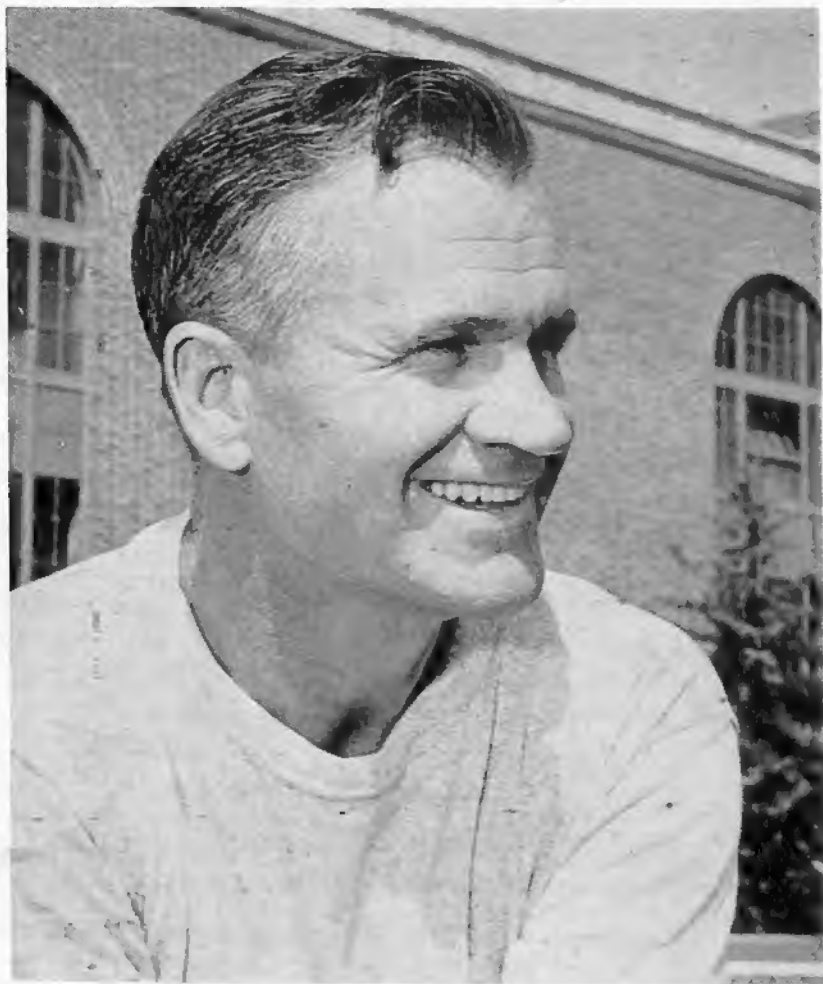

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## SKETCH OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA . . .

Everywhere you go people talk about the weather but in Nebraska they talk about the weather and the University of Nebraska Cornhuskers.

On autumn Saturdays virtually every radio in the state is on a station carrying the Cornhusker games and when Nebraska cowpokes, farmers, or smart shop sales girls ask, "How we doin'?" they really mean "we" because every Nebraskan considers himself a Cornhusker, personally.

This may sound like Nebraskans are dippy over football. They are. But there is more to it than that. The University and the State of Nebraska have grown up together and the experience has developed an uncommonly strong bond of interest between the citizens and the school.

It hasn't been easy for either the University or the State to grow up in a 77,000 square-mile area that less than a hundred years ago was considered desert and wild Indian country.

But today the University, which was founded in 1869, has a modern physical plant valued at more than \$50 million.

More than 80,000 young people have sought knowledge in the University's lecture halls and laboratories. From a mere handful of instructors, the faculty has grown to its present size of nearly 600. And from the dozen courses of early days has grown a curriculum which offers a student a choice of nearly 2,000 subjects.

The background of the average student at the University is closely related with agriculture. Most students were either reared on a farm or ranch, attended a rural or small-town school, and they have more than a passing acquaintance with saddle horses, combines, windmills, cattle and barbed wire fences.

As a result of the agricultural influence and background, there are many events at the University that may be seen only in the great Mid-

west. Students at the College of Agriculture hold their annual Farmers Fair, complete with parade, barbecue, milking contest for girls, dance, and even a full size rodeo.

