his first season working with Scott Frost's offensive system in 2018, Cooper helped the Huskers rank 25th nationally in total offense and Nebraska had both a 1,000-yard rusher and 1,000-yard receiver for the first time in program history. In 2019, Nebraska produced its most total yards and most points ever in a Big Ten Conference game, while the 2020 Husker offense ranked second in the Big Ten in rushing offense. In 2021, Nebraska ranked 20th nationally in total offense, its highest ranking in that category since 2008.

Cooper came to Lincoln from Portland State, his alma mater. He began his coaching tenure at Portland State as a graduate assistant, and he also served as a full-time coach with the Vikings, serving as an assistant working with the tight ends and wide receivers before being promoted to offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach.

In his first season as offensive coordinator, Portland State improved its scoring average by 10 points per game and rushed for more than 3,000 yards. In 2016, PSU averaged 454.2 yards and 33.2 points per game. In his final season with the Vikings in 2017, Cooper helped a pair of freshmen quarterbacks power an offense that averaged 429.0 yards per game.

Cooper earned his bachelor's degree in philosophy from Portland State. He was a wide receiver for the Vikings during his playing career.



MIKE CASSANO



[OFFENSIVE ANALYST]

Mike Cassano is in his fifth season at Nebraska and his seventh straight year on Scott Frost's staff. Cassano serves as an offensive analyst for the fourth straight season after being in charge of national high school relations in his first year in Lincoln. Cassano had previous experience in both positions as he served as both the director of high school relations and as a quality control administrator for the offense in his two seasons at UCF.

Cassano boasts more than 15 years of coaching experience. He came to UCF after more than a year at UMass, serving as the passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach for a Minutemen team that ranked 11th nationally in passing in 2015. Cassano was also at UMass from 1998 to 2003 as the running backs coach, helping the Minutemen to the 1998 Division I-AA (now FCS) national title under Mark Whipple.

In between his stints at UMass, Cassano was the assistant director of player personnel at Georgia Tech in 2013, the running backs coach at Miami in 2010, the running backs coach and recruiting coordinator at Florida International from 2007 to 2009 and an offensive graduate assistant and offensive assistant at Miami from 2004 to 2006. In 1995 and 1996, Cassano was a graduate assistant and safeties coach for Eastern Michigan after spending one season as a defensive graduate assistant at Lehigh.

Cassano earned his bachelor's degree in physical education pedagogy from New Hampshire in 1994.

D.J. **VOKOLEK**



SENIOR DEFENSIVE QUALITY CONTROL

D.J. Vokolek is in his first season as Nebraska's senior defensive quality control coach in 2022. Vokolek owns more than 25 years of collegiate coaching experience.

Vokolek came to Nebraska after serving as the assistant head coach at Northern Iowa, his second stint at the school. Vokolek coached the Panther linebackers from 2017 to 2021. He was also the assistant head coach at UNI from 2003 to 2005, serving as linebackers coach in 2003, co-defensive coordinator in 2004 and defensive coordinator in 2005. He helped the Panthers to a pair of conference titles and an appearance in the 2005 FCS National Championship game. Vokolek spent a total of eight seasons on the UNI staff.

In 2015, Vokolek was the assistant head coach and defensive backs coach at Buffalo. He went to Buffalo after spending nine seasons as the associate head coach and defensive coordinator at Missouri State. In his role at Missouri State, Vokolek was responsible for organization, direction and evaluation of defensive game plans, schemes and techniques for each position of the Bears' defense.

Before his first stint at UNI from 2003 to 2005, Vokolek spent the first 10 years of his coaching career in Nebraska. He was at UNO for six seasons from 1997 to 2002, serving as the Mavs' defensive coordinator and linebackers coach from 2000 to 2002 and as the linebackers coach and academic coordinator from 1997 to 1999. Vokolek's first full-time job was as the defensive backs coach and recruiting coordinator at Wayne State in 1996. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at UNO from 1993 to 1995.

Vokolek played collegiately at Nebraska-Kearney, where he was a three-year team captain and three-time All-Nebraska selection as a defensive back/linebacker.

D.J. and his wife, Pam, have a son, Travis, and a daughter Leah. Travis is a tight end for the Huskers.



DEMEITRE **BRIM**



[DEFENSIVE QUALITY CONTROL]

Demeitre Brim is in his fifth season on the Husker staff in 2022. He is a defensive quality control coach after previously serving as a defensive analyst in 2021 and as a graduate assistant from 2018 to 2020. One of Brim's primary assignments is to assist inside linebackers coach Barrett Ruud. Brim played for both Ruud and Nebraska Head Coach Scott Frost while Brim was a linebacker at UCF.

Brim helped Dedrick Young II set a career high in tackles as a senior in 2018, when Young concluded his career as one of the top five all-time tacklers in the history of Nebraska football. Brim also helped Mo Barry to a breakout junior season in 2018, when Barry ranked second in the Big Ten in tackles per game en route to all-conference honors. Barry repeated as an All-Big Ten pick in 2019. In 2020, Will Honas was an honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection after averaging more than eight tackles per game. In 2021, starting inside linebackers Luke Reimer and Nick Henrich - both underclassmen - led Nebraska with 108 and 99 tackles, respectively.

As a player, Brim spent three seasons at UCF after beginning his career at Virginia, where he lettered as a freshman and sophomore. While at UCF, Brim was a two-year letterwinner at middle linebacker, starting 12 games as a senior in 2016 when the Knights made a bowl game in Frost's first season. Brim also served on the UCF Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and the Leadership Board for Student-Athletes.

Brim earned his bachelor's degree from UCF in 2016 with an interdisciplinary studies degree in education and sociology. As a graduate assistant at Nebraska, Brim is pursuing his master's degree in higher education administration.



JOEY CONNORS



SPECIAL TEAMS QUALITY CONTROL

Joey Connors is in his second season as Nebraska's special teams quality control coach in 2022.

Connors came to Nebraska after serving as an offensive line graduate assistant at Troy prior to the 2021 season. Previously, he was the defensive line coach for Greensboro College in 2020. Prior to his time at Greensboro, Connors coached at Sprayberry High School and with the Velocity Football Academy, helping Sprayberry to the state playoffs for the first time in nine seasons. Connors' first coaching job came as an instructor with the Hoya Youth Football program and as an intern with the Orlando Apollos of the Alliance of American Football.

Connors earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from UCF in 2017 and his master's degree in interdisciplinary studies in 2019. He was a four-year letterwinner for the Knights football team, serving as a team captain in 2017 and 2018. Connors helped UCF to a 12-0 record in 2017, Scott Frost's final season as the Knights' head coach.



WES **FLEMING**



[DEFENSIVE QUALITY CONTROL]

Wes Fleming is in his first season as a defensive quality control coach at Nebraska after previous stops at Army, Midland and Kansas Wesleyan. Fleming spent the 2021 season as a defensive quality control coach at Army, helping the Black Knights to a nine-win season with an Armed

Forces Bowl win against Missouri to finish the season.

Prior to Army, Fleming served as the offensive coordinator for two seasons (2019-20) at Midland University, where he guided the Warriors to record-breaking numbers. While also coaching quarterbacks, Fleming's first year on staff saw Midland break school season records for total points (397), scoring average (36.1) and passing touchdowns (31).

Before Midland, Fleming coached in a number of key roles at Kansas Wesleyan. After Fleming was promoted to offensive and special teams coordinator in 2018, Kansas Wesleyan dominated its conference, registering an undefeated record to advance to the semifinals of the national playoffs. School and conference record books were rewritten in 2018, when the Coyotes set new highs in wins (13), total yards (6,935) and total points (676). Kansas Wesleyan finished with a No. 6 national ranking and 10 players earned all-conference honors, including the conference player of the year and offensive player of the year.

The Chicago Heights, Ill., native began his coaching career at alma mater St. Ambrose University after his graduation in 2015. Fleming also earned a master's degree in business administration from Kansas Wesleyan in 2017.



AUSTIN **WHIPPLE**



[OFFENSIVE QUALITY CONTROL]

Austin Whipple is in his first season as a Nebraska offensive quality control coach in 2022. Prior to Nebraska, Whipple served as an offensive assistant coach at Pittsburgh for the 2019 and 2021 seasons. Whipple also served as the assistant director of football operations at Massachusetts in 2018.

Whipple was a collegiate quarterback a Penn State (2013) and UMass (2014-15) before injuries forced him to retire from the sport. In 2014, Whipple played in six games with two starts and completed 25-of-48 passes for 325 yards and three touchdowns.

Whipple earned his degree from UMass and finished his career as a student assistant coach. Austin played for his father at UMass, as Mark Whipple was the Minutemen's head coach. Mark is currently Nebraska's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

MATT **DAVISON**



SR. ASSOCIATE AD - EXTERNAL ENGAGEMENT

Matt Davison is in his fifth season on the Nebraska staff. He is the Senior Associate Athletic Director for External Engagement after previously serving as the Associate Athletic Director for Football. A former Husker football and basketball player, Davison was a teammate of Scott Frost.

Davison joined Frost's staff after a career in the medical sales field, but Davison always remained involved with Nebraska Athletics as a color commentator for football and men's basketball radio broadcasts. Davison is still an analyst for the Huskers Radio Network game-day football broadcasts.

In addition to his day-to-day role with the football program, Davison is heavily involved in the planning and design of Nebraska's new Football Performance Center, part of the athletic department's \$155 million, 350,000-square foot expansion project scheduled to open in 2023.

Davison was a four-year wide receiver from 1997 to 2000, finishing his career ranked second in school history with 93 receptions (currently 13th) and 1,456 receiving yards (currently 11th). He was a three-time honorablemention All-Big 12 selection and was a part of two Big 12 championship teams and the 1997 national championship team. In 1997, Davison caught a touchdown pass from Scott Frost that deflected off fellow split end Shevin Wiggins' foot on the final play of regulation to force overtime at Missouri, a game the Huskers went on to win to preserve their perfect season. That play took home the 1997 ESPY for the College Football and Overall Play of the Year.

Davison also excelled in the classroom at Nebraska, as he was a threetime first-team academic All-Big 12 honoree and twice was named to the academic all-district team. Davison was also recognized for his work in the community as a two-time member of the Brook Berringer Citizenship Team. Davison earned his degree in communication studies from Nebraska in 2001.

Matt and his wife, Allie, have a daughter, Reece and a son, Teddy.



ANDREW



DIRECTOR OF FOOTBALL OPERATIONS

Andrew Sims is in his fourth season at Nebraska and serves as Director of Football Operations. In his role, Sims plays a leading role in the dayto-day operations of the football program.

Sims also serves as a liaison with other units within the athletic department and directs the budget, team travel and summer camps and clinics, along with numerous other duties associated with the Husker football program, its coaches and student-athletes.

Sims came to Nebraska after spending two seasons at Southern Miss. He served as the Golden Eagles' director of social media/on-campus recruiting in 2017 before transitioning to the role of executive to the head football coach in 2018.

Previously, Sims spent four years at East Tennessee State. He was the Buccaneers' graduate assistant for recruiting/football operations for two years before moving into a full-time role as director of football operations for two seasons. At ETSU, Sims was responsible for all operations of the football program internally and externally, as well as travel, budget, compliance, academic development and recruiting.

Sims also has experience in the Big Ten Conference, as he spent two seasons as a recruiting intern at Indiana from 2010 to 2012. He earned his bachelor's degree in kinesiology, sport marketing and management from Indiana in 2012. Sims earned his master's degree in business administration from East Tennessee State in 2015 and a doctorate in education from ETSU in 2019. He and his wife Rachel reside in Lincoln.



AUSTIN



[ASSOCIATE DIR. OF FOOTBALL OPER.]

Austin Herink is in his second season as Nebraska's associate director of football operations. Herink assists with all facets of the day-to-day operations of the football program, including serving as a liaison with other units within the athletic department, assisting with budgets, team travel and summer camps and clinics.

Prior to Nebraska, Herink was the Director of Player Personnel/Data Analytics at his alma mater, East Tennessee State. With the Buccaneers, he assisted Head Coach Randy Sanders and the offensive coaching staff with game planning, while also instructing quarterbacks on proper mechanics, game planning and scheme knowledge. Herink also helped coordinate unofficial and official recruiting visits.

Herink was previously the quarterback and passing game coordinator for the Vienna Vikings, a pro football club in Vienna, Austria. He led the team to a second-place finish in the European Football League and for his play he finished runner up for European Player of the Year.

Herink played quarterback at East Tennessee State, where he earned a bachelor's degree in 2017 and a master's degree in 2019. He led the 2018 team to the third-best record in school history (8-4) and the program's first playoff game in over 20 years, as well as a share of the Southern Conference Championship. Herink was a four-time team captain from 2015 to 2018.

William Prince is in his first season as Nebraska's director of player development. In his role, Prince works closely with the entire staff to manage and oversee the development of Husker football student-athletes both on and off the field.

Prince came to Nebraska after spending four years with the Southern Miss football program. He began his tenure as the Golden Eagles' executive assistant to the head coach, where he oversaw the athletic, education and social development of the team. Prince was an assistant strength coach for his final three seasons at Southern Miss.

Prince was also the head strength and conditioning coach and head equipment manager at Alcorn State from 2012 to 2016. He managed the equipment budget and helped decrease team injuries by 72 percent.

Previously, Prince had a successful career in private business. He was an assistant general manager/director of sales at the Fayetteville Athletic Club in Arkansas from 2011 to 2012. Prince also served as the owner and operator at Beaumont Health and Fitness in Texas from 2003 to 2011 and Bally Total Fitness in Kansas City and Dallas from 1997 to 2003.

As a player, Prince was an All-America running back at Warren Central High School in Mississippi. He went on to be a four-year start at Mississippi State and earned his degree in fitness management.

VINCE GUINTA



SR. DIR. OF PLAYER PERSONNEL & RECRUITING

Vince Guinta is in his first season as Nebraska's senior director of player personnel and recruiting. Guinta has previous experience with Nebraska, serving on the Husker recruiting staff from 2004 to 2008.

Guinta owns more than 20 years of involvement in major college football with a history of national recruiting success. Guinta has experience across the country, working at schools in the Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-12 and Mountain West Conferences.

