## PRESS, RADIO, TV INFORMATION

The 1983 Nebraska Football Media Guide was written, compiled and edited by assistant athletic director and sports information director Don Bryant, assistant sports information director Tom Simons and publications coordinator/sports information assistant Chuck Pool.

All requests for press, radio, television and photography information or space in the Memorial Stadium press box should be directed to Don Bryant, 116 South Stadium, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, Nebraska 68588. Further information on the NU media services and policies is available on pages 2-4 of the Media Guide. **An index to the guide is on pages 309-310.**

## PRESS BOX CREDENTIALS & SERVICES

The University of Nebraska Press Box is located on the West side of Memorial Stadium and features an outstanding view of the game, and complete services such as elevator, pre-game and post-game information, statistics, play-by-play, food and refreshments. Telephones may be installed at each seat for reporters desiring to file by phone, telecopier or Video Display Terminal (VDT). Telecopier Service at a reasonable cost is available. Writers wishing to utilize Telecopier Service should request it when they request credentials. The service will cost \$35 per game, \$25 (check payable to the University of Nebraska), and \$10 (cash) to the operator.

**When writing for credentials, please inform the NU Sports Information Office how you will file the game story.**

As a general rule, working space in the Nebraska Press Box is allotted on the following basis: (1) daily newspaper writers covering for Sunday publication; (2) sports editors of Nebraska daily newspapers; (3) radio personnel for an originating broadcast; (4) official school daily, one seat and/or one sideline only; (5) approved special coverage; (6) press and TV working photographers. **Weekly press representatives and non-broadcasting radio representatives cannot be accommodated in the press box because of space limitations.** Free-lance and amateur photographers are not eligible for media credentials.

Visiting newsmen may get tickets at the South Stadium Press Will-Call Window. No credentials will be mailed. All special requests should be directed to Don Bryant, Sports Information Director, 116 Memorial Stadium, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, Nebraska 68588. Phone: 402/472-2263.

**Photographers must secure arm bands in the Press Box before games. Cutline writers or equipment carriers are not permitted on the sidelines, per Big Eight rules. Photographers and those with credentials other than Press Box seat assignments will not be admitted to the press box except for lunch and arm bands and may not gather in the Press Box at halftime or during the second half.**

## PRESS TICKET WILL-CALL, ELEVATOR LOCATION

Press, radio and TV credentials will be left at Will-Call.

Tickets for will-call will be left at the Stadium Will-Call window in the Memorial Stadium Office Bldg. at the south end of the stadium.

Memorial Stadium press box elevators are located just south of West Stadium middle or main entrance. You must show your press box credentials in order to board the elevators.

If there is a ticket problem, ask the elevator ticket guard to phone Don Bryant, Tom Simons, or Chuck Pool in the press box.

All persons with press credentials of any type should enter the gate marked "PRESS" on the West side. If it is necessary to leave and return, use the same gate and get stamped. No one will be admitted with a torn ticket only.

## **BIG EIGHT SIDELINE CONTROL POLICIES FOR 1983**

The Big Eight Conference maintains a strict sideline control policy in an effort to keep the playing area as clear of people as possible.

**All Sideline photographers must have arm bands. Arm bands can be picked up in the press box prior to game time, providing photographers have made prior arrangements.**

The 1983 Big Eight sideline control policy:

- (1) Only those photographers on assignment, including student and freelance photographers, are given credentials. Each student publication shall be limited to one press and/or one sideline photo pass.
- (2) Only those papers with Sunday and/or daily editions are eligible for sideline passes. (Special requests shall be submitted to the sports information director for his review but such requests, if honored, will be limited to one photo pass.)
- (3) Cutline writers, equipment carriers, and/or other so-called "assistants" will not be allowed on the sideline.
- (4) Photographers **must** display their credentials (credential and arm band) at all times. If not, they will be asked to leave the stadium.
- (5) University personnel are to be deployed on the sidelines to insure that all credentials are properly displayed and to watch for any abuse of privileges by photographers. Those possessing coaches' sideline (bench) badges must remain inside the team bench area (between the 25-yard lines).
- (6) Photographers may not enter the bench area (between the 25-yard lines) at any time.

## **PHOTO DAY**

Nebraska's annual Photo Day will be held Sunday, Aug. 7, at 1 p.m. on the Memorial Stadium Astro Turf.

The Cornhuskers will commence two-a-day practices on Aug. 8.

## **PRESS PARKING**

Press parking is located at 10th and T Streets in front of the South Memorial Stadium Office Building. No car will be admitted to the Press Lot after 12:15 p.m. because of traffic congestion. No cars will be admitted without a Press Parking Pass.

## **NEBRASKA LOCKER ROOM POLICY**

The University of Nebraska post-game policies conform to NCAA and Big Eight Conference efforts to assist the news media in coverage of Cornhusker football.

In 1983, the following rules will apply (no change from 1982):

—Coach Tom Osborne and Husker players will be available for interviews 10 minutes after they enter the locker room.

—No cameras—television or still—will be permitted in the dressing, shower and toilet areas. Post game pictures and TV interviews will be available in the **First Floor Lounge** of the South Stadium building.

—No members of the opposite sex are permitted in the dressing, shower and toilet areas of University of Nebraska locker rooms. News media members of the opposite sex will be admitted to all other areas of post-game activity, and players and coaches will be made available upon request.

—No children are permitted in the post-game interview areas and the locker room.

—Parents and official visitors to the locker room will be admitted approximately 30 minutes after the team arrives in the locker room after a game.

—Media admittance to the South Stadium Building and the locker room and interview areas will be by game credentials only.

## 1983 Preview

# "LONG" SEASON IN STORE FOR HUSKERS

Anyway you slice it, 1983 is going to be a long football season for the Nebraska Cornhuskers. Hopefully, it won't be a bad season, but it certainly will be a long one.

Tom Osborne will gather his flock on Aug. 6 and the final game—the Oklahoma Shootout, of course—is set for Nov. 26. Since the Huskers have gone a-bowling annually since 1969, the odds would indicate they'll be in action well into December and, possibly, January, if they successfully defend the Big Eight championship they've won the past two years. Thus, a long season is in store.

The reason for the early start is Penn State, the only team to beat the Huskers (27-24) in 1982 as the Nittany lions roared to the national championship. These two national rivals will hook up to open the 1983 season, meeting at Giants Stadium in the New Jersey Meadowlands complex on Monday night, Aug. 29.

It should be a dandy lid-lifter for the college season, reminiscent of the old College All-Star game. Two of the nation's top three coaches—Nebraska's Tom Osborne and Penn State's Joe Paterno—will lead teams that are expected to again contest for the national title, despite losing some key stars from the 1982 campaign.

Penn State, of course, will be minus Curt Warner and Todd Blackledge, the go-guys of the No. 1 1982 team. Nebraska will be without Mr. Everything, Dave Rimington, and the rest of the offensive line with the exception of All-America candidate Dean Steinkuhler at guard. Osborne is concerned, too, about the departure of his three top linebackers, his top three tight ends, his top split end and two outstanding defensive linemen.

There's a mighty bright side to Osborne's situation, however, and therein lies the root of optimism that prevails in the Cornhusker camp.

"We'll have a good team, possibly a very good team," Osborne has said more than once during the summer. "We have a lot of fine players back and some very promising young players, but we won't know how good we can be until things get rolling in the fall. We do know we will miss a lot of players from the 1982 team who did an outstanding job for several years."

Last year Nebraska led the nation in most offensive categories, but particularly in rushing, total offense and scoring. A whale of a lot of the fire power returns, but a whopping number of the hole-openers must be replaced if the Huskers are to approach 1982 dimensions.

Osborne doesn't back off from bragging about his backfield talent, calling it the best material he's had during his 11 impressive years as Nebraska's head coach. Turner Gill returns at quarterback after racing away with All-Big Eight honors the past two years. I-back Mike Rozier shattered the Nebraska single-season rushing record last fall—in the first nine games, that is—enroute to consensus All-America recognition. His 1,689 yards ranked No. 4 in the nation and he's the top rusher returning among 1982 Heisman Trophy vote-getters. Irving Fryar, rated by many experts as the top receiver in the nation, returns at wingback, the spot where he's starred for the past two years.

Fullback Mark Schellen, a power runner with blazing speed, makes the No. 1 backfield appear formidable, indeed, and the depth picture is bright, too. Nate Mason, a two-year letterman, and Craig Sundberg, a one-year letterman who sparkled in the spring, will keep Gill hustling. Jeff Smith, who had a sensational sophomore season in 1982 when he posted a 10.2 average and gained 569 yards, makes

I-back a solid position. A pair of talented sophomores, Paul Miles and Doug DuBose, could also enter the picture.

Shane Swanson and Jim Thompson both lettered at wingback in 1982, so Fryar can have capable relief, and letterman Tim Brungardt and soph Tom Rathman are solid fullback performers.

Up front, Osborne and Co., are rebuilding and the spring films show progress was made on replacing Randy Theiss, Mike Mandelko and Jeff Kwapick in the line. Steinkuhler, who led the grading in 1982, no longer is in the shadow of upperclass superstars, and senior Scott Raridon has lettered twice while playing very well as an alternate. That makes the right side solid, and the left side has lettermen John Sherlock at tackle and Harry Grimminger at guard, and the depth is good with lettermen Mark Behning and Anthony Thomas still very much in the picture.

How about center? With Rimington gone—along with two Outland Trophies and the 1982 Lombardi Award—the hole looked big. But Osborne shifted alternate tackle Mark Traynowicz, who starred in relief against LSU in the Orange Bowl, to center and the hole doesn't look quite so big. Maybe that's because Traynowicz is 6-6 and 260 pounds with fine mobility and a heap of aggressiveness. Letterman Brad Muehling is also on hand.

Tight end remains a question mark, with only letterman Monte Engebritson boasting back-up experience. Three lettermen line up at split end, Ricky Simmons, Scott Kimball and Scott Schoettger.

With the backfield talent available, the Husker offense again could be impressive, once the spring rebuilding job jells in the fall. There is explosive potential, to say the least.

Defensively, only four starters return—right tackle Rob Stuckey (as in cookie), end Bill Weber, cornerback Dave Burke and safety Bret Clark. The Husker Black Shirts will have speed and quickness, perhaps better than in 1982, but they won't have quite the size and strength of past units.

Still, the defense looked solid in the spring and fall seasoning could bring it up to par with Nebraska's usual sturdy tradition.

There will be lettermen at all starting spots. Dave Ridder, Scott Strasburger, Eric Buchanan and Weber are all in the chase at defensive end. Mike Keeler and Doug Herrmann are veteran tackles, along with Stuckey, and lettermen Mike Tranmer and Ken Graeber lead the pack at middle guard.

There may be a few new faces at linebacker for the Huskers, but talent is not short. Mike Knox was devastating in the Orange Bowl and will take two letters into his junior year. Mark Daum also lettered as a sophomore in 1982 and had a good spring, but sophs will provide the reserves.

The secondary could be potent, but reserve depth must be developed in fall camp and early season to offset any injury problems that may develop. Neil Harris at left cornerback and Mike McCashland at monster, along with Burke and Clark, all have logged starting experience and playing time together.

Kicking may be the greenest area of the Husker game in 1983. Grant Campbell handled the punting the past two years, while Kevin Seibel did the place-kicking for the past four years, and both have departed. Newcomers Dan Wingard and Tom Demmell appear to be the top punting candidates along with junior college transfer Scott Livingston, while Dave Schneider and Mark Hagerman will handle the kicking.

Like preceding years, Nebraska again expects to be in the race for the Big Eight title and the national championship. But there's still a lot of work to do before Osborne gets all the pieces fitted together.

Tom sums it up best when he muses, "All I'm really sure of right now is that it definitely will be a long season!"



## TOM OSBORNE SAYS:

**OVERALL PROSPECTS**—"We felt after spring practice that we were somewhat encouraged by our football team. The main thing that we are most concerned about is the fact that we have only eight starters returning and even though we may have some great individual players we will have inexperience at a great number of positions going into the game back at the Meadowlands."



**OFFENSIVE PROSPECTS**—"Our main concerns were tight end, since we graduated the top three tight ends from last year's team, and center where we lost the top two from last year's team. Monte Engebritson made some progress at tight end and appears to be an adequate player. We moved Mark Traynowicz from tackle to center and Mark had a pretty good spring. Our offensive line is not where it was a year ago in terms of knowledge and finesse, but the players are big and strong and I think they will make progress. We have some great running backs, so we are encouraged about the offense."

**OFFENSIVE ALL-AMERICANS**—Mike Rozier is the best running back we've had at Nebraska during the 20 years since I've been around Nebraska football. We feel we have a great receiver in Irving Fryar, who also returns punts and kickoffs. Turner Gill is an outstanding quarterback and our offensive right guard, Dean Steinkuhler, is probably one of the best offensive linemen we've ever had here. We feel that all four of these are legitimate All-America-type players.

**DEFENSIVE PROSPECTS**—"Our main (spring) concern centered around the loss of three of our top four linebackers . . . Mike Knox who did play some a year ago, had a good spring . . . Mark Daum, who was our fifth linebacker a year ago, played pretty well . . . We're still a little bit concerned about depth at that position. We are also concerned about the loss of Toby Williams and Jeff Merrell in the interior of our defensive line, and we feel we'll be thin in that area. The secondary should be better than it was a year ago because we have three of the top four players back. We also have out top three defensive ends returning, so we feel that we could be decent on defense.

**KICKING GAME PROSPECTS**—"Our kicking game is a real concern because we lost our punter and our placekicker, and we're still struggling in that department.

**SUMMATION**—"Overall we think we have a chance to be good, but we have more uncertainty than we did a year ago simply because of the fact that instead of having 14, 15 or 16 returning starters, we have only eight . . . But we do have some quality players among those eight people."



## Rodgers, Rimington on All-Time Team

# 1971 Huskers Named Best College Team Ever By Sporting News

Nebraska's 1971 national championship football team has been named the best college football team of all time.

The Sporting News asked a select panel of coaches to rate the best teams in history and Coach Bob Devaney's 1971 team was the runaway winner, finishing 33 points ahead of the runner-up 1956 Oklahoma Sooners team.

Nebraska's 1971 team was listed on 16 of the 19 ballots and the Huskers were listed No. 1 on six of the 16 ballots.