The life of the University itself consists of three principal duties—teaching, research, and services.

In the teaching department, the University is composed of 10 colleges and four schools. Present enrollment averages about 9,000 a semester. Students are, of course, mainly from Nebraska, but every state in the Union is represented in the student body and students are enrolled from 44 foreign countries.

Integrated with the everyday life of Nebraska citizens are the public services of the University. The Agricultural Extension Service sponsors about 30,000 meetings for homemakers during the year and for 4-H Youth Clubs, farmers, ranchers and other groups, with a combined attendance of 650,000.

Another important service agency is the Extension Division, which annually gives instruction by correspondence and evening classes to 18,000 persons. The University's extension enrollment is second largest among the Nation's educational institutions.

The University is guided in all of these efforts by Chancellor Clifford M. Hardin, who was appointed to the position in July, 1954.

Looking to the future, the University has now under construction a \$3 million Nebraska Center for Continuing Education, which will serve adult education in Nebraska and the Great Plains Region. The structure is being financed by a state-wide fund drive and a grant from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek, Mich. The University also will begin construction soon on a \$3 million Sheldon Art Gallery, a gift of the A. B. and Frances Sheldon estates.

Other facts about the University:

The University Libraries have a collection of 650,000 catalogued volumes, 700,000 bibliographical units, 46,000 maps and aerial photographs, and about one million pamphlets and manuscripts.

A study made by Who's Who showed that the University ranked ninth among all state universities in number of alumni in Who's Who. The present edition of "Who's Who in Engineering" shows the University's College of Engineering and Architecture ranking second of 475 schools in the nation in percentage of alumni regarded as outstanding engineers.

The University Museum of Natural History is the finest in the country. It is noted particularly for its great Hall of Elephants and the skeleton of the Lincoln County Mammoth, which stands 14 feet at the shoulders making it the largest recorded fossil elephant in existence. More than 200,000 persons visit the Museum annually.

The University's main campus is at the north edge of Lincoln's downtown business district and includes a tract of 75 acres. The College of Agriculture campus is at the northeast edge of the City, and the College of Medicine campus is in Omaha.

## PREVIEW OF 1959 CORNHUSKER FOOTBALL TEAM . . . .

Four words tell the story of the University of Nebraska football team this season:

Improved but not great.

Coach Bill Jennings and his staff believe they have one problem licked, the matter of depth. Whether it be depth in quantity or quality remains a question that will not be answered until actual-playfield tests.

A year ago the Cornhuskers, when all hands were physically fit, stood up well against some of the nation's better teams. Penn State and Pittsburgh were two examples, Nebraska upsetting both.

But when three or four key players were on the sidelines, the roof fell in.

Distribution of experience is much better this fall. A year ago there were five seniors on the squad. This season it breaks down in this way: 13 seniors, 16 juniors, 43 sophomores for a total of 72. Of the returnees, 20 are lettermen.

A thorough clinical test awaits in the opening game. The University of Texas, conquerors of Oklahoma a year ago, comes here September 19.

Then it's Minnesota at Minneapolis, Oregon State, Kansas, and Indiana in Lincoln; Missouri at Columbia; Oklahoma here for homecoming; Iowa State at Ames; Colorado in Lincoln and the finale with Kansas State at Manhattan.

The depth chart at the close of spring drills showed but five sophomores in the first two lineups. There were five among the starters a year ago.

Coach Jennings made it plain early that Nebraska would not have what is generally known as a starting eleven this fall. The first 22 players will be starters, he said, operating as alternate elevens.

Among the newcomers are three transfers who have given indication of providing a helping hand. Also the return of Don Olson, Grand Island, after a year's absence should bolster the guard corps. Olson was slightly sensational as a tackle in his sophomore year. He's big and quick.

Topping the transfer list is Tom Kramer, who lettered at the University of California, before coming here. Kramer can run and pass. At quarterback this spring he furnished the spark that enabled the varsity to score its first shutout over the alumni in the annual spring game.

Darrell Cooper, who lettered as a sophomore at Baylor, is tabbed for action at center. George (Animal) Haney, who came here after a freshman year at Georgia Tech, is a tackle with all the equipment.

Guards: Al Fischer, Princeton, Minn.; Don Houser, Lincoln.