Guinta came to Nebraska from Baylor where he spent two seasons as associate athletics director for player personnel. In his role with the Bears, Guinta oversaw all aspects of the recruiting process, including prospect identification, evaluations, marketing and social media, and campus visitations. During the 2021 season, Baylor posted a 12-2 record, won the Big 12 Championship and posted a victory in the Sugar Bowl.

Before his time in Waco, Guinta spent five years at Oregon State in multiple roles including as assistant athletic director for player personnel. Prior to Oregon State he spent the 2013 and 2014 seasons as director of football recruiting at Wisconsin.

Following four years in private business, Guinta joined the staff at Fresno State, where he served as the coordinator of football operations in 2012. With the Bulldogs, Guinta was responsible for coordinating team schedules, travel and logistics while also monitoring the program's operating budget, coordinating the walk-on program and supervising recruiting activities.

Guinta's first tenure at Nebraska came from 2004 to 2008. He began as the Huskers' football operations intern and was promoted to director of football personnel and recruiting after the 2005 season. He also served as assistant director of football operations. In 2005, the Tom Lemming Report rated Nebraska as the No. 1 recruiting class in the nation, and during Guinta's tenure, Nebraska finished in the top 25 in recruiting four times.

Guinta served in various roles for the Utah football program from 1997 to 2003. Guinta is native of Salt Lake City, Utah and holds a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Utah. Guinta and his wife Emily have two sons, Maxwell and Franklin.



SEAN **DILLON**



[DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL]

Sean Dillon is in his fifth season as Nebraska's director of player personnel and his seventh straight season in that role under Scott Frost. Dillon is in his 14th straight season serving on the same staff as Frost.

Dillon has played a large part in Nebraska's recruiting success under Frost. With Dillon's assistance, Nebraska has signed a top-20 recruiting class in three of the past four seasons.

Previously, Dillon was the director of player personnel under Frost at UCF in 2016 and 2017. Dillon was a part of the Knight staff that posted the greatest two-year turnaround in NCAA history, as UCF went from 0-12 the season before Frost's arrival to 13-0 in Frost's second and final season.

Dillon spent nine seasons at Oregon, when Frost was a Duck assistant for those same nine seasons. Dillon was Oregon's director of high school relations from 2012 to 2015, after serving as a Ducks' recruiting assistant from 2009 to 2012. He began his career as a quality control coach at Northwestern in 2009.

Originally from Orland Park, Ill., Dillon played collegiately at Valparaiso from 2004 to 2008. He totaled 158 tackles in his junior and senior seasons combined, including 87 stops as a senior. Dillon earned his bachelor's degree in sports management from Valparaiso in 2008.



RYAN **CALLAGHAN**



[ASSOC. DIR. OF PLAYER PERSONNEL]

Ryan Callaghan is in his fifth season at Nebraska in 2022. He was promoted to associate director of player personnel after serving as the assistant director of player personnel in his first four years on staff. He has helped the Huskers sign a top-20 recruiting class in three of his first four seasons.

Previously, Callaghan had spent his entire career at UCF before following Scott Frost to Lincoln. Callaghan served as UCF's assistant director of player personnel in each of Frost's two seasons as the Knights' head coach. Before Frost's arrival in Orlando, Callaghan was a full-time UCF recruiting assistant in 2015. He previously worked as a Knights' football student equipment manager for six seasons from 2009 to 2014, and pulled double duty for his final four years by also interning and volunteering in the Knights' recruiting office.

Callaghan was associated with four UCF teams that won conference titles and three Knight teams that won at least 11 games. In his final season in Orlando, UCF won its third American Athletic Conference title. The Knights were the nation's only undefeated team in 2017 and ended the year with a No. 6 final ranking after defeating Auburn in the Peach Bowl.

Callaghan earned his bachelor's degree in business management from UCF in 2012 and his master's degree in business administration in 2014.



DAN **Dillon**



ASST. DIR. OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Dan Dillon is in his fourth season on the Nebraska staff, and he serves as the Huskers' assistant director of player personnel.

Previously, Dillon worked as a recruiting analyst. Before serving as a recruiting analyst, Dillon spent the 2019 and 2020 seasons as a recruiting intern for the Huskers. He has been a part of attracting three top-20 recruiting classes for Nebraska in four years.

Before coming to Nebraska, Dillon worked as a sales and marketing manager for Clark Street Sports. Dillon earned a bachelor's degree in sport management from Grand Canyon University in 2018.

PLAYER PERSONNEL STAFF



KEITH WILLIAMS



[ASST. DIR. OF PLAYER PERSONNEL]

Former Husker offensive lineman Keith Williams joined the Nebraska football staff in May of 2022 as the assistant director of player personnel.

Williams most recently served as the assistant head coach, offensive coordinator and strength and conditioning coordinator at Bethel University in Tennessee. His offense ranked among the nation's most explosive units in 2021. The Wildcats ranked in the top 12 nationally in the NAIA in passing yards (3,422, 5th), passing yards per game (311.1, 7th), total offense (5,037, 9th), total offensive yards per game (457.9, 12th), passing touchdowns (30, 9th), yards per completion (17.4, 3rd) and fourth-down conversion percentage (68 percent, 4th).

Individually, the Bethel offense featured four players ranked among the national leaders. Quarterback Nolan Chowbay ranked in the top five nationally in passing yards (3,232, 2nd), passing yards per game (293.8, 4th) and passing touchdowns (30, 5th). Wide receiver James Dixon, an All-American and the conference Freshman of the Year, was fifth in receiving touchdowns (14), sixth in receiving yards (1,116) and eighth in receiving yards per game (101.5). Running back Deontay Tate ranked top 10 nationally in rushing yards (1,098, 8th) and rushing touchdowns (13, 9th). Wide receiver Dieuly Aristilde also ranked among the national leaders despite playing in only eight games, posting 32 receptions for 768 yards and six touchdowns.

Williams coached H-backs and tight ends during the 2020 season, as well as serving as the head strength and conditioning coach. He helped the Bethel offense rank in the top 20 in passing yards per game and in the top 25 in points per game and third-down conversion percentage. Bethel players made great strides on the field and in their physical development under Williams.

Prior to arriving to Bethel, Williams spent three-and-a-half years at Missouri Baptist University as the program's offensive coordinator (2018-19), run game coordinator (2017), strength and conditioning coordinator (2017) and equipment manager (2018-19).

Williams' focused the offensive line and tight ends at Missouri Baptist, and the program set new school records academically and on the field. He helped his players earn six academic all-conference honors, one academic all-district accolade and one Daktronics NAIA Football Scholar Athlete selection. On the field, Williams produced one All-American, nine offensive all-conference selections and had two players rank among the top seven players nationally at their position.

School records also fell during Williams' time at Missouri Baptist. During his tenure the Spartans had their first 1,000-yard rusher and first 1,000-yard receiver in program history. Missouri Baptist also set school records for rushing yards (1,760), passing yards (2,625) and total offensive yards (4,093) in a season.

Before entering the coaching profession, Williams spent time in the NFL as a member of the Pittsburgh Steelers and Buffalo Bills organizations. He was a sixth-round pick by the Steelers in the 2011 NFL Draft. Williams also won a championship with the Arizona Rattlers in the Arena Football League.

Williams is a native of St. Louis, Mo., and he holds a bachelor of art degree from Nebraska. With the Huskers, Williams played in 50 games with 34 starts. He was a second-team All-Big 12 selection as a senior in 2010 and was a member of three Big 12 North champion teams.



FRANK **VERDUCCI**



[RECRUITING & PERSONNEL ANALYST]

Veteran coach Frank Verducci is in his fifth season on the Nebraska staff in 2022. Verducci brings extensive experience and knowledge to his role, having coached in five decades, including stints as a Big Ten assistant, an offensive coordinator and NFL assistant coach.

Verducci transitions into the recruiting and personnel analyst role after having worked with Nebraska's offensive line the previous four campaigns, including serving as offensive line coach during the conclusion of the 2021 season. Cam Jurgens received All-Big Ten Conference honors and was selected with the 51st pick in the 2022 NFL Draft by the Philadelphia Eagles, becoming the 22nd player drafted under Verducci's tutelage and the third Husker offensive lineman drafted during his tenure in Lincoln. (Matt Farniok, Dallas Cowboys and Brendan Jaimes, Los Angeles Chargers).

Before serving as an analyst under Scott Frost, Verducci's on field experience included 17 years with current Big Ten squads. The 2022 season marks his 22nd year in the conference. Verducci spent 12 years at lowa, three seasons at Maryland and two seasons at Northwestern.

Verducci was the offensive coordinator at UConn in 2015 and 2016 after serving as run game coordinator at Notre Dame, Iowa and Florida. His NFL experience includes serving as the offensive line coach with the Dallas Cowboys, Buffalo Bills and Cincinnati Bengals along with serving as an assistant with the Cleveland Browns and in pro personnel for the Rams.

Developing offensive linemen has been the cornerstone of Verducci's coaching tenure. As a college coach, he has developed first round draft picks at Iowa (Ross Verba, 1997 - Green Bay Packers) Notre Dame (Zach Martin, 2014 - Dallas Cowboys) and Florida (DJ Humphries, 2016 – Arizona Cardinals). Forty-one of Verducci's former players have made NFL rosters over the course of his career. Single game, single season, bowl and career rushing records were all broken during Verducci's tenure at Iowa.

In the NFL, Verducci oversaw the development of rookie offensive linemen Joe Thomas (Cleveland Browns) and Jason Peters (Buffalo Bills), both earning All-Pro accolades during their careers. As the Dallas Cowboys offensive line coach, Verducci tutored NFL Hall of Famer Larry Allen in 2002. Cincinnati Bengals running back Corey Dillon set the NFL single-game rushing record during Verducci's time with the Bengals and Emmitt Smith became the NFL's all-time leading rusher during Verducci's time in Dallas.

Dave Ellis is one of the most accomplished thought leaders in the high performance fueling space. He has an impressive resume with a history of innovation that dates back even before he started Nebraska's nutrition department in 1994.

Ellis is known for innovative approaches to organizing training tables that make food coachable, an approach that is emulated in countless athletic settings globally. He was one of the first to emphasize the need to score weight carrying capacity of athletes by measuring and scoring frame measurements. An advocate for athletes at all levels, Ellis is also adept at implementing effective budgets that ensure athletes are being adequately fueled and that an athlete's body composition goals are realistic relative to the ability of an athlete's frame to carry the weight.

Ellis' impact on the field of sports nutrition has been immense and not only for the athletes who benefit from his expertise. Ellis served as the first president of the Collegiate and Professional Sports Dietitians Association (CPSDA), where he was a catalyst for the growth of performance nutrition across the United States. Ellis helped raise awareness to the importance of teams having trained nutritionists on staff, which in turned created more opportunities for Sports Registered Dietitians.

Ellis' roots were established at Nebraska, where he did the bulk of his academic and applied training over the first half of his career. Ellis is in his third stint working for Husker Athletics, his most frequent stop among a 40-year career that has broadened his knowledge with a diver resume that has included exposure to a variety of sports and athletes. During the last 20 years, Ellis has become a leading authority food and supplement security, which focuses on the mitigation of adulterants in food and supplements that can harm the health and eligibility of athletes as a result of a positive drug test.

In his first stop at Nebraska, Ellis created the Husker nutrition department in 1994. Nebraska was one of the first colleges or universities to have an organized performance nutrition program and is often credited with providing a performance nutrition model utilized by countless other programs. The creation of the nutrition department paid big dividends, as the Husker football program won national titles in 1994, 1995 and 1997 under Hall of Fame Head Coach Tom Osborne. Looking for an edge over his peers, Osborne was the catalyst behind Nebraska creating a nutrition program, and he tabbed Ellis to create and lead the nutrition efforts.

Through his work, Ellis has left a lasting impact on the high performance fueling world. Many of Ellis' former assistants have gone on to lead their own nutrition programs. He continues to innovate at Nebraska, where the Huskers are opening a brand new training table and performance nutrition space in 2023. Nebraska's commitment to nutrition combined with Ellis' vision and expertise will keep the Huskers at the top of the performance nutrition field for years to come.

An Omaha native, Ellis earned his undergraduate degree in human nutrition from Nebraska in 1988. He returned to Nebraska and completed his graduate work necessary to become a registered dietitian in 2000.

Timmy Bleekrode joins the Nebraska program for the 2022 season after a successful stint at Furman. Bleekrode served as the Paladins' starting place-kicker and punter during the 2020 and 2021 seasons, and is expected to focus on kicking duties with the Huskers. A graduate transfer, he has three seasons of eligibility at Nebraska.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (MARIST SCHOOL/FURMAN)

Bleekrode spent three years at Furman and was the starting punter and place-kicker in both 2020 and 2021. In his Furman career, Bleekrode was 21-of-25 on field goals, and he averaged 42.9 yards on 91 punts.

In 2021, Bleekrode went 15-of-18 on field goals (83 percent) ranking 16th in the FCS ranks in field goals and field goal percentage en route to second-team all-conference accolades. He was also 30-of-32 on PATs. and had a career-long 51-yard field goal at Tennessee Tech. As Furman's punter, Bleekrode averaged 42.2 yards per punt on 60 attempts. He had 11 50-yard punts – including a long of 60 – and pinned the opponent inside the 20-yard line 13 times. For his efforts, Bleekrode repeated as a second-team All-Southern Conference punter.

In an abbreviated 2020 season, Bleekrode was 6-of-7 on field goals while going 16-of-18 on extra points. A second-team all-conference punter, Bleekrode averaged 43.6 yards on his 36 punts with 17 inside the opponent's 20-yard line. He had five punts covering more than 50 yards, including a career-long 69-yard punt against Chattanooga. He was the Southern Conference Special Teams Player of the Week against Samford, when he made all three of his field goal attempts and averaged 47.2 yards on five punts.

Bleekrode played in three games during the 2019 season, making his lone PAT attempt of the year and placing two of his three punts inside the 20-yard line while averaging 48.0 yards per punt. Bleekrode played his prep ball for the Marist School in Atlanta.