The Sporting News also selected an all-time college football team and two Cornhuskers made the lineup, center Dave Rimington and wingback Johnny Rodgers. Rimington, now a Cincinnati Bengal after being drafted in the first round of the NFL draft, is the most honored college lineman in history and the only player ever to win two consecutive Outland Trophies. He also won the Lombardi Trophy and received almost every other honor available to college linemen, including Big Eight Player-of-the-Year, Big Eight Athlete-of-the-Year, NCAA Top Five, Academic All-American, All-American and many others.

Rodgers, winner of the 1972 Heisman Trophy, was a two-time All-American and sparked back-to-back national championship teams. He established numerous Big Eight and NCAA receiving and kick-returning records that still stand, then went on to a pro career with the Montreal Alouettes and the San Diego Chargers.

Nebraska's 1971 team, pepped by the 1970 national championship, posted a second consecutive undefeated season, winding up 13-0-0 for a repeat national title.

Highlight of the 1971 season, of course, was the "Game of the Century" at Norman, Oklahoma, where the Cornhuskers outlasted the Sooners, 35-31, in a

contest most experts already have labeled the best game in college history. After a trip to Hawaii for their 12th victory, the Huskers faced a second "national championship" game against Alabama in the Orange Bowl. Nebraska erased any doubts about being No. 1 blasting Paul (Bear) Bryant's Crimson Tide, 38-6, and boosting the Husker streak without a defeat to 32.

# Alabama, Huskers Top Winners: NEBRASKA'S 21-YEAR PERFORMANCE RATED BEST IN THE NATION

When it comes to consistent performance over the past 21 years, no school in the nation can match the excellence of the Nebraska Cornhuskers.

Thanks to the computer age, the recapitulation of college football performances from 1962 through 1982 is possible. And the results show clearly that Nebraska, under Bob Devaney and Tom Osborne, has been the national statistical pace-setter.

While Nebraska ranks second to Alabama in won-loss percentage over the past 21 years, the Cornhuskers join the Crimson Tide and Southern California as the only three teams to boast winning seasons each of those years.

More impressive, perhaps, is the fact the Nebraska unquestionably was the national "balance" leader with the best overall ranking in both offensive and defensive categories used to measure college football performance.

Over the past 21 years, Nebraska ranks No. 1 in scoring offense (30.46), No. 2 in total offense (407.66), No. 2 in rushing offense (262.00) and 27th in passing offense (145.66). Defensively, Nebraska ranks No. 1 in total defense (237.77), No. 2 in scoring defense (11.46), No. 2 in pass defense (108.82) and No. 9 in rushing defense (128.94). The Cornhuskers also rank No. 1 in scoring margin over opponents with a 19.0 average.

While the NCAA doesn't rank pass defense by yards-per-attempt, the Huskers were the best from 1962 through 1982 in that category, too, with a 5.34 mark. They were first, also, in completion percentage allowed (.429) and first in total defense, based on yards-per-play, with a mark of 3.70.

Meanwhile, the Husker offense wasn't loafing, either. The Nebraska passing attack rates high in efficiency, ranking No. 6 in yards per attempt (7.33) and No. 5 in completion percentage (.526).

While all this was being produced by the Cornhuskers during the past 21 years, more than 8.5 million fans watched the action at Memorial Stadium, ranking Nebraska No. 3 in average attendance behind Michigan and Ohio State. The Huskers drew 8,547,586 in 127 games for an average of 67,304. Michigan led with 11,398,270 for 86,351, while Ohio State drew 10,762,508 for an average of 85,417.

Nebraska has another No. 1 claim, although it must share the honor of most bowl game victories with Alabama. Both teams have won 11 during the past 21 years, with the Tide posting a 11-9-1 mark and Nebraska a 11-7-0 record. Alabama went a-bowling all 21 years, while Nebraska and Texas tied for second with 18 post-season appearances.

Among the other interesting highlights of the 21-year statistical study:

—Nebraska ranked last in team net punting (30.50). It can be noted, however, that Pen State was next to last (31.79) and Ohio State was third from last (32.03), while Michigan, Oklahoma, USC, BYU, Pitt, Washington, Arizona State, Alabama, LSU and Arkansas were all in the Bottom 20 of this category. All of which indicates that winning teams have less field to punt into and have to kick the ball higher and shorter.

—Nebraska ranked No. 5 in punt return offense (10.09), trailing Auburn (10.63), Oklahoma (10.51), Utah State (10.23) and Penn State (10.17).

—Nebraska ranked No. 4 in punt return defense (7.18), trailing Miami of Ohio (6.02), Missouri (7.13), North Carolina (7.13).

—Nebraska ranked 30th in kickoff return average (19.78).

- Nebraska ranked 23rd in fewest turnovers lost (2.67 per game).
- Nebraska ranked 26th in most turnovers gained (3.04 per game).
- Nebraska ranked 16th in turnover margin (0.37).

And, finally, Nebraska and Notre Dame tied for third in posting the most shutouts (40), trailing Michigan with 42 and Alabama with 41. On the other side of the coin, the Huskers were shut out only four times in 21 years and five teams bettered that mark with three each.

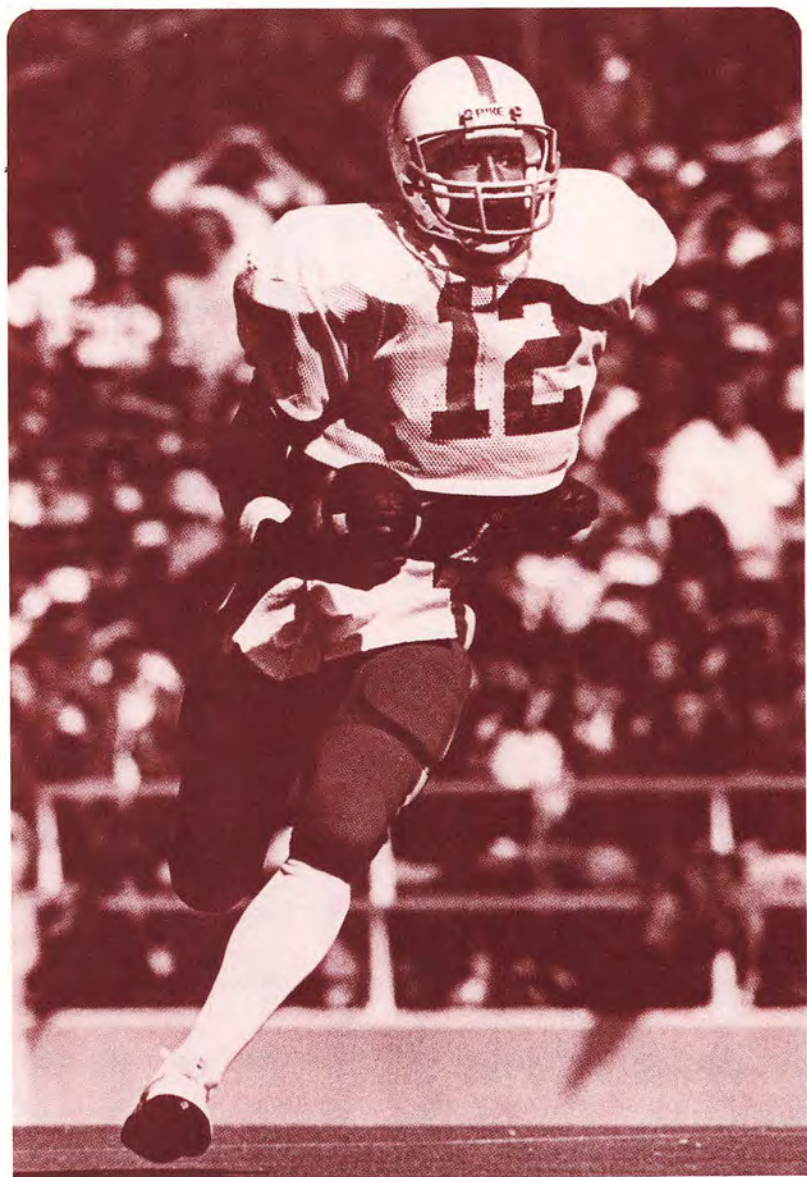

**Senior . . . 22 . . . 5-11 . . . 210 . . . Camden, N.J. . . . 2L**

Nebraska's leading Heisman Trophy candidate since Johnny Rodgers won it in 1972, Rozier heads into his senior season virtually certain to become the Huskers' all-time leading rusher and the school's first two-time All-America running back . . . As a junior in 1982, Rozier rushed 242 times for a school-record 1,689 yards and 15 touchdowns and ended up as the nation's No. 4 rusher with a per-game average of 140.8 yards . . . Rozier's yardage broke the 32-year-old Nebraska record of 1,342 yards set by Bobby Reynolds in a nine-game season in 1950, and he broke the record with a 251-yard (itself four yards short of the school's single-game record), four touchdown effort in the season's ninth game (vs. Oklahoma State) . . . During the year, he shot from 22nd to second on Nebraska's career rushing chart and, with 2,632 career yards, he needs just 183 to break I.M. Hipp's record of 2,814 set from 1977-79 . . . He also ranked 14th in the nation and led the Big Eight in scoring in 1982 at 8.5 points per game and ranked eighth nationally in all-purpose running at 149.2 yards per game . . . For all that, he was named a first-team All American by United Press International, Kodak, the Football Writers Association of America and the Football News, All-Big Eight for the second time by the Associated Press, United Press International and the Omaha World-Herald, was named Big Eight Player-of-the-Year by AP and Big Eight Offensive Player-of-the-Year by UPI and was 10th in Heisman Trophy balloting . . . Strong as a bull and quick as a



cobra, Rozier was twice named the conference's offensive player-of-the-week, first against Missouri, then against Oklahoma State . . . Despite his outstanding day against OSU, the Missouri game may have been his best-ever . . . Not expected to start because of a painful hip pointer suffered the previous week vs. Kansas State, he came off the bench when substitute Roger Craig re-injured a sprained ankle and backup Jeff Smith bruised a hand to rush for 139 yards on 17 carries and lead the Huskers to a 23-19 come-from-behind win over the Tigers on regional television . . . Capped his junior year with a superlative performance in the 21-20 Orange Bowl win over Louisiana State as he led all rushers with 118 yards on 26 attempts and caught three passes for 28 yards, including an 11-yard TD from Turner Gill that started the Huskers on their road back from a 17-7 second-half deficit . . . Topped 100 yards nine times in 12 games and 200 yards three times in 1982 . . . Ranks as the Big Eight's No. 7 career rusher and his 1982 season was the third-best-ever behind the 1,877 yards gained by Oklahoma State's Ernest Anderson, also in 1982, and the 1,762 gained by Heisman Trophy-winner Billy Sims of Oklahoma in 1978 . . . As a sophomore transfer from Coffeeyville (Kan.) Junior College in 1981, Rozier exploded on the Nebraska and Big Eight scene, and teamed with Roger Craig in the most-deadly I-back combination in college football that season . . . Rozier backed Craig up during Nebraska's first four games in 1981, then got his first start vs. Colorado, Oct. 10, and responded with a 95-yard, two-touchdown day on only 11 carries . . . He and Craig alternated starts and series the rest of the way, with Rozier finishing the year with 943 yards (fifth in the Big Eight) and five TDs on 151 attempts for a 6.2-yard average . . . The solidly-built scatback (he bench presses 325 pounds) averaged 104.4 yards per game in Nebraska's last seven contests and was named All-Big Eight by both wire services and by the Omaha World-Herald . . . He was also tabbed the Big Eight's offensive newcomer-of-the-year by AP and was runnerup to Kansas State freshman defensive tackle Reggie Singletary in UPI balloting for Big Eight newcomer-of-the-year . . . Also an AP honorable-mention All-American . . . He and Craig combined to rush for 2,003 yards and 11 TDs in 1981, despite the fact they were never in a game at the same time, and both were over 100 yards in the 37-14 win over Oklahoma—Rozier with 105, Craig with 102 . . . The Oklahoma game was Rozier's fourth 100-yard-plus day . . . The others were a 19-carry, 102-yard performance vs. Oklahoma State, a nine-carry, 153-yard, one-TD day vs. Kansas State, and a career-best 22-carry, 179-yard, one-TD day vs. Kansas . . . Against K-State, he had a 93-yard TD run, the third-longest in Nebraska history (trailing only 94-yard gallops by Craig Johnson vs. Kansas in 1979 and by Roger Craig vs. Florida State earlier in 1981), and he turned in a 93-yard kickoff return vs. Oklahoma State, Nebraska's first kickoff-return TD since Heisman Trophy winner Johnny Rodgers returned one 98 yards vs. Texas A&M in 1972 . . . Rozier's 32.4-yard average on five kickoff returns would have led the nation, but he didn't have the requisite 1.2 returns per game . . . Had a fine performance vs. national champion Clemson in the Orange Bowl, rushing 15 times for 75 yards, returning three kickoffs 78 yards, and catching the Tigers completely by surprise on a 25-yard TD pass to wingback Anthony Steels which gave Nebraska its only lead in the game, 7-3, midway in the first quarter . . . One of Huskers' fastest running backs with a 4.54-second electronic timing at 40 yards, he competed as a sprinter for the NU indoor track team in 1982. . . One of the most-highly-recruited players in the nation in 1979-80, he was originally scheduled to enroll at Nebraska in the fall of 1980, but went to Coffeeyville instead, where he starred for Coach Dick Foster . . . Recreation major . . . Younger brother, Guy, is a defensive back for the Huskers . . . Born March 1, 1961 (March 1, ironically, is Statehood Day in Nebraska) . . . Son of Garrison and Beatrice Rozier.