Centers: Henry (Dick) Tinglehoff, Lexington.

Quarterbacks: Dean Cozine, Ft. Worth, Tex.; Ron Meade, Canby, Minn.; Joe Rutigliano, Brooklyn, N. Y.

Halfbacks: Dallas Dyer, Lexington; Pat Clare, Lincoln; Dennis Stuewe, Hamburg, Minn.

Fullbacks: Dave Roberts, Longview, Wash.; Steve Olsen, Sioux City, Ia.; Noel Martin, Broughton, Kans.

The big experiment of the spring season was the switching of Don Fricke from center to fullback. Although he had never played in the backfield, the Hastings junior adjusted to the new surroundings. Fricke drew attention as a sophomore center. His defensive play was top drawer.

Weak points: Still lack overall team speed. Four of the five lettermen graduated were starters.

Strong points: Will have depth. End spots appear more solid with all hands\* back plus four promising ends from freshman class. It made possible the switch of Roland McDole from end to tackle where he worked his way into the No. 1 right tackle slot. McDole was chosen the most valuable lineman in the varsity-alumni struggle this spring.

Also Roger Brede, a senior who doubles as a hurdler for the track team, will be shifted from end to a halfback spot.

Loss of Monte Kiffin, 6-3 and 215, one of the top sophomore tackle prospects was a blow. Kiffin had spinal surgery in July which will preclude any play this season.

## PLAYER SKETCHES . . . .

### LEFT ENDS

**William M. (Bo or Bill) Bohanan**, a senior from Dallas, Tex., graduated from W. H. Adamson High School in Dallas. Transferred to Nebraska from Navarro Junior College where he was All-Conference and voted most outstanding back. Started at end for Nebraska last season. Bo has burning desire, a hustler and likes contact. An Army veteran, he served nine months in Austria, another nine months in France. Captained his high school team. Biggest sports thrill: Helping upset Penn State and Pittsburgh last fall.

**Charles Louis (Mike) Eger**, junior from South Bend, Ind., (St. Joseph's High School). Played end as a freshman and sophomore in high school, quarterback as a junior and senior. Caught five passes for 61 yards, one a touchdown against Pitt. Came fast as a defensive end in spring ball. Mike is 6-2 and weighs 195.

**James Stewart (Jim) Hugs**, a sophomore with fine potential. Won regents scholarship and is among top students on squad. Taking a pre-med course. Fine pass catcher and goes after ball with the "extra-inch" try. Worked way into No. 3 slot in spring drills. Earned two letters in football, three in basketball and three in track at Holdrege. Biggest thrill: scoring on 39 and 76 yard runs against Ord in first game he played for Holdrege to provide a 12-7 victory.

### LEFT TACKLES

**Martin Duane Mongerson**, two-letter winner from Omaha North, logged 463 minutes of playing time last fall. The coaches tab him as steady and dependable. He's 6-4 and 206 and is considered slightly better offensively than defensively. Named as an All America high school player in 1955.

**George Bernard (Animal) Haney**, transfer from Georgia Tech and a sophomore. Graduate of East Point High at Russell Ga. Served in transportation branch of army at Ft. Eustis, Va. Married and father of 2-year-old daughter. Greatest thrill: Played opposite former pro player in service game. Ended up with a broken thumb and a slight concussion but played 50 minutes and was voted outstanding lineman of the game.

**Russell Dean (Russ) Edeal**, at 6-1 and 219, is a junior letterman from Overton, played high school football at Lexington. He won three high school football letters, two in track and one in basketball. He was awarded the Carl Raymond Gary scholarship. Enrolled in ag where his major is technical science and animal husbandry. Russ was the surprise of the spring season as a freshman and has been improving steadily since.

### LEFT GUARDS

**Don Eugene Olson**, Grand Island, laid out last year but is returning to school this fall. As a sophomore he led the squad in minutes played, 423 out of a possible 600. He's big and quick (6-3 and 215).

Don is a throwback to the traditionally tough tackles for which Nebraska has been famous in other years. Could be one of top linemen in Big Eight. Strong both offensively and defensively.