Punter Brian Buschini joined the Nebraska program in January as a transfer from Montana. Buschini was a standout with the Griz in his three seasons, being recognized as the FCS's top punter in 2021.

Gabe Ervin Jr. quickly ascended to the top of Nebraska's depth chart at running back as a true freshman in 2021. After starting two of the first four games, Ervin suffered a season-ending knee injury at Oklahoma. Ervin did preserve a redshirt season and will be part of the competition in a deep group of Husker backs in 2022.

2021 (REDSHIRT)

Ervin started two of Nebraska's first four games at running back in 2021 before suffering a season-ending injury at No. 3 Oklahoma. Ervin rushed 37 times for 133 yards and two touchdowns in his abbreviated 2021 season. He started at Illinois, becoming the first true freshman running back to start a season opener in the modern era of Nebraska football. Ervin had 12 carries for 33 yards in his collegiate debut, and he added six carries for 17 yards the next week against Fordham. Ervin carried the ball 10 times for 56 yards against Buffalo, scoring the first two rushing touchdowns of his career. At No. 3 Oklahoma, Ervin rushed nine times for 18 yards before leaving the game with his injury.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (BUFORD HS)

Ervin was a standout running back from Buford High School in Georgia, where he was a 2020 Sports Illustrated All-America candidate.

Ervin helped Buford to the Class 6A state championship, winning a state title in Georgia's second-largest class one season after he helped the Wolves to a Class 5A state championship. Ervin ran for more than 1,000 yards as a senior, including 40 carries for 333 yards and five touchdowns in the state playoffs. For his efforts as a senior, Ervin was named a first-team all-state selection by Georgia High School Football Daily. As a junior, Ervin rushed for more than 1,200 yards and 15 touchdowns while averaging nearly seven yards per carry and helping the Wolves to a state title in Georgia's third-largest class.

Ervin had more than two dozen scholarship offers, choosing Nebraska over Arizona State, Duke, Georgia and Michigan State, among others. He was ranked among the top 25 running backs in the nation by Rivals.

Myles Farmer is in his fourth season as a Husker in 2022 and will be a key member of a new look Nebraska secondary this fall. Farmer started four games last season at safety and is a strong contender to earn a starting spot this fall. Farmer has played in a total of 21 games as a Husker, including four in 2019, five in 2020 and all 12 games last season.

2021 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

2021 (REDSHIRT)

Thomas Fidone II suffered an injury prior to the 2021 season that limited his ability to contribute as a true freshman. After rehabbing the injury, Fidone was able to make his Husker debut at No. 19 Wisconsin, the only action he saw during the season.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (LEWIS CENTRAL HS)

Fidone was the country's top tight end recruit and a top 40 recruit, the highest-rated recruit to sign with NU since 2008. Fidone was a high school All-American for Lewis Central High School, as he was selected for the 2021 All-American Bowl, which featured the nation's top 100 seniors. Fidone was also the lone tight end on the 2020 Sports Illustrated All-America first team.

Despite facing constant double and triple teams, Fidone averaged 84.5 receiving yards per game and 19.7 yards per catch, an average that ranked fourth in the state according to the Register. For his efforts, Fidone was named to the All-lowa Elite team in addition to being an all-state selection. As a junior, Fidone had 39 receptions for 576 yards and seven touchdowns to help the Titans reach the state semifinals. Fidone caught more than 100 passes in his prep career while amassing more than 1,500 receiving yards and more than 20 touchdowns.

Anthony Grant joined the Nebraska program in January with impressive credentials. Grant was the top offensive player in the junior college ranks in 2021, while playing at the New Mexico Military Institute. Grant also owns Power Five experience, beginning his career at Florida State.

Grant was regarded as the No. 1 running back recruit in the junior college ranks and among the top 20 overall junior college recruits by 247Sports. Rivals regarded him as a four-star junior college recruit.

He totaled a career-high 15 tackles against No. 9 Michigan, the third double-figure tackle game of his career. At Minnesota, he had seven tackles, including six solo stops, and 1.0 TFL. The Omaha native began his career as a wide receiver, but is now part of the Husker tight end group. The 6-5, 215-pound Hickman has played in 15 career games, including five games in 2021.

Nash Hutmacher is set to play an expanded role on the defensive line as a sophomore this fall. The 6-4, 330-pound Hutmacher appeared in 11 games last season, after seeing limited time while redshirting in his first year at Nebraska.

2021 (FRESHMAN)

Hutmacher played in 11 games in 2021, appearing on both defense and special teams. He provided valuable depth on the defensive line over five games, but he did not record a tackle.

As a senior, Hutmacher had 88 tackles, 18 tackles for loss and four sacks. As a junior, he totaled 105 tackles (56 solo) with 11 TFLs, 10 sacks, 10 forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries. He also saw limited action at running back, scoring three touchdowns on nine carries.

On the wrestling mat, Hutmacher was a four-time state champion, the first four-time heavyweight state champion in South Dakota history and the first four-time champion in one weight class in state history. Ranked as the nation's No. 1 high school heavyweight wrestler, Hutmacher went 166-0 from his freshman to senior season. He first started practicing with the varsity team as a sixth grader and amassed 226 career wins and competed in six state tournaments. Hutmacher won each of his final 73 matches by pin - 71 in the first period - the second-longest pin streak in the history of high school wrestling. He became the first person to be named the Daily Republic Wrestler of the Year four times.

Hutmacher was 43-0 as a senior, with each win via pin including 30 within one minute. He won the Junior Schalles Award as the nation's best high school pinner. He went 33-0 as a junior with 32 pins and one forfeit en route to earning a spot on the 2018-19 USA Today All-USA Boys Wrestling Team. He was 46-0 as the state champion as a sophomore and 44-0 as a freshman state champion. Outside of high school competition, Hutmacher was a four-time All-American who won several event titles, including pinning three of his four opponents en route to the 2019 USA Wrestling Junior Folkstyle National Championship and winning the 2017 USA Wrestling Cadet Freestyle National Championship.

In track and field, Hutmacher won the Class A state title in the shot put and discus as a junior. Hutmacher was named the 2018-19 and 2019-20 South Dakota Boys Athlete of the Year.

The consensus No. 1 player in South Dakota, Hutmacher also visited Oregon and Wisconsin. A three-star prospect, 247Sports ranked Hutmacher among the nation's top 50 defensive tackles, while Rivals listed him among the nation's top 55 defensive tackles.

kickoff return at Illinois. The next week against Fordham, Johnson gained 19 yards on five carries. Against Buffalo, Johnson had four carries for nine yards. He made his first career start at No. 3 Oklahoma, and he totaled 103 all-purpose yards against the Sooners. He rushed 11 times for 42 yards at Oklahoma and had three catches for 49 yards, both of which were career highs. Johnson also returned one kickoff for 12 yards against the Sooners.

He totaled 100 all-purpose yards at No. 20 Michigan State, setting career highs with 19 carries and 76 rushing yards. Johnson started and had 12 carries for 74 yards against Northwestern with a career-high two rushing touchdowns. Johnson had a career-high 172 all-purpose yards against No. 9 Michigan. In addition to rushing for 67 yards on 17 carries, he set career highs with seven catches for 105 yards. Johnson hauled in a 41-yard touchdown pass against the Wolverines, the first touchdown reception of his career, and he also had a career-long 43-yard catch.

At Minnesota, Johnson had 11 carries for a career-high 83 yards and two touchdowns before leaving the game early with an injury. He had a career-long 29-yard run against the Golden Gophers. Johnson had 13 carries for 52 yards against Purdue, and he also caught a 12-yard touchdown pass against the Boilermakers. He rushed for 62 yards on 16 carries against No. 6 Ohio State and added two catches for 10 yards.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Johnson played in six games as a redshirt freshman. He had eight carries for 30 yards and one touchdown and added six catches for 33 yards. Johnson had a season-long 17-yard reception at Ohio State and also returned three kickoffs for 54 yards. He had a three-yard carry and an eight-yard reception against Illinois. At Iowa, Johnson had five carries for 23 yards, including a 12-yard touchdown run. He also had a five-yard reception. Johnson had a four-yard carry and a two-yard catch in the win at Purdue. He had one carry and a five-yard reception at Rutgers.

Johnson rushed for more than 2,300 yards in his career as a state champion at Bergen Catholic High School. As a senior, Johnson ran for 1,334 yards and scored 12 total touchdowns, becoming the first Crusader to rush for 1,000 yards since 2009. He was named a third-team all-state selection and a first-team pick among non-public schools.

Johnson rushed for 555 yards and six touchdowns on 90 carries as a junior, when Bergen Catholic won the state title. He also caught 11 passes for 97 yards and two touchdowns and had 23 kickoff returns for 428 yards. He rushed for 462 yards and three touchdowns as a sophomore.

On the track, Johnson won sectional titles in the 100-meter dash each of his last three seasons and was third at the 2018 NJSIAA Championships. He won a sectional title in the 200 meters in 2017, when he also finished fourth in the long jump. Indoors, Johnson finished second in the 200 meters at the 2018 NJSIAA Meet of Champions and second in the 55-meter dash at the 2017 NJSIAA Championships.

Johnson was rated as the No. 6 all-purpose back in the country by Rivals. He only visited NU but had offers from numerous Power Five schools, including Minnesota, North Carolina, Pitt and West Virginia.

Martin earned his degree in finance in May of 2022.

Ochaun Mathis joined the Nebraska program this summer as one of the nation's top transfers after spending four years at TCU. A two-time second-team All-Big 12 selection with the Horned Frogs, the 6-5, 260-pound Mathis will provide a pass rushing threat for the Huskers. Mathis has two seasons of eligibility remaining.

over Fordham, Nelson recorded a pair of tackles. Against Buffalo, he finished with three tackles, including 2.0 TFLs. Nelson totaled six tackles at No. 3 Oklahoma, including a half tackle for loss. He filled up the stat sheet at No. 20 Michigan State, recording six tackles, 2.0 TFLs, 1.0 sack and his first career pass breakup. Nelson recorded two tackles against Northwestern, including a 12-yard sack. Nelson totaled six tackles against No. 9 Michigan.

At Minnesota, Nelson finished with eight tackles - one shy of his career high - and added a two-yard tackle for loss. Nelson totaled five tackles and a half sack against Purdue. He had an 11-yard strip sack against No. 6 Ohio State. Nelson finished with six tackles at No. 19 Wisconsin, including a six-yard sack. In the season finale, Nelson recorded six tackles against No. 17 Iowa.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Nelson started all eight games at outside linebacker as a sophomore. He set then-career highs with 30 tackles, 4.0 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks, with each of his TFLs coming in the season's final three games.

Nelson made his first career start at No. 5 Ohio State and finished with one tackle. At Northwestern, Nelson tallied three tackles and a quarterback hurry. Nelson notched a career-high nine tackles in the win over Penn State. He made one tackle against Illinois and had four solo tackles at Iowa. In three seasons for Scottsbluff, Nelson totaled 150 tackles, 26 tackles for loss and 18 sacks, while also playing offense for Coach Joe Benson's Bearcats.

In 2018, Nelson led Scottsbluff to a 12-1 record and a runner-up finish in Class B. Nelson finished his senior year with 39 tackles, including seven tackles for loss and four sacks for 34 yards. Nelson was named an Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska selection and was a member of the Lincoln Journal Star Super-State team as a defensive lineman. He was also an honorary captain of the Lincoln Journal Star's Class B all-state team.

During his junior season, Nelson recorded 44 tackles, 11 TFLs, nine sacks and recovered a fumble. He added 133 rushing yards and caught four passes. His play earned him All-Nebraska and Super-State honors from the World-Herald and Journal Star, respectively. Nelson made his first impact on the varsity squad as a sophomore, racking up 67 tackles, eight tackles for loss and five sacks to help his team to a 9-2 record.

Nelson was ranked as the No. 2 player in Nebraska by Rivals and among the top 40 defensive ends in the country, while 247Sports also listed him among the nation's top 50 defensive ends.

CAREER CAPSULE

Receiver Trey Palmer joined the Nebraska program in January after playing the past three seasons at LSU. The 6-1, 190-pound Palmer caught 41 passes for the Tigers and was also an explosive threat in the return game. Palmer comes to Nebraska with two seasons of eligibility remaining.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (KENTWOOD HS/LSU)

Palmer joined Nebraska after playing three seasons at LSU (2019-21). Palmer played in 28 games in his three years at LSU, totaling 41 receptions for 458 yards and three touchdowns. In addition to averaging more than 11.0 yards per reception, Palmer was an electric return man for the Tigers, returning both a punt and kickoff for a touchdown. He had 23 punt returns for 188 yards and one touchdown at LSU with 15 kickoff returns for 394 yards and one touchdown.

In 2021, Palmer caught 30 passes for 344 yards and three touchdowns, ranking third on the team in touchdown receptions and fourth in catches. He also returned 18 punts for 115 yards and seven kickoffs for 142 yards. In 2020, Palmer had 10 catches for 108 yards while returning seven kickoffs for 241 – including a 93-yard touchdown against South Carolina – and two punts for eight yards. Palmer earned playing time as a true freshman in 2019, when LSU won the national championship. Piper redshirted in his first season at Nebraska. He played in one game as a true freshman, playing on the offensive line in the Huskers' win at Maryland. As the second of three Husker true freshman offensive linemen to play in 2019, Piper became only the 13th true freshman offensive lineman to play in a game in school history.

Piper was one of the top prep players in the state of Nebraska for Norfolk Catholic. As a senior, Piper's blocking paved the way for a powerful offense and record-setting rushing attack. Piper also excelled on the hardwood and in track and field. He captured the Class C shot put title as a junior and was second in the discus before finishing as the runner-up in both events as a senior. In basketball, Piper was a three-time honorable-mention all-state choice.

Piper was a three-star prospect regarded among the top five players in Nebraska by both Rivals and 247Sports.

Noa Pola-Gates has been a valuable special teams performer in his first three seasons at Nebraska, while also providing valuable depth in the secondary. The 6-0, 180-pounder has played in 18 career games, including eight contests each of the past two seasons. He was an Academic All-Big Ten selection in 2020.