The most-exciting, if not simply the best all-around quarterback ever to play at Nebraska, Gill is a solid All-America candidate in 1983 after deciding to turn down a professional baseball contract (after announcing the decision, he was drafted in the 17th round by the New York Yankees, but did not sign) . . . That May decision allows him to return to NU for the 1983 football season and the 1984 baseball season—after which he'll make the decision to pursue one sport or the other as a professional . . . As a junior, Gill was coming off serious nerve damage suffered in his lower right leg in the Iowa State football game late in the 1981 season, but responded with a football season that saw him earn consensus All-Big Eight honors by completing 90 of 166 passes (54.2 percent) for 1,182 yards and 11 touchdowns with just three interceptions (1.8 percent), and rush for 497 yards and four TDs on 101 attempts; and a baseball season that saw him earn honorable-mention All-Big Eight honors as a shortstop after hitting .284 and rank second on the Husker team in hits (48) and triples (five) after three years away from the sport . . . Named the outstanding back in the Orange Bowl when he completed 13 of 22 passes for 184 yards and a TD (but with two rare interceptions), and rushed for 37 yards and a TD to lead the Huskers to a 21-20 come-from-behind win over Louisiana State . . . Named the Big Eight's Offensive Player-of-the-Week twice in 1982 in back-to-back performances vs. Penn State and Auburn . . . In the Huskers'

only loss in 1982 (and their only loss in the 18 games Gill has started), a 27-24 defeat at Penn State, Sept. 25, Gill was magnificent, as he completed 16 of 34 passes with one interception for 239 yards and two touchdowns, rushed for 52 yards and the Huskers' third TD, and guided three 80-yard touchdown drives despite not being able to call audibles due to the noise created by the 85,304 fans at Penn State's Beaver Stadium . . . The following week at Auburn, he completed 10 of 19 passes with an interception for 162 yards and a touchdown, and rushed 11 times for 50 yards to lead the Huskers' 41-7 rout of a strong Tiger team . . . Two weeks later against Kansas State, he broke Dave Humm's eight-year-old Nebraska and Big Eight single-game completion percentage record of .852 (on 23-of-27 vs. Kansas) by completing 11 of 12 (for 101 yards and a TD) for a .917 percentage . . . A very accurate passer, he's not thrown an interception in a regular season game in his last 72 attempts, or since the second quarter of the 1982 Colorado game (that's 16 short of Jerry Tagge's 1969 school record) . . . Did not start the season finale at Hawaii when he developed cramps in his back during the pre-game warmups, but came in in the second half to spark a 37-point explosion that brought the Huskers from a 10-0 halftime deficit to a 37-16 win over the fired-up Rainbows . . . Nebraska's top threat ever as a running quarterback, his 497 yards last year is the third-best mark ever for a QB and the best in 27 years, and his 786 career yards tie him for the NU position record with Jeff Quinn (1977-80) . . . As a passer, he ranks eighth all-time in yardage with 1,801 yards and his 20 touchdown passes rank fourth . . . Got his first chance to start five games into the 1981 season and has been outstanding ever since . . . Nebraska was 2-2 when he took over, but he guided Huskers to six straight wins before injuring his leg vs. Iowa State and missed finale vs. Oklahoma and Orange Bowl loss to Clemson . . . As starter in 1981, completed 45 of 84 passes (53.6 percent) with three interceptions for 594 yards, nine TDs . . . In first start, rushed six times for 46 yards, completed nine of 14 passes for 178 yards and school-record-tying four TDs in 59-0 win over Colorado to earn Big Eight offensive player-of-week honors . . . Nearly won that award twice more as he completed 10 of 14 passes for 141 yards, two TDs, rushed 14 times for 72 yards vs. Kansas State, and completed eight of 10 passes for 89 yards, one TD, rushed 13 times for 42 yards, two TDs vs. Oklahoma State . . . Abilities were first evident when he set a Nebraska freshman team record with 981 total offense yards in 1980—302 rushing on 51 attempts (three TDs), 679 passing on 34 of 52 for 65.4 percent (eight TDs) . . . One of the most-highly-recruited prep prospects in 1979-80, he was an all-state, all-county and all-district quarterback for Coach Merlin Priddy at Fort Worth Arlington Heights High School, and was good enough on the baseball diamond to be selected in the second round of the 1980 free-agent draft by the Chicago White Sox . . . Public relations major . . . Born Aug. 13, 1962 . . . Son of Mr. and Mrs. Turner Gill, Sr.

One of the Huskers' most talented players, Fryar battled a series of injuries in 1982, but still emerged as Nebraska's leading receiver with 24 catches for 346 yards and two touchdowns, and the nation's No. 3 punt returner and repeat Big Eight champ with a 15.4-yard average on 18 returns . . . Ranked fifth in the Big Eight in all-purpose yards (rushing, receiving, punt and kickoff returns) at 99.3 yards-per-game . . . Fleet receiver started the year with 15 catches for 258 yards and two touchdowns in the first three games, then sprained an ankle vs. Auburn in Game 4, bruised a thigh vs. Missouri in Game 6, and injured a shoulder vs. Kansas in Game 7 . . . Over seven-game stretch, he caught just four passes for 24 yards and no touchdowns, but came back in the last two games to catch five passes for 64 yards, rush nine times for 89 yards and a touchdown, return two kickoffs 37 yards and two punts 72 yards (including 70-yard touchdown vs. Hawaii, the third punt-return TD of his career) . . . Set up the Huskers' go-ahead touchdown in the crucial 28-24 win over Oklahoma by throwing a 37-yard pass to Mitch Krenk after taking a deliberately-bounced lateral from Turner Gill . . . 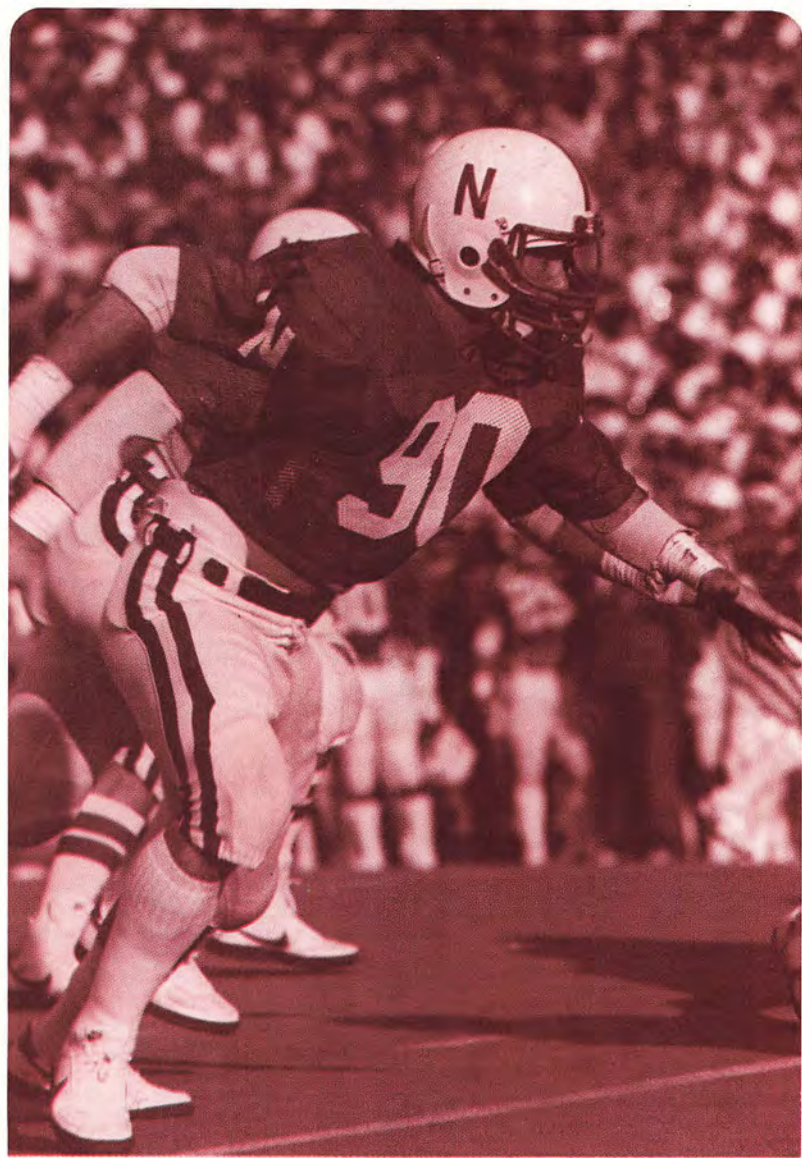

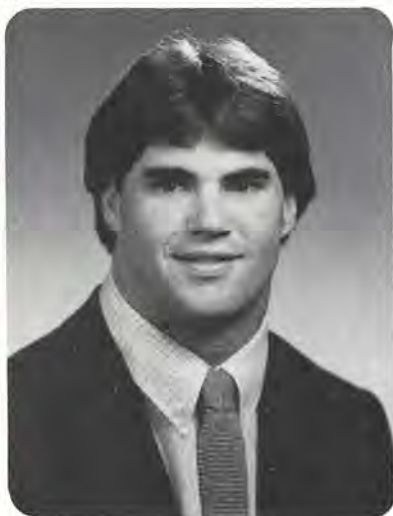

# Dedication

PAUL SCHNEIDER

The 1983 University of Nebraska Football Guide is dedicated to one of the all-time Cornhuskers—Paul Schneider.

Beloved by athletes and coaches for more than 30 years, “Schnitz” retired during the past school year after serving as head trainer and later as assistant to the director of the Bob Devaney Sports Center.

Two generations of the Cornhuskers suffered the gruff barbs and the warm counsel that were Paul’s trademarks. Always the champion of the athlete, he would let a coach know in no uncertain terms if he felt the coach was not treating the player fairly.

And woe to the official who didn’t do his job correctly—Schnitz would sound off with vigor, either from the football sideline or the basketball bench. Veteran Big Eight officials still chuckle at some of Paul’s caustic reminders of their shortcomings.

First and foremost, however, was Schneider’s dedication to the physical well-being of the Husker athletes under his care. Teaming with his friend and co-worker, George Sullivan, Paul saw to it that Nebraska teams were ready to play—physically and mentally.

Following his retirement as trainer in 1976, Paul joined forces with Jim Ross to launch and develop the operations at the Devaney Sports Center, which has become the state’s finest sports and entertainment facility.

These days, when former Husker athletes return to campus one of the first people they inquire about is “Schnitz” because he played such a big part in their lives. Coaches like Bill Glassford, Pete Elliott, Bill Jennings, Bob Devaney and Tom Osborne will also tell you that “Schnitz” made invaluable contributions to the Cornhusker program.

It is with these things in mind, and a sense of appreciation for years of service and friendship, that the 1983 Football Guide is dedicated to a great Nebraskan—Paul Schneider.

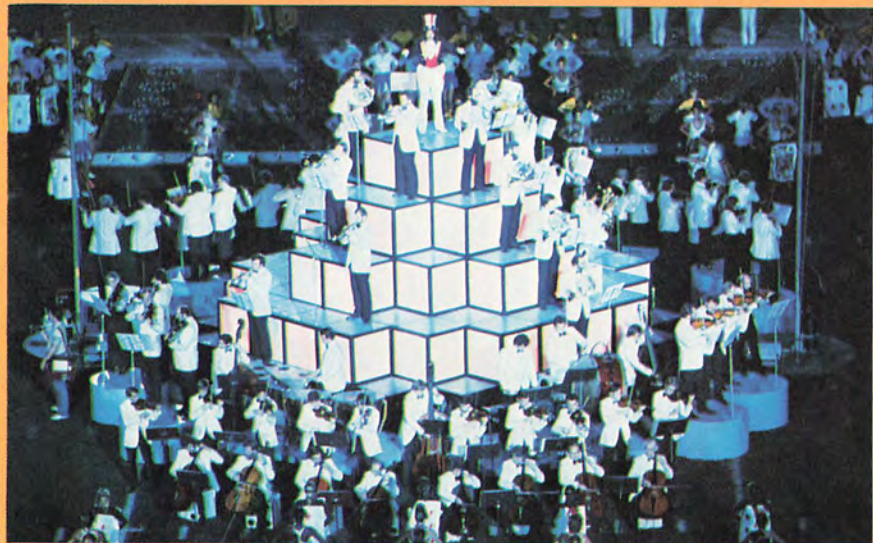

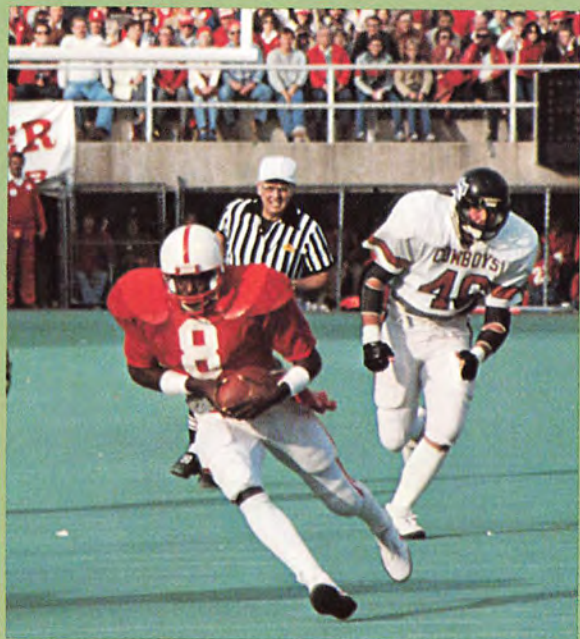

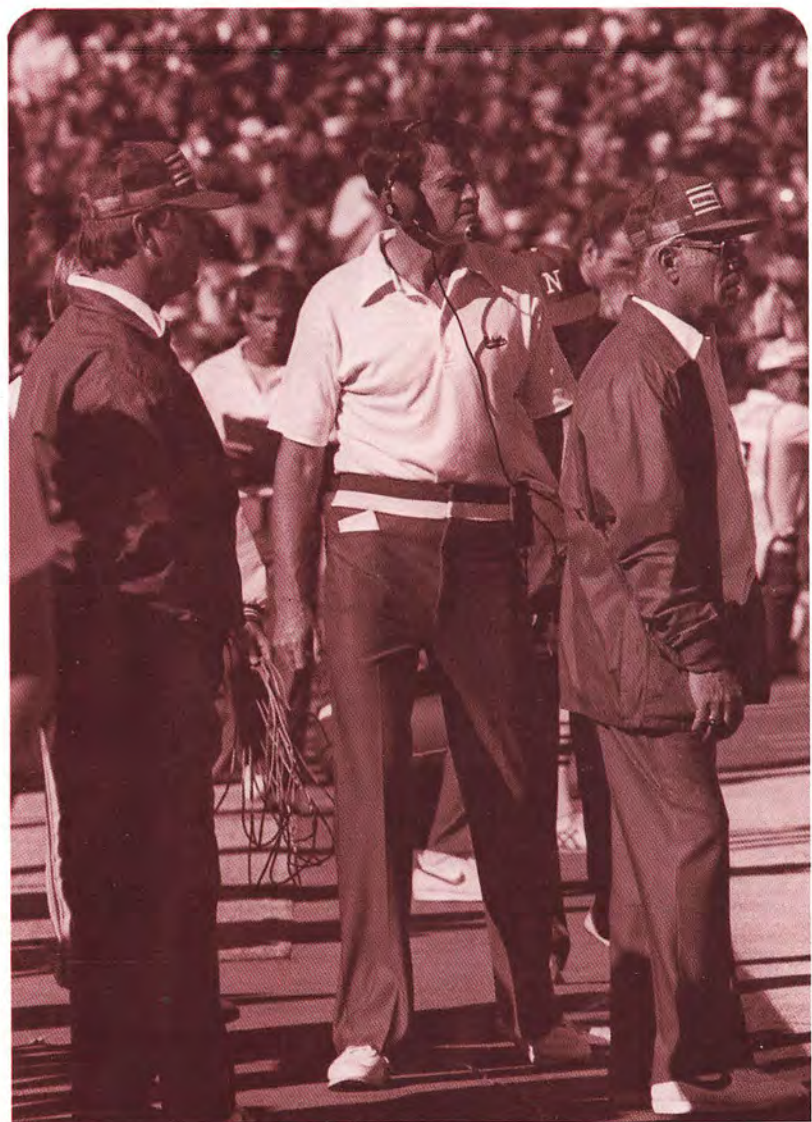

## TOM OSBORNE

Head Football Coach

Tom Osborne enters his second decade as the University of Nebraska's head football coach coming off his most-successful season yet at the Husker helm.

