Matt Rhule is in his third season as Nebraska's head coach in 2025. The 31st head coach in school history, Rhule led Nebraska to its first bowl appearance in eight years in 2024, leading the Huskers to a victory in the Pinstripe Bowl.

Rhule has 12 years of experience as a head coach, including nine years in the college ranks and three seasons as the head coach of the NFL's Carolina Panthers. Highly regarded as a program builder and player developer, Rhule led successful turnarounds of the programs at Baylor and Temple and has improved Nebraska's record in each of his first two seasons in Lincoln.

The Huskers' two-win increase in 2024 continued his history of improvement throughout his college career. Rhule's teams have increased or matched their win total from the previous season in each of his nine seasons as a college head coach. Additionally, Rhule is one of just 12 active FBS head coaches to guide three different schools to bowl appearances.

After leading Nebraska to five wins in his first season in 2023, Rhule's second Nebraska team took another step forward. The seven wins were the most at Nebraska since 2016, and the bowl victory was the program's first since 2015. Nebraska posted an unbeaten record against non-conference teams for the first time since 2005, and the Huskers were ranked as high as No. 22 during the season, NU's highest ranking in eight years.

The steady improvement at Nebraska follows the path of Rhule's success at Temple and Baylor. Temple won only two games in Rhule's first season but in year three, the Owls set a school record for victories and played in the conference championship game. After leading Temple to a conference title the next season, Rhule moved on to Baylor with similar success. The Bears won only one game in Rhule's first season but in his third year, Baylor won a school-record 11 games and played in the Big 12 Championship Game and the Sugar Bowl.

HEAD COACHING CAREER

NEBRASKA CORNHUSKERS: Rhule led Nebraska to a 5-7 record in his first season in 2023, tying for the program's most victories in seven seasons. In the final year of Big Ten divisions, Rhule led the Huskers to three West Division wins, matching NU's total from the previous three seasons combined. NU also went undefeated in the month of October for the first time since 2001.

Rhule and his staff helped Nebraska rank among the nation's 15 most-improved teams in rushing defense, rushing offense, total defense and scoring defense. The Huskers also showed improvement in special teams, ranking second nationally with four blocked kicks. Individually, Rhule and his staff helped 10 Huskers earn All-Big Ten honors, including seven returning players who were recognized for the first time in their careers.

Nebraska improved to 7-6 in Rhule's second season, when the Huskers posted the program's first winning season and first bowl victory in eight years. The Huskers were ranked as high as No. 22 during the 2024 season, and Nebraska went undefeated against non-conference teams for the first time since 2005. Five of Nebraska's six losses were one-score defeats, but the Huskers also showed improvement in winning close games as two of their final three victories came by seven or fewer points.

The Husker defense ranked in the top 20 nationally in rushing defense, total defense and scoring defense for the second straight season in 2024. Besides Nebraska, the only other teams who ranked in the top 20 nationally in rushing defense, total defense and scoring defense in both 2023 and 2024 were Michigan, Ohio and Penn State. Offensively, Nebraska boasted the nation's third-most improved passing unit in 2024. That group was led by a pair of true freshmen, as quarterback Dylan Raiola set Nebraska's freshman passing record while receiver Jacory Barney Jr. had the most receptions by a freshman in program history.

Rhule's success was not limited to the field, as Nebraska posted its highest team grade-point average in history and had more academic All-Big Ten selections than any other school during the 2024 season.

CAROLINA PANTHERS: Following successful stints as the head coach at Baylor and Temple, Rhule moved on to the National Football League as the head coach of the Carolina Panthers. Rhule coached the Panthers for two-plus seasons, posting an 11-27 record.

Rhule inherited a Carolina team that had lost eight straight games to finish the 2019 season. He led the Panthers to a 3-2 start in 2020 before finishing with a 5-11 record that included eight one-score losses.

Carolina won its first three games of the 2021 season before injuries at the quarterback position contributed to a 5-12 record. Rhule then led the Panthers to a 1-4 record through the first five weeks of the 2022 season.

BAYLOR: Rhule produced an impressive turnaround in three seasons as Baylor's head coach from 2017 to 2019, guiding the Bears to a 19-20 record.

Baylor won only one game in Rhule's first season in 2017 but two years later, the Bears went 11-3, becoming the first team from a Power Conference to go from 11 losses to 11 wins in two or fewer seasons.

Baylor finished 1-11 in 2017 but Rhule was successful in creating a strong culture and developing players, including quarterback Charlie Brewer, who was named the Big 12 Co-Offensive Freshman of the Year.

In his second year, Rhule guided Baylor to a 7-6 record in 2018 capped by a Texas Bowl victory over Vanderbilt. Baylor's six-win improvement from the 2017 to the 2018 season ranked third nationally and led all Power Conference programs. His staff's player development was on display again, as wide receiver Jalen Hurd was named the 2018 Big 12 Newcomer of the Year.

Rhule delivered a record-breaking season in his final year in Waco. Just two years after a one-win season, Rhule led Baylor to a school-record 11 victories in 2019. The Bears began the season 9-0 to mark the best start in school history, and the season ended with Baylor playing in its first Big 12 Championship game and its second Sugar Bowl. With a second straight bowl appearance, Rhule became only the second coach in Baylor history to make a bowl game in two of his first three seasons.

With an 11-3 record in 2019, Baylor finished with a No. 13 ranking, the Bears' second-highest final ranking since 1951. The only losses in Rhule's final season were a pair of three-point defeats to a top-10 Oklahoma squad and a 12-point Sugar Bowl loss to a top-5 Georgia team.

Sixteen Baylor players earned all-conference honors in 2019, and defensive tackle James Lynch was named the 2019 Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year and Defensive Lineman of the Year.

TEMPLE: Rhule's first head coaching job came at Temple, where he led the Owl program to new heights in four seasons from 2013 to 2016. Rhule guided Temple to a 28-23 record, including 20-7 over his final two years.

Rhule once again laid the foundation in his first year, when Temple finished 2-10. After an 0-6 start, the Owls went 2-4 over the final six games and never trailed entering the fourth quarter in any of their final six games.

With an emphasis on closing out games entering Rhule's second season, his team succeeded by allowing only 23 fourth-quarter points in 12 games in 2014. The strong finishes helped Temple achieve bowl eligibility with a 6-6 record.

Temple tied its school record with 10 victories in Rhule's third season in 2015, and the Owls again won 10 games in 2016. He led Temple to back-to-back 10-win seasons for the first time in program history, as the Owls had produced only one 10-win season before Rhule's appointment as head coach. Temple also played for the conference title in both 2015 and 2016.

In 2015, Rhule led his team to a conference division title. The Owls started the year 7-0 and achieved a national ranking for the first time in 36 seasons. Temple spent eight weeks ranked in 2015, accounting for half of the 16 all-time weeks the Owls have been ranked entering the 2024 season.

Rhule's final season culminated with another 10-win campaign and the program's first conference title in nearly 40 years, as Temple defeated No. 20 Navy, 34-20, in the American Athletic Conference Championship Game.

ASSISTANT COACHING CAREER

NEW YORK GIANTS: Rhule's most recent season as an assistant coach came in the NFL, as he was an assistant offensive line coach with the New York Giants in 2012. The Giants finished 9-7 that season, and Rhule's work with the offensive line helped New York have a 3,000-yard passer, a 1,000-yard rusher and a 1,000-yard receiver.

TEMPLE: Rhule was on the Temple staff for six consecutive seasons from 2006 to 2011. He joined the Owls as the defensive line coach but moved to coaching quarterbacks the next season. Rhule served as Temple's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach from 2008 to 2010, and he was the assistant offensive coordinator and tight ends coach for his final season in 2011.

In 2011, the Owls went 9-4 and won their first bowl game since 1979. For the second time in Rhule's tenure, Temple set a school record for single-season rushing yards and rushing touchdowns. Temple originally set school records for season rushing yards and offensive all-conference selections in 2009, when Rhule was in his second season as offensive coordinator.

In his first season as offensive coordinator in 2008, Rhule's unit helped the Owls to their most wins (5) in nearly two decades. Temple outscored its opponents for the first time in 18 seasons, and Bruce Francis established the school records for career receiving touchdowns.

In addition to his coaching duties, Rhule served as Temple's recruiting coordinator in 2007 and 2011. The Owls landed the No. 1 recruiting class in the MAC in each of Rhule's two seasons as recruiting coordinator.

WESTERN CAROLINA: Rhule coached at FCS Western Carolina from 2002 to 2005, holding a variety of titles during his time as a Catamount. He was the assistant head coach for his final three seasons on staff, as Rhule took on additional duties while head coach Kent Briggs battled cancer.

Rhule coached the offensive line, special teams and linebackers during his tenure, while also serving as the running game coordinator in 2005. Western Carolina ranked 12th in the FCS in total defense in 2004, led by Rhule's linebackers who occupied the top five spots on the team in tackles. As the special teams coach, Rhule's unit led the FCS ranks in kickoff return average (27.4) in 2005.

UCLA: In an impressive rise up the ranks, Rhule landed a Power Five assistant coaching position in just the fourth season of his coaching career. Rhule was the assistant defensive line coach at UCLA in 2001, when the Bruins started 6-0 with four wins over ranked opponents. UCLA ranked in the top 25 nationally in total defense in Rhule's lone season on staff.

BUFFALO: Rhule coached the linebackers at the University of Buffalo for two seasons in 1999 and 2000, which marked the Bulls' first two seasons transitioning to the FBS level from the FCS ranks.

ALBRIGHT COLLEGE: One year after he was finished playing college football, Rhule landed his first full-time coaching job as the linebackers coach at Albright College in Pennsylvania in 1998.

PLAYING CAREER (PENN STATE)

Rhule was a linebacker at Penn State from 1994 to 1997. He helped the Nittany Lions to a 41-8 record in his four seasons with one Big Ten title, three bowl victories and a top-20 final ranking every season.

PERSONAL

A native of New York City, Rhule earned his bachelor's degree in political science from Penn State and his master's in educational psychology from Buffalo. He and his wife Julie have three children, Bryant, Vivienne and Leona.

MATT RHULE COACHING NOTEBOOK

A HISTORY OF IMPROVING PROGRAMS

Matt Rhule has a proven ability to improve programs after laying a strong foundation in year one. He owns a collegiate record of 59-56, but that mark improves to 51-28 when excluding his first season at Temple (2013) and Baylor (2017) and Nebraska (2023).

- At both Temple and Baylor, Rhule led his team to a school-record victory total in just his third season at the school.
- Rhule took Temple from two wins in his first season to a school-record 10 victories in both his third and fourth seasons. He then took Baylor from one win in his first season to a school-record 11 victories in his third season.
- Over his last seven collegiate seasons, Rhule has won one conference championship, three division titles and produced three years with double-digit wins.

TOOK TEMPLE TO NEW HEIGHTS

In his tenure at Temple from 2013 to 2016, Rhule took the Owls to new heights.

- In Rhule's second season in 2014, Temple posted the program's first win over an SEC team since 1938, its first win over a ranked opponent in 16 seasons and the program's largest margin of victory in nearly 50 years.
- Rhule won 10 games in both 2015 and 2016. He is responsible for two of the three 10-win seasons in Temple's 124-year history.
- He also took the Owls to back-to-back bowl games in 2015 and 2016, the first time Temple played in a bowl in consecutive seasons.
- In 2015, Rhule led Temple to the American Athletic Conference Championship Game, the first conference title game in program history.
- The next season, Rhule guided the Owls to their second conference title in program history and the first in nearly 40 years.
- Temple has spent a total of 16 weeks ranked in the 87-year history of the Associated Press top-25 poll. More than half of those top-25 rankings (9) came under Rhule in 2015 and 2016.

- Individually, linebacker Tyler Matakevich was Temple's third consensus All-American and its first in nearly 30 years. Matakevich also became the second Owl to win a major award, as he was the winner of the 2015 Chuck Bednarik Award and the Bronko Nagurski Trophy.

AN ENCORE AT BAYLOR

At Temple, Rhule led the Owls to their highest season win total in program history, their first conference championship game appearance and an impressive run in the national rankings. He produced an encore by accomplishing each of those same feats in three seasons at Baylor.

- Baylor finished with 11 losses in Rhule's first season in 2017 but two years later, he guided the Bears to 11 wins in 2019. It was a remarkable turnaround, as Baylor became the first Power Five program to go from 11 losses to 11 wins in two or fewer seasons.
- Baylor won its final two games of the 2018 season and its first nine games of the 2019 campaign. The 11 straight victories marked the second-longest winning streak in school history, while Baylor's 9-0 start in 2019 was the best start in program history.
- In 2019, Rhule led Baylor to its most wins (11) in school history, the Bears advanced to their first Big 12 Championship Game and played in the Sugar Bowl for only the second time in program history.
- Baylor finished with a No. 13 ranking in 2019, the Bears' second-highest final ranking since 1951.

2024 (REDSHIRT)

Tristan Alvano started Nebraska's first three games at place-kicker before missing the final 10 games of the season due to an injury. He went 3-of-4 on field goals and was a perfect 12-of-12 on extra points. Against UTEP, he made a 20-yard field goal while connecting on all five of his PATs. Alvano was also perfect on four extra-point tries against Colorado. He tied his career high with a pair of field goals against Northern Iowa and added three extra points to finish with a career-high nine points.

2023 (FRESHMAN)

Alvano connected on 9-of-15 field goals as a freshman and made all 27 of his PAT attempts. Alvano also had 14 touchbacks in 32 kickoffs.

In his first game at Minnesota, Alvano connected on a 27-yard field goal in his lone attempt. He was 5-of-5 on extra points against Northern Illinois. Alvano made all four of his PATs against Louisiana Tech and had two touchbacks on four kickoffs. Alvano was 2-of-3 on field goals at Illinois, and he had one touchback on two kickoffs. Alvano made a then-career-long 47-yard field goal against Northwestern.

Against Purdue, Alvano connected on a 55-yard field goal in his lone attempt. The field goal was the longest by a freshman in program history and tied for the second-longest kick overall in Nebraska history. He added a 24-yard field goal at Michigan State. Alvano connected on his fourth consecutive field goal with a 38-yarder against Maryland, and he also had three touchbacks on his three kickoffs against the Terps. Alvano made 1-of-2 field goals at Wisconsin, connecting on a 30-yarder with four seconds left that sent the game into overtime.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (OMAHA WESTSIDE HS)

Alvano was a record-breaking kicker for Omaha Westside High School. He set state all-class records for most field goals in a game and in a season, while his 27 career field goals were the most in Class A history.

Alvano made 16 field goals as a senior, the most in a season in the history of Nebraska high school football, regardless of class. He kicked five field goals, including a 50-yarder and a 45-yard game-winner as time expired, in Westside's state championship victory over Gretna. His five field goals were the most in any state playoff game in Nebraska history and tied for the most field goals in any high school game in state history. Alvano scored 118 points as a senior, the most points by a kicker in state history. As a junior, he was 11-of-14 on field goals and was named a second-team junior All-American by MaxPreps.