**John Allan Ponsiego**, graduate of Mendel Catholic High School in Chicago. An all-city tackle and guard in high school. Ponsiego is a brother of Joe, who lettered in 1951-'52. During the summer he works on an automobile assembly line in Chicago. One of the top-hustlers on the squad. Sharp on pursuit and in punt and kickoff coverage.

**Donald Joseph Houser**, all-state fullback at Lincoln Pius X in 1958. Greatest thrill: Scored TD first time he handled the ball at Pius. Has physical potential to be a top lineman and could be pushing for starting job by end of season. Possesses terrific desire. Enrolled in business administration.

### CENTERS

**Henry Michael Tingelhoff**, 6-1 and 210, a sophomore from Lexington, had battled into the No. 1 position by the end of spring drills. He was All America, all state and all conference in his 1957 season in high school. Wants to coach when he completes his college work. Made rapid strides in spring campaign. He has shown all around ability. Coaches counting on him to play a lot of football before his three years are ended.

**Darrell Lester Cooper**, 5-11 and 215, lettered at Baylor one year before transferring to Nebraska. Graduate of Arlington Heights High of Ft Worth, Tex. Named all-Southwest conference at center as a freshman at Baylor. Defensive play his top forte, especially with plays coming directly at him.

Being under weight, he would drink heavily of water and ate six meals a day. The minimum weight was 85 and when Jim hit the scales he was still a pound light. But it was waived and "it was the first of my many football thrills."

### RIGHT GUARDS

**LeRoy Allen (Lee or Zimba) Zentic**, senior two-letter man, who doubles as an outfielder for Tony Sharpe's baseball team, is tabbed to be one of top Husker linemen. He played 296 minutes as a sophomore and 268 last fall. Particularly stout defensively. He was a three-sport athlete at Rock Island, Ill., where he lettered three times in basketball and baseball, twice in football.

**Richard Allen (Kosh) Kosier**, a junior from Watertown, S. D., played well as a sophomore and improved this spring. He was all-state and All America selection in high school where he lettered in football, basketball and track. He's stronger on defense. Greatest

thrill: Helping Watertown dump Yankton 30-0 for ESD title. Has played guard, tackle and quarterback.

**Robert Dale (Stub) Siemer**, all-state guard from Denison, Ia. He has 190 pounds spread over a 5-8 frame. Siemer came along rapidly this spring and while he lacks the height he is a good competitor and will do a top job in a relief role, coaches predict. Lettered in football, track and baseball in high school.

#### RIGHT TACKLES

**Roland Owen (Ron) McDole**, graduate of DeVilbiss High School in Toledo, O. At 6-3 and 204, McDole was all-city linebacker and offensive fullback. Played end last fall as a sophomore and switched to tackle this spring. Was named outstanding lineman in Alumni-Varsity game this spring. Better defensively. Good hustler and expected to have a good year. Caught the pass against Iowa State that enabled Huskers to edge a 7-6 victory.

**Joe M. Gacusana**, 6-2 and 205, doubles as a swimmer. A Lincoln high graduate, Joe lettered three times in track and swimming, twice in football. Injuries early last fall tossed Joe into a starting spot as a sophomore and until he hurt a shoulder he held up right well. Has speed and quickness and leadership potential.

**Allen Carroff Wellman**, DeSmet, S. D. high graduate who still holds South Dakota prep discus record. Played 250 minutes as a sophomore but passed spring drill to compete with track team as shot putter and discus thrower. Additional strength gained through shoulders in latter sport should help this fall, coaches believe. Al is a coach's delight, always trying to improve and willing to listen.

#### RIGHT ENDS

**Donald Robert Purcell**, 6-1 185, sophomore, was all-state in his senior year at Omaha Benson. Showed vast improvement in spring to win No. 1 spot. Showed all around ability, especially in offensive blocking. Greatest sports thrill: Playing in midget league game at Las Vegas, Nev., where his team won the championship. Aggressive and the comes-to-play type.

**Max Lee (Dukes) Martz**, has lettered at both end and halfback in two seasons with the Huskers. Martz, 6-2 and 189, was all-stater in basketball and football at Beatrice, and a gold medal winner as a hurdler in track. Majoring in geology. Good pass catcher and runs well with ball after catching it. Top student, ranking 12th in high school graduating class of 154.

