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NEBRASKA EYES 'OPERATION BOUNCEBACK'

"Boy, it hurt—it really hurt to be on the first team to lose the Big 8 title in five years! We really want it back and we hope to make amends in 1968 for blowing the title in 1967."

So mused a University of Nebraska football veteran during a short break in rugged spring practice sessions, and that pretty much sums up the goal for 1968—Bounce back into the Big 8 race picture after a frustrating drop to a 5th place tie last fall.

Not that the Cornhuskers collapsed in 1967, not at all. Actually, Nebraska probably had the best 6-4 team in the land and it came within inches of another outstanding season. Non-loop wins came over Big 10 co-champion Minnesota, tough Washington and a Texas Christian team that came to life with a vengeance after losing to the Huskers.

But in the Big 8 where balance is the by-word these days, the Huskers stumbled four times to fine teams (Kansas 5-5, Oklahoma 9-1, Missouri 7-3, and Colorado 8-2) and that dashed all hopes for a fifth straight title for Bob Devaney and Co., as the Scarlets skidded to a fifth-place tie—lowest ever for a Devaney team and Nebraska's worst finish since 1961.

So how about 1968? Well, Nebraska appears to be better equipped to face the formidable venture of tackling the Big 8 field which again looms awesome.

First of all, the jolly green giants of the 1967 offensive platoon have all now been blooded. Last spring they appeared neither jolly nor green. Rather, they offered evidence on several occasions that they wanted to take on the character of bombastic, angry bulls after an unprofitable interlude of flower-sniffing.

An analysis of the 1968 Cornhuskers would indicate: (1) improved offense with better running speed, experienced quarterback with sufficient reinforcements in case of emergency, outstanding receivers, experienced line more able to cope with problems that a year ago had blockers talking to themselves and (2) good defense with an outstanding secondary back from the 1967 team that led the nation in pass defense and total defense, a solid corps of big, experienced and agile linebackers and a line that will be minus a super-star like Wayne Meylan and will have to rely on improved quickness and balance.

Names are required as evidence. So look at the offense where lettermen man all starting positions and eight veterans with logged starting time. The ends: Letterman Paul Topliff on the tight side, along with junior Jim McFarland (6-4, 220) and letterman Miles Kimmel (6-3, 208) teaming to make this a sound spot. Split ends will be led by 2-year star Tom Penney, backed up by little soph (5-10, 160) Guy Ingles and soph Rex Lowe, both of whom are adept at the spectacular snare and have bomb-threat speed.

Glenn Patterson, 1967 starter heads the tackle contingent which is bouyed by Gale Williams, 1967 guard lettermen, and squad vets Ed Hansen and Donnie McGhee and soph standout Wally Winter.

At the guards, Joe Armstrong and Mel Brichacek return to familiar positions, ably backed up by lettermen Dan Delaney.

Carl Ashman moves from heavy guard duty to center, pushed by veteran Joe Buda.

Familiar names abound in the Husker backfield. Big 8 passing king Frank Patrick, who smashed most Husker passing marks and Bobby Reynolds' total offense record last year as a soph, returns at quarterback. So does back-up man Ernie Sigler, along with Rick Wenner who advances from the unbeaten frosh team with a wealth of ability and a chance to see considerable action.

Joe Orduna, 1967 starter who rushed for the highest soph total since Bobby Reynolds set the mark in 1950, takes over at left half, along with fleet Mike Green. Right half (flanker, too) is up for grabs between lettermen Larry Frost, Mick Ziegler and soph Paul Rogers who earns a spot on the travel roster with his toe. Rogers booted 49 and 36 yard field goals in the spring finale.

And at fullback, All Big 8 Dick Davis, who possesses fine speed and power heads the field, spelled by Vet Buster Yannon and sophs Dan Schneiss, a 6-2, 208 standout, and Phil Vassar.

No Wayne Meylan will harass enemy offenses in 1968, but Nebraska should continue to yield ground grudgingly in the Devaney tradition (the Huskers have led the Big 8 in defense for five straight years.

Starting ends Mike Wynn, 6-5 and 223, and Frank Avolio return, but depth could be a problem although soph Dennis Gutzman and offense-escapee Sherwin Jarmon flashed fine promise last spring.

In the middle, jobs are up for grabs. Best guess at this point: Dave Walline, a fine soph prospect, veterans Tom Linstroth, Ron Drakulich, Bob Liggett and Ken Kusserow in a tight race with Linstroth, Liggett and Walline in a slight lead.

Succeeding Meylan is no picnic, but Dan Kobza, 199-pound junior, and squad vet Bill Hornbacker proved effective last spring and the spot could be solid. Kobza moves in from linebacker.

Scanning the linebacker corps causes smiles to crease Devaney's Irish mug. Both 1967 starters Ken Geddes and Adrian Fiala rate star status and letterman Dan Kobza is a good one if he returns from middle guard. Soph Jerry Murtaugh has the class to fit right in.

A year ago, Nebraska claimed the "finest young defensive backs we've had," and the entire group of corner backs and safeties except Marv Mueller returns to defend the national pass defense title.

Check the familiar names: Bob Best, Al Larson, Jim Hawkins, Randy Reeves, Dana Stephenson. Toss in Wilfred Minor and Junior Jim Jansen and recall that all Nebraska backs are interchangeable and the depth picture seems bright.

Despite spring impressions that Nebraska may have a fine team in 1968, sobering thoughts still crop up. Like it's always tough to climb back up the standings, "improving" on a 6-4 record, ordinarily a satisfactory campaign, is easier dreamt about in August than achieved in November, and regaining a lost title in a conference, recognized these days as one of the most rugged and best-balanced in the nation, is a monumental assignment.