According to MaxPreps, Alvano was also 119-of-120 in his career on extra points. He scored 200 points in his two seasons as the Warriors' kicker. He handled kickoff duties for Westside for three seasons, booting 141 touchbacks in 225 attempts, including 73 as a senior. Alvano was named to the Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska first team as both a junior and senior. He also earned a spot on the Lincoln Journal Star Super-State first team both seasons. Alvano also played soccer at Westside, which finished as the Class A state runner-up in his junior season.

Alvano was rated as a five-star prospect by Kohl's Kicking, which ranked him as the nation's No. 5 kicker.

2024 (FRESHMAN)

Jacory Barney Jr. played in all 13 games as a true freshman with four starts. He caught 55 passes for 447 yards, tying the school record for receptions by a freshman. Barney also rushed 10 times for 130 yards and three touchdowns and returned 14 kickoffs for 285 yards and three punts for nine yards. Barney led the Huskers with 55 receptions and 285 kickoff return yards. He ranked second on the team with 842 all-purpose yards, three rushing touchdowns and 447 receiving yards. Barney ranked third nationally among all FBS freshmen in receptions and according to PFF, he had the most targets of any player in the country (76) without a drop.

Barney had a 10-yard reception and returned three kickoffs for 75 yards in his Husker debut against UTEP. Barney totaled 92 all-purpose yards against Colorado. He had six catches for 29 yards, two carries for 28 yards and returned two kickoffs for 35 yards against the Buffs. He caught three passes for 29 yards against Northern Iowa and added a 10-yard touchdown run for his first career score. Barney had four catches for 25 yards against Illinois with a 26-yard kickoff return.

Barney made a big impact in Nebraska's road win at Purdue. He led the Huskers with a career-high 66 rushing yards on only four carries, including a career-long 31-yard run and a 25-yard touchdown. Barney also caught two passes for 28 yards against the Boilermakers with an eight-yard kickoff return on a squib kick, finishing the game with 102 all-purpose yards. Barney made his first career start against Rutgers and had three catches for 28 yards. He also started at Indiana and had eight catches for 32 yards. Barney also scored Nebraska's lone touchdown on a seven-yard touchdown run and returned two kickoffs for 20 yards. At Ohio State, Barney led Nebraska with seven receptions, finishing with 49 receiving yards. He had 86 yards from scrimmage against UCLA, catching four passes for 78 yards with an eight-yard rush. Barney had a career-long 40-yard reception against the Bruins. He started at USC and had two catches for nine yards, two punt returns for four yards and a 23-yard kickoff return.

Barney totaled 150 all-purpose yards in the win over Wisconsin en route to being named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week. He had a career-high and team-leading nine receptions for a career-high 85 receiving yards. Barney also had an 11-yard rush, a career-long 45-yard kickoff return and a career-long nine-yard punt return against the Badgers. Barney caught three passes for 29 yards at Iowa. In the Pinstripe Bowl, Barney had three receptions for 16 yards with a 17-yard kickoff return.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (PALMETTO HS)

Barney Jr. was a versatile performer for Coach Mike Manasco at Miami Palmetto High School. A two-way player for the Panthers, he saw time on offense at quarterback, running back and wide receiver.

As a senior, Barney caught 15 passes for 135 yards and one touchdown, according to MaxPreps. He also passed for 189 yards and three touchdowns and added 100 yards rushing with one score. As an honorable-mention all-state selection as a junior, Barney had 37 receptions for 559 yards and four touchdowns, including a 91-yard touchdown. He added 217 passing yards and 184 rushing yards with four passing touchdowns and one rushing touchdown. In his sophomore season, Barney rushed for 67 yards and threw for 124 yards with two rushing touchdowns and one passing touchdown. He helped Palmetto to the state regional finals as a sophomore and the regional semifinals as a junior.

Barney was rated as a four-star recruit by Rivals, which ranked him among the top 60 wide receivers in the country. He was also ranked among the nation's top 25 athletes by 247Sports.

Buford totaled 18 tackles and set career highs with 3.0 tackles for loss and 1.0 sack. By playing in only four games, Buford was able to use his redshirt season.

Buford made his 2023 debut at Michigan State and recorded a pair of solo tackles. He started the next week against Maryland and had five tackles with a career-high 1.5 tackles for loss, including an 11-yard sack for his first career sack. Buford started at Wisconsin and finished with a career-high 10 tackles while tying his career high with 1.5 TFLs for the second straight week. Buford recorded more than 90 tackles with five interceptions in his two seasons at Trinity Christian, which both culminated in state championships. As a senior in 2019, Buford made 40 tackles and intercepted three passes, in addition to totaling 412 receiving yards and seven touchdowns, according to MaxPreps. He was an all-district and all-state performer in each of his two seasons at Trinity Christian. Buford started for Bolingbrook as a freshman wide receiver before becoming a two-way player as a sophomore.

2024 (REDSHIRT)

Turner Corcoran started the first four games at left tackle before suffering an injury that kept him out for the remainder of the season.

2023 (JUNIOR)

Corcoran started the first seven games at left tackle in 2023 before suffering a season-ending injury. He was injured during the Northwestern game, which marked his 30th consecutive start. Corcoran's play helped Nebraska rank second in the Big Ten in rushing.

2022 (SOPHOMORE)

Corcoran started every game of the 2022 season. He started the first three games at left guard before starting the final nine games at left tackle. His work on the line helped Trey Palmer set the Nebraska single-season receiving yardage record (1,043), while Anthony Grant rushed for the most yards (915) by a Husker since 2018.

Corcoran helped Free State average 6.7 yards per carry and 37.5 points per game in 2019. Corcoran was also a first-team all-state pick as a junior, and he started for the Firebirds as a sophomore.

A four-star recruit, Corcoran was the consensus No. 1 player in Kansas and ranked among the nation's top 50 players overall. He was tabbed as the nation's No. 47 overall recruit in the 247Sports Composite rankings, while Rivals listed Corcoran as the No. 65 player in the country. He had offers from many of the nation's top programs, including Auburn, Clemson, Georgia, LSU, Michigan, Notre Dame, Ohio State and Oklahoma.

2024 (JUNIOR)

Heinrich Haarberg played in 12 games in 2024. He was Nebraska's No. 2 quarterback for all 12 regular-season games before making a position switch and starting at tight end in the Pinstripe Bowl. Haarberg was efficient as Nebraska's No. 2 quarterback while also figuring into the offense as a runner and receiver. He completed 10-of-18 passes for 101 yards, rushed 25 times for 102 yards and caught two passes for 16 yards.

Haarberg played extensively in the second half against UTEP, completing 5-of-5 passes for 35 yards and rushing two times for eight yards. He led an 80-yard touchdown drive in the fourth quarter against Northern Iowa, finishing the game 3-of-3 passing for 34 yards with three carries for seven yards and an eight-yard reception. At Purdue, Haarberg had two carries for 18 yards from his quarterback position on Nebraska's final drive. Haarberg was Nebraska's leading rusher at Indiana with 32 yards on five carries. He completed 2-of-7 passes for 32 yards and rushed four times for eight yards while replacing the injured Dylan Raiola in the fourth quarter against UCLA. Haarberg had two carries for 15 yards at USC. He carried six times for 18 yards against Wisconsin with a five-yard touchdown run that opened the scoring.

Haarberg started at tight end against Boston College in the Pinstripe Bowl and had an eight-yard reception.

2023 (SOPHOMORE)

Haarberg played in 10 games with eight starts and led the Huskers to a 5-3 record. Haarberg led Nebraska in passing yards (967), rushing yards (477), rushing touchdowns (5) and passing touchdowns (7).

Haarberg saw action in an H-back role at Minnesota, catching a 10-yard pass in the second quarter. At Colorado, he played quarterback for Nebraska's final three drives after Jeff Sims was injured. Haarberg threw for 13 yards and rushed twice for 17 yards and he led Nebraska on a 57-yard touchdown drive.

Haarberg made his first start at quarterback against Northern Illinois and accounted for 256 yards of total offense and three touchdowns. He rushed for 98 yards and one touchdown and completed 14-of-24 passes for 158 yards and two scores. Haarberg topped that effort with 264 yards of total offense against Louisiana Tech, when he became the first Husker quarterback to win his first two career starts since Tommy Armstrong Jr. in 2013. Haarberg passed for 107 yards and one touchdown against the Bulldogs and ran 19 times for 157 yards, including a career-long 72-yard touchdown run. Haarberg's 157 rushing yards tied for the highest total by a Husker quarterback since 2012.

Against No. 2 Michigan, Haarberg threw for a career-high 199 yards. Haarberg threw for 154 yards and rushed for 82 yards at Illinois, accounting for 236 total yards in the Husker victory. He accounted for 157 yards of total offense and two touchdowns against Northwestern, throwing a 44-yard touchdown pass and rushing for 72 yards and one score. Haarberg completed a career-long 73-yard touchdown pass against Purdue while tying his career high with two touchdown passes.

Haarberg threw for 129 yards and rushed for 37 yards at Michigan State, including a 43-yard carry and a five-yard touchdown run. Haarberg started against Maryland but was injured on the first drive of the second quarter and did not return. The injury kept him out of the Wisconsin and Iowa games.

2022 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Haarberg did not play in a game in 2022.

2021 (REDSHIRT)

Haarberg did not play in a game and redshirted in 2021.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (KEARNEY CATHOLIC HS)

A three-year starter for Kearney Catholic High School, Haarberg was the first in-state scholarship quarterback to sign with Nebraska since 2001. He was a 2020 Sports Illustrated All-America candidate. Haarberg enrolled at Nebraska in January of 2021.

As a senior, Haarberg completed 55 percent of his passes for 1,857 yards and 19 touchdowns, according to the Kearney Hub. He added 556 rushing yards, scored 10 touchdowns on the ground and averaged 6.0 yards per carry. For his efforts, Haarberg was named the Hub Territory 11-Man Player of the Year in addition to being an Omaha World-Herald second-team All-Nebraska honoree and a Lincoln Journal Star second-team Super-State selection. Haarberg was an honorable-mention all-state selection by both the World-Herald and Journal Star as a junior, when he threw for 1,869 yards and 23 touchdowns and ran for 426 yards and four scores. Haarberg first became Kearney Catholic's starting quarterback during his sophomore season. He also starred at the Nebraska Class C state track and field championships as a sophomore, finishing second in the 200-meter dash and the 400-meter relay and third in the 100-meter dash and high jump.

Haarberg was ranked among the nation's top 20 dual-threat quarterbacks by 247Sports. He had more than a dozen scholarship offers and chose Nebraska over Boston College.

2024 (JUNIOR)

Malcolm Hartzog Jr., an honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection, started 12 games in 2024 with seven starts at safety and five starts at cornerback. He led Nebraska with four interceptions - the most by a Husker since the 2015 season - while totaling a career-high 45 tackles with 2.0 tackles for loss and four pass breakups. Hartzog ranked 19th nationally in interceptions per game.

Against UTEP, Hartzog tied for the team lead with five tackles and intercepted the fourth pass of his career. Hartzog recorded three tackles and broke up a pass against Colorado. He intercepted his second pass of the season against Northern Iowa and added two tackles against the Panthers. Hartzog had four tackles against Illinois. He recorded four solo tackles and one pass breakup at Purdue. Hartzog finished with four tackles against Rutgers, including stopping a fake field goal attempt along with Ceyair Wright. Hartzog had three tackles at Indiana with one interception and one pass breakup. He missed the UCLA game with an injury. Hartzog returned to start at cornerback at USC and tied his career high with six tackles and had one pass breakup. Hartzog started at cornerback against Wisconsin and had five tackles, one shy of his career high. He also totaled five tackles at Iowa with a career-high 2.0 tackles for loss. In the Pinstripe Bowl against Boston College, Hartzog totaled two tackles.

Hartzog wore the No. 7 after he was one of 10 Huskers to win a team vote to wear a single-digit number.

2023 (SOPHOMORE)

Hartzog played in all 12 games with 10 starts as a sophomore, with seven starts at cornerback and three at safety. Hartzog set career highs with 40 tackles, 1.5 tackles for loss and six pass breakups. He was a key member of a Blackshirt unit that posted Nebraska's best rushing defense (92.9 yards per game), total defense (303.5 yards per game) and scoring defense (18.3 points per game) since the Huskers joined the Big Ten in 2011. NU ranked in the top 20 nationally in each of those three categories. Hartzog made at least four tackles in seven games.

Hartzog made four tackles at Minnesota in the opener and tied his career highs in tackles for loss (1.0) and pass breakups (1). Hartzog had a career-high six tackles at Colorado. He recorded four tackles against Northern Illinois. Against Michigan, Hartzog had four tackles and a pass breakup. He started at safety at Illinois and again had four tackles and a breakup.

Hartzog again started at safety against Northwestern and finished with five tackles and one pass breakup, his fourth consecutive game with a breakup. Hartzog started at safety at Michigan State and totaled four solo tackles and one pass breakup. Hartzog started at corner against Maryland and recorded three solo stops.

2022 (FRESHMAN)

Hartzog played in every game as a true freshman with eight starts. He led Nebraska with three interceptions while totaling 22 tackles, 1.0 tackle for loss and two pass breakups. Hartzog's efforts as a freshman earned him recognition as Nebraska's Freshman Male Athlete of the Year across all sports.

Hartzog played on special teams in the first three games before making his debut on defense against No. 6 Oklahoma. Hartzog earned the start at cornerback against Indiana, becoming NU's first true freshman to start at corner since 2016. Hartzog broke up a pass against the Hoosiers and returned a blocked punt 30 yards for a touchdown to earn Big Ten Freshman of the Week.

At Rutgers, Hartzog posted his first three career tackles and intercepted a pass on Rutgers' final offensive play to preserve a Husker victory. He posted an identical stat line the next week at Purdue with three more tackles and another interception.

Against Illinois, Hartzog had a season-high four tackles. He matched that total with four more tackles the next week against Minnesota. He made three tackles at No. 3 Michigan with a pass breakup. Hartzog had four tackles, 1.0 TFL and an interception that set up a touchdown against Wisconsin.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (JEFFERSON DAVIS COUNTY HS)

Hartzog was the first Mississippi native to sign with Nebraska since 2014 and was the Huskers' first scholarship recruit from the Mississippi high school ranks since 2004. Hartzog was a standout on offense, defense and special teams for Jefferson Davis County High School.

Hartzog helped the Jaguars to a state championship as a senior, when he was named Class 3A Mr. Football. A cornerback, running back and returner, he rushed for 131 yards and a pair of touchdowns in the state final and also had an interception and a pass breakup. On the season, Hartzog had more than 10 passes defended. He also rushed for more than 1,200 yards and accounted for 44 total touchdowns.