After nine seasons that saw him rank among the top six active coaches in the country in winning percentage, and that saw him guide the Huskers to nine top-10 finishes and a like number of bowl appearances, Osborne's 1982 team posted his best-ever record (12-1-0), won its second-straight Big Eight title (NU has now won 14-straight conference games), beat Louisiana State, 21-20, in the Orange Bowl, finished third in the final polls of both wire services (and second in the New York Times computer rankings), and came within four seconds of possibly winning the coveted, elusive national title when a Penn State touchdown pass dropped the Huskers, 27-24, at University Park, Sept. 25.

Nebraska's 1982 campaign pushed the 46-year-old Osborne's record to 96 wins, 24 losses and two ties for a .795 winning percentage, which ranks him as the third-winningest active college coach, behind, ironically, Oklahoma's Barry Switzer (98-17-3 for .843) and Penn State's Joe Paterno (162-34-1 for .825). It's ironic because Osborne's 1983 Huskers open the season against Paterno's Nittany Lions and close against Switzer's Sooners.

In 1982, Osborne's Huskers put on an offensive show that will be long remembered. Led by an outstanding offensive line, an excellent array of backs finessed and powered their way to 394.3 rushing yards, 518.6 total offense yards and 41.1 points per game—all NCAA-leading marks and Nebraska school records. At the same time, NU's bend-but-not-break defense came up with consistently good efforts and a series of big plays to make the difference in several crucial contests. Called into question at times in certain quarters, the "Black Shirts" nevertheless led the Big Eight in rushing and scoring defense, and ranked fifth by giving up 12.2 points per game.

Under Osborne, Nebraska has extended its string of consecutive top-10 rankings to 13, and consecutive bowl appearances to 14. Before the win over LSU last January, his teams had beaten Texas, 19-3, in the 1974 Cotton Bowl (making him the first coach to take a team to a major bowl in his first year at the helm); beaten Florida, 13-10, in the 1971 Sugar Bowl; lost to Arizona State, 17-14, in the 1975 Fiesta Bowl; beaten Texas Tech, 27-24, in the 1976 Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl; beaten

North Carolina, 21-17, in the 1977 Liberty Bowl; lost to Oklahoma, 31-24, in the 1979 Orange Bowl; lost to Houston, 17-14, in the 1980 Cotton Bowl; beaten Mississippi State, 31-17, in the 1980 Sun Bowl; and lost to national champion Clemson, 22-15, in the 1982 Orange Bowl. His overall bowl record is 6-4, including 5-2 in the "major" bowls.

Only one Osborne-coached team has finished lower than second in the Big Eight—the 1976 team which tied for fourth, but only one game out of a first-ever three-way tie for first. His teams have won or shared the conference title four times in 10 years (1975, 1978, 1981 and 1982).

He has three times been named Big Eight coach-of-the-year (1975, 1978 and 1980), and three times been named District VI coach-of-the-year by the American Football Coaches Association and Kodak (1978, 1979 and 1980). In addition, in 1978, he was named Bobby Dodds National Coach-of-the-Year by the Atlanta Quarterback Club and Delta Air Lines for his efforts toward the advancement of the higher and more notable aspects of college coaching.

In 1982, he was the first recipient of the Distinguished Nebraskalander Award from the Nebraskaland Foundation and in 1983 he was named national coach-of-the-year by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Osborne, who graduated from Hastings College in 1959 before logging pro time with the Washington Redskins and San Francisco 49ers, joined Devaney as an assistant in 1962. In 1965 he received his Ph.D. in educational psychology, then elected football coaching as a career. He coached the Husker receivers and helped build the NU offense into one of the most potent in the nation during the 1970 and 1971 national championship years.

While Osborne was a newcomer to the head coaching ranks in 1973, he was no stranger to Nebraska football. Osborne was a member of Bob Devaney's incomparable staff for 11 years—the last six as a key organizer of a steamroller offense.

During his tenure on the Devaney staff, Osborne headed the passing game strategy and coached the receivers. When Devaney announced his retirement from coaching in favor of full-time athletic director duties following the 1971 season, he announced Osborne as his designated successor. Osborne served as assistant head coach and director of recruiting in Devaney's final campaign in 1972, then took the head coaching reins in 1973.

An outstanding high school athlete at Hastings High School in the mid 1950s, Osborne was named Nebraska prep Athlete of the Year. Passing up major college offers, Osborne became the star quarterback and basketball player for Hastings College where both his father and grandfather had matriculated. At Hastings, he played both football and basketball for Coach Tom McLaughlin, who was elected to the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 1982. In 1959 he was named State College Athlete of the Year—the first athlete in Nebraska history to win both the high school and college honor.

Following graduation from Hastings with a bachelor's degree, Osborne played two years with the Washington Redskins and one year with the San Francisco 49ers as a flankerback before returning to Nebraska.

In 1962 he contacted Bob Devaney and secured a position as a graduate assistant on the Husker staff. He continued in that capacity until he obtained his master's degree in 1963. Continuing his dual role in education and football coaching, Osborne gained his doctorate in 1965 and, holding the academic rank of instructor of educational psychology in Teacher's College, was a half-time coach.

Osborne, born Feb. 23, 1937, elected to pursue coaching full-time in 1967 and became the Huskers' receivers coach, a decision that NU fans have applauded since.

Married to the former Nancy Tederman, Osborne is the father of a son, Mike and daughters, Ann and Susie.

## **BOB DEVANEY**

**Athletic Director  
University of Nebraska**



One of the greatest coaches in the history of American football, Bob Devaney—who was enshrined in the National Football Hall of Fame in 1981—is now turning his vast energies toward supervision of the entire athletic program at the University of Nebraska. Devaney heads both the men's and women's athletic programs.

Nebraska has one of the finest athletic plants in the nation, thanks to Devaney's inspiration and leadership during the past 21 years. The last three years, the Huskers won the Big Eight all-sports championships.

Since Devaney became athletic director in 1967, Nebraska's Memorial Stadium has been enlarged to a capacity of 73,640 and an AstroTurf field, huge press box and scoreboard have been added.

Since 1967, the Cornhuskers have added a multi-purpose office building at the south end of Memorial Stadium, an outdoor track facility—Ed Weir Stadium—and a new baseball park—Buck Beltzer Field—with an AstroTurf infield and grandstands, as well as a new softball stadium for the women's program.

Devaney also spear-headed a drive for the new multi-purpose complex that resulted in the Nebraska Legislature voting a cigarette tax to finance a 14,438-seat basketball arena, with adjacent swimming complex and indoor track plant. The result of his efforts was the Nebraska Sports Complex, which opened its doors in the fall of 1976. Besides the basketball arena, the NU Sports Complex, located on the Nebraska State Fairgrounds, houses a 220-yard synthetic track with seating for 4,500, a 25 meter x 25 yard swimming pool, and practice areas for the wrestling and gymnastics teams. In 1978, the Complex was renamed—by a vote of the Board of Regents—the Bob Devaney Sports Center.

Few coaches ever achieved the success Devaney did as headmaster of the Nebraska Cornhuskers from 1962 to 1972. During most of that span he was the "winningest coach in the nation," based on percentage of victories. He wound up with three straight Orange Bowl wins to go with his amazing record of nine bowl trips in 11 years, eight Big Eight titles, two national championships, two Outland Award winners, a Lombardi Trophy winner, a Heisman Trophy winner and numerous coach of the year and similar honors. Twice his teams won four straight Big Eight titles—1963-1966 and 1969-1972.

In his final season, Devaney's 1972 Huskers went 9-2-1 with a 40-6 win over Notre Dame in the Orange Bowl, and Bob led the nation's active coaches with a lifetime record of 136-30-7 for an .806 winning percentage. That year, too, Johnny Rodgers won the Heisman Trophy and Rich Glover swept the Outland and Lombardi Trophies.

Devaney was named Coach of the Year by the Walter Camp Foundation, the Washington Touchdown Club and the Football Writers Association after Nebraska's Cornhuskers were undefeated in 13 games in 1971, sweeping to the national championship after winning the Game of the Century against Oklahoma, 35-31.

It was the second-straight national championship for Nebraska. The 1970 team was also undefeated (11-0-1), and during the span of 1969 to 1972, the Huskers went 32 games without a defeat. After Nebraska defeated LSU in the 1971 Orange Bowl game to win its first national title, former President Richard Nixon came to Lincoln to bestow a presidential plaque upon Devaney and co-captains Dan Schneiss and Jerry Murtaugh.

The Devaney Huskers reaped countless honors during those two years—AP and UPI trophies, the Grantland Rice Trophy, the MacArthur Bowl, Big Eight and Orange Bowl trophies and Coach of the Year by the Football News.

All Star games were old hat for Devaney who coached in many post-season classics such as the Hula Bowl, the Coaches All America, the All America Bowl, the Blue-Gray and the Shrine East-West. He also coached the College All Stars against the NFL Champion Dallas Cowboys in the 1972 Chicago game.

At Nebraska, Devaney's teams won 101, lost 20 and tied two in 11 years, following his 35-10-5 record at Wyoming. He never had a losing season at Nebraska and he directed three undefeated teams—in 1965, 1970 and 1971. In 11 years Devaney's teams went to nine post-season games, winning six and losing three. The Huskers played in the Gotham Bowl, Cotton Bowl, Sugar Bowl, Sun Bowl and four times in the Orange Bowl with Devaney at the helm.

Under Devaney's outstanding leadership, too, the Cornhuskers produced 22 All-America players and 72 All Big Eight selections in 10 years.

Devaney played football as an end at Alma College in Michigan, graduating with a B.S. in 1939.

After starting his coaching career at Big Beaver, Mich., High, Devaney moved to Keego Harbor and Saginaw before spending seven years at Alpena High where his teams had a 52-9-0 record. He then joined Biggie Munn, and later Duffy Daugherty, at Michigan State before becoming head coach at Wyoming in 1957.

Devaney is married to his college sweetheart, the former Phyllis Wiley. His son, Mike, and daughter Patricia, are both graduates of the University of Nebraska. He's a grandfather, too, with Mike's family including a daughter and a son.

Jim Ross, Assistant Athletic Director and former standout freshman and varsity assistant football coach for the Huskers, is in his eighth year as the director of the Bob Devaney Sports Center. Ross, starting his 17th year as assistant AD, served as the Cornhuskers' head frosh coach from 1969 to 1975. From 1962 to 1968, he was Nebraska's outstanding defensive backfield coach (NU led the nation in pass defense in the 1960s).

Entering his 21st year at Nebraska, Ross came to Lincoln in 1962, leaving the University of Wyoming with Bob Devaney and his staff. Ross had served under Devaney for five years at Wyoming and before that at Alpena, Mich., High School. Prior to teaming with Devaney, Ross was the head football coach at Newaygo, Mich.,

High School and Standish, Mich., High School.

## **NEBRASKA'S CHANCELLOR & VICE PRESIDENT**

### **Dr. Martin A. Massengale**

Dr. Martin A. Massengale, 49, became Chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln on June 1, 1981.

Dr. Massengale came to Nebraska in 1976 from the University of Arizona. He joined the Arizona faculty in 1958 as assistant professor of agronomy. He was named head of the Department of Agronomy in 1966 and was named Associate Dean of the College of Agriculture and Associate Director of the Agriculture Experiment Station in 1974. He also served on the staff of the University of Wisconsin and Western Kentucky University.

A native of Monticello, Ky., Dr. Massengale holds a B.S. degree from Western Kentucky University and M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Wisconsin. He and his wife, Ruth, have two children—Jennifer and Alan.

Dr. Massengale is recognized nationally and internationally as an agronomist and consultant on crops research, teaching, and administration. He has served as a consultant in the United States, Brazil, Mexico, Saudi Arabia, Indonesia, and the Soviet Union.

He is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the American Society of Agronomy. He is past president of the Crop Science Society of America. Dr. Massengale was named one of the Outstanding Educators of America, professor of the year in the College of Agriculture at the University of Arizona, and received several awards from the Future Farmers of America.

The author or co-author of more than 70 technical articles and co-author of two books, his research emphasis is in the area of water use efficiency, photosynthate production, and cutting management for forage plants.

He is a member of Sigma Xi, Phi Kappa Phi, Alpha Zeta, Gamma Sigma Delta, Phi Sigma, and Gamma Alpha honor societies; the National Merit Scholarship Corporation Board of Directors, the Nebraska Academy of Science, Arizona Academy of Science, National Association of Colleges and Teachers of Agriculture, American Society of Plant Physiology, and is a past president of the Western Society of Crop Science. He is a certified professional crop scientist and a certified professional agronomist.



## UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

### Dr. Ronald W. Roskens

Dr. Roskens has served as President of the University of Nebraska since April, 1977. Prior to that, he was Chancellor of the University of Nebraska at Omaha, a position he assumed on July 1, 1972.

He was born and raised on a farm near Spencer, Iowa, and attended a one-room elementary school. Dr. Roskens earned both B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Northern Iowa at Cedar Falls, Iowa, and a Ph.D. from the University of Iowa.

Dr. Roskens has received honorary doctorate degrees from Creighton University, Huston-Tillotson College (Austin, Texas), Hastings College and Nebraska Wesleyan University.

Before his affiliation with the University of Nebraska, he was an Assistant Dean at the University of Iowa and Executive Vice President at Kent State University.