But the Nebraska Cornhuskers appear to relish the challenge and will be better prepared to launch Operation Bounce-Back in 1968.

COACH BOB DEVANEY SAYS - - -

"We expect to have another fine Nebraska football team in 1968. We had a good team last year, but the Big 8 Conference was so much improved we had to settle for a fifth place tie.

"In 1968 we hope to contend for the title the same as in the past six years. But the job will be even more difficult because the Big 8 has become the toughest football conference in the nation, and we return the second fewest number of veterans.

"Looking at our own team, our offense appeared to be improved last spring, helped by more line experience, a veteran quarterback, good speed in the backfield and a more intense desire to be more aggressive. Defensively, we have no Wayne Meylan and we're still looking for a tackle like Jim McCord and Jerry Patton. But our defense in the spring was better than we expected, and we feel we will have an aggressive defensive front backed by the finest secondary we've had at Nebraska.

"Our defensive backs are outstanding and we'll have a fine group of linebackers. Our offensive receivers appear to be much improved, so there are bright spots. But we have problems: right halfback is unsettled, we still make offensive mistakes, we need defensive tackles and middle guards to mention a few.

"All things considered, however, we hope to be able to challenge Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, and the other Big 8 powers for the title we lost last year.

"We'll have to be better because it will be a tremendous task for any team to win the Big 8 in 1968."

Athletic Director and Head Football Coach

When you're the winningest football coach in the nation, you might think of resting on your laurels and taking it easy.

But not Bob Devaney, Nebraska's athletic director and head football coach. He maintains a rugged pace of constant activity as he supplies leadership to the Cornhusker athletic program and, in particular, the Husker football team.

In constant demand as a speaker and advisor, Devaney travels thousands of miles yearly spreading the Cornhusker gospel. Recruiting, banquet speeches, clinics, public service consultations and time devotions for many, many other administrative and civic activities keep "The Duke" on the go. But his first love is his Cornhusker football team and it's a rare day he's not studying film or meeting with his staff in preparation for the next game or next season.

Devaney has a life time coaching record of 88 wins, 22 losses and 5 ties and a Nebraska record of 51-9 and five bowl appearances. And he makes no pretense about waving a magic wand. His formula: top assistant coaches, intense recruiting and dedicated hard work.

Since coming to Nebraska in 1962, Devaney's teams have piled up impressive marks of 8-2, 9-1, 9-1, 10-0, 9-1 and 6-4 during regular season play and his teams won the Big 8 title four straight years, 1963 through 1966.

Arrival of the genial and humorous Irishman signalled a new era in Nebraska football. The state went wacky and fans—all wearing red clothing—charged Memorial Stadium so heavily that it had to be expanded three times until it became the largest in the Big 8 with a 65,000 capacity.

At the same time, Devaney was capturing the hearts of Nebraska people with his wit and humor. And when Tippy Dye resigned as athletic director in the spring of 1967, Devaney assumed the driver's seat for the Husker athletic department and has since applied his forceful energy to improving all phases of the University's intercollegiate program and physical plant development.

Honors have continually come Devaney's way, with the latest being passed on by the Shrine East-West game in San Francisco. Bob has been named to coach the West squad in the 1968 post-season classic.

Here's a capsule of Devaney's football record at Nebraska:

1962—Succeeding Bill Jennings, who resigned after the 1961 season, Devaney took a 3-6-1 club and turned it into the stunner of the Big 8. Nebraska won six straight, wound up 8-2, accepted a Gotham Bowl bid and shocked Miami, 36-34, on an iceberg called Yankee Stadium. Devaney was named Big 8 Coach of the Year.

1963—With an outstanding group of seniors like Dennis Claridge, Bob Brown, Rudy Johnson and Lloyd Voss, the Huskers rolled to a 9-1 record and a spot in the Orange Bowl where they licked Auburn, 13-7, as Devaney again earned Coach of the Year laurels.

1964—Slated for trouble, as 11 of 13 seniors moved on to pro football, Devaney marshalled his troops, shifted to platoon football after the opening game and skipped the Huskers to a nine straight wins and a 9-1 record, despite the loss of starting quarterback Fred Duda

via injury. With soph Bob Churchich taking over, the Scarlets romped to a repeat Big 8 title and a Cotton Bowl bid and Devaney again was Coach of the Year.

1965—Nebraska defied the age-old jinx of being picked high. All the experts tabbed the Huskers to rank high and repeat as Big 8 champs and they roared through like Gangbusters. A third-straight Big 8 title, an undefeated season, an Orange Bowl bid and Coach of the Year honor for Devaney marked the banner season.

1966—The Cornhuskers missed a second straight undefeated season by a half-minute of the final game, but wrapped up a fourth straight Big 8 title and a fifth straight bowl trip, the 1967 Sugar Bowl Classic.

1967—Nebraska's title string ran out, but the Cornhuskers shook off the effects of wholesale offensive inexperience to post a 6-4 record. And the Huskers led the nation in total defense and pass defense, while Frank Patrick snapped Big 8 and Nebraska passing records.

Under Coach Devaney, the Cornhuskers have produced eight All American players: Bob Brown in 1963, Larry Kramer in 1964, Walt Barnes, Tony Jeter and Freeman White in 1965, Wayne Meylan, Larry Wachholtz and LaVerne Allers in 1966 and Wayne Meylan in 1967. In addition, Devaney has developed 37 All Big 8 performers during the past six seasons.