Hartzog was regarded as a three-star recruit by Rivals and 247Sports, and he was the MVP of the Mississippi/Alabama All-Star game after recording nine tackles and an interception. He chose Nebraska after also considering Ole Miss, South Alabama and Southern Miss.

Malcolm was born on Dec. 17, 2003, and he is the son of Cecile Herrion-Oatis and Derrick Oatis. He is majoring in advertising and public relations and was a 2023 Academic All-Big Ten selection.

2024 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

John Hohl played in all 13 games in 2024 with 10 starts at place-kicker. He made 10-of-15 field goals while going 23-of-25 on extra points. He also had five touchbacks on 17 kickoffs. Hohl tied a Nebraska record with a 54-yard field goal at Ohio State, tying for the longest field goal in an away game in school history. Hohl ended the season making nine of his final 10 field goals.

Hohl had two touchbacks against UTEP while helping limit the Miners to an average of just 16.0 yards on three kickoff returns. Hohl kicked off twice against Colorado and made one tackle. He kicked off three times against Northern Iowa with one touchback, while the two returned kicks totaled only 10 yards. Hohl also attempted and made the first extra point of his career against the Panthers. Hohl started against Illinois and made a 21-yard field goal and all four of his extra-point tries. He also started at Purdue and made a career-high four PATs. He made two extra points against Rutgers and had two touchbacks on three kickoffs. Hohl made his lone extra point try at Indiana and kicked off twice.

At Ohio State, Hohl was 3-of-3 on field goals. He made a 39-yard field goal in the first quarter that was the longest kick of his career at the time. On the final play of the first half, Hohl connected on a career-long 54-yard field goal that tied the school record for the longest field goal in an opposing stadium. Hohl also added a 47-yard field goal in the third quarter. Against UCLA, Hohl made two extra points. He connected on field goals from 29 and 30 yards at USC, extending his streak to five consecutive made field goals. Hohl extended the streak to eight consecutive made field goals with a 3-for-3 performance against Wisconsin. He also went 5-of-5 on extra points against the Badgers to finish with a career-high 14 points. Hohl went 1-of-2 on field goals at Iowa, making his first attempt to connect on his ninth consecutive field goal. Hohl made two extra points in the Pinstripe Bowl victory over Boston College.

Hohl redshirted in his lone season at Iowa Western in 2023 before transferring to Nebraska. Ranked as the top transfer kicker at a Kohl's Kicking showcase in the spring of 2024, Hohl chose to join the Huskers after also receiving interest from Coastal Carolina.

At Lincoln Southwest High School, Hohl saw action at both place-kicker and punter. In his senior season, Hohl made all three of his field goal attempts and was a perfect 18-of-18 on extra points.

2024 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Kwinten Ives played in nine games in 2024 and had six carries for seven yards and one touchdown with three kickoff returns for 58 yards. Ives had three carries for four yards against UTEP. He carried twice for one yard at Indiana and had a 40-yard kickoff return. Ives had an 18-yard kickoff return against UCLA. Ives had a two-yard touchdown run in the Pinstripe Bowl against Boston College for his first career score.

2023 (REDSHIRT)

Ives redshirted in 2023 but played in four games as a true freshman. He made his debut against Northwestern but did not have a carry. Ives served as a kick returner in the final three games, and had a 23-yard kickoff return at Wisconsin.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (PALMYRA HS)

Ives was a standout for Palmyra High School in New Jersey, where he was one of the top running backs on the East Coast. Ives ran for 3,055 yards and scored 49 touchdowns in his junior and senior seasons combined, according to NJ.com. He averaged 10.1 yards per carry and 160.8 yards per game over his final two seasons, and had at least 100 rushing yards in each of his final 14 prep games.

As a senior, Ives ran for 1,617 yards and 26 touchdowns on 157 carries. He averaged 10.3 yards per carry and had at least 100 rushing yards in all nine games including three 200-yard efforts. Ives also caught 15 passes for 240 yards and three touchdowns and had a 79-yard kickoff return for a touchdown on his lone return of the season. He began his senior season with a 50-yard touchdown on his first carry and a 57-yard touchdown on his second carry of the season.

Ives carried 146 times for 1,438 yards and 16 touchdowns as a junior. He had seven 100-yard rushing games with three 200-yard rushing performances. Ives rushed for at least 148 yards in each of the season's final five games, and he averaged 9.8 yards per carry for the season. Ives also caught seven passes for 225 yards and three touchdowns – averaging 32.1 yards per reception – with a 28-yard punt return. Ives also played on the varsity team as a freshman and sophomore.

Ives also starred in basketball and track and field. Ives scored more than 1,200 career points with more than 600 rebounds, averaging 15.4 points and 8.4 rebounds per game. In track and field, Ives was a two-time Burlington County divisional champion in the 100 meters, including winning the title as a senior. As a junior, he finished second at the county championships in the long jump and was fourth in the 100 meters. As a sophomore, he won the divisional title in the 100 meters, the 200 meters and the long jump while finishing second in the triple jump.

Ives was among the nation's top 40 running backs and the top 10 players in New Jersey. He also had scholarship offers from Temple and UConn, among others.

2024 (JUNIOR)

Elijah Jeudy played in all 13 games in 2024 with one start, totaling career highs of 13 tackles and 2.0 tackles for loss. He had a half TFL in the season opener against UTEP. Jeudy recorded a solo tackle against Northern Iowa. He made another solo tackle at Purdue. Jeudy finished with two tackles against Rutgers, including a 1-yard TFL. He recorded one solo tackle at Ohio State and Jeudy was a lead blocker on Nebraska's 1-yard touchdown run that gave the Huskers a fourth-quarter lead. 2024 (SOPHOMORE)

Emmett Johnson played in all 13 games in 2024 with five starts. He ranked second on the team with 117 carries and 598 rushing yards and led Nebraska with 908 all-purpose yards. Johnson added 39 catches for 286 yards and two touchdowns, setting career highs in each of those categories. His 39 receptions were the most by a Husker running back since the 2007 season.

Johnson had eight carries for 72 yards against UTEP, leading the Huskers in rushing. Johnson had a career-long 42-yard run against the Miners. He also had a five-yard catch. Johnson had a three-yard carry against Colorado. Against Northern Iowa, Johnson had four carries for 50 yards, including a 36-yard touchdown run. He also had three catches for 43 yards, finishing with 93 scrimmage yards against the Panthers on only seven touches. Johnson had eight carries for 50 yards at Purdue while adding three catches for 49 yards.

Johnson made his first start of the season against Rutgers and had 14 carries for 33 yards with a seven-yard reception. He rushed eight times for 24 yards at Indiana, caught three passes for six yards and had two kickoff returns for 24 yards. At Ohio State, Johnson gained 30 yards on eight carries and had four receptions. He had seven carries for 23 yards with a seven-yard reception against UCLA. Johnson started at USC and led Nebraska with 55 rushing yards on 10 carries. He also led NU with a career-high seven receptions, finishing with 36 receiving yards including a 29-yard touchdown for his first career receiving touchdown.

Johnson had a career game in the win over Wisconsin, posting the first 100-yard rushing game of his career. Johnson had 16 carries for 113 yards against the Badgers, the first 100-yard rushing game by a Nebraska running back in 19 games. He also caught six passes for a career-high 85 receiving yards against the Badgers. Johnson made his third straight start at Iowa and had 71 rushing yards on 18 carries while catching six passes for 25 yards, leading Nebraska in receptions. Johnson accounted for 99 yards from scrimmage in the Pinstripe Bowl against Boston College. He had 15 carries for 75 yards and caught four passes for 24 yards, including a 13-yard touchdown.

2023 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Johnson played in 12 games in 2023 and started six of the final seven contests. He had 90 carries for 411 yards and two touchdowns to help Nebraska rank second in the Big Ten in rushing. He also caught seven passes for 46 yards and returned one kickoff for 15 yards.

Johnson had two carries for six yards against Louisiana Tech. He rushed for nine yards and caught two passes for 20 yards against No. 2 Michigan. He started his first game at Illinois and totaled seven carries for 29 yards.

Johnson started against Northwestern and had 12 carries for 73 yards. In his third consecutive start against Purdue, he set then-career highs in carries and rushing yards for a third straight game with 13 carries for 76 yards. He scored on a 28-yard fourth-quarter touchdown that marked the longest run of his career and his first career touchdown. Johnson set career highs with 17 carries and 84 rushing yards in a start against Maryland. He had 13 carries for 50 yards in his start at Wisconsin. Johnson had 11 carries for 27 yards against Iowa, and he also caught an 11-yard pass.

2022 (REDSHIRT)

Johnson played in four games while utilizing his redshirt season. He played on special teams against Illinois, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Iowa.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (ACADEMY OF HOLY ANGELS)

Johnson was the top high school player in Minnesota as a star running back and two-way player for the Academy of Holy Angels. He was named Mr. Football by the Minnesota Football Coaches Association in 2021.

Johnson rushed for more than 2,500 yards and scored 42 touchdowns as a senior. He had at least 100 rushing yards in all 11 games, including seven 200-yard rushing efforts. Johnson also had eight four-touchdown games and accounted for more than 2,800 all-purpose yards. As a junior, Johnson carried 174 times for 1,521 yards and 12 touchdowns.

He ran for nearly 5,000 career yards and totaled nearly 6,000 all-purpose yards with more than 130 tackles on defense. He was a two-time District MVP, three-time all-district selection, two-time all-metro pick and an all-state honoree. Johnson was named the Offensive MVP for the South team in the Minnesota High School All-Star Game following his senior season.

2024 (SOPHOMORE)

Cameron Lenhardt played in all 13 games in 2024 with two starts. He totaled 16 tackles with 3.0 tackles for loss and a half sack.

Lenhardt had a half tackle for loss in the opener against UTEP. He finished with three tackles, including 1.5 TFLs and a half sack against Colorado. Lenhardt started against Northern Iowa and recorded three tackles. He recorded one tackle against Illinois. Lenhardt made two tackles at Purdue. He had a quarterback hurry against Rutgers. He recorded one solo tackle at Ohio State. Lenhardt had one solo tackle at USC. In the Pinstripe Bowl, Lenhardt started and recorded three tackles, including a three-yard TFL.

2023 (FRESHMAN)

Lenhardt played in 10 games with four starts as a true freshman, missing two games due to injury. Lenhardt recorded 16 tackles with 5.0 tackles for loss and 3.0 sacks.

Lenhardt became the first Husker true freshman to have multiple sacks in a game since Barry Turner in 2005.

He was injured early against Northern Illinois and the injury kept him out of the following two games. He returned to action at Illinois, and then tied his career high with three tackles against Northwestern with a four-yard tackle for loss. He had a career-high four tackles at Michigan State with 1.5 TFLs and an eight-yard sack. Lenhardt made his fourth start of the season against Maryland, and had two tackles with a half tackle for loss at Wisconsin.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (IMG ACADEMY)

Lenhardt was one of the most coveted defensive line recruits in the nation as a high school All-American at IMG Academy in Florida. Lenhardt played his first two seasons for Don Bosco Prep in New Jersey.

Lenhardt helped IMG Academy to a stellar defensive season as a senior, when he recorded 21 tackles with 7.0 tackles for loss. IMG recorded 30 takeaways in his final season and gave up only 32.8 rushing yards per game and 96.4 passing yards per game. IMG allowed only 2.1 yards per rush and 3.7 yards per pass. Lenhardt played his freshman and sophomore seasons at Don Bosco Prep in New Jersey. He played on the varsity both seasons and recorded five sacks.

Lenhardt was selected to play in the 2023 Under Armour All-America Game. A four-star prospect, Lenhardt was ranked among the top 150 recruits in the country by ESPN, which tabbed him as the No. 17 edge recruit in the country. He had offers from numerous top programs but chose Nebraska over fellow finalists Michigan State and Penn State.

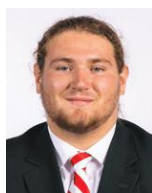
Lutosky was rated as the nation's No. 13 offensive guard by Rivals. He chose Nebraska over Georgia, Iowa State and Missouri, among others.

2024 (FRESHMAN)

Carter Nelson played in all 13 games as a true freshman in 2024. He caught 10 passes for 86 yards and one touchdown.

Nelson caught three passes for 21 yards in his debut against UTEP. He did not have a catch against Colorado but set career highs with four receptions and 48 receiving yards against Northern Iowa. He caught a 24-yard touchdown pass on Nebraska's opening drive for his first career touchdown. Nelson's next catch was a six-yard reception at Purdue. He had two catches for 11 yards to end the regular season at Iowa.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (AINSWORTH HS)

The consensus choice as the top prospect in the state of Nebraska, Nelson excelled as a playmaker at Ainsworth High School for Coach Jessiah Owen. Nelson finished his prep career with 128 catches for 2,346 yards and 43 receiving touchdowns and was selected to play in the All-American Bowl as one of the top recruits in the country.

Nelson earned first-team All-Nebraska recognition from the Omaha World-Herald and first-team Super-State honors from the Lincoln Journal Star as a senior, while being the honorary captain of the Class D-2 all-state team by both publications. He caught 32 passes for 658 yards and 14 touchdowns, averaging nearly 21 yards per catch. Nelson also rushed for 1,148 yards and 19 touchdowns on 120 carries and made 80 tackles with three interceptions on defense, helping Ainsworth to a 9-1 record and a state playoff berth.

Nelson was a second-team All-Nebraska selection as a junior when he helped his team to a 9-1 record and the state playoffs. Nelson had 32 catches for 641 yards and 13 touchdowns and rushed for 789 yards and 14 touchdowns. He also played quarterback and threw for 720 yards and 16 touchdowns. On defense, Nelson had 53 tackles and six interceptions.

He played varsity as both a sophomore and freshman, combining for 64 catches for more than 1,000 yards and 16 touchdowns in those two seasons. He also made 34 tackles in each of those seasons.

Away from the football field, Nelson was also a successful basketball and track athlete. He earned honorable-mention all-state recognition in basketball as a junior while averaging 12.5 points and 7.4 rebounds per game. Nelson was a first-team all-state selection as a senior, when he averaged 16.2 points, 8.2 rebounds, 5.4 assists and 3.1 blocks per game while helping Ainsworth reach the state final. In track, Nelson won the Class D state high jump as a sophomore with a leap of 6-10, and he followed up by finishing fourth as a junior. He also finished fifth in the state in the pole vault and qualified for state in the discus and the 4x100 relay as a junior. In his senior season, Nelson won the Class C long jump and finished third in the 200 meters.

Nelson was ranked as a composite top 100 overall prospect in the nation and was the No. 1 player in Nebraska by all major recruiting outlets. He was ranked among the nation's top 10 tight ends, including No. 2 by both 247 Sports and Rivals.com. Nelson was selected to participate in the All-American Bowl in San Antonio.