He serves on the Boards of the American Council on Education, Foundation for the Study of Presidential and Congressional Terms, Willa Cather Pioneer Memorial and Educational Foundation and several corporations. Pres. Roskens is on the American Council on Education's ad hoc committee on the Problems of Major Intercollegiate Athletic Programs. He is Chairman of the Executive board of the North Central Association, the accrediting group for academic programs in mid-America, and a member of the Commission on Institutions of Higher Education, and serves on the Business-Higher Education Forum of the American Council on Education.

In 1980-81 he was King of Ak-Sar-Ben. Dr. Roskens, who was named "Midlander of the Year" in 1977 by the Omaha World-Herald, is listed in "Who's Who in America" and "American Men and Women of Science" as well as having been named by Change Magazine as one of the "100 Young Leaders of the Academy."

Dr. Roskens received a Citation for Meritorious Service in 1978 from B'nai B'rith, a national award from 4-H, and has been named "Outstanding Alumnus" by the University of Northern Iowa.

He and his wife, Lois, are parents of four children.



## **INSTITUTIONAL REPRESENTATIVE** **Dr. James O'Hanlon**

Dr. James O'Hanlon, Dean of Teachers College, became Nebraska's Institutional Representative to the Big Eight Conference and the National Collegiate Athletic Association, Sept. 1, 1982, replacing Dr. Keith L. Broman, who had served in that position since 1971.

Dr. O'Hanlon has been a member of the University of Nebraska faculty since 1966 when he came to NU from Ohio University as an Assistant Professor in the Department of Secondary Education. He was elevated to Associate Professor in 1967 and to Professor in 1970.

From 1975 to 1977, he chaired the Department of Physical Education and Recreation, then became Director of the new School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation (HPER). He served in that position until being named acting Dean of Teachers College, July 1, 1982. He was named Dean of Teacher College, May 1, 1983.

A native of Blair, Neb., O'Hanlon attended Grinnell College in Grinnell, Iowa, and received a bachelor's degree in history from Nebraska in 1957. He earned his master's degree in secondary education from Ohio State University in 1958, then served as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army.

From 1959 to 1962, he was a secondary school teacher in Parma, Ohio, and Fremont, Neb., then served as a part-time instructor at the University of Nebraska and Assistant Principal at University High School while pursuing an Ed.D. in secondary education and educational psychology, which he received from the University in 1964. He served as an Assistant Professor in the Department of Secondary Education at Ohio University from 1964 to 1966, and was named to the Honor Roll of Faculty at Ohio U. in 1965.

# A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln is one of the nation's most dynamic universities.

Rich in pioneering history and spirit, NU was chartered by the Nebraska Legislature in 1869. The University established the first graduate program west of the Mississippi River in the mid-1880s and was selected for membership in the prestigious Association of American Universities in 1909.

Over the years, alumni such as Willa Cather, Mari Sandoz and Roscoe Pound have enriched the University's tradition of leadership and scholarly excellence.

Today, more than 25,000 students from all parts of the world attend classes on NU's campus in Lincoln, Nebraska's All-American capital city.

The University is the intellectual center of the region. As Nebraska's comprehensive, land-grant university, NU serves a tripartite mission of teaching, research and service.

Quality instruction is emphasized in NU's eight undergraduate colleges and the professional, graduate College of Law. The Colleges of Agriculture, Architecture, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Engineering and Technology, Home Economics, Teachers College and School of Journalism offer more than 100 degree programs leading to career opportunities in the arts, the sciences, the humanities, and the professions. The NU faculty includes many prominent scholars.

In research, NU faculty and students stand at the forefront of discovery in many fields. Among well-known research activities at the University are projects involving mass spectrometry, cell biology, genetic engineering, transportation, videodisc development for the hearing impaired, linguistic and folklore analysis, educational television, tractor testing, livestock, and crop production, conservation, meat technology, animal and plant health, agricultural marketing and economics.

In service, the University of Nebraska reaches thousands of citizens each year through programs conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service and the Division of Continuing Studies. The Cooperative Extension Service provides all Nebraskans with information and assistance in agriculture and natural resources, home economics and family living, 4-H and youth development and community resource development. Continuing Studies offers alternatives to formal on-campus education with programs such as summer reading, evening classes, independent study by correspondence, telecourses and study tours.

Modern educational facilities and a diverse cultural life add to the environment for teaching and learning at NU.

The Lincoln campus is home to the nationally renowned Sheldon Memorial Art Gallery and Sculpture Garden, the University of Nebraska State Museum, the Christlieb Collection of Western Art and to the University's championship Big Eight conference men's and women's athletic teams.

An exciting university with a tradition of historic excellence, a quality presence and a dynamic future: That's the University of Nebraska!

## Points of Interest on Campus—

**Museum**—The University of Nebraska State Museum has an outstanding collection of fossil mammals and is world renowned for its Elephant Hall. There are galleries of health science, Nebraska wildlife, zoology, geology and anthropology. In addition to its exhibits on three floors of Morrill Hall at 14th and U, the museum has extensive research collections in Nebraska Hall.

**Art**—The Sheldon Memorial Art Gallery has one of the finest collections on a university campus. Its sculpture garden is also one of the finest in the nation.

**Music**—School of Music students and faculty perform regularly in Kimball Recital Hall and throughout the state. There is an active schedule of concerts by University choral and instrumental groups, musical theatre productions and a wide range of musical and dance events by visiting artists.

**Theatre**—During the school year there are periodic performances by University companies in Howell Memorial and Studio Theatres. A repertory group performs throughout the summer months.

**Nebraska Unions**—The social centers on each campus provide a variety of food service facilities and relaxation areas for students and visitors, house the placement center and offices for student organizations, book stores, bowling alleys, game rooms, TV rooms, record rooms, study rooms, and rooms for large meetings and social events.

**Carillon Tower**—Built in 1948, the gift of alumnus Ralph S. Mueller, the tower has become a symbol of the NU Lincoln campus. It houses a 2½-octave electronic English bells carillon, played on ceremonial occasions from a keyboard.

**Historical Museum**—The State Historical Society has its museum and library on the campus. It features Nebraska lore dating from early Indian relics.

**Center for Continuing Education**—Conference and hotel facilities at 33rd and Holdrege provide a site for hundreds of adult and youth meetings each year. Continuing education programs are planned by a professional staff. The Center was financed through a grant from the Kellogg Foundation and by public subscription.

**Planetarium**—Public sky shows are presented daily during the summer and on weekends during the school year. Special shows are also given to University classes and visiting school groups.



## CORNHUSKER LEGEND

Prior to 1900, Nebraska football teams were known by such names as the Old Gold Knights, Antelopes and the Bugeaters.

But in 1900, Lincoln sportswriter Charles S. (Cy) Sherman, who was to gain national renown as the sports editor of the Lincoln Star—he also helped originate the Associated Press ranking poll—tired of referring to the Nebraska teams in such an unglamorous term as Bugeaters.



Iowa had from time to time been called the Cornhuskers, and the name appealed to Cy. Iowa partisans seemed to prefer Hawkeyes, so Cy started referring to the Nebraska team as Cornhuskers and the 1900 team was first to bear that label.

Of course, the name caught on and became a Nebraska by-word.

There is no official symbol of a Cornhusker and various cartoonists have caricatured the mystical something that typifies Nebraska football—some winning fan approval and others arousing fan ire.

At the present time, the University of Nebraska Athletic Department uses two distinctly different cartoon characters as promotional symbols. One is a caricature of the famed Nebraska fan as drawn by Bill Goggins. It first appeared in the NEBRASKA FARMER, and that publication gave permission for the Athletic Department to use the red-attired fan as a symbol.

The newest cartoon character, "Herby Husker," evolved out of Nebraska's trip to the Cotton Bowl in 1974. Artist Dirk West of Lubbock, Texas, designed a Cornhusker cartoon for the Cotton Bowl press headquarters that caught the eye of Husker SID Don Bryant. Later, Bryant contacted West for permission to use the cartoon and West expressed a desire to refine his original cartoon and improve some of the character's features. As a result, West was commissioned to draw an original Cornhusker cartoon character who now serves as a mascot for all Husker men's teams.

Artist West's concept of Nebraska football is appropriate—a burly, rugged and confident fellow who is proud of both the athletic and the agricultural traditions of the University of Nebraska.

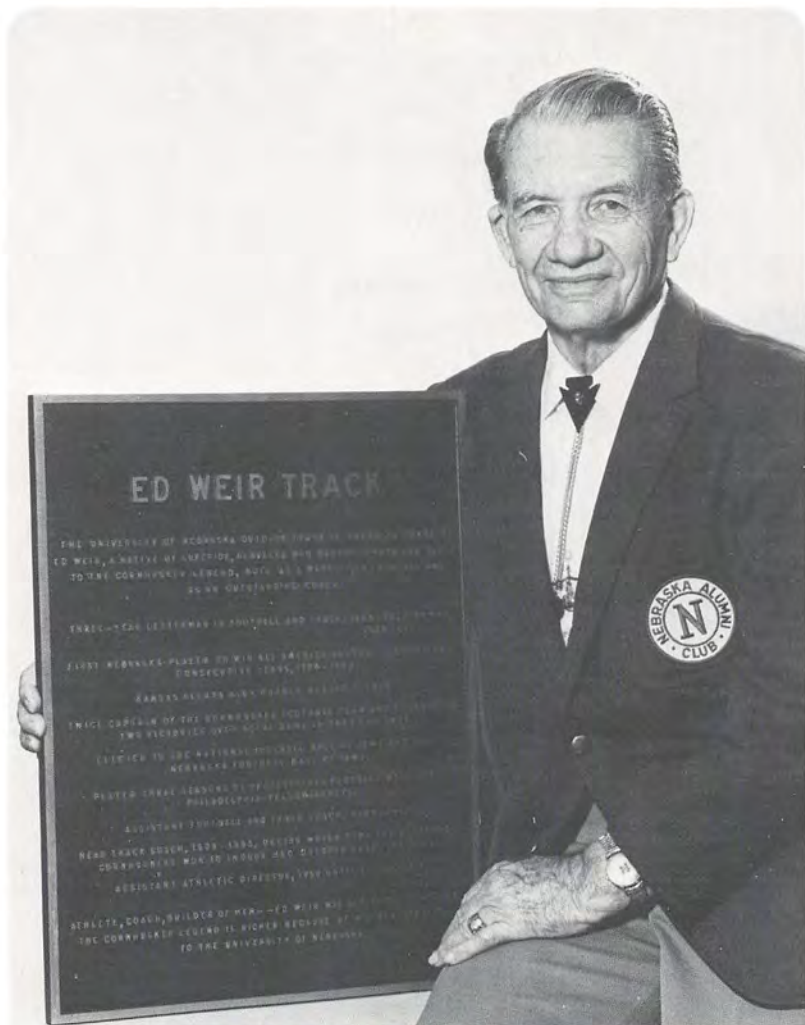

#### Huskers strike early and often in rolling to 42-7 win over Iowa

LINCOLN, Neb., Sept. 11—Nebraska exploded for two touchdowns in each of the first two quarters, then added two more in the fourth quarter as the Huskers romped to an impressive, 42-7, win over defending Big Ten champion Iowa in the season opener.

In the first quarter, fullback Doug Wilkening started things off with a three-yard touchdown run, then Turner Gill threw a 41-yard TD pass to wingback Irving Fryar, who went on to catch six passes for 127 yards on the day. ### Game No. 2

#### Four NCAA offense marks fall as Huskers crush Aggies, 68-0

LINCOLN, Neb., Sept. 18—Nebraska's high-powered offense broke four NCAA single-game records as the Huskers swept to a 68-0 white-washing of out-manned New Mexico State. Before the final gun sounded, Nebraska had gained 883 yards' total offense to break the existing NCAA mark of 875 set by Oklahoma vs. Colorado in 1980, picked up 677 rushing yards without a loss to top the old mark of 645 by Texas—El Paso vs. New Mexico State in 1948, recorded 36 first downs rushing to break the old record of 35 by Colorado vs. Northwestern in 1978, and rolled up 43 first downs to snap its own record of 42 set against Colorado the previous season.

NU's domination was so complete that six Husker backs rushed for 49 or more yards, led by Mike Rozier's 149 (including three touchdowns) and Jeff Smith's 126.

#### Lions' TD pass in final seconds cancels Huskers' rally, 27-24

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa., Sept. 25—Penn State tight end Kirk Bowman made a miraculous catch of a low Todd Blackledge pass deep in the Nebraska end zone with just four seconds left to lift the Lions to a 27-24 win over the Huskers, sending a Beaver Stadium record crowd of 85,304 into a frenzy.

Thanks to a series of Nebraska errors, the Lions controlled the early stages of the game and led, 21-7, just into the third period before the Huskers started to rally. NU had pulled within 21-17 in the fourth quarter when quarterback Turner Gill, playing before the largest regular-season crowd ever to see Nebraska play and a national CBS-TV audience, guided the Huskers 80 yards in 13 plays in a drive that consumed 6:50, capping the drive himself on a 1-yard run with 1:18 left—only to see Blackledge take the Lions 65 yards in 10 plays.

#### Huskers rebound with convincing 41-7 romp over tough Auburn

AUBURN, Ala., Oct. 2—Critics wondered whether Nebraska would be able to recover quickly enough from the previous week's heart-breaking loss at Penn State to handle a tough, unbeaten Auburn team on the Tigers' home turf—and for more than a half, there was plenty of reason to wonder.

The Huskers struggled to a 14-7 halftime lead and had an anything-but-safe 21-7 advantage after three quarters. Nebraska had benefitted from two drive-ending Tiger fumbles to establish that lead, but the Huskers made some key defensive adjustments in the second half to shut off the home club's outstanding outside speed, and then scored on three-straight possessions in the fourth quarter to make the final score a deceptively-comfortable 41-7. On the minus side, wingback Irving Fryar sprained an ankle, starting a series of injuries that kept him far from full speed for the next six games.

#### Huskers survive third-quarter scare, open Big Eight with 40-14 win over Buffs

BOULDER, Colo., Oct. 9—New Colorado Coach Bill McCartney began pointing his team toward its Big Eight opener against Nebraska almost from the moment he was hired. Critics scoffed, and appeared well-justified when the high-powered Huskers rolled to a 20-0 halftime lead over the underdog Buffs.

However, fired-up Colorado scored two unanswered third-quarter touchdowns to cut Nebraska's lead to a scary 20-14, and, if that wasn't enough, the Huskers nearly fumbled away the ensuing kickoff inside their own nine. NU righted itself, though, drove 91 yards in 16 plays to go back up 26-14 midway in the final quarter, then took advantage of the only two interceptions of linebacker Steve Damkroger's career to put together two short drives and ice the game.