Prior to accepting the Nebraska coaching position, Devaney posted a 35-10-5 record at Wyoming in five years. He went to Wyoming from Michigan State where he served as an assistant under Biggie Munn and Duffy Daugherty. As a high school coach in Michigan, his teams posted a fabulous 52-9-0 record at Alpena.

The 1939 graduate of Alma (Mich.) College is married to the former Phyllis Wiley. The Devaneys have two children, Mike and Patricia—both 1966 graduates of the University of Nebraska.

head coach of the Blue team in the 1962 Blue-Gray game; associate coach in 1966 Hula Bowl game; associate on West staff for the 1963 and 1966 American Coaches Association All America Bowl game, and head coach of the West team in the 1964 and 1967 games; has the best winning percentage of active major college coaches (.800 on 88-22-5); had been named to be the head coach of the West squad in the 1965 Shrine East-West game at San Francisco but had to decline when NU went to Orange Bowl; slated to coach West team in 1968.

REEVES CONTINUES AS TOP SCHOLAR ON 1968 HUSKER TEAM

Randy Reeves of Omaha, first Nebraska preppler to clear 14-feet in the pole vault, continues to rank as the No. 1 scholar on the 1968 Cornhusker football team.

Reeves, who spent the summer as an intern-assistant to Nebraska's Senator Roman Hruska in Washington, D.C., led the 1967 squad with a 3.903 average and he repeats in 1968 with 3.879 cumulative (4.000 is perfect).

Reeves' 3.923 topped second-semester grades, while Soph Jim Anderson's 4.000 led the first semester.

HUSKERS' BOB DEVANEY AGAIN TOPS WINNINGEST COACH IN THE NATION RANKINGS

Nebraska football coach Bob Devaney added a 6-4-0 record to his lifetime totals in 1967 to retain the No. 1 spot on the national ranking of successful coaches, based on winning percentage.

Devaney zoomed to the top in 1965 and repeated in 1966 and 1967.

Heading into 1968, Devaney's teams have played 115 games in 11 years and they have won 88, lost 22 and tied 5 for a nation-leading .800.

Runner-up is Johnny Vaught of Mississippi with .773, while Paul (Bear) Bryant of Alabama is third with .772 and Dan Devine of Missouri is fourth with .764.

FACTS AND FIGURES

Students

More than 18,000 undergraduate, professional and graduate students are enrolled in the University. Men out-number women about two to one. Approximately 85 per cent of the University's students are Nebraska residents. Enrollment at the new University at Omaha totals about 10,000.

Government

The government of the University, under the direction of the Legislature, is vested in a six-member Board of Regents whose members serve without pay and who are elected by district on the nonpartisan ballot. Two members of the Board, J. G. Elliott of Scottsbluff and Robert Raun of Norman, finish terms in 1968 but both have been nominated for re-election. Other members of the Board are B. N. Greenberg, M.D., York; Richard Adkins, Osmond; Richard Herman, Omaha; and Edward Schwartzkopf, Lincoln.

Chancellor Clifford M. Hardin is the University's chief executive officer. The present vice chancellors are Dr. Joseph Soshnik, administration and corporation secretary; Dr. Merk Hobson, Dean of Faculties; and Dr. G. Robert Ross, student affairs. Cecil L. Wittson, M.D., is president of the University Medical Center in Omaha. Dr. Kirk Naylor is president of the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

Historical

The University of Nebraska is now observing its centennial. Its charter was issued by the first regular session of the state legislature on February 15, 1869 and by resolution the legislature committed the University to the terms of the federal Morrill (Land-Grant College) Act of 1862. As a Land-Grant institution the University was directed to offer instruction in agriculture, military tactics, and the "mechanic arts" and has continued as a member of the Land-Grant group. The University has always been co-educational and open to all qualified students regardless of race, creed or color.

First classes: September 7, 1871, collegiate enrollment of 20, a faculty of seven, and a preparatory school of about 100 pupils.

The University Today

The University of Nebraska is composed of 10 colleges and six schools.

The Colleges: Agriculture and Home Economics, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Dentistry, Engineering and Architecture, Graduate, Law, Medicine, Pharmacy, and Teachers.

The Schools: Architecture, Music, Graduate School of Social Work, Home Economics, Journalism, and Nursing.

There are four campuses:

City Campus—175 acres at the north edge of downtown Lincoln. On the City Campus are Arts & Sciences, Business Administration, Engineering & Architecture, Graduate College, Law, Pharmacy, and Teachers, and the Schools of Architecture, Music, Journalism, and Social Work.

East Campus—Covers 331 acres about two miles east of the City Campus. On the East Campus are College of Agriculture and Home Economics, the College of Dentistry, and the Nebraska Center for Continuing Education.

The Medical Center—Covers 26 acres in Omaha. It is the home of the College of Medicine and the School of Nursing, the Nebraska Psychiatric Institute, the Epply Research Institute for Cancer and Allied Diseases, and the University Hospital.

Omaha Campus—Pursuant to enabling legislation enacted by the 1967 Legislature and a vote by the people of Omaha, the University of Omaha was merged with the University of Nebraska on July 1, 1968, and was given the new name, University of Nebraska at Omaha. It is governed by the Board of Regents but maintains a high degree of autonomy with its own administrative officers and faculty.

Other University of Nebraska Operations

The University also operates the Nebraska School of Technical Agriculture at Curtis., Mead Agriculture Field Laboratory, Tractor Testing Laboratory, Institute for Cellular Research, Extension Division, University Health Center, University State Museum—which houses the Hall of Elephants featuring the Lincoln County Mammoth (largest recorded fossil elephant in the world)—the Mueller Planetarium and the Nebraska Student Union.