**John Charles Bond**, 6-0 180, junior from Missouri Valley, Ia. Member of honor roll in high school. Four sport letter winner in high school with two in football, three in basketball, track, four in baseball. Has played quarterback and end. Plans to coach when graduated. Caught four passes for 30 yards last fall.

#### QUARTERBACKS

**Thomas McVay Kramer**, transfer from the University of California, is first quarterback Nebraska has had in years who could both run

and pass. Attended East Contra Junior College where he captained the football and track teams. Has but one year of eligibility remaining. Served with Army from January, 1956, to December, 1957. Fine ball handler and expected to provide spark and leadership for an improved Nebraska team.

**Harry Roscoe Tolly**, two-year veteran, who was the No. 1 pitcher this past spring for the baseball team. Prepped at North Platte and Phillips-Exeter Academy. Missed spring drill because of baseball but expected to provide serious competition for No. 1 spot. Made national honor society and honor roll in high school. Elected to Innocents Society, men's senior honorary.

**Walter Dean Cozine**, sophomore from Ft Worth, Tex., out last season with an injury. Graduate of R. L. Paschal High School in Ft. Worth. Lettered in both football and basketball there. Majoring in geology. He was named the outstanding back in the Alumni-Varsity game All Sports Day. Executes split T well, good competitor, and in the thick of the fight for the No. 1 spot.

### LEFT HALFBACKS

**Patrick Fischer**, Omaha Westside graduate, possesses natural talent for top fighter. Fourth brother to play for Nebraska, preceded by Cletus, Ken and Rex. Was starter as a sophomore last fall. One of finest safety men in country. Has good speed and tough competitor. Averaged 15.4 on nine punt returns last fall. Completed three of nine running passe.

**Patrick Eugene Clare**, 190 and 6-0, possessing all the goods. Was All-State at Sioux City, Ia., East. Pre-med student. He's a nephew of Leland Clare who lettered at Nebraska in wrestling. Hits handoff better than any Husker back. Needs more experience but conceivably could be top back by season's end. Good speed and quickness.

**Dallas Marion (Dally) Dyer**, 5-10 and 175, sophomore from Lexington was twice an all-state fullback in high school. Only lack is break-away speed. Will do fine job any time he is in game, coaches say. Teachers college student and plans to teach and coach upon graduation. Keeps in shape in summer by carrying and stacking 100-pound sacks of flour in a mill.

### RIGHT HALFBACKS

**Carroll Robert Zaruba**, senior, and a marine corps veteran. Zaruba served in Korea, the Virgin Islands in his overseas service. Attended Fullerton High School where he was all-state in 1949-'50. Shifted from fullback. Injury prone but could be great if he could avoid the hampering hurts. Has size speed combination and played well latter part of 1958 season at halfback.

**Clay (Bud) White**, Toledo, O., junior. Possesses speed and led the Husker ground gainers last fall with a 4.6 average on 29 carries. Graduate of Libbey High in Toledo. Won a novice Golden Gloves crown. Coaches tab him as above average in speed and he'll always

make yards when given a minimum of blocking. He'll be pushing for the No. 1 position. Showed great improvement in spring drill.

**Dennis Howard Stewe**, Hamburg, Minn., sophomore who is hard-nosed and strong with good straightaway speed. Vicious tackler. With experience he could be outstanding. Four-sport athlete in high school winning three letters in football, two in baseball and basketball, one in track. Works on farm in summer and is taking agriculture.

### FULLBACKS

**Donald Calvin Fricke**, one of the top sophomore centers in the Big Eight last season, has been switched to fullback. Made the transition without too much loss of ground. Terrific line backer. Needs experience as ball carrier as it is his first time in backfield. One of the lads who can be counted on for 100 per cent effort. Studying pre-law with hopes to become FBI member after graduation. He is 5-7 and 175. Has also played quarterback. Biggest thrill: Helping defeat Sioux City Central in last high school game of his career when East was an underdog. Pat Clare, now a Husker teammate, ran 86 yards with the second half kickoff to aid the East surprise win.

## MEET THE STAFF . . . .

**James William (Bill) Orwig**, director of athletics, was born Jan. 1, 1907 in Cleveland, O. He attended high school in Toledo and college at the University of Michigan. He received his degree of Bachelor of Science in Education in 1930 and remained at Michigan for a year of graduate work.