"I told our players at halftime that it wasn't over," said a relieved Nebraska Coach Tom Osborne. "This is the best Colorado team we've faced in years."

#### Gill, Rozier pace Huskers to 42-13 win over Wildcats

LINCOLN, Neb., Oct. 16—All-America I-back Mike Rozier followed his 212-yard rushing performance against Colorado with a 204-yard, two-touchdown outing. Turner Gill set a Big Eight completion percentage record by connecting on 11 of 12 passes (91.7 percent) for 101 yards and a TD, and Nebraska celebrated its return to Memorial Stadium after three weeks on the road by rolling up 496 yards' total offense in a 42-13 win over Kansas State.

Rozier joined I.M. Hipp as the only Nebraska backs to ever put together back-to-back 200-yard games, and his outing against the Wildcats included TD runs of 27 and 46 yards. Gill's passing performance bettered the old conference percentage record of 85.2 percent set by another Husker, David Humm, vs. Kansas in 1974 when he complete 23 of 27 passes.

"I've been up here many times with many ball clubs," said K-State Coach Jim Dickey. "I believe this is the best offensive team I've ever seen Nebraska have."

## 1982 IN REVIEW

### Game No. 7

#### Mathison comes off bench to lead 23-19 come-back win over Missouri

LINCOLN, Neb., Oct. 23—When Husker quarterback Turner Gill left the game with a mild concussion late in the first half and Missouri leading, 7-6, Nebraska's 122nd consecutive sellout crowd (76,406) and a regional ABC television audience sensed a strong possibility of an upset by the visiting Tigers.

That sensation was a little stronger six minutes into the fourth quarter when Mizzou's Brad Burditt kicked a 51-yard field goal to give the Tigers a 13-9 lead. But seldom-used senior quarterback Bruce Mathison had his legs under him by that time and he took the Huskers 70 yards in 11 plays for a 16-13 lead with 4:45 left. After a Brent Evans interception, Mathison capped the Husker comeback by sprinting 16 yards to score at the 2:36 mark for an insurmountable 23-13 lead. I-back Mike Rozier, not expected to play because of a painful hip pointer, came off the bench to rush for 139 yards and earned Big Eight player-of-the-week honors.

#### Offense, defense in high gear as Huskers blast Kansas, 52-0

LAWRENCE, Kan., Oct. 30—In perhaps the Huskers' most-impressive combined offensive and defensive show of the season, Nebraska recorded 32 first downs for seven for Kansas, outrushed the Jayhawks 426 yards to six and out-offended the home team, 546-69, in recording its second shutout of the season, 52-0.

Five different Huskers scored touchdowns, including I-back Mike Rozier, who had touchdown runs of 25 and 27 yards while enjoying a 123-yard day, and backup I-back Jeff Smith, a Wichita native who ran for a one-yard TD and returned a punt 65 yards for another. Turner Gill recovered sufficiently enough from the concussion he suffered the week before against Missouri to complete 10 of 14 passes for 115 yards and a 12-yard TD to tight end Jamie Williams. The win was the Huskers' 14th-straight over the Jayhawks.

### Game No. 9

#### Reynolds' 1950 rushing record falls as Huskers, Rozier topple Cowboys

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 6—With four games remaining, Husker I-back Mike Rozier was only 214 yards away from Bobby Reynolds' 32-year-old Nebraska single-season rushing record of 1,342 yards, and the junior standout seemed certain to smash the mark. The only catch was that Reynolds got those yards in a nine-game season in 1950—and Rozier was heading into his ninth game when NU took on Oklahoma State at Memorial Stadium.

Rozier had hammered his way to exactly 214 yards and two touchdowns early in the fourth quarter, tying Reynolds' mark with an unspectacular 2-yard stumble to the OSU 37. He then broke the mark with a spectacular 37-yard sprint down the right sideline that sealed the Huskers' 48-10 win over the Cowboys. The expected duel between Rozier and OSU's Ernest Anderson never materialized as the eventual NCAA rushing champ (170.6 yards per game) was held to just 68 yards.

#### Nebraska overcomes sluggish start, cruises to second-straight 48-10 win

AMES, Iowa, Nov. 13—Nebraska survived a first-quarter scare by Iowa State to score two touchdowns in each of the final three periods to go from a 7-7 early tie for its second-consecutive 48-10 win.

Playing before a packed home crowd on a frigid, blustery day, the Cyclones held the Huskers at bay through the first quarter, and pulled into the tie by putting together an 80-yard, 13-play touchdown drive to score with three seconds left in the period. However, Turner Gill's magic steadily turned the game into a rout, and it was the junior quarterback who started the surge by scoring himself on a 22-yard run and passing 49 yards to Todd Brown for another second-quarter TD. Helped by Mike Rozier's sixth-straight 100-yard-plus rushing game (103), Nebraska rolled up 460 yards' total offense to set up a Big Eight showdown two weeks later against Oklahoma.

#### Huskers come from behind, hold off Sooners, 28-24

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 26—Nebraska wrapped up its second-straight Big Eight title and Orange Bowl bid with a fiercely-contested, 28-24 win over Oklahoma before its 124th consecutive sellout and a national television (CBS) audience—but not until defensive end Scott Strasburger's interception with 26 seconds left killed a last-gasp Sooner effort.

The Huskers trailed, 10-7, early in the second period, but put together seven-play touchdown drives of 78 and 62 yards capped by 2- and 14-yard runs by fullback Doug Wilkening to take a 21-10 halftime lead. OU and freshman sensation Marcus Dupree weren't finished, though, as Dupree accounted for more than half of his game-high 149 rushing yards when he sprinted 86 yards to score on the third play of the second half, bringing the Sooners within 21-17. The teams traded long TD drives in the third quarter, then the Sooners were stymied twice inside the Husker 35 in the final period before Strasburger's interception sealed their fate.

#### Huskers' 30-point explosion denies Rainbows' upset hopes

HONOLULU, Hawaii, Dec. 4—For three quarters, the 46,876 on hand at Aloha Stadium—including some 8,000 Nebraskans—could hardly believe what they were seeing. Heavy underdog Hawaii had built a 10-0 halftime lead, was still in command, 16-7, entering the final period, and Nebraska was showing no signs of rallying to prevent the college football season's biggest upset.

However, the nation's most-potent offense took advantage of defense-created opportunities early in the fourth quarter, exploded for 30 points in a little over 10 minutes, and the Huskers kept their fleeting national-title hopes alive with a 37-16 win that was anything but a romp. Despite the struggle, though, NU rolled up 479 yards on the ground, led by senior Roger Craig's 127 and Mike Rozier's 111, the latter wrapping up an NU record season (1,689 yards).

## Regent Simmons Former Husker Track Standout

University of Nebraska Regent Robert G. Simmons, Jr., of Scottsbluff is a former Cornhusker track star who won six championships during his career.

Simmons, son of long time Chief Justice of the Nebraska Supreme Court and father of John Simmons, who lettered three years for Coach Frank Sevigne in the 1960s, was a standout Big Six quartermiler. He won the indoor 440 in 1938 (:51.8) and 1939 (:50.4) and won the outdoor title three straight years—1937 (:49.1), 1938 (:48.8) and 1939 (:47.8). Bob also won the 220-yard low hurdles (:24.0) in 1939 for a tough double.

# Huskers overcome errors in Orange Bowl victory

Miami, Fla. (Jan. 1, 1983)—Stung by their own miscues and the ferocious play of the Louisiana State Tigers, the Nebraska Cornhuskers battled from behind for an impressive, 21-20, victory in the 1983 Orange Bowl game.

Nebraska struck early, then suffered an amazing string of uncharacteristic turnovers, before returning to form with a stirring second-half performance.

Civil unrest in the Miami area cut the crowd to 54,407—there were 14,306 no-shows, the smallest crowd since the 1947 Rice-Tennessee OB game—but those who were on hand experienced unrest only regarding the outcome.

It was an exciting show—including a magnificent OB halftime extravaganza featuring the London Philharmonic Orchestra—from start to finish, with the Huskers coming on strong in the late stages of the contest.

Nebraska, which wound up No. 3 in the nation following the Orange Bowl, came into the game with a slight chance to become No. 1. Only No. 1-ranked Penn State managed to slip by the Huskers and the Nittany Lions met Georgia in the Sugar Bowl. Unbeaten SMU was in the Cotton Bowl, but no miracles came to pass. Penn State won, SMU won and Nebraska won—and that's the way the polls wound up.

Tough as LSU was, the Cornhuskers came into the game as one of the nation's finest teams, and the Huskers proved it. After leading 7-0 in the first quarter, Nebraska spent the rest of the first half trying to live down errors. Four turnovers led to a 14-7 LSU lead at the half and the Tigers made it 17-7 midway through the third quarter.

Then Nebraska regrouped with a vengeance. Turner Gill hit Mike Rozier with a 11-yard TD pass to pull the Huskers up 17-14. The Huskers got a break in short order when LSU's Clay Parker experienced heavy pressure on a punt and decided to run. He missed the first down and the Cornhuskers got the ball at the Tiger 48. It took only eight plays to go the distance and Turner Gill got the final yard on a sneak for a 21-17 lead with 11:14 left in the game.

LSU came back to boot a 49-yard field goal with 5:05 left, but the Black Shirts kept the Tigers in check the rest of the way to hang up victory No. 12.

Perhaps the key play of the game came on Nebraska's 80-yard drive following LSU's field goal which made it 17-7. On fourth and one at the Tiger 35, Coach Osborne called for a Turner Gill pass and the All-Big Eight quarterback hit split end Todd Brown with an 18-yard strike. The quick result was a touchdown which put the Huskers back in the game and turned the tide.

Nebraska clearly dominated the game despite the closeness of the score. The Huskers out-yarded LSU, 403-211, with 219 on the ground and 184 through the air.

Gill was named Most Valuable Back in the game with 13 pass completions in 22 attempts for 184 yards and one TD. He also ran for 37 yards and one TD. Center Dave Rimington was voted Most Valuable Lineman, completing his two-year sweep of regional and national honors.

Mike Rozier was the top rusher in the game with 118 yards on 26 carries, while wingback Irving Fryar was the Huskers' top receiver with five catches for 81 yards.

Nebraska's defense also sparkled, particularly in the second half, and set a school bowl record by holding LSU runners to a mere 38 yards rushing. That broke the old bowl mark of 45 yards set in 1965 against Arkansas in the Cotton Bowl. The Black Shirts also kept heavy pressure on Tiger QB Alan Risher. While Risher



passed for 173 yards, he did it under the gun and managed to hit only 14 of 30 passes and had two intercepted. He was the victim of four sacks.

**Orange Bowl Notes . . .** Nebraska is now 5-4-0 in Orange Bowl play, with wins over Auburn, Notre Dame, Alabama and LSU twice. Losses have been to Alabama, Duke, Clemson and Oklahoma . . . Coach Tom Osborne is 6-4 in bowl play and he's 1-2 in the Orange Bowl . . . Nebraska has been to 14 consecutive post-season games and has a 10-4 record since 1969.

# NEBRASKA BOWL HISTORY AND RECORDS

## 1941 ROSE BOWL

### STANFORD 21, NEBRASKA 13

Nebraska was only the third Big Six team to play in a post-season bowl game, but the Cornhuskers made their first bowl trip a memorable one with an invitation to the granddaddy of them all—The Rose Bowl. Under the warm California sun in Pasadena, Coach Biff Jones' Cornhuskers led Clark Shaughnessy's Stanford Indians twice in the first half, but fell victim to the innovative T-formation 21-13. The Huskers took a 7-0 lead just six plays after the kickoff when fullback Vike Francis plunged over from the three. Stanford tied the count just four plays later when Pete Gallarneau bolted over from nine yards out. In the second quarter, the Huskers took the lead again on a 33-yard Herm Rohrig-to-Allen Zikmund pass, but the Indians came back on Frankie Albert's 41-yard TD pass to Gallarneau for a 14-13 halftime lead. A 39-yard TD punt return by Pete Kmetovic iced the game for the Indians in the third quarter.

## 1955 ORANGE BOWL DUKE 34, NEBRASKA 7

If Nebraska's first bowl bid was a memorable one, it's second was one to forget. The 1954 Cornhuskers finished second behind Oklahoma in the Big Seven race and went to Miami under the no-repeat rule. Making their first bowl appearance in 15 years, Bill Glassford's Cornhuskers trailed Duke's Blue Devils at the half 14-0 and pulled within 14-7 early in the third quarter after a minus-two-yard Duke punt. Halfback Don Comstock scored from the three to cap a 35-yard drive. After that, it was all Duke. Coach Bill Murray's Blue Devils rolled 65 yards to score on their next possession and added two more tallies in the fourth quarter to ice the game, 34-7.

## 1962 GOTHAM BOWL NEBRASKA 36, MIAMI, FLA. 34

Playing under coach Bob Devaney, Nebraska won its first bowl game in three tries, upsetting Miami and George Mira, 36-34, in New York's now-defunct Gotham Bowl. Playing in Yankee Stadium before only 6,166 fans in sub-freezing weather, the Huskers and Hurricanes put on one of the greatest bowl shows ever, trading scores in every quarter. Willie Ross' one-yard plunge and Bill "Thunder" Thornton's subsequent two-point run gave the Huskers' the lead for good, 36-27, with 12:10 left. Mira, who passed for 321 yards led a valiant comeback attempt, but was thwarted by a last-minute interception by Husker guard Bob Brown.

## 1964 ORANGE BOWL NEBRASKA 13, AUBURN 7

Nebraska made it's second Orange Bowl trip a happier one than the first with a 13-7 win over Auburn in the 1964 Miami Classic. The Huskers evened their bowl record with the win and handed Bob Devaney his second bowl win in as many tries. Husker quarterback Dennis Claridge broke the game open before most of the 72,647 fans had settled in their seats. On the Huskers' second play from scrimmage, Claridge bolted 68 yards down the sideline to put NU ahead 7-0. At the time, it was the longest TD run in OB history. Moments later Dave Theisen set another OB record with a 31-yard field goal. The record lasted until the second quarter when Theisen booted a 36-yarder to give NU a 13-0 halftime lead. Auburn quarterback Jimmy Sidle almost brought the Tigers back, but Husker linebacker John Kirby batted a fourth-and-four pass away at the goal line with less than three minutes to go.