Mari Sandoz Hall—Women's residence hall for 450 women.

Arthur C. Westbrook Music Building—new facility for the Department of Music.

Willard Kimball Concert-Recital Hall—New concert-recital facility under construction adjacent to the Westbrook Building.

Harper, Smith and Schramm Halls—New residence halls complex for 2,000 men and women.

Charles Henry Oldfather Building—High-rise classroom-office building being opened later this year.

Cliff Struthers Hamilton Building—High-rise \$8 million building for the Department of Chemistry under construction.

Marvel E. Baker Hall—Teaching-research facility on the East Campus for the Department of Animal Science.

Women's Physical Education Building—New facility for the Department of Physical Education for Women.

Basic Sciences Building—New basic sciences facility now under construction at the College of Medicine in Omaha.

University Hospital Addition—New addition to University Hospital at the College of Medicine in Omaha.

Dental College Building—New teaching research and clinic facility on East Campus.

Athletic Department Facilities

Memorial Stadium—Capacity 64,000, for football and outdoor track; indoor track under East Stadium.

Memorial Coliseum—Capacity 8,500, for basketball, swimming, wrestling, physical education, offices and large University functions.

Henry F. Schulte Field House—Locker-rooms, medical and training facilities, indoor workout space for baseball and football.

NEBRASKA'S MULTI-PURPOSE 'PRESS BOX' RANKS AMONG THE NATION'S FINEST

Sportswriters and broadcasters who worked for the first time in Nebraska's spacious and functional new Information Center were unanimous in tabbing the Cornhusker press box a fine facility and a great improvement.

Financed by the Athletic Department in cooperation with dedicated Cornhusker fans who helped secure a first-class press-radio-TV facility, the Nebraska Information Center cost more than \$500,000. No tax money was involved in the construction or operation.

The first level is where the working press and radio people labor. On the front row, some 50 writers can be accommodated, while the second row is devoted to over-flow writers, scouts, statisticians and Western Union. There is a lounge area, with snack bar, where catered pre-game luncheons are available to the working newsmen.

Also located on the first level are nine radio booths, coaches booths, scoreboard and clock booth, statistics center, office, photo dark room, rest room, maintenance room and a communications room.

The second level of the heated and air-conditioned structure contains two movie and news photo wings, the public address booth and Section 300, which includes 316 theater seats for the Husker Achievement Award Contributors who helped make the press box a reality.

Husker Award members who agreed to contribute \$1,000 per year for five years in addition to their regular \$1,000 gift for scholarships, have the option to purchase four seats at a premium price in the area. The area also includes a snack bar (regular stadium fare at regular prices and no liquor), rest rooms and film change rooms.

Level No. 3 is restricted to television, movie and news photographers. It's an open-air deck atop the giant structure which stretches between the 25-yard lines.

Underneath the press box, in the area formerly covered by the old press box, is Section 200. Husker fans who wanted to help construct the press box by contributing \$500 per year for five years have the option on four seats at a premium price in this area.

The Nebraska Information Center is serviced by two high-speed (ground to top in 10 to 12 seconds) elevators.

As a special service to writers and broadcasters, pert members of the Air Force ROTC Auxiliary, Angel Flight, are on hand in the press box to help find seats, answer questions and serve coffee and soft drinks during the game.

PRESS BOX CREDENTIALS

As a general rule, working space in the Nebraska press box is allotted on the following basis: (1) daily newspaper writers covering for Sunday publication; (2) sports editors only of Nebraska daily newspapers; (3) radio personnel needed for those stations broadcasting live; (4) school publication (official daily papers) representatives; (5) approved special coverage. Weekly press representatives and non-broadcasting radio representatives cannot be accommodated. Visiting newsmen, may get tickets early by writing or at will call booth at south end of West Stadium. 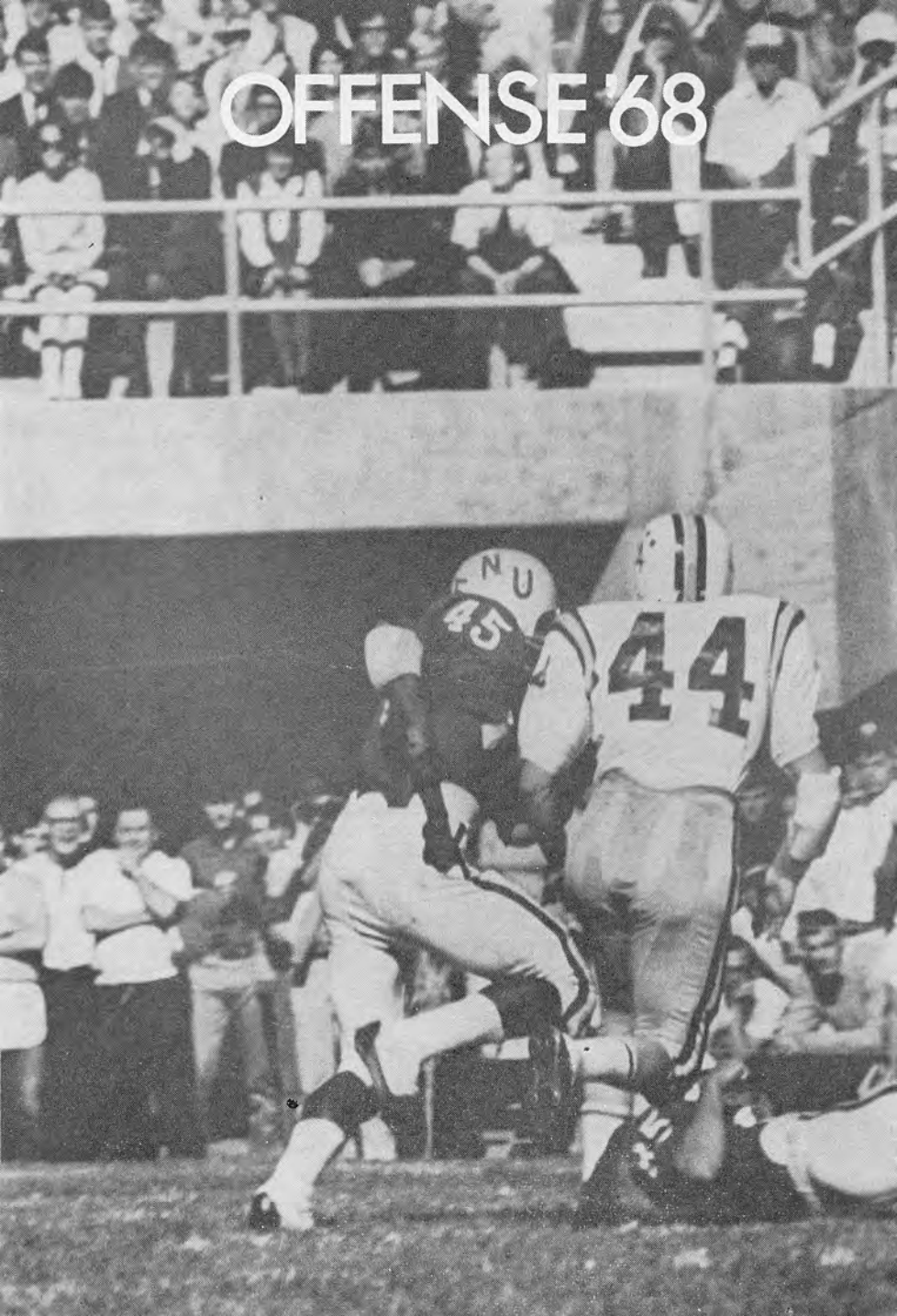
DEVANEY TO SKIPPER WEST IN SHRINE EAST-WEST CLASSIC