CAREER CAPSULE

Sophomore offensive tackle Teddy Prochazka showed great promise in his first season with the Huskers in 2021, before suffering a season-ending injury. The Elkhorn South graduate played in five games as a true freshman, including two starts at left tackle. Prochazka became just the second true freshman in modern Husker history to earn a start at left tackle.

2021 (FRESHMAN)

Prochazka played in five games in 2021 with two starts before suffering a season-ending injury. He was just the 16th true freshman offensive lineman to play in a game in Nebraska history. Prochazka earned the start at left tackle against Northwestern, when Nebraska rushed for 427 yards and gained 657 total yards. With his start, Prochazka became only the second true freshman in the modern era of Nebraska football to start a game at left tackle. Overall, he became just the seventh true freshman offensive lineman to start a game in the modern era of Nebraska football. Prochazka also started the next contest at left tackle against No. 9 Michigan, but he suffered a season-ending injury in that game.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (ELKHORN SOUTH HS)

One of the top 75 prospects in the country, Prochazka was a 2020 Sports Illustrated All-America candidate. Prochazka joined the Huskers as an offensive lineman after he was a two-way performer for Elkhorn South High School.

Prochazka was a three-year starter on offense and two-year starter on defense. As a senior, he helped Elkhorn South to a state runner-up finish when he was named to the Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska and Lincoln Journal Star Super-State first teams. Prochazka was one of the most decorated Nebraska high school players during his career, as he was also an All-Nebraska first-team selection in 2019, one of only five juniors to make the team. He was also named a first-team Super-State selection by the Lincoln Journal Star as a junior and was a second-team Super-State pick as a sophomore.

Prochazka was ranked among the nation's top 75 recruits by Rivals, which regarded him as the 11th-best offensive tackle in the country and the No. 73 player overall. The 247Sports Composite rankings listed Prochazka among the nation's top 250 overall prospects and top 20 offensive tackles. Prochazka had numerous offers and chose Nebraska over Arizona State, Iowa and Michigan among many others.

Purdy accounted for 9,000 yards of total offense and 111 touchdowns in two seasons as Perry's starter. Purdy totaled 4,423 yards of offense and 52 touchdowns as a senior, when he was the Arizona Offensive Player of the Year. As a junior, he passed for 3,425 yards and 36 touchdowns while rushing for 1,152 yards and 23 scores.

CAREER CAPSULE

Luke Reimer established himself as one of the Big Ten's top linebackers in 2021, leading the Blackshirt defense in tackles. Reimer racked up 108 tackles while starting all 12 games, marking the first Husker defender to crack the century mark in tackles since 2018. Reimer had five games with double-digit tackles, including a 19-tackle effort against Purdue which was the highest total for a Nebraska player in 11 seasons.

Reimer started five games as a sophomore in 2020, and played in 10 games as a reserve linebacker and on special teams as a true freshman in 2019. Originally a walk-on, Reimer is a two-time Academic All-Big Ten selection and is on track to graduate in May of 2023 in business administration.

2021 (SOPHOMORE)

Reimer started all 12 games in 2021. He led the team with a career-high 108 tackles, including 6.0 tackles for loss, with 1.0 sack, setting career highs in tackles and TFLs. Reimer also ranked second on the team with six pass breakups and intercepted one pass. Following the conclusion of the regular season, Reimer ranked third in the Big Ten and 22nd nationally with his 108 tackles. He was the first

Husker to have a 100-tackle season since 2018. On the season, Reimer recorded double-digit tackles in five of 11 games, including four times in nine Big Ten games. Reimer's performance earned him honorablemention All-Big Ten accolades from the conference coaches and media.

Reimer finished with eight tackles at Illinois, including a half tackle for loss and a forced fumble that resulted in a Husker takeaway. He then made four solo tackles and added a quarterback hurry in the win over Fordham. Reimer had a career game against Buffalo and was named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week for his performance, the first Husker to win that award since 2016. Reimer totaled 16 tackles against Buffalo, then the most by a Husker since 2015. He also intercepted the first pass of his career and returned it to the 1-yard line to set up a Husker touchdown on the next play. Reimer also recorded his first career pass breakup against the Bulls.

At No. 3 Oklahoma, he totaled seven tackles, a half TFL and a quarterback hurry. He made 11 tackles at No. 20 Michigan State, including 1.5 tackles for loss and a half sack. Reimer recorded five tackles with a pass breakup against Northwestern. Reimer posted double-figure tackles for the third time with a 12-tackle performance against No. 9 Michigan that included a seven-yard tackle for loss and a pass breakup. At Minnesota, Reimer recorded four tackles.

Against Purdue, Reimer recorded a career-high 19 tackles, the most ever by a Husker in a Big Ten Conference game and the most by a Husker in any game since Lavonte David had a 19-tackle performance against South Dakota State in 2010. Reimer had his fifth double-figure tackle game of the season against No. 6 Ohio State, totaling 10 tackles and a pass breakup. He ranked second on the team with five tackles at No. 19 Wisconsin and had one of Nebraska's two tackles for loss in the game.

Reimer finished the season with seven tackles, 1.0 TFL, one pass breakup and a career-high two forced fumbles against No. 17 Iowa. He came up clutch against the Hawkeyes, breaking up a 4th-down pass in the end zone to deny a touchdown, while forcing a fumble that was recovered by Nebraska with Iowa driving inside the Husker 15-yard line.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Reimer battled injuries to play in six games with five starts as a sophomore. He posted 40 tackles, 5.0 tackles for loss and 2.0 sacks, ranking second on the team in sacks and third in TFLs.

Reimer missed the Ohio State game due to injury but returned to make his first career start at Northwestern. Reimer led Nebraska with a then-career-high 10 tackles against the Wildcats, while also setting career highs with 1.5 tackles for loss and 1.0 sack. Reimer came off the bench to record four tackles in the win over Penn State, including a four-yard sack. He had seven tackles, including one for a two-yard loss, against Illinois.

Reimer led Nebraska with a season-high 12 tackles at Iowa, including 11 solo stops. His 11 solo tackles were the second-most by a Husker in a Big Ten Conference game, trailing only the 14 solo tackles Lavonte David made at Michigan in 2011. Reimer added five tackles, including a half tackle for loss, at Purdue. He made two early tackles against Minnesota before leaving the game in the first quarter with an injury. The injury also kept him out of the season finale at Rutgers.

2019 (FRESHMAN)

Reimer played in 10 games as a true freshman walk-on, totaling 11 tackles, including one tackle for loss. Reimer made his Husker debut on special teams against Colorado, and he recovered a fumble as a member of Nebraska's kickoff coverage unit. He also saw action on special teams at Illinois and made his debut on defense against No. 5 Ohio State, recording his first three career tackles from his linebacker spot. Reimer made his first career special teams tackle with a stop on kickoff coverage against Indiana. He added tackles on kickoff coverage in back-to-back games against Purdue and No. 15 Wisconsin. Reimer saw extensive action on both special teams and defense at Maryland, recording a season-high four tackles, including his first career TFL. Reimer made his final stop of the season with a tackle on kickoff coverage against lowa.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (LINCOLN NORTH STAR HS)

Reimer was a two-way performer at Lincoln North Star. As a senior, Reimer earned Lincoln Journal Star Super-State honors as a linebacker, as he posted 74 tackles, 14 tackles for loss and a sack. The captain of the Journal Star's all-city team, Reimer added 328 rushing yards and nearly 500 all-purpose yards. Reimer earned honorable-mention all-state recognition as a junior, when he had 397 rushing yards and nine touchdowns with 838 all-purpose yards. He added 40 tackles, six TFLs and an interception. Robinson made two stops at No. 20 Michigan State, including a one-yard tackle for loss. Robinson tied his career high with four tackles against No. 9 Michigan, while also registering a 13-yard sack for his first career sack and breaking up the first pass of his career. 2019 (REDSHIRT)

Robinson played in three games in 2019, appearing on the defensive line against No. 15 Wisconsin, Maryland and No. 19 Iowa. By playing in only three games, he redshirted and preserved a season of eligibility.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (HIGLEY HS)

Robinson was one of the most coveted defensive line recruits in the country. He came to Lincoln after earning high school All-America honors at Higley High School in Arizona, where he was one of four finalists for the All-American Bowl National Defensive Player of the Year.

Quarterback Logan Smothers enters his third season in the Nebraska program in 2022. The 6-2, 190-pound Smothers served as the Huskers' top backup at quarterback last season and started the regular-season finale against Iowa. Smothers completed nearly 70 percent of his passes in his six appearances last season, while rushing for 133 yards and two touchdowns. Smothers redshirted in his first season in 2020.

Smothers earned Academic All-Big Ten honors in 2021.

Smothers had a career-long 24-yard rush against the Hawkeyes, while his 24 carries were the most by a Husker quarterback since Jammal Lord had 30 carries against Texas A&M in 2002.

four tackles for the third straight game at No. 20 Michigan State. He had two tackles, including a seven-yard sack against Northwestern and made one stop the next week against No. 9 Michigan. Tannor recorded two tackles at Minnesota. He had two tackles against Purdue with a four-yard tackle for loss.

Tannor had four tackles against No. 6 Ohio State, including a nine-yard sack and 1.5 tackles for loss. He made two tackles at No. 19 Wisconsin before leaving the game in the first half with an injury. He returned the next week against No. 17 Iowa, finishing with three tackles and a careerhigh two pass breakups.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Tannor played in every game as a junior with five starts at outside linebacker. He finished with 23 tackles during the shortened season and added 2.5 tackles for loss and 2.0 sacks.

CAREER CAPSULE

Quarterback Casey Thompson joined the Nebraska program in January after spending four seasons at Texas. Thompson played in 19 career games with the Longhorns, including 10 starts during the 2021 season. Thompson threw for more than 2,400 yards and 30 touchdowns at Texas, while rushing for five touchdowns.

Thompson has two seasons of eligibility available at Nebraska. A May 2021 Texas graduate, Thompson is working toward a master's degree in applied science at Nebraska.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (NEWCASTLE HS/TEXAS)

Thompson spent four years at Texas (2018-21), playing in 19 games with 10 starts. He completed nearly 64 percent of his passes (185-of-290) for 2,422 yards and 30 touchdowns while rushing 73 times for 210 yards and five scores. Thompson had three career games with five or more touchdowns - all in 2021 - the most in Texas history.

In 2021, Thompson started the final 10 games of the year. He was 165-of-261 (63.2 percent) through the air for 2,113 yards and 24 touchdowns. Thompson was a member of the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award preseason watch list and was the Big 12 and national player of the week after completing 18-of-23 passes for 303 yards and five touchdowns with six total touchdowns against Texas Tech. Two weeks later against No. 6 Oklahoma, he threw for 388 yards and five touchdowns. Thompson then tied the school record with six touchdown passes and seven total touchdowns against Kansas, when he completed 30-of-43 passes for 358 yards.

Thompson redshirted in his first season at Texas in 2018. He played in four games as a redshirt freshman in 2019, completing 8-of-12 passes for 84 yards. Thompson saw action in three games in 2020, completing 12-of-17 passes for 225 yards and six touchdowns.

Thompson went to Texas as one of the nation's top 225 recruits and top 15 quarterbacks by ESPN. He played his final prep season for Newcastle High School after beginning his career at Southmoore High School. Thompson totaled 12,840 yards of offense in his high school career, including 9,829 passing yards and 107 passing touchdowns with 3,011 rushing yards and 47 touchdowns.

PERSONAL

Casey is the son of Kori and Charles Thompson, and he was born on Oct. 3, 1998. He earned his degree from Texas in May of 2021. His father Charles played quarterback for Oklahoma in 1987 and 1988, while his brother, Kendal, spent three seasons as a quarterback at Oklahoma (2011-13) and two seasons at Utah (2014-15).

yards. Vokolek had a five-yard catch against Northwestern and added perimeter blocking for a Husker rushing attack that gained 427 yards. Vokolek had a two-yard catch at Minnesota. Gould was a big part of a Crusader defense that allowed 7.8 points per game. He led the team with four interceptions and recorded 27 tackles and two pass breakups en route to all-state accolades. In an abbreviated junior season shortened to six games due to COVID, Gould had 13 tackles and four pass breakups.

Gould was ranked as one of the top 25 cornerback prospects and one of the top 200 overall players in the country in the 247Sports Composite rankings, which also ranked him as the No. 2 recruit in New Jersey. Hartzog helped the Jaguars to a state championship as a senior, when he was named Class 3A Mr. Football. A cornerback, running back and returner, he rushed for 131 yards and a pair of touchdowns in the state final and also had an interception and a pass breakup. On the season, Hartzog had more than 10 passes defended from his cornerback position. He also rushed for more than 1,200 yards and accounted for 44 total touchdowns, including 30 rushing touchdowns, three rushing scores and 11 combined kickoff and punt return touchdowns.

Hartzog was regarded as a three-star recruit by Rivals and 247Sports, and he was the MVP of the Mississippi/Alabama All-Star game after recording nine tackles and an interception. He chose Nebraska after also considering Ole Miss, South Alabama and Southern Miss.

Victor Jones Jr. came to Nebraska as one of the top players in Orlando. Jones was a star wideout for Olympia High School.

Jones had 53 catches for 847 yards and seven receiving touchdowns as a senior. He also averaged 30.3 yards per return on six kickoff returns. He ranked among the receiving leaders in the Orlando area and was named an all-metro selection for his performance. As a junior, Jones caught 43 passes for 718 yards and 10 touchdowns in only seven games. He also added two rushing touchdowns and had two kickoff return touchdowns.

A three-star recruit, Jones was ranked among the nation's top 75 receivers by Rivals. He chose Nebraska after also considering Arkansas, Cincinnati and Kentucky, among others.



EMMETT JOHNSON

5-11 | 175 | MINNEAPOLIS, MINN.

Emmett Johnson came to Nebraska as the top high school player in Minnesota. As a star running back and two-way player for the Academy of Holy Angels, Johnson was named Mr. Football by the Minnesota Football Coaches Association in 2021.

Honored as the top player in the state, Johnson rushed for more than 2,500 yards and scored 42 touchdowns in his senior season. He had at least 100 rushing yards in all 11 games as a senior, including seven 200-yard rushing efforts. Johnson also had eight four-touchdown games and accounted for more than 2,800 all-purpose yards. He also played safety for Holy Angels, recording 85 tackles and 13 tackles for loss in 2021. As a junior, Johnson carried the ball 174 times for 1,521 yards and 12 touchdowns.