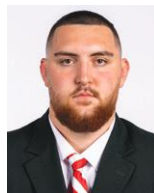

Teddy Prochazka suffered a season-ending injury during fall camp and missed the entire 2024 season.

2023 (SOPHOMORE)

Prochazka was slowed early in the season while rehabbing from an injury. He played in each of the final 10 games with six starts, including the final five games at left tackle. Prochazka made his season debut against Northern Illinois. He started his first game of the season at Illinois, when Nebraska opened with six offensive linemen. The play of Prochazka helped Nebraska post the No. 2 rushing offense in the Big Ten.

2022 (REDSHIRT)

Prochazka started the first three games at left tackle in 2022. He suffered an injury in the Georgia Southern game that kept him out for the rest of the season.

One of the top 75 prospects in the country, Prochazka was a 2020 Sports Illustrated All-America candidate. He was a dominant two-way performer for Elkhorn South High School.

Prochazka was a three-year starter on offense and two-year starter on defense. As a senior, he helped Elkhorn South to a state runner-up finish when he was named to the Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska and Lincoln Journal Star Super-State first teams. Prochazka was one of the most decorated Nebraska high school players during his career, as he was also an All-Nebraska first-team selection in 2019, one of only five juniors to make the team. He was also named a first-team Super-State selection by the Lincoln Journal Star as a junior and was a second-team Super-State pick as a sophomore.

Prochazka was ranked among the nation's top 75 recruits by Rivals, which regarded him as the 11th-best offensive tackle in the country and the No. 73 player overall. 2024 (FRESHMAN)

A semifinalist for the Shaun Alexander Freshman of the Year award, Dylan Raiola won Nebraska's starting quarterback competition and started all 13 games as a true freshman. Raiola completed more than 67 percent of his passes (275-of-410) while throwing for 2,819 yards and 13 touchdowns. Raiola threw for the most yards by a freshman in program history and had the best completion percentage by a freshman in school history. Overall, Raiola ranked third on Nebraska's season completion percentage chart and seventh on NU's season passing yards list.

Raiola led all FBS freshmen and ranked 14th nationally in completion percentage in 2024. He also led all true freshman and ranked third among all freshmen in passing yards.

In his debut against UTEP, Raiola completed 19-of-27 passes for 238 yards and two touchdowns in less than three quarters of action. Just the second true freshman quarterback to start a Nebraska season opener since World War II, Raiola led the Huskers on eight drives against the Miners. Nebraska scored touchdowns on five of his eight drives and punted just once. The Huskers scored a touchdown on each of Raiola's final four drives against UTEP. For his performance, Raiola was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week, the first Husker offensive player to win that award since 2019.

Raiola completed 23-of-30 passes against Colorado for 185 yards and one touchdown. He completed 17-of-23 passes for 247 yards and two touchdowns against Northern Iowa, becoming the first Husker quarterback since 1980 to have a 70 percent completion rate in three consecutive starts. Raiola had 24 completions for a career-high 297 passing yards and three touchdowns in his Big Ten debut against No. 24 Illinois. In the first road game of his career, Raiola completed 17-of-27 passes and threw for 257 yards and one touchdown at Purdue. He led nine drives against the Boilermakers with each drive crossing into Purdue territory. Raiola led Nebraska to a touchdown on each of his three second-half drives.

Raiola completed 13-of-27 passes for 134 yards in Nebraska's win over Rutgers. He threw for 234 yards on a career-high 44 passes at Indiana. Raiola completed 21-of-32 passes for 152 yards at Ohio State. He also added a career-high 31 rushing yards against the Buckeyes with a career-long 38-yard scramble. Raiola completed 14-of-27 passes for 177 yards and one touchdown against UCLA before leaving the game in the fourth quarter with an injury. Raiola returned to play the entire game at USC, completing 71 percent of his passes (27-of-38) for 191 yards and one touchdown.

In the win over Wisconsin, Raiola threw for 293 yards and one touchdown while completing 28-of-38 passes. Raiola completed 22-of-32 passes for 190 yards at Iowa. He did not throw an interception against the Hawkeyes, marking the only time all season Iowa did not record an interception. In the Pinstripe Bowl, Raiola became the first true freshman to lead Nebraska to a bowl victory. He completed 22-of-30 passes for 224 yards and one touchdown in the win over Boston College.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (BUFORD HS)

Raiola joined Nebraska as the top quarterback recruit in the country. He began his prep career in Texas and Arizona before playing his senior season for Buford High School in Georgia. In his prep career, Raiola passed for nearly 8,500 career yards with 88 touchdowns and only 11 interceptions, according to MaxPreps.

As a senior at Buford, Raiola helped the Wolves to an 11-2 record and the quarterfinals of the state playoffs. He completed 63 percent of his

passes, throwing for 2,666 yards. Raiola threw 34 touchdowns and had just one interception. Raiola played his junior season at Chandler High School in Arizona, where he led the Wolves to the semifinals of the open division state playoffs. He threw for 2,435 yards and 22 touchdowns at Chandler, completing 64 percent of his passes. As a sophomore at Burseson High School in Texas, Raiola completed 65 percent of his passes and threw for 3,341 with 32 touchdowns, and he added nine rushing touchdowns. Raiola was the county and district player of the year.

Raiola was rated as the top quarterback prospect in the country by 247Sports, ESPN and Rivals. Each organization also had him ranked among the top 10 overall recruits nationally, including 247Sports and Rivals which each tabbed him as the No. 2 overall recruit in the 2024 class.

PERSONAL

Dylan was born on May 9, 2005, and he is the son of Dominic and Yvonne Raiola. Dominic Raiola was a center at Nebraska from 1997 to 2000. Dominic was a redshirt on the Huskers' 1997 national championship team and in 2000, he was a first-team All-American and the Rimington Trophy winner as the nation's top center. Dominic's No. 54 jersey is retired at Nebraska. He went on to play 14 seasons in the National Football League with more than 200 career starts, becoming the second player in Detroit Lions history to play in 200 games and the first non-kicker.

Dylan's uncle, Donovan, is Nebraska's offensive line coach.

DeShon Singleton returned from a season-ending injury in 2023 to start all 13 games in 2024. He recorded a career-high 71 tackles - ranking second on the team in tackles - with 1.0 tackle for loss, a career-high three pass breakups, one interception and one fumble recovery.

2024 (JUNIOR)

Javin Wright dealt with a health issue in August and September but returned to play in nine games with one start in 2024. He totaled 34 tackles and 1.0 tackle for loss with one pass breakup.

Wright made his season debut in the fifth game of the year at Purdue and posted three tackles. Wright then recorded four tackles against Rutgers. He also had four tackles at Indiana. Wright had a 7-yard tackle for loss at Ohio State. He recorded four tackles against UCLA. Wright made three stops at USC. He finished with five tackles in the win against Wisconsin. Wright started his first game of the season at Iowa and had two tackles. In the Pinstripe Bowl victory over Boston College, Wright led Nebraska with career-high-tying eight tackles, including a half tackle for loss.

2023 (SOPHOMORE)

Wright played in 12 games with one start at linebacker in 2023. In addition to his 51 tackles, Wright contributed two interceptions, two pass breakups, 1.5 tackles for loss, 0.5 sacks and one forced fumble. He was a key member of a defense that posted Nebraska's best rushing defense (92.9 yards per game), total defense (303.5 yards per game) and scoring defense (18.3 points per game) since the Huskers joined the Big Ten in 2011. NU ranked in the top 20 nationally in each of those three categories.

Wright had a then-career-high four tackles in the season opener at Minnesota. He recorded four more tackles against Northern Illinois while intercepting a pass that set up a 35-yard touchdown drive. Wright made five tackles against Louisiana Tech, and he also broke up the first pass of his career.

Against No. 2 Michigan, Wright totaled seven tackles with a pass breakup for the second straight game. Wright made four tackles at Illinois. He also had four tackles against Northwestern, including a half tackle for loss. Wright finished with five tackles at Michigan State. He totaled a career-high eight tackles against Maryland with an interception and a forced fumble that resulted in a Husker takeaway. Wright started his first game of the season at Wisconsin and had six tackles. Against Iowa, Wright posted three tackles, including a half sack.

2022 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Wright played in 10 games in 2022 with one start, seeing action on defense and special teams. He made an impact in the win over North Dakota with a blocked punt, the first of his career. Wright saw his playing time on defense increase as the season progressed. He made two tackles against Illinois and had one tackle against Minnesota.

Wright earned his first career start at No. 3 Michigan and tied his career high with two tackles. He played extensively at nickel against Wisconsin and recorded one tackle. He again saw extensive playing time at Iowa and finished with two tackles.

2021 (MEDICAL HARDSHIP)

Wright played in two games in 2021. He made his Husker debut against Fordham, recording his first career tackle. Wright also played against Buffalo.

Wright suffered a preseason injury and missed the entire year.

Wright redshirted in his first season at Nebraska. He earned playing time as a true freshman by making his Husker debut on special teams at Illinois, and he also was on the travel roster for the Colorado game.

As a senior, Wright made 18 tackles, had an interception and a pair of pass breakups before his season was cut short by injury. During his junior season, Wright helped Hamilton to an 8-4 record and a trip to the 6A playoffs. Wright made 41 tackles from his defensive back spot, while adding an interception, seven pass breakups and two tackles for loss. Wright first made an impact on defense as a sophomore, when he had 52 tackles, 12 breakups and an interception, helping his team to a 7-4 record.

Wright was ranked among the top 15 prospects in the state of Arizona and among the top 70 cornerbacks in the nation in the 247Sports Composite rankings. Wright also visited UCLA before choosing Nebraska, and had offers from Arizona, Arizona State, Oregon, Syracuse and Washington among others.

Simpson was a first-team all-state selection as a senior. In two seasons at Galveston Ball High School, Simpson totaled 58 tackles, 16 tackles for loss, seven sacks, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

Simpson was rated as a four-star recruit. On3 listed him as the nation's No. 9 defensive lineman and No. 98 overall recruit.

Kade Pietrzak was a state champion and the top player in the state for Sheyenne High School in North Dakota. Pietrzak helped the Mustangs to a pair of state championships during his career.

As a senior, Pietrzak was the 2024 MaxPreps North Dakota High School Football Player of the Year and Class 3A Senior Athlete of the Year. He helped Sheyenne High to a state championship playing on both the offense and defensive lines. Pietrzak totaled 58 tackles, 26 TFLs and five sacks as a senior. During his junior year, Pietrzak logged 72 tackles, 19 tackles for loss and two sacks. He earned first-team all-state honors for his performance as a junior.

A four-star recruit, Pietrzak was the consensus choice as the No. 1 player in North Dakota. He was listed as one of the nation's top 200 players by On3, which also ranked Pietrzak as the No. 24 defensive line prospect in the country.



BRIAN TAPU

Brian Tapu was a dominant offensive lineman for Salt Lake City West High School. He played only one season of high school football after moving from New Zealand in 2023. At West High School, Tapu was coached by Toniu Fonoti, an All-American Husker lineman who is a member of the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame.

In his lone season at West High School, Tapu helped the Panthers to average nearly 35 points per game. The line led the way for an offense that averaged 325 passing yards and 285 rushing yards per game.

Before coming to the United States, Tapu played basketball and netball in New Zealand.

Tapu was a three-star recruit who was regarded as one of the top 10 recruits in Utah. Rivals ranked Tapu as one of the top 65 offensive tackle prospects in the country.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (HERITAGE HS)

Tanner Terch was a two-way standout at Heritage High School in Colorado. The top recruit in the state, Terch was a star wideout and defensive back. As a receiver, Terch had 120 receptions and 2,356 receiving yards in his career with 30 total touchdowns.

Terch, who helped Heritage to three straight playoff appearances, totaled 1,312 receiving yards and 16 touchdowns in 13 games as a senior in 2024, averaging more than 100 receiving yards per game. He also rushed for 142 yards and four touchdowns while posting 30 tackles with two pass breakups. Terch was a first-team all-state selection in his senior season. As a junior, Terch was an all-state honoree after he caught 55 passes for 876 receiving yards and eight touchdowns. He also added two rushing touchdowns on just four carries. Terch had seven catches for 168 yards as a sophomore with two touchdown catches.

A three-sport athlete, Terch also played basketball and ran track, clocking personal-best times of 10.93 in the 100 meters and 23.03 in the 200 meters.

A consensus three-star recruit, Terch was recognized as the top player in Colorado by both ESPN and 247Sports.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (MILLARD NORTH HS)

Caden VerMaas was a standout at Millard North High School. With the Mustangs, he excelled in the secondary, as an offensive weapon and as a kick returner. VerMaas finished his high school career with 93 tackles, five interceptions and four forced fumbles. He also totaled better than 3,600 all-purpose yards and 46 career touchdowns.

VerMaas recorded 32 tackles on defense and produced 1,408 all-purpose yards during his senior season, including 857 rushing yards and nine touchdowns on the ground. He also caught 16 passes for 420 yards and five touchdowns, averaging better than 26 yards per catch. His play helped the Mustangs to a 6-5 record and a trip to the Class A state quarterfinals. VerMaas was a first-team Lincoln Journal Star Super-State selection as a senior, and he also earned a spot on the Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska second team.

As a junior, VerMaas was also a versatile two-way performer, making 19 tackles while rushing for 764 yards and 16 touchdowns and catching nine passes. He added 187 yards on kickoff returns and was an honorable-mention all-state selection. VerMaas made a strong impact for the Mustangs as a sophomore with 34 tackles, 665 rushing yards and eight rushing touchdowns, while adding one receiving touchdown.

VerMaas was ranked as the No. 3 player in Nebraska and among the nation's top 25 safeties by ESPN.



TYSON TERRY

6-3 | 305 | OMAHA, NEB.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (NORTH HS)

A dominant two-sport star at Omaha North High School, Tyson Terry was a standout defender who amassed more than 300 career tackles. Terry also won four straight state championships on the wrestling mat.

Terry finished his career with 315 tackles, including 48 tackles for loss, 17 sacks, five pass breakups, a pair of blocked field goals and a touchdown. He missed the majority of his senior year with an injury but managed to make 46 tackles, including nine tackles for loss and two sacks. His play helped the Vikings to a 9-3 record and a trip to the state semifinals. Terry had a breakout freshman season when he had 85 tackles and 12 tackles for loss.

Terry helped North to the state playoffs each season, including the semifinals as a freshman and senior and the quarterfinals as a junior. Terry was a three-time first-team Super-State pick by the Lincoln Journal Star and a two-time Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska selection.

Terry was also one of the nation's top prep wrestlers, capturing four consecutive Class A state heavyweight championships without losing a match. He finished his high school career with a 169-0, setting a Nebraska Class A record for consecutive victories. Terry was also the first wrestler in state history to be a four-time state champion at the heavyweight decision, and he won his final title as a senior despite wrestling with a torn ACL.