COLORADO THRONG SETS NU BIG 8 RECORD

The largest crowd in Big 8 Conference and Nebraska history—65,842 excited fans—watched the 1967 Nebraska-Colorado game at the Cornhuskers' giant Memorial Stadium.

Nebraska boasts the largest stadium in the Big 8 with 63,284 permanent reserved seats, an official capacity of 63,984, including bleachers, and a head-count capacity of over 65,000. The Husker-Buff game of 1967 was one of three games which drew over 65,000 and the fourth in Nebraska history.

The Huskers set a home attendance record for five games of 320,932 fans in 1967, too. Road attendance was 188,550 for a season total of 509,482—second largest in Nebraska history.

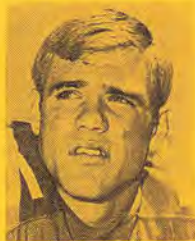

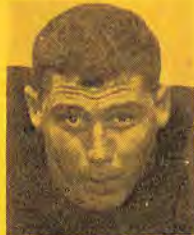

WAYNE MEYLAN VOTED TOM NOVAK TROPHY

Wayne Meylan, Nebraska's great two-time All America middle guard, was voted the 1967 winner of the Tom Novak Trophy, presented annually by J. Gordon Roberts of Omaha.

The trophy, established by Mr. Roberts in 1950, is presented to the Husker senior who "best exemplifies courage and determination despite all odds in the manner of Nebraska All America center Tom Novak." Sportswriters and broadcasters who cover all Nebraska games vote on the award.

Meylan was a near-unanimous choice, missing on only one ballot as a voter paid tribute to Tackle Jim McCord, who battled back from severe leg injuries to become a Husker star.

HUSKERS LED NATION IN TOTAL DEFENSE AND PASS DEFENSE

Continuing the tradition for excellence established by Coach Bob Devaney, the 1967 Cornhuskers turned in impressive statistics.

The Huskers led the nation in total defense, allowing an average of only 157.6 yards per game and eight TDs. They also led in pass defense by permitting only an average of 90.1 yards per game and one TD (ironically, that touchdown came in the Missouri game and cost the Huskers a 10-7 decision.)

Nebraska also ranked fourth in rushing defense (67.5 yards per game) and fourth in defense against scoring (8.3 points per game).

Husker quarterback Frank Patrick ranked No. 11 in passing with 116 completions for 1,449 yards, the same figure that enabled him to rank 23rd in total offense.

NEBRASKA HAS EXCITING, ACTION-PACKED BOWL HISTORY

Nebraska's Cornhuskers have played in only seven post-season football games, but they logged five consecutive appearances from 1962 through 1966—a mark which stands as a Big 8 record—and they have achieved the honor of playing in the four major bowls (Rose, Orange, Cotton and Sugar), also a Big 8 mark of distinction.

While the Huskers can boast only a 2-5 mark in bowl play—they're 2-3 under Coach Bob Devaney—they have supplied some sensational action for the fans.

Nebraska's first bowl appearance came in the 1941 Rose Bowl—the Cornhuskers are the only Big 8 team to ever play in the grandpappy of them all—against the great Stanford team which created the T-formation craze. Nebraska twice led the Indians before losing a thriller, 21-13—via Pete Kmetovic's punt return—after the Huskers had held Stanford four downs within the one-yard line, one of college football's great goal-line stands.

Duke clobbered the Huskers, 34-7, in the 1955 Orange Bowl game, as Nebraska got the bowl bid by finishing second to Oklahoma during the era when the same Big 8 team could not go to Miami twice in succession.