Playing end on the Wolverine football team, he lettered in 1927, 1928 and 1929. He also lettered in basketball those same years, earning an all-conference guard berth and an All-America selection in his senior year.

From 1931 to 1936 he coached football and basketball at Benton Harbor, Mich., and taught social science. In 1936 he moved to Libbey High School in Toledo as football and basketball coach and remained there through 1944. At Libbey High School he coached undefeated, state champion football teams in 1941, 1942 and 1944. His Libbey teams won a total of 74, lost 25 and tied 4.

Orwig became athletic consultant for the Army of Occupation in Europe in 1945, and in 1946 assumed the football coaching reins at the University of Toledo where his teams won 15, lost 4 and tied 2 in a two-year period. He took over the basketball coaching duties in his second year at Toledo, winding up with a 19-6 record.

Orwig joined the Michigan football staff in 1948. He coached the ends and linebackers until 1953 when he was shifted to offensive end coach and defensive backfield coach:

He took over as Nebraska athletic director in 1954.

Married, he has two children—a daughter, Janice, and a son, William.

**Bill Jennings**, 41, is the twenty-fourth University of Nebraska head football coach since the first full-time mentor was hired in 1893.

Prior to serving as an assistant coach here, Jennings was backfield coach at the University of Oklahoma for seven years, resigning after the 1953 season to become associated with an oil company at Ft. Worth, Tex.

Jennings lived most of his life in Norman, Okla. He played end at Norman High where he was coached by Dewey "Snorter" Luster, head coach at Oklahoma from 1941 to 1945. He then played wingback and end for Tom Stidham's Sooners in 1938-'39-'40. He still holds several Sooner pass-catching records.

Playing in the East-West game in 1940, Jennings batted 1000 as a pass catcher, fielding all four tosses to him from Paul Christman.

Following his graduation, Jennings coached one year at Cushing (Okla.) High School. He then enlisted in the Marine Corps, serving from June, 1942 until 1946 when he joined the Oklahoma coaching staff.

Jennings developed several All-America backs while at Oklahoma, among them Quarterback Eddie Crowder, Fullback Buck McPhaul and Halfback Billy Vessels.



When Jennings played for Coach Stidman's Sooners, he was known as "Twinkle Toes" because of his fancy footwork when loose in broken field. As a sophomore, he alternately played wingback and end on the all-victorious Sooner team that lost to Tennessee in the Orange Bowl.

Jennings didn't see action in that bowl game because of an injury. He had suffered a broken ankle during Oklahoma's final 28-0 win over Washington State.

Born March 13, 1918, Jennings holds B.A. and M.A. degrees from Oklahoma. A Presbyterian, he is married and has two daughters.

**LeRoy Pearce** carries the title of assistant head football coach at the University of Nebraska. He came here in January, 1958.

Pearce is a 1949 graduate of the University of Wyoming where he played under Bowden Wyatt. He served as an assistant to Wyatt for three years after graduation, then went to Arkansas when Wyatt took the head coaching job there.

He spent two years at Arkansas and two years at Tennessee as an assistant before going to Iowa State in 1957.

The 31-year-old coach lettered four years in football at Wyoming and one year in track. He is a native of Casper, Wyo. Pearce is married and has two children.

**Richard Monroe**, 36, assistant coach, is a 1949 graduate of the University of Kansas.

Monroe, who started as a high school coach at Atwood and Columbus, Kan., has been coaching at the college level for the past seven years. He was an assistant at Kansas and later at the University of Wichita.

Monroe served 41 months with the Air Force during World War II. He is not married.

Monroe, rated one of the all-time greats at center for the Jayhawk school, played for George Sauer when the latter coached at Kansas.

While at Wichita, Monroe served as "first lieutenant" for Coach Pete Tillman. During this span the Wheatshockers won two Missouri Valley championships.

**Don Strasheim**, assistant coach, will mark his sixth season in that capacity this fall.

Strasheim began his coaching duties at Nebraska in 1954 following his release from the Navy. A NAVCAD recruiter and PIO officer, he served with the Navy from 1952 until March of 1954. He now holds the rank of Lt. (jg) in the Active Naval Reserve.