Terry was regarded as one of the top three players in Nebraska and was ranked among the top 25 defensive linemen in the country by Rivals.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (RIDGE POINT HS)

Bryson Webber was a standout defensive back for Ridge Point High School in Texas. A terrific cover cornerback, Webber allowed only one completion over his final two seasons.

Webber recorded 10 tackles, an interception and two pass breakups while not allowing a reception as a senior. As a junior, Webber tallied 22 tackles, two tackles for loss, two interceptions, four pass breakups and allowed only one catch on the season. He was an all-district selection for Ridge Point.

Webber also ran track, where he ran a 10.5 in the 100-meter dash and was a member of the 4x100 and 4x200 teams that were ranked in the top 10 nationally.

ESPN listed Webber as a four-star cornerback and regarded him as the No. 23 cornerback nationally and the No. 195 overall prospect nationally.

Bryson's stepdad, Gareon Conley, was a cornerback at Ohio State, while his father, Montre Webber, was a wide receiver at Texas.

2024 (SENIOR)

Jahmal Banks played in 13 games with 10 starts in his lone season at Nebraska. He led the Huskers with 587 receiving yards and ranked second with 44 catches and three receiving touchdowns.

Banks caught six passes for 61 yards against UTEP, including a 21-yard touchdown with two seconds left in the first half. Banks had two catches against Colorado. He had a 13-yard reception against Northern Iowa. Banks set a career high with eight catches in his Big Ten debut against Illinois, finishing with 94 receiving yards. At Purdue, Banks led Nebraska with five catches, 82 receiving yards and one touchdown. Banks had a season-long 31-yard reception against Rutgers. He caught two passes for 33 yards at Indiana. Banks had two receptions totaling 31 yards at Ohio State. He had two more catches for 13 yards against UCLA. Banks had five catches for a team-high 55 yards at USC. He caught four passes for 52 yards against Wisconsin, including a five-yard touchdown. Banks had four receptions for 41 yards at Iowa. In the final game of his collegiate career, Banks caught four passes for 79 yards in the Pinstripe Bowl win over Boston College.

Banks wore the No. 4 after he was one of 10 Huskers to win a team vote to wear a single-digit number.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

(ST. FRANCES ACADEMY/WAKE FOREST)

Banks played in every game with 10 starts for Wake Forest in 2023 and finished the year with 59 receptions for a team-high 653 yards. Banks caught four touchdown passes to tie for the team lead and ranked fifth in the ACC in receptions per game. Banks had a season-high 108 receiving yards on six catches against Elon. He added eight catches for 81 yards and a touchdown against Old Dominion and closed the season with seven catches for 90 yards and a touchdown against Syracuse. Banks had seven games with at least 50 receiving yards in 2023.

Banks earned honorable-mention All-ACC honors in 2022, when he helped the Demon Deacons to an 8-5 record. He played in all 13 games and had 42 catches for 636 yards and nine touchdowns. His nine TD catches tied for the sixth most in program history. Banks had a career game against No. 5 Clemson when he had six catches for a career-high 141 yards and two touchdowns. He also had multiple TDs in wins over Liberty and Boston College and had seven receptions against the Eagles. Banks had the highest contested catch rate (58.6 percent) of any receiver in the ACC and ranked fifth among Power Five conference receivers.

Banks played in 14 games in 2021 as Wake Forest won the ACC Atlantic Division. He had five catches for 98 yards, including three receptions for 63 yards against Duke. Banks played in six games in his first year at Wake in 2020, and made his first career catch against Campbell.

Banks starred at St. Frances Academy, helping the Panthers to a No. 4 national ranking according to USA Today. His school posted a 44-3 record during his four years, including an 11-1 mark in 2019. Banks was a two-time first-team all-conference selection and had 91 tackles and 36 tackles for loss, along with nine sacks. He earned team MVP honors and was also the MVP of the school's basketball team.

PERSONAL

Jahmal is the son of Kristie Martin, and he was born on Oct. 2, 2001. His sister, Kyerra Martin, played volleyball at Bowie State. He completed his degree work at Wake Forest in communication and is took graduate classes at Nebraska. Banks participated in numerous outreach activities, including the NoFilter Service Trip to Panama in May.

2024 (SENIOR)

An honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection, Bryce Benhart started all 13 games at right tackle in his final season. He made the 42nd start of his career against UTEP, breaking a tie for the most starts by an offensive lineman in program history. Benhart started the 50th game of his career against UCLA, becoming only the fifth Husker - and second non-kicker - to start 50 games. The UCLA game also marked the 56th game played of Benhart's career, which tied the Nebraska record for games played. He broke the record with a start at USC.

Benhart broke the school record for career starts with his 54th start against Boston College in the Pinstripe Bowl, which also marked the school-record 60th game of his career. Benhart's play on the line helped quarterback Dylan Raiola set Nebraska's freshman passing record.

2023 (JUNIOR)

Benhart started all 12 games at right tackle and earned honorable-mention All-Big Ten recognition.

Benhart's play on the line helped Nebraska rank second in the Big Ten in rushing. Nebraska rushed for 176.8 yards per game and ranked as one of the 15 most-improved rushing attacks from the previous season.

2022 (SOPHOMORE)

Benhart played in every game in 2022, including 11 starts at right tackle. His work on the line helped Trey Palmer set the Nebraska single-season receiving yardage record (1,043), while Anthony Grant rushed for the most yards (915) by a Husker since 2018.

2021 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Benhart played in every game in 2021 with 10 starts at right tackle. Against Fordham, Benhart helped Nebraska total 300 yards rushing and passing in the same game for only the third time in program history.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Benhart started every game at right tackle as a redshirt freshman. He was the only Husker offensive lineman to start every game at the same position in 2020. Benhart helped Nebraska's offense total 620 yards in a season-ending win at Rutgers, and the Huskers finished with the second-best rushing attack in the Big Ten.

2019 (REDSHIRT)

Benhart played in three games and traveled to every road game as a true freshman in 2019, preserving his redshirt season. Benhart made his career debut at right tackle against Northern Illinois. He also played on special teams against No. 15 Wisconsin and saw extensive time on the line and on special teams at Maryland. Benhart became the 12th true freshman offensive lineman to play in a game in school history.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (LAKEVILLE NORTH HS)

Benhart was regarded as one of the nation's top offensive line recruits at Minnesota prep powerhouse Lakeville North High School. Benhart was selected for the 2019 Army All-American Bowl.

Benhart helped Lakeville North High School to a 13-0 record and a Class 6A state title as a senior. The Lakeville North offense scored at least 35 points seven times, and Benhart earned All-Minnesota honors from USA Today. In 2017, Benhart was a second-team All-Minnesota selection by the Associated Press. Benhart was also a member of the varsity team in 2016, helping Lakeville North to a 9-2 record as a sophomore.

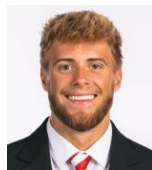
Benhart was also a standout on the wrestling mat. He finished fourth at the 2018 state wrestling championships and then went 34-0 as a senior en route to capturing the Minnesota 3A heavyweight title.

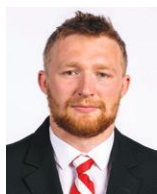

2024 (JUNIOR)

Alex Bullock played in all 13 games with two starts. He caught one pass for 12 yards and was one of Nebraska's top perimeter blockers. His lone reception of the year was a 12-yard catch against UTEP. He made his first start of the season at Purdue and also started at Ohio State.

2023 (SOPHOMORE)

Bullock played in all 12 games, and caught 15 passes for 221 yards and one touchdown, ranking third on the team in receptions.

Bullock led Nebraska with three catches for 56 yards in the season opener at Minnesota, including a career-long 34-yard touchdown. Bullock made his first career start at Colorado, then had a 33-yard reception a week later against Northern Illinois. Bullock had a 14-yard reception and a 22-yard kickoff return against Louisiana Tech. At Illinois, Bullock had two catches for 16 yards, including a reception on a 4th-and-5 play that kept alive a Husker touchdown drive. Bullock caught three passes for 37 yards at Michigan State, tying his career high in receptions. With Alex starting at wide receiver at Colorado and his brother, John, starting at linebacker against the Buffs, the Bullocks became the first brothers to start the same game on opposite sides of the ball at Nebraska since 1987. They started the same game on eight occasions in 2023.

Alex Bullock played in two games in 2022, appearing on special teams against Georgia Southern and Iowa. He made his lone tackle of the season on kickoff coverage against the Hawkeyes.

Bullock was honored as Nebraska's co-Offensive Scout of the Year.

Bullock redshirted and did not play in a game during the 2021 season.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (CREIGHTON PREP HS)

2024 (SENIOR)

John Bullock started all 13 games in 2024 and was an honorable-mention All-Big Ten pick. He set career highs with 70 tackles, 10.0 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks, five pass breakups and one interception, which he returned for a touchdown. Bullock ranked third on the team in tackles and was second in TFLs and pass breakups and third in sacks. He also tied for the team lead with two forced fumbles.

He opened the year with a pair of tackles against UTEP. Bullock then recorded five tackles against Colorado with a career-high 2.0 TFLs, one pass breakup and one quarterback hurry. He set a career high with nine tackles against Northern Iowa, 1.0 sack and a pass breakup. Bullock had nine tackles again the next game against Illinois, including a two-yard sack and a pass breakup. He also forced a fumble that resulted in a takeaway that led to a Husker touchdown.

Bullock had a big impact in Nebraska's 28-10 win at Purdue. He recorded four tackles with a three-yard tackle for loss and had his first career interception. Bullock intercepted as fourth-quarter pass and returned it 35 yards for a touchdown, giving the Huskers a 28-3 lead with less than six minutes to play. Bullock totaled four tackles against Rutgers. He finished with three tackles at Indiana. He recorded five tackles at Ohio State. Bullock recorded eight tackles against UCLA with a four-yard sack. He led Nebraska with seven tackles at USC and added one pass breakup. Bullock finished with four tackles and 1.5 TFLs in the win over Wisconsin. He again had 1.5 tackles for loss at Iowa while tying for the team lead with five tackles. Bullock also broke up a pass against the Hawkeyes. In the final game of his career, Bullock had five tackles, including a sack and a forced fumble against Boston College in the Pinstripe Bowl.

Bullock wore the No. 5 after he was one of 10 Huskers to win a team vote to wear a single-digit number.

2023 (JUNIOR)

Bullock moved from nickel back to linebacker during the spring and emerged as a starter and key playmaker. He played in all 12 games with 10 starts. Bullock wore the No. 5 as one of 10 Huskers to earn a single-digit number in a team vote selecting him as one of Nebraska's "toughest" players.

Bullock helped a Blackshirt defense that posted Nebraska's best rushing defense (92.9 yards per game), total defense (303.5 yards per game) and scoring defense (18.3 points per game) since the Huskers joined the Big Ten in 2011. Bullock was fourth on the team with a career-high 50 tackles with 2.5 tackles for loss, 1.5 sacks, two pass breakups and one forced fumble. He had six games with five or more tackles on the year.

Bullock earned his first career start at Minnesota and recorded six tackles while breaking up the first pass of his career. At Colorado, Bullock totaled five tackles, then totaled a career-high eight tackles against Louisiana Tech with his first career tackle for loss. Bullock had six tackles at Illinois with his first career sack and a pass breakup. He finished with three tackles, 1.0 TFL and a half sack against Northwestern. Bullock totaled seven tackles against Purdue, including five solo stops. He made his 10th start of the season against Iowa and recorded five tackles and forced a fumble.

2022 (SOPHOMORE)

Bullock played on special teams in 10 games as a sophomore. He recorded his lone tackle of the season with a solo stop on kickoff coverage at Purdue.

2021 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Bullock played on special teams in every game, recording five tackles. In the win over Buffalo, Bullock made the first tackle of his career on kickoff coverage, and he also downed a punt at the Bulls' 2-yard line. Bullock also had a tackle on kickoff coverage at No. 20 Michigan State and a tackle on punt coverage at Minnesota. He added another tackle on punt coverage against Purdue. Bullock's final tackle of the season came on punt coverage against No. 6 Ohio State.

2024 (SENIOR)

Brian Buschini, an honorable-mention All-Big Ten performer, handled all of the punting duties for Nebraska in 2024 in addition to being the primary kickoff specialist. He averaged 44.7 yards per punt, the fifth-highest average in school history. Buschini placed 16 of his 45 punts inside the opponent's 20-yard line, including eight inside the 10-yard line. He was recognized as the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week once as a senior. Buschini ended his Nebraska career with a punting average of 43.1, the fifth-highest average in Husker history.

Buschini averaged 48.5 yards on two punts against UTEP. He punted five times against Colorado, averaging 50.8 yards per punt while placing three punts inside the 20-yard line. Nebraska did not punt against Northern Iowa, but Buschini had two touchbacks on four kickoffs. He punted three times against Illinois, averaging 50.3 yards per punt. Buschini punted three times at Purdue. He pinned the Boilermakers inside the 10-yard line on two of his three punts, while his third punt landed inside the 5-yard line and barely trickled into the end zone before it could be downed.

Buschini made a big impact in Nebraska's 14-7 win over Rutgers. He averaged 50.2 yards on five punts against the Scarlet Knights, including two punts longer than 60 yards. His final punt was a 69-yarder that flipped the field and forced Rutgers to start its final drive from its own 11-yard line. Buschini also completed a 30-yard pass on a successful fake punt against Rutgers. Buschini punted three times at Indiana with a long of 52 yards. He averaged 40.8 yards on six punts at Ohio State and also had two touchbacks on four kickoffs.

All three of Buschini's punts against UCLA covered more than 50 yards, as he averaged 55.7 yards per punt with a long of 64 yards. He also had three touchbacks on four kickoffs against the Bruins. Buschini averaged 46.0 yards per punt at USC with three of his five punts inside the 20-yard line. He also had four touchbacks on five kickoffs against the Trojans. Buschini punted twice against Wisconsin, average 50.5 yards per punt with one punt that went out of bounds at the 3-yard line. He placed two of his seven punts at Iowa inside the 20-yard line. In his final game, Buschini had a 47-yard punt in the Pinstripe Bowl against Boston College, and he also completed an 8-yard pass on a successful fake punt.

Buschini also kicked off 46 times with 23 touchbacks.

2023 (JUNIOR)

Buschini, who wore the No. 18 to honor the late Brook Berringer, started all 12 games in 2023, marking the second straight season he started every game. Buschini averaged 40.7 yards on 57 punts. He placed 35 percent (20-of-57) of his punts inside the opponent's 20-yard line with 19 fair catches, allowing only 19 returns. Buschini had seven punts covering 50 yards or longer.