In his prep career, Johnson ran for nearly 5,000 yards and totaled nearly 6,000 all-purpose yards with more than 130 tackles on defense. He was a two-time District MVP, three-time all-district selection, two-time all-metro pick and an all-state honoree. Johnson was named the Offensive MVP for the South team in the Minnesota High School All-Star Game following his senior season. Johnson also played basketball and competed in track and field for Holy Angels.

The top running back in Minnesota, Johnson was ranked among the top 10 overall players in the state. The three-star prospect chose Nebraska over scholarship offers from numerous FCS programs and interest from several Big Ten schools.

Jalil Martin came to Nebraska from Chicago's Kenwood Academy, where he was a two-way player.

He helped the Broncos to a city title and playoff appearance in his final season. Martin finished with 27 tackles, one interception and six passes defended. Offensively, Martin caught 12 passes for 263 yards and four touchdowns in 2021. Illinois did not play high school football in the fall of 2020, and Martin played in only three games during the abbreviated spring season. He was also a key contributor as a sophomore when Kenwood Academy made another playoff appearance.

Martin had offers from a dozen Power Five schools. The three-star prospect chose Nebraska after also considering Boston College, Colorado and Illinois, among others.

Gage Stenger was one of the most versatile players in the state of Nebraska for Millard South High School. He played quarterback and defensive back for the Patriots.

As a senior, Stenger was an honorary captain of the Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska team, making the squad as a defensive back. He was also a Lincoln Journal Star first-team Super-State selection as an athlete. Stenger quarterbacked Millard South to an undefeated regular season and the No. 1 seed in the state playoffs. He threw for nearly 1,400 yards and 19 touchdowns and did not have an interception all season. He set a Class A state record with six touchdown passes in a first-round playoff matchup with Omaha North. He also rushed for nearly 600 yards and 11 touchdowns. Stenger was also an honorary captain of the World-Herald's All-Metro team. Patriots' head coach Andy Means, who coached Millard South for 36 years, told the World-Herald that Stenger was arguably the best football player he coached in his tenure at Millard South.

A three-star recruit, Stenger was rated as the No. 5 player in Nebraska by 247Sports. He chose Nebraska over Kansas State.

As a junior, he passed for 1,149 yards and 18 touchdowns, while rushing for 276 yards. Torres also played basketball for Southside.

Torres was a three-star recruit, and 247Sports ranked him among the nation's top 40 quarterback prospects. He chose Nebraska after also visiting Kansas State.



BRODIE TAGALOA

Brodie Tagaloa came to Lincoln from California, where he starred for prep powerhouse De La Salle High School. Tagaloa was selected to participate in the 2022 Polynesian Bowl.

His junior season was disrupted by the pandemic, as De La Salle played a six-game spring schedule. As a senior, he helped De La Salle to a 10-3 record and a trip to the state playoffs. Hausmann was a first-team all-state honoree by the Lincoln Journal Star and was an honorablemention all-state pick by the Omaha World-Herald. Hausmann led Coach Ty Twarling's squad to an 8-3 record as a junior in 2020, when he threw for 1,835 yards and 27 touchdowns.

A three-sport athlete at Norris, Hausmann played on the basketball team and was a standout on the track. Ås a senior in 2021, Mangini recorded 68 tackles - including 40 solo stops - with 4.0 tackles for loss, three interceptions and 12 passes defended. As a junior, Mangini was credited with 42 tackles and seven passes defended. Additionally, Mangini blocked three field goals in his career. Mangini also competed in track and field as a sprinter and jumper during his prep career at Desert Ridge.

He added 24 tackles on defense and earned second-team all-metro and honorablemention all-state honors from the Omaha World-Herald.

During his junior season, Lindenmeyer caught 35 passes for 444 yards and three touchdowns, while adding three sacks on defense. He earned honorable-mention all-metro honors in 2020. Miller threw for 2,047 yards and 36 touchdowns, while completing 72 percent of his passes. He also ran for 1,117 yards and 23 touchdowns, with five 100-yard rushing games. Defensively, Miller made 100 tackles as a senior. For his efforts, Miller was named the Class D-1 all-state quarterback and honorary offensive captain by the Omaha World-Herald and Lincoln Journal Star. The World-Herald also listed him as a second-team All-Nebraska selection as a defensive back, while the Journal Star tabbed him as a second-team Super-State pick as an athlete.

Miller earned D-1 all-state honors as an athlete in 2020, when he helped his team to a 6-3 record. In his career, Miller threw for 3,397 yards and 53 touchdowns, while rushing for 2,506 yards and 55 touchdowns. On defense, he finished with 257 career tackles, 13 interceptions and five fumble recoveries. Miller also played basketball for Lourdes Catholic and averaged more than 15 points per game in his career.

Mikey Pauley will play both football and baseball for Nebraska after being a three-sport standout at Blue Valley Northwest High School. Pauley was a four-year letterwinner in football and a three-year letterwinner in basketball and baseball.

On the gridiron, Pauley was an all-state quarterback. He completed 57 percent of his passes while throwing for 5,173 yards and 54 touchdowns in his career, according to MaxPreps. Pauley also rushed for 2,326 yards and 38 touchdowns for the Huskies. He accumulated nearly 7,500 yards of total offense in his high school career with 88 total touchdowns.

As a senior, Pauley threw for 1,945 yards, rushed for 1,214 yards and accounted for 45 total touchdowns to help Blue Valley Northwest to a 12-1 record and the school's first state title. Pauley was a three-star football recruit ranked among the top 15 prospects in the state of Kansas. He signed his National Letter of Intent with the Nebraska baseball program, spurning multiple football scholarship offers.



TOM OSBORNE

HEAD COACH, 1973-97 RECORD: 255-49-3 (.836, 6TH ALL-TIME)

The field inside Memorial Stadium is called Tom Osborne Field in honor of a man, who in 25 seasons, built a total program based on more than winning.

Osborne's coaching career came to a poetic end in the 1998 Orange Bowl. In his final game, the Huskers defeated No. 3 Tennessee, 42-17, giving him a share of a third national title in his final four seasons. The victory left Osborne as the first coach in college football history to retire as a reigning national champion, along with the nation's best active winning percentage (.836, 255-49-3), which ranks sixth all-time among Division I coaches.

Osborne guided the Huskers to back-to-back titles in 1994 and 1995, then capped his career by sharing the 1997 title with Michigan. Nebraska's back-to-back national titles in 1994-95 made Osborne the first coach to accomplish that feat since Bear Bryant in 1978-79. Under Osborne, NU became just the second school all time to post back-to-back perfect national championship seasons. In fact, Osborne's last five Nebraska teams put together the best five-year run in collegiate football history with an amazing 60-3 record.

Osborne-coached Nebraska teams captured 13 conference crowns and all 25 of his Husker teams won at least nine games and went to a bowl. Achievements of that magnitude earned Osborne an immediate ticket to the College Football Hall of Fame in December of 1998, after it waived the customary three-year wait for entrance into the hall. The Memorial Stadium field was re-named Tom Osborne field in 1998.

A Hastings, Neb., native, Osborne served Nebraska for three terms in the U.S. House of Representatives. Osborne served as Nebraska's Athletic Director from 2007 through 2012.

BOB DEVANEY

HEAD COACH, 1962-72 RECORD: 101-20-2 (.829, 13TH ALL-TIME)

One man tops the list of people responsible for the success of the University of Nebraska athletic teams – Bob Devaney. For 35 years he was the driving force behind the University of Nebraska championships, first as a Hall of Fame football coach (1962-72), then as Athletic Director (1967-93) and Athletic Director Emeritus (1993-96). Devaney retired in 1996 and lived in Lincoln until he passed away at the age of 82 on May 9, 1997.

Devaney's mark will remain forever. The memories of the storybook national championship seasons of 1970 and 1971 will continue to inspire generations of Husker fans for years to come. His commitment to building one of the nation's best athletic programs is reinforced with every athletic and academic honor earned by Husker student-athletes.

From the time he took over athletic director duties in 1967, to his final year in 1993, his vigor, enthusiasm and administrative excellence earned him a reputation as one of the nation's outstanding athletic directors. Those characteristics helped make him a football coaching legend. A 1981 inductee into the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame, under Devaney's leadership Nebraska developed one of the nation's most successful all-around athletic programs.

During his 11-year stint as Husker football coach, Devaney's teams won 101 games, lost only 20 and tied two for an .829 winning percentage. His career mark of 136-30-7 (.806) ranked him as the nation's winningest active coach at the time of his retirement in 1973. Today, he ranks 13th on the all-time list, seven spots behind the man he tabbed as his replacement, Tom Osborne.

In all, his Husker gridiron teams won eight Big Eight titles and two national championships (1970, 1971) and went to nine bowl games. He had three straight Orange Bowl wins, two Outland Trophy winners, a Lombardi Award winner and a Heisman Trophy winner. Twice his teams won four consecutive Big Eight titles, 1963-66 and 1969-72.







NEBRASKA'S NATION-LEADING 18 NCAA TODAY'S TOP TEN AWARDS

The highest honor the NCAA can bestow on a student-athlete is The NCAA Today's Top 10 Award. The award is based not only on outstanding athletic accomplishments, but on excellent academic records and leadership ability in community and campus activities. Nebraska earned its NCAA-leading 18th Top 10 Award in January of 2020 when men's gymnast standout Anton Stephenson was recognized at the NCAA bonors dinner

The Husker football program has nine of Nebraska's 18 Top 10 Award winners, the most of any single sport in NCAA history. The most recent football player to earn a Top 10 Award was All-America rush end Grant Wistrom, who was a 1998 honoree. Wistrom's selection gave Nebraska nine overall Top 10 honorees in the 1990s. Two Huskers received the award in both 1990 and 1991, marking the first two times that a school had more than one student-athlete honored.

In the 1990s, six Husker football players were awarded the Top 10 honor, including Aaron Graham (1996), Rob Zatechka (1995), Trev Alberts (1994), Pat Tyrance (1991) and Jake Young (1990). Randy Schleusener (1981) was the first Husker to win the award, followed by Dave Rimington (1983) and Mark Traynowicz (1985).

Nebraska's success in the classroom also extends to other sports. Along with nine football players who have won the Top 10 Award, four Husker volleyball players (Sarah Pavan-2008, Virginia Stahr-1990, Janet Kruse-1992, Nancy Metcalf-2002), three men's gymnasts (Tom Schlesinger-1989, Patrick Kirksey-1991, Stephenson-2020), one women's gymnast (Richelle Simpson-2005) and one women's tennis player (Mary Weatherholt-2014) have also claimed the honor.

NEBRASKA IN THE POLLS

The Associated Press poll began in 1936 and Nebraska came in at No. 15 in the first-ever regularseason poll on Oct. 24. The Huskers finished with a No. 9 national ranking that year. From 1936 through 1949, the AP polls did not come out until October. Beginning in 1950, AP polls were issued weekly throughout the entire regular season. Until 1964, all final rankings were based on regular-season finishes and did not include bowl game results. In 1965, the AP final rankings became post-bowl rankings (with the exception of 1966). In 1974, the UPI final ranking also became post-bowl, and since then all final rankings have included bowl results. The AP has tracked its all-time poll rankings based on finish in each of its final polls. NU checks in at No. 7 in the All-Time AP Poll and has appeared in more than 60 percent of all AP polls since 1936.



(Alma, 1939) 101-20-2 (.829),1962-72 Bob Devaney won back-to-back national titles in 1970 and 1971 and eight Big Eight crowns. He retired in 1973 with a career record of 136-30-7 (.806), which left him as the winningest active coach in the nation. In 1971, he was named coach of the year by the Walter Camp Foundation, the



Football Writers of America, Football
News and the Washington Touchdown Club. Devaney was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1981 and into the Orange Bowl Hall of Honor in 1976. His 11-year stint as head football coach is the second longest in school history behind Tom Osborne. He was Nebraska's athletic director from 1967 to 1992 and served as athletic director emeritus for four years, before retiring June 30, 1996. Devaney passed away on May 9, 1997.

COACH TOM OSBORNE (Hastings, 1959) 255-49-3 (.836), 1973-97

Tom Osborne was hand-picked by Bob Devaney as his successor and served as assistant head coach in 1972. Osborne is credited as the offensive genius behind Devaney's national championship teams and served as a full-time assistant from 1967 to 1972. Osborne won back-toback national championships in 1994



and 1995, and a third national title in 1997. During his 25 seasons Nebraska won 13 conference championships and went to 25 consecutive bowl games, including 17 "major" bowls. His teams won nine or more games every year and 11 national rushing titles. His athletes won six Outlands, three Lombardis, one Heisman, one Butkus and one Johnny Unitas Award. He reached 200 (21 seasons) and 250 wins faster than any coach in college football history. In his last five seasons, Osborne's teams posted a 60-3 record, the most wins in a five-year span by any team in collegiate history. He served as Nebraska's Athletic Director from 2007 to 2012.

Solich coached Nebraska to a 9-3 regular-season record, but did not coach NU in the Alamo Bowl, as defensive coordinator Bo Pelini served as interim head coach. Solich was a member of Bob Devaney's first recruiting class in 1962. As a fullback, Solich earned All-Big Eight honors in 1965 and was the first Husker to rush for 200 yards in a game.

he oversees an enrollment of over 25,000 students and 6,000 faculty and staff.

He received bachelor's and master's degrees in animal science from Virginia Tech and Colorado State University, respectively. His doctoral program was completed jointly at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and the USDA-ARS U.S. Meat Animal Research Center in animal breeding and genetics.