Then came the Bob Devaney era and two successive bowl wins—a 36-34 spine-tingler over George Mira-generated Miami on the frozen turf of Yankee Stadium in 1962; and a rousing 13-7 win over Auburn in the 1964 Orange Bowl, pepped by the 68-yard scoring jaunt of Quarterback Dennis Claridge and a pair of record field goals by Dave Theisen.

After a repeat 9-1 in 1964, the Huskers played in the 1965 Cotton Bowl game against unbeaten Arkansas and led the favored Razorbacks, 7-3, most of the way before bowing, 10-7, in the final minutes. The win over Nebraska gave Arkansas the Grantland Rice Trophy.

In 1965 the Huskers capped a perfect season by meeting explosive Alabama in the 1966 Orange Bowl game, and dropped a 39-28 decision. But Nebraska turned in some brilliant offensive fireworks as Bob Churchich fired a record-matching total of three TD passes.

In 1966 the Scarlets won a Sugar Bowl bid, then fell 34-7 to unbeaten Alabama. Once again Churchich and Dick Davis supplied some fine action in the losing effort.

CORNHUSKER MARCHING BAND

Always one of the highlights of a Nebraska football game is the performance of the Cornhusker Marching Band, a 175-man aggregation of outstanding musicians selected via competitive auditions.

Miss Susie Kunc, Wilber junior, again will star as Nebraska's famed "Sunshine Girl." Drum majors are Lynn Moeller of Grant, Jeff Klintberg of Laurel and Bob Slie of Scottsbluff.

The marching band is one of several outstanding musical groups at the university—the Symphonic Band, top performing organization, the Collegiate Band, the ROTC Band, the Brass Ensemble, the Woodwind Choir and the Brass Choir.

Membership in the NU marching band is recognized as firm evidence of talent and good musicianship, and the experience of having been a Cornhusker bandsman is one the members remember with pride throughout their lifetimes.

And football fans annually are thrilled by the Husker marchers, who have staged outstanding halftime shows at the Rose Bowl (1941), the Orange Bowl (1955, 1964 and 1966), the Cotton Bowl (1965), and the Sugar Bowl (1967).

DON LENTZ, JACK SNIDER—GREAT BATON TEAM

The University of Nebraska is fortunate to have two outstanding musical experts directing its fine band program—Donald A. Lentz, who is Director of Bands, and Jack R. Snider, Assistant Director of Bands and director of the Cornhusker Marching Band.



DON LENTZ

Mr. Lentz is nationally known as an outstanding flute player, composer and author. Heading the Nebraska band program since 1937—he is the father of Band Day, which has become a national by-word—he previously played under some of the world's great conductors in the New York Symphony, the Barrere Symphony, the Sousa Band, and in the theater, ballet and radio.

Prof. Lentz is an expert in the field of oriental scale systems, having studied the Hindu, Thai and Indonesia scale systems in the Orient in 1956-57 and 1962. He has recently authored a book, "Tones and Intervals of Hindu Classical Music." Among his band compositions are "Bakonian Legend," "Panomime," and "Samana."

Prof. Snider has worked closely with Mr. Lentz in the development of the Nebraska band program, and has been most active in directing the Marching Band. He also directs the Collegiate and ROTC bands, the Brass Ensemble and Brass Choir.

A 1949 graduate of Nebraska, Prof. Snider taught in the Kearney schools before joining the NU faculty in 1951. He plays Principal French Horn with the Lincoln Symphony and also serves as assistant conductor. He is one of the founders and the first president of the Nebraska State Bandmasters Association.

HUSKERS OPEN SEASON WITH 17-7 WIN OVER WASHINGTON

Seattle, Wash.—(Sept. 16, 1967)—Rebuilding Nebraska was really an unknown quantity against favored Washington in the 1967 opener, but the Cornhuskers pulled off a 17-7 victory in rousing fashion before 57,481 fans.

Recovering a fumbled punt in the first quarter, the Huskers drove 33 yards to score in nine plays. The next time they got the ball, Rookie Quarterback Frank Patrick—with the aid of a 31-yard pass to Dennis Morrison—took the Scarlets 43 yards to score in another nine plays.

But the Huskies weren't stunned by a 14-0 deficit and three plays after the kickoff, Quarterback Tom Sparlin tore through Nebraska's vaunted defense 48 yards for a TD.

Bill Bomberger's 20-yard field goal just before the half wound up the scoring.

ORDUNA'S GALLUP SUPPLIES 7-0 WIN OVER BIG 10 CHAMPS

Lincoln, Neb.—(Sept. 30, 1967)—Sophomore Joe Orduna broke up a titanic defensive battle with a 25-yard touchdown run in the third quarter to give the Nebraska Cornhuskers a 7-0 win over Minnesota in the home opener.

Nebraska held the Big 10 co-champs to only three yards rushing. Memorial Stadium bulged with 65,347 fans as the two teams battled furiously to a scoreless halftime rest. Both teams had serious drives blunted and both missed field goal attempts.

But early in the third period, Frank Patrick engineered a drive from the Husker six-yard line, hitting four of five passes and getting some fine running from fullback Dick Davis.

With a first down at the Gopher 25, Orduna shot through left tackle and broke into the clear for the clinching touchdown as 4:45 flashed by in the third quarter.

BOMBERGER'S BOOT SALVAGES 16-14 WIN AT K-STATE

Manhattan, Kan.—(Oct. 7, 1968)—Bill Bomberger kicked a 19-yard field goal with only 1:11 left in the game to give Nebraska a 16-14 decision over a fired-up Kansas State team on the rain-drenched Wildcat turf.