Buschini punted three times at Minnesota, placing all three of his punts inside the 20-yard line, while averaging 47.7 yards per punt, including a 60-yarder. He averaged 42.8 yards on six punts against Northern Illinois and had one punt downed at the 1-yard line. He had terrific placement against Louisiana Tech, putting five of his six punts inside the 20-yard line while averaging 45.3 yards per punt.

Buschini averaged 45.7 yards on three punts against Michigan despite punting into the wind each time. Buschini punted four times at Illinois - all into a strong wind - placing one punt inside the 20-yard line. He placed four of his seven punts against Northwestern inside the 20-yard line. Buschini placed two of his five punts inside the 20-yard line against Purdue with a pair of punts longer than 50 yards.

2022 (SOPHOMORE)

Buschini started all 12 games at punter in 2022. Despite battling a midseason injury, he averaged 44.0 yards per punt on 68 attempts which was the eighth-highest season average in school history. Buschini ranked 25th nationally in punting average in 2022. He had 16 punts of 50 yards or longer and had 14 punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line. For his performance, Buschini was recognized as Nebraska's Special Teams Player of the Year.

In his Husker debut against Northwestern, Buschini averaged 47.2 yards on six punts with four punts downed inside the 20. He averaged 50.5 yards on four punts against Georgia Southern, including a then-career-long 65-yard punt.

He punted eight times against Indiana, placing four of his punts inside the 20-yard line. At Purdue, two of his four punts covered more than 50 yards. He punted six times against No. 17 Illinois, averaging 48.2 yards per punt with three punts longer than 50 yards. Buschini booted five of his six punts longer than 50 yards against Minnesota en route to a career-best 55.5 average. He punted seven times at No. 3 Michigan with a long of 54 yards.

Buschini unleashed a career-long 74-yard punt against Wisconsin, the seventh-longest punt in school history. He ended the year by placing two of his six punts against Iowa inside the 20-yard line.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (CAPITAL HS/MONTANA)

Buschini transferred to Nebraska from Montana, where he was recognized as the top punter in the FCS. Buschini spent three seasons (2019-21) at Montana.

Buschini played in 15 games at Montana, averaging 45.8 yards on 75 career punts. He had 30 punts of 50 yards or longer with the Griz, while placing 35 of his 75 punts inside the opponent's 20-yard line. Buschini also handled kickoffs for Montana, recording 35 career touchbacks.

Buschini started all 13 games for the Griz as a redshirt freshman in 2021, when he was named the FCS Punter of the Year and a first-team All-American. Buschini ranked third nationally with an average of 46.0 yards per punt in 2021, and he helped Montana lead the nation in net punting average. His 46.0-yard average was a school record, breaking the previous record of 44.7 set in 1985. Buschini punted 69 times in 2021 with 30 punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line and 28 punts covering 50 yards or longer.

Montana did not play in the fall of 2020 due to the pandemic and played only two games during an abbreviated 2021 spring schedule. Buschini averaged 43.3 yards per punt that season, placing five of his six punts inside the opponent's 20-yard line. Buschini redshirted in 2019.

Previously, Buschini was a three-time honorable-mention all-state selection for Capital High School in Helena, Mont., where he handled both the punting and place-kicking duties.

PERSONAL

Brian was born on April 25, 2001. He and his wife, Kellie, were married in 2021. A criminology and criminal justice major, he earned his bachelor's degree from Nebraska in December of 2022 and is pursuing his master's degree in construction engineering and management. He was a 2023 and 2024 Academic All-Big Ten selection.

2024 (JUNIOR)

A member of the Mackey Award watch list, Thomas Fidone II played in all 13 games in 2024 with nine starts. He set career highs with 36 receptions and 373 receiving yards, ranking fourth on the team in receptions. Fidone caught multiple passes in 10 of his 13 games.

Fidone caught three passes against UTEP and then had a 13-yard reception against Colorado. Fidone had two catches for 13 yards against Northern Iowa. He had two catches and a then-career-high 46 receiving yards against Illinois, including a 29-yard reception. Fidone made three catches for 39 yards at Purdue. He had three more catches for 15 yards against Rutgers. Fidone set career highs with six receptions and 91 receiving yards at Indiana. He had four catches for 55 yards at Ohio State, including a career-long 33-yard reception. Fidone caught four passes for 16 yards against UCLA. He had two catches for nine yards at USC. Fidone

had a 25-yard reception at Iowa. In the Pinstripe Bowl victory over Boston College, Fidone led Nebraska with five receptions totaling 50 yards.

2023 (SOPHOMORE)

Fidone II played in all 12 games with eight starts in 2023. He led Nebraska with four touchdown catches and ranked second on the team with 25 receptions and 260 receiving yards. His four touchdown receptions were the most by a Husker tight end since 2010.

Fidone caught two passes for 13 yards at Colorado, including a four-yard touchdown on the game's final play. Fidone set a career high with four catches against Northern Illinois, putting up 42 receiving yards. He hauled in a then-career-long 20-yard reception and had a 16-yard touchdown catch.

Fidone made it three straight games with a touchdown catch with a career-long 29-yard scoring grab against Louisiana Tech. With that catch, he became the first Husker tight end to have a touchdown reception in three consecutive games since Kyler Reed in 2010. Fidone caught two passes for 31 yards against No. 2 Michigan. At Illinois, Fidone had two receptions and 42 receiving yards. He had three catches for 18 yards against Northwestern.

Fidone's lone catch against Purdue was a one-yard touchdown grab. He caught three passes for a career-high 43 yards at Michigan State, including a 27-yard reception. Fidone caught a combined six passes over the season's final three games.

2022 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Fidone did not play in a game in 2022. He was limited throughout the year while recovering from an injury.

2021 (REDSHIRT)

Fidone suffered an injury prior to the season that limited his ability to contribute as a true freshman. After rehabbing the injury, Fidone was able to make his Husker debut at No. 19 Wisconsin, his only action of the year.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (LEWIS CENTRAL HS)

Fidone was the country's top tight end recruit and a top 40 recruit. Fidone was a high school All-American for Lewis Central High School, as he was selected for the 2021 All-American Bowl, which featured the nation's top 100 seniors. Fidone was also the lone tight end on the 2020 Sports Illustrated All-America first team.

A second-team preseason USA Today All-American, Fidone put up big numbers in his senior season en route to first-team All-America accolades. He caught 43 passes for 845 yards and 10 touchdowns in 10 games. Despite facing constant double and triple teams, Fidone averaged 84.5 receiving yards per game and 19.7 yards per catch, an average that ranked fourth in the state according to the Des Moines Register. For his efforts, Fidone was named to the All-Iowa Elite team in addition to being an all-state selection. As a junior, Fidone had 39 receptions for 576 yards and seven touchdowns to help the Titans reach the state semifinals. Fidone caught more than 100 passes in his prep career while amassing more than 1,500 receiving yards and more than 20 touchdowns.

Fidone was rated as the No. 1 tight end in the 2021 recruiting class by both Rivals and 247Sports. Rivals listed Fidone as the No. 31 overall recruit in the country, while 247Sports tabbed Fidone as the nation's No. 41 recruit. He was the consensus pick as the top recruit in the state of Iowa. Fidone held offers from nearly every program in the country and chose Nebraska over Iowa, LSU, Michigan, Notre Dame and Penn State.

2024 (SENIOR)

Isaac Gifford started all 13 games in his final season and led Nebraska with 73 tackles while adding 4.0 tackles for loss and one pass breakup. Gifford led Nebraska in tackles in six of the Huskers' 13 games. He ended his career with 240 tackles, which marked the third-highest total by a defensive back in school history. He also played in 57 career games, the third-highest total in program history.

Gifford had one tackle in the opener against UTEP before finishing with six tackles against Colorado to tie for the team lead. Gifford then led Nebraska with 10 tackles against Northern Iowa, including 1.5 TFLs. The 10-tackle effort marked the fourth time in Gifford's career that he had double-digit tackles. Against Illinois, Gifford recorded five tackles. He had two tackles at Purdue. Gifford led Nebraska with eight tackles against Rutgers, including 1.5 tackles for loss. He also broke up a pass against the Scarlet Knights. Gifford led Nebraska with eight tackles at Indiana. He posted the 200th tackle of his career against the Hoosiers, becoming the 10th defensive back in program history to reach the milestone. Gifford recorded four tackles at Ohio State. He led Nebraska with nine tackles against UCLA. Gifford recorded six tackles at USC. He tied for the team lead with six tackles against Wisconsin. He had four solo tackles at Iowa, including a two-yard TFL. In his final game, Gifford recorded four tackles in the Pinstripe Bowl victory over Boston College.

Gifford wore the No. 2 after he was one of 10 Huskers to win a team vote to wear a single-digit number.

Off the field, Gifford was a member of the 2024 Allstate Wuerffel Trophy watch list. The Wuerffel Trophy is college football's premier award for community service. He is also a semifinalist for the Campbell Trophy, college football's premier scholar-athlete award.

2023 (JUNIOR)

Gifford started all 12 games and led Nebraska in tackles, while ranking second on the team with a career-high eight pass breakups. He added a career-high 6.5 tackles for loss and one interception. Gifford wore the No. 2 as one of 10 Huskers to earn a single-digit number in a team vote selecting him as one of Nebraska's "toughest" players.

Gifford was a big part of a Blackshirt defense that posted Nebraska's best rushing defense (92.9 yards per game), total defense (303.5 yards per game) and scoring defense (18.3 points per game) since the Huskers joined the Big Ten in 2011. NU ranked in the top 20 nationally in each of those three categories.

At Minnesota, he recorded five tackles with a five-yard tackle for loss and one pass breakup. Gifford had eight tackles - all solo stops - at Colorado. He recorded three tackles and broke up a pass against Northern Illinois. Gifford had seven tackles, a half tackle for loss, one pass breakup and his first career interception against Louisiana Tech. He also recorded his 100th career tackle against the Bulldogs. At Illinois, Gifford totaled eight tackles and set a career high with three pass breakups.

Gifford posted his fourth straight game with seven or more tackles against Northwestern, finishing with seven stops, including a one-yard tackle for loss. Gifford had 10 tackles against Purdue with a career-high-tying 2.0 tackles for loss and one pass breakup. Gifford made seven tackles against Maryland, including a half TFL. He totaled eight tackles at Wisconsin, his eighth game of the year with at least seven tackles. Gifford ended the season with 11 tackles against Iowa, tying his career high and marking his third career game with double-digit tackles. He also broke up a pass against the Hawkeyes.

2022 (SOPHOMORE)

Gifford played in all 12 games as NU's nickel back in 2022, making 10 total starts with eight starts at nickel and two starts at safety. Gifford ranked third on the team with 70 tackles and posted 5.0 tackles for loss, 1.0 sack and three pass breakups.

Gifford made three tackles and broke up a pass in the opener against Northwestern. He started the next week against North Dakota and had eight tackles with a five-yard tackle for loss that marked his first career TFL. Against Georgia Southern, Gifford earned another start and finished with a career-high 11 tackles while adding one pass breakup. Against Indiana, Gifford had five tackles, including a career-high 2.0 TFLs. Gifford led Nebraska with nine tackles at Purdue. He made six tackles against Illinois with a seven-yard sack for his first career sack. The next week, he recorded three tackles and a quarterback hurry against Minnesota.

Gifford started at safety at No. 3 Michigan and finished with six tackles. He played extensively at safety again the next week against Wisconsin and recorded four tackles. Gifford made his second start at safety in the season-ending win at Iowa, leading the Huskers with eight tackles, including a TFL.

2021 (FRESHMAN)

Gifford played in every game in 2021, including extensive action as Nebraska's nickel back in the final two games. Gifford made seven tackles on the season with one pass breakup.

He recorded one tackle on punt coverage at Illinois and had a tackle on defense against Northwestern. Gifford also had a tackle on punt coverage against No. 9 Michigan that resulted in a minus-five-yard return. Gifford made three tackles - all solo stops - at No. 19 Wisconsin while filling in as Nebraska's nickel back for the injured JoJo Domann. Gifford again played the nickel role in the season finale against Iowa, where he broke up the first pass of his career on a 3rd-down play in Nebraska territory that forced the Hawkeyes to settle for a field goal.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Gifford played in every game in his first season on campus. A key member of Nebraska's special teams coverage units, Gifford totaled four tackles. He made his first career tackle on kickoff coverage against Illinois. Gifford also had tackles on kickoff coverage against Iowa, Minnesota and Rutgers.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (LINCOLN SOUTHEAST HS)

Gifford had a standout career as a versatile playmaker at Lincoln Southeast High School. As a senior, Gifford earned All-Nebraska honors from the Omaha World-Herald by tallying 71 tackles, six pass breakups and an interception. 2024 (SENIOR)

Tommi Hill was plagued by a foot injury much of the season but battled through the injury to play in seven games with five starts. He recorded 21 tackles, 0.5 tackles for loss, one pass breakup and one interception, which he returned for a touchdown.

Hill had one tackle against UTEP in the season opener. Against Colorado, Hill tied for the team lead with six tackles and intercepted a pass which he returned seven yards for a touchdown. The return marked Nebraska's first interception return for a touchdown since the 2019 season. He finished with five tackles against Northern Iowa. Hill made two tackles against Illinois but suffered an injury in the first half and did not return to the game. Hill missed Nebraska's next two games against Purdue and Rutgers. He returned to start at Indiana, finishing with two tackles. Hill did not travel to Ohio State due to his injury. He returned to the field against UCLA and recorded three tackles and one pass breakup. He had two tackles at USC, including a half tackle for loss. Hill missed the final three games of the season due to his injury.

2023 (JUNIOR)

Hill played in all 12 games in 2023, with one start on offense and seven on defense. He split time between both sides of the ball early in the season, before moving full-time to cornerback. Hill set career highs with 26 tackles, nine pass breakups and four interceptions, and he had a half tackle for loss and one fumble recovery.

Hill tied for the Big Ten lead with 13 passes defended during the regular season and ranked fourth with his four interceptions. During conference play, Hill led the Big Ten with 12 passes defended and ranked second with four interceptions. He was recognized for his play with an honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection from both the coaches and media. Hill also led Nebraska with six kickoff returns for 144 yards.

Hill was a big part of a Blackshirt defense that posted Nebraska's best rushing defense, total defense and scoring defense since the Huskers joined the Big Ten in 2011. NU ranked in the top 20 nationally in each of those three categories.

Hill made three tackles and was targeted once as a wide receiver at Minnesota. Hill continued to play both ways over the next five games. At Colorado, Hill had one tackle on defense and again saw action at wide receiver. Hill made one tackle and broke up a pass against Northern Illinois, and he had one carry and one target on offense. He also saw action on offense and defense against No. 2 Michigan, recording two tackles and returning two kickoffs for 42 yards.

Hill started at cornerback at Illinois and had two tackles, a pass breakup and a 10-yard fumble return that set up a Husker field goal. He also had a 22-yard kickoff return against the Illini. Hill had one tackle, a pass breakup and his first career interception in a start against Northwestern, while adding a career-long 36-yard kickoff return.