Green has served on the animal science faculties of Texas Tech University and Colorado State University, and as the national program leader for animal production research for the USDA's Agricultural Research Service and executive secretary of the White House's interagency working group on animal genomics within the National Science and Technology Council. Prior to returning to NU, Green served

as a global executive for Pfizer Animal Health's animal genomics business. Dr. Green has authored 130 refereed publications and abstracts, nine book chapters and 56 invited symposia papers, and has delivered invited presentations in 43 U.S. states and 21 countries around the world. He is a past-president of both the American Society of Animal Science (ASAS) and the National Block and Bridle Club and has served in several leadership positions for the U.S. Beef Improvement Federation, National Cattlemen's Beef Association, National Pork Board, National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences, Association of Public and Land-Grant Universities, and Alpha Gamma Rho national fraternity. He currently is a member of several boards, including the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors, Neogen Corporation, and Supporters of Agricultural Research. He is a member of the Presidential Forum of the NCAA representing the Big Ten Conference, an inaugural member of the NCAA Division I Board Infractions Process Committee and was recently named a member of the Blue-Ribbon Panel of the National Academies to look at Enhancing Land Grant Coordination and Cooperation. He was named a fellow of ASAS in 2014 and a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 2015. In 2017 Dr. Green was honored with the American Society of Animal Science's Morrison Award, the highest international academic recognition for an animal scientist.

Ronnie and his wife Jane, a double UNL alumna, are the proud parents of four children – Justin, Nate, Kelli and Regan – all UNL graduates, and one granddaughter, Charlotte.

Scott M. Fuess Jr. is in his third year as Nebraska's Faculty Athletics Representative, having started on July 1, 2020.

As faculty athletics representative, Fuess serves as a liaison between the Office of the Chancellor and Athletic Department. He also serves on the Athletic Department's Executive Staff. His areas of focus in the role include the welfare of student-athletes, NCAA and Big Ten Conference compliance, maintaining the positive relationship between athletics and faculty, developing and responding to NCAA legislative proposals and representing the university at related NCAA and Big Ten Conference meetings.

The half-time position - which was restructured to an expected term of five years - reports directly to Chancellor Ronnie Green and consults with Athletic Director Trev Alberts. He splits time between faculty representative duties and academic responsibilities.

Fuess, the Steinhart Distinguished Professor of Business and former chair of the College of Business' economics department, has worked at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln since 1986. He serves on the Faculty Senate's Intercollegiate Athletics Committee, having chaired the committee for 2018-19 and a sub-committee in 2017-18. He also has served on numerous Big Ten Conference committees, including the Sports Management Committee, the Compliance and Reinstatement Committee and the Legislative Review Committee.

Fuess earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Delaware, as well as master's and doctoral degrees from Purdue University. His research interests are labor economics, the economics of collegiate sports, and the economy of Japan. He has earned numerous "Distinguished Teaching" awards. In 2016 he received the UNL College of Business "Distinguished Service" award.

Ted Carter became the eighth president of the University of Nebraska on Jan. 1, 2020, following a national search by the Board of Regents.

As president, Čarter leads a four-campus university system that enrolls nearly 52,000 students and employs 16,000 faculty and staff on campuses in Lincoln, Omaha and Kearney, plus academic divisions and research and extension centers across the state. He serves as chief spokesman and chief executive officer for the system, which operates on a \$2.8 billion annual budget and includes a flagship Big Ten institution, a world-renowned academic

health sciences center, Division I athletics programs, and preeminent institutes focused on water and agriculture, national security and defense, infectious disease and early childhood education.

Carter brought with him a distinguished record in education, partnerships and military service, having come to Nebraska from the U.S. Naval Academy, his alma mater, where he served as superintendent. Under his leadership, the Naval Academy achieved a No. 1 national ranking and new records in student success and diversity. Carter previously was president of the U.S. Naval War College in Newport, R.I. A retired Vice Admiral with 38 years of service, Carter has logged more than 6,300 flying hours and holds the American record for carrier-arrested landings.

In his first year at the University of Nebraska – faced with the unexpected and unprecedented challenges presented by COVID-19 – Carter led with a focus on the land-grant priorities of access and opportunity for students and families. He launched the Nebraska Promise, a financial aid program guaranteeing free tuition for low- and middle-income Nebraskans, and implemented a multi-year budget plan that included a two-year, across-the-board tuition freeze. The result was system-wide growth in enrollment, including record gains among underrepresented students.

Carter oversaw the awarding of a \$92 million federal contract for the university's National Strategic Research Institute, one of only 14 University-Affiliated Research Centers in the country conducting exclusive research for the Department of Defense. During Carter's tenure, the NU system has been ranked among the world's top 100 institutions for earning research patents, the Omaha campus was selected as the home for a new federal counterterrorism research center, the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources launched a new effort focused on rural vitality, and the medical center opened an education, training and preparedness facility that positions Nebraska as the world leader in the fight against infectious disease.

Carter holds a courtesy faculty appointment in aviation in the College of Public Affairs and Community Service at the University of Nebraska at Omaha. He serves as the chair of the Daugherty Water for Food Global Institute's Board of Directors and is a board member for the Greater Omaha Chamber of Commerce, the Nebraska Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the Naval Historical Foundation and the Naval Aviation Museum Foundation. Carter is also a member of the Aspen Institute's Higher Education Working Group and the Association of Public and Land-Grant Universities' Council of Presidents. He is an ex-officio member on the board of the University of Nebraska Foundation, the philanthropic partner of the university system that has a \$1.7 billion endowment.

Carter earned his bachelor's degree in physics and oceanography from the U.S. Naval Academy, where he played hockey and served as team captain. He is a graduate of the Navy Fighter Weapons School (Top Gun) and holds educational credentials from the Navy Nuclear Power School, the U.S. Air Force Air War College, the Naval War College and the Armed Forces Staff College. Carter's military career includes service for the Carrier Strike Group Twelve, in which he commanded 20 ships, two nuclear-powered aircraft carriers, and two carrier wings that were deployed to Afghanistan and the Arabian Gulf.

The son of an English teacher, Carter was raised in the rural, one-high school town of Burrillville, R.I. He and his wife, Lynda, live in Lincoln and have two adult children, Brittany and Christopher.

UNIVERSITY BOARD OF REGENTS

The Board of Regents consists of eight voting members elected by district for six-year terms, and four non-voting student Regents, one from each campus, who serve during their tenure as student body president. The board supervises the general operations of the university, and the control and direction of all expenditures. The board also includes a corporation secretary who manages

A veteran administrator and College Football Hall of Famer, Trev Alberts is entering his second year as Vice Chancellor, Director of Athletics at the University of Nebraska in 2022-23. Alberts, who was hired on July 14, 2021, returned to his alma mater after spending 12 years at Nebraska-Omaha, guiding the program through a successful transition to the Division I level.

In his first season at Nebraska in 2021-22, Alberts helped the Huskers navigate the ever-changing landscape of Name, Image and Likeness quidelines for the benefit

of Nebraska student-athletes. He led the development of the N-Vest Nebraska program to award \$5,980 per year to student-athletes who meet academic benchmarks.

Alberts also spearheaded the charge to complete the fundraising for Nebraska's Go Big Project, which will provide Nebraska football with a new facility scheduled to open in the summer of 2023. The project will also house academic, life skills, nutrition and support services for all Nebraska student-athletes.

A tireless worker who puts both the interests of student-athletes and fans first, Alberts helped orchestrate a qualitative survey of Nebraska's fan base to help shape the future of Memorial Stadium's game-day atmosphere.

Alberts has also focused much of his time on developing the first strategic plan for Nebraska Athletics in 15 years. He has also committed himself to providing intense support and a unifying vision for Nebraska's coaches across all sports.

Nebraska's athletic achievements in 2021-22 included top-five NCAA finishes from Husker volleyball, wrestling and men's gymnastics programs, while the NU women's basketball and softball teams enjoyed breakout seasons that concluded with trips to the 2022 NCAA Tournament. The women's track and field team added a 14th-place finish at the NCAA Outdoor Championships - its best showing since 2006.

Academically, Nebraska student-athletes continued to shine with a school-record 95 percent graduation rate across all sports.

Alberts' tenure leading UNO athletics was marked by successes in competition and in academics; by transitioning the university's athletic programs to NCAA Division I in 2011; and by establishing new homes for many UNO athletics teams, including Baxter Arena, the Maverick Park baseball/softball complex and the soccer pitch at Caniglia Field.

Alberts took the bold step in announcing that Omaha would reclassify from Division II to Division I in all sports in 2011 and simultaneously securing conference affiliation with the Summit League for all of the department's then-Division II programs. His vision for UNO's reclassifying teams was demonstrated even before the four-year transition period had ended. The Omaha baseball team won back-to-back Summit League regular-season championships in 2013 and 2014, while the men's basketball team made its first Division I postseason appearance in 2014 with a berth in the CollegeInsider.com Postseason Tournament.

During UNO's time in the Division I ranks under Alberts tenure, the Mavericks had six teams and four student-athletes qualify for the NCAA Tournament, including hockey advancing to the Frozen Four in 2015 and men's soccer reaching the second round of the NCAA Tournament in the spring of 2021. He also expanded opportunities, adding men's golf and men's soccer in 2011, and Omaha began a men's swimming and diving program in 2021-22.



Throughout his tenure in Omaha, Alberts was focused on enhancing the student-athlete experience, including the construction and staffing of the Hamilton Academic Excellence Room and the development of the Ethel S. Abbott Student-Athlete Development Wing. Those efforts paid off in Nebraska-Omaha student-athletes posting consistent collective semester grade point averages above 3.3 for 18 consecutive semesters, including at least a 3.5 in each of his final three semesters.

The facilities around Omaha Athletics received a major uplift during his tenure. Maverick Park opened in March of 2021 to rave reviews as the home to the Mavericks' baseball and softball programs. Funding for the complex, which includes a 1,500-seat baseball facility and a 650-seat softball facility, were raised privately and provided both programs a permanent on-campus home for the first time.

Another crowning achievement was the opening of Baxter Arena in 2015. Alberts directed efforts to secure community support and funding to build the on-campus arena, which allowed the nationally prominent hockey program to play on campus and also serve as the home of the men's and women's basketball and volleyball programs. Caniglia Field underwent renovations in 2012, making it one of the finest collegiate soccer facilities in the country, highlighted by a FIFA 2-star rated playing surface and one of the largest LED videoboards in a soccer-only college facility.

Alberts' work on behalf of hockey, UNO's established Division I sport, also paid dividends. He successfully guided the Mavericks into the new National Collegiate Hockey Conference in 2013-14. The following year, Omaha reached the 2015 NCAA Frozen Four.

In addition, Alberts and his team led Omaha Athletics into a partnership with Learfield, a national leader in the marketing of collegiate athletics, and developed Omaha Sports Properties. As the exclusive corporate sponsorship sales unit for UNO Athletics, Omaha Sports Properties further enhanced revenue and increased brand prominence locally, regionally and nationally.

As part of UNO's reclassification to Division I, Alberts oversaw the rebranding of UNO athletics with new primary and secondary logos and a greater focus on strengthening the Maverick brand both regionally and nationally.

As a student-athlete, Alberts was an All-American on and off the football field as a Husker Blackshirt. He was Nebraska's first Butkus Award winner in 1993, helping Coach Tom Osborne's Huskers to an undefeated regular season and an Orange Bowl appearance against Florida State. A first-team All-American by every major publication in 1993, he was also the Football News National Defensive Player of the Year, the Big Eight Male Athlete of the Year, and the Big Eight Defensive Player of the Year. His No. 34 jersey was retired at the 1994 Red-White Spring Game. In 2015, he was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame.

Off the field, Alberts earned the NCAA's highest honor, The Today's Top Six Award. A three-time Academic All-Big Eight honoree, he was a CoSIDA Academic All-American in 1993. He graduated from Nebraska before his senior season.

Alberts was the fifth pick in the 1994 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts and played for the Colts until 1996. Following his NFL career, he served as an analyst on college and professional football games for major national networks, including ESPN, CNN/SI and CBS Sports Network.

Alberts and his wife Angela have three children – Chase (and his wife, Cassie), Ashtynne and Breanna.

COMMUNICATIONS OFFICE

The Nebraska Communications Office is available to assist the media with coverage of the Nebraska football program. The Communications Office is located on the third floor of the Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex in the North end of Memorial Stadium.

For information regarding credentials, interviews, statistics and other media inquiries, please call the Communications Office at (402) 472-2263, visit Huskers.com or e-mail Director Keith Mann (kmann@huskers.com), Senior Associate Director Shamus McKnight (smcknight@huskers.com) or Associate Director Matt Smith (msmith@huskers.com). Below are guidelines for covering Nebraska in-season. Additions or changes to these policies can be found at Huskers.com/media.

MEDIA CREDENTIALS

Nebraska utilizes an on-line credentialing system. Directions regarding the application process will be sent to media members or can be accessed at Huskers.com/media. Out-of-state media can contact Vicki Capazo in the Communications Office at (402) 472-7769 or vcapazo@huskers.com for assistance.

As a general rule, working space in the Nebraska Press Box is allotted on the following basis: (1) writers from news outlets covering for same or next day publication; (2) radio personnel for broadcast originations; (3) press and TV working photographers; (4) sports editors/reporters of Nebraska daily newspapers; (5) official school student daily newspaper, one seat and/or sideline only; (6) approved special coverage as space allows. Visiting freelance and amateur photographers are not eligible for media credentials, except by approval of the Nebraska Communications Office.

MEDIA ACCESS

The game-day entrance to Memorial Stadium for the media is at the Media Gate 7 entrance on street level on the west side of the stadium (main lobby of West Stadium). The working press area is on Level 6 (Don Bryant Media Facility) with the photo and television deck on Level 7. Level 3 (West Stadium Club) and Levels 4 and 5 (Skybox Suites) of the West Stadium and Level 7 of the North and East Stadium Suites are not open to the media or public.

Single-game media credentials can be picked up at West Stadium Lobby Media Will Call on game days, beginning five hours prior to kickoff. Those picking up credentials must show a photo I.D., and all credential holders (season or single game) must receive a wristband to accompany their credential in order to be admitted into Memorial Stadium. Bag check will also occur in the West Stadium lobby.

MEDIA PARKING

Parking at Memorial Stadium is always at a premium, with a limited number of spaces allocated to the media. Media parking is divided among several lots around Memorial Stadium. Early arrival is strongly suggested. No cars will be admitted to Lot 4 (South Stadium lot) later than 90 minutes before kickoff.