## 1965 COTTON BOWL ARKANSAS 10, NEBRASKA 7

Coach Frank Broyles' Arkansas Razorbacks mounted an 80-yard fourth quarter drive against a previously impregnable Nebraska defense to down the Huskers, 10-7, in NU's first Dallas appearance. The Huskers had led most of the way in one of the greatest defensive battles in bowl history. Arkansas scored first on a 31-yard Tom McNelly field goal in the first quarter. But soph Harry Wilson capped a 69-yard Husker march in the second quarter on a one-yard plunge to give Nebraska a 7-3 halftime lead. The Huskers held that lead until Bobby Burnett finished the Arkansas drive with a three-yard TD run with 4:50 left in the game. In the fierce defensive struggle, first downs were even at 11, and the Razorbacks held a slim, 176-168 total offense edge.

With the National Championship riding on the line, coach Bob Devaney's Huskers took on Alabama's Crimson Tide for the first time. Nebraska went into the game 10-0 and ranked third, Alabama was 8-1-1 and fourth. But earlier in the day, top-ranked Michigan State lost to UCLA in the Rose Bowl and LSU knocked off No. 2 Arkansas in the Cotton Bowl to set up a national game in the Orange Bowl. Playing in the first night bowl game ever, 'Bama won the title, 39-28. The Tide led 24-7 at the half and the game was never in serious doubt, but led by the passing of Bob Churchich, the Huskers came back to make a solid fight and set passing and receiving records.

## 1967 SUGAR BOWL

### ALABAMA 34, NEBRASKA 7

Never ones to duck a challenge, coach Bob Devaney and his Cornhuskers accepted a bid for a rematch with Alabama and Bear Bryant in the Sugar Bowl. It turned out to be a little too much of a challenge as No. 3 'Bama handed the No. 7 Huskers a 34-7 thumping. The Tide rolled up a 17-0 first quarter advantage and led at halftime, 24-0, behind the passing of Kenny Stabler. Sophomore fullback Dick Davis prevented a complete whitewashing with a 15-yard TD catch of a Bob Churchich pass on the first play of the fourth quarter. 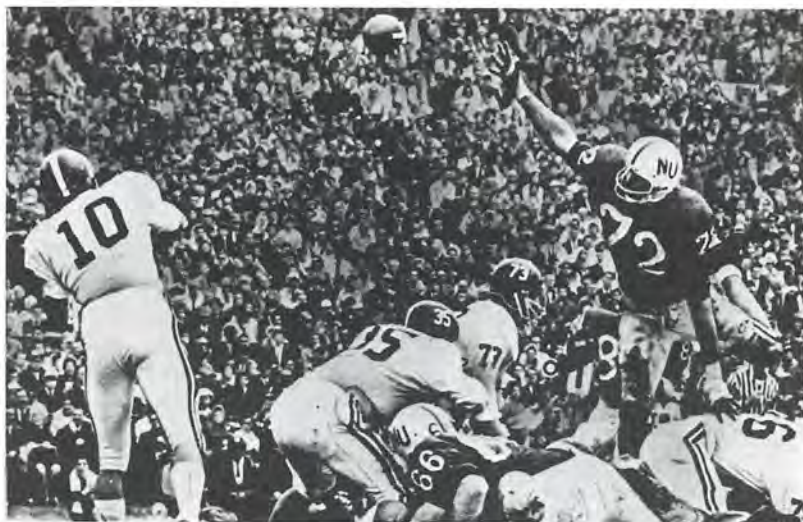

## 1971 ORANGE BOWL NEBRASKA 17, LOUISIANA STATE 12

Playing under the lights in Miami's Orange Bowl for the first time in five years, Coach Bob Devaney's Nebraska Cornhuskers won the first of two straight national titles by virtue of a 17-12 win over LSU and some fortunate circumstances. Earlier in the day, top-ranked Texas was upset by Notre Dame, 24-11, in the Cotton Bowl, and No. 2 Ohio State was shocked by Stanford, 27-17 in the Rose. That left the doors to the title wide open for No. 3 Nebraska. The Huskers responded by building a 10-0 first-quarter lead on a 25-yard field goal by Paul Rogers and a three-yard TD run by Joe Orduna. But a pair of Mark Lumpkin FG's and a 31-yard Buddy Lee to Al Coffee TD pass on the last play of the third quarter gave the aroused Tigers a 12-10 lead. Nebraska showed its grit by driving 67 yards, Jerry Tagge stretching the ball over from the one with 6:10 left and the whole world knew Nebraska was No. 1.

The Huskers added two more scores in the second stanza, and by halftime there was no doubt about who was No. 1—Nebraska led, 28-0. The Huskers continued to dominate and rolled to a 38-6 win, giving the Huskers a second straight national title and coach Bob Devaney a satisfying first win in three tries over 'Bama coach Bear Bryant.

Heisman Trophy winner Johnny Rodgers went wild, scoring four touchdowns and passing for another, as the Cornhuskers became the first team to ever win three straight Orange Bowls, romping over Notre Dame, 40-6. In his last game as a Cornhusker, Rodgers was moved to I-back from his usual wingback position, and on the game's first play he took a pitchout for a 13-yard gain. It was a sign of things to come. "Johnny R" capped his career by scoring on runs of eight, four and five yards, caught the Irish defense by surprise with a 52-yard TD pass to Frosty Anderson in the second quarter, and scored the last of his record 50 career TDs by taking a sideline pass from Dave Humm in the third quarter and scampering 50 yards to paydirt.

## 1974 COTTON BOWL NEBRASKA 19, TEXAS 3

Nebraska's Cornhuskers broke open a tight scoring contest in the third quarter with a pair of game-breaker plays to chalk up a 19-3 win over the mighty Texas Longhorns in the 1974 Cotton Bowl game at Dallas. The chilled New Year's Day crowd of 67,500 saw the Big Eight runnerup and the Southwest Conference champions battle to a 3-3 tie at halftime, thanks to a brilliant Longhorn one-yard-line stand just before the gun. But the Huskers weren't to be denied and midway through the third quarter, safety Bob Thornton returned a Texas field goal try 41 yards to set up the clinching touchdown. Ritch Babe got the final 12 yards on a reverse and Rich Sanger kicked the point to make it 10-3. Four plays later, John Bell recovered a Texas fumble at the Longhorn 19 and three plays later Tony Davis ripped in from the three to make it 16-3. Sanger kicked a 43-yard field goal with 8:09 left to complete the scoring. Texas had scored first on a 22-yard field goal by Bill Schott in the wake of a Husker fumble, but early in the second quarter defensive end Steve Manstedt picked up a Roosevelt Leaks' fumble in mid-air and raced 65 yards to the eight. But a stiff Longhorn defense forced a 24-yard field goal by Sanger.

## 1974 SUGAR BOWL NEBRASKA 13, FLORIDA 10

Rallying from a 10-0 halftime deficit, Nebraska scored three times in the second half to defeat the tough Florida Gators 13-10. It was the Cornhuskers' sixth straight bowl victory, tying Nebraska with Georgia Tech for consecutive bowl wins.

From the very start, it was a tough, uphill climb for the Huskers. Florida scored once in the first quarter and kicked a field goal in the second, while holding Nebraska's usually strong offense to 138 total yards.

But in the second half, fullback Tony Davis, quarterback Terry Luck, kicker Mike Coyle and the Black Shirt defense took over for the Huskers and led Nebraska to victory. Although it wasn't until the fourth quarter when the Huskers really got rolling.

Freshman sensation, I-Back Monte Anthony, scored the Huskers first touchdown, with 13:24 left in the game, when he ran straight up the middle for two yards and the score. Coyle's kick was good, and the Huskers trailed 10-7.

Setting up the next two Husker scores was the fanatical running of Davis. Overall he ran for 126 yards on 17 carries, including the longest run of the game for 40 yards. For his performance, Davis was named the game's Most Valuable Player, an award which he had also received in the Cotton Bowl the previous year.

Nebraska's final scores came on field goals by Coyle. Coyle tied the score on a successful 37-yard boot with only 7:13 left in the game and with only 1:46 remaining. Coyle's 39-yard kick was good, and the Huskers had won their sixth post-season game.

## 1975 FIESTA BOWL ARIZONA STATE 17, NEBRASKA 14

Nebraska's six bowl game winning streak was snapped by Arizona State in the 1975 Fiesta Bowl, when the Sun Devils edged the Huskers 17-14, before 51,396 fans in Tempe, Ariz.

The final blow came with 4:50 remaining in the game, when ASU kicker Dan Kush successfully booted a 29-yard field goal, giving the Sun Devils a 17-14 lead.

Fighting till the very end, Nebraska then took the ensuing kickoff and drove to the Arizona State 31 yard line with less than two minutes to play. The Huskers first two plays from there were incomplete passes, but on third down, quarterback Terry Luck hit fullback Tony Davis with a pass at the ASU 21 yard line. However, Davis was hit hard by two Arizona State players and fumbled the ball. The Sun Devils recovered it and went on to kill the clock and claim their 17-14 win.

So Nebraska ended the 1975 season at 10-2 and ranked No. 9 in the country. The Huskers lost their last two games of the year to No. 1 ranked Oklahoma 35-10 and to the No. 2 ranked Sun Devils.

## 1976 ASTRO-BLUEBONNET BOWL NEBRASKA 27, TEXAS TECH 24

In the most exciting bowl game of the year, the Nebraska Cornhuskers edged past a determined Texas Tech team, 27-24, in the Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl.

Twice Nebraska rallied to overcome 10-point deficits. With Texas Tech ahead 17-7 and time running out in the second quarter, quarterback Vince Ferragamo moved the Cornhuskers 80 yards in less than two minutes to score on a 22-yard touchdown pass to Mark Dufresne. But Texas Tech running back Billy Taylor countered early in the third quarter with an eight-yard touchdown run to put Nebraska down 24-14.

Once again, the Cornhuskers started to work on the Texas Tech lead. I-back Rick Berns broke around right end and dashed untouched 18 yards into the end zone to put Nebraska within three. The Huskers then took the lead when Ferragamo connected with split end Chuck Malito—who gained 107 yards in three catches to earn most-valuable-lineman honors in the game—for a 23-yard touchdown pass. That score, which would prove to be the winning touchdown, was set up by a partially blocked punt by defensive backs Ted Harvey and Kent Smith.

The final score was in doubt until with 1:34 left in the game, defensive end Reg Gast recovered a Red Raider fumble, killing a Tech threat and allowing Nebraska to run out the clock.

Nebraska scored twice in the fourth quarter on two Randy Garcia touchdown passes to rally from a 17-7 deficit and defeat the University of North Carolina 21-17 in the 19th annual Liberty Bowl.

Following a scoreless opening quarter, North Carolina opened the scoring in the second period, on a 12-yard pass from quarterback Matt Kupec to tight end Brooks Williams, with 13:52 left in the quarter. The extra point was good and NC led 7-0.

But Nebraska came right back with nine minutes left in the half and scored on a 15-yard run by fullback Dodie Donnell. Billy Todd's extra point tied it at 7-all.

However, the Tar Heels took a 14-7 lead into the lockerrooms when with 3:11 left in the half, Kupec passed 10 yards to fullback Bob Loomis for the touchdown and with the extra point, NC led 14-7.

At the 4:17 mark of the third period, North Carolina got its final score, a 47-yard field goal by Tom Biddle, making it NC 17-NU 7.

Garcia entered the game in the fourth quarter and threw two touchdown passes, leading the Huskers to the win. The first came with 10:51 left, a 10-yarder to Curtis Craig, and the second, with 3:16 left, a 34-yarder to split end Tim Smith.

For the game, Garcia completed all three of his passes for 56 yards and two touchdowns, and for his effort, he was named the Nebraska Offensive Player of the game.

## 1979 ORANGE BOWL OKLAHOMA 31, NEBRASKA 24

In a rematch of the Big Eight kings—Nebraska had beaten Oklahoma 17-14 just one month earlier—Oklahoma held off a furious Husker fourth quarter rally and defeated Nebraska 31-24, under the lights at the 45th annual Orange Bowl game in Miami.

At the start of the final period, Oklahoma held what seemed to be a comfortable 31-10 lead—when the Hukers caught fire. With 9:12 left, senior I-Back Rick Berns scored on a one yard plunge—Billy Todd's extra point was good—capping a 78 yard drive in 15 plays, to make it OU 31-NU 17.

The Huskers got another break with 8:07 remaining, when Sooner senior quarterback Tomas Lott fumbled the ball, and Husker sophomore tackle David Clark recovered it on the OU 42 yard line. Nebraska then drove 35 yards in eight plays and was faced with a fourth and one situation at the Sooner seven yard line. Husker sophomore I-Back Craig Johnson tried the middle for the first down, but was stopped by Oklahoma junior linebacker George Cumbly. Time was beginning to run out for Nebraska.

Nebraska made its one more scoring opportunity count. Starting at the Nebraska 41-yard line, the Huskers drove 58 yards in 10 plays as senior quarterback Tom Sorley passed two-yards to junior tight end Junior Miller. Todd's extra point was good—with no time remaining—making the final score OU 31-NU 24.

It came down to a game of seconds as Houston, the Southwestern Conference champion, defeated Nebraska, runnerup in the Big Eight, 17-14 in the 44th annual Cotton Bowl game in Dallas.

Before a CBS-TV national audience and a crowd of 72,032 in the famed bowl, the Huskers struck first, with 5:13 left in the opening quarter, when junior I-Back Jarvis Redwine scored on a nine-yard run and with Dean Sukup's extra point, NU led 7-0.

But Houston came back strong in the second period and marched 71 yards in six plays and one penalty, to score with 12:17 left in the first half, on an eight yard run by sub-quarterback Terry Elston. With the Cougars' extra point, the game was tied 7-7 at the half.

Neither team scored in the third period, but with 8:25 left, UH kicker Ken Hatfield boot a 41-yard field goal, to give the Cougars a 10-7 lead. However, Nebraska then rallied, and with 3:56 left in the contest, scored on a six-yard pass from quarterback Jeff Quinn to junior tight end Jeff Finn. And with Sukup's PAT, Nebraska held on to a 14-10 lead with only 3:39 left to play.

Houston then took the kickoff and drove 60 yards in 12 plays, down to the NU six yard line. With only seconds remaining, and with a fourth and goal situation, Elston threaded the ball between three Nebraska defenders in the end zone and Eric Herring caught it for the winning score with 12 seconds left to play.

## 1980 SUN BOWL

### NEBRASKA 31, MISSISSIPPI STATE 17

A great passing performance by senior Jeff Quinn and a stout defensive effort enabled Nebraska to enjoy a successful return to the Sun Bowl by downing Mississippi State 31-17. The 1980 Classic marked a reunion of sorts, since it was in the 1969 Sun Bowl that the Huskers started their present streak of 13 straight bowl appearances.