Bomberger's boot capped a great Husker comeback, accomplished largely via the passing of Frank Patrick and the catching of Dennis Richnafsky after Kansas State had jumped to a slippery, 14-0, lead in the first quarter.

Fumbles by Patrick (at the NU 11) and Ben Gregory (on a punt at the NU 39) gave the Wildcats two giant chances in the first 12 minutes and they capitalized on both—Cornelius Davis blasting from the one each time.

But the Cornhuskers regrouped and regained the initiative as the Patrick-Richnafsky duo went to work. When it was over, Patrick had passed for 193 yards (19 of 33) and Richnafsky had set a Big 8 record of 14 catches for 145 yards.

Nebraska scored in the second quarter off a 48-yard drive, Patrick tossing a five-yard TD strike to Richnafsky, to cut the halftime gap to 14-7. In the third quarter, the Huskers went 38 yards, mostly on power thrusts by Dick Davis and Ben Gregory, with the latter scoring from the one. But Bomberger's PAT try was partially blocked and K-State was ready to let school out.

However, demonstrating that the Huskers, too, had a thing called pride, the Scarlets got the ball on their own 15 late in the game marched to the Wildcat nine before stalling. Then Bomberger booted the clincher and No. 3 was wrapped up.

KANSAS RISES UP TO STUN HUSKERS, 10-0, AND SNAP SCORING STRING

Lawrence, Kan.—(Oct. 14, 1967)—Nebraska found it couldn't escape two straight ambushes in the Sunflower State as the Kansas Jayhawks shook off earlier door-mat appearances and struck down the Cornhuskers, 10-0.

It was the first time a Bob Devaney team had been shut out and snapped a Husker scoring string that went back to the ninth game of 1961.

Bobby Douglass—running and passing—skipped the Jayhawks to a second quarter TD that proved to be enough to derail the Scarlets. He carried over from the four with 1:14 left in the half to cap a 62-yard drive.

Nebraska came within one-yard of getting back in the game before the half ended. After getting a first down at the KU 45, Frank Patrick tossed a 42-yard pass to Tom Penney, who made a diving catch at the KU three. Two tries in the final eight seconds were hurled back by the aroused Jayhawks.

Neither team threatened in the third quarter. Kansas cemented the upset victory in the final period after a pass interception and 28-yard return to the NU 32. Bill Bell kicked a 30-yard field goal with :36 left in the game and Kansas had turned in a fine performance to take the first olive out of the bottle and start the Huskers toppling off the Big 8 throne for the first time in five years.

LONG-HAUL INTERCEPTIONS GIVE BUFFS 21-16 WIN IN THRILLER

Lincoln, Nebr.—(Oct. 21, 1967)—Both Colorado and Nebraska had been sailing a collision course for a year after NU's squeaker at Boulder in 1966. The crash came before a record crowd of 65,842 fans who stood and cheered the Huskers as they left the field, defeated 21-16 by a fine, opportunistic Buffalo team that would go on to win the Bluebonnet Bowl.

Two pass interceptions that went for TDs killed the inspired Cornhuskers who thumped the Buffs in every department but the key one called scoring.

The fans hardly got seated before Colorado fumbled and Nebraska quickly drove 43 yards to score. Frank Patrick hitting Ben Gregory with a 17-yard TD toss with 8:23 left in the first quarter.

Colorado got a key break early in the second quarter when Nebraska elected to go for a fourth and inches situation at the Husker 29. The officials ruled Patrick failed to make the necessary yardage and Colorado promptly punched in to score.

With only :49 left in the half, the Buffs broke the deadlock in sensational fashion. All America Dick Anderson picked off a Patrick pass, apparently was hemmed in near the Husker bench and then lateraled to Mike Veeder who skipped the rest of the way for a 68-yard score and a 14-7 halftime lead.

Nebraska took the second half kickoff and went 80 yards to score in only eight plays as Joe Orduna broke loose for a 27-yard TD. But Bill Bomberger's kick was blocked and NU still trailed.

With 3:09 left in the third, Colorado again capitalized on an interception. Jeff Raymond grabbed a Patrick toss and tore 67 yards unhampered to score.

Back battled the Huskers in the fourth period and a 39-yard Patrick-to-Orduna pitch set up a 33-yard field goal by Bill Bomberger. But the hay was in the barn and the Huskers, who had 402-182 yardage bulge, couldn't dent the Buffs during the rest of the game. Ironically, the final play of the game was a pass interception by Colorado, as if to spotlight the theme of the day.

**HUSKERS BOUNCE BACK WITH
29-0 WIN OVER TCU**

Ft. Worth, Tex.—(Oct. 28, 1967)—Smarting from two straight Big 8 defeats, the Nebraska Cornhuskers stormed to a 29-0 win over Texas Christian before a disappointing crowd of 18,529.

Nebraska scored twice in the first quarter to launch the rout, taking a lesson from Colorado and capitalizing on a fumble and an interception.

Frank Patrick passed five yards to Dennis Richnafsky for the first tally with 8:08 left in the first quarter after the Huskers recovered a Frog fumble at the 19. On the third play after the kickoff, linebacker

Ken Geddes grabbed a TCU pass and on the next play Patrick fired a 21-yard strike to Dick Davis.

Bill Bomberger kicked a third quarter field goal before the Huskers tallied twice in the final period. Geddes picked off another Frog pass and ran 39 yards to score. In the last quarter, Al Fierro passed a 46-yard TD bomb to Buster Yannon as the reserves wound up the action.