WEEKLY PRESS CONFERENCE

Each Monday during game weeks, Nebraska will hold a press conference, including Head Coach Scott Frost and selected players. The press conference will be held in the press box on Level 6 of West Memorial Stadium.

Media may not provide live coverage of any press conference on any digital platform or website. The only live coverage that is permitted is live television coverage. A free, live video stream will be available on Huskers.com and streamed on other social media platforms. Shortly following the press conference, a press conference video will be made available to media members followed by a written transcript.

INTERVIEW POLICY

During the season, Coach Scott Frost is available in person at a Monday press conference and briefly after practice on Thursdays of game week. Any other interviews with Coach Frost must be arranged through the Communications Office at least one day in advance.

Nebraska players are available for interviews in person at the Monday press conference and Tuesday after practice. Player interviews can occasionally be set up for other times with at least one day advance notice. Assistant coach interviews will be Tuesdays after practice. All requests for player and coach interviews must go through the Communications Office.

Post-practice interviews with players and coaches should not be streamed live online.

No interviews are to be conducted in the locker room, training room, weight room or Nebraska Student Life Complex.

DAILY PRACTICES

During the season, practices are normally conducted either in Memorial Stadium, in the Hawks Championship Center or on the Ed and Joyanne Gass Practice Fields northeast of the stadium. Practices are generally closed to the media and public. Media arriving to conduct interviews with Nebraska players and coaches should arrive to the designated post-practice interview area shortly before the end of practice.

Opportunities for media members to shoot photos and video of practice will be communicated to the media. As a general rule, these opportunities will only be during fall camp and not during the season. During open practice times, media are prohibited from streaming practice live and no interviews should be conducted during this time period. Media are also asked to refrain from live practice reports until after the conclusion of the open period. This includes social media, radio reports, video reports, etc.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

Nebraska's locker room is closed after games, both home and away, but Coach Scott Frost and requested players will be available for interviews following a brief cooling-off period. Nebraska's assistant coaches are not available following games.

For home games, only coaches, players and staff members will be admitted to the tunnel and locker room after the game, but Coach Frost and requested personnel will be brought to the interview room (Ndamukong Suh Strength

Complex). Admittance to the interview area will be by media credential only. Media should access the area via the door located on field level in the northeast corner of the Osborne Athletic Complex. Media are asked to not access the media room until after halftime. Additional player interviews will take place on the Hawks Championship Center balcony.

digital platform or website is prohibited.

For away games, the best available interview area will be used. Interview requests, home and away, will be taken by Keith Mann and the Communications staff at the end of the third quarter. Non-requested players making significant plays in the fourth quarter will be added as needed.

Nebraska players and coaches will not do interviews on the field after the game.

The visiting locker room at Memorial Stadium is located underneath the South Stadium. The visiting team interview area is just off the main tunnel leading to the visitor's locker room.

Live coverage of any press conference on any digital platform or website is prohibited, including post-game press conferences, both home and away, with the exception of live television coverage. A live stream will be available on Huskers.com and a complete video will be made available to the media following the press conference.

If media are planning to do live shots on the field after the game, they should make advance arrangements with the Communications Office, as well as contact Scott Guthrie in HuskerVision (402-472-4645).

SIDELINE POLICIES

The Big Ten Conference maintains a strict sideline control policy in an effort to keep the playing area as safe as possible. All sideline photographers must have a photo vest and a photo credential, and both must be clearly visible. Vests will be issued beginning three hours before game time. Vests will be issued

to media members with a photo credential who will be shooting still photos or video during the game. Media without a photo vest may access the sideline during pre-game and in the final five minutes of the game. Special exceptions to this also include interviews with special guests on the field at halftime, quarter breaks, etc. All other media should work from their assigned location on Level 6 or Level 7.

Those individuals receiving a photo vest will be asked to sign a waiver concerning the usage of photos at the time they check out the vests. Vests may be returned to one of four locations following the game: Nebraska post-game interview room, opponent post-game interview room, press box, photographers work area.

The photographers work area is available on field level, just off the southeast corner of the playing field.

Additional sideline policies include: (1) Only those photographers on assignment from a newspaper, website, magazine, television station or a participating institution, are given credentials. Each student publication may be limited to one press and/or one sideline photo credential. (2) Media outlets with same or next day publication will be given preference for sideline credentials (Special requests must be submitted to the Communications Director for review). (3) Assistants, equipment carriers, etc. will not be allowed on the sideline. (4) Photographers must display their credentials and vest at all times. (5) University personnel will be present on the sideline to ensure that all credentials are properly displayed. Those $possessing\,bench\,credentials\,must\,remain\,inside$ the team bench area (between the 20-yard lines). (6) Photographers may not enter the bench area at any time. (7) Photographers should not congregate in the writers' section of the media facility during halftime, during or after the game.

FACILITY USE RESTRICTIONS

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln has an interest in protecting its facilities, property and reputation associated with its intercollegiate sports. Therefore, no person shall be permitted to access or use the arenas, facilities and other University of Nebraska intercollegiate athletic venues without first securing the permission of the Athletic Director or his/her designee. The only exception is an individual who records an image (e.g. photograph, videotape) for his/her non-commercial personal use. In no case shall any person be permitted to use these venues for the purposes of promoting the sale or manufacture of alcohol or tobacco or the promotion of any venture associated directly or indirectly with legal or illegal gaming or gambling.

BIG TEN CREDENTIAL POLICY & RESTRICTIONS

This working credential is subject in all respects to the Media Credential Criteria and Policies set forth by the Big Ten Conference as in effect from time to time. This working credential is issued for the sole purpose of providing facility access to an accredited agency's employee who has a legitimate working function (media or game service) in conjunction with this event. It is non-transferable and non-assignable and

any duplication or alteration of this document is prohibited. Any unauthorized use of this credential subjects the bearer to ejection from the facility and prosecution for criminal trespass. Any secondary use of any picture, photograph, audio description, video, film/ tape, drawing or other description of a game taken or made by the accredited organization or individual to whom this credential has been issued (including, but not limited to use in delayed editorial or non-editorial advertising, sales promotion or merchandising) is prohibited without prior specific written approval of the Big Ten Conference. Photographing this credential is strictly prohibited. Nothing in these terms and conditions authorizes or allows bearer to violate any of the trademarks, copyright and other proprietary rights of the Big Ten Conference. A maximum of two minutes (2:00) of game video footage (without audio) may be utilized during the seven days following the conclusion of the game solely within regularly scheduled bona fide news programming distributed via television, including such television programming simulcast on the internet, wireless or other forms of media, but otherwise may not be distributed on the internet, wireless or other forms of media.

No pregame coverage shall be permitted for two hours before the game without the express permission of the University of Nebraska, the Big Ten Conference and the broadcast rights holder. Local television stations may not originate a pre- or post-game show from inside Memorial Stadium. Live postgame interviews may not be aired while the television rights holder is still on the air.

Non-originating radio stations or other outlets may not provide play-by-play coverage, live or delayed, but may provide short news updates provided such news update is one minute or less occurring no more than once per hour.

Media are also prohibited from live coverage of any Nebraska press conference on any digital media platform or website, with the exception of live television coverage.

INTERNET/WIRELESS

Media will have use of wireless internet in the Memorial Stadium press box.

Media members using wireless frequencies at Memorial Stadium will be asked to register that equipment in advance. Media will be prompted to complete a frequency coordination form when they fill out their on-line credential application. (Note: This does not apply to those registering for wireless internet access).

Any media sources that want to install a telephone in the media facility should contact Nebraska Telecommunications (402) 472-2000 at least two weeks before the game.

Information such as statistics, postgame quotes, play-by-play, etc., will be available online at Huskers.com. If arrangements are made in advance, postgame notes, quotes and game statistics may be e-mailed.

HUSKERS RADIO NETWORK

The Huskers Radio Network launched on July 1, 2021, from the production studio on the East side of Memorial Stadium. This department within Husker Athletics leads the broadcast efforts for Husker Football, Volleyball, Men's and Women's Basketball, Baseball and Softball. In addition, the Huskers Radio Network team will produce Sports Nightly and Huskers Radio Network podcasts. Sports Nightly airs Monday-Friday evenings from 6-8 p.m. (central) year-round across the network. During the football season, Sports Nightly features a weekly football radio show on Thursday evenings with Coach Frost and Husker assistant coaches.

In the state of Nebraska, KXSP AM 590 ESPN (590 AM) and KEZO Z-92 (92.3 FM) serve as Omaha affiliates. KXSP-AM's strong signal reaches a good portion of the Midwest day and night, including parts of lowa, Minnesota, Missouri and Kansas. KLIN (1400 AM) serves as the Lincoln affiliate with KFGE Froggy 98 (98.1 FM) also carrying the football broadcast. KRVN (880 AM) is a powerful central Nebraska affiliate that reaches around the state. In addition, the network has several dozen locally based affiliates across Nebraska. All broadcasts are streamed live for free on Huskers. com and the Huskers mobile app.

Sponsorships and advertising on the Husker Radio Network is marketed and sold by Huskers Athletic Partners, which took over Nebraska's multimedia rights on July 1, 2021. Huskers Athletic Partners is led by General Manager Jason Rathe who oversees all sales and sponsorship fulfillment for the Huskers.

Greg Sharpe (Play-by-Play), Matt Davison (Analyst), Jeremiah Sirles (Sideline) and Jessica Coody (pregame and postgame) will anchor the radio coverage of Nebraska football. Sharpe returns for his 15th full season as the "Voice of the Huskers." He will host the Scott Frost pregame and postgame radio shows. Sharpe also serves as the "Voice of Husker Baseball", host of Sports Nightly and as the host of the Nebraska Football TV Show.

Davison, a former Husker and current Senior Associate Athletic Director for External Engagement, joins Sharpe in the broadcast booth for his 16th season as a color analyst. A member of the 1997 national championship team, Davison also assists with fundraising efforts for the Huskers Athletic Fund. Davison was instrumental in the fundraising efforts surrounding the Go Big facility currently under construction on the Northeast side of Memorial Stadium.

Coody will serve as the Huskers' sideline reporter and players and coaches interviews. Coody, who co-hosts Sports Nightly, is in her second year with Nebraska after spending the last nine years with the University of Oklahoma in a similar role. Previously, Coody worked Big 12 Championship Broadcasts for Fox Sports, and served as the sideline reporter for the Oklahoma Team Stream 2016 Final Four Broadcast on TNT.

Ben McLaughlin, Jay Foreman, Brenden Stai and Matt Coatney are also part of the pregame and postgame football broadcast team. Director of Broadcast Operations, Mike Elliott oversees studio operations and logistics for the radio network. Elliott has nearly four decades of experience in the radio industry and has previously worked at the Broadcast House, Pinnacle Sports and the Husker Sports Network.

For the second straight season, Husker football broadcasts will also be available in Spanish in both Omaha (KBBX, 97.7 FM) and Grand Island (KLIQ, 94.5 FM) and also on the Huskers app.

Enrique "Kike" Morales, handles the play-byplay duties, as the Juarez, Chihuahua, native also serves as the Spanish play-by-play voice for the Kansas City Chiefs and had previously provided broadcast duties for the Kansas City Wizards.

Oscar "El Tico" Monterroso joins Morales as the color commentator. Monterroso is a mass media journalist and owns a multi-media production company which broadcasts Spanish-language broadcasts for several NFL teams and college programs.

THE BIG TEN CONFERENCE

Known as one of intercollegiate sports' most successful undertakings, the Big Ten is home to a lineage of legendary names and an ongoing tradition of developing strong leaders. Even in its infancy, the conference established itself as the preeminent collection of institutions in the nation, where the pursuit of academic excellence prevailed as the definitive goal.

The history of the Big Ten traces back more than 120 years to the Palmer House hotel in Chicago, where on January 11, 1895, then-Purdue president James H. Smart and leaders from the University of Chicago, University of Illinois, University of Michigan, University of Minnesota, Northwestern University and University of Wisconsin set out to organize and develop principles for the regulation of intercollegiate athletics.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first known action "restricted eligibility for athletics to bonafide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." That important legislation, along with other legislation that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for intercollegiste athletics.

On February 8, 1896, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the same Palmer House and officially established the

mechanics of the conference, which was officially incorporated as the "Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association" in 1905.

Indiana University and the State University of Iowa became the eighth and ninth members in 1899. In 1908, Michigan briefly withdrew its membership, and in 1912 Ohio State University joined the conference, bringing its membership total back to nine. Upon Michigan's return in 1917, the conference was first referred to as the "Big Ten" by media members, and that name was eventually incorporated in 1987.

As the 1900s opened, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1904, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along

with having one year of residence.

In 1901, the first Big Ten Championship event was staged when the outdoor track and field championships were held at the University of Chicago. The debut event marked what is now a staple of conference competition. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 28 official sports, 14 for men and 14 for women, including the addition of men's ice hockey and men's and women's lacrosse over the last four years. Big Ten schools compete in a total of 42 different sports, furthering the conference's commitment to broad-based programming and providing more participation opportunities than any conference in the country.

One of the conference's proudest traditions began in 1902 when Michigan took on Stanford in the Rose Bowl, the nation's first bowl game. Big Ten teams only appeared in Pasadena twice before the conference signed an exclusive contract with the Tournament of Roses in 1946, making it the first bowl game with permanent conference affiliations. But Michigan's appearance in 1902 cultivated a relationship that has endured

for more than a century.

Coupling the academic goals set forth by the leaders of the charter members of the conference and their steadfast commitment to athletics, the conference instituted the Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1915. It is awarded annually by each conference institution to a student of the graduating class who has attained the greatest proficiency in scholarship and athletics. For

who has attained the greatest proficiency in scholarship and athletics. For more than 100 years, it has been the most prestigious honor a student competing in Big Ten athletics can receive.

In 1922, Major John L. Griffith became the conference's first "Commissioner of Athletics." Griffith was the first of six men to assume the role of commissioner in the conference's history, followed by Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson in 1945, Bill Reed in 1961, Wayne Duke in 1971, Jim Delany in 1989, and current commissioner Kevin Warren in 2020.

After nearly 30 years with 10 members, the conference consolidated to nine schools when the University of Chicago formally withdrew its membership in 1946. Michigan State College (now Michigan State University) was added to the Big Ten three years later, bringing the number of affiliated conference schools to 10 once again.