Hill had a career-high two interceptions against Purdue. He started at cornerback at Michigan State and had three solo tackles with a pass breakup. Hill again started at corner against Maryland and totaled six tackles while tying his career high with two pass breakups. He also had a half TFL against the Terps for his first career tackle for loss. Hill totaled four tackles in a start at Wisconsin. Hill recorded three tackles in a start at Iowa and had a career-high three pass breakups and one interception. His play helped Nebraska limit Iowa to 94 passing yards.

2022 (SOPHOMORE)

Hill began the 2022 season as a cornerback, lining up on defense for the first five games of the season, including starting the first four contests. Prior to the Rutgers game, Hill switched positions to wide receiver.

As a defender, Hill posted 17 tackles and four pass breakups. He had a then-career-high five tackles and a pass breakup in his Husker debut against Northwestern. He recorded three tackles and had another breakup the next week against North Dakota. Hill set career highs with eight tackles and two pass breakups against Georgia Southern. He had one tackle against No. 6 Oklahoma.

After switching to wide receiver, Hill also took over as Nebraska's top kick returner, leading NU with 12 kickoff returns and 221 kickoff return yards. He returned his first kickoff of the season for 22 yards at Rutgers. Hill saw his first offensive snaps at wide receiver against Purdue. Although he did not have a catch against the Boilermakers, he set career highs with four kickoff returns, 91 kickoff return yards with a long return of 32 yards. Hill had an 18-yard kickoff return against Illinois. Hill earned his first start at wide receiver against Minnesota. At No. 3 Michigan, Hill returned three kickoffs for 51 yards. He had three kickoff returns for 39 yards against Wisconsin.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (EDGEWATER HS/ARIZONA STATE)

Hill joined Nebraska after spending his freshman season at Arizona State in 2021. Hill played in 11 games as a true freshman for ASU, finishing with nine tackles, including a career-high three stops against Stanford. He also returned four kickoffs for 79 yards.

Hill chose to attend Arizona State after being one of the top high school prospects in the country for Edgewater High School in Orlando. Ranked as one of the top 200 overall recruits in the nation and the No. 12 cornerback by ESPN, Hill won a state championship as a senior with Edgewater when he had four interceptions and eight pass breakups on the season.

In the opener against UTEP, he made three tackles, including one TFL. Hutmacher had three solo tackles against Colorado, including an 11-yard sack. In the Big Ten opener against Illinois, Hutmacher had four tackles. He finished with three tackles in Nebraska's win at Purdue. Hutmacher had three tackles against Rutgers, including a 4-yard sack. He had one solo tackle at Ohio State. Hutmacher also had one tackle against UCLA. He totaled two solo tackles at USC, including a three-yard TFL. NU ranked in the top 20 nationally in each of those three categories. Hutmacher was key in Nebraska ranking eighth nationally in rushing defense. He wore the No. 0 as one of 10 Huskers to earn a single-digit number in a team vote selecting him as one of Nebraska's "toughest" players.

Hutmacher totaled four tackles at Minnesota, including an eight-yard sack. Against Northern Illinois, he recorded six tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss, which included a half sack. He was a disruptive force against Northwestern, setting career highs with seven tackles, 2.5 TFLs and 2.5 sacks. He had four tackles against Maryland with a two-yard tackle for loss. He ended his season with four tackles against Iowa that included a half sack. Hutmacher also blocked his first career field goal against the Hawkeyes and added a pass breakup and two quarterback hurries.

Following the completion of the football season, Hutmacher dropped more than 40 pounds to compete for the Nebraska wrestling team in the 285-pound class. Hutmacher posted a 7-8 record, finished sixth at the Big Ten Championships and qualified for the NCAA Championships. He also earned Academic All-America honors from the National Wrestling Coaches Association.

2022 (SOPHOMORE)

Hutmacher played in all 12 games with two starts in 2022. He posted 15 tackles and 0.5 tackles for loss on the season.

Hutmacher made his first career start against Northwestern and then recorded his first career tackle the next week against North Dakota. He had two tackles against No. 6 Oklahoma and one tackle against Indiana. Hutmacher posted his first career solo tackle at Purdue and had two tackles against No. 17 Illinois. He recorded one solo tackle against Minnesota and had two tackles at No. 3 Michigan. He started against Wisconsin and had four tackles with his first career TFL. In the season-ending win at Iowa, Hutmacher recorded one tackle.

2021 (FRESHMAN)

Hutmacher played in 11 games in 2021, appearing on both defense and special teams. He provided valuable depth on the defensive line, but he did not record a tackle.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Hutmacher appeared in one game in 2020, making his Husker debut in the season finale at Rutgers.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (CHAMBERLAIN HS)

Hutmacher was a standout three-sport athlete for Chamberlain High School in South Dakota. In addition to being a three-time all-state football player, Hutmacher was also a four-time state champion in wrestling and two-time state champion in track and field.

Hutmacher was a three-time all-state selection who finished with 269 career tackles, 63 tackles for loss and 13 sacks. As a senior, Hutmacher had 88 tackles, 18 TFLs and four sacks. As a junior, he totaled 105 tackles with 11 TFLs, 10 sacks, 10 forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries. The consensus No. 1 player in South Dakota, Hutmacher was ranked among the nation's top 50 defensive tackles.

On the wrestling mat, Hutmacher was a four-time heavyweight state champion, the first four-time champion in one weight class in South Dakota history. Hutmacher went 166-0 from his freshman to senior season and amassed a total of 266 career wins. Hutmacher won each of his final 73 matches by pin, the second-longest pin streak in the history of high school wrestling.

Hutmacher was 43-0 as a senior, 33-0 as a junior, 46-0 as a sophomore and 44-0 as a freshman. He was a four-time All-American who won the 2019 Junior Folkstyle National Championship and the 2017 USA Freestyle National Championship.

Nash is the son of Joe and Laura Hutmacher and was born on May 15, 2001. He completed his degree in management in May of 2024 and competed as a graduate student as a senior. Hutmacher was a four-time Academic All-Big Ten selection.

2024 (SENIOR)

Rahmir Johnson battled through injuries to play in 10 games with two starts in his final season. He carried the ball 54 times for 261 yards while adding 21 catches for 179 yards and one touchdown. He finished his career with exactly 1,000 rushing yards.

Johnson had 11 carries for 50 yards against UTEP. He rushed nine times for 33 yards against Colorado and also led Nebraska with a career-high eight catches and 49 receiving yards, including an 18-yard touchdown. Against Northern Iowa, Johnson had four yards rushing with two catches for 28 yards. He had four carries for 17 yards against Illinois and caught two passes for 14 yards. Johnson had five carries for nine yards at Purdue with a 15-yard reception. He had five carries for 34 yards against Rutgers while also catching three passes for 40 yards. At Indiana, Johnson gained six yards on two carries while catching three passes for 19 yards.

Johnson missed the Ohio State game due to injury. He returned to post three carries for 27 yards against UCLA. Johnson then missed the USC and Wisconsin games due to injury. He returned to have four carries for 21 yards at Iowa with a five-yard reception. In a return to his home state, Johnson was named the Most Outstanding Player of the 2024 Pinstripe Bowl. In the win over Boston College, Johnson had nine carries for 60 yards and one touchdown, and he also had a nine-yard reception.

2023 (JUNIOR)

Johnson played in the first three games including one start before suffering a season-ending injury against Northern Illinois. Johnson ran for 65 yards on 12 carries, caught three passes for nine yards and had three kickoff returns for 102 yards.

Johnson set up a Husker touchdown at Minnesota by returning the opening kickoff of the second half 63 yards. At Colorado, Johnson had 11 carries for a season-high 66 yards, including a career-long 44-yard run. He also caught a three-yard pass and had a 23-yard kickoff return against the Buffaloes. Johnson started against Northern Illinois and had one kickoff return for 16 yards.

2022 (SOPHOMORE)

Johnson saw action on offense and special teams in 2022, playing in 10 games. He rushed for 85 yards on 19 carries while catching one pass for seven yards. He had his first carry of the season with a 17-yard rush at Purdue. He carried the ball four times against Minnesota and added a seven-yard reception. Johnson led Nebraska with 52 rushing yards on 12 carries in the season-ending win at Iowa.

2021 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Johnson played in each of the season's first 10 games with seven straight starts before he missed the final two games of the year with an injury. He ranked second on the team with 112 carries, 495 rushing yards and four rushing touchdowns and was second with two receiving touchdowns and sixth with 16 catches and 197 receiving yards.

Johnson made his first career start at No. 3 Oklahoma, and he totaled 103 all-purpose yards against the Sooners. He rushed 11 times for 42 yards at Oklahoma and had three catches for 49 yards, both of which were career highs at the time. Johnson also returned one kickoff for 12 yards against the Sooners.

He totaled 100 all-purpose yards at No. 20 Michigan State, setting then-career highs with 19 carries and 76 rushing yards. Johnson started and had 12 carries for 74 yards against Northwestern with a career-high two rushing touchdowns. Johnson had a career-high 172 all-purpose yards against No. 9 Michigan. In addition to rushing for 67 yards on 17 carries, he set career highs with seven catches for 105 yards. Johnson hauled in a 41-yard touchdown pass against the Wolverines, the first touchdown reception of his career, and he also had a career-long 43-yard catch.

At Minnesota, Johnson had 11 carries for a career-high 83 yards and two touchdowns before leaving the game early with an injury. He had a season-long 29-yard run against the Golden Gophers. Johnson had 13 carries for 52 yards against Purdue, and he also caught a 12-yard touchdown pass against the Boilermakers. He rushed for 62 yards on 16 carries against No. 6 Ohio State and added two catches for 10 yards.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Johnson played in six games and had eight carries for 30 yards and one touchdown and added six catches for 33 yards. Johnson had a season-long 17-yard reception at Ohio State and returned three kickoffs for 54 yards. At Iowa, Johnson had five carries for 23 yards, including a 12-yard touchdown run. He also had a five-yard reception.

2019 (REDSHIRT)

Johnson played in four games as a true freshman. He gained 64 yards on 21 carries with one touchdown, and he had one catch for 12 yards. He carried the ball three times for nine yards in his debut against Northern Illinois. Johnson played a large role in a 54-7 win at Maryland, gaining 55 yards on 18 carries, including a one-yard touchdown run. Johnson also had a 12-yard reception at Maryland, the first catch of his career.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (BERGEN CATHOLIC HS)

Johnson rushed for more than 2,300 yards in his career as a state champion at Bergen Catholic High School. As a senior, Johnson ran for 1,334 yards and scored 12 total touchdowns, becoming the first Crusader to rush for 1,000 yards since 2009. He was named a third-team all-state selection and a first-team pick among non-public schools.

Johnson rushed for 555 yards and six touchdowns on 90 carries as a junior, when Bergen Catholic won the state title. He also caught 11 passes for 97 yards and two touchdowns and had 23 kickoff returns for 428 yards. He rushed for 462 yards and three touchdowns as a sophomore.

On the track, Johnson won sectional titles in the 100-meter dash each of his last three seasons and was third at the 2018 NJSIAA Championships. He won a sectional title in the 200 meters in 2017, when he also finished fourth in the long jump. Indoors, Johnson finished second in the 200 meters at the 2018 NJSIAA Meet of Champions and second in the 55-meter dash at the 2017 NJSIAA Championships.

Johnson only visited NU but had offers from numerous Power Five schools, including Minnesota, North Carolina, Pitt and West Virginia.

The son of Angela Johnson, Rahmir was born on Jan. 5, 2001. He graduated in December of 2023 with a degree in advertising and public relations. Johnson was a four-time member of the Brook Berringer and Tom Osborne Citizenship teams.

2024 (SENIOR)

Isaiah Neyor played in 12 games in 2024, playing every regular-season game with nine starts. He led Nebraska with five receiving touchdowns and ranked second on the team with 455 receiving yards on 34 receptions.

In his Nebraska debut against UTEP, Neyor caught six passes for 121 yards with a 59-yard touchdown. His six catches tied his career high while Neyor posted his fourth career 100-yard receiving game. 2024 (SENIOR)

Robinson was a disruptive force in the season opener against UTEP. Robinson made two tackles in the game, both behind the line of scrimmage. He had a three-yard tackle for loss in the end zone that resulted in a safety, Nebraska's first defensive safety since the 2009 season. Robinson's second tackle was a five-yard sack. Against Colorado, Robinson had two solo tackles, including a nine-yard sack. He also had a pass breakup and blocked the second field goal of his career. Robinson recorded two tackles and broke up a pass against Northern Iowa. He had three tackles against Illinois. Robinson totaled two tackles at Purdue, including an eight-yard sack.

Robinson was disruptive in the win over Rutgers, totaling three tackles including 2.0 TFLs and a nine-yard sack. He also broke up a pass against the Scarlet Knights. He had two solo tackles at Indiana. Robinson recorded three tackles at Ohio State, including one tackle for loss. Robinson tied the Nebraska record for games played against UCLA, appearing in the 56th game of his career. He had four tackles against the Bruins with two tackles for loss and an eight-yard sack. Robinson had two tackles at USC, including a 10-yard strip sack that resulted in a takeaway that led to a Husker field goal. He recorded five tackles against Wisconsin with a quarterback hurry. Robinson had three tackles and one TFL at Iowa.

In his 60th and final game, Robinson finished with four tackles in the Pinstripe Bowl win over Boston College, including a seven-yard sack, 1.5 tackles for loss and a pass breakup.

Robinson wore the No. 9 for the second straight season after he was one of 10 Huskers to win a team vote to wear a single-digit number.

2023 (JUNIOR)

Robinson played in all 12 games with 10 starts. He posted a career-high 29 tackles with a career-high six pass breakups while tying his career high with 4.0 tackles for loss. Robinson also led Nebraska with 11 quarterback hurries and blocked a field goal against Iowa.

Robinson was a big part of a Blackshirt defense that posted Nebraska's best rushing defense (92.9 yards per game), total defense (303.5 yards per game) and scoring defense (18.3 points per game) since the Huskers joined the Big Ten in 2011. NU ranked in the top 20 nationally in each of those three categories. Robinson was key in Nebraska ranking eighth nationally in rushing defense.

Against Northern Illinois, Robinson made two tackles, including a half sack. He recorded three tackles against Louisiana Tech. Robinson totaled three tackles with a half TFL against No. 2 Michigan. At Illinois, he recorded three tackles and a career-high three quarterback hurries. Robinson had a half sack for an eight-yard loss and a pass breakup against Northwestern.

Robinson had three tackles and one quarterback hurry at Michigan State. He set career highs with seven tackles, 1.5 TFLs and two pass breakups against Maryland while also recovering a fumble. Robinson had two tackles, a five-yard tackle for loss and two more pass breakups at Wisconsin. He made two tackles against Iowa and added two quarterback hurries, one pass breakup and the first blocked field goal of his career.