Again the defense sparkled, limiting the Cyclones to a minus-five yards rushing and a total offense net of only 82 yards. But Iowa State's defense refused to buckle either.

Nebraska scored early, thanks to a fumble recovery at the Cyclone 7 in the opening minutes, as Bill Bomberger kicked a 23-yard field goal. It stayed 3-0 until late in the third quarter when Frank Patrick capped a 41-yard drive after a pass interception with a one-yard TD punch.

When the Cyclones fumbled the subsequent kickoff, Nebraska got the ball at the IS 27 but couldn't power the ball in. However, after stalling the Huskers at the one, Cyclone Ben King was tackled in the end zone by Frank Avolio and NU got two more points.

LONG, FOURTH QUARTER PASS GIVES MISSOURI VICTORY, 10-7

Columbia, Mo.—(Nov. 18, 1967)—A 38-yard TD pass from Garnett Phelps to Jon Staggers at the start of the final quarter gave Missouri a come-from-behind victory over Nebraska, 10-7.

With 56,400 fans on hand, Nebraska carried the fight to the Tigers all day, jumping to an early lead before the game became a tenacious defensive struggle.

Thanks to a 30-yard pass to Dennis Richnafsky and a 31-yard TD flog to Joe Orduna, Frank Patrick got the Huskers on the board, 7-0, with only 7:30 gone in the first quarter. But NU couldn't break through the stubborn Tiger defense again and managed only 11 yards rushing for the game, lowest ever for a Bob Devaney-coached team.

Missouri cut the gap in the second period when Wallace kicked a 45-yard field goal.

It looked like Nebraska's great defense might hang on to preserve the win, but three plays into the final quarter disaster struck. All

America Wayne Meylan almost nailed Phelps for a loss, but he got the ball airborne. At the goal line Stagers stretched out through the air between two defenders and snared the ball for the game-winning TD.

SOONERS FINALLY STOP HUSKERS AFTER 21-14 HEART-STOPPER

Lincoln, Nebr.—(Nov. 23, 1967)—With a crowd of over 59,000 and a national ABC-TV audience of millions looking on, dethroned Nebraska tried valiantly to derail the title-bound Oklahoma Sooners.

But the Sooners finally fought down the battling Huskers and pulled out a 21-14 victory in a tremendous Big 8 contest.

Oklahoma jumped out to a 10-0 lead early in the game and it looked for a while like a rout was in the making. But Nebraska regrouped and overshadowed the Sooners in posting a 14-13 halftime lead that held up until the final quarter.

The Sooners won the game when Eddie Hinton skirted left end and sprinted 23 yards to score the clincher with 14:12 left in the game.

Oklahoma got a 3-0 lead following a Husker fumble on the opening kickoff as Mike Vachon kicked a 20-yard field goal before the popcorn vendors got to work in the stands.

Ron Shotts made it 10-0 by capping a 47-yard drive with a one-yard plunge at the end of the quarter. It got worse for the Huskers when Oklahoma recovered another fumble at the NU 31 and wound up getting three more points on a 43-yard Vachon field goal.

Nebraska responded with gusto, marching 75 yards in nine plays after the kickoff, with Frank Patrick passing nine yards to Ben Gregory for the TD.

After blunting the Sooners at the Husker 20 late in the half, the Huskers again marched 80-yards to score with only :48 left. Bill Bomberger's second kick put NU ahead, 14-13, and the Huskers almost broke the game open when the Sooners fumbled the following kickoff.

Patrick pitched a 15-yard strike to Dennis Morrison and then hit

Dennis Richnafsky in the end zone with a TD pass, but what could have been a 21-13 lead dissolved because Nebraska was guilty of illegal motion.

Bomberger's 26-yard field goal try before the gun didn't make it and the game became a defensive struggle until Hinton broke loose.

Husker standouts were legion—Wayne Meylan overshadowing his All America rival Granville Liggins; Dick Davis rushing for 127 yards and Patrick hitting 22 of 40 passes for 290 yards, to mention three.

Oklahoma went on to post a tremendous Orange Bowl victory while Nebraska passed up post-season play for the first time in six years with a sixth straight winning season to its credit but the Big 8 title gone for the first time in five years.

An inexperienced team had its great moments and its bad moments, but it kept the fans on the edges of their seats and looking forward to 1968.

WHITES BEAT REDS, 26-24, IN SPRING DRILL FINALE

Nebraska wound up spring football practice on a rousing, bomb-filled note.

The Whites scored in the final minute with the aid of a pass interference call to pull out a 26-24 victory over the Reds on May 11.

After the hitting concluded, Coach Bob Devaney commented:

"I think this was one of our better offensive showings of the spring. We had general improvement on offense all the way around this spring, and I think we made progress in finding replacements for the middle of our defensive line.

Three of the six TD plays of the day were from over 50 yards out, prompting Devaney to observe: "That's something we didn't have last year—the home run threat."

Particularly outstanding was the pass receiving of Tom Penny, Rex Lowe, Guy Ingles and Larry Frost; the running of Mike Green and Joe Orduna; the kicking of Paul Rogers; and the overall play of the offensive lines and the defensive backfields.

After watching the receivers haul in 22 passes for 462 yards, end coach Tom Osborne commented: "I think our receivers will be as good as those on any team we meet."

Lowe caught a 66-yard TD pass, while Penney was on the TD end of a 71-yard cannon shot from Frank Patrick, who took up where he left off last fall as the Big 8's premium passer: 11 for 28 for 216 yards. Green blew around left end for 54 yards and a TD and Orduna got things gong with a 26-yard dash.

Rogers gave promise of a fine field goal threat by booting 3-pointers from 37 and 49 yards out.