In 1955, the Big Ten formulated a revenue-sharing model designed to pool all football television rights of its members and share those proceeds equally. The conference and its members continue to utilize a revenue sharing model, dividing media rights, bowl payouts and other profits

among all conference institutions.

While academics have always played an integral role in the conference, presidents of the Big Ten member institutions formalized the primacy of academics with the establishment of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation) in 1958. The Big Ten Academic Alliance is an academic consortium of all Big Ten universities. Annually, the schools currently constituting the Big Ten Academic Alliance produced over \$10 billion in funded research, \$5 billion more than any other conference

In one of Duke's first actions as commissioner, he oversaw the adoption of the Big Ten Advisory Commission in 1972, designed to study conference programs and make suggestions which would further Big Ten objectives. The Advisory Commission enlists former students that competed in Big Ten athletics to serve as liaisons to the NCAA's Diversity and Inclusion Department, the Big Ten Student-Athlete Advisory Commission and other

In 1981, the conference presidents and chancellors endorsed a proposal that enabled universities to affiliate their women's intercollegiate programs with the conference, and the first conference championships for women were staged that fall. The Big Ten was the first conference to voluntarily adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992.

In December of 1989, the conference agreed in principle to invite Pennsylvania State University for membership. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents officially voted to integrate Penn State into the conference, giving the Big Ten 11 members.

In 2004, the Big Ten implemented a pilot program of instant replay for college football. Following the season, the conference forwarded replay proposals to the NCAA regarding the future use of instant replay, where it approved country-wide testing in 2005. In 2006, the NCAA approved the use of instant replay for all conferences

the use of instant replay for all conferences. In 2006, Delany announced the creation of the first conference-owned television network, a 20-year agreement with FOX Networks to create what would become the Big Ten Network (BTN). Launched on Aug. 30, 2007, BTN now produces more than 1,800 events across all platforms each year. BTN is in almost 60 million homes in the U.S. and Canada via

each year. BTN is in almost 60 million homes in the U.S. and Canada via the nation's major video providers and more than 300 additional video providers across the country. BTN is also available through the majority of OTT providers, and via the Fox Sports App, which delivers live and on-demand programming to computers, smartphones and tablets. In addition, the BTN+ platform streams hundreds of events each season. On June 11, 2010, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) approved a formal membership application by the University of Nebraska, expanding the conference to 12 institutions. Nebraska officially joined the Big Ten on July 1, 2011. The conference expanded its footprint further in 2012 when the COP/C approved formal membership applications from the University of Maryland and Rutgers University on November 19 and 20, respectively. Maryland and Rutgers became official Big Ten members on July 1, 2014, giving the conference almost 9,500 students participating in intercollegiate athletics and more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams. participation opportunities on 350 teams.

participation opportunities on 350 teams.
Since opening in the fall of 2013, the Big Ten conference center hosts more than 300 meetings annually for member institutions, Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly CIC) related committees and coaches' groups. The headquarters also features an interactive digital museum — the Big Ten Experience — which brings the conference's storied academic and athletic history to life. For more information on the Big Ten Experience,

In 2014, the Big Ten opened a second office in New York City, featuring both office and meeting space in Midtown Manhattan. Big Ten staff members are based in the New York City office to provide expanded coverage and service, while other conference and institutional administrators utilize the space as necessary when conducting business on the East Coast.

Warren and his staff work to meet the educational needs of studentathletes to allow them to excel in all areas of their lives. The conference office manages 27 different championships and tournaments, offers legislative and compliance services, oversee's the production and distribution of more than 2,000 events annually, provides staff services to coaching and administrative personnel, and remains a vital resource for media and fans seeking information on the Big Ten.

During his first year, Warren has helped spark a number of groundbreaking conference initiatives. On March 7, 2020, in advance of the rising tide of the COVID-19 pandemic, the conference partnered with all 14 of its member institutions to create the Big Ten Task Force for Emerging Infectious Diseases. This group was formed to provide counsel and sound medical advice to ensure the health, safety and wellness of the Big Ten's students, coaches, administrators and fans. It includes representatives from a diverse set of disciplines across campus healthcare systems and schools of public health and their input serves as a resource for the conference in making important decisions based on information received from local, state and

federal health departments, along with the NCAA.

Less than two months later on May 4, 2020, the conference announced the formation of the Big Ten Mental Health and Wellness Cabinet, featuring representation from all 14 member institutions, as well as sport affiliate members Johns Hopkins (men's and women's lacrosse) and Notre Dame (men's ice hockey). The goal of the cabinet is to promote optimal mental health for Big Ten student-athletes through a comprehensive, systemic and interdisciplinary approach to establishing mental health programs, while also providing counsel, advice and expertise to the conference office.

Following the death of Minneapolis resident George Floyd, Warren penned an open letter on June 1, 2020, announcing the formation of what became known as the Big Ten Equality Coalition. This group, which features

became known as the Big Ten Equality Coalition. This group, which features student-athletes, coaches, athletic directors, chancellors, presidents and other members of the Big Ten family from all 14 member institutions, has a stated goal of seeking tangible ways to actively and constructively combat racism and hate around the world, while also empowering student-athletes to express their rights to free speech and peaceful protest. The United State's Library of Congress selected Warren's open letter for inclusion in its historic collection.

A product of the conversations emerging from the coalition was the creation of the Big Ten Voter Registration Initiative. This non-partisan, conference-wide collaboration encourages student-athletes to take part in the product of the product of the particles of the particles. in the electoral process and is led by a Voter Registration Committee that includes representatives from all 14 Big Ten institutions. The Voter Registration Committee has partnered with the National Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Lawto develop educational programming and outreach tools, and to collaborate with other established civic platforms

More than 125 years after its inception, the Big Ten remains a national leader in intercollegiate athletics on and off the field. Big Ten programs have combined to win more than 450 team and 1,800 individual national championships, consistently taking home individual honors for athletic and academic accomplishments and fulfilling the Big Ten's mission of academic achievement and athletic success.

BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The 12th annual Big Ten Football Championship Game is scheduled for Dec. 3, 2022, at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis. The game will be televised to a national audience on FOX with kickoff set for 7 p.m. Central. The game will match the winners of the East and West divisions, and the winner of the contest will be presented the Stagg Championship Trophy.

In 2011, the Big Ten Conference announced that Lucas Oil Stadium would host the first five football championship games through the 2015 season. The contract has been extended several times since and Lucas Oil Stadium will host until the 2024 season. During the first 11 seasons, Wisconsin (2011, 2012), Michigan (2020), Michigan State (2013, 2015), Ohio State (2014, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020) and Penn State (2016) have captured titles. Nebraska made its first title game appearance in 2012 and lost to Wisconsin.

While a member of the Big 12 Conference, Nebraska participated in the league title game six times. Nebraska captured Big 12 crowns in 1997 and 1999, and was also the North Division representative in the game in 1996, 2006, 2009 and 2010.

2022 BIG TEN BOWL LINEUP

The Big Ten features the largest and most diverse postseason lineup in conference history. Stretching from coast to coast, the Big Ten's future bowl lineup will be highlighted by annual games against quality opponents from the ACC, Big 12, Pac-12, SEC, and MAC in Arizona, California, Florida, Michigan, New York, North Carolina and Tennessee, along with the opportunity to visit four other outstanding postseason venues as part of the College Football Playoff. The Big Ten's bowl lineup allows teams and fans to visit world-class cities while having the opportunity to experience 10 different NFL stadiums, along with some of the most iconic venues in the country, including Rose Bowl Stadium and Yankee Stadium.

MEMORIAL STADIUM INFORMATION

GATES/STADIUM ENTRY

Fans are encouraged to enter the stadium at the gate printed on their ticket; however, fans can enter gates 1-15, 18, 20 & 23 to access the stadium. Other gates are reserved for premium level tickets or specialty gate tickets only. Gates 1, 6, 8, 18, 19, and 21 will close shortly after kickoff. If your game day ticket displays a gate that is closed after kickoff, use the next available open gate to gain access into the stadium. Fans will be required to open outer garments for visual inspection upon entry. Fans are also encouraged to travel lightly to the game and leave unnecessary belongings at home or in your vehicle.

PUBLIC PARKING

Public Parking is available in lots 20 and 21 of Haymarket Park, the Festival Parking lot north of Pinnacle Bank Arena via pinnaclebankarena.com or through the city of Lincoln via parkandgo.org. Lots at Haymarket Park will open at 6 a.m. for 11 a.m. kickoffs and 8 a.m. for all other kickoff times.

ACCESSIBLE PARKING

- Season permits for patrons with state-issued handicapped vehicle/parking permits or license plates are available in donor lots 5, 8, and 9 on a limited basis and can be applied for through the Athletic Ticketing and Development Office.
- Donor lots 5 and 9 have free shuttle cart service for persons with limited mobility to the northeast and east locations of Memorial Stadium.
- Single-game accessible parking is available on campus on a first-come, first-served basis. Donor lots 9 and 12 have limited spaces reserved for those with state-issued handicapped vehicle/parking permits or license plates. Additional accessible parking is available at 14th & U Streets (east of Morrill Hall, 14th & W Streets) and the Lot 9 parking garage (14th & Avery Ave.), for \$25 per game. Lot 9 is the primary accessible parking option for our fans.
- Free public parking for persons with state-issued handicapped vehicle/parking permits or license plates is available at meter spots on 14th and Vine on a first-come, first-served basis.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

Alcoholic beverages, controlled substances, bags not conforming to the clear bag policy, coolers, chair backs, noise makers, glass bottles, cans, video cameras, banners/ flags on poles, use of selfie sticks and open umbrellas are not allowed in Memorial Stadium. Consideration of other spectators is expected. With the passage of the concealed weapons law in the state of Nebraska, fans are reminded that concealed weapons are not allowed on the UNL campus and are prohibited at all collegiate sporting events. 



COMMITMENT TO COMPLIANCE

On behalf of the University of Nebraska student-athletes, coaches, and Athletic Department staff, I would like to express my appreciation for your continued support of our entire athletic program. The University of Nebraska is known for its loyal, passionate, and knowledgeable fans. It is this type of fervent support that not only assists Nebraska student-athletes in reaching their full potential on and off the playing field, but also draws the next generation of student-athletes to our campus. However, as a University of Nebraska donor, alumni, or fan, please remember that you are also required to know and follow NCAA regulations.

Our coaches, student-athletes, and Athletic Department staff members are knowledgeable about NCAA regulations because they receive ongoing education. But, to truly attain the excellence the University of Nebraska strives for, we also need our supporters to be educated about these same regulations. In turn, you will be assisting us with protecting the eligibility and well-being of our current and future student-athletes.

NCAA PRINCIPLES

Institutional Control

It is the responsibility of the University of Nebraska to control its intercollegiate athletic program in compliance with the rules and regulations of the NCAA and the Big Ten Conference.

Responsibility

The University of Nebraska's responsibility for the conduct of its program includes responsibility for the actions of its staff members and for the actions of any other individual or organization engaged in activities promoting the athletic interests of the institution. This includes donors, alumni, and fans.

Compliance

The University of Nebraska must monitor its program to assure compliance and to identify and report to the NCAA instances in which compliance has not been achieved. An institution found to have violated NCAA rules is subject to disciplinary and corrective actions as determined by the NCAA.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS FROM BOOSTERS

Am I a Booster?

Anyone who engages in the following is a booster for the University of Nebraska:

- a) Belongs to a University of Nebraska Athletic booster club;
- b) Makes financial contributions to a NIL Collective that represents and

- employs Husker student-athletes;
- c) Makes financial contributions to the Athletic Department or a specific Husker team;
- d) Assists in the recruitment of prospective student-athletes;
- e) Employs, gives benefits to, or provides services to a student-athlete, a prospective student-athlete or the relatives/friends of either; or
- f) Promotes the University of Nebraska athletic programs.

What is an "extra benefit"?

An "extra benefit" is any benefit provided to a student-athlete or a student-athlete's relatives or friends that is not authorized by NCAA legislation or available to the general student body. The following list is not exhaustive, but includes examples of "extra benefits" that jeopardize a student-athlete's eligibility:

- a) Free or discounted: food, merchandise, housing, tickets, repairs, haircuts, tattoos, golf/gym memberships, jewelry, etc;
- b) Use of a car, boat, or ATV; and
- c) Gifts, loans, money, or gift cards.

Can I contact prospective student-athletes (recruits) for the Huskers?

No. It is not permissible for boosters to contact recruits. This restriction applies to, but is not limited to, the following forms of contact:

- a) Face-to-Face Meetings;
- b) Phone Calls, Zoom, or any other type of videoconferencing;
- c) Emails/Text Messages/DMs; and
- d) Facebook, Twitter, and all other forms of social media communication.

Although we recognize that some donors, alumni, and fans may have preexisting relationships with student-athletes through family and friends, please contact our staff prior to providing any benefit to a current student-athlete. It is important that the nature of the relationship and proposed benefit is disclosed in advance to ensure the student-athlete's eligibility is not jeopardized. In addition to answering questions directly, our staff can work with the NCAA and Big Ten Conference to confirm whether a benefit is permissible. Nebraska Football Violated Countable Coaches Rules

The Nebraska football program violated NCAA rules for countable coaches and the football head coach violated head coach responsibility rules, according to an agreement released by the Division I Committee on Infractions.

The university, football head coach and NCAA enforcement staff agreed that a former football special teams analyst provided technical or tactical instruction to student-athletes during practices and film sessions. He also assisted in tactical decisions during games. Because he was a noncoaching staff member, his instruction of student-athletes caused the program to exceed the number of permissible coaches in violation of NCAA rules.

According to the agreement, while the head coach did address concerns about the analyst's instruction of student-athletes with the analyst directly, he did not appropriately monitor the analyst or notify compliance staff that violations had occurred. As a result, the football head coach violated head coach responsibility rules.

The university and the enforcement staff used ranges identified by the Division I membership-approved infractions penalty guidelines to agree upon Level II-mitigated penalties for the university and the football head coach.

As a result of the violation, the university will be on probation for one year.



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