2022 (SOPHOMORE)

Nebraska's co-Defensive Lineman of the Year, Robinson started all 12 games. He totaled 24 tackles with 4.0 tackles for loss and 2.0 sacks.

Robinson made one tackle against both Northwestern and North Dakota. Against Georgia Southern, he recorded three tackles with a half tackle for loss. Robinson made one solo tackle against No. 6 Oklahoma. He totaled four tackles against Indiana, including an eight-yard sack. Robinson had one tackle at Purdue before recording a career-high six tackles against No. 17 Illinois, including a half tackle for loss. Robinson had one tackle against both Minnesota and Michigan, including a six-yard sack against Minnesota. He recorded three tackles against Wisconsin and had two tackles with one tackle for loss and one pass breakup at Iowa.

2021 (REDSHIRT FRESHMAN)

Robinson played in all 12 games with four starts in 2021, totaling 27 tackles with 4.0 tackles for loss and 2.0 sacks. He started at defensive end and tied his season high with four tackles at Illinois before adding two tackles the next week against Fordham. Robinson made three stops against Buffalo, including a two-yard tackle for loss. He added three more tackles at No. 3 Oklahoma.

Robinson made two stops at No. 20 Michigan State, including a one-yard tackle for loss. He had four tackles against No. 9 Michigan, while also registering his first career sack and pass breakup. Robinson started at Minnesota and had a pair of solo tackles. He recorded one tackle against Purdue and added another tackle against No. 6 Ohio State. Robinson started at No. 19 Wisconsin and had a pair of tackles. He started against No. 17 Iowa and totaled three tackles, including a seven-yard sack.

2020 (COVID SEASON)

Robinson played in every game and started seven of the Huskers' eight games as a redshirt freshman. He helped anchor a strong defensive line and finished with 17 tackles, including 2.0 tackles for loss.

Robinson started at defensive end at No. 5 Ohio State and totaled three tackles and 1.0 TFL. At Northwestern, Robinson made four tackles, including one for a loss. He matched that effort with four more tackles in the win over Penn State before recording two tackles vs. Illinois. Robinson had one tackle at Iowa, and he made three stops against Minnesota.

2019 (REDSHIRT)

Robinson played in three games in 2019, appearing on the defensive line against No. 15 Wisconsin, Maryland and No. 19 Iowa. By playing in only three games, he redshirted and preserved a season of eligibility.

BEFORE NEBRASKA (HIGLEY HS)

Robinson was an All-American at Higley High School in Arizona, where he was one of four finalists for the National Defensive Player of the Year.

As a senior, Robinson registered 74 tackles, including 34 tackles for loss and seven sacks. He totaled 56 tackles as an All-Arizona selection as a junior with 30 TFLs, 13 sacks and five forced fumbles. As a sophomore, Robinson had 16 tackles, five tackles for loss and three sacks.

A four-star recruit, Robinson was ranked as the No. 98 player in the country by Rivals. He also visited Alabama, Oregon and USC.

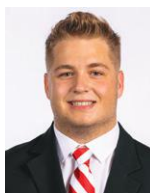

Michigan has won the last four meetings after the Huskers won back-to-back games in 2012 and 2013, giving NU the first winning streak in series history. Nebraska allowed just one Michigan touchdown in winning the 2012 and 2013 meetings. The 2012 game in Lincoln was Michigan's first trip to Lincoln in 101 years and the first-ever game between the schools at Memorial Stadium. Michigan's only previous trip to Lincoln came on Nov. 25, 1911, when the teams battled to a 6-6 tie. First-year Nebraska head coach Bob Devaney led the Cornhuskers to a 25-13 victory over the Wolverines in Ann Arbor on Sept. 29, 1962. Between 1962 and 2011, the two traditional powerhouses split a pair of bowl matchups, with No. 5 Michigan defeating No. 7 Nebraska, 27-23, on Jan. 1, 1986, in the Fiesta Bowl following the 1985 regular season. NU knocked off No. 20 Michigan, 32-28, in the 2005 Alamo Bowl, posting the largest bowl comeback in school history.

Series Notes: Six of the eight meetings since Nebraska joined the Big Ten have been decided by five or fewer points, including each of the past five matchups. Nebraska defeated Michigan State, 9-6, in Lincoln in 2018, winning without a touchdown for the first time since a 3-0 win over Kansas State in 1937. Nebraska's 39-38 win over No. 6 MSU in 2015 marked just the third time in school history an unranked Nebraska team defeated a top-10 opponent. It was also the highest-ranked team NU had defeated in 14 seasons. MSU posted its first two wins in the series in 2013 and 2014. Nebraska's rally from a 10-point fourth-quarter deficit marked one of four second-half double-digit comebacks in 2012. The Spartans were held to 14 or fewer points in each of the first six meetings, including three points in consecutive meetings in 2003 and 2011. NU's win over No. 9 Michigan State in 2011 marked the second straight year the Huskers defeated a top-10 team in Lincoln. Second-ranked Nebraska posted a 50-10 victory at Michigan State in 1995, in the Huskers' first trip to East Lansing.

Series Notes: The 2024 season marked the first time Nebraska did not play Minnesota since joining the Big Ten in 2011. Before Nebraska joined the Big Ten, Minnesota was NU's most frequent opponent among conference schools, with 51 meetings between 1900 and 1990. NU is 5-8 against the Gophers as Big Ten foes, as Minnesota has won the past five meetings, including the last four by seven or fewer points. The 2020 game was played on Dec. 12, the first December game in Memorial Stadium history. Minnesota has won eight of the 11 meetings since 2013 after the Huskers had a 16-game win streak in the series. The 16-game NU win streak from 1963 to 2012 included lopsided NU wins in the first two meetings as Big Ten opponents. In the 2011 win, Nebraska scored the first 34 points, giving NU 145 consecutive points against the Gophers in three consecutive meetings. The first 14 of the wins in the 16-game streak came under Hall of Fame coaches Bob Devaney and Tom Osborne by a combined score of 553-100. NU was 8-0 against the Gophers under Devaney (225-73) and 6-0 under Osborne (328-27). Nebraska posted five shutouts in the winning streak. Nebraska defeated the Gophers for eight consecutive seasons from 1967 to 1974, including NU national championship seasons in 1970 (35-10 at Minneapolis) and 1971 (35-7 in Lincoln). NU posted back-to-back shutouts in the final two meetings in non-league games (1989, 1990), winning by a combined margin of 104-0. Minnesota's 1960 national championship team posted a 26-14 win over Bill Jennings' Huskers in Lincoln in the Gophers' previous victory in the series. The Gophers also beat NU on their way to AP national titles in 1936 (7-0, Minneapolis), 1940 (13-7, Minneapolis) and 1941 (9-0, Minneapolis). Minnesota has never played Nebraska as the nation's No. 1 team, while the Huskers have entered the game with Minnesota as the AP No. 1 three times (1971, 1983, 1984). In 1968, both teams were ranked at game time (NU 9, UM 17) for the only time in series history. Nebraska's 84 points in 1983 are the most scored by the Huskers during the modern era (since WW II). In the first 37 games in the series, which dates to 1900, Minnesota posted a 29-6-2 record and shut out the Huskers 12 times. The Gophers' last shutout came in 1941, which marked the second win in a 10-game winning streak by Minnesota.

Series Notes: Nebraska and Northwestern did not play in 2024, ending a streak of 13 straight years of playing since Nebraska joined the Big Ten. The 2022 game was played in Dublin, Ireland, the second international game in Nebraska history. Eight of the 13 meetings since NU joined the Big Ten have been decided by three or fewer points or in overtime. Northwestern holds a 5-3 edge in those close contests. Nebraska's 56-7 win in 2021 tied for the largest margin of victory in the series. Nebraska has twice defeated Northwestern on the final play of the game (Hail Mary in 2013 and field goal in 2019), two of the three-walk off Husker wins in Memorial Stadium history. Nebraska is 3-2 at Ryan Field. Nebraska's 2013 Hail Mary victory at Memorial Stadium was the first game-winning Hail Mary in Nebraska history. Nebraska won 29-28 at Evanston in 2012, rallying from a 12-point fourth-quarter deficit to the largest fourth-quarter comeback in school history. The Huskers defeated Northwestern 66-17 in the 2000 Alamo Bowl. The game marked the highest point total by the Huskers in a bowl game and Dan Alexander rushed for a Nebraska bowl-game record 240 yards and two touchdowns. Nebraska has been ranked in the AP top 10 in three of the meetings. Nebraska won the first meeting in series history, 12-0, in Lincoln on Nov. 27, 1902—the only shutout in series history. Northwestern posted a 19-7 victory in the first meeting between the two schools in Evanston on Oct. 3, 1931.

Series Notes: Nebraska and Penn State met as protected division cross-over foes from 2011 to 2013, but have played just twice since 2014, and do not play in 2024. This year's meeting in State College will be NU's first trip to Beaver Stadium since 2017. The most recent meeting was held in 2020 in Lincoln without fans during the Covid pandemic. NU won the first three meetings as Big Ten foes, before No. 13 Penn State won in 2017. NU improved to 7-1 all-time in overtime games with its 2013 win in Happy Valley. Nebraska rallied from a two-touchdown halftime deficit for a 32-23 win in Lincoln in 2012. Series Notes: Nebraska and Iowa began the Heroes Game tradition with the first meeting as Big Ten opponents in 2011. Iowa is now Nebraska's only Big Ten foe that the Huskers play each season. The road team has won nine of the past 13 games. Nebraska won at Iowa City in 2022, snapping Iowa's seven-game series win streak. The past seven meetings have been decided by a total of 32 points, including last-second field goals by Iowa in 2018, 2019, 2023 and 2024. The schools have met on Black Friday each of the Huskers' 14 seasons in the Big Ten. Nebraska has played on the day after Thanksgiving each year since 1990, including matchups with Oklahoma (1990-95), Colorado (1996-2010) and Iowa (2011-present). Iowa's 56 points in 2017 were the the most points the Hawkeyes have scored in 55 meetings with the Huskers. Iowa was ranked No. 3 entering the 2015 game in Lincoln, the first time NU faced a ranked Hawkeye team (Iowa was also ranked in 2019 and 2021). In 2014, Nebraska rallied from a 17-point second-half deficit, tying the largest road comeback in school history. The Huskers prevailed 37-34 in overtime. No. 1 Nebraska rolled to a 42-13 win at Memorial Stadium in 2000 in the final non-conference meeting, a year after the No. 5 Huskers cruised to a 42-7 victory in Iowa City in 1999. NU was ranked at game time in eight straight meetings from 1979-2012. The Huskers were 7-1 in those contests, suffering a 10-7 defeat to the Hawkeyes on Sept. 12, 1981. Nebraska held the Hawkeyes to 13 or fewer points in seven straight matchups from 1980 through 2012. NU is 15-8-1 all-time against Iowa in Lincoln, including 11-7 at Memorial Stadium. The first true home game in the series was played at Iowa City on Oct. 31, 1903, with Nebraska coming away with a 17-6 win. The previous 10 meetings had come on neutral fields in the Omaha/Council Bluffs area with the two teams battling to a 4-4-2 deadlock.

Series Notes: Nebraska and Illinois met for the 12th straight season in 2024, but do not meet in 2025. Illinois' overtime victory in the 2024 game in Lincoln marked the first time Nebraska played host to a matchup of ranked teams at Memorial Stadium since 2013. Nebraska's 20-7 victory at Illinois in 2023 ended a three-game Illinois win streak. Overall, the Huskers have won seven of 12 meetings as conference foes. Illinois was ranked 17th in the 2022 meeting, marking the first time the Huskers faced a ranked Illini team. The 2021 game - originally scheduled to be played in Dublin, Ireland - marked the earliest conference game in school history until NU opened the 2022 season against Northwestern in Dublin on Aug. 27. The Huskers are 9-4 against Illinois in Lincoln, including a 4-3 mark as conference foes. NU's 54-35 win in 2018 marked the Huskers' first 50-point game in Big Ten Conference play. The only meetings between 1953 and 2013 came in 1985 and 1986 when the Huskers easily won both ends of a home-and-home series. One of

the more memorable wins in the first half-century of Nebraska football was a 14-0 victory over Red Grange and the Illini on Oct. 3, 1925. It was the only time in Grange's career that he was held scoreless in a home game. NU's second-ever meeting with a Big Ten school came against Illinois with a 6-0 victory on Oct. 24, 1892. NU opened the series with four straight wins in Lincoln from 1892 to 1905.

Series Notes: Nebraska and Wisconsin play for the Freedom Trophy, a trophy that debuted for the 2014 matchup. The 2024 game ended a streak of meeting 11 straight seasons, and the schools will not meet in 2025 or 2026. Nebraska's 19-point win in 2024 ended a 10-game Wisconsin win streak in the series. Nebraska played its first-ever game as a member of the Big Ten Conference at Camp Randall Stadium against Wisconsin on Oct. 1, 2011. The teams met twice in 2012. In the regular-season meeting in Lincoln, Nebraska posted the second-largest comeback in school history, twice rallying from a 17-point deficit for a 30-27 victory. Wisconsin defeated Nebraska 70-31, in the Big Ten title game at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis. The Badgers have won 11 of 13 games since NU joined the Big Ten, including each of the past 10 games. Nebraska was ranked in the top 25 in eight straight meetings with the Badgers before entering the 2015 game unranked, while Wisconsin has been ranked in five of the last seven matchups. The 2016 game featured a pair of ranked teams for the third time in 14 all-time matchups. The 2020 game scheduled for Lincoln was canceled due to COVID-19 protocols in the Badger program. NU was ranked in the top 10 five times entering the UW game from 1965 to 2011, and was No. 7 in 2016. Wisconsin won the first meeting between the two teams, 18-0, on Nov. 2, 1901. The Huskers reeled off three straight wins from 1965 to 1973 by a combined margin of 88-19. The first two meetings came under NU Hall of Fame Coach Bob Devaney, who led his 1965 Huskers to a 37-0 shutout of the Badgers. Nebraska completed a series sweep one year later with a 31-3 victory in Madison. Former Wisconsin head coach and A.D. Barry Alvarez was a linebacker on those two NU teams. The two teams met again in Lincoln in 1973, when No. 2 NU, under first-year head coach Tom Osborne, escaped with a 20-16 win.

Series Notes: Nebraska and Washington will meet for the first time as Big Ten opponents in 2026 in Lincoln. The schools played seven times between 1991 and 2011, including three times in 12 months in 2010 and 2011, with a Holiday Bowl meeting sandwiched between a home-and-home series. Four of the 10 all-time meetings have paired ranked teams, including three games pitting a pair of top-10 teams. Four straight meetings featured one of the teams ranked in the top five nationally. Nebraska's win at No. 2 Washington in 1997 remains the last time Nebraska defeated a top-10 team on the road.