A 1951 University of Nebraska graduate, Strasheim was awarded his Master of Education degree in 1953. He played on Husker football squads in 1948-'49-'50, beginning at fullback and switching to guard his last year where he received All-Big-Seven recognition. It was his blocking that cut Bob Reynolds loose on many of his sensational runs in 1950. Strasheim played under three different collegiate coaches—Bernie Masterson, George "Potsy" Clark and Bill Glassford.

Strasheim served as a sports writer for the Lincoln Star from January, 1951, until his Naval induction. A varsity wrestling letterman, he coached the grapplers for three years.

Born Nov. 26, 1929, Strasheim married Carol McCowan, Beatrice, in July of 1956.

**Don Scarbrough**, assistant coach, was head football and basketball coach at Northwestern State College, Alva, Okla., before coming here.

Scarbrough graduated from Altus, Okla., high school where he lettered in football, basketball and baseball. From 1942 until 1946 he served with the U. S. Navy. -

In 1947-'49 he attended Cameron State Agricultural College at Lawton, Okla., lettering in football and basketball.

He was chosen as the best all-around athlete in 1949 and played with the Cameron Aggies in the Little Rose Bowl game at Pasadena, Calif.

Scarbrough received his B.S. degree from the University of Tulsa in 1951, lettering in football and basketball. He coached football and basketball at Healdton, Okla., high school for a year and a half and then became an assistant football coach at the University of Tulsa for two years.

Born Nov. 8, 1924, he married Rosa Lee Anderson of Marvell, Ark., in June, 1955. They have one child.

**Warren Schmakel**, 37, freshman coach, formerly served as head coach at Central Michigan College.

Chosen on the Little All-America team when he played at Central Michigan in 1942, Schmakel has been, since 1954, chief of the plans and operations section of the United States Army European Athletic Office.

In this position he planned and organized 18 different sports for 200,000 servicemen in Germany and France.

Schmakel served two years as an assistant to Athletic Director Bill Orwig when the latter was head coach at Toledo. He also served more than three years in the Submarine Corps, U. S. Navy, from 1943-'46, practically all of it in the South Pacific.

He was wed to Eleanor E. Diehm, New York City, two years ago.

Schmakel received his Master of Arts degree from Columbia, and worked toward his Doctor's degree while an assistant at the University of Michigan.

His coaching background includes these assignments:

1946-'48—Line Coach, University of Toledo.

1948-'50—Line Coach, Miami University, Oxford, Ohio.

1950-'51—Head Coach, Central Michigan, Mt. Pleasant, Mich.

1951-'53—Line Coach, Miami University, Oxford, Ohio.

1953-'54—Asst. Freshman Coach and Scout, University of Michigan.

**Jack Braley**, Miles City, Mont., a 1956 graduate of the University of Nebraska, was added to the staff last spring when John Gordy resigned to return as an active player in professional football. Braley played end for the Huskers three years. He has been helping on a part-time basis as he completed work for a master's degree. Jack is married and has one child.

Although the going has been rough for the Cornhuskers the past 15 years, the overall record shows Nebraska winning 356 games, losing 206 and tying 36:

E. O. (Jumbo) Stiehm, who coached from 1911 through 1915, has the top record among the 24 coaches who have held the helm since 1890. He won 35, lost 2 and tied 3 for a mark of .913.

Next, from a percentage standpoint, was Walter C. (Bummy) Booth, 1900 through 1905. His teams won 52, lost 8 and tied 2.

Coaches with percentages of .700 or above included E. N. Robinson (1896-'97) W. C. (King) Cole (1907-'10) E. J. (Doc) Stewart (1916-'17) Fred T. Dawson (1921-'24) Ernest E. Bearg (1925-'28) Dana X. Bible (1929-'36).

## LONGEST VICTORY RUN . . . .

E. O. (Jumbo) Stiehm's Nebraska teams from 1912 through 1916 compiled the longest winning streak any Cornhusker elevens have ever registered. If you know of any marks that might be questionable let us know and we will try to find the correct totals. It isn't easy as records were sketchy, if at all, in the early days.

Bob Reynolds, Mister Touchdown of 1950, holds a majority of the marks, as you will note.

We felt we had to make a start somewhere and this list is as accurate as we could make it.

This will give the Cornhuskers something to shoot at in the years to come.

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### **'Greatest Thrill' . . . .**