The Huskers drew first blood, when Todd Brown took a pitch on an end around play and ran 23 yards for the score with only 2:30 gone in the game. Brown's score was set up on a fumbled punt by MSU's Mardye McDole on the previous play.

The Huskers added 10 points in the second quarter—on a 22-yard Kevin Seibel field goal and an eight yard Jeff Quinn to Jeff Finn pass—to take a 17-0 lead into the dressing room at halftime.

MSU finally scored in the third quarter on a 47 yard field goal and appeared to be gaining momentum when Husker defensive end Jimmy Williams recovered a fumble at the Bulldog 25 to set up a 2 yard run by Andra Franklin.

After State scored to open the final quarter, Williams again thwarted any further MSU chances with a sack and another fumble recovery. The Huskers then iced the game with a 52 yard Jeff Quinn to Tim McCrady pass late in the game. For their efforts, Williams and Quinn were named the outstanding players of the 1980 Sun Bowl.

## 1982 ORANGE BOWL CLEMSON 22, NEBRASKA 15

Coach Tom Osborne's Cornhuskers went into their 13th consecutive bowl game in Miami against No. 1-ranked Clemson, hoping New Year's magic would work the same wonders for them as it had for their Big Red counterparts 11 years earlier—and for a while, it looked like it would. First, Texas toppled No. 3 Alabama, 14-12, in the Cotton Bowl, and while fourth-ranked Nebraska battled Clemson, Pitt was knocking off No. 2 Georgia in the Sugar Bowl, leaving it up to the Huskers and Tigers to settle the national title.

The dream of a third championship in 12 years was not to be for the Huskers, though, as their own errors, plus standout performances by Clemson quarterback Homer Jordan and the Tiger defense gave the South Carolina school its first national title and a 12-0 season with a 22-15 victory.

The Tigers scored first on a 41-yard Donald Igwebuike field goal to take a 3-0 lead, but Nebraska came back with a bit of razzle-dazzle and took a 7-3 lead midway in the first quarter on a 25-yard TD pass from I-back Mike Rozier to wingback Anthony Steels.

For the next two-and-a-half quarters, though, it was almost all Clemson, as the opportunistic Tigers took advantage of Husker errors to score 19 unanswered points and take a 22-7 lead after three periods. Early in the fourth quarter, the Huskers came back on a 26-yard TD run and a two-point conversion by Roger Craig, cutting the margin to 22-15, but an eighth untimely penalty stopped another promising drive moments later and the elusive Jordan ate up all but six seconds of the last 5:24.

## 1983 ORANGE BOWL NEBRASKA 21, LOUISIANA STATE 20

The 1983 Orange Bowl game between Nebraska and Louisiana State started out like the one-sided contest the oddsmakers had predicted. The Husker defense held the Tigers to three yards on three plays after the opening kickoff, forcing a punt, then the NU offense drove 51 yards in six plays to take a 7-0 lead on Mark Schellen's 2-yard run 4:03 into the game.

At that point, however, Murphy's Law went into effect. On the first play after Toby Williams intercepted an LSU pass at the Husker 7, Nebraska fumbled the ball away to set up a tying Tiger TD. The Huskers then fumbled the ball away at the LSU 15, forced a punt, and fumbled it at their own 45 to set up another Tiger TD. A fake punt then went awry, LSU forced another punt, and the Huskers threw an interception, before heading to the locker room thankful to be down only 14-7 at halftime.

The second half didn't start out any better as NU missed a field goal, then fumbled again to set up a field goal that gave LSU a 17-7 lead. But once down 10 points, the Husker offense suddenly came alive, driving 80 yards in 12 plays to score on an 11-yard pass from Turner Gill to Mike Rozier, and going 47 yards in seven plays to finally regain the lead, 21-17, early in the fourth quarter on a 1-yard run by Gill.

A dropped pass on a faked field goal prevented another score, and another interception set up an LSU field goal that cut the margin to 21-20, but the Husker offense sealed the win by eating up the final 5:05, moving from its own 20 to the LSU 16 on 12 plays.

## NEBRASKA, GEORGIA TECH, ALABAMA TIED AT SIX FOR BOWL WIN STREAK RECORD

Nebraska, Georgia Tech and Alabama are currently tied for the bowl victory streak record, the teams winning six post-season classics in a row.

The Huskers' string was constructed like this: 1969—beat Georgia 45-6 in the Sun Bowl (played in December); 1971—beat LSU 17-12 in the Orange Bowl; 1972—beat Alabama 38-6 in the Orange Bowl; 1973—beat Norte Dame 40-6 in the Orange Bowl; 1974—beat Texas 19-3 in the Cotton Bowl and 1974—beat Florida 13-10 in the Sugar Bowl (Dec. 31). Nebraska was after the title outright in 1975 when the Huskers met Arizona State in Fiesta Bowl on Dec. 26, but lost to the Sun Devils 17-14.

Georgia Tech won six games from 1952-57, while Alabama tied the record from 1976-81 until losing in the 1982 Cotton Bowl.

## NEBRASKA'S MULTI-PURPOSE 'PRESS BOX' RANKS AMONG THE NATION'S FINEST

Sportswriters and broadcasters who work in Nebraska's spacious and functional Information Center (opened in 1967) are unanimous in tabbing the Cornhusker press box one of the finest in the nation.

Financed by the Athletic Department in cooperation with dedicated Cornhusker fans who helped secure a first-class press-radio facility, the Nebraska Information Center cost more than \$500,000. No tax money was involved in the construction or operation.

The first level is where the working press and radio people labor. On the front row, some 50 writers can be accommodated, while the second and third rows are devoted to over-flow writers, scouts and statisticians.

Also located on the first level are radio booths, coaches booths, scoreboard and clock booths, the public address booth, statistics center, office, rest rooms, maintenance room and a communications room.

The second level of the heated and air-conditioned structure contains two movie and news photo wings and Section 300, which includes 316 theater seats for Husker Achievement Award Contributors who helped make the press box a reality.

Husker Award members who agreed to contribute \$1,000 per year for five years in addition to their regular \$1,000 gift for scholarships, have the option to purchase four seats at premium price in the area. The area also includes a snack bar (regular stadium fare at regular prices and no liquor), rest rooms and film change rooms.

Level No. 3 is restricted to television, movie and news photographers, stadium security personnel and visiting radio stations.

## JOHNNY RODGERS WON 1972 HEISMAN TROPHY



JOHNNY RODGERS

Nebraska's Johnny Rodgers, an All America wingback in 1971 and 1972, won the 1972 Heisman Trophy in a landslide over Oklahoma's Greg Pruitt and his own teammate, Rich Glover.

Rodgers was the 38th recipient of the coveted Heisman, presented each year since 1935 to the outstanding football player in the nation by the New York Downtown Athletic Club.

The Husker 1-3 finish of Rodgers and Glover was the best teammate finish since Glenn Davis and Doc Blanchard of Army went 2-3 in 1944, then 1-2 in 1945 and 1-4 in 1946.

Nebraska, by the way, is one of only three schools to ever to produce a Heisman Trophy and an Outland Trophy winner in the same season—Johnny Rodgers (Heisman, 1972) and Rich Glover (Outland, 1972). And for good measure, Glover added the Lombardi Trophy in 1972 to become the only man ever to win both the Outland and the Lombardi in the same year.

In 1981 and 1982, Nebraska center Dave Rimington became the first player to ever win the Outland Award twice and as a senior, he also won the Lombardi Trophy, joining middle guard Rich Glover (1972) as the only Huskers to win that award.

Rimington joins defensive tackle Larry Jacobson (1971) and Glover (1972) as Huskers who have won the Outland. With Jacobson and Glover, Nebraska is the only school to have back-to-back winners, and the Huskers have done it twice. NU is the only school to have produced four Outland winners within the last 19 years.

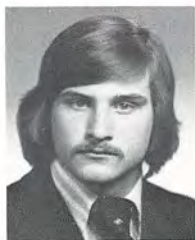

## ED WEIR NAMED TO ALL-TIME ALL AMERICA CENTENNIAL TEAM

Nebraska's two-time All-American from the glory days of the 1920s, Ed Weir, in 1969 was named to the All-Time All-America team, selected in conjunction with the College Football Centennial in 1969.

The modern era (1941 to the present) and the early-era (1906-1940) teams were selected by veteran sportswriters from across the nation.

Weir, a Hall of Fame member, was named to a tackle spot on the early-era team, along with such college greats as Don Hutson of Alabama, Bronko Nagurski of Minnesota, Benny Friedman of Michigan, Sammy Baugh of TCU, Red Grange of Illinois, Ernie Nevers of Stanford, Chris Cagle of Army and Tom Harmon of Michigan.

Nebraska's new track stadium was named in Weir's honor in 1974 and in 1980 he was inducted into the Drake Relays Hall of Fame.

## SIX PLAYERS, ONE COACH SELECTED FOR NEBRASKA FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

Six players and one coach will be inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in a halftime presentation at the Nebraska-Syracuse football game at Memorial Stadium, Oct. 1.

The six players include five former Huskers—Paul Amen, Willie Harper, Bob Mehring, Dave Rimington and Herm Rohrig—and Jack Peterson, a standout at the University of Omaha in the early 1960's. The coach is the late Al Wheeler of Peru State.

Amen and Mehring, teammates from 1935-37, were tabbed from players in the pre-1940 era. Amen earned eight letters in three sports at NU, playing football for D.X. Bible and Biff Jones. Mehring was an All-Big Six guard for the 1937 Huskers. Herman Rohrig, the selection from the 1940-62 era, was a standout back for Biff Jones from 1938-40 and capped his career by throwing a 33-yard touchdown pass to Allen Zikmund (a 1977 NHOF selection as a coach) in the 1941 Rose Bowl. The Husker selections from the post-1962 period were Harper, a consensus All-America defensive end in 1971 and 1972, and Rimington, a two-time All-American who won the Outland Trophy in 1981 and 1982, the Lombardi Trophy in 1982, and was recently named the best center in the history of college football by The Sporting News.

Peterson, an Omaha North grad, was 6-5, 270-pound NAIA All-America tackle for Omaha U. in 1963, and was also named to Little All-America teams by both the Associated Press and United Press International.

Wheeler was an outstanding coach for Peru State from 1938-63, a period that saw the Bobcats compile a 133-51-12 record and win seven Nebraska College Conference titles. In seven years as the school's basketball coach, he took his teams to the NAIA national tournament five times.

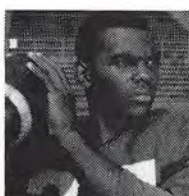

# RIMINGTON BECOMES HUSKERS' SIXTEENTH FIRST-ROUND SELECTION: SIX OTHERS SELECTED IN '83 DRAFT.

All-America center Dave Rimington, a two-time winner of the Outland Award and the 1982 Lombardi Trophy winner, became the 16th University of Nebraska player to be selected in the first round of the National Football League draft when he was tabbed by Cincinnati Bengals last April.

Six other 1982 Huskers went in the draft, including running back Roger Craig, to San Francisco in the second round (he was the 49ers' first pick), and tight end Jamie Williams, to the New York Giants in the third. Detroit picked split end Todd Brown in the sixth round, but he chose to sign with Montreal of the Canadian Football League. Three other Huskers went in the 10th round—nose tackle Jeff Merrell to the 49ers, defensive end Toby Williams to the New England Patriots and quarterback Bruce Mathison to the San Diego Chargers.

Earlier, Brad Johnson, Rimington's alternate at center, had signed with the Boston Breakers of the fledgling United States Football League.

Three 1982 Huskers signed free-agent contracts with NFL teams following the draft—tight end Mitch Krenk with the Seattle Seahawks, defensive back Allen Lyday with the Kansas City Chiefs and defensive back Kris Van Norman with the Atlanta Falcons.

## NU'S RETIRED JERSEYS—20, 50, 60, 79

By winning both the Outland Award and the Lombardi Trophy in 1982, All-America center Dave Rimington became the fourth Nebraska player to have his jersey number officially retired to the Husker trophy case.

Rimington's 50 joins Tom Novak's No. 60, Johnny Rodgers' No. 20 and Rich Glover's No. 79 in the case. Novak's jersey was retired following the 1949 season on a vote of the N Club after "Train Wreck" had been a four-time All-Big Seven choice as either a fullback of center and a 1949 All-American. Rodgers' and Glover's jerseys were retired following the 1972 season after Rodgers had won the Heisman Trophy and Glover had claimed both the Outland and Lombardi.

## KEVIN SEIBEL—Kicker

## **MEMORIAL STADIUM KEEPS EXPANDING**

Boasting one of the largest stadiums in the country and one of the nation's most beautiful press facilities, the University of Nebraska is adding to the Bob Devaney-era improvement program with a huge new weight-training room in the West Stadium and a new visitors' lockerroom in the Schulte Field House.

Here is the chronological order of Memorial Stadium expansions and improvements from the original 38,000-seat structure.

1964—South end zone section installed, making the stadium a horseshoe, raising capacity to the 48,000 mark.

1965—Center portion of north end-zone section added, raising capacity to more than 53,000.

1966—Both wings of the north end-zone added, raising capacity to more than 65,000 and making Memorial Stadium into a bowl.

1967—New press box, with guest section added, providing a beautiful and practical press facility.

1970—Installation of AstroTurf.

1972—South end zone extended. 9,400 seats added, raising capacity to 73,650.

1973—Athletic office building completed, housing, dressing and training facilities for varsity football.

1977—Installation of new AstroTurf replacing the 1970 turf, and a new scoreboard over the north stadium.

1980—Completed top deck of press box for additional photo and visiting radio-TV space.

1981—New west stadium weight room and new visitor's locker room in Schulte Field House.

1982—Expansion of Schulte Field House practice area.

### **Interesting Memorial Stadium Facts**

Here are some more interesting facts about Nebraska's Memorial Stadium:

- Nebraska, with the largest Stadium in the Big Eight, has averaged over 75,000 fans per game for 11 years. The Huskers have ranked in the top six nationally, in attendance for years.
- Nebraska games have been sold out 124 consecutive times, dating back to 1962.
- All 1983 games are already sold out—six games, with an assured attendance of more than 455,000 fans.
- Every time Nebraska plays football Memorial Stadium becomes the third largest population area in the State of Nebraska.
- Every time Nebraska plays football, 6 percent of the state's population gathers to watch the action.
